HOW RADIO SNATCHED FOUR ASPIRING ARTISTS FROM CONCERT STAGE

IT is a queer turn of fate that has made a punctured dream the basis of Lombardo's career. If Papa Lombardo had ever achieved that concert stage for which he studied, the little Lombardos might not have had to sit about the house tra-la-la-ing the scale. But Papa Lombardo's tailoring business kept getting in the way, and art stumbled over it, so ambition had to be side-tracked, shelved, ultimately pushed into another generation, and that generation was Guy's.

Finally she decided that the young Lombardos should play for the woman's club. So they got all dressed up, went around the corner and got young Freddie Kreitzer, who played a piano, and set a lot of ladies to foot tappings and swayings.

Bands Replace Sherlock Holmes

A concert orchestra under the direction of Graham Harris and a dance band led by Billy Artzt will replace the Adventures of Sherlock Holmes, mystery drama program, on the NBC networks during the summer months. Beginning this Wednesday night at 8:00 p. m. (CDST) over WMAQ, the orchestra will broadcast light classical selections, and introduce occasional guest artists.

Graham Harris, who will handle the baton, is a former director of Gilbert and Sullivan operas for NBC and conductor of the incidental music on the Sherlock Holmes programs. He conducted the Capitol Theater orchestra in New York for three years, and has played with the New York, Chicago and Detroit symphony orchestras.

The Boat Club Dance, a program of dance music featuring the smooth, stringed rhythms of Billy Artzt's orchestra, will occupy the Thursday night periods over an NBC network and over WENR at 8:30 p. m. (CDST). The Foursome, a male quartet from "Girl Crazy," will add vocal harmonies to these weekly offerings.

Edith Meiser, author of the Holmes radio dramatization, has prepared a series of brief dialogues through which Allyn Joslyn and Sylvia Field will lend a touch of summer romance to The Boat Club Dances. Billy Artzt, well known to radio and New York dancers, is celebrated for his graceful dance arrangements.

Amelia Putnam Will Receive CBS Medal

Amelia Earhart Putnam, whose recent lone crossing of the Atlantic by plane was said to have linked broadcasting and aviation in a notable flight, will be awarded the Columbia Broadcasting System medal for distinguished contribution to the radio art, it was announced this week.

In recognition of Mrs. Putnam's extemporaneous interviews broadcast from London at the completion of her flight and during her reception by the British people, the award is given. The medal will be presented to the aviatrix shortly after her return to this country.

Mrs. Putnam is the fourth to receive this honor. Other recipients have been Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, Sir John Reith, and Leopold Stokowski. The medal was designed by Gaetano Cecere, noted sculptor.

WGES Blues Singer

Mary Williams, blues singer, has taken the 6:30 spot (CDST) every evening at WGES. She is featuring special medley arrangements of popular tunes together with novelty piano accompaniments by Johnny Van. Miss Williams has been featured this season at the College Inn and over NBC networks with Johnny Maitland's orchestra.

Many Politicians Crop Out Of Radio

If you would be a successful office seeker, buy a radio station! Surprisingly enough, several radio station owners or operators have begun to take a prominent place in the present political whirl. At least three broadcasters are currently seeking high office.

If Henry Field of KFNE, Shenandoah, Ia., who won the Republican nomination for U. S. Senator in the recent Iowa primaries, is elected, he will make the third U. S. Senator owning or operating a radio station. The other two are Senator Arthur Capper, of Kansas, who owns WIBW, and Senator John S. Cohen of Georgia, publisher of the Atlanta Journal and owner of WSB.

There are no station owners in the House of Representatives, as yet, although Dr. Frank W. Elliott, former manager of WHO-WOC and one time president of the National Association of Broadcasters, is seeking office. So far, Elliott has managed to secure the Republican nomination in the Davenport district.

Russian Music

There is such a thing as a Russian Village right here in Chicago. It's on Dempster Street. And from that romantic spot is broadcast Russian music and particularly Russian folk songs sung in the native tongue each Sunday through WIBO. At 9:15 p. m., 11:15 p. m. and 11:45 p. m. (CDST). The village festivities are interrupted long enough for George Nelidoff, former baritone of the Moscow Opera, Yasha Yakovleff, baritone, and Inna Miraeva, to sing the Russian folk tunes against a background of a Russian chorus and a pleasing ensemble of violin, guitar and native instruments.

Kostelanetz Presents Symphonic-Jazz Music

Andre Kostelanetz, noted pianist-composer and former conductor of the Petrograd Grand Opera, will inaugurate a novel program of symphonic and jazz music over the Columbia network this Friday from 7:30 to 8:00 p. m. (CDST). The program will employ a forty piece orchestra, featured vocal soloists, and the Round Towners and Four Clubmen quartets. The broadcast will be heard each Friday thereafter at the same time.

Kostelanetz, who has conducted numerous Columbia programs, was born and educated in Petrograd. Since coming to the United States, he has conducted for several seasons with the German Opera Company and later toured the country for a number of Metropolitan and Chicago Opera stars, including Julia Claussem, Marie Kurenko, and Helen Stanley.

The cast includes Hank Moller, interlocutor; Hal Gilles, as "Muddy White"; Jack Spencer, as "Pork Chop"; Marlin Hurt, as "Ebony Brown"; as well as "Tom, Dick and Harry" and their accompanist, Carl Hoeffe.

Damrosch To Give Concert Series

Walter Damrosch has announced plans for five gigantic festival concerts to be held next season in Madison Square Gardens. 175 picked musicians will participate with Damrosch conducting three of the concerts, and distinguished guest soloists including Kreisler and Rachmaninoff appearing. Proceeds will go to the Musicians Emergency Aid which is sponsoring the series in conjunction with the NBC.

The concerts are scheduled for November 19, November 26, December 10, January 11, and January 25. The final one will be a gigantic pageant-pantomime, with a chorus of 1,000, and orchestra of 200, and one thousand dancers, soloists and actors.

"It was Paderewski's concert in Madison Square Garden which gave me the idea for this symphonic series," Damrosch explains. "I was so impressed by the marvelous acoustic properties of the Garden that I visualized the possibility of utilizing it as a center for musical events of a mammoth character."

Events Of Other Days Recalled On WGN

OUR music critic, Carleton Smith, has often referred to the fact that opera stars seldom give their best to the radio audience. He explains this by saying that they are not given their choice of songs, and since operatic singers train their voices for a particular type of music they find it difficult, if not impossible, to meet the many limitations placed upon them by the broadcasters.

First of all we want to clear the broadcasters of responsibility for this state of affairs and place the blame squarely on the program sponsors who present these artists to the listeners. The trouble lies, we believe, in the fact that the advertisers are poor psychologists, and are working on the assumption that radio listeners are a race of morons. How come? Well, listen to a modern comedy of errors.

Two of the best known programs presenting opera stars are the Sunday General Electric and the Swift Garden Hour. Both have expended huge sums each year to bring the radio audience such artists as Tito Schipa, Beniamino Gigli, Mary Garden, John Charles Thomas, Charles Marshall, Richard Bonelli, Rosa Ponselle, and many others. But these artists are told that in order to get a large listening audience for their sponsor they must sing the songs that everyone knows: the old familiar ballads, like Silver Threads Among The Gold, Mighty Like a Rose, etc., those are the songs that everyone wants to hear. Mrs. Jones or Mr. Smith, who have never been to the opera, wouldn't care to hear arias from Grand Opera. And that settles that question.

Here is what this line of reasoning produces on the air. Mrs. Jones and Mr. Smith, who have never been to the opera because, in the first place, it costs too much compared to the cost of the movies, and, secondly, it's terribly dull sitting through three hours of singing about something they don't understand, learn that a great opera star is to appear on the radio Sunday. Well, it doesn't cost anything to tune in, and half an hour of opera is just about the right amount, so Mrs. Jones and Mr. Smith tune in on Sunday, only to find that the great opera star sings two or three of the old ballads, like Carry Me Back To Old Virginy, or Mother Machree, and that the favorite crooner of Mr. Jones and Mr. Smith sings them much better anyway. They then and there decide that opera is the bunk, that the great opera star has been greatly overrated, and the chances are in favor of their passing up the next broadcast of a singer of operatic fame.

On the other hand, Mrs. Smythe, who goes to the opera occasionally, tunes in the broadcast and is thoroughly disgusted with the work of the great opera star. She has heard him in a number of operas and she finds him at his worst while singing these ballads on the air. Whereupon Mrs. Smythe decides that radio programs are being produced for morons, and that a receiver is out of place in a home where good taste and culture are the order.

When the Camel Caravan, now disbanded, visited Indianapolis a number of weeks ago, Morton Downey, who won his first fame with the song "Wabash Moon," got his first glimpse of the Wabash. It turned out to be a modest little creek, and Morton was given a vote of thanks by the Wabash Boosters Association for his efforts in behalf of their favorite body of water. Somebody asked him how he came to write the song without ever having seen the river, to which Morton replied that he may not have seen the river, but he certainly had seen the moon. This is indeed strange, inasmuch as Morton lives in New York City, where the moon is something the songwriters use to rhyme with June and soon, and is customarily considered just a figure of speech like "west of the Hudson" or "the great open spaces." Of late Morton has been singing his song of the Carolina Moon, which is altogether more appropriate. For even the New Yorkers must have read about the vote cast by the delegates from both Carolinas in the recent debate on the prohibition plank. Otherwise there might have been some doubt in their minds about the existence of a Carolina.

MUSIC IN THE AIR

By CARLETON SMITH

DO YOU KNOW . . .

THAT Columbia is to give us the real treat of summer broadcasts? This Saturday evening and seven Saturdays thereafter at 7:30 (CDST) the entire program of the Stadium concerts in New York will be heard over a nationwide network. The Stadium concerts, inaugurated in 1918 and conducted each season in the outdoor auditorium of the College of the City of New York, have come to be a unique feature of New York's summer life. Since 1923 the orchestra has been the same, with the exception of five first desk men, as that which plays at the New York Philharmonic Symphony at Carnegie Hall in winter. The programs are now virtually identical in content with those of the older organization, including the standard repertoire of Brahms, Beethoven, Wagner, Debussy and the moderns.

THAT Willem van Hoogstraten and Albert Coates will be the conductors directing the orchestra during the broadcasts, the former conducting the first four concerts and the latter the last four? Van Hoogstraten has been the principal conductor of the Stadium concerts since 1923, assisted each year by a distinguished guest. Originally introduced to American audiences as guest conductor for two concerts under Philharmonic management in Carnegie Hall, he has made similar appearances at the Hollywood Bowl and with the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra. For the past six years he has been regular conductor of the Portland Symphony, and he has just completed his second successive season as conductor of the Beethoven Festival at Bonn, Germany. Among his plans for the Stadium concerts is the presentation of a Beethoven cycle, including the nine symphonies and many famous overtures.

THAT Albert Coates, who will conduct the second half of the summer season, is a native of St. Petersburg, now Leningrad, Russia? His ability was first recognized by Tchaikovsky, and he studied under Rimsky-Korsakov. When he went to England to continue his education, he studied chemistry under Sir Oliver Lodge, but soon returned to St. Petersburg determined on a musical career. Coates has conducted at the Leipzig Opera, at Mannheim, Dresden, St. Petersburg, Covent Garden, New York, and numerous other music centers.

THAT educators, to be successful at the "mike," must disregard many pedagogical practices? They cannot transfer the class room lecture to the air and expect to hold the American listener.

THAT there are sixteen million receiving sets in the United States?

THAT the theme song has become the trademark of the radio program? The particular signature varying from the newest "Tin Pan Alley" tune to the "Roku-Dan" used by Yoichi Hiroaka, Japanese Xylophonist, builds up a definite association between the tune and the program. Witness the number of your friends who will speak of "Amos 'n' Andy" if you hum "The Perfect Song" or of the Goldbergs if you whistle Toselli's "Rimpianto."

THAT practically all signatures and titles of programs are registered in the United States Trademark Association?

THAT the most popular signature is "Swanee River," which has been identified with five different programs, and, next in the runnings, is "Carry Me Back to Old Virginia" with three?

THAT a tire company once used as its theme song "Breezing Along With the Breeze"; a manufacturer of Persian Rugs, "The Call of the Desert"; a shoe program, "Oh Dem Golden Slippers"; and the Blue Moon Cheese Program, "Once In a Blue Moon"?

THAT Arthur Friedheim, concert pianist who learned his technique under the great

Franz Liszt, will be guest artist on the "Great Composers" program Sunday, over NBC-WEAF networks? Born in St. Petersburg in 1859, Friedheim began the study of music at eight, and appeared as a pianist at nine. He is regarded today as a foremost exponent of Liszt's music, will play the great Hungarian Concerto for piano and orchestra.

THAT Friedheim once directed orchestras in Germany and became first a pupil and then a fast personal friend of Liszt? He lived with the composer and studied in Rome from 1880 to 1882 and later resided with Liszt at Weimar. He has written a number of compositions for piano.

THAT a series of four recitals with orchestra accompaniments is being planned for Luella Melius, often called the "perfect" coloratura soprano? Mme. Melius was a Wisconsin girl (Appleton, I believe) who studied for five years with Jean de Reszke, and returned to her native land with an unbelievably accurate technique and trill. There have been many who have wondered at the shortness of her career in opera here. In view of the scarcity of birds of her species, Melius would be a welcome addition to any opera company. She told me that not so long ago she had played accompaniments for Tetrizzini to sing for her. This was the realization that she had never expected of an old ambition, and she said that Tetrizzini sang well. She told me also of Tetrizzini's great disappointment at being ill and having to return to Italy without making a tour.

THAT two years ago some friends took Josef Koestner, once accompanist for Mme. Claire Dux and now NBC conductor, out for a round of golf? Since that time, he may be seen touring around the course, his little son, Joe, Jr., trudging along after him.

THAT Chandler Goldthwaite, who has appeared as organ soloist with several symphonies, is heard Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings, helping to serve Our Daily Food?

THAT great music is heard on the Great Composers program Sunday afternoons?

THAT George Barrere, at his June concert in Town Hall, said he had had something to do with those inventions that sold music by the yard or millimeters? He announced that the music on his program, without his talks and cuts, would last one hour and twenty-eight minutes. He knew because he had played all the compositions on the radio.

THAT Goldman will begin his program Sunday with Elgar's "Pomp and Circumstance" and follow with the overture to "Fingal's Cave," Bach-Gounod's "Ave Maria," Grieg's Peer Gynt Suites and a Bach Chorale and Fugue? Imagine that for a band! And on Saturday evening the whole broadcast is of Bach's music.

THAT Grace Moore (really Senora Valentin Parera), whom every one tells me is faithful to her Spanish "Clark Gable," will sing her final broadcast of the season on the Goodyear program this Wednesday, and sail immediately thereafter on the Maiden Voyage of the French Cabin Liner—Champlain?

THAT Richard Crooks has listed Schubert's Serenade, Lehmann's "Moon of My Delight" and "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" among his selections this week?

THAT Genia Fonariova, mezzo soprano, has some choice songs on her NBC program late Saturday afternoons?

THAT the sustaining programs now replacing "commercials" are offering better music—performed, it is true, by less gifted talent? There may yet be more ether waves carrying classics.

Jan Garber and his orchestra just opened at Norumbago Park, Boston.

Don Bestor scored such a tremendous hit at the Hotel New Yorker during the early spring that the management is bringing him back for the mid-summer season.

Tommy Clines has done it again, or at least he's talking of doing it. What we're driving at is that he wants to change his name once more. First it was changed from Klines to Clines, now we understand it is to be Nelson. Well, we all have to have a hobby, don't we?

Happy Felton took his orchestra out to the Jenkinson's Pavilion in Point Pleasant, New Jersey, on June 25th for an indefinite stay.

Jack Pettis and his orchestra were booked into the William Penn Hotel in Pittsburgh for their mid-summer season.

began to get a clear idea that there might be money in this business of scraping notes out of a fiddle and blowing noises out of brass. So the four stuck together, made other ladies tap their toes, pocketed nickels, and then helped win the war.

The musicians were too young to carry a gun—Guy was twelve—but they helped by providing theme songs for war at the London, Ontario, barracks, near their home. They tooted out martial tunes for the soldiers, the soldiers sang them, and months later in the trenches the songs they played were hummed while shells made a discord of civilization. The boys thought that over and decided that music was a strange thing.

Looking back at the past, Guy Lombardo, who, as the oldest, heads their orchestra, realizes that he figures events on a family basis. It goes like this: Lebert refused to play the trumpet any longer and insisted on pounding the drums. Papa Lombardo punched holes in the ceiling and blamed it on the war.

"Parades," he shouted, "soldiers marching in step. It gets in the blood, and even an honest trumpet player wants to beat out foot music."

So that was 1917, the year the Lombardos started to play for concerts, socials and lodge dances. Then Carmen switched to a saxophone. He became Public Enemy No. 1 by being the first to bring that weird instrument into their town. He mastered it, and worse, gave lessons to others. His best pupils, Freddy Higman and Bern Davies, were taken into the band and protected. That expansion marks 1920, when their orchestra became big enough for ballroom work. Then there was a ukelele player in town, Francis Henry. They argued with Fran that sitting around in canoes twanging Hawaiian chords never would get him any place. So he took to playing a banjo and got into the orchestra.

Then Lebert tired of the drums and went back to the trumpet, which meant the addition of another playmate, George Gowans, as drummer. That meant 1923 with nine in the band. Then Corinne Arbuckle heard them, decided they should join her act, and took them to Detroit, their first appearance outside their home district.

Lombardo is not clear about the rise to prominence except they went to Cleveland, played in Sophie Tucker's road house, went on the air to give the home folks a thrill—everybody in the band wired home to "Listen to us"—and finally played a long engagement in Chicago. He remembers that in Cleveland their fate was decided in a funny way.

The boys got homesick and called a meeting to see if they should go back home or stay in this country. The vote was deadlocked when the last member of the band arrived late. He had just met a grand girl, voted to stay and that was the hairline between being a small town band and a famous orchestra.

Part of their success Lombardo attributes to the fact that the band played together for eleven years without a change of musicians, except when Victor was added several years ago.

"My band remains intact," Lombardo said. "You see there are my three brothers and the others are old friends. We've always played together. It's teamwork that counts in an orchestra just as much as on the gridiron and the diamond."

That partly explains it—partly but not all. Much lies in the personality and force of Guy Lombardo himself. Two anecdotes give an insight into the man.

Victor, although a musician, had never belonged to his brother's band. When Guy was

in Chicago playing at the Granada Cafe, Victor approached his big brother.

"I want to join your band, Guy, will you take me in?" Victor asked. At that time Victor had been playing the saxophone for six years.

Guy had his brother play for him, and listened as attentively and yet as impartially as he would have listened to a stranger. At the end he turned to the young saxophonist and said:

"No, Vic, you better go back and practice up a little bit more."

That was all. Not another word was said. After half a dozen years he was not quite good enough, and the fact that he was a brother meant nothing to Guy who insists upon real musicianship. The result was that Victor played successively with two other orchestras and later qualified for the Royal Canadians.

The other story shows Lombardo's loyalty to a friend. He never forgets. One of the band's first great successes was at the Granada in Chicago, and for that Guy was grateful to the manager who first gave him a chance. Recently he heard that that man had had reverses and was broke. Immediately Guy took a week's vacation with his band and played at the Granada for seven days without charge.

Lombardo is an innovator in dance orchestras. He knows the charm of simplicity in orchestration, and appreciates the subtle art of pianissimo dynamics.

"I didn't give the people what they wanted," Lombardo said in discussing his own particular version of the Cinderella story. "I gave them what they didn't expect. As a matter of fact the new rhythm and unusual tonal combinations didn't get over so well at first, but I find they are suddenly popular."

When Lombardo opened a week's engagement at the Chicago Theater he broke all attendance records. The box office returns were \$72,000 for that week. So far as we know, this has been equalled by no other dance band.

Guy and his band are one of radio's romances. Theirs is the story of a small orchestra playing community affairs and college dances along our northern border—of the discovery of a new dance tempo—of Chicago—later New York—the Columbia broadcasting chain—and fame. Almost overnight the smooth, dreamy Lombardo rhythm has captured the continent.

Two More Stations Taken Over By Nets

Two more important broadcasting stations went under network control last week. KPO, San Francisco, was sold to NBC for \$600,000 and Columbia was authorized to lease WJSV, Alexandria, Virginia, for \$20,000 a year with option to buy at the end of five years for the sum of \$400,000. WJSV is just across the Potomac from Washington. KPO is a 5,000 watt station, but will shortly go to 50,000, and WJSV operates with 10,000 watts on 1460 kc.

This transfer gives NBC a total or part ownership in eleven stations. Besides KPO, it owns outright WEA and WJZ in New York; WENR in Chicago; WTAM, Cleveland, and WRC, Washington. CBS owns six stations in whole or part and leases two others. It owns outright WABC, New York; WBBM, Chicago; WBT, Charlotte; WCCO, Minneapolis, and WKRC, Cincinnati.

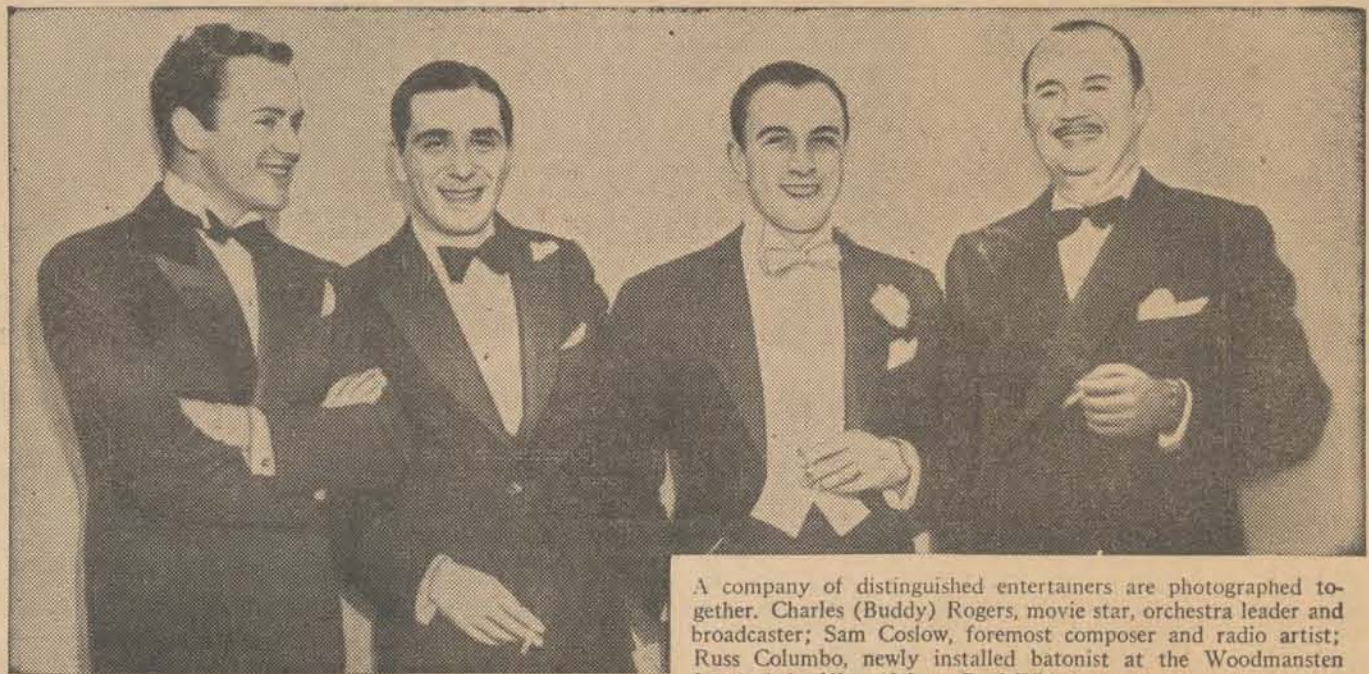

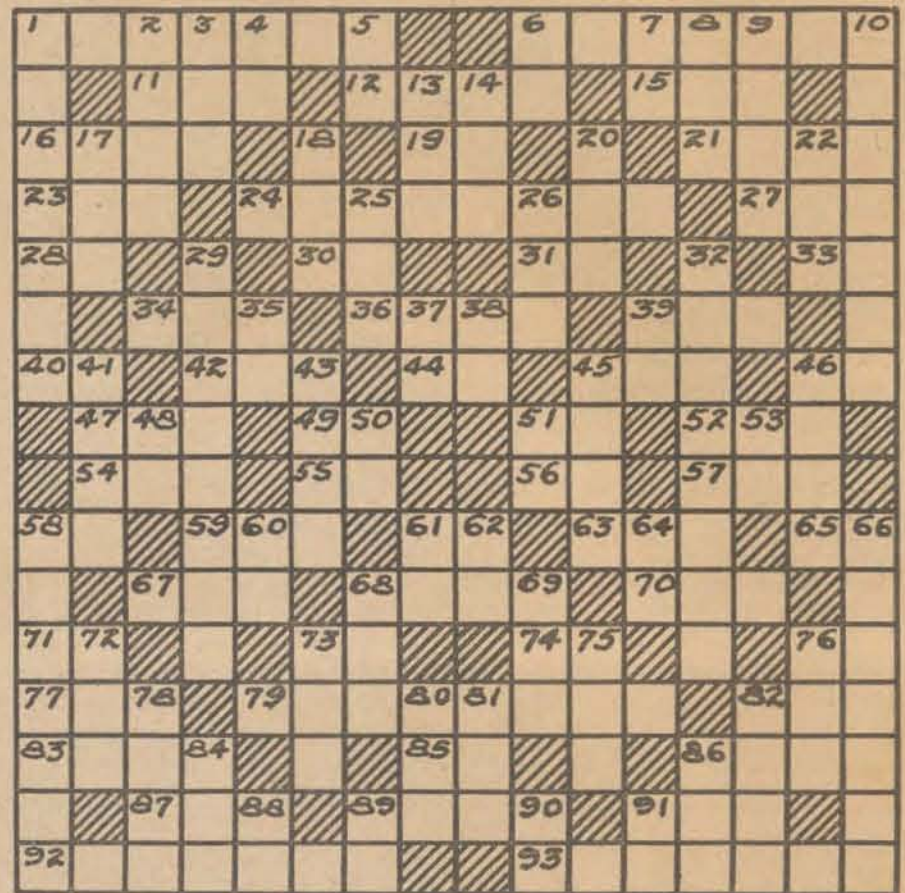

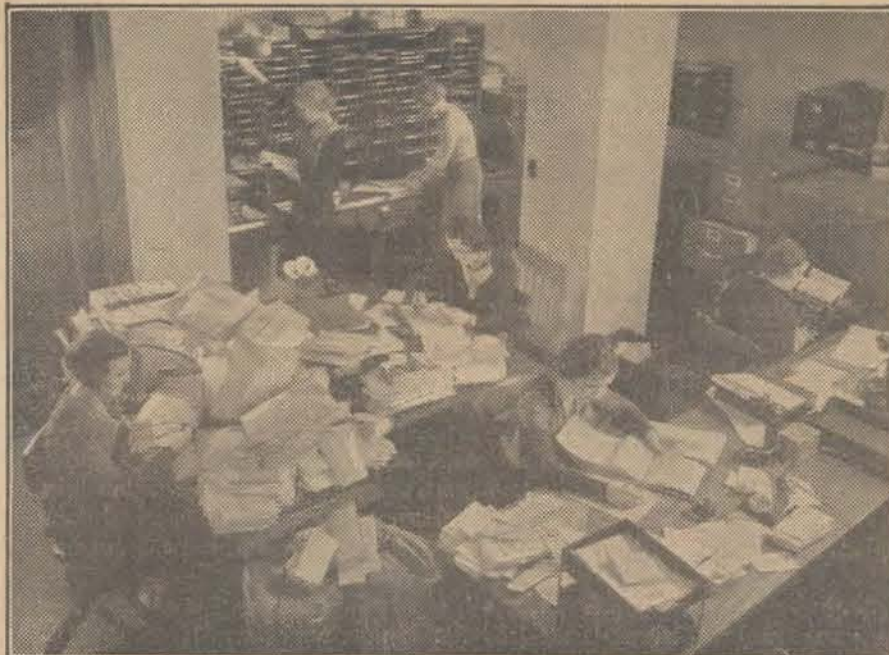
+ FAN MAIL +

Fan mail—expressions of appreciation and comment which are the applause of listeners for the contributions of radio artists—is handled by a separate department at the Chicago NBC studios. Here the staff is kept constantly busy sorting, opening and distributing the thousands of letters and other articles sent to radio artists, radio advertisers, and the network.

The practice of writing letters to radio stations and artists originated probably in the very earliest days of radio, when a listener, thrilled over having heard a particular station, wrote about his reception of

Reading material, educational material, bulletins issued by the Federal departments are often requested.

When letters regarding a network program are addressed to stations in the network, the stations forward the mail to the NBC Audience Mail department. These are also handled exactly as if they were sent direct. The staff of girls in charge of the mail also keeps an accurate count of the number of letters received in response to each broadcast. Radio artists often receive excellent suggestions from their listeners and try to use them in their work. Some of the



the feature. With the increase in popularity of radio, the practice of writing fan mail was stimulated with the result that the numbers of letters received by NBC and associated stations has mounted month by month and year by year.

As a matter of interest, a letter written by a radio listener may be traced from the listener's home where the radio receiver plays an important part in his daily life, education and entertainment. Dispatched through Uncle Sam's efficient service, the mail is delivered in quantities, a number of sacks several times each day. Received by the Audience Mail department, it is emptied on the desks and sorted.

Letters addressed to NBC are read and answered. Those that require answers to questions which entail special research are sent to proper destinations and answered by various departments. Letters addressed to clients are sent to them each day, and those addressed directly to the radio artists are sorted and delivered to the eager recipients.

There is no end to the variety of questions asked about radio, about the artists, and in many cases, about particular programs that may have gone on the air the previous day or perhaps two or three months previous. Each of the letters is carefully read and the questions answered whenever possible.

Many, of course, contain requests for specific material offered during broadcasts.

artists take pride in answering all of their letters personally. Sometimes listeners contribute by mail to radio programs. The Sinclair Minstrels program, for instance, is built around jokes submitted from week to week by its followers.

Almost without exception the letters received at the Chicago NBC headquarters commend the programs on the air.

Fan mail, incidentally, also includes more than letters. Gifts of every description are frequently received by the artists. Amos 'n' Andy have been the recipients of many varied gifts as a result of something mentioned during their broadcasts. Everett Mitchell, announcer, has been promised a fourteen button rattlesnake from the Texas arid regions; Harry Kogen and the Home-Stealers orchestra receive all sorts of edibles prepared by members of the Farm and Home Hour audience.

Crates of oranges from Florida, apples from Washington state, flowers and candy from all parts of the nation are included among the various surprise packages that find their way to radio artists.

Curiously addressed letters are not infrequent. So well known are some of the artists that letters addressed merely with some characteristic radio saying or drawing are promptly delivered. Other letters come from far away nations and tell of the reception of programs many thousands of miles away.

Political Battle

The Chicago stadium, scene of the Republican Convention, is used frequently for box-



ing exhibitions, and over either side of the massive hall is an electric sign reading "Next Fight," the date being left blank. One of the wags in the radio corps filled in the date "June 27." That's when the Democrats meet.
