Three Famous Musical "Names" to Be Booked by Network

Three of the most distinguished figures of the operatic and concert fields, Jeritza, member of the Metropolitan Opera Company; Kreisler, eminent violinist; and Rachmaninoff, composer and concert pianist; have completed negotiations transferring their entire professional management to the National Broadcasting Company's Artists Service. Beginning next season NBC Artists Service will have complete management of their concert tours.

Kreisler and Rachmaninoff thus far have never been heard on the radio. Altho this new arrangement does not necessarily mean that the two will broadcast now, if they should decide to do so in the future, it will be thru the National Broadcasting System. Jeritza already is known to radio audiences.

Will Be Replaced by George Jessel on Chase and Sanborn Hour

When Eddie Cantor leaves the Chase and Sanborn Hour for a recess from broadcasting, his friend George Jessel will take his place and the program will continue the same happy mingling of humor and melody with Dave Rubinoff in charge of the musical features. This program is an NBC broadcast, heard at 7:00 p. m. each Sunday.

Cantor is now on his way to the west coast to perform in a few movies, and is making the trip profitable by appearing in theatres along the way. Jessel is accompanying him on this trip, and both comedians will appear on the Chase and Sanborn program this Sunday from Chicago, where they are making a personal appearance at the Chicago theatre this week.

In vaudeville Cantor and Jessel have proved the most successful comedy team in theatrical history. They have literally shared laughs and honors, and broken house records. Their friendship is of more than 20 years standing, since they were youngsters in vaudeville. Back in 1909 Cantor and Jessel were on the same bill in a neighborhood house in New York—Eddie at \$15 and George at \$4.

Adventures of the forest ranger and his "cub" assistant, dramatically portraying the necessity for forest fire prevention, is one of the weekly features on the National Farm and Home Hour which will be heard from NBC at 11:30 p. m. this Thursday.

Prepared by the United States Forest Service, these dramatic episodes stress the best uses that can be made of the 160 millions of acres of national forests in the United States.

Harvey Hays, who is well known to radio listeners for his interpretations of outdoor roles, will play the part of the forest ranger. Wise in the ways of forestry and forest protection, the character will often find himself in amusing situations with his "cub" assistant whose eagerness sometimes overwhelms his better judgment and knowledge.

Art Jarrett, the song stylist, has been signed as an exclusive artist with the Columbia Broadcasting System. He is heard on five weekly evening broadcasts, each Monday and Wednesday at 5:45, on Tuesday at 5:00, Friday at 2:30 and every Saturday at 8:45.

Jarrett will be accompanied in these broadcasts by Freddie Rich's orchestra. Rich has directed the musical activities of Morton Downey, Kate Smith, the Boswell Sisters and Bing Crosby when these artists first appeared over the Columbia chain. He predicts a great future for Jarrett as a lyric tenor.

SINGING LADY IN NEW NBC SERIES

Another WGN feature has gone NBC! With the NBC debut of The Singing Lady, late of WGN, another local Chicago feature has been placed within reach of a coast-to-coast audience.

Eight months ago the Singing Lady, sponsored by the Kellogg Company, started her broadcasts over WGN with no other assistance than a piano, which she plays herself. The reception accorded her by juveniles, parents and child authorities determined the sponsors to strike out for more extensive audiences. She is now heard twice daily except Saturday and Sunday over the NBC network. On WMAQ at 5:15 p. m. and at 6:00 p. m. on WGN.

WHITEMAN SEEKS RADIO TALENT IN PONTIAC SERIES

For twenty-five weeks, at the invitation of the manufacturers of the Pontiac automobile Mr. Whiteman will conduct personally a "talent expedition" thruout the United States.

"New talent is the life blood of any enterprise," the band leader said in explaining the procedure to be followed for the new talent search.

"In each city that I play on my present vaudeville tour, a talent audition will be held after an announcement by the mayor of the city," he said. "Applications for the auditions will be limited to those who have never done any broadcasting. After the preliminary auditions are held I shall listen to the finalists and select the voice that, in my estimation, is the best for broadcasting.

"The individual will then be given an opportunity to sing over a nationwide NBC network the following week, and his or her expenses will be paid for a trip to the next city where I am appearing with my orchestra. For example, the winner of the audition in St. Louis will be heard next Friday night from Cincinnati, thru the courtesy of my sponsors," Mr. Whiteman said.

As musical supervisor of the Chicago division of NBC, Whiteman has many radio "finds" to his credit, including Mildred Bailey and Jack Fulton, Jr. In addition to the weekly "Youth of America" audition, as the program will be known, Whiteman and his band will be heard each week in a program of modern music.

MEET the ARTIST
The Three Doctors

The other radio entertainers, not to mention the listeners, wonder how they do it, how the Three Doctors continue ad libbing their programs with the same nonchalance as tho they were amusing some friends at a house party. The Doctors in turn wonder how the other entertainers go through

the monotony of rehearsing programs. Personally, they think rehearsing a broadcast makes it sound stiff and formal, and formality is the last thing they want in one of their periods.

Russell Pratt, Ransom Sherman, and Joe Rudolph are the names, if you insist on a formal introduction. But the Three Doctors wouldn't. Pratt and Sherman grew up together in Appleton, Wisconsin, and continued to be closely associated when they went into business in Chicago. Pratt is tied up with the Credit Men's Association. Sherman is an insurance agent. They maintain an active interest in their businesses despite their success as chain broadcasters, and, of course have more time for their affairs than most radio artists would, because they never prepare more than a line or two of their programs in advance, and they never rehearse.

His business interests unceremoniously dumped Pratt into radio work. The concern which paid him his salary decided to publicize, so he organized a quartet and sang in it himself. Music had been his hobby since boyhood, but this didn't seem to help the quartet, which soon went off the air. Pratt didn't, for he took over the childrens'

program on WMAQ. He is the father of five of his most enthusiastic listeners.

Sherman was by this time a seasoned broadcaster, though strictly incognito. In the days when KYW was the only station in Chicago, he used to take off three hours for lunch in order to drop in on their Afternoon Frolic program. Those were the days, too, when anybody who went into the studios and said he could sing was at once led to the microphone, without benefit of audition. Sherman says the latter circumstance probably explains why he got on the air. But the explanation of why he was announced with an unpronounceable Russian name was slightly different; his boss knew nothing of his radio activities during the three-hour lunch period. When he got tired of being Russian he changed his nationality. But he still sang and pattered ad lib with the feeling of a schoolboy playing hookey.

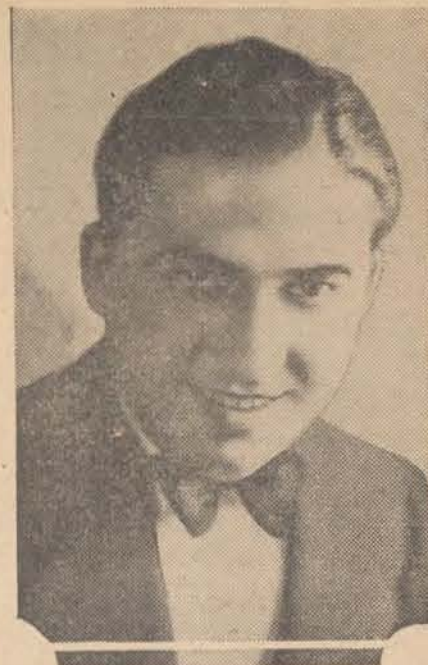
The Two Doctors decided they needed

some music in their programs, and Sherman recalled that during his college days he had played the saxophone in Joe Rudolph's orchestra. Joe played the piano like nobody's business, and he was willing to join the "Docs," so the trio was complete. At first he was rated only as an interne, but finally he blossomed forth as a full fledged member of the medical trio.

The Three Doctors enjoyed their broadcasting. It was great fun. They could work off all the gags that had been stewing in their minds, and shoot at one another. The audience liked it because it seemed spontaneous, and it was. Pratt's chief amusement is trying to get Sherman so tied up he won't be able to make a comeback. So far he has not succeeded. Radio is still a game with them. Though they have been on the air nearly five years, the novelty has not worn off, and as long as they can make their programs in their own way they are perfectly happy. They

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Music in the Air

By CARLETON SMITH

Bruno Walter at the Helm
Bruno Walter, the distinguished Prussian conductor, lifted his baton over the new York Philharmonic-Symphony for the first time this past week, and on Sunday conducts his first radio performance in America. When he appeared last in New York during the season 1924-25 as guest conductor, Walter Damrosch was then directing the New York Symphony, which had not at that time merged with the Philharmonic to form the present organization. Mr. Walter, whose real name is Schlesinger, made his first appearance in this country in 1923 as guest conductor of the New York Symphony and since then has conducted for brief periods in San Francisco and Cleveland. It is understood that the Metropolitan has negotiated with him unsuccessfully from time to time to have him join its staff to conduct the German classics, particularly Mozart, Strauss, and Wagner. His activities abroad have included appearances as conductor of opera and symphony orchestra in practically every music centre in the world. Lately he has directed the German repertoire of the Covent Garden season in the Spring, and he is, of course, director of the famous Gewandhaus Orchestra in Leipzig.

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The 55-year old German conductor follows on the radio series the highly interesting and contrasting programs of the three conductors, Golschmann, Lange, and Gabrilowitsch, who substituted for Toscanini, and I dare say interested radio listeners by the variety and opportunity for contrasts that they offered. Mr. Walter will conduct seven broadcasts and is expected to give those who are vitally interested in the Symphonic program material and are as yet unaware of his intention, plenty of chance for speculation. At the end of the seven weeks; that is, on the first Sunday in March, it is hoped that the incomparable Maestro—that first genius of the baton—Arturo Toscanini, will be sufficiently recovered to complete the remaining eight broadcasts of the current Philharmonic season.

Return Engagement

The first great artist ever to sing over the radio in this country is promised for a return engagement before the end of the season. Could you guess the artist's name? Few there are who heard her, yet most of us were active at that time, for it was only ten years ago. It was December in 1920, at the beginning of radio broadcasting, when KDKA had been on the air only a month that Luisa Tetrazzini decided to try out the ether just once before she retired to the country estate she was acquiring in Italy. One cannot forget the queer sensation when her staccato tones came vaguely through a maze of static. She was then, we thought, at the end of her career, during which she had made the art of the coloratura glow in a manner such as it has never glowed since. Physical illusion was never in her line, for she weighed well over two hundred and fifty pounds. But she was a perfect embodiment of the ideals of the preceding generation which demanded perfect singing and little else in opera. And now it seems inconceivable that this girl who began her career on the streets of San Francisco, and who has been in retirement ten years, should still retain her voice. Preserving a coloratura is certainly a more difficult task than keeping, for instance, a contralto voice. She says that she has been rehearsing with her early records and that she can duplicate them today. Ten years are a long time in the life of a coloratura, especially at Tetrazzini's age. In New York she vocalizes each day and soon will start on her "farewell" concert tour. There are many who recall the joyous certainty with which she swooped into all the cascades and fireworks of the coloratura and who are anxiously awaiting her radio appearance.

Richard Crooks on G. E.

One of the finest of American-born tenors is Richard Crooks, whom the General Electric hour brings to American homes this Sunday. Trenton, New Jersey, was boasting of their boy soprano when Crooks was only nine, and persistent study has brought him a complete mastery and control over that voice. He has done much to popularize good contemporary songs, and they, in turn, have made him one of the most popular recitalists. Since Crooks is a finished oratorio tenor, musicians undoubtedly hope that the General Electric program builders will feel that some of the finer oratorio arias are known in the American home and thus can be included on his program.

Civic Concert

The Civic Concert program next Saturday night brings a brilliant and fiery pianist, Jose Echaniz. If his name is not familiar to you, you may place him as the accompanist for Tito Schipa. Though I am sure that no member of the feminine sex who has seen him will ever have difficulty in placing him. When he left Mr. Schipa two seasons ago to start on a concert career of his own, it was rumored that the tenor had said, "Two shows on one stage at the same time are too many."

Speaking of Schipa, his radio admirers will have their chance to hear him next month.

Godfather Bonelli

Richard Bonelli, who has a broadcast recital in February, told me the other night that after his last broadcast, a woman in northern Canada wrote him saying that she had had difficulty in deciding upon a name for her three day old baby boy. After hearing Bonelli sing "Tommy Lad," the baby became "Tommy Lad," and "Tommy Lad" he remains. And the radio is still naming babies.

Civic Opera

Conchita Supervia occupied loge seven at the Chicago Civic Opera the other evening and created a sensation befitting one of her natural beauty. The Spanish mezzo, after dashing back and forth between Chicago and Washington, will make her debut with the Civic Opera this next week, and radio listeners will hear her in her only role of this season, "Carmen." Mme. Supervia is billed as one of the most sensational and colorful Carmens extant. My only regret is that the radio audience will not be able to see her. However, the broadcast will probably last long enough to contain her singing of the Habanera. "Carmen," I think, is an excellent choice for broadcast. It is one of the few operas that wins universal approval. The man in the street whistles and loves its melodies, the opera star is enthusiastic over its possibilities for singing and acting, the dramatic critic commends its carefully delineated characterizations, the musician admires its well conceived and masterfully handled emotions and its excellently wrought orchestration.

It is certainly regrettable that more than a half hour of the opera cannot be given, so that John Charles Thomas could be heard as the Toreador and Rene Maison and Leola Turner as the unfortunate lovers. It was rumored that some change would be made in the broadcasts of the Chicago Company, but since there is only one more Saturday night left in the season, the half-hour period will be maintained. Next season the Chicago Opera expects to be heard for a longer period, possibly on Monday evenings, which would be an advantage to all concerned. It is not fair to the opera performance nor the listener to have the music fade out in the middle of an important phase.

"Met" Broadcasts

The broadcasts from the "Met" are being conducted with a great deal more consideration for the listener. Perhaps you noticed how the intermission was shortened between the acts of "La Boheme." Stage hands were

Tin-Pan ALBUM

Dusting off the Album, we turn its pages till we find a picture of Ted Fiorito, orchestra leader and prolific writer of melodies. It's not a very good picture—rather shadowy, and the edges are blurred—well, that's because it's so very difficult to get a clear imprint of Fiorito's life or personality. Here is Genius as you'd expect it to be—moody, silent and brooding. Tunes like "No, No, Nora," "Sometime," "Laugh Clown, Laugh" and "Poor Marionette" have made his name known to everyone—but few people ever really get to know him. As far as we can determine, Fiorito has always lived for his music. At school, he fore-swore the pigskin for the piano. Shortly after being awarded his sheepskin, he landed a job playing in a "dive," proving that if a man makes a better piano player, the world will beat a path to his door, or words to that effect, because Danny Russo discovered him there and brought him to Chicago. His first song, "Charlie My Boy" was written while acting as co-conductor, with Russo, of the famous Orioles. His current tunes are "Now that You've Gone" and a new one soon to be released, "Where the Lilies of the Valley Grow."

I cannot tell a lie, I did it with my little Remington . . . made that mistake in last week's column, I mean . . . Being just a trusting believe-what-I'm-tolder, I trusted the brute who told me that melody-writer Matt Malneck was also the senior member of Whiteman's organization. Never thinking to make him sign anything, I went right back and told you about it (but you'd forgive me if you knew what I've suffered). All I got for my pains was a great big luscious berry of the species vulgarly known as Razz . . . with no cream or sugar on it. Matt Malneck isn't any such thing . . . Mike Pingitore is the oldest member of the band . . . in fact, he's been in it forty minutes longer than Whiteman has . . . he was the first one to show up for the first rehearsal. To make a short story long, Mike is the banjo player . . . and you have it from no less an authority than Ferde Grofe, that he's one of the best in the country. He can drown out a whole orchestra if he wants to . . . and stop any show. In his spare time, he writes hot banjo solos.

"Fud" Livingston, who wrote a new tune for the old song-and-dance, "I'm Through with Love," also has a complex for composing sax solos that will replace any old-fashioned heating system . . . try one on your music room the next time the thermostat lays out. "Feelin' No Pain," "Imagination," "Krazy Kat" . . . ask for them by name at your nearest sax-solo store . . . they'll wrap one up in asbestos and send it right over the counter.

Credit Jack Perry, western representative of Phil Kornheiser, for lots of information this week . . . He tells me that the song-pluggers have promoted themselves to "song-delineators" . . . sorry about that, because I can't be grabbing a Webster every time I want to write song-plugger.

Jack is delineating a new number right now that seems to be causing a regular Tin-Panic, no less . . . "Kiss by Kiss." On a recent trip to N'Yawk, Whiteman listened to a thousand tunes and brought back just one lead-sheet with him . . . you've guessed it, that's the one! The melody-makers are writing up their orchestrations, can't wait for the printed ones . . . crooners and shouters are wishing laryngitis on each other, so they can introduce it first . . . and the Old Maestro says he KNOWS you'll like it.

Walter Hirsch, Ben Bernie and Phil Baker have something up their sleeve which in the opinion of those Who are Who, will introduce a new era in popular songs. The melody has been giving headaches to some of the country's most expert lyric writers for the past year, but Walter finally tamed it. "Strange Interlude" is the title . . . and as there's not much that hasn't been done

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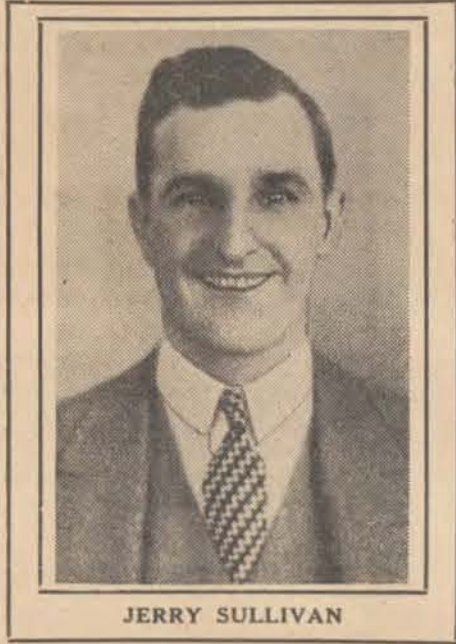

Jerry Sullivan remembers his first broadcast on KYW back in March, 1922. Jerry is a singer, announcer, and general manager of station WSBC. You'll know him by his trade mark, "Chi-CAW-go." He was working on the Board of Trade when curiosity overcame him and he went up to KYW, where he was allowed to sing. When WDAP came on the air, Jerry and the rest of the gang on KYW went up to the new station to do their stuff. The gang included little Joe Warner, Eddie and Fannie Cavanaugh, Grace Wilson, Everett Mitchell, Wendell Hall. When fan mail started coming in, Jerry decided to make radio work his vocation. Then came WTAS in Elgin, and on Monday nights, which was silent night, the gang travelled to Elgin to assist Charlie Erbstein. One cold silent night, in 1924, the elements raged and a big snow storm kept the stars from going out to Elgin. All but Jerry and Charlie Erbstein. And did they give up the ship? Not on your life. They recited, sang, adlibbed, and wisecracked until after midnight. Jerry says he sang everything he ever knew and forgot.

When he was offered the chance of announcing and singing on the new Rainbow Garden and Calumet Baking Powder Company station, WQJ, Jerry grabbed it and made good use of his trademark, "Chi-Caw-go." Well, there was a lot of discussion about that, some saying that he was distorting the name of our fair city. However, a letter from a listener settled that problem for good. This man had taken his radio set and a guide out to an Indian reservation and tuned in on Jerry Sullivan. Every time the Indians heard "Chi-CAW-go" they let out a war whoop. The guide informed this man that the word in Indian language meant odor of wild onions. And since the Indians named our city because of the growth of wild onions, and that's the way they pronounce the name, Jerry must be right and about 3 million people wrong. All right, then, he'll show you the letter to prove it.

The fan mail at that time was something to get excited about. Letters came in from Fiji Islands, England, Honolulu, Paris, Alaska, Haiti, and anywhere else you can think of. No wonder the artists were willing to work for nothing. Remember the midnight frolics over KYW, and all the fun the stars seemed to have. Well, they did have fun. They got a midnight supper, and that's something to look forward to.

Ho-Hum, those were good old days.

Ben Bernie . . . CBS maestro . . . says that five generations of his family were blacksmiths, but the sixth (little Ben) became a joke-smith . . . was born and raised in his father's blacksmith shop, which was directly under the Brooklyn Bridge . . . attended the Columbia School of Mines and Engineering . . . but shortly after went into vaudeville . . . how? . . . it was this way . . . Bernie was happily engaged sawing out melodies on a bargain violin (price, \$4.98)

in a New York department store . . . used to explain to his customers that his playing couldn't annoy them half as much as it annoyed himself . . . and that he didn't like violins anyway . . . if they did tho, here was a bargain fiddle . . . his novel sales talk attracted a theatrical booking agent and a contract followed . . . Now at College Inn in Chicago, Bernie's observations on life, love, farm relief, and the price of cigars are as fresh and spontaneous as ever . . .

Louis Relieux, known in Chicago as "Lix" Riley, has created a sensation with his dance orchestra, at the Brown Palace Hotel in Denver, Colorado.

In the December 31 issue of the Denver Post, Relieux's picture was among many that were headed "Builders of Greater Denver."

He now broadcasts over Station KOA and wants to be remembered to all his Chicago friends.

* * *

Gus Arnheim and his famous Cocomat Grove orchestra, who have been playing an engagement at the Club Forest in New Orleans, come to Chicago for an engagement at the Winter Garden Cafe starting January 22. The famous California maestro and his popular orchestra will be heard nightly over WBBM, Chicago. Irving Aaronson and his Commanders, who are finishing a long stay at the Winter Garden, follow Arnheim into the Club Forest at New Orleans.

* * *

Versatile Benny Meroff, who for five years acted as master of ceremonies in Chicago movie theatres, is scheduled to do an RKO tour with his famous orchestra. Benny and his band just closed a long engagement with Eddie Cantor and George Jessel at the Palace Theatre in New York. His orchestra has been heard many times over the CBS.

* * *

A new radio program featuring Clarence Wheeler, chief arranger and musical director for Publix theatres in Chicago, and a 20-piece orchestra, goes on the air over the NBC Blue network as the "Maytag Orchestra" on Monday night. The new musical feature, produced by the Radio Department of Music Corporation of America, will include a vocal quartet and promises to be something new in popular entertainment.

* * *

Theme Songs

Romantic tunes, most of them old and a few new, comprise the majority of the theme songs of America's most popular radio dance orchestras.

Paul Whiteman has long been identified with "Rhapsody in Blue" as the theme song of his orchestra in their radio broadcasts. Whiteman's identity with "Rhapsody in Blue" dates back to the day when George Gershwin, the composer, completed the number and Whiteman's orchestra was chosen to introduce it at a concert program in New York.

While Rudy Vallee is best known over the air for his theme song, "My Time Is Your Time," he has also featured "Good-night Sweetheart" as a signature song during some of his broadcasts. Guy Lombardo and his Royal Canadians likewise have several radio theme songs. Guy's numbers, designed to fit the occasion, are: "It's the Darndest Thing," "Comin' Through the Rye" and "Auld Lange Syne." Of the three numbers, "It's the Darndest Thing" has been used by the Lombardo band the most

and dates back to the days of their first radio triumphs over WBBM in Chicago.

"Violets," the theme song of his college fraternity, is used by Herbie Kay, the young collegiate orchestra leader who is heard over the NBC chain and broadcasts nightly from WGN, Chicago. Herbie, a member of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity, played the number while in school and received permission from his fraternity to use it later when he became a professional musician.

Harry Sosnik, Chicago arranger and composer, wrote the theme song used by Ted Weems and his famous orchestra. Ted wanted something original to identify his band on the air, and Harry furnished him with "Out of the Night." Incidentally, the Hotel Lowry in St. Paul adopted "Out of the Night" as their theme song during the Hotel's commercial broadcasts. They are said to be the first hotel to adopt a theme melody for broadcasting purposes.

Two famous orchestra leaders show preference for "Hour of Parting." They are Leo Reisman and his Park Central orchestra, heard frequently from New York, and Earl Burnett and his Californians. Earl's orchestra used the number during their broadcasts over WBBM, WGN and WCCO during the past summer and is now using it during their broadcasts over the Don Lee chain from the Biltmore Hotel, Los Angeles.

"My Paradise," a romantic theme melody written by Carleton Coon and Joe Sanders, identifies the famous Nighthawk orchestra in their broadcasts over the NBC chain from the Hotel New Yorker, New York City. The theme song has become very popular in Gotham, and Irving Berlin, music publisher, has obtained the publication rights on the Coon-Sanders theme song.

An original number, "The Waltz You Saved for Me," is heard every time Wayne King, the famous waltz maestro, comes on the air. It was written by Wayne and selected as the theme melody because it identifies the orchestra as radio's famous waltz band. Recently Wayne sought a new theme tune and asked his radio audiences for suggestions. The majority of fans, in response to his plea, suggested that he retain "The Waltz You Saved for Me."

Ben Bernie, "the ole maestro," musically tells the radio listeners that his band is on the air by playing either "Lonesome Old Town," "One of Us Was Wrong" or "Pleasant Dreams." The signature song, "Pleasant Dreams," is Ben's favorite and gives "the ole maestro" an opportunity to vocalize a farewell to his radio listeners before signing off.

Vincent Lopez uses "La Paloma" as a theme melody, while Cab Calloway, of Cotton Club fame, gives his interpretation of his own composition, "Minnie the Moocher." Henry Thies likes the tune, "Sometimes I'm Happy," from the show, "Hit the Deck," as a peppy theme song, and Dan Russo uses an unpublished German waltz. Don Pedro romances during his theme song, "Singing to Hide the Tears."

Satisfactory Chesterfieldian disport necessarily implies dignity, and a proper swoop to Lady Etiquette who is thus solicited to beam with indulgent accord. Otherwise, the name, the letters, the reputation would be all for naught. At least that seems to be the advertising attitude of those who plot great things for the nicotine members of the Great Family. Newspaper lineage has been utilized in conformance with these well-established standards. And now the ether has been enlisted for the benefit of Those Who Enjoy Better Things.

Those who are sponsoring this program have built a radio feature that has a great deal of merit. The vocal abilities of Alexander Gray (now publicized as Alex) need little comment. He is admittedly a voice of excellent repute, and his radio work maintains his high standing. Singing in a lusty, virile manner, Gray very probably personifies the type of performer that the Chesterfield lords believe will be in vogue. Thus we might say that classification would "pigeon hole" the show as an "anticipatory program." Nathaniel Shilkret, as always, is superb, and his music deserves ranking with the finest on the air. It's well spotted and certainly worth a dial twist.

The story of radio can never be told accurately without a prominent inclusion of the activities of the Two Sons of the Air. From many corners one hears faint rumblings, imagined omens of their declining popularity. Particularly is there such a suspicion in Chicago, the birth-place of Amos 'n' Andy. It is my belief that although there might be a diminution in interest among certain groups of Chicagoans, there most certainly is no such feeling through the countryside. These tooth-paste vendors are a religion to the country-folk, and wisely accepted. If anything, A & A have improved with the years. If you haven't listened lately, try them. You'll still get a laugh.

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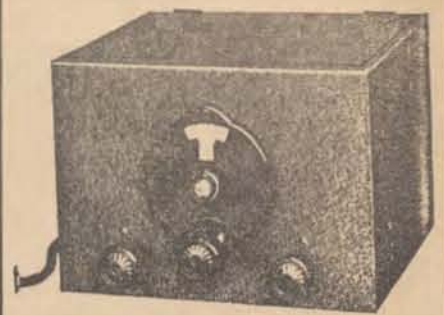

Nothing could be much sweeter than the top side of this disk, unless it's sugar . . . the other side is a fair sample of that husky harmony that makes the Boswells the best of the feminine trios. Their accompanists, the Dorsey Brothers, do a swellish job of it. (Brunswick)

"Gettin' Sentimental" and "My Goodbye to You" . . . Paul Whiteman

A lilting fox-trot and a lingering one . . . dansation pure and simple, without the usual orgy of symphonic orchestration that the Dean of Modern Music is wont to indulge in. You'll like it because you'll like it, that's why! (Victor)

"I Wonder Who's under the Moon with You Tonight" and "Pagan Moon" . . .

.....Abe Lyman

Two lovely moonlight melodies . . . despite modern instrumentation, they both have that old-fashioned romantic appeal peculiar to waltz rhythms. Chicagoans will no doubt recognize the pleasing voice of Frankie Sylvano in the vocal choruses. (Brunswick)

"I Wonder Who's under the Moon with You Tonight" and "Save the Last Dance for Me" . . . The Cavaliers

It's going to be hard to choose between this platter and the one described above . . . The Cavaliers are famous as waltz artists and their unnamed vocalist puts lots of emotion into his vocalizing. You'll have to make it a toss-up between "Pagan Moon" and "Save the Last Dance for Me." (Columbia)

"Chinatown, My Chinatown" and "Stardust" . . . Louis Armstrong

Old Egg Foo Young wouldn't recognize his home town . . . seems like the boys are holding a kind of melodic marathon and there's some man that keeps talking to beat the band. "Stardust" gets a dose of black magic also, and goes a bit voo-doo. (Columbia)

"When the Blue of the Night Meets the Gold of the Day" and "You Were My Salvation" . . . The Knickerbockers

They've taken the "Bing" out of this first one and left a smooth dance rhythm . . . Both sides are nice arrangements, with nothing outstanding to take your mind off dancing. (Columbia)

"Lazy River" and "Leven Pounds of Heaven" . . . Wayne King and Paul Whiteman

Step this way, ladies and gentlemen . . . three big names for the price of one—Wayne King and Paul Whiteman each take a side and call it even . . . altho Mildred Bailey adds extra weight to the Whiteman offering (and that's not meant to be funny, either). A sure-nuff bargain! (Victor)
