RADIO CALLS ANOTHER STAR

BELLE BAKER JOINS THESPIANS WHO HAVE FOUND A HAVEN OF REFUGE

• Another star deserts the stage for radio, and for the same underlying reasons that have actuated every other theatrical figure in making the move. Radio offers a larger audience, it does away at one fell swoop with a score of hardships, and it also assures its artists of a steady income. •

AFTER twenty years of success on the stage and in vaudeville and talking pictures, Belle Baker has turned to radio for the medium best suited to her generous talents. The chronicle of her rise through sheer hard work and natural ability reads like a page out of the story book of romance. And now that she has realized her ambition to star in radio, Belle Baker looks fondly back over her thrilling career.

It isn't that "the Mother of the sentimental song," as critics have called her, has turned her back on the stage and forgotten the medium which carried her to stardom; it isn't that Belle Baker has lost the youthfulness and charm which endeared her to the hearts of the theatre-going public. It is simply that she has found a medium which is ideal for her talents, a medium which enables her to reach millions where once she reached hundreds, and a medium which the Belle Baker of today loves with all her heart.

And then, too, Miss Baker realizes, as do all theatrical people, the many advantages of radio which the theatre cannot afford. Once assured

WGN's Gym Class Moves to 9 A. M.

In response to thousands of requests, Charlie White's Gym Class of the Air over WGN has been moved up from a 7:15 a. m. to a 9:00 a. m. spot, and the sponsors are now making plans for a coast-to-coast hookup which will make Charlie director of the largest Gym Class in the world. Charlie's Wednesday night program from WBBM, featuring the "Mysterious Teller of Tales", will soon be broadcast over one of the networks.

WJJD German Hour Features A Zither

A German Broadcast, announced in German and featuring the best of all types of German music, is now being presented each Sunday at 2:30 p. m. from WJJD.

An outstanding feature of the new series is the appearance on the programs of Tony Godetz, master of that unusual musical instrument, the Zither. The Zither is a very old stringed-instrument played by all German, Tyrolean, Austrian and Swiss Mountain folk, especially in the Alps. Its strangely beautiful tones, as produced by Mr. Godetz, are heard as a part of each broadcast.

Maxwell, Real Folks To Switch Networks

Network changes affecting two of the best known radio programs on the air were announced this week. One former NBC program switches to CBS, and one CBS program will hereafter be heard over the NBC.

The Maxwell House Ensemble program, with Lanny Ross as the featured artist is now heard over the Columbia network every Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 10:15 p. m. Until April 7, Maxwell House will continue to broadcast a program over an NBC network at the same time that the Lanny Ross combination is being heard from Columbia. Countess Olga Albani will be the featured artist soprano.

The "Real Folks" program, George Frame Brown's famous rural sketch, will wind up its Sunday afternoon broadcasts over the Columbia system on Sunday, April 3, and will begin broadcasting over an NBC network on Thursday, April 7, at 8:30 p. m. It will utilize the time formerly devoted to the Maxwell House broadcast, and will be under the sponsorship of the makers of Post Toasties instead of Log Cabin Syrup as at present.

John Thomas Favors Radio To Concerts

John Charles Thomas, American baritone heard frequently over NBC networks, prefers radio broadcasting to the concert stage. He cites two reasons: first, the size of the audience; second, the escape from constant traveling.

"If I sing, for example, sixty concerts in the course of a season, with an average attendance of 1,500", says Mr. Thomas, "that totals only 90,000 listeners for all the concerts. While for a single radio recital, the audience may easily total from 15,000,000 to 20,000,000".

Mr. Thomas thinks that broadcasting enables one to be at home more, to study and prepare a more perfect repertoire and to avoid the hardship of concert travel.

"The radio has made easily accessible the aural art of the world to a vast unnumbered audience, and also makes it possible for the artist to reach, in one half hour, a greater potential audience than perhaps he could appear before in a professional lifetime."

German Mayor Works Overtime Answering American Fan Mail

Mayor Hermann Luppe, of Nuremberg, Germany, has received almost eleven hundred letters from American listeners as a result of his recent international broadcast, "Christmas Made in Germany", which came through the Columbia network. The mayor had intended to answer all mail in long hand or picture postcards of the city, and he was more than surprised at the volume of mail received.

The little six-year-old fraulien, who stepped up to the microphone to say hello to American children, has received more than fifty requests for her picture, and many young fans wanted her address so that they could correspond with her.

Plan To Televis Conventions Here

Television, so the experts say, is now at about the same stage of development as sound broadcasting of 10 years ago. Nevertheless, when the Republicans and Democrats hold their presidential nominating conventions in Chicago next spring, television pickups may be placed on or near the rostrum of the convention hall so that pictures as well as words of the participating notables can be broadcast. If the plans go through, the televising will undoubtedly be done over local Chicago stations only.

In addition to the honor bestowed by the music publishing company, Hugh has been chosen for the Radio Guide's "Musical Interview" at 9:05 a. m. this Thursday. Hugh is a colorful character and a true exponent of the mountain ballads. He was born in the Smoky Mountain region and learned his songs from the mountaineers directly. He has had a kaleidoscopic life, doing everything from professional wrestling to playing in medical shows. His interview promises to be an unusual one.

Three Symphonies By Beecham Sunday

Sir Thomas Beecham will conduct the New York Philharmonic Orchestra in a program of three symphonies this Sunday from 2:00 to 4:00 p. m. when the concert is broadcast over the Columbia network. Symphonies of Haydn, Mozart and Cesar Franck will all be heard on the broadcast. Olin Downes, distinguished music critic, will discuss the program during the intermission.

"Friendly Philosopher"

Homer Griffith, who originated the radio role of "The Friendly Philosopher" and who has been, for the past two years, a popular figure in this presentation over Pacific coast stations, is now heard in eight shows a week over WBBM. On each broadcast he introduces one central theme subject which he builds up with quotations from the masters of philosophy and poetry. An appropriate musical background is also a part of each program.

MEET THE ARTIST

BOBBY BROWN

His full name is Robert Brown, but everybody calls him Bobby. His official position is director of production of the WBBM studios and particularly of the "Myrt and Marge" skits heard daily except Sunday from that station. But the "Myrt and Marge" cast call him Bobby. You see, he is that sort of person.

Informal, friendly, sympathetic, shrewd, Bobby's characteristic note is—tact! Sometimes he is directing as many as 30 people in the "Myrt and Marge" broadcasts—a tremendous cast to perfect for microphone presentation. Every voice must be made to stand out, every character must be drawn as distinctly as an etching, yet all must merge to form a cohe-



sive whole. Some job!—but Bobby does it, because he is not only an intelligent director, he is a tactful one.

Here is something unusual: Bobby never tried to get into radio. Radio just reached out a hungry arm and gathered him up.

When he was overseas during the war, this Brown boy learned to sing a few songs and accompany himself on the uke. His buddies thought it was great. They thought it was so good that after the war a group of them got in touch with WDAP and demanded that Bobby Brown and his overseas uke be made a regular part of their programs. None of the station officials knew who he was, but when his first radio appearance provoked about one thousand telegrams, they got busy. Bobby has been in the radio game ever since.

His best training was gained as entertainer and assistant announcer at KYW. Of course Bobby liked singing for radio friends, and announcing was fun too. BUT—something else—something bigger, more exciting, more glamorous was beginning to take form in his mind.

And that something was radio dramatic production. A radio drama that would develop with time and someday, perhaps, rival the movies or even the dramas of the legitimate stage. There was an idea there . . .

And so to WBBM and years of hard work—plus infinite excitement

and the satisfaction of watching radio drama grow from its first awkward and ineffective stages to a new, more perfect emotional medium of expression.

You know, I think that Bobby's story is more exciting than that of many a successful performer. His success has come not by chance, but by careful, scientific planning and the contribution of a big idea. Radio talent is cheap—radio brains are invaluable.

During rehearsal, Brown works like a demon. His hair is wild, his tie

thrown in some corner, his eyes excited with the problem before him. In the control room, where he seats himself to watch and listen to the players at work in the outside studio, he misses nothing. Time after time he stops the players for minute corrections that must be made if the broadcast is to go on the air with the perfect effect of natural and unrehearsed happenings. Yet always at the psychological moment, he gives the sign for rest and a relaxing cigarette.

But you'd never guess that the charming open-faced Bobby was the impressively serious and dynamic person I have just described to you. Personally, he is young, not more than 5.7 in. tall, and blessed with a superbly pleasing smile. He loves dogs, and anything connected with the theatre. If you press him, he will admit bashfully that he has been on the stage. When, and how—or even why—he won't say.

Of course he is married—all the nice ones are—to a lovely brunette who contrasts strikingly with his fair complexion and hair. Together they maintain a charming home where they are often host and hostess to the most interesting of the radio folk.

You would love Bobby Brown!

Radio Pioneer



Maurice Wetzel, newest addition to NBC's production staff, has been affiliated with broadcasting since the crystal-set days. Called one of the most versatile men in the radio world, he was the guiding genius behind KYW programs for a number of years. Announcer, musician and author of many a text-book on the Technique of Modern Syncopation, he is remembered for inaugurating the first "courtesy" programs (in 1922) and more recently, for creating and announcing the largest local commercial feature, "State Street Tomorrow."

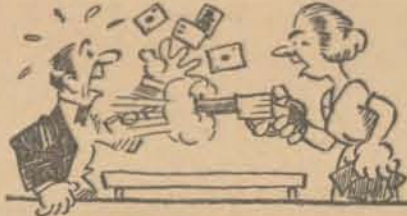

Phillips H. Lord, creator of the Seth Parker role heard over an NBC network, has been invited to referee the Final Championship Down-East Hockey Match at the



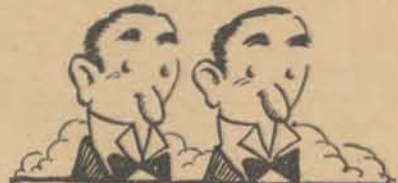
Boston Garden, Boston, Massachusetts. It is undecided as yet whether Mr. Lord's radio activities and his literary work will permit him to accept.

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MUSIC IN THE AIR

Library of Congress Musicales

Among the most satisfying of all classical music broadcasts are the Library of Congress musicales. Too little has been said and almost nothing done to "build" this series which ends Sunday with a program by Nina Koshetz and the International String Quartet.

One would readily agree that Chamber Music has not had a wide or a popular appeal. Yet I believe the effort spent in informing listeners concerning the pure and absolute forms of music would be profitable, especially if we assume that the radio has obligations to improve musical taste and increase enjoyment. In the quiet of one's home, remote from the surroundings and distractions of a concert hall, one can enjoy to the full such programs as the Elshuco Trio, the Salzedo Harp Ensemble, the Kroll Sextet, the Sonatas played by Lee Pattison and Jacques Gordon, and the Land o' String Quartet's "Aus Meinen Leben". This music appeals to the imaginative reason of the listener and necessitates some order of intellectual activity. It is ideally suited to the radio—that allows that intimacy and privacy in which its hearing was intended.

These programs and their performance have a different flavor from many that are produced in the super-charged atmosphere of our broadcasting studios. Through the juxtaposition of clever programming, the hidden affinities between modern and older works were revealed and we could understand the tendencies in composition today and have a guess, perhaps, at the musical grammar of tomorrow. This series holds great import to students of contemporary music, and lovers of chamber music are rightfully grateful for the intelligent and discriminating generosity of Mrs. Elizabeth Sprague Collidge, whose position among living patrons of musical art is unique.

The End of the "Ring"

We come this Thursday to "Die Gotterdammerung" (The Twilight of the Gods) of "Der Ring des Nibelungen"—the trilogy which occupied Wagner's ever active mind for more than a quarter of a century and which is without parallel in the whole realm of music for grandeur and breadth of conception.

When one approaches such a work, he is baffled as to how to study it. There are mysterious and eluding meanings in the "Ring" as there are in all extensive and full-stored works of the imagination. It is necessary, of course, to know the words and action and the associated "leading motives". The best way to learn them, I have found, is from the phonographic reproduction. Ninety are listed—ninety endlessly wonderful "themes", with their eloquent compactness, their pregnancy, their fulness of statement, their inevitability.

These motives have the timeless quality of immemorial things—one fancies that they must always have been; that Wagner simply came upon them, ageless, completely shaped, unchangeable in power and expressiveness, at some turning in his creative path. They seem almost to have been co-existent with the elemental and imponderable realities that they symbolize and project: water, fire, wind, light; destiny, youth, godliness, greed; hatred, ecstasy, loveliness; a gnome's malice or a god's despair. And their course is from first to last things—from the stirrings of primordial depths to the ultimate flaming of the spirit's will.

When one has sensed them, he sees the marvelous completeness of Wagner's work and does not for an instant receive the impression of the actual complication of what he hears. All the motives stand out from one another, and there is no confusion. We float in an ocean of luminous waves of harmony, and learn the lessons of Wagner's philosophy.

The cast that will sing the music from "Die Gotterdammerung" under Arthur Bodansky Thursday will include Gertrude Kappel, Gota Ljungberg, Lauritz Melchior, Clarence Whitehill, Michael Bohnen, and Gustav Schutzendorf. And the opera audi-

ence that attends this and the other uncut Wagner matinees at the Metropolitan is unlike any other in America. It is an assemblage excelling and distinguished in various ways, but chiefly by reason of its concentration upon the work of genius at hand. Music-lovers of the nation who can avail themselves of the opportunity to join ears with the inspired gathering in the opera house are fortunate.

I am sorry that we are not allowed to hear the finale of the opera. As the dusk of the Gods comes and their epoch ends, one realizes, perhaps, more clearly than anywhere else in Wagner's writings, his knowledge of redemption through love, of a last and supreme benediction in the consolatory phrase which lingers so sweet and so nobly serene.

It bespeaks a faith that makes life worth living.

Happenings

In the world of music, we hear . . . that Sergei Rachmaninoff, one of the greatest living virtuosos, to have refused radio appearances, thinks that "modern" music does not represent evolution, but only retrogression. It fails because it does not reveal the "emotions of the heart", and the great Russian says he agrees with Heine: "what life takes away, music restores". "Our modern composition is chiefly color and rhythm; it gives no relief to the soul, nor does it attempt to rehabilitate minds and souls. Therefore it fails". . . . The Chicago Symphony, after forty-one years of continuous activity, is threatened with the suspension of its concerts at the close of the current season. Lack of public patronage and an exorbitant union scale are given as the reasons . . . Prima donna worship has not ended. Then we had the "Gerry flappers"; now we have the "Pons fans". They are a group of Vassar girls, who cannot contain themselves when Mme. Lily Pons sings, and to show their excitement have arranged to wear buttons and attend all the operas in which the small French lady appears. Those of you who heard her Bell song in the broadcast of "Lakme" might procure a button by mail and promise to listen and write a letter each time she sings. It looks as though this latest arrival in the historic succession of coloraturas was destined for a long reign . . . Mme. Luisa Tetrazzini has just finished a week's engagement at the Paramount Theatre in New York, where she made twenty-nine appearances between movies. Her entire concert tour ten seasons ago consisted of thirty-two performances. She still wears the emerald ring which the Kaiser gave her in 1902. Her love for America has not changed, though she cannot understand the "crooning" rage. "No voices—but clever—very clever, these crooners!" . . . Mme. Johanna Gadski will sing no more. The great soprano was killed and buried on the soil she loved so dearly . . . Another of the "immortals" returned to the Metropolitan and sang Erda's fateful and prophetic "Weiche, Wotan! Weiche" in the season's only performance of "Das Rheingold", a part of which was broadcast. Thus Mme. Schumann-Heink as the Earth-mother awakened memories of a great tradition and an unforgettable past . . . Atwater Kent, whom economic conditions have forced to curb his broadcasting activities this season, finds that he is able to continue the annual national radio audition. Nonprofessionals between the ages of 18 and 25 may compete in the audition. Awards of \$15,000 will be divided as follows: \$5,000 each for the highest rating young man and young woman singers, and \$5,000 among the runners-up in the finals. Sectional trials will be held to determine contestants for the finals . . . Sir Thomas Beecham's second broadcast program will contain three symphonies, a Hadyn, a Mozart, and Cesar Franck's great mystical expression of faith.

of a place in radio the artist says farewell to a host of petty and not so petty annoyances. There are, for instance, no more weary weeks tramping the Rialto for engagements; no more discouraging heart-breaking weeks of rehearsal, hoping that the new play may "get across".

No more long tours from water tank to water tank; no more miserable meals in mismanaged "eating houses", no more draughty dressing rooms, dirty stages and poorly equipped theatres; no more long, dusty rides in dirty day coaches from this town to the other, with midnight or later changes of cars.

And no more wondering about salaries.

Consider the radio artist for a moment. He lives at home; he has regular hours of work in well heated and well lighted studios; his rehearsal hours are as regular as his hours of broadcasting; he is able to say just how long he will be working, just what he will be paid, and he knows that as he becomes known on the air the demand from the public will increase in direct proportion to his ability.

Who wouldn't give up the uncertain life of the theatre for the well balanced routine of radio?

And looming high above all other reasons for the switch is that one little word "money". Dollars, pounds Sterling, drachmas, pesetas, guilders, colons, leri, quetzals, escudos—gold, silver, paper—rhino, cash, spondulix or gelt—no matter what you call it or how you count it, it's "money", and it makes the wheels go 'round.

The new Ever-Ready Razor and Blade program, to be broadcast every Sunday night at 8:00 o'clock over the Columbia chain, starting Sunday, March 13, will not be Miss Baker's radio debut, nor that of the orchestra to be heard with her. For the past three years Miss Baker has been appearing as guest artist on some of the largest programs, but the new venture will mark her initial appearance as a regular network feature, and may therefore be taken as her definite break with the stage.

In preparation for these projected Sunday night appearances Miss Baker is canceling all of her stage engagements and devoting herself completely to selecting new songs and other broadcast material.

Jack Denny and his orchestra, whose entire career has been linked with radio, went to Canada some time ago on a rush wire, after they had established themselves at the old Frivolity Club on Broadway. It was a rush wire, by the way, which recalled the boys from the Mount Royal Hotel in Montreal, where they have been a feature for the past several months.

Miss Baker's enthusiasm for her new field of endeavor has led her to install a radio in her boudoir, and at all odd hours of the day and night one finds her listening in on network programs, just to get the feel of things. Her trip to Montreal, there to join Denny and rehearse for the inaugural program, was to insure her thorough understanding of just what would be required of her. She is taking no chances with the microphone.

"This program means more to me than anything else in the world—except the Christmas present I received eleven years ago," explains Miss Baker with a twinkle in her eye.

"The Christmas present" which alone means more to her than her new career is her son, Herbert John Abrahams, who was born on Christmas Day eleven years ago, on the anniversary of Miss Baker's own birthday. His father, the late Maury Abrahams, one of Manhattan's most prominent song writers, died less than a year ago; and Herbert has become the very center of his mother's universe. For Belle Baker, the mother, far more than Belle Baker, the star, is the woman you see today.

There is a mellowness in the deep brown eyes of the girl who has so long been Broadway's sweetheart, a soft motherliness which predominates over the sparkling twinkle which is still so evident. The greatest thrill in her life came when her talented little son played and sang with her on a recent network broadcast. Herbert has a voice strikingly like his mother's, and as she listens to it Belle Baker's face lights up with the vision of a career for the boy superior even to her own brilliant success.

Jan Garber opened an engagement with his orchestra at the Hotel Muehlebach in Kansas City last week. The Garber orchestra is heard nightly over WDAF.

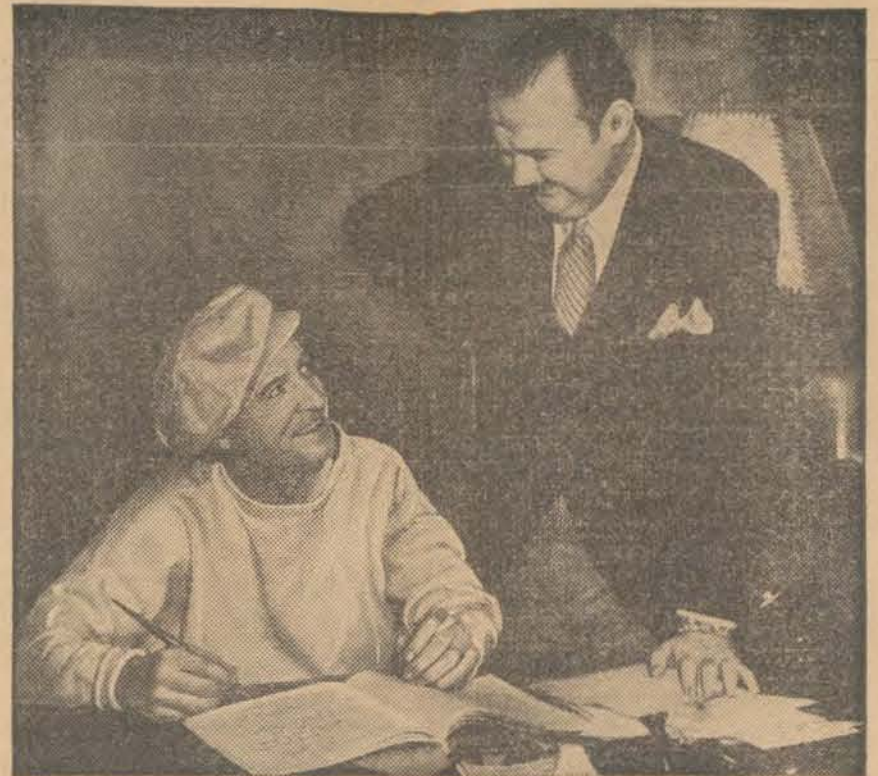

Buddy Rogers, idol of the screen, will soon lead His California Cavaliers in broadcasts over NBC networks from the Hotel Pennsylvania, it was announced this week by the NBC Artists Service after Rogers had signed a contract to succeed Rudy Vallee and his orchestra in the hostelry. The salary given in the contract is said to be a record for a hotel orchestra conductor.

Rogers, now appearing with the Ziegfeld Broadway production of "Hot-Cha", will play both dinner and supper music in the Hotel Grill, but his definite schedule of broadcasts has not yet been announced. A "welcome to the air program" will be given on his opening night, Easter Monday, by a group of NBC radio stars.

New "Sight" Stations

Two new television stations, both employing the ultra-short waves, will soon be on the air, bringing the total number of visual broadcasters authorized by the Federal Radio Commission to 32. The Commission has just granted WJR, Detroit, and WGAR, Cleveland, both under the same ownership, authority to build television adjuncts to operate in synchronism with one another on a group of ultra-high frequencies between 43,000 and 80,000 kilocycles with 200 watts. A hearing has been ordered on the application of First National Television Corporation of Kansas City, proposing to build a visual station there to operate in conjunction with KMBC.

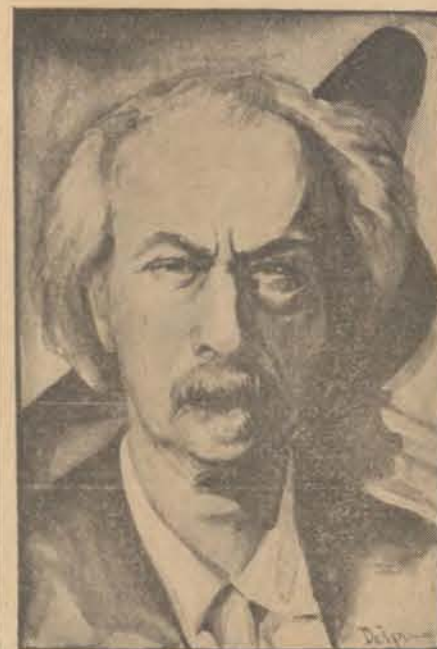

Ask and you shall be answered—and how. If you have a problem confronting you, write to Mrs. Blanche Chenoweth of WLS. She will present a "Little Drama from Life" with you as hero or heroine and your problem as plot of the drama.

One letter came to Mrs. Chenoweth from a young girl who kept house for her father and several brothers. The men folks kept her nose to the grindstone, not allowing her any money for clothes. She saved a few pennies from her household money and when she purchased a cheap pair of hose, her father raised an awful fuss. She asked advice from Mrs. Chenoweth, who dramatized her story on the air. One woman listener was so touched by the little drama, that she sent a pair of expensive silk stockings to the station, to be sent to the girl. Mrs. Chenoweth had better prepare for an avalanche of hard luck stories.

Thumbnail Sketch

Jimmie Kozak, whose nimble fingers WAAF listeners heard flying over the piano keyboard on the Radio Guide program, is a veteran of the theater and air. His life has been devoted to music, and he has performed all over the United States and in Europe. He has been a pianist on the staffs of KYW and WCFL.

But being an accomplished pianist is only one of Jimmie's musical accomplishments—he is an orchestral director of considerable note as well. He held the baton over the orchestra at the opening of the Balaban and Katz Roosevelt Theater, and for some time thereafter. 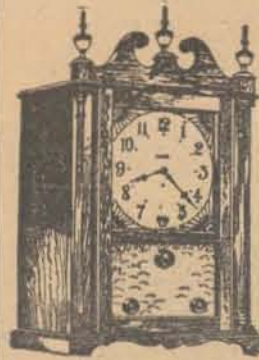

John Philip Sousa with
His Wife and Daughter

One of the greatest figures of the modern music world, John Philip Sousa died last week. American sentiment, American music and American radio suffer great loss with his passing.

Sousa died suddenly in Reading, Pa., after attending a banquet in his honor the day before. He was buried in the Congressional cemetery with military and civilian honors.

Sousa's career was launched at the Chicago World's fair in 1893 when he was commissioned by Theodore Thomas, founder of the Chicago Symphony orchestra, to play at building dedications preceding the opening of the fair, and later to lead the official fair band.

His work in connection with the civic project brought him immeasurable success and popularity and his subsequent tours were in the nature of a triumphal procession.

The March King has been heard over both networks in numerous concerts given by the United States Marine and Army bands under his direction. During the World War he was given the rank of Lieutenant Commander as a result of his work in leading the Marine band at the Great Lakes Naval Training Station.

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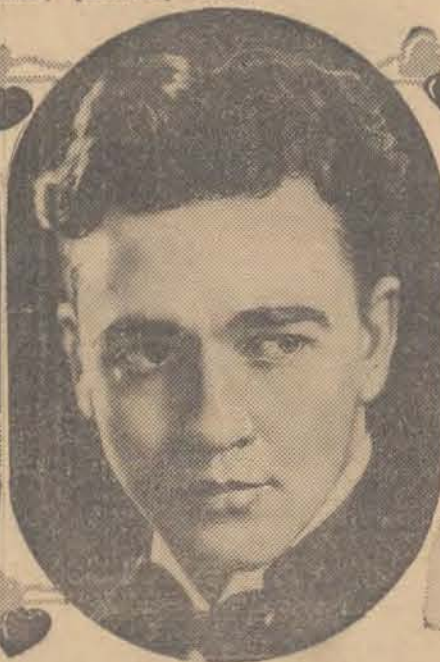
