Medal of Merit

A Weekly Award for Excellence in Broadcasting

AWARDED TO THE UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO ROUND TABLE

FEW programs have built so big or so devoted a following as the seven-year-old series which is known everywhere as the University of Chicago Round Table.

During its earliest days, the Round Table was heard only in Chicago over Station WMAQ. Its premiere as a network show came on October 15, 1933. Since that date, it has humanized both austere professors and knotty problems for the benefit of a vast audience spreading from Coast to Coast.

How an educational program may be also entertaining has long been a broadcasting riddle. When the Round Table was first planned, it was discussed from the point of view of its entry into a typical home. No crowd would be its audience but a man here, a woman there, a family group elsewhere. How could they enjoy and how could they participate in discussion of those subjects on which long-haired professors are accustomed to lecture. The answer was this formula which has been followed on the Sunday series ever since.

On the program, the listener is a kibitzer. Subjects which are the news and consequently topmost in his mind are used. Three professors who prove swiftly that they are no longer-haired than anybody's next-door neighbor toss their arguments back and forth. When a question is forming in a listener's mind, just as he is wishing he could shout it

over the kilocycles, one of the broadcasters is certain to hurl it into the battle of words. Not accidently, of course, but because this is a very definite and important part of their technique of interesting an audience.

Interesting problems arise in this series. There is the matter of voices. In broadcasting, different characters should sound different. But when experts are summoned to discuss Sino-Japanese affairs, for instance, two of them may sound exactly alike. So far as possible, such duplication is avoided. How to broadcast without a written speech is another problem. Many men feel that they should have their remarks written in advance. This broadcast convinces them that notes are enough. Certainly notes are enough for the reader, for he hangs onto every word, knowing that he is hearing men as they really think, not as they parrot in stilted fashion the words they have before them on printed pages.

To those men who have helped produce and present the University of Chicago broadcasts, listeners everywhere must forever be grateful. Their discussions have done much to inform and enlighten. Because they have led the way for many years in bringing a greater understanding of the world about them to radio listeners, we present to them and the University of Chicago Round Table our Radio Guide Medal of Merit.

CASTLE IN THE AIR

CHIEFTAIN OF SHUT-INS, "KING POP I" OF CLEVELAND, RULES HIS KINGDOM FROM HIS BEDSIDE—WITH RADIO

THE crown of King Pop I is a red skull-cap with a tiny red tassel—his throne is an invalid's bed—his scepter is a forked back-scratcher. He rules his realm with radio.

King Pop is John Garvey of Cleveland, the chieftain of the shut-ins. Bed-ridden with arthritis, helpless but not hopeless, sometimes melancholy but never morbid, he keeps in contact with his subjects by radio and mail.

He knows more men than most congressmen. His name is hallowed. He wields more influence than many ministers. He is the chieftain of the strangest clan in creation. And the king can do no wrong. He has no reason in the world to be happy, but he laughs all the time.

"I cannot weep when I laugh," the king says.

It is the sane philosophy of one of the most amazing men I have ever met, a czar who has only one court rule: "You must not mention Death."

I called on the king on Cleveland's West 67th Street. His castle is a frame house, slaty gray—as gray and as moody and as weather-beaten as the snow clouds that banked ominously over Lake Erie. Over the front door is a sign, "Coal for Sale." The king sells coal. His wife met me at the door. She is a smiling woman with capable hands. She moves around gracefully but never bustles. She makes you feel at home in the palace. She never complains.

KING POP was lying on a cot when I entered the throne room. He was smoking a big black stogie. He used the back-scratcher to flip the ashes off the bed.

"Sit down," said the king. "And call me Pop."

The king is as democratic as hash. He can move only one hand, from his elbow to his fingertips. Directly over him and at a convenient angle is an extension mirror. The king cannot move his head, but by looking into the mirror he can see his subjects. To the right of his cot is a radio. There are pegs on the dial control. With the aid of the back-scratcher the king can snap on his set. Directly behind his radio is a short-wave set in a huge black cabinet. It is station W8QJO, and by remote control King Pop can talk to his subjects. His telephone is on an extension and with his back-scratching scepter he can push a button and the telephone pops over his mouth and ear. He does not have to call a number. He can just say, "Operator, this is King Pop. Get me John Smith" at such and such an address.

Pop began carving his territory out of humanity's wasteland ten years ago. That was when he left the world outside his door and took to his bed. With radio, he has now brought the world inside. His regular broadcasts on WCLE in Cleveland make him the best friend of sufferers in thousands of homes. His amateur "bedside chats" on his "ham" station, W8QJO, penetrate beyond "Quiet" signs on sick-room doors in most parts of the world.

Wherever his unstudied philosophies go, they bring back returns in love. Pop's files cherish letters from four thousand people all over the world!

Expertly, King Pop poked his scepter through his stogie, gesticulating with his cigar, and blew a smoke ring into the air.

SO YOU came all the way from New York to see the king, eh?—to find out about his radio?—and about me and about my philosophy? Well, young man, there is a slim line between health and the hereafter. You are on one side." He looked in the mirror and watched me closely. "Over on the other side is eternity. I and my com-

rades are in between. There was a time when I was where you are. I walked and ran and worked as you do. There may come a time, God forbid, when you will be where I am. And there is certain to come a time when you and I both will be over there." He waved his scepter to the left, indicating oblivion.

"There is only a thread between health and helplessness. I was a husky man once—I was a drill-pointer here in Cleveland. That was ten years ago. I was thirty-five years old. And now," he popped his cigar back into his mouth, took two healthy puffs and jerked it out again, "and now I am wasting away—I am petrifying, but I

am not afraid. Only a fool would be afraid. There is nothing I can do about it—there is nothing my doctor can do. When he calls on me he plays the piano—gay songs that make me laugh. He tells me jokes, for he knows that no mortal hand can make me arise. And no elixir can make me walk.

"I hold no grudge with the world—I'm sensible enough to know it would do no good if I did. After all, here I am helpless, so why cry about it? Why worry my friends with my woes? Why cry on their shoulders? Why bore them to tears with my pain? If I would do that I would have no friends. If I had no friends I would be sure to get moody, and if I got moody and melancholy—well, I would just sort of dry up and blow away, I guess.

PAIN? Why do people always want to talk about pain? My pain is so constant that if I should wake up some morning and not have it, huh, I'd think something was wrong—I would miss it—I don't know what it is not to hurt. It's a dull, throbbing kind of pain that begins in my toes and goes right up to my fingertips.

"If I lay here and thought all the time about how bad I felt I would feel a whole lot worse. A man can get used to pain—why, a man can get used to anything.

"I am incurable—there is something terrifying—awesome, about the word 'incurable.' It makes people shrink. It makes a creepy sensation crawl up your back. Incurable—it sounds like—well, it sounds like doom. But arthritis is not necessarily incurable. I wish newspapers and radios would quit talking about incurable diseases. If you get to arthritis in time you can beat it. The same thing is true of cancer. Don't ever say that a disease is certain doom. There is always hope. Never lead the world to think that there is no chance any more."

That is the philosophy of hope where there is no hope on which Pop's "state church" is built—for he is the archbishop of a faith as great as any devout's, too. He preaches it whenever he takes to the air. I asked King Pop how long it had taken him to overcome his shock when he was first called "incurable."

OH, MY disease started like most other diseases of this kind. First I got a cane because I had trouble walking, and then I got a crutch, and then I got a wheel-chair, and then I got a rolling bed, and then, by golly, I just decided I would take a good long rest. So I piled in the bed five years ago, and here I've been. See that square-looking box around my feet?" With his scepter he pointed to the end of the bed. The covers visibly were over a wire netting of some kind. "That is a wire screen over my feet. If the covers ever touched my feet my toes would grow all whichaway, one would go east and one would go west. That's the sort of thing that arthritis does for you.

"And so after they piled me in bed

I lay here for several days thinking to myself and I said to myself: 'Okay, Pop, here you are flat on your back. You'll never get up again. So what are you going to do about it?'

I whistled a tune to kind of cheer my wife up. She was sitting right over there in that chair watching me day and night. My pal, the undertaker, was watching me, too. So I made up my mind then that I would never grunt or groan or complain or sigh. I said to my wife, 'Mom, turn on the radio—get something funny or something lively.' Mom grinned at me and I grinned back and she went over and turned on the radio.

THEN I said, 'Wouldn't it be fine, Mom, if I could turn on the radio myself and just lie here and listen to it,' and Mom said it certainly would be fine. Then I began thinking just how many folks there are in the world just like I am—lying in bed wishing somebody would turn on the radio. Just about that time my back started itching and I couldn't scratch it, so I said, 'Mom, scratch my back, please.' And Mom scratched my back. I began to realize that if every time my back itched I had to call Mom that she wouldn't have a chance to do very much else, so I said, 'Mom, let's buy a back-scratcher, and I can scratch my own back.' So we bought a back-scratcher."

Sometimes when he's on the air, Pop tells his subjects of people who take care of themselves. He makes them want to help carry the burden of their own needs. His people love him for giving them that message. But it was through a strange series of circumstances that he ever became a broadcaster.

"That night some of the boys dropped over and we were sitting around gabbing like we always do, when one of them had the idea of putting pegs on my radio dial. So they did that, and then I discovered I could turn on the radio myself, and I said to myself, 'Pop, now ain't that sump'n? All in the world you've got to do is just lie here and listen to the radio.'

It was so much fun that I decided to drop a line to some more shut-ins and tell them how to turn on their radios. They wrote me back and thanked me and we started a regular correspondence a going.

BECAME such a radio fan that station WJAY (later discontinued) here, heard about me and thought it would be a good idea if I broadcast a program just for shut-ins, so they put me on a bed, rolled me to an ambulance and took me down to the studio. And then they rolled me out under the mike. Mendel Jones was the program director. He hauled the mike in front of me. His hand was sweating—I could tell he was worried. He didn't know but what I might pop off right there in the studio. I hadn't rehearsed any program—it was the first time they'd ever let anybody go on the air there and just talk like they wanted to. But I looked up into the mike and took a deep breath and said, 'Hi, fellows!' just like that.

"I got to talking to 'em. I told 'em I just felt fine—never felt better in my life. And I was having so much fun just lying around doing nothing. Then I sang 'em a little song about everybody works but father and he lies around all day. At the close of the program I reported some news from some more shut-ins. You know the kind of stuff I mean. Kind of like this: 'I got a letter from Joe the other day down in Cincinnati. Joe says he's just doing fine. He had a letter from

Helen out in Topeka, Kans. She says she is not doing so well.' "For some reason the program was a big hit, and Mendel Jones decided to make a regular studio feature of it, and now I broadcast regularly over station WCLE. They call it the 'Shut-in program.' They bring their mobile set out here to my palace, roll my throne out on the porch and I just talk and send news to my subjects. A lot of healthy folks listen in, too, and seem to enjoy it very much.

"Word got around that old Pop Garvey liked to write letters to people, liked to hear from people, and the letters started coming in. I answered every one of them. They came from all over the country—from Europe and from Asia—and the first thing I knew I was averaging sixty postcards a day and about twelve letters. And then somebody started calling me King Pop of the Shut-Ins, and it kind of stuck.

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IT TAKES a heap of money to write that many letters, and I didn't have much money. My son works, but it's not right for a king to depend on his



son, so I decided to sell coal. I had this phone rigged up, and people order coal from me. Sometimes I solicit business—I just push a button, the phone pops over here in front of my mouth and I start talking. I sell enough coal to keep body and soul together. After all," King Pop grinned, "it doesn't take very much to keep me going.

"I first got interested in short-wave radio by listening on my set. I dropped postcards to several amateurs—hams, we call ourselves—and they got interested and wrote me back. So I made up my mind right then that I was going to have a short-wave set. Many of the hams right here in town dropped by to see me, and one night we decided to form a club. We called ourselves 'The Hermits.' There were about fifty of the boys here that night and they all knew radio. So they decided that they were going to get me a short-wave station of my own, and," he waved his scepter triumphantly at W8QJO, "there it is. The fellows made it. The set is so constructed that if anything goes bad it shuts itself off automatically."

THE king took his Federal radio examination and passed with flying colors, and the first night on the air thousands of hams throughout the world listened in. There was one who listened particularly intensely. He is Grandpa Leroy Penfield, of Lorain, Ohio. He, too, is a shut-in, and has his own short-wave set. When Pop got on the air he and Grandpa immediately began a friendly feud that still exists.

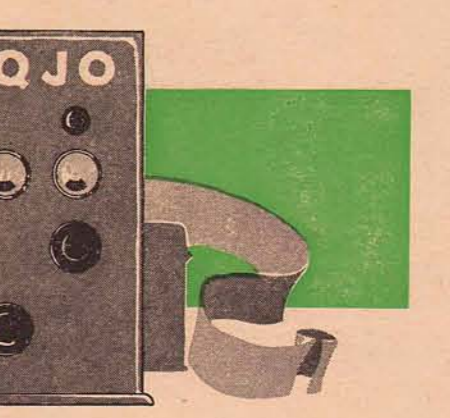
"Grandpa can sit up," the king said, "but he ain't the man I am. He's a

swell guy, but he's pretty nearly petrified.

"Oh, no, I don't spend all my time with radio. I play about three thousand bridge games a year. I use my back-scratcher to deal the cards and to help hold them. I have a regular routine mapped out. I spend four hours a day answering correspondence. Once a week the Hermits meet here and we have a feast and a little sociable game. We conduct a football raffle and during the summer time I spend several hours a day out on my front porch. I am fortunate because I have a rolling bed. It has air tires and can take me anywhere, provided I have somebody to roll me. Usually Mom rolls, or my pal, the undertaker.

THE greatest thing in the world that could be done for shut-ins is for each to be supplied with a rolling bed. The second greatest thing that could happen is for each to be supplied with a radio, and the third would be that each could have a few pennies a week to mail postcards.

"You'd be surprised how many healthy folks like to talk to sick folks



if the sick folks will let the healthy folks do all the complaining. A lot of husky visitors call on me and the first thing some of them say is, 'Oh, Pop, I feel so bad,' and then they will go into a song and dance about the agonies and worries they think they have. I just lie here and listen to 'em and laugh to myself. Here are people coming in telling me about pain—telling me how bad they feel—and yet they can walk, they can enjoy life. But I just let 'em talk because it does 'em good. Then they ask my advice and I tell 'em to buck up. I sympathize with them; in fact, I really sympathize with them more than they sympathize with me.

MAN is a selfish being—there's no getting around that—everybody believes his troubles are the greatest. The greatest bores in the world, however, are the visitors who call and try to feel sorry for me. They come in and say, 'Oh, Pop, you look terrible.' Shucks, I know I look terrible—if you'd been in bed as long as I have you'd look terrible, too. When helpless people are lonely, nine out of ten times it's their own fault. Either they talk too much about themselves or they will not listen to the other fellow's woes.

"Now you take in my kingdom. We had a whale of a convention here last summer during the Exposition.

"I sent word out to all my subjects to come to Cleveland and help us paint the old town red. And did they come! One woman came from Pennsylvania in a milk-wagon. She had two undertakers as companions. They loaded me on my rolling bed and took me down to the Exposition and everybody

who came in yelled, 'Hi, King Pop!'

"We rode around in hearses and ambulances, and boy, you never saw so many undertakers in your life. There were undertakers everywhere, just waiting for something to happen, but nothing did.

YOU know, undertakers are some of the greatest fellows in the world. They have a great sense of humor. My undertaker pal drops by several times a week to visit me. One day he came by and I wasn't on my front porch, where I should have been on a pretty sunny day, and he dashed into the house like a hornet was after him. He was scared to death that some other undertaker had got me. But the undertakers didn't get any business during our convention—everything moved along just perfectly.

"One old lady, who had never seen a cow, came to town—and she lived in the country, too. Can you imagine that? She'd been in bed most of her life, living within a few feet of cows and horses and yet she had never seen one. So I told my subjects, by golly, to show that woman a cow. They loaded her in an ambulance and we chased all over Cleveland till we finally found a cow. Yes sir, we are going to have another big convention next summer.

"The average shut-in likes to read wild adventure stories. Being helpless himself, he likes to imagine that he is the dashing hero you read about in stories—that he shoots Indians and holds up stage coaches and drives ships—goes places and does things.

"Oh, no, not all of my friends are shut-ins. There is Joe E. Brown, for one. Joey is my pal. He was in Cleveland and heard about me, so he dropped out to see me. Boy! his mouth is so big I felt like crawling right out of bed and jumpin' in it. He told me a couple of jokes, and we had a swell time. Another friend of mine is Tony Wons. I hear from Tony all the time, and Gene and Glenn—you know, Gene and Glenn, the radio stars.

"They write me news of the radio world and I pass the news on to my subjects. I write about everything in my letters—that is, everything but politics. I used to write about politics even. I'd find that a certain shut-in was a Democrat, so trying to make him feel good, I'd write him that Democrats are the greatest guys in the world. Then I'd find out another fellow was a Republican, and I'd write him the Republicans were the greatest guys in the world. Everything went along fine till they all got together one time and then they said that King Pop was a liar. So I gave up politics.

"If you want to see my file, just open that drawer over there and look at those cards. There are four thousand names and addresses.

"Oh, yes, and there are several there turned backwards. They have passed away. Yes, I often write and my letters are never received.

WHEN I first started broadcasting I didn't quite have the courage to announce the tragedies in my kingdom, but I realized I had to do it, so now in my regular broadcast I always say those who have passed away are—and I give the list."

The interview was ended. Mom showed me to the door.

"Please come back some time and see the king," she said. I couldn't help thinking about those cards that were turned backwards.

"I'll be back," I vowed, "and I'll write. Until then, God bless the king!"



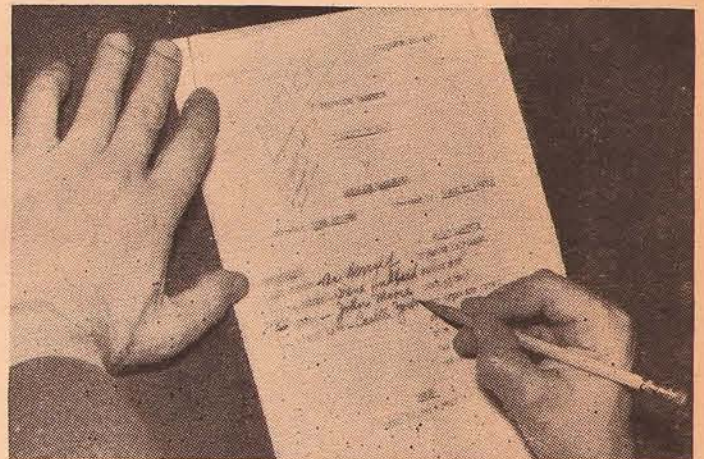

"HILLTOP House" heard over CBS five times weekly, has its share of romance and pathos, and a healthy streak of native humor. At present, there's trouble aplenty at the little orphanage in Glendale. A mysterious stranger has been discovered and brought into "Hilltop House" in a starving condition. Bess Johnson, matron, takes care of him without reporting the matter to the board. (Miss Johnson, formerly "Lady Esther," retains her own name in the play.) She is threatened with dismissal, much to the enjoyment of her assistant, Thelma Gidley. Then, too, the orphanage is running short on funds. In times of stress, Bess has but two friends to turn to—Dr. Robby Clark, town physician, and Paul Hutchinson, town banker.

WHEN you listen to "Romantic Rhythms" over CBS Sunday evening, you'll hear a musical tribute paid to his family by Seymour Simons, conductor of the "Romantic Rhythms" orchestra.

Listen to his opening theme. It's called "Honey," and its composer is Simons himself. But he has given it over to his ten-year-old daughter, Sarah. All the royalties from "Honey" are Sarah's property.

Then wait for his closing theme. It's another of Simons' own songs, "All of Me." And it belongs to his twelve-year-old daughter, Shirley.

This musical concern with his children is part of a task which became Simons' nearly ten years ago when he suddenly had thrust upon him a new role—that of a musician with a family to bring up.

To get to the beginning of the story, we must shift the scene quickly to a house in Miami, Florida, ten years ago, hear the sharp ring of a telephone—see the receiver lifted calmly.

"Detroit calling Mr. Seymour Simons . . ."

"Yes! This is Seymour Simons. What is it?"

Then . . .
"Daddy! You *are* coming back, aren't you? To me and Sarah and Brother? You aren't in the land of sunshine and flowers with Mamma?"

And a child's terrified, bewildered sobbing.

Seymour Simons, himself frightened, thought fast. Over a thousand miles of telephone wire went his calm, reassuring voice.

LISTEN, Shirley, Daddy is coming back tomorrow. He's in a land of sunshine and flowers, but not the same one where Mother went. Get Nurse to show you a map of the United States. Get her to show you just where you are on the map and just where Daddy is. It isn't the same as where Mother is, because there is no map of that place."

Then, still bewildered, he talked to the nurse. He learned that the trouble began when she told little Shirley that Daddy was in a "land of sunshine and flowers"—exactly the same words that Grandma had used to explain where Mamma had gone when she died only a few months before.

Shirley, not quite three, didn't understand.

After he had put down the receiver Seymour Simons sat for a long time in the Miami living-room of his own parents' house and thought about the job he had on his hands. He had to bring up a family of three motherless children, all under six, who depended on him completely, as Shirley's phone call proved. And, too, he would have to continue his own musical career at the same time.

The other day, he talked to me about it in his New York hotel suite, where he spends every Saturday directing the musical details for his Sunday evening broadcast.

Radio is the only musical work he will undertake these days. And even his radio work must be regulated to allow him a maximum of time at home in Detroit.

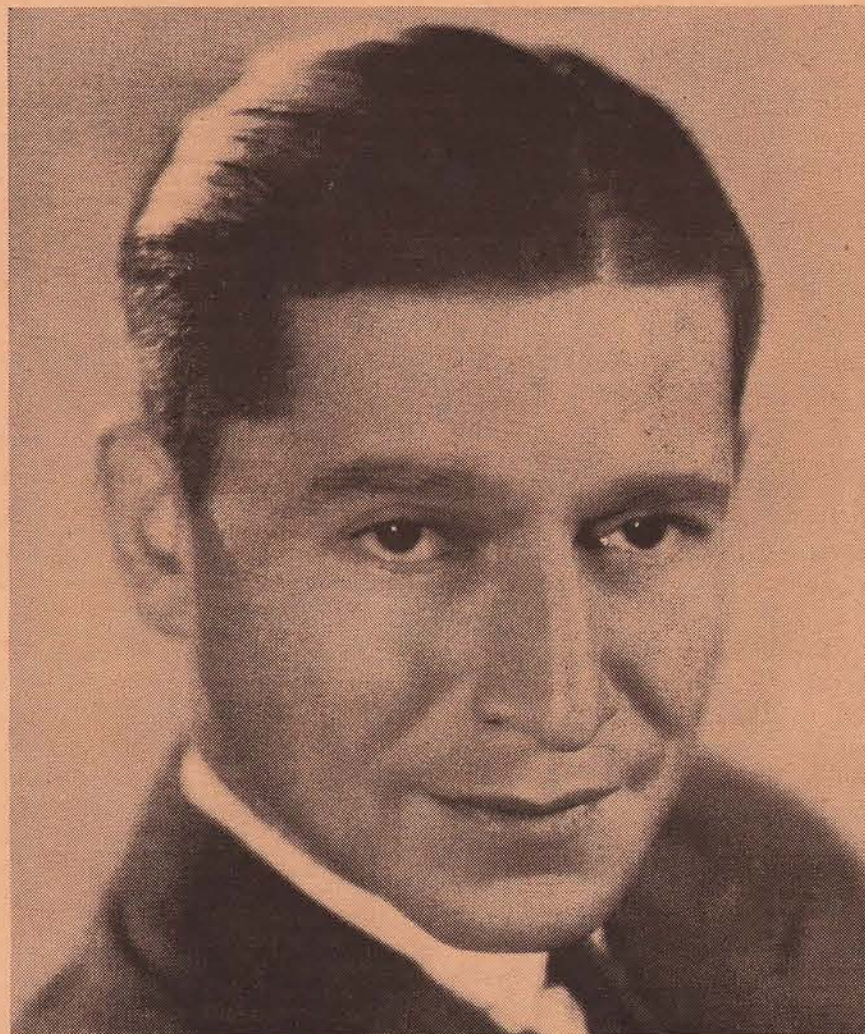
He comes to New York each Saturday and takes the train back to Detroit again Sunday night.

IT WAS during one of those brief week-ends in New York that we discussed the simple rules that made it possible for him, a musician, to bring up a family—rules that all parents, whoever and wherever they are, can follow to give their own children the kind of training they need for living.

SEYMOUR SIMONS OF "ROMANTIC RHYTHMS" PAYS MUSICAL TRIBUTE SUNDAY—TO HIS OWN CHILDREN

"That telephone call of Shirley's ten years ago certainly brought me up short," he said, leaning back.

"It made me realize what I was up against, being father and mother to three youngsters, and traveling with my own band at the same time.

"Already Sarah was beginning to be exactly like her mother—Titian-haired and quick-moving. It was my job to help her fulfill that promise.

"And Shirley, high-strung and nervous of temperament already? I was the one who must help her learn to control tendencies toward hysteria and instability. And Brother, named Ruthven for his mother, Ruth Oppenheim Simons, who died when he was born. I had to bring him up from babyhood. But how was I to do it?"

All of this was as much of a problem to Seymour Simons as it is to any

parent, and he endeavored to find the right answer just as desperately.

WHAT did he know about child psychology?

Where was he to find such knowledge? To whom could he go with his problem?

Suddenly he remembered a young psychology student he had met on a trans-Atlantic steamer years before, a young man on his way to study in Vienna, who had later returned to become a famous child psychologist in New York.

"That old friend of mine," he says thankfully today, "taught me, in our one short interview, fundamentals of the bringing up of children that I have never forgotten. I'd like to pass them along to the parents in my radio audience who must often feel about their

children just the way I have felt about those youngsters of mine."

His deep-brown eyes lighted up with a smile for a minute as he lit a cigarette with firm, nervous, capable hands.

"I don't want you to get the idea that I had anything fancy in mind for my children or that I thought they were a special case. I was just young and inexperienced. I wanted a set of rules to go by. And I got them, but with the warning that they weren't a set of rules you could put on your children like a pair of stockings or that you could use to measure them by as you do their height and weight.

"The first rule to remember is that children are both immature and adult at the same time. That's why—and this is one of the first things my psychologist-friend told me—you must never force affection on children. They don't want to be grabbed up from their play and 'whooz li'l darlin' izzou'ed' to death.

AND the reason for that is very simple. The desire for affection is just the same with children as with adults. It never changes, whether you're four or forty.

"You want affection when you lose your sense of self-sufficiency, when you feel the need to lean on somebody, when you're lonely. With a grown-up it may be after a disappointment or failure in business or in love; and with a child it may be just a simple fall or a nightmare.

"But when a man is working out a sales campaign or a woman is planning a meal, just as when a child is busy playing with his toys, he doesn't want to have affection forced on him."

One thing Simons always tries to do is to manage to be in the same place when they come home from school every afternoon. They want some little attention after the long day away from home. If they know just where you are, they'll run to you with a welcoming kiss. But if they have to run all over the house looking for you, they forget about that natural impulse of affectionate greeting, and then you miss an opportunity to lavish a wanted affection on them.

THE other rules Seymour Simons has been following for ten years are equally simple and sensible.

One is not to ask children to do things for you that you aren't willing to do for them.

"I remember I used to come home sometimes pretty tired and jittery and ask the children to be quiet so I could rest. One day, Shirley did the same thing. She said she had a headache, lay down on the coach, and asked us would we please be quiet.

"It was my business to explain this to the other children—so that Shirley could hear me. Then we were very quiet, and she understood that she would get the same consideration from me that I expected from her."

On the other hand, don't refuse to do things you expect your children to do. In the Simons' household recently the cereal question became a burning one. Shirley and Sarah and Brother all refused to eat cereal, said it was just kid stuff.

But when their Dad insisted on having cereal along with them, they decided it must be all right.

A common failing among parents is a tendency to "don't" their children all the time. Or to keep calling them to do little things of really little importance.

"One of the worst things you can do is to lose your temper with children

RADIO'S NEWSCASTING GROWS UP AS "HEADLINES AND BY-LINES" REVIEWS THE NEWS EACH SUNDAY

ONE of the magic properties of the modern metropolitan newspaper is the kaleidoscopic charm of its front page, the fascinating diversity of headlines which reach out for the reader's consciousness, halt him, tempt him, drag him, willy-nilly, into the news stories which support them.

To take a quick glance at a good front page is to open a door into a kitchen filled with the appetizing aromas of cooking food, or to peer through a slit in the canvas fence around a circus or carnival. Headlines do more than tell a story. They sell a story.

One of the problems of broadcasting news by radio is the problem of news display, the problem of exciting and holding the listener's interest over a period of more than the few minutes required for the announcement of one or two startling bulletins. Some programs attempt to get around this difficulty by employing announcers whose voices have some peculiar charm or vibrance. "Headlines and By-Lines," a CBS newscast heard every Sunday night, solves it by resorting to a modification of newspaper technique.



At the opening of the broadcast, three announcers—Mel Allen, Frank Gallop and Kenneth Roberts—reel off in rapid succession a series of headlines based on last-minute bulletins from radio news-service wires. Then come the commentators with the news back of these catchy headlines and the headlines of the preceding week, and when they have finished their tasks the program closes with an alluring invitation to the listener in the form of several enticing questions on current events and probabilities in the news. What will happen next week? It is an infallible bid for interest.

This newscast, broad and shifting as is its base, is well integrated. The introductory headlines pave the way for the march of the commentators. The queries at the end of each broadcast leave the listener with a few brain-teasers which give him pause to think, and since to the average citizen there is nothing more fascinating than an opportunity to don the robes of an oracle, their attraction is well-nigh irresistible.

Four experienced radio news-commentators carry the burden of broadcasting "Headlines and By-Lines." Two of them—young Bob Trout, highly publicized as Columbia's "presidential announcer," and H. V. Kaltenborn, old-time newspaperman—are fixtures. The others—Lewis Browne, famed author and traveler, and Pierre Bedard, director of the French Institute in New York and Secretary General of the Alliance Francaise—alternate on the program. This Sunday will be Bedard's turn to appear.

Preparations for the program are made under heavy pressure. Trout writes a script covering his feature material, but on Saturdays and Sundays watches the papers closely for events that might change the complexion of the news. Often having completed his weekly chore, he finds that he has it to do all over again. Kaltenborn uses no scripts, ordinarily jots down only a few notes and figures, but likewise watches the wires. Either Browne or Bedard—whichever is scheduled on a given broadcast—is given advance notice of the subjects on which Trout and Kaltenborn will talk. This, too, precludes overlapping.

Then they settle back and await the inevitable last-minute rush. On Sunday nights, at the studio, Trout gets the latest bulletins from news-service wires and fits them into his scripts. For the announcers, headlines are written and hurriedly inserted in their scripts. Revisions are made where necessary, and the questions to be left dangling as bait for listeners' interest are formulated. The result is a first-class newscast, as timely and exciting as a swiftly and ably edited newspaper.

LAWRENCE TIBBETT'S CAREER OF TRIUMPH BRINGS HIM TO FORD HOUR SUNDAY NIGHT

TOWERING high among today's American heroes of song is Lawrence Tibbett, guest on the Ford Hour Sunday, who just returned from a series of shining triumphs in the opera houses and concert halls of Europe.

Paris, Vienna, London, Prague and other foreign music centers now give the grandly gifted Californian the same eminent standing he had won here in song recitals, radio appearances, on the screen, and with the Metropolitan and other American opera companies.

Tibbett's artistic career started just after the World War (where he served in the Navy), when he got his first singing job at Grauman's Million Dollar Theater in Los Angeles because it was thought he looked like Charles Ray, the screen star in the film then being featured. He sang a blacksmith's song, and was paid \$50 a week! Later, Tibbett studied with Basil Ruysdael, formerly a Metropolitan Opera member and now radio announcer heard over station WOR in New York.

During the 1924-25 season at the Metropolitan, Tibbett did the role of Ford in Verdi's "Falstaff," and put so much vocal fire and fury of delivery into his second act aria of jealousy that an unprecedented ovation fell to his lot. The enraptured audience, clapping, cheering, stamping, insisted for over half an hour that the young singer take an individual curtain call, which the stage director refused to grant. Impresario Gulio Gatti-Casazza finally rushed backstage and let Tibbett accept the honor, which appeased the tumultuous house. Next day every New York newspaper front-paged the incident and its hero at once sprang into national fame.

AND was there drama also in real life for Tibbett! His father, a two-gun sheriff in Kern County, California, was shot and killed by a gang of bandits he tried to capture. Twenty-six years later, in 1922, the son sang the role of the sheriff, Jack Rance, in the Metropolitan Opera revival of Puccini's "The Girl of the Golden West." The rest of the cast being largely foreign, Tibbett was the only rough California pioneer in the play who knew how to handle his firearm properly.

Next to the sensational "Falstaff" appearance, Tibbett's most pronounced success has been as the ebony-hued and scoundrelly Emperor Jones, in the O'Neill-Gruenberg opera of that name. Whoever has seen and heard him as the terrified negro, running away from his savage pursuers, lost in the darkening forest, and praying for help when ghosts of his past rise to torture him, will never forget the intense pathos and passion of that scene as sung and acted by Tibbett.

This altogether-celebrated and likable artist has not been heard in radio since last May, and therefore he is the more welcome when he raises his voice anew on the "Ford" program Sunday night.

THE MET'S NEW FIND,
DONALD DICKSON, IS
GENERAL MOTORS STAR
THIS SUNDAY NIGHT



NOTHING ever happens to me." That's what Donald Dickson, baritone and "General Motors" star Sunday night, said. A remarkable statement, and coming, too, from a young American who made the Metropolitan spring season last year, is now a member of its regular illustrious winter company, and owns an exclusive radio contract with the "General Motors Concert Company."

Probably the most important thing that happened to Mr. Dickson was that he came into this world just twenty-six years ago. He uttered his initial vocal aria when he first opened his eyes at Clairton, Pa., but no one there foresaw his future success, nor in Lakewood, Ohio, either, where the Dickson family moved when Donald was still a boy.

Papa Dickson, superintendent in a steel plant, and surrounded by daily din, no doubt had a good laugh when his Donald was told at school that he could not sing because his voice was too loud! But musical Mama Dickson, who plays the piano and organ, knew better than that, and fostered her son's singing talent. She encouraged his general studies at high school, from which he graduated, but with no desire to go on for a college education.

ANOTHER to whom I owe much," Mr. Dickson says, "is connected with my high-school career, for there I met a pretty brunet. It was a case of mutual love-at-first-sight and we have been happily married for eight years. What a gambling chance that girl took! I had no money, and worked in a steel plant and a cigar store while I was preparing myself for what I really wanted to do."

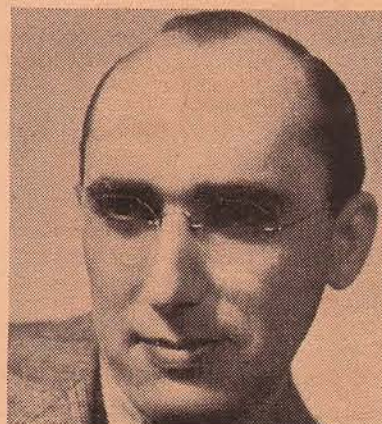
There were obscure local appearances. Incessant polishing of voice and interpretation. Then came his first real opportunity. The Cleveland Symphony Orchestra produced "The Merry Wives of Windsor," and assigned Dickson to the big role of Ford.

No more steel and cigars after that. He began an engagement for summer opera in Cleveland, followed by a renewed course of study at the Juilliard School in New York. He made his public stage debut in that institution, singing the title role in "Garrick." General Motors scouts heard Dickson and signed him for a guest appearance at Carnegie Hall. A radio contract and a successful debut as Valentine in "Faust" at the Metropolitan followed.

There is no musical isolation for Dickson, who, unlike some other singers, goes to the opera even when he is not performing there. "That's part of my studies," he holds. Eager to sing in the Wagnerian repertoire, a wistful look comes into his eyes as he confesses, "It's really one of my greatest ambitions to do the role of Hans Sachs, the lovable cobbler-poet in the great 'Meistersinger'."

He still insists that nothing much has happened to him. "No. Nothing. I never even sang in a church choir."

DAZZLING DICK POWELL HEADS CAST OF NEW WARNER BROTHERS- LUCKY STRIKE SHOW WEDNESDAY

MANY observers think the movie-makers of Hollywood have stolen a march on eastern radio men by arranging alliances with commercial sponsors for the broadcast of air shows filled with Hollywood talent, written by Hollywood authors, produced with the assistance of Hollywood directors, and redounding, quite naturally, mainly to Hollywood's credit. Be that as it may, the fact remains that the trend of radio toward the movie capital is becoming more and more pronounced. New evidences of the westward tide of empire pile up day by day.

Early last month Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer announced a marriage of convenience with the makers of Maxwell House Coffee, and the birth of a sprightly new variety show spangled with glittering stars from the M-G-M studios on the Pacific Coast. Then came Warner Brothers with the news of a union of their resources with those of the American Tobacco Company, makers of Lucky Strike cigarettes. Now, along Broadway and its tributaries, there is a well-authenticated report that around the first of next year R-K-O will open a show cut from a similar pattern. Its sponsor is as yet unnamed.

Who will benefit most from these enterprises it is difficult to say. Apparently the commercial sponsors fear no loss of identity in Hollywood; and Hollywood, young in years but old and shrewd in show business, is going efficiently about the business of killing two birds with one stone—selling its talents profitably to national radio advertisers and at the same time keeping itself and its personalities firmly in the public eye.

The Warner Brothers-Lucky Strike show has its inaugural Wednesday over NBC with Dick Powell, lively young Warner Brothers star, as master of ceremonies and central figure in the fifty-two week series of hour-long broadcasts. Featured with Powell as a regular performer on the program is Rosemary Lane, who appeared with him in the Warner Brothers picture, "Varsity Show," and is one of the stars of the forthcoming "Hollywood Hotel."

The new show replaces the current Lucky Strike Wednesday night "Hit Parade," leaves intact the Saturday night "Hit Parade." Behind it will be the entire resources of the Warner Brothers studios, including the standing-army of scenario writers, directors, and composers. Producers say it is designed to provide radio listeners with a panoramic view of the movie capital. Following a fashion established by its forerunner, the M-G-M show, it will include previews of Warner Brothers pictures and feature an impressive list of guest stars. Leo Forbstein, movie musical director, will be in charge of orchestral music and Dudley Chambers will direct choral numbers.

When Powell, a genial young man who likes to be called a "typical young American," assumes his new duties as master of ceremonies on the radio show, he will be returning to the role from which he was graduated into the movies. He is a native of Arkansas, once sang in a church choir (until his boyish soprano changed to baritone), later traveled as a saxophonist, a pianist and a drummer with various orchestras, was a master of ceremonies in a Pittsburgh theater, and then entered the movies.

Miss Lane is the daughter of a small-town Iowa dentist. She was graduated from Simpson College, won her first job as a singer on a trip to New York with her mother, when Fred Waring heard her and her sister sing and gave them a contract to appear with his Pennsylvanians. In the three years she spent with the Waring organization she achieved a nationwide reputation as a radio performer. When Waring and his musicians were cast in "Varsity Show" with Dick Powell, Miss Lane was given the feminine lead. A movie contract followed.

'A More Intelligent Listening'—CBS

A Welcome From New York University

The radio listener wants a guide. The newspapers provide it for him with relation to amusement broadcasts, but he also wants it for cultural programs. The listing title does not always clearly indicate the nature of the broadcast.

BRAVE NEW WORLD... history

CBS Mondays, 10:30 to 11 p.m.

Everyone knows the story of the Inca king who offered a solid roomful of gold as ransom when the Spanish Conquistadores came—and then, his promise fulfilled, was tortured to death. It is only one of many deeply moving stories which form the richly colored histories of the countries of South America. From those lands have come some of the most intensely dramatic epics in the long history of man's efforts to understand his fellows and to harmonize the conflicting customs, ideas and institutions that distinguish one nation from another.

Our Latin-American neighbors have been alternately scourged by the wrath and arrogance of conquerors and the sympathy and determination of social messiahs sprung from within and without their own ranks. From these stories of great courage and faith in a finer destiny come the background materials for "Brave New World."

This new program combines the sweep and depth of world history with the sparkle of tomorrow's news. Pointed parallels between ancient racial and national struggles with those of today will be readily drawn by the thoughtful listener. And equally evident will be some of the answers to the great problem of amicable international relationships—the difficult but open way to a brave new world.

The program is particularly significant and noteworthy at the moment because of the recent startling political developments in Brazil, and because, in the opinion of many experienced observers, the South American countries are just emerging on an era of great development.

This week a selected group of Columbia artists will dramatize the events surrounding the famous secret meeting between Bolivar, the greatest hero of all South America, the man who broke the yoke of Spanish rule in what are now Venezuela, Colombia, Ecuador, Panama, Peru and Bolivia, and the great San Martin, hero of Chile and Argentine independence.

Little known, but vastly important, the meeting has been called—as the drama will be—"America's Most Famous Interview."

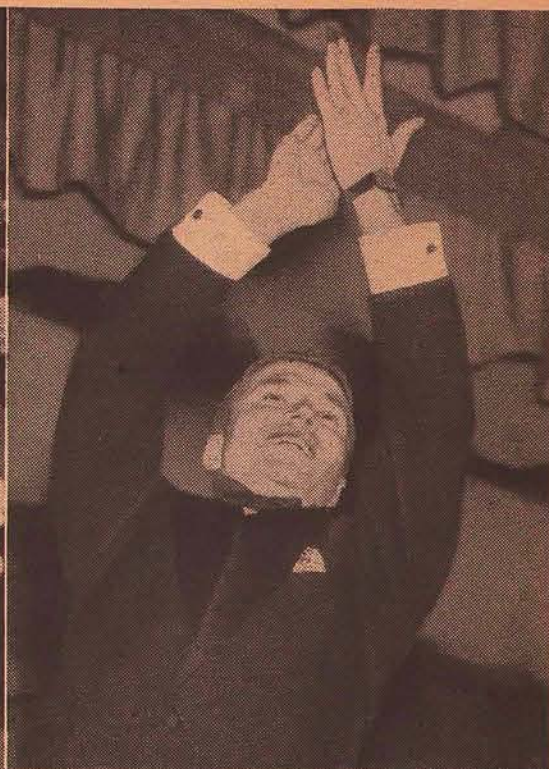

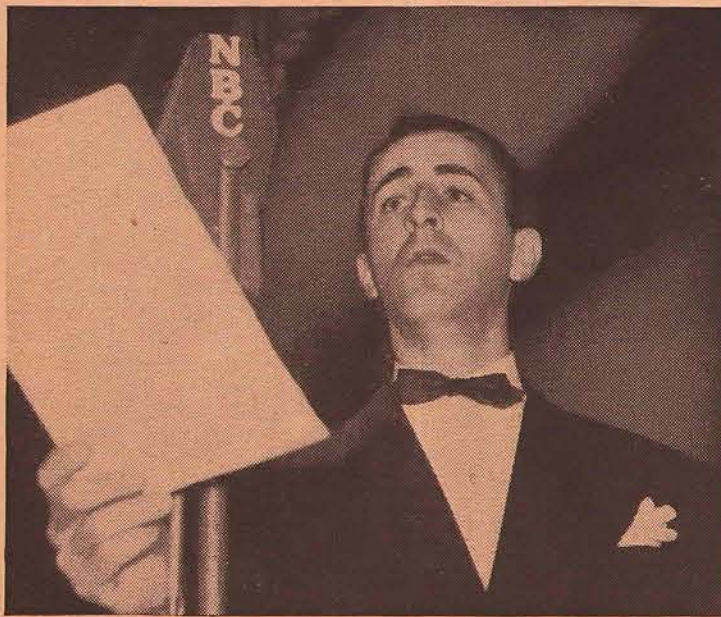

OUR SINGING PHOTOGRAPHER VISITS AN EDDY DUCHIN BROADCAST

SINCE Sept. 29 of this year, Wednesday nights on NBC have been brightened by sprightly music built around the piano interpretations of Eddy Duchin's "magic fingers." Sponsored by Elizabeth Arden cosmetics, Duchin's show brings popular and classical music—and on November 24, brought listeners a special guest, Radio Guide's "singing cameraman," Gene Lester, who sang "Harbor Lights."

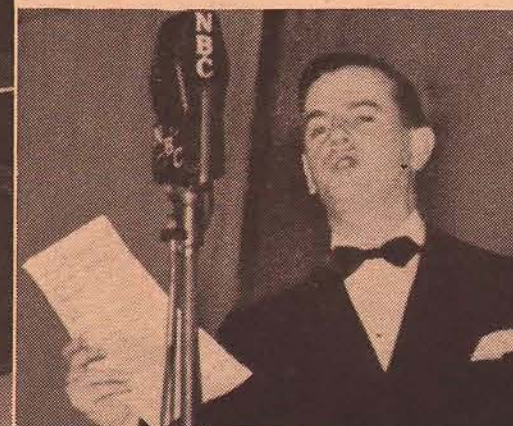
The "magic piano-fingers of radio" are insured for \$100,000—but Duchin's music was once just a hobby. He studied at Massachusetts Pharmacy College, preparing to take over his father's chain of drug stores, but after graduation he joined Leo Reisman's Central Park Casino (New York) orchestra. When Leo left, Eddy stayed on, formed his own band, became a society and radio favorite and one of radio's most popular and highest-paid leaders.

MOZART'S "Marriage of Figaro" employs the main characters to be found also in Rossini's subsequent "Barber of Seville." The stories of both are humorous, and strangely enough in the realm of opera, end happily. Mozart's delightful music aptly matches the plot (based on a comedy by Beaumarchais) of droll intrigue and tender sentiment.

Lalo's (French composer) "Symphonie Espagnole" (Spanish Symphony) is more of a violin fantasy than a symphony. Sensuous melodies and characteristic repeating rhythms of Spain make piquant and exotic experience for the listener.

"Mardi Gras" is the great annual February festival in New Orleans, and the "dark dances" orchestrated by Cadman sound subtle pascings and harmonies that some fanciful minds might associate with the mysterious voodoo rites of the colored brethren in earlier southern days.

The March of Music

Edited by Leonard Liebling

"... An ampler Ether, a diviner Air..."—Wordsworth

A MATTER has been troubling me of late which might bring easement if I discuss it frankly.

Some of the top-rank opera and concert vocalists frequently permit themselves (or are they more or less subtly persuaded?) to air their voices and talents in the delivery of frankly popular songs or those of the easier ballad type. The practise is unfair to the artist and to listeners. The finished performance of a light song is as much of a specialty as the presentation of a concert number or an operatic aria. The fingers of one hand would be more than sufficient to count the singers who do equally well in the higher and lesser styles. That is no disparagement of the lesser; but Schumann, Schubert, Verdi and Wagner just do not mix effectively with Youmans, Cole Porter, Kern, Irving Berlin, and Rodgers and Hart.

It is an error for most prima donnas, male and female, to imagine that they master the technique necessary for rhythm songs, swing material or popular ballads. They have not even the proper feeling for them. In that field I have never heard any great concert or opera exponent approximate the skill of a Kate Smith, Jane Froman, Sophie Tucker, Ethel Merman or Dorothy Lamour.

I truly doubt whether radio listeners really care to hear opera and concert experts do the music of Broadway, except just once as a matter of curiosity. Am I wrong about that?

On the Banks program this Monday night, Leopold Stokowski's conducting of Tschaiakowsky's Fifth Symphony ought to be something particularly arresting and exciting. In the Philadelphia Orchestra he has a medium brilliantly able to carry out his interpretation of the composer's typically Russian pages, in which folk-tunes are adorned with such masterly symphonic dress. The martial opening section has always intrigued me as much as the songful slow movement, the graceful waltz interlude, and the barbaric dance constituting the finale. Tschaiakowsky's Fifth is one of the clearest and most understandable of all symphonies, luscious in melody, richly colorful in orchestration. The work, while not as popular as the composer's "Pathetique Symphony," ranks with it in picturesqueness and inspiration. Enjoyment of the slow movement enhances if listened to as an ecstatic love duet heightened by tragedy.

Dr. Walter Damrosch started a vitally useful musical influence many years ago when he founded public symphony concerts for children and somewhat older young people. When radio came, he transferred his activities to the air, where his valuable music-appreciation courses have become a permanent fixture. However, other conductors continued the idea of playing symphonic music in concert halls for audiences of chil-

wrongfully accused by her jealous husband, Renato (Tibbett).

"Eri Tu," one of Verdi's finest inspirations, expresses, with poignant melody and a deep sense of drama, a tale of love, hate and a broken heart.

Philip James' "Bret Harte" gives impressions of some of the early western stories by our famous American author, and tingles with racy music of that atmospheric period. Listen for the rattle, slapstick and tenor banjo.

A CONCERTO GROSSO is a composition in concerto form, but assumes a sort of wholesale complexion, for groups of instruments take the place of the usual solo performer. Handel and Bach wrote copiously in "Grosso" form. Composers of our day have adopted it on occasion, but of course with modifications of the original strict classical character. In the present example, the expansive constructional lines of Handel, as well as his abundant vitality and ease of craftsmanship, are well represented.

Scarlatti's music is predominately bright and often distinctly humorous, like the bit of burlesque on this program. Perhaps he was thinking of himself and his capacious abdomen, so large that he had extreme trouble to play harpsichord music which required him to cross his hands.

REGALLY splendid is the Flagstad vocal equipment, and nothing features it better than the great "Love Death" ending Wagner's opera of romantic passion. The accents of ecstasy and deepest grief make Isolde's dying apostrophe to Tristan an expression of sublimated beauty and pathos. Although I have heard it countless times, each new hearing—especially in the Flagstad voicing—never fails to give me musical goose-flesh.

Norwegian by birth, the grandly eloquent soprano interprets with racial feeling the songs of her countryman, Grieg. The two herewith listed are poetical flowerings of his lyric genius.

Grieg deserves more attention than he receives nowadays from program-makers, for he still exceeds all other Scandinavian composers in direct melodiousness and tasteful harmonizing.

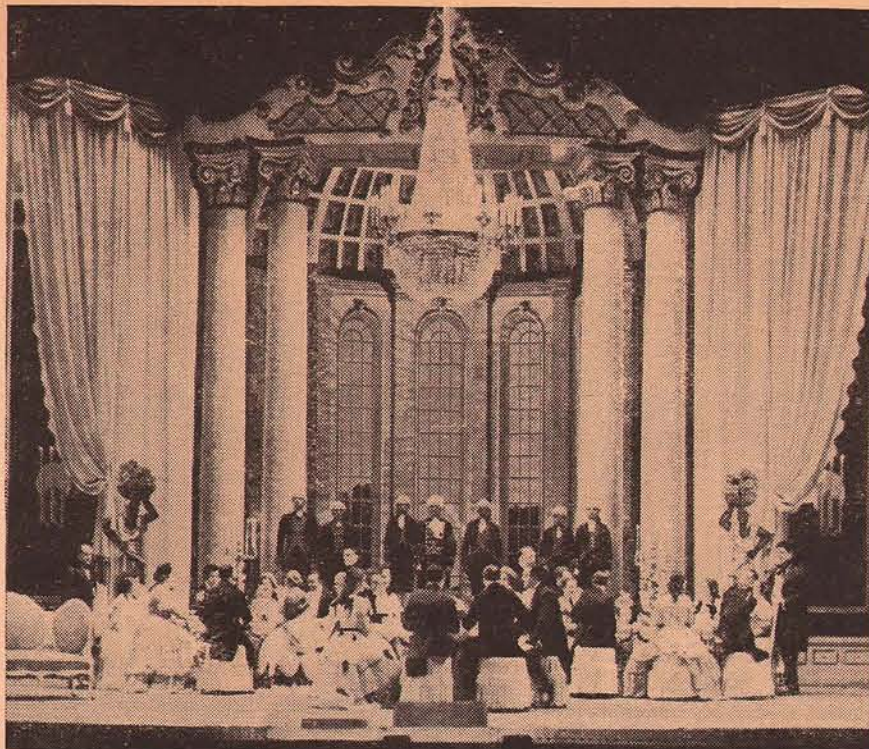

FOR the second of these concerts to be conducted by him, Artur Rodzinski has chosen a program devoid of strict classics. His players are called upon for all the skill, stress and sonority required by modern music.

Smetana, Bohemian composer (1824-1884), contributes the least-daring work, with amiable, chattering pages introductory to a rural comedy-opera about a marriage broker and a tricky swain who wins the village belle as his bride. The bustling overture is as light as it is speedy, and keeps the orchestra breathlessly busy.

If the hearer is something of a tune detective, with a correct ear and good memory, he can find an old melodic friend in Tchaikowsky's romantic Fantasy. Just before the finale, the glowing love theme played by the strings suddenly brings us close to Broadway, for those measures bear more than a passing resemblance to the broad uplifting strain that climaxes the late George Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue." (Tchaikowsky's creation dates from 1870; Gershwin's from 1924.) The "Romeo and Juliet" fantasy follows the familiar high moments of Shakespeare's drama.

Stravinsky's suite, music drawn from his great ballet, is picturesque matter illumined by many realistic orchestral touches describing the amours of a ballerina and her two harlequin admirers, all of them marionettes in a puppet show. Particularly clever is the opening of the work, with the easily recognizable turmoil and rude jollity of a village festival.

dren, and many cities have such series throughout the winter season.

Eugene Goossens and his Cincinnati Orchestra, warm believers in educating youngsters musically, will be on the air Tuesday with a program detailed elsewhere on this page. The conductor supplements the playing with spoken comments suitable for youthful listeners.

I remember an occasion when Ernest Schelling led one of his children's concerts with the New York Philharmonic Orchestra. He told the story of Wagner's "Flying Dutchman," and related that the opera ends with its hero jumping into the sea. "Was he drowned?" a childish voice piped excitedly.

Mr. Schelling, ill, is unable to direct at present, and his place will be taken by John Barbirolli, the first of the children's concerts being the matinee of December 18. Thereafter the series continues on occasional Saturday mornings.

At the Saturday evening concerts of the new NBC Symphony Orchestra (soon to be led by Toscanini) a private listening-room is provided for the New York music critics, where they may loll in comfortable settees, smoke, and hear the music through a special radio set. This is done for the convenience of those reviewers who must leave during the concert in order to serve first editions. The room is glass-enclosed, affording view of the conductor and players. Radio Guide's critic prefers such loudspeaker listening to sitting primly in the hall, for the microphone funnels and concentrates the performance so that the ear catches even the least defects. Those ogres, the music critics, love to pounce on defects, as everyone knows. Unfortunately for the fraternity, however, the pouncing has been poor so far at the concerts of the new orchestra.

Apropos, NBC's technicians have done an excellent job of the tone transmission. The first concert was preceded by weeks of control-room work, experimenting at the mixing-panels, measuring decibel strengths, adjusting tonal balance, and recording rehearsals phonographically for study and comparison by the laboratory folks and the conductor. (Radio listening has been made so easy for all of us that we rarely inquire into the ways and means that make it possible at all.)

"LA TRAVIATA"

By Giuseppe Verdi

EIGHTY-FOUR years ago, "La Traviata" was a failure at its premiere in Venice. Since then it has become one of the most popular works in the operatic repertoire. The reason for the earlier lack of appreciation based itself on the fact that for the first time Verdi dared to use a libretto which put psychological problems into the domain of lyric drama. Then, as now, censors hovered lovingly over the stage. To think of "La Traviata" (founded on Dumas' play, "Camille") as "psychological," amuses us in this age when the sex question has lost its terrors in plays, books and operas. "La Traviata" today is innocent enough matter for both adolescents and adults. No one shivers at the story, but settles down to see richly dressed socialites and demi-mondes fraternize on the stage, and to hear a succession of ear-pleasing melodies and ornamental orchestration. Of course, the sentimental old tale of the lovely courtesan still holds interest and even draws tears when the tubercular Violetta breathes her last. Verdi's music has real dramatic strength, and foreshadows the art which he was to attain in his later masterpieces.

Act I

There is a supper party in the Paris salons of beautiful Violetta Valery, whose attractions are well known to the male fashionables of the boulevards. The hostess leads the revels in a mood of reckless gaiety, for already she knows that her health is frail. Alfredo Germont, handsomest of the young men present, declares his love, and Violetta, accustomed to the light romancers of her acquaintance, is touched by Alfredo's earnestness and vows of faithfulness. They pledge each other in champagne and a drinking-song ending in a duet. The act ends with Violetta's famous florid aria, "Ah, Fors'e Lui" ("Ah, Perhaps It Is He"), in which she contrasts her questionable mode of life with the lasting happiness that seems to beckon. Patti, Sembrich, Ponselle, Tetrazzini, and all the celebrated coloratura singers have scored triumphs in the aria. Now it has become also a favorite concert number and is warbled by every incipient performer of cadenzas and trills.

Act II

Violetta and Alfredo are living their love idyll in a country house near Paris. He sings of their perfect companionship, and those who have seen Nino Martini, slim and handsome, can well understand how gallant a cavalier he must appear in the eyes of Miss Bovy who sings Violetta. Enters Alfredo's father, explaining to the girl that his son must give up his infatuation, marry, and rejoin his family. She leaves a note for Alfredo telling him that she has returned to her former rich lover, and forthwith makes the sacrifice. The distracted youth is consoled by Germont, Sr., in the soothing and universally familiar air, "Di Provenza," descriptive of the family home in fair Provence. John Charles Thomas made his Metropolitan Opera debut in the role of the elder Germont, and I remember the stir he created with his aristocratic bearing, heart-warming voice, and refined vocal style.

The second scene of this act is in a Paris gambling-house, where Alfredo appears and bitterly reproaches the helpless Violetta. He plays for high stakes with his rival, Baron Douphol, wins a large sum, and still misunderstanding Violetta's sacrifice, throws the money at her feet, exclaiming "There is your pay." Alfredo's father arrives and upbraids Alfredo for his cruelty.

Act III

Violetta is dying, awaiting her end with resignation. A letter from Father Germont informs her that he is arriving with Alfredo, and consents to the reconciliation of the pair, for he has recognized her true worth. They come, and the rest of the opera is practically a duet for the enamored couple, closing with an inordinately touching song by Violetta accompanied by the tenderest strains of violins. She dies in his arms.

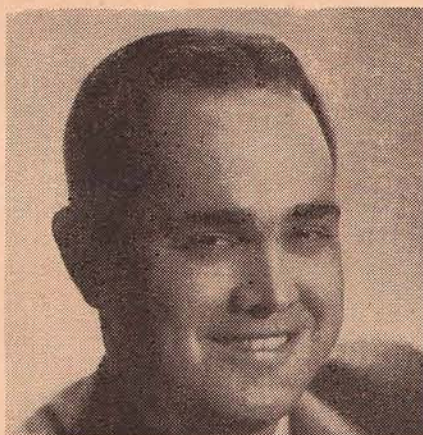
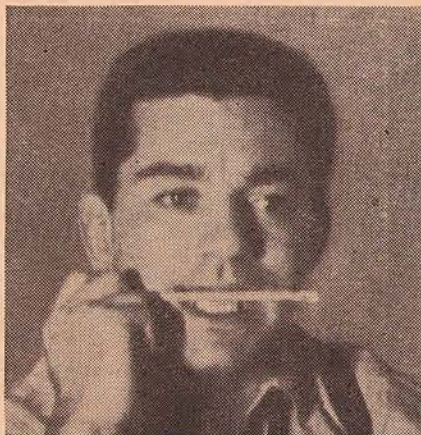

AS TO be expected, the networks are going to give the New Year's Eve merrymakers plenty of excellent dance music on the big night. CBS has already made arrangements for a gala five-hour show. Listeners will hear the crowds in the streets of New York, Chicago, Denver and Hollywood. For the sixth consecutive year, Announcer Paul Douglas will be perched above Times Square in one of the offices in the Paramount Theater, and will describe the large crowd jamming the Great White Way area. Music will be supplied by Benny Goodman, Eddy Duchin, Cab Calloway, George Hall, Frankie Masters and other ork pilots.

On February 1 Boake Carter will cease dispensing his newscasts for his current radio sponsor, and will start a new series soon thereafter in behalf of a food product. No definite date has been set for the new series, but it is more than likely that it will be heard over the CBS network.

S. C. Johnson and Son of Racine, Wisconsin, sponsors of "Fibber McGee and Molly," recently announced the purchase of "Attorney at Law," daily script show created by Carl Wester of the National Broadcasting Company. Wester will leave NBC to open his own offices in Chicago. The new show, augmenting "Fibber McGee and Molly," goes on the air January 4.

The next time anyone comes forth with the statement that women are the weaker sex, I am going to take him by the hand and lead him to a few radio studios to watch Gertrude Berg, Elizabeth Arden and many others go into action. After the broadcast, Mrs. Berg and the cast snatch a hurried bite of lunch and then rush over to the recording studio to make an electrical transcription.

The script of the program that I heard called for much merrymaking, such as dancing, Russian music, etc. Most programs create illusions through the use of sound-effects, but not this program. Six couples were in the studio doing nothing else but dancing to the music. It was quite a sight, believe you me. One thing in particular tickled my funnybone. From the control-room, Mrs. Berg yelled into the microphone for "Jake" to take the gum out of his mouth. Nothing happened for a few moments, and so the request was repeated, to which "Jake" replied that he did get rid of it. "Molly" called, "I didn't see you," and "Jake's" reply, "I swallowed it," broke up the rehearsal for many minutes.

Another day found me in the studio watching, for the first time, Eddy Duchin rehearse his Wednesday night Coast-to-Coaster. Here I saw another one of the fairer sex give instructions to everyone on the show as to how this particular job should be done. I could not help but admire this woman, whom I had the pleasure of meeting after rehearsal. It was Elizabeth Arden herself—the woman who pays the bills for the Duchin program. Miss Arden, who seems to be as good a showman

as she is a beautician, attends every rehearsal and program, and personally supervises them all.

It was interesting and amusing to watch Duchin play the piano. Every part of his body moves—and gracefully, too. As his fingers sweep over the keys, he appears to be completely carried away by the melody. His shoulders rise and fall with the mood of the music, while his feet tap in

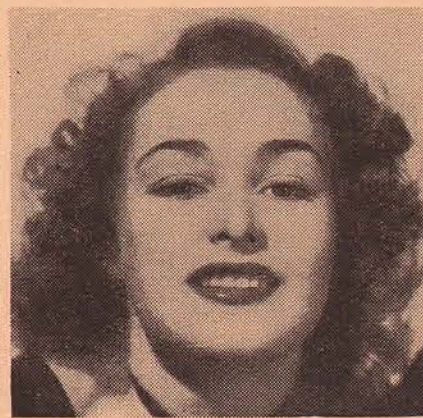

had been in New York, and upon arrival she was very disappointed because she didn't find any snow. Miss Langford has come a long way since she left for California, and I don't mean in miles. She has done right well by herself in the movies and on the "Hollywood Hotel" show.

Shep Fields with his "Rippling Rhythm" returns to the airwaves next week. The ork pilot opens an engagement at the Palmer House in Chicago and will broadcast several times weekly over the Mutual network. Fields just finished working in Paramount's "Big Broadcast of 1938," which will be one of the better musical pictures.

Strangest Person

Robert Ripley may know some strange people, but we had a letter a couple of days ago from just about the most unusual of all—a lady who's won—not one—but six or seven prizes from Proctor and Gamble! The contests are designed for the most part for housewives—and housewives who've had little contest experience nearly always win. This lady has the secret that overcomes the tradition, it seems!

Here's part of her letter: "When sewing or ironing, I do most of my thinking and keep a pad handy . . . As I figure out different things that would apply to what I am working on, I jot them all down roughly, later put them together as a rough outline—then I keep paring them down until I am within the limit, always keeping my entries as brief as possible, yet making them most emphatic and as nearly different from others as I judge they could possibly be in order to attract the judges' eyes. Beside my bed at night I keep a pad, pencil and flashlight lest I should think of something which, like dreams that fade away at the break of day, the very word or words I might be "struck with" could be jotted down fresh as they might come. This does not happen very often—generally when I've been working hard on something that did not come to me earlier. I never purposely lie awake, of course, making my poor brain overwork . . ."

Read over that paragraph again. The style would seem to be what the Proctor and Gamble judge, Elsie Rushmore, wants. It's simple and unadorned, and it's sincere. A contest entry written in the same style would sound like a personal letter written to the judge herself.

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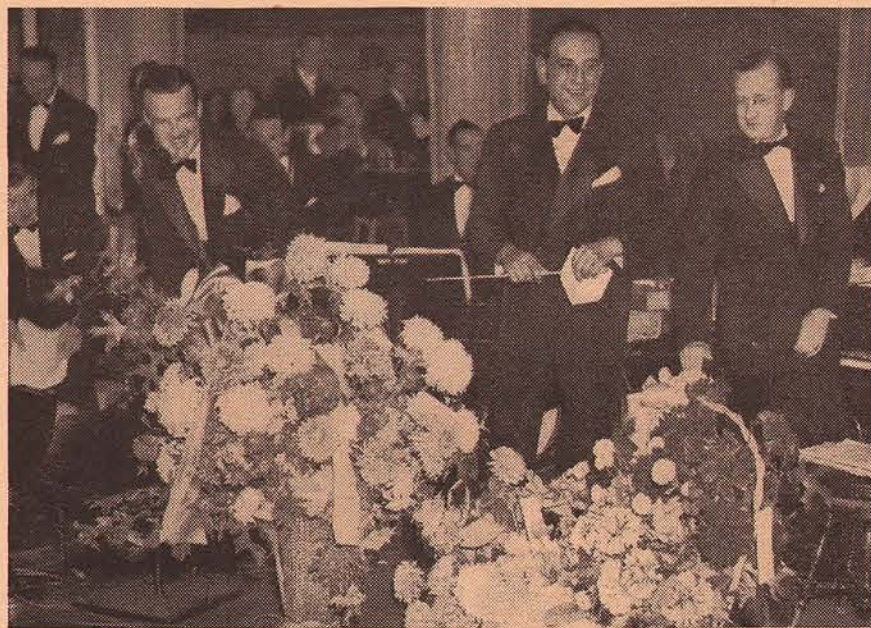
HE'S A GREAT GUY

THOSE right-Royal Canadians, those perennial favorites, entertainers of the public for nigh onto twenty years on radio, recordings, and at dances—the Lombardos—are the result of frustration, a punctured dream. Papa Lombardo's yen for the concert stage for which he had studied resulted in the little Lombardos' trala-la-ing the scales at an early age. And there might have been no Lombardo's band if it hadn't been for Papa's business acumen (he was a tailor) in addition to his artistic yearnings. His to-do about nickels, always giving one to the boy who did this—and that the best, taught them to value money because it bought such nice candy. Mama Lombardo was president of a woman's club, and whenever the boys, under Papa's direction, started playing, she was around, tapping her feet. Guy, the oldest, was taught the

broadcasting. Arrangements were made with WBBM, and their first broadcast was heard by the station's owner, who had the program continued for a half-hour. Overnight, crowds swarmed to the Granada.

Much has been said about that Lombardo style. Many bands have attempted to imitate it unsuccessfully. Many theories have been propounded as to how those muffled brasses are muffled, and how the vibrato is vibrato-ed. Bandmasters have hinted that Guy has his men play off-key to get his effects. One night saxophonist Larry Owens, who had been playing for quite a while and his reed was wet, ran a piece of paper under the reed to dry it. Immediately people claimed the saxophonists got their unusual tones by slipping paper under the reed. Another man said that they warmed their instruments over a spirit lamp.

fiddle, Carmen the flute, and Liebert the trumpet in these concerts.

Finally, Mrs. Lombardo decided the boys should play for the woman's club. So they dressed up, went around the corner and got young Freddy Kreitzer, who played the piano, and pretty soon many ladies were tapping their feet.

Then came the war—which they helped win by playing war songs at the barracks near their Canadian home. The war was also responsible for Liebert taking up the drums. Papa Lombardo was furious and claimed it was because of parades and soldiers marching. The same year Carmen became Public Enemy Number One in London by bringing the first saxophone to town—and worse, teaching it to others. His best pupils, Fred Higman and Ben Davis were taken into the band. By 1920, the band had attained ballroom proportions. Their first engagement outside their home playground was in Detroit—with Sophie Tucker's roadhouse in Cleveland the next stop. It was in Cleveland that their fate was decided in a strange way. The boys were homesick and called a meeting to see if they should return or stay. The vote was deadlocked when the last member arrived late. He had just met a grand girl, voted to stay, and that was the hairline between being a small-town band and a famous orchestra.

In Chicago, their third stop, people had never heard of Lombardo, so their public was comprised mostly of waiters at the Granada Cafe. After looking at empty tables night after night, Guy suggested to the owner that they try

The boys in the band greet these stories with loud hoots—they know that the essence of their coveted style, which they disclose without risking a thing—goes back twenty years. Carmen, the flutist, applied flute-playing principles to learning the saxophone. Applying woodwind principles to the reed instrument group—vibrato and all—was far out of line with academic teaching, but it did make sweet music. Liebert, who dropped the drums for the trumpet, was also self-taught. They were both free from taboos in technique that come with professional training. Hence their style doesn't conform to anyone else's, based, as Guy puts it, on his musicians' ability to imitate the human voice in their instrumentation.

Swing may come and swing may go, but Guy Lombardo's music sings without swing and continues in popularity. The Lombardo style has remained the same for many years. He only plays the pieces that conform to his unique style—for when a piece doesn't conform—like the rumba, they completely neglect it.

In the orchestra today there are twelve men, including Guy. Of the brothers, Guy directs, Carmen plays first saxophone and sings (also writes song-hits), Liebert plays the trumpet, and Victor, the baritone saxophone. All but two of the men are from London, Ontario. Carmen, Larry Owens, Boyd Bunch do the arranging. Currently, they are playing at Roosevelt Grill in New York City, and are heard Sunday afternoon on the Bond Bread Company program at 5:30 EST on CBS.

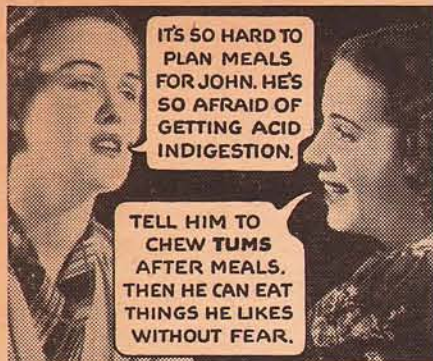

IT MAY be because Phil Lord finds more of himself personified in Gabriel Heatter than in any other radio personality, that he chose Heatter—the busiest commentator of the air, to succeed him as No. 1 man on "We, the People."

For, when these two appear on the same program, Lord as guest and Heatter as master of ceremonies, there will be two men as qualified as any who have heretofore appeared on the show. They have both had experiences that only a fortunate few can rightfully tell.

The success story of Heatter, the success story of Lord, are each worthy of time on the air. Part of these stories can be expected to be told when, for the first time, Phil Lord and Gabriel Heatter actively appear on the same program.

and punish them suddenly—a harsh slap or a screaming protest almost before they know what they've done.

"You're only giving way to your own temper. You're not teaching your children anything that way. Spank them, yes. I've spanked my children, but not without explaining to them just why I did it.

In the Simons' home it's a strict rule that, no matter how hard or loud you may be playing before dinner, you quiet down when you go into the dining-room. The children understand that excitement at meals is very bad for their digestion.

THEY'RE encouraged to take part in conversations at the dinner table. Sarah and Shirley and Brother read the headlines in the newspapers—murders and all. Their Dad feels that anything that's getting headlines in the newspapers is important enough for them to know about.

There's another very important thing in helping children develop. Don't neglect their sense of humor. All children have one, and later in life they're most certainly going to need it. Be sure to encourage it early.

Simons used to have his three youngsters cut out the ten best jokes they found in children's magazines.

"It was funny what different things they picked. Shirley is the one who likes situation humor, the laugh that grows out of an unusual situation. Sarah laughs at the ridiculous. A man in a straw hat, shorts, and galoshes is the funniest thing in the world to her. And Brother, although he's the youngest, has the most subtle sense of humor. He likes plays on words, odd turns of phrase or tones of voice. But I don't care what they laugh at just so long as they laugh!"

Rules for their education are his own and they aren't very formal. He prefers public schools because he thinks they're more democratic. He

follows the listings made by the Parent-Teachers' Association to guide them in choosing the movies they see.

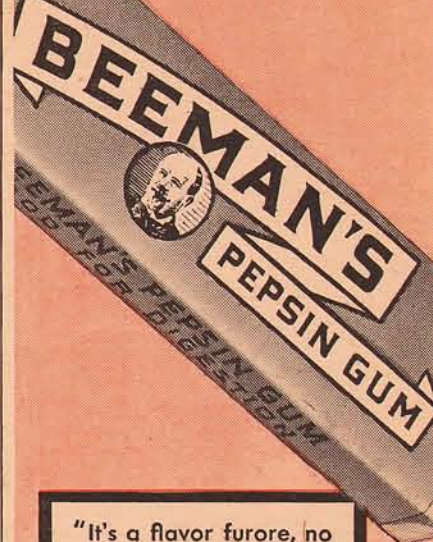

"I don't want to make them seem little prigs, talking about them like this," he said, laughing, when we'd talked ourselves hoarse about bringing up children. "Believe me, they can be just as mischievous and exasperating as anybody else's children. But I do think there are different ways of handling them when they act that way. So far I've found that the rules I learned a long time ago were the best ones. Without them, I don't know how well I'd have done my job as a musician bringing up a family."

He means to go right on using them. And he hasn't any doubts that other parents everywhere could help both themselves and their children by using those rules, too!

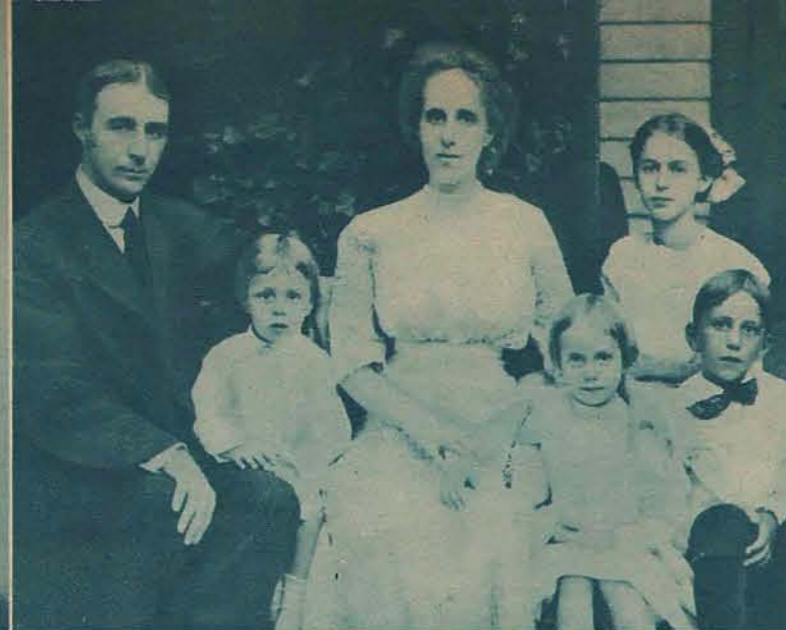

WHEN Sunday School Teacher Grace Moore left the hills of Tennessee for New York, she was responding to the voice of youthful ambition, not that of good judgment. Her experience had been limited to singing in the Jellico Baptist Church, her training, to her studies at Wilson-Green School of Music in Washington. Determined to be the star that Mary Garden was, however, she ran away from home, went straight to the Metropolitan Opera House! Success wasn't awaiting her there.

Lean days in Greenwich Village followed while she acquired the experience she needed, and when better days came, she spent the money on European training. But when she made her Metropolitan debut, she found instant success.

Star of stage, screen, opera and radio, Miss Moore is really Mrs. Valentin Parera, happily married to a Spanish film actor she met on shipboard on the Atlantic.

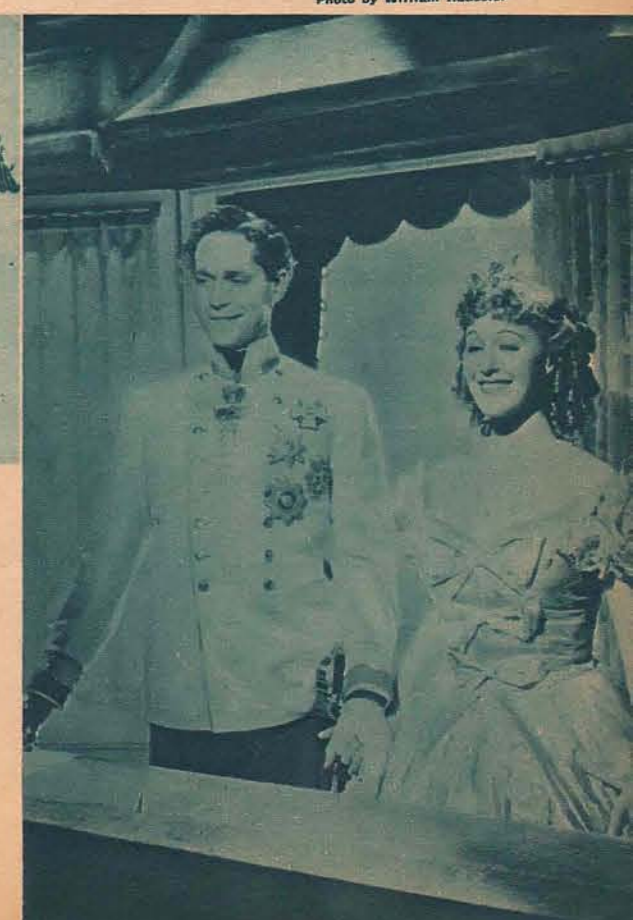

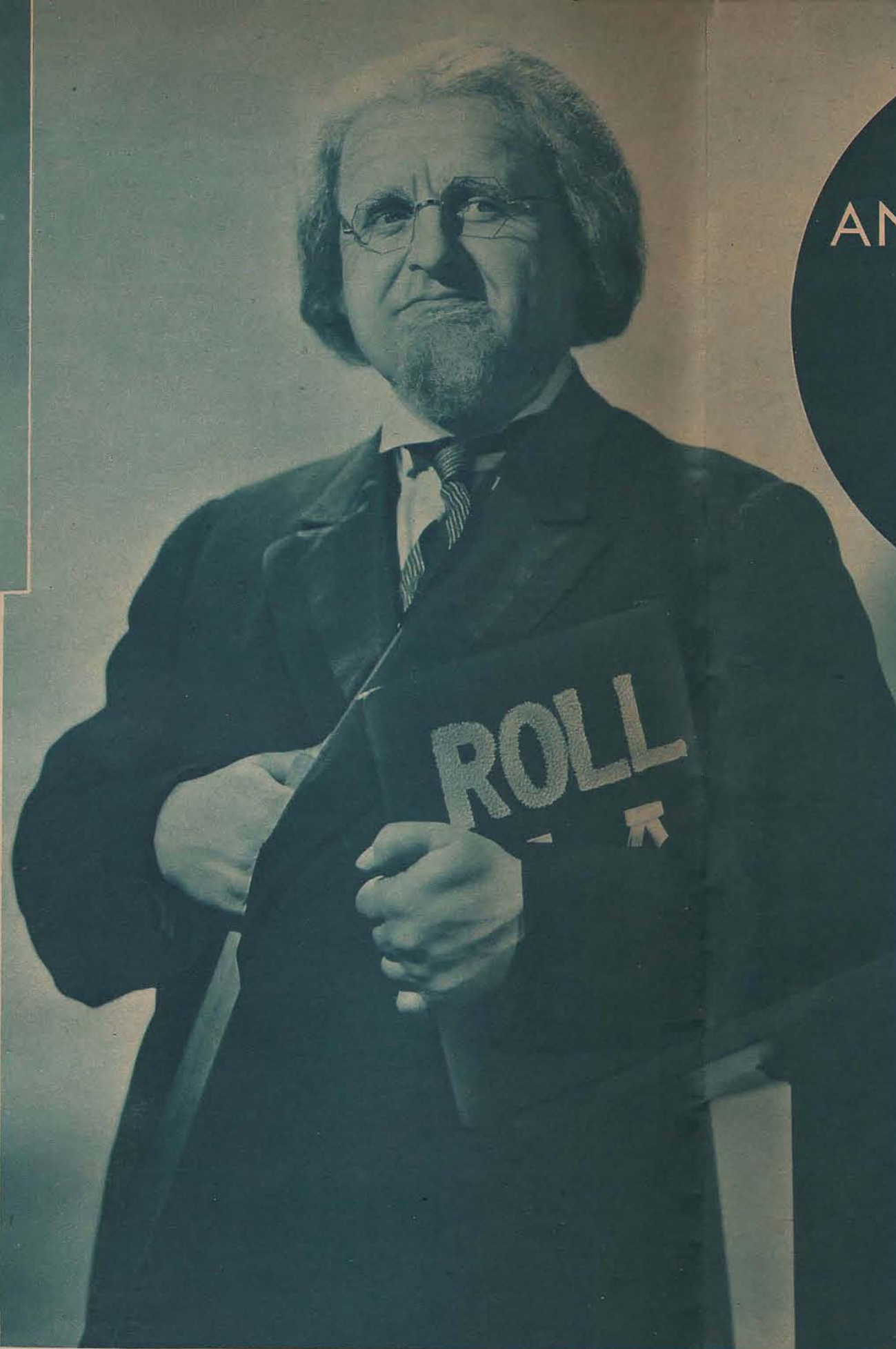

STARS AND SATELLITES

KALTENMEYER'S KINDERGARTEN—AND THOSE WHO ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR IT

ALTHOUGH he never knew about it, Friederich Froebel, who founded the first kindergarten in Germany in 1837, also founded Kaltenmeyer's Kindergarten of the air. From his book, Bruce Kamman found his inspiration for the rollicking burlesque which has been a radio hit for over 6 years. Kamman, still in his 20's, was visiting at the home of his parents in Cincinnati, Ohio, when he came across the old volume in the attic. He decided that if humor were added to its dry, technical data, the book would make a good play—but he did nothing about it.

At the time, Kamman was playing cornet with the Hagenbeck-Wallace Circus, having graduated from the pit of a Nickelodeon theater. Later, he was an actor in a stock company.

Then came the War. In France, Kamman met an old professor whose dry humor caught his fancy. Picturing him in the humorous version of Froebel's book, he visualized the role of Professor August Kaltenmeyer, and decided he'd try out the idea at his first opportunity.

On his return, Kamman played in an NBC studio orchestra, later did production work. Finally, he sold the kindergarten idea. His comic class went on the air September 25, 1931.

Credit for the success of the new show must go to Kamman and the cast—but credit for its continued success during the past 6 years must also be shared with the assistants who work backstage. Here, Radio Guide introduces them to listeners.

Johnny Wolf (above) was signed as Izzy Finkelshtein in Kaltenmeyer's Kindergarten because he filled in on a Farm and Home Hour when a comedian failed to appear—and got 10,000 letters!

Cornelius Callahan, tough guy of the Kindergarten, really is mild-mannered Billy White (right). His tenor voice often is mistaken for that of a girl. He's even had proposals—by mail!

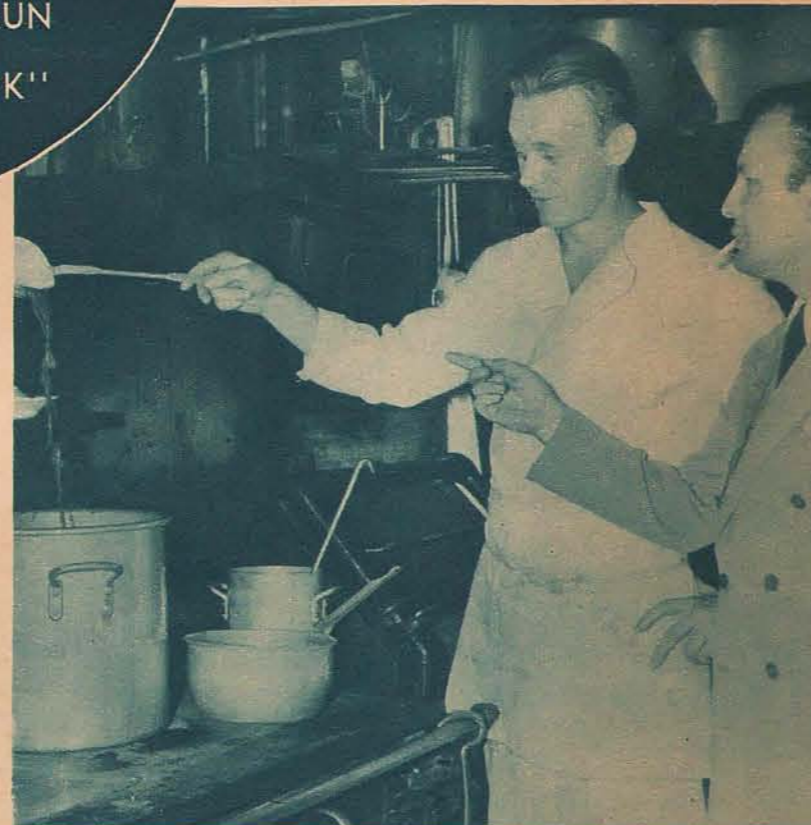

INTERMISSION means time out to most musicians—but to the boys in Frank Dailey's band, it means time to go to work. Not because of insufficient help—but just in case an emergency might arise. Frank's is a cooperative orchestra, and it not only plays at the Meadowbrook Inn, Cedar Grove, New Jersey, but owns the place outright. Consequently, it is to the boys' best interests that they know how to serve in dual capacities—and they do. Labor troubles can never close the Meadowbrook, for the bandsmen have formed a skeleton force—and to keep in practise, they take turns at their secondary duties once in a while when business is rushed and additional help is welcomed.

Taking an interest in the roadhouse where they were often engaged, the small band augmented its number, borrowed \$220 from a bank on Friday, made a first payment—and paid back the bank Monday. Today, Meadowbrook employs 84, has a \$2,000 payroll!

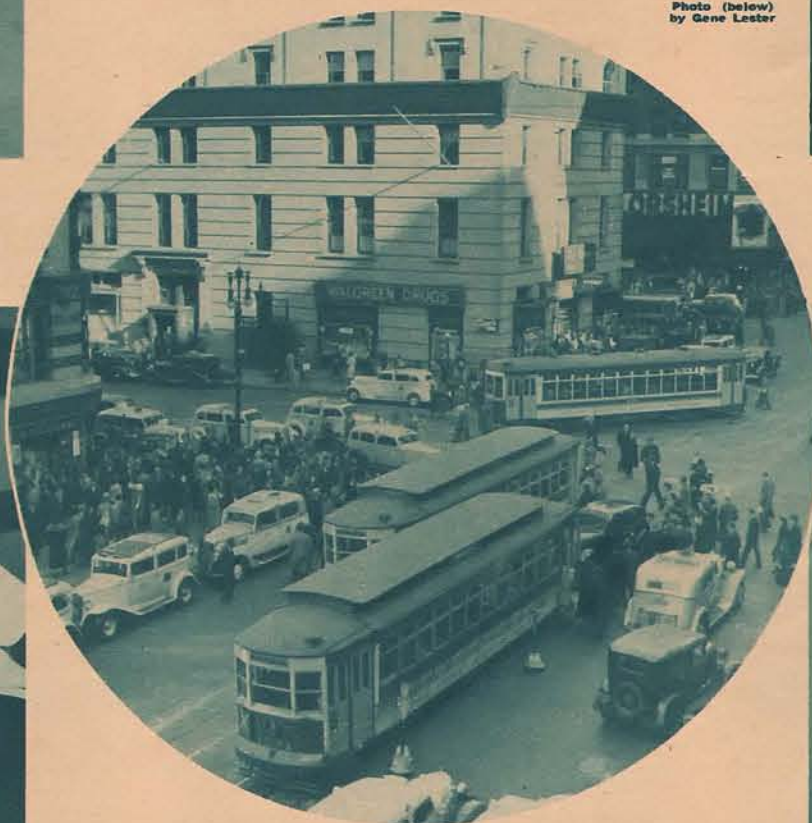

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SHORT WAVES

BY CHAS. A. MORRISON, president, INTERNATIONAL DX-ER'S ALLIANCE

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WHAT USERS SAY
LaPorte, Tex. After using the Capacity Aerial Eliminator over a year on my 1935 small 7 tube set can say it brings in reception with fine volume and clarity, pulling in stations from Japan, Europe, South America, and broadcast stations from all over the U. S. Efficiency proven. I took down my old outside aerial. Signed:

Davenport, Ia. Received your Radio Aerial Eliminator and it sure works fine. Also works swell on Short Wave band. Wish I had found it long ago. Signed:

Manila from 7 p.m. to 1 a.m. EST (6 p.m. to 12 mid. CST); Tokyo, from 8 p.m. to 2 a.m. EST (7 p.m. to 1 a.m. CST); in Calcutta, from 4 to 10 p.m. EST (3 to 9 p.m. CST); in Shanghai, from 7 p.m. to 1 a.m. EST (6 p.m. to 12 mid. CST), and in Sydney, Australia, from 9 p.m. until 3 a.m. EST (8 p.m. until 2 a.m. CST), their own local times respectively.

The station will be equipped with directional antennas of the latest type, with beams directed to the Far East and South America . . . The programs of this broadcaster will consist of the best features now offered by the red and blue networks of the NBC, as well as many programs designed especially for short wave . . . The General Electric Company has requested permission from the Federal Communications Commission for the erection of two television stations to be located at Albany, N. Y., and at Easton, Conn., to share time on a frequency of 44 megs, with power outputs of 10,000 watts and 3,000 watts respectively.

W10XAB (17.31), the commercial call of the transmitter of the MacGregor Arctic Expedition, wintering at Reindeer Point, Greenland, may often be heard in contact with the Rocky Point, N. Y., Station WEL (8.95), from 6 to 7 p.m. EST (5 to 6 p.m. CST).

VP3THE, the 400-watt short-wave transmitter of the Terry-Holden Expedition, is now installed in a thatched roof Savannah shack with open sides, near the source of the Rupununi River, on the southeastern boundary of British Guiana.

Signals from VP3THE on an announced frequency of 13.74 megs, were first picked up at the RADIO GUIDE Listening Post on Monday, November 15, at 8:40 p.m. EST (7:40 p.m. CST), and since that date one receiver has been tuned constantly to this frequency, in order that I may be able to bring you first-hand information.

VP3THE contacts the RCA transmitters at Rocky Point, N. Y., irregularly between 6:30 and 6:45 p.m. EST (5:30 and 5:45 p.m. CST). WQV (14.8), is generally used as the North American end of the circuit. Later in the evening, the British Guiana station calls and talks with various amateurs in the United States.

On Thursday, November 18, Dr. Hall-Holden and the advance group of scientists left the base-camp in charge of Radio Operator Orrin Hungerford, Neil McMillan, two Indian boys, three parrots and "Icky," a little Marmoset monkey, and started out on a two-month trek, which will take them down the Kuyuwini, Essequibo and Onoro rivers into the wild and unexplored Brazilian water-shed of the Amazon River. Incidentally, it was in this region that Aviator Redfern, an almost mythical figure that reappears from time to time in the news as reports trickle through that he is still alive and held captive by the Indians, was forced down some eight years ago.

By the time this column reaches you, the advance party hopes to have reached the heretofore unvisited site where the great meteor fell two years ago, lighting up the sky, shaking the Marudi Mountains and devastating acres of forest in its descent. A description of this site will form the subject matter for one of the interesting NBC pick-ups from the expedition's portable transmitter.

To get first-hand reception from this weird jungleland where two or three feet of rain can fall in a single down-pour, where the temperature reaches 120 degrees by day and jaguars prowl by night, dial 13.74 megs.

Mr. Hungerford promises that any

reports, accompanied by an international reply coupon, mailed to either Short-Wave Station VP3BG, or VP3MR, of Georgetown, British Guiana, will be verified upon suitable expedition cards as soon as he again returns to civilization, some time next spring.

Short-wave transmitters in Shanghai, China, are also forced to broadcast from secret locations, even when engaged in commercial telephone traffic. XRA (12.065) has been heard cautiously calling Berlin and London at 3:15 a.m. EST (2:15 a.m. CST), and XRTI (14.15) has been phoning the United States near 4:45 a.m. EST (3:45 a.m. CST). These Shanghai stations are unlisted and at unknown locations.

A new short-wave station, reported by one listener as PZF, announcing its address as "Lands Radio in Telefoon Dienst, Paramaribo, Suriname, Netherlands Guiana," and operating in the vicinity of 17.5 to 17.7 megs, has been heard on several consecutive Sundays from 2:41 to 4:41 p.m. EST (1:41 to 3:41 p.m. CST), broadcasting experimental programs, which consist for the most part of phonograph recordings. After the program, the station sometimes contacts Curacao and Holland. This same broadcaster was heard by Norman Kriebel of Ambler, Penn., near 7:45 a.m. EST (6:45 a.m. CST). Reports are requested and should be sent to the address given above.

An interesting departure from the type of radio drama normally heard in the programs from Davenport is provided by the forthcoming broadcast of Ibsen's famous play, "Ghosts," which will be heard on Friday, December 10, at 2:30 p.m. EST (1:30 p.m. CST). Marie Tempest, the world-famous British actress, will play the part of Mrs. Alving, and in so doing she will show that her art is far from being limited to the interpretation of comedy.

The reconstruction of HVJ (15.12), "Radio Vaticano," has been completed, and the station may now be heard again daily from 10:30 to 10:45 a.m. EST (9:30 to 9:45 a.m. CST) . . . The new schedule of broadcasting from Short-Wave Station "Radio Nations," Prangins, Switzerland, is as follows: Over HBO (11.402), Fridays 2 to 2:15 p.m. EST (1 to 1:15 p.m. CST), and Saturdays 6:45 to 8 p.m. EST (5:45 to 7 p.m. CST); over HBL (9.345), Fridays 2:30 to 2:45 p.m., 7:30 to 7:45 p.m. and 8 to 8:15 p.m. EST (1:30 to 1:45, 6:30 to 6:45 and 7 to 7:15 p.m. CST), and over HBJ (14.535), Saturdays 6:45 to 8 p.m. EST (5:45 to 7 p.m. CST). After December 19, the Saturday schedule will be heard over Stations HBL (9.345) and HBP (7.797).

Ashley Walcott of San Francisco, Calif., has received a letter of verification from the Director of Posts and Telegraphs at Tananarive, Madagascar, which states that "Radio Tananarive" is broadcasting daily from 12:30 to 12:45 a.m., 3:30 to 3:45 a.m. and from 10 to 11 a.m. EST (11:30 to 11:45 p.m., 2:30 to 2:45 a.m. and from 9 to 10 a.m. CST), simultaneously on assigned frequencies of 10.96, 9.503 and 6.069 megs. However, the station is actually being heard on the Pacific Coast from 10 to 11 a.m. EST (9 to 10 a.m. CST) on the following frequencies, which are subject to some variation: 10.95, 9.38 and 6.06 megs, the first one being received the best. The first fifteen minutes of the program consists of music which is followed by a news period in French and then more music to complete the hour. Modulation is poor on all three stations.

The schedule for Short-Wave Station HJTABD (9.63) of Bucaramanga, Colombia, is daily 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 6 to 10:30 or 11 p.m. EST (10 a.m. to 12 noon and 5 to 9:30 or 10 p.m. CST). Reports are requested and verifications will be mailed just as soon as they can be printed. In the meantime, a man reads the names of those sending in reports in English, just before sign-off.

VOICE OF THE LISTENER

The "Voice of the Listener" letterforum is a regular feature in Radio Guide each week, offered to the readers as a means for expressing and exchanging opinions about radio.

LISTENER OBJECTIONS

Dear VOL: Bought my first copy of RADIO GUIDE the other day and found some of the discussions in your column. They brought to mind many of my pet gripes against programming. Here is a synopsis of these:

1. I, too, object to spending Saturday afternoons, and other times, trying to find a station not giving some sport. I happen to dislike sports of nearly all kinds, and especially when they are given spot places over good music. Yesterday was an example. I finally succeeded in locating two small local stations not connected with networks which had phonograph music.

2. Also I object to the applause following (or preceding) each new appearance or joke (?). I enjoy such programs as Wayne King's, because one may sit back in comfort and listen to soft music without the rain-on-the-roof clatter of applause after each number. Ever notice how like rain applause sounds over short wave?

3. I object to a local station, while transmitting a network program, cutting off the music and inserting an ad for a local store or dealer. I found this to be consistent policy with WOAI and noticed it yesterday on an S. F. or Oakland station. The network programs in question were unsponsored, but that is still no excuse.

4. In the same vein, and particularly with WOAI, there are announcers who evidently can't tell time, for they often cut off the program before the half-hour point and give their call, then, when the program cuts off automatically for the local call, no announcement is given. Sometimes the situation is opposite, and the announcer is late instead of early, interrupting the program in either case.

5. I happen to work on a ship running between San Francisco and Panama. Reception is pretty fair both on long and short wave, at night, on my seven-tube set. About half way down all Pacific Coast stations fade out and we pick up Texas stations mostly. It happens that nearly all of these, and certainly all of them that have any power, are NBC stations. I prefer CBS programs, but can't get them. This applies also to short wave. I pick up a number of U. S. short-wave stations in Chicago, New York, etc., but only two of these have CBS programs, and VERY LOW POWER. What is the matter with CBS?

6. A very strange thing exists in the minds of program directors who arrange for short-wave broadcast to South America. Apparently they are of the opinion that the Spaniards don't hear enough of their own music, for the MAJORITY of programs available on both standard and short-wave bands to the southern hemisphere are in the Spanish style. Especially is this hard on the whites in the tropics who want to hear something from home.

A WORD TO HALEY

VOL: When Jack Haley opened his new program recently, radio fans vowed enthusiastic allegiance and anticipated his next program, with unrepressed optimism. What a red whale he dragged through that next half hour!

Haley used the same gags about fan mail, or lack of it, that his contemporaries have so pitilessly fatigued. Are

such cracks intended to encourage fan mail? The audience knows that entertainers need fan mail to gauge their popularity. When sufficiently inspired, it does write.

During his third program Haley exhumed the gag humorously (?) referring to the presence of a script. The audience does not want to be script-conscious. It would rather have the illusion of spontaneous repartee and action.

Haley, with the aid of his scriptwriters, has enough talent and intelligence to present consistently good programs. He's clever enough, in fact, and his less snappy scripts are tolerated in anticipation of his better ones.—Gladys E. Finsted, Salem, Ore.

COMPLAINT

Voice of the Listener: If the advertising sponsors of the various radio programs could be made to realize how weary we housewives become of the same old sales talk that the announcers recite day after day, I think they might curtail them.

As a matter of fact, those monotonous three-minute dissertations defeat the very purpose they are meant to perform. The average individual would listen to a few well-chosen words about a product, and probably be glad to buy it in appreciation for an entertaining program, but it is far simpler to tune out the station until after the advertising is finished than to listen to three minutes of sales talk which sounds as if it were written for the intelligence of a five-year-old child.

Personally, I become so aggravated with some of the advertising twaddle that I find myself scanning my grocer's shelves for some product which long-continued radio boosting has not prejudiced me against buying. I find, too, on discussing this subject with my friends, that my reactions are typical of many others.—Mrs. W. Wheeler, Baldwin, N. Y.

A few more such expressions from indignant listeners, brought to the attention of sponsors and advertising agencies, may bring an end to what to many is a nuisance.—Ed.

NO MILLENIUM

Dear VOL: No, the millenium is not here. Why, we women all like a sponsored program if they are not too selfishly broadcast. To a lot of us the announcer and master of ceremonies make the show. Don McNeill would surely sell coffee, pancake flour, cereals, or even soap. I don't believe there is one person in America who would kick about sponsored programs if the sponsor would let the products he wants sold be put in the program in special ways, such as Don McNeill's quick wit could put over. It's the reading of long-winded commercials before and after each program that make us sick and not use the product just for meanness.

My children like the Breakfast Club program better than some of the silly or blood-curdling children programs. After all, we are all by nature common and enjoy common things. I hope that such splendid programs as "Vic and Sade," "Kitty Keene," "Ma Perkins," and "The O'Neills" will not be spoiled much longer with such long, dry, stale commercials.—Mrs. Marie Ganzel, Clyde, Mich.

We dare say that there are many who will rise to declare that Bob Crosby's music is the "tops" in modern dance music. However, every man, and woman, to their own opinion.—Ed.

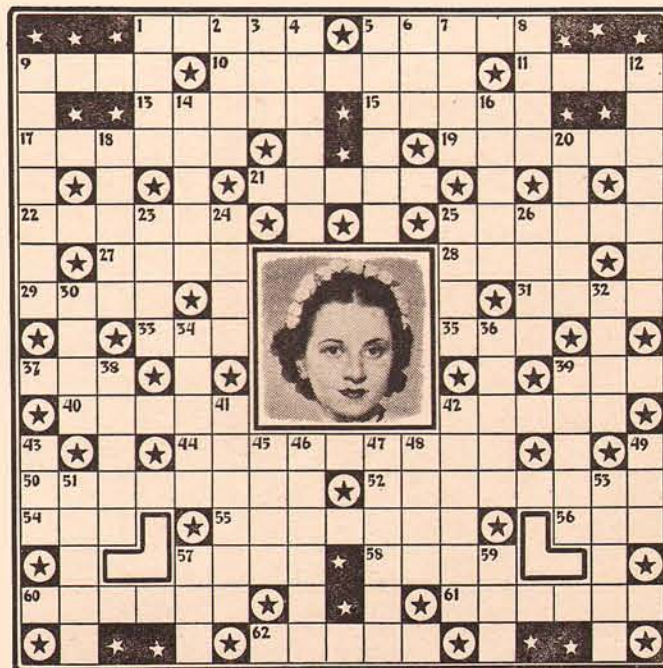
BRING IT BACK

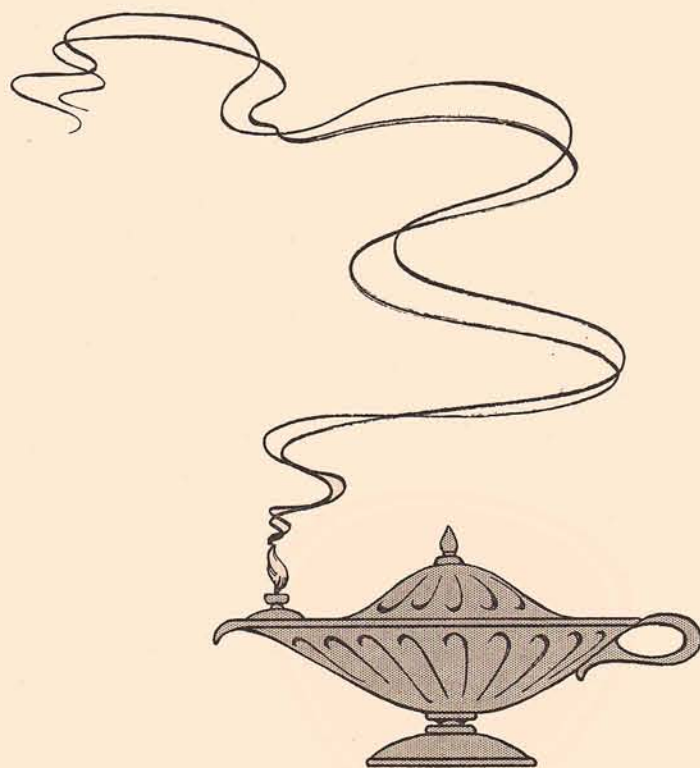
