News and Views of the Week

Above the Crowd

There is a penalty for leadership. WBOW, the Terre Haute broadcasting station which performed an outstanding service to its community during the recent strike chaos, is reap-

ing some unjustified criticisms along with the praise and

recognition due it.

The signally fine service rendered by WBOW in keeping the public abreast of strike developments apparently antagonized some less stalwart purveyors of news and information.

In these columns, three weeks ago, was carried the item Calling All Cars Regardless. The basis for the comment was a news report published by Terre Haute papers and national press services, that an official of WBOW, after receiving a ticket for a minor traffic violation, denied the use of the station's facilities to the city for the broadcasting of police calls. The station had been serving the city's police department in that capacity for many months. It further stated that the WBOW traffic violator was a relative of W. W. Behrman, the station director. All this is denied.

The news further indicated that the public-spirited citizens underwrote the price of a short-wave police transmitter to overcome this emergency and to improve the police service which was stated to be unsatisfactory because of limited time on WBOW.

Apparently the entire story was a vicious and undeserving, underhanded attack, the sole purpose being one of embarrassment for WBOW.

In refuting the story as being false, Mayor Samuel E. Beecher of Terre Haute publicly complimented the WBOW management for its "wonderful cooperation," and urged W. W. Behrman, its director, to accept the presidency of the city's radio commission.

The Mayor explained the suspension of service by saying "I regret that there has been anything said which would indicate there might have been a misunderstanding between station WBOW and the City of Terre Haute. Mr. Behrman told me personally several weeks ago that the City Hall service would be discontinued for a few days while they were having a more powerful

When anyone or any institution gets above the crowd, he or it is always the target of jealous competing interests. WBOW is the target of an unethical, mean sniping expedition. The station so has distinguished itself that no harm can come to it through such tactics. It stands high in the regard of its community. Other competitors might well follow its example of heroic service to the community they all strive to serve.

Signs of Recovery

Encouraging Radio, the barometer of economic conditions during the years of the Depression, registers signs of progress. The indications are tangible forward steps that reflect the confidence of

America's leading industrialists in the future of our social, economic, business and political structure.

Their action is not just lip service and flag-waving. Actions speak louder than words. In Philadelphia the Philco Company has increased its pay roll to \$1,000,-000.00 a month. More than 9,000 men and women find daily employment in the various departments of this huge radio factory. The Atwater Kent factory also is getting under way again.

Broadcasters with cleared and full-time wave lengths are applying to the Federal Communications Commission for increases in power. The majority are seeking 50,000-watt stations. All of which involves the expenditure of fortunes for new equipment. It means that more skilled labor is being absorbed and more families may come off the dole permanently. The latest addition to this group is WMAQ in Chicago. WGN soon will broadcast its programs from its new studio building on Chicago's swankiest street-Michigan Avenue. Architecturally it is a Gothic gem, sitting on a plot that Croesus' millions would have been taxed to purchase.

The National Broadcasting Company has outgrown its palatial home in Chicago and is forced to add three new studios, an organ chamber, and additional office space to handle its 1935 business.

The country's leading networks are practically sold out. The evening hours are all sold to sponsors and the morning and daytime schedules are more than ninety percent sold. Independent stations are reporting similar

All of these expenditures must be supported by new business. The new business comes from the advertising of the country's industries, which in turn must see its way to better times in the very near future.

The Old Order Changeth

The radio audience is loyal to its characters. That moot question is settled beyond dispute by the way the audience again has accepted Phillips Lord. He is being acclaimed once

more for two outstanding radio presentations. He has brought back to life again that lovable, philosophic, psalm-singing Seth Parker, and has created the most stirring of the true-life dramas, G-Men.

A year ago a series of unfortunate breaks and a volume of vicious, unfounded gossip nearly wound up his career. He was too hot to hold; even NBC was ready to drop him. The damaging stories circulatedalthough untrue, as we pointed out in an editorial Who Was Fooled? more than a year ago-were creating such a bad impression that it was a repetition of the old story of giving a dog a bad name.

Phil Lord had something up his sleeve, however. It was Seth Parker, the magnificent, strong, God-fearing, simple, kindly New Englander, who was Phil Lord's first creation for radio. The strength of that character, with its wide audience acceptance, came to Phil's rescue. In the guise of the Jonesport patriarch, Lord started out again and won the audience that seemed lost forever. The ugly stories now are forgotten and happily refuted. Radio has done some strange things. But the re-

habilitation of Phil Lord is its strangest. Radio permitted an unjustly discredited, but nevertheless a discredited, man to borrow strength and support from a fictional character and re-establish himself in the eyes and ears of the so-called fickle audience. Most great characters have lived through some actor's ability. It was Barrymore's Richard the Third, and Bernbardt's Camille. Radio has reversed the old order, for now it is Seth Parker's Phillips Lord by virtue of the audience's lovalty to a character.

What Radio Drama is radio's weak spot. It is the one division of entertainment that has not gone over to radio and surrendered to broadcasting.

The attitude of the drama and the theater is understandable. The theater was an institution before Marconi opened his wide, innocent eyes on the blue skies of his native Italy. The theater had its traditions, its way of doing things. It had been satisfying the world for generations.

Those who were directing the destinies of the theater, had just survived the onslaught of the movies, which rocked their complaisancy to its foundations, when radio raised its uncertain voice in the uncharted tracks of the atmosphere.

Radio in its swaddling clothes was humorously tolerated by the theater. How could it be otherwise when the dramatic action of a play or the crashing crescendo of a symphony was interrupted rudely to transmit the Arlington time signals or to make a station call-letter announcement? To those steeped in the traditions of the theater where a sneeze is a breach of etiquette, radio seemed impossible.

Things have changed in radioland in the past decade, but the theater had taken its stand. The die was cast. Drama would lose face if it sought radio. It was the senior branch of entertainment, and had its dignity to protect. So it has remained aloof. If radio wanted the theater, it would have to come to the theater.

Like all independent, robust and self-made things radio struggled on and tried to develop its own ideas of drama. They have not been all that could be desired. In fact, with few exceptions, the efforts might be classified as weak and amateurish.

Helen Hayes, America's outstanding emotional actress, in directing attention to the things wrong with broadcasting, puts it up to the sponsors "who refuse to give artists carte blanche in selecting material, and the industry's lamentable refusal to make overtures to writers and playwrights of recognized standing."

Being Forged

New Chain A new radio network is in the making. It will have its key station in New York City. It will reach from the Atlantic Ocean to the Mississippi River, and include many of the coun-

try's most powerful independent broadcasters. Some of the stations are now identified with other chains.

The sponsors of the new chain are not rushing things. They have been playing with the idea for years. They capitalized on the ill-starred adventure of the young millionaires group headed by John Hay Whitney.

The time is not right to go ahead with the chain, said their spokesman. "We are just forging the links. When industry returns to normal we will be ready to complete the chain and claim our share of the broadcasting business. Right now the two existing chains can take care of all the business there will be for some time to come."

Niela Goodelle, Instead of Waiting for the Prince with the Glass Slipper, Carried Her Slipper While She Went Hunting the Prince

HE'S Cinderella only in fancy. In fact, she's Niela Goodelle, and she reversed the fairy tale tradition by surprising the Prince and then permitting him to fit upon her dainty foot the glass slipper of Fame which she had toted carefully tucked under one arm throughout the long pursuit. That the Prince was going to turn out to be Al Jolson was a development she couldn't

have guessed.

have guessed.

Niela had no mythical godmother to transform her pumpkins into golden carriages—and a few of the rats that she encountered during that spirited chase never did change their contours. But all in all the hunt was an interesting one, fraught with adventure and climaxed by events which warrant the stock tag-line—and they all lived happily ever after.

Now Niela is heard weekly singing over a National Broadcasting Company network. The glass slipper fits snugly. The Prince is occupied with his manifold other duties and has retired from the Goodelle picture. But there were six years that intervened between the start and the finish of that exciting pursuit, and the finish of that exciting pursuit, and their telling adds a new chapter to the book of real-life fairy tales.

IF NIELA had no fairy godmother, it was her extremely good fortune to have a very practical grandmother who, in the family home deep in the Catskill

in the family home deep in the Catskill mountains, taught the growing girl the rudiments of music. Vocal training was a bit outside of her ken, but she was an able pianist and by the time Niela had reached her teens she had taught her mastery of that instrument.

And that's why, by the time Miss Goodelle was 18 and living in Miami, Florida, the stage was set for the opening scene in the Cinderella drama. Her skill as a pianist had become well known and she was kept busy accompanying singers who were much in demand at the smart affairs given by society folks in the luxurious Winter capital. Among these was Burton Thatcher, a popular favorite and as able a teacher as he was a soloist. Niela slyly made a deal with him by which, in exchange for her capable accompaniment, he instructed her in the development of a rich voice which gave startling promise.

Well, it wasn't exactly a ball, but it was an extremely swanky affair at which the hosts were the proud and affluent Stotesburys; the guests, scions of America's original 400. Thatcher was the featured singer—and his accompanist an attractive but unnoticed girl of 18. That would be Niela Goodelle. Thatcher knew his way around with bluebloods at play. He sensed their ennui, recognized their avid taste for innovations, for any departure from the routine in diversion

SO WHEN he had finished his own numbers he stifled applause by signaling with raised hand that he wanted the floor for a moment. Silence was his reward. Then he announced that he had a surprise in the person of his lanist whom he wished to present in a role quite unexpected—that of a singer.

"Ladies and gentlemen, Miss Niela Goodelle," was his brief introduction.

Niela managed the rest. Through the means of a simple but catchy ballad which she played as she sang in that intriguing voice of hers, she completely captivated her blase audience. Added to the typical demonstration of approval was a strong overtone of murmured delight, that extra acknowledgment of talent which marks the difference between bored acceptance and keen interest in the artist. interest in the artist.

Soon the shy girl was mingling with those elite guests—and one of them offered her a letter to a New York theatrical giant which he was sure would carry her

upward in a mere flash.

It wasn't many days later that Niela set forth in search of the Prince, making her first stop Manhattan. The letter which represents the glass slipper of Fame in this mixed allegory really carried her upward as designed. It bore her up more flights of stairs than she




Two unusual poses of Miss Goodelle showing her, right, dressed for a broadcast and, above, as she looks when she prepares a program

believed existed, stairs leading to producers' offices. Buthey were two-way stairs, and from each newly visited office she came forth with another letter, a note to some other impresario than the one she had just seen. It became a round-robin of letters, for it seems that no one was casting that season, but each prospect in turn wanted to do something for the girl who had come so highly recommended. It was a departure from the standard chain letter but it was something akin in effect.

EVENTUALLY all this letter-writing bore fruit, and there loomed on Niela's horizon a roseate flush which at least heralded the proximity of the Prince. She obtained a scholarship with the Berkshire Playhouse in Stockbridge, Massachusetts. That was in 1930 and by the end of the season Miss Goodelle was singing the leading role in an operetta. A talent scout from the seemingly unattainable Theater Guild of New York saw her was taken by her voice and beauty—and the Prince her, was taken by her voice and beauty-and the Prince

was brought just that much closer. That Winter found Niela filling a role in the Guild's Garrick Gaieties. The show closed in the Spring of 1931, but that didn't thwart Miss Goodelle. She was sought out by representatives of Ziegfeld to take her place in the line of the last Follies ever staged by the Great Glorifier. Niela was blocked neatly from the singing role in that production by the presence of Ruth Etting. But when the New York run was over and Ruth refused to take to the road, it was Miss (Continued on Page 19)

OT until the last five years have the Crosbys stopped worrying about their third son. Not that Bing, from infancy on, wasn't an utterly charming person! Not that he wasn't invariably liked by everyone who crossed his path, for he always was generous, humorous and tolerant; but well irresponsible. To be perfectly align the boy was—well—irresponsible. To be perfectly plain, Bing was lazy. He admitted it.

In fact, it was farthest from their thoughts that the youngster—then filling the hand-me-down baby clothes of his older brothers, Larry and Everett—would eventually keep said brothers busy running the offices of "Bing Crosby, Ltd., Inc." on the Paramount lot in Hollywood, and Pop Crosby busy fulfilling the requests of his third son's fans.

As a youngster Bing always wheedled the things he wanted out of life for all the hittle Crosby had be

wanted out of life—for all the little Crosbys had to fetch for themselves—but Bing seemed to aim at no soaring ambition, and his parents regretted it, for their Bing had brains. He had too many brains, they thought, to be content drifting around from one thing to another.

THINGS came very easy to Bing. He always could pick up a little money, but it slipped casually through his fingers. He seemed, alas, to have no definite plan for making his mark in the world.

And yet Bing made it! That's no news. He reached the top in the thing he could do without effort—singing. He was born to carve out rhythm lazily. As a result, he's got everything, not only fame and fortune, but happiness, an ideal family life, "work" he enjoys, and devoted friends.

Bing Crosby Is An Astounding Contradiction to the Ninety-Eight Per Cent Perspiration That Represents Genius

of by every human being? Did he suddenly realize he was a rolling stone, and quickly call a halt to his pleasant meanderings ot gather moss? No! Emphatically not. Bing made no sacrifices, he denied himself nothing for the sake of making good. Today—one of the biggest stars of radio and the screen—he is exactly the same sort of fellow he was when he first bummed his way to Los Angeles to sing for his supper. He is as lazy, as happy-go-lucky, and as modest.

WHAT, then, is the secret of Bing's suchave spelled failure for a man of a different temperament boosted Bing to top rank. All his work is the more attractive for an underlying hint of laziness and comedy. When, in Hollywood, they first planned to make a romantic hero of Bing on the screen, he said, "I can't act! They can never make a Barrymore out of me!" He didn't even try to act. And witness the result. His prankish, lazy attitude and diffidence made a

grand romantic comedi-an of him. The very fact that he refused to take it seriously scored instantly on the screen. This infectious quality may be traced back to early childhood when Bing first was assigned the role of Julius Cæsar in a school Shakespeare dramatiza-tion. Bing considered the

of a joke, but the teacher was determined to have him go through with it. On the opening night in the school auditorium Bing brought down the house—but not pre-

cisely the way his teacher had hoped.

Dressed in a toga fashioned from one of his mother's old sheets, the third son of Mr. and Mrs. Crosby faithfully emoted the immortal writings of Shakespeare. He even managed to die nobly. The curtain began to descend. Bing, playing dead, opened one eye and perceived that the curtain was not only descending, but descending upon himself. There was only one thing to do, and that was to move. So just as the curtain was about to strike him, he leaped to his feet. The audience doubled up laughing, the dramatic teacher nearly died over the thwarted dignity of the play, and young Casar Crosby was called back for numerous bows. He struck Crosby was called back for numerous bows. He struck various postures in his toga, and finally was yanked out of any more comic returns to the curtain by an indig-

BING spent a happy childhood, with no deprivation or strain which sometimes causes a bitter will to conquer the world. The Crosbys moved to Spokane when their third son was a youngster, and settled down in a rambling frame house big enough to accomodate the uproar of seven little Crosbys.

They led a pretty carefree existence. Mrs. Crosby held pretty much to the Topsy theory. She let her kids just grow. Not that she didn't attempt to imbue them from the day they began to toddle—with ambition. She wanted her sons to become professional men.

wanted her sons to become professional men.

She wanted son Bing to study law. Perhaps she got the idea because her third son was the most logical, the most even-tempered of the kids. When everybody became upset, which occasionally happens in the best of families, Bing was apt to take himself off to the back fence where he would whittle and whistle. Then, when everything had quieted down, he usually would dismiss the whole affair with a few youthful words of wisdom

the whole affair with a few youthful words of wisdom. Mrs. Crosby would have been horrified to contemplate theatricals for Bing at that date. His pop, who was very musical, occasionally offered a source of worry. He



couldn't resist musical instruments, and kept the family on the brink of financial embarrassment continually by purchasing a new guitar or a banjo. The kids—Bing particularly—liked to hear Pop play. They'd gather around the living room of an evening while Pop strummed a guitar and sang old ballads.

Bing himself showed an inclination to take after

Pop. For he spent his extra pennies on gramophone records. The Crosby kids had to earn their own pin money. That should have been an incentive for good honest labor. But their third son picked up the wherewithal for those wanted records in the easiest way.

Witness the job he landed in the post office. He was

Witness the job he landed in the post office. He was paid sixty cents an hour, and was not obliged to report to work until four-thirty of an afternoon. His job was sorting mail into large racks for all the states of the Union. Bing used to take a stack of letters, stand at a distance, and flip them into the proper bins. It was easier than trotting around the room, dropping a letter

here and a letter there.

Mrs. Crosby noted, with some regret, that her third son didn't take much interest in girls. She good-naturedly scolded him for being too lazy to become a successful Lothario like Everett. It was too much trouble, Bing thought, to slick back his hair and get his



shoes shined. And at an early age he got the idea that

girls were too pernickety about that sort of thing.

Later on in his life he was to have one of his few quarrels with Dixie Lee because she refused to

tew quarrels with Dixie Lee because she refused to attend an opening with an escort who was careless enough to wear an old tweed coat over his tuxedo!

During the Summer through high school. Bing escaped the arduous task of working in Pop Crosby's pickle factory, by bumming his way off to apple orchards. He found the job of thinning apples preferable to sorting pickles into vats according to size.

As a matter of fact, he dreaded the end of school days which would make it necessary for him to get down to business. So he entered Gonzaga College, run by

Of course Bing sang in the college glee club. He also played in the school band. He was given his choice of instruments and chose drums—because they

were easiest to play!

"I found it more fun to play for dances than to dance myself," says Bing. "I liked girls all right but it would have been much more work for me to have to dance with them all evening."

At about this point Bing's band organized a quar-

tet, in which he and a friend, Al Rinker, were the leading lights. Bing's particular specialty was a number called Red Hot Henry Brown. The quartet made their debut in a picture theater in Spokane, and received \$35 a week for their efforts.

The kindly fathers at the Jesuit College had a very great influence upon the happy-go-lucky third son of the Crosby family. Bing began to admire their useful lives. They were learned men and their days were well-ordered, smooth-running. You would find no bitter ambition, no high pressure in a monastery. The life appealed to Bing. He made up his mind to become a priest.

E WENT through a great period of strain before he finally talked to the fathers about it. It was a thing too deep to discuss, even with his family. Bing went on playing drums in his band, watching the world dance by before his eyes, while an

world dance by before his eyes, while an inward battle was being waged.

There were days when he thought life could be renounced easily for a priestly vocation. There were days when he could feel his adventurous, happy-go-lucky spirit pulling at the leash. Finally, he decided to apply to the fathers to enter a novitiate in the order of lesuits.

in the order of Jesuits. The fathers at Gonzaga College, whose wise and kindly influence steered him through the tumultuous 'teens, made him see that priesthood was not his vocation, and that he would find a more satisfying fulfill-ment of his efforts in work to which he was

adapted more naturally. This decree from the fathers put his troubled mind at ease. Since the notion to become a priest first occurred to him, he had been torn between his natural love of life, and the fact that he idealistically yearned to lead a worthwhile existence, and respected

yearned to lead a worthwhile existence, and respected the work of the Jesuits.

There had been another possibility for a career, but Bing turned his back on that, too. He had been majoring in law at Gonzaga, but the great volumes of reference books bored him.

He hated routine, and he disliked the prospect of being cooped up in an office.

"Well, what do you want to do?" his mother asked him. She always had been certain that her third son had brains, and lamented that he was too lazy to use them—except when it suited him to deliver an oration or an argument.


"Sing," said Bing sheepishly, "just sing."

WELL that was no news to Mrs. Crosby. Whenever he came home to lunch, she could hear him coming from three blocks away.

BING owned a superannuated auto, which almost shook itself to pieces every time he started the engine. But since it had carried the boys up and down the

But since it had carried the boys up and down the steep Washington hills, they decided to depend on it to carry them to Los Angeles.

Down there Bing thought there might be easy dough. He was frankly after easy dough. The boys set off gayly, with a couple of spare shirts and no spare tires. The old crate jittered over the roads while Bing and Al shouted songs at the top of their lungs—Home on the Range and The Lone Prairie. You would have thought to see them, that they were two college boys thought, to see them, that they were two college boys off on a lark—not two potential stars. But then, Bing has managed to imbue all of his ventures with the spirit of a picnic, even the most important steps in

now. They were scowling.




If it is true that when two of a certain race of Europeans meet they invariably open a restaurant, it is twice true that given two actors out of work, within an hour they will have patched together a plot for a

Learning with devastating speed that two actors can starve as cheaply as one, they haunted theaters and booking agencies until they landed an engagement in a Bronx theater where an act had failed to show up. Their plight was tragic until that opening gave them hope.



ISTENERS who relish the absurdities of this delightful pair either as Pick and Pat over the Columbia Broadcasting System, or as Molasses and January on the NBC Show Boat program, marvel at their capacity for endless gag writing. But the facts of their prolific talent still aren't fully disclosed. The boys do not present of their russ. All the equipment of their russ. talent still aren't fully disclosed. The boys do not prepare most of their gags. All the equipment they carry is a skeleton of a situation, and the comedy is spontaneous. That's the secret of their continued success. They are almost psychic in their exchange of repartee, either being able to sense the build-up which the other is seeking for a jest which suggests itself as they follow the pattern sketchily prepared.

It was several years of vaudeville work for Pick and Pat after their first successful engagement. During that time they became walking dictionaries of gags. The team took to radio several years ago, beginning on a small local station. News of these gag-men soon spread around, and an advertising agency approached them with an offer to appear on a network to buck those old favorites, Amos 'n' Andy. Pick was overjoyed. Pat was lugubrious.


HIS misgivings were correct. The institution for which they were to broadcast couldn't arrange to get the same air time on the stations they required.

Though they were disappointed in that particular job, they had established their reputation and it wasn't long before the networks demanded them. And now—

or radio.
Looking over this carefully, you find that it fits the VALLEE show; that it resembles the JOLSON broadcast; that it might de-Son broadcast; that it might describe the Hollywood Hotel presentation; that it will be the pattern for the JACK HYLTON variety show soon to develop from Chicago, or that it may be similar to California Melodies. And then again you may be assured that it will fit the new WHITEMAN setup. For the Whiteman show has been revised as of September 12, to maintain the present troupe, but also to include four additional attractions weekly, the first being MISCHA LEVITZKI, MICHAEL BARTLETT who will tenor subsequently on the Benny series, BOB BURNS, Arkansas comedian who is getting the same comedian who is getting the same agency buildup that made of Joe Penner a big name, and LYDA ROBERTI.

EACH week the Whiteman sesthe quartet of added attractions—a fact which undoubtedly will stimulate the guest-star routine.

There can be no question that the guest business, plus a standard quality show, combining to make of the composite a high-class variety bill, is the prescription almost perfect. Rudy Vallee has managed, by foresight,

So it would seem that the search for the sure-fire stuff is about ended.

Especially does this seem true when it is recalled that RCA plans a Winter schedule on which will be heard famous guests of the air; guests borrowed from other programs, and including perennials like AMOS 'N' ANDY.

For too many months now have the musicians holding down hotel spots in New York been off the air because of a reluctance of the hotel men to pay a regular \$3 fee per musician per broadcast, if sustaining. During the exile of perhaps twenty bands the tiff between the union (which exacts the fees) and the hotel men had kept quite a few name bands out of New York. Few big-timers care to bury themselves under anonymity even in the big town. The matter seems to be deadlocked, but it is not quite hopeless.

According to the dopesters, the first break in the situation, designed to bring back the exiles, will come this month, when the Hotel New Yorker, one of the leaders in the hotel men's fight, capitulates. The New Yorker is negotiating with TED FIORITO, and certainly if he comes to New York there must be a sustaining wire for him. The Lexington, owned by the same management, will feature OZZIE NELSON, who also is destined for a wire. If all that comes true, the union will win its point and a dozen other hotels will be free under the New Yorker's precedent to follow on the air. Such exiles probably will be scheduled for broadcasts twice a week.

Radio gossip revolved most of last week about the exodus of NBC announcers, who have decided that they can make more money and do less work by free lancing, JIMMY WALLINGTON, KELVIN KEECH and FRANK SINGISER deserted the NBC staff, and were to be followed by FORD BOND, who changed his mind, however, at the last moment.

The departure of the trio has caused reassignments. GRAHAM McNAMEE replaces Wallington on the MAJOR BOWES show. The spots vacated by KEECH and SINGISER will bring new voices to the air.

It has been settled, practically, that BING CROSBY will perform this season for Eddie Cantor's sponsor Sun day nights at CBS, immediately following Cantor.

Something to figure out: Here is an excerpt from the speech by MME. YOLANDA MERO-IRION, ad-visory chairman of the Women's National Radio Committee (which claims to represent 17,000,000 women) at WOR last week:

"Even though these (crime story) broadcasts stress the fact that crime does not pay, weak-minded individ-uals are apt to get ideas from them; children imitate the hard-boiled accents of criminals in their play, and above all, the stories are much too exciting for young people's

The Women's National Radio Committee Review, which publishes criticisms of radio shows, last month complained that "the G-Men dramas (by Phillips Lord) were dull—and sissified."

MOS 'N' ANDY are two smart boys who spread their influence over more of this North American continent than even they themselves perhaps realize. It is therefore commendable of them to utilize this in-fluence for the good of the general welfare.

To the A&A audience the script was in character. The moral lesson was not obvious, but it was there, and more effectively so than if it were a straightforward speech by an expert on motor-car casualties.

Amos 'n' Andy realize their responsibility. Most carefully do they scan their scripts to keep them clean and pointed positively and constructively for the public weal. Correll and Gosden deserve carloads of plums.

Incidentally, we wonder if you have noticed that, in cities where traffic court cases are aired, the automobile accident figures have dropped markedly since the inception of those broadcasts? Yet the newspapers have carried traffic court reports for years without a similarly beneficial result! beneficial result!

REE, gratis, and for nothing, this column hereby donates to the sponsors a suggestion which they may take or leave. At any rate, here it is: Mr. Sponsor, how about taking steps to protect one of your greatest assets—your radio stars—by the simple expedient of insuring them

stars—by the simple expedient of insuring them against death by accident?

Certainly this is a grim note on which to start a column, but the recent tragic death of WILL ROGERS, the near drowning of JACK PEARL, and the explosion on a boat which almost took the life of JACK BENNY, all prove the irrefutable fact that man is mortal and that expensively built up radio followings die with the stars that created them. Are not the radio stars just as real and tangible an asset to the sponsors as their plants, equipment, and stock—and just as worthy of insurance?

Lloyd's of London for years has run a profitable business by underwriting at long odds against any pos-sible unforseen event. Prizefight promoters, organizers

sible unforseen event. Prizefight promoters, organizers of outdoor pageants and managers of concerts or theatricals frequently have been known to take out insurance against bad weather. But never, so far as is recorded, has a sponsor taken out life or accident insurance on his expensively built up star.

The explosion and consequent destruction of a fiftyone foot pleasure yacht on Puget Sound off Seattle, when fire started among the fuel tanks during the Labor Day weekend, came perilously close to taking from radio one of its most popular figures, Jack Benny. Had not the skipper of the Nokomis—his name is Louis Wagner and he's Mary Livingstone's uncle—been able to bring the craft into shallow water so that the passengers could leap to safety, America's millions of radio listeners could leap to safety, America's millions of radio listeners might have lost one of their favorites—and a sponsor would have lost a million-dollar investment.

would have lost a million-dollar investment.

Of course no amount of insurance would have been able to replace Jack Benny. But after all, radio as we know it in this country is not only show business but also the advertising business. Therefore, isn't the sponsor entitled to a fair return on his investment, and should he not protect himself? The accidental deaths of Will Rogers and Russ Columbo, and the miraculous escapes from death of Jack Pearl and Jack Benny, should give the sponsors something to think about. Leading air stars these days think nothing of broadcasting one week from New York and a few days later from the West, or California. Automobile, aviation and railroad accidents still are not beyond the realms of possibility.

The cigarette company that last season presented operatic and concert stars, will return to the CBS airwaves on October 2 with LILY PONS and on October 5 with NINO MARTINI and ANDRE KOSTEL-ANETZ' orchestra. Miss Pons will be heard on Wednesday nights and Martini will face the microphone on Saturday nights. Incidentally, all three artists recently returned from Hollywood where they acted before the movie cameras. It was stated also that the smoothie announcer, DAVID ROSS, has been engaged exclusively for this series. gaged exclusively for this series.

HAL KEMP and his band have been selected to sup-ply the musical portion of PHIL BAKER'S new program. An-other addition is BABS RYAN

and her "brothers."
This trio seems to have come This trio seems to have come up fast in the past couple of years. We remember distinctly when they first hit New York they were hired to sing in a floor show on the roof of a New York hotel. Russ Columbo and his orchestra were opening the same night. The Ryans lasted for only a little better than a week, but it wasn't any reflection on their work. They quit when they had trouble in collecting their salary—and who could blame them? The next we saw of them was when they were making their air debut with Fred Waring and his gang. Tiney've been on the air almost constantly ever since.

Both NBC and CBS are outbidding each other for the privilege of picking up Guy Lombardo sustaining programs, which will go on twice weekly from one of

New York's most fashionable night clubs, starting September 19. According to the inside in-formation at the command of formation at the command of your scrivener, however, the odds favor CBS in the fight, as my informant tells me that Guy practically has made up his mind to stick with the network over which he first started his climb to fame about seven years ago.

AND while we're making scoopie, we might as well be the first to record the names of the judges who have been selected to pick the finalists on the National Radio Open Audition Contests which are now nearing a close. After EDNA O'DELL finished singing her number, he had the boys in the orchestra applaud loudly, which would give him a chance to say, all right, all right, all right, and a few more all rights. After the applause ceased, he advised the listeners of the telephone numbers in Oskaloosa and Sqedonk. For laughs we endorse Don McNeill anywhere, at any time, or on anywhere, at any time, or on any program.



Music in the Air By Carleton Smith

RESIDENT M. H. AYLES-WORTH of the National Broad-casting Company has announced a most significant forward step in the interest of music of the better sort. The NBC Music Guild, he declared in a broadcast that extended from coast to coast, will present sizeable cash awards to contestant composers of chamber music. Works must consume from 20 to 25 minutes' playing time; they may be for string quartet, string quintet from 20 to 25 minutes' playing time; they may be for string quartet, string quintet or for any five orchestral instruments; they must be in three, four or five movements, and may be either strict sonata form or suite form. The awards will consist of a first prize of \$1,000.00, second prize of \$500.00 and a third prize of \$250.00. Seven judges, under the chairmanship of Musical Director Frank Black, will decide the winning works; the other six judges' names are to be announced shortly.

Among the highlights of Mr. Ayles-worth's announcement were these words: "It was not so many years ago that the United States was considered a musically backward nation. As radio began more and more to make symphonic opera and chamber music available to American listeners, our audiences for such types of music grew. Today symphonic music and opera enjoy an amaz-

and opera enjoy an amazing popularity...

"Quite as significant is radio's achievement in popularizing c h a m b er music. The world's greatest composers frequently expressed their most eloquent thoughts and most intimate feelings in music written for the smaller groups of instruments, trios, quartets, quintets, and so forth. This chamber music, or house music as it is called in some lands, was written to be played in the home rather than in the concert hall.

"From time to time we have presented noted chamber music ensembles and noted chamber music artists, and with such a growing response from our listeners that on October 1





The Rhythm Boys toured the country with Whiteman, and that unit become idolized by college kids and all followers of rhythm. Their records sold like hot cakes, and they picked up plenty of fame for themselves.

When the King of Jazz was summoned to the Coast to make a picture, the Rhythm Boys returned there with him Bing was glad to see California again. The climate is hand-in-hand with the company which loves to bask on beaches,

his nature, which loves to bask on beaches, and go hatless and coatless.

When Whiteman prepared to return to the East, Bing reneged, and the other Rhythm Boys gladly reneged with him, for they were all native Californians and believed they could find plenty of work in Hollywood. They had friends there. So the King of Jazz released the Rhythm Boys from contract. Boys from contract.

With the prestige the association with Whiteman had given them, the Rhythm Boys were on Easy Street. Engagements


