# News and Views of the Week

Recordings Win First Round

You can't eat your cake and have it. This in substance is the answer of the Justices of the Common Pleas Court of Philadelphia to Maestro Fred Waring, who tried to stop station WDAS

from using his records for broadcasting.

The Court ruled that Waring has no control over the records he has been paid to make.

The answer points out that Waring did not own the copyright of the songs in dispute, I'm Young and Healthy, and You're Getting to Be a Habit with Me, but that the copyright proprietor, M. Witmark & Sons, granted RCA Victor Company the right to use the musical compositions.

The RCA Victor Company, National Broadcasting Company, and the National Association of Broadcasters are aligned with WDAS in defending the suit because of the far-reaching effect the decision may have on the broadcasting of phonograph records.

WDAS further points out that it held a license from the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers to perform such musical compositions, and it previously had been granted the performing rights by the authors of the words and music.

Waring, after playing the selections for RCA Victor Company, "had no rights of any kind in said records," the answer sets forth, "and RCA Victor Company, Inc., was not bound to plaintiff by contract or otherwise to limit in any way the use which purchasers of said records might make thereof."

WDAS ridiculed the claims of the orchestra leader that he has been "for a long time past a unique and individual artist and performer," and responded that "musical selections can be and have been interpreted, rendered, played and performed by other musicians and orchestras in the same or similar manner as interpreted, rendered, played and performed by the plaintiff.'

If orchestra leaders are afraid of the competition of their own canned music, they should discontinue making records as a lucrative sideline.

The Man Want?

What Does In waging a war the first thing to have is an objective. The second thing to have is a plan of campaign, and last but not least the men and brains to carry it through to a suc-

cessful conclusion. These things should be taken to heart by the members of the Fourth Estate who are inspiring the statements and antics of George Henry Payne, of the Federal Communications Commission, who is bearing the reform banner against radio broadcasting.

Mr. Payne is fast becoming the Don Quixote of radio. He is tilting with windmills constantly. He is at odds with commercial broadcasting. He advocates government ownership, and in the next breath admits "this country is not inclined to accept the British system where radio is completely controlled by the government, where no advertisements are permitted and where the programs are supported by a tax on the radio sets.

His efforts to enlist the aid of educators to back up his contention that the public demands culture, are made laughable by his appraisal of his countrymen.

In an address before the Columbia School of Journalism he said: "The American public is a generous public, a little childish at times in its delight over novelties, as one learns when one travels in Europe and sees one's countrymen in touring bodies, making shrill sounds of delight over some ancient cathedral or architectural wonder; but whatever childish qualities they have, they are the qualities of the heart."

Mr. Payne usually gets off on a tangent when he starts comparing the press and radio. He seems to know neither very well. His references to the Fourth Estate are always in terms of reverence, while radiothe Fifth Estate-brings forth sneers. In discussing the differences he said: "Now then, what are the differences between the Fourth Estate of Burke and the Fifth Estate of the commercial broadcasting propagandists?

"If a person has grievances that he thinks should be communicated to the public, he is at liberty, if he possesses the resource, to publish a paper anywhere in the country, even in the smallest hamlet, in order to disseminate his views. A similar course is absolutely impossible in the case of radio broadcasting. There are only 90 channels in this country over which broadcasting may be done. On these channels there are 629 stations, the great majority are limited in power and range, reaching only the people within a comparatively short distance from the stations." That statement is as ridiculous as are his other contradictions,

Anyone with the money and a message to deliver can buy as much time on the air as he needs or wants.

The only restriction imposed is that the subject matter meet the dictates of decency and good taste. Beyond that anyone can get as much on the air waves on any given subject as one can get into newspapers.

Mr. Payne objects to criticism of his statements. He likes to dish it out but does not like to take it-even in this he resembles Don Quixote.

Before Mr. Payne stirs up too much of a tempest, let him present his idea of the ideal radio broadcast structure and the perfect pattern for a week's broadcasting. Until he has an objective, and a plan to substitute for an idea, he should keep quiet.

Radio Beacons on Guard

Radio lighthouses and beacons have proved so successful in safeguarding shipping during fog and storm that they have made ineffective the oldfashioned lighthouse, and the government is installing ten new beacons.

The Department of Commerce is announcing that three of the new beacons will be lightships. With the completion of this program, every lightship under the jurisdiction of the United States will be equipped with this important type of navigation signal, it was stated.

Of the ten new stations, Capa Arago, Oregon, went into service on November 1. Installations at the lightships will be placed in operation shortly, six of these ships being in Nantucket and Long Island Sounds, and the seventh ship at Heald Bank, Gulf of Mexico. Two additional lighthouses, Minneapolis Shoal, and Green Bay, in Lake Michigan, will be placed in commission shortly after the opening of navigation on the Great Lakes in the Spring of 1936. Both these new lighthouses are now under construction.

At the present time the United States Lighthouse Service has 108 radio beacons in operation, and the ten new stations planned will bring the total to 118. The new stations will represent a substantial improvement to the existing system of radio beacons, and will do much to reduce the hazards of navigation and safeguard shipping, according to the Lighthouse Service.

Still News

News Is

That news is news and is not subject to exclusive ownership or domination, is indicated in an examiner's report which has been submitted to the Federal Communications Commission.

Examiner Melvin H. Dalberg, who conducted hearings on the application of A. E. Newton, Jamestown N. Y., for renewal of the license of WOCL, holds that that station did not violate the rule against rebroadcasting in its World Series play-by-play account last year, in the following manner: A receiving set was placed in WOCL studios where a running account was received.

In conjunction with the play-by-play account radioed through Station WGR, Buffalo, the announcer used information obtained by watching an animated score board, in operation across the street, and a ticker

The station was cited for rebroadcasting.

The following argument was used to sustain Examiner Dalberg's findings.

"In the case at bar it appears that the originating station was broadcasting news of a baseball game to the general public. According to the testimony in this case, the continuity of that broadcast was not literally restated, but the news gathered herefrom and which was heard by the general public from the originating station, was restated by the announcer of Station WOCL to listeners within the area of that station; and it further clearly appears that the facts which he broadcast were not obtained solely from the station or stations into which he had tuned, but also from an electrical scoreboard opposite or near the studios from which he was operating."

# She Was Born to Music!

NYONE who has gone as far in radio as Kay Thompson, has what it takes. But in possessing that vital, indescribable quality, which makes for outstanding success, Kay has the jump on her contemporaries. She always had what it takes.

it takes.

Kay isn't very old; she was born November 9, 1909. Yet twenty years ago she was a reigning sensation in St. Louis, her home town.

And what's more, this outstanding vocalist of today didn't even think of singing a single note then, although she had the St. Louis musical colony agasp and agape at the rarity of her musical art and of her personality. She was four years old and already an artist of distinction, a piano virtuoso!

Nothing has changed in Kay during those two decades except her medium of expression. The rarity of her musical art has deepened and developed most beautifully. Her personality is as vivid as is her blonde hair. But instead of expressing her personality within the rigid confines of the classic concert stage with the piano as her instrument, she comes to the public in the immensely broad spheres of radio, singing to millions instead of playing to hundreds.

L ONG before Kay went to school her parents discovered that she had what it takes. Her musical aptitude was noticeable even in babyhood, and she demonstrated it a good while before she astounded the music profession in St. Louis shortly after her fourth birthday. And after her initial appearance at the piano keyboard there never was any doubt in anyone's mind. Of course she would become a concert pianist. Kay had not even learned her ABC's, yet her future already had become setfled.

Iler parents were willing. Though wholly unaccustomed to the glare of the spotlight, they welcomed the opportunities to develop Kay's talents. The Thompson family was used to the reticence and exclusiveness that are typical of the better-bred well-to-do. Their social position was more than adequate: they were able to give this gifted daughter every advantage that money and social prominence could accomplish. She had the talent; what more was needed except work?

And work she did!


SHE threw herself into the task of bringing that sensational talent of babyhood to full fruition. All through grade school and high school she worked like a Trojan, dotting the years with carefully selected and adroitly maneuvered public appearances. Meanwhile, her reputation as a classical piano star of the first magnitude grew apace. When she was sixteen, a high school junior, she made a concert appearance with the St. Louis Symphony Society and duplicated the amazing sensation she had provoked a dozen years previously.

If Kay had been a less vital person, she no doubt would have fulfilled the expectations of her parents, her teachers and the St. Louis musical public—and become a concert pianist. But Kay's is the temperament that must sing to the multitude; she has the inborn nature that sings the rhythm of the crowd. That is true music. And that is what her teachers sensed in her when they proclaimed her a prodigy at the age of four.

She never was meant by the Giver of Gifts to practice her art before the small, select clientele that patronizes the concert hall. By no means! She was meant to sing to the millions.

Kay started to realize this soon after her great success as piano soloist with the St. Louis Symphony. She

kept her own counsel, but she gradually tried experiments. Co-ed parties at Washington University provided opportunities. Kay found herself suddenly as decided a success in social circles as she had been in the realm of musical society. But for a decidedly different reason—that she could sing torch songs like nobody's business. She never had tried them before!

Soon afterward Kay was singing on station KMOX in St. Louis. The response from the listeners was enthusiastic in the same degree that years before had marked the response of musicians and the musically elect to her piano work. Now Kay knew where she was heading. And she has come to the top as quickly as the combination of divine gifts, grand musical training and sharp intelligence could do it for anyone.

It was while she sang over this St. Louis station that Kay stumbled into the accident that very nearly terminated her radio career right then and there.

She was in a studio with a group of other artists, about to go on for her very first broadcast. Naturally she was nervous; she paced up and down the studio. Suddenly another member of the cast detached himself from a group that had been gathered about the production man, listening to his criticisms. He stepped directly into Kay's path.

into Kay's path.

NSTINCTIVELY, she shrank back and to the side. And in doing so she bumped into a microphone of the old carbon type, placed on a stand. The stand trembled, wavered, and crashed to the floor. Three hundred dollars' worth of microphone splintered into minute particles and tinkled over the floor of the studio.

Instantly all was silence. Kay admits that never before nor since has she felt so much like crawling

behind the waste basket, or hiding in a flower vase. However, there was nothing she could do but stand there and, like a good musician, face the music. An irate minor official was for firing her on the spot. But the program had to go on, and no substitute for the embarrassed songstress was on hand. So she sang into a hastily procured microphone. And, she admits, because of the tension within her, all thoughts of nervousness during her performance vanished. So far as the listener could ascertain, her voice was flawless.

Perhaps it was that very performance that saved her radio career for her, and saved her for a radio career. Stormings of the petty straw bosses did not avail with the program manager of that station—he was not going to lose a million-dollar voice because of a three-hundred-dollar microphone. Kay remained with the station for most of the year, accumulating invaluable broadcasting experience.

She went to California pleasure-bound and in the twinkling of an eye was singing with Bing Crosby over Columbia. She became the toast of California. They love her earnestly out there, even though she has seen fit to move to New York.

KAY'S New York radio experience has been long and varied. For a while she worked under that most exacting of masters, Fred Waring, as directress of a girls' chorus. And this job, she explains, was her most difficult one. For she was responsible not only for herself, but for the entire group of thirteen girls under

herself, but for the entire group of infrieer girls underher.

Those girls grew to know her and love her. She was "Ma" to them, a twenty-four year old mother of thirteen beautiful damosels, many older than she was herself. She had found them and she developed them, coached their singing, helped train their voices, instructed them in harmony and all things musical. Away from the microphone she was their guiding genius, helping them select their clothes, seeing that they wrote home frequently, that they did not stay out too late, and smoothing over what difficulties arose.

It is a revelation to watch Kay at work. The rehearsals for her Hit Parade program were frequent and demanding. They went on all week with a final seven-hour plug on Saturday, the day of the broadcast. She sparkles, she is vivid with the flame and force of living, a veritable reservoir of energy. When she sings, one feels the effortless ease, the fullness of power, which would overflow but for its perfect control; one feels the immense vitality back of every note, every gesture.

A ND what sort of person is this girl who was born to music? She's no different from her thousands of listeners. She loves to swim and dive. Once she served as diving instructress at Catalina Island. She loves cars and sail-boats also, although she tries to keep out of the sun, afraid of freckles. She's a blonde, five feet, five and one-half inches tall, and weighs 121 pounds. Her eyes she describes as grayish blue in color.

Although she admits to mike fright, she claims it makes her work better. And she's undoubtedly correct For she has the irresistible, irrepressible vitality that is the well-spring of all great artists who exert an appeal on large numbers of the population. She's always had that vitality, ever since that fourth birthday concert.

Kay Thompson has just completed the long series of Hit Parade in which she was featured by the makers of Lucky Strike cigarettes. She is expected to begin a new program shortly.

From All Sections of the Country They Come to New York—These Amateurs Dreaming of That Thousand-to-One Break. Of the Many Called - a Few Are Chosen. This Story Tells How - and Why

It stacks up something like this: The Major gets 15,000 letters a week which can be considered. (He gets as many again which are thrown out because the applicant does not come from New York.) Of these he picks 600 for auditions and sixteen for each program. The auditions are held six days a week, and the Major must hear about one hundred a day to keep up to schedule.

Who are the lucky sixteen who make the grade?
Well, there were the Duchess of Torlonia and the Singing Garbage Man; the Tuscarora Indian Trio and the Chinese Hillbilly; the Texas Cowboys from Norwich, Connecticut, and Skeet Simmons, the hobo; the man who played a mouth organ behind his back through a rubber hose, and the nine-year-old concert pianist; the Irish colleen who wanted a diamond tooth. Harlem who wanted a diamond tooth.

THERE was a steeplejack, department-store clerk, beach comber (feminine), housekeeper, janitor, elevator operator, messenger boy, dog catcher, porter, cowboy dude wrangler, physiotherapist, truck driver, brewer, dishwasher, cook in a C.C.C. camp, barger, fruit peddler, student, woman dentist, street-cleaner, school-teacher, glass-blower, die-cutter, stenographer, grocer, butler, banker, telephone operator, butcher, carpenter, plumber

and some others.

Amateurs are unemployed, on relief, down and out.
They hitch-hike to New York or they pack up the kids in an old car and stagger feebly across mountains and rivers until they reach the Hudson. Again, they may be substantial citizens with good jobs at home, out for a lark, testing their friends' verdict. What happens after their performance may mean nothing—or everything.

They may be 110 years old like Doctor Marie

Davenport, the sprightly piano-player who thought it would be fun to play a theater engagement. Or they may be nine, like Veronica Mimosa, another pianist, and need a special permit to go on the stage. They may be wealthy, like Marie de Mum, of New York and Newport, daughter of the champagne king. Or a little hunger, like the ways reliable to the property of the champagne to the stage. little hungry, like the boy who collapsed at rehearsal.




It WAS on March 24, 1935, that Major Bowes' Amateur Hour first came to the networks under its present sponsorship. The show had been running on New York local station WHN for about a year prior to that. More elaborate preparations were made for the premiere than for any other program on record.

The Major himself worked fiercely for weeks assembling the best talent he could find. From the very first he has auditioned all talent himself. The number heard altogether is pretty close to 20,000 by now.

A huge telephone voting system was devised, which eventually will cover every section of the country. On the floor above the studio in Radio City where the Amateur Hour goes on the air, 100 operators and about half as many tabulators receive and count the votes from the New York area. Two hundred lines come into this office, which is a special exchange of the telephone company. Each week this same setup is installed on a slightly smaller scale in another city in the country. The telephone voting operates from the beginning of the broadcast to half an hour after its close.

A MONG the first to approach the microphone that Sunday night last March was Wyoming Jack O'Brien, the cosmopolitan cowboy from California, Born in Montana, he had knocked around the bunkhouses of a dozen ranches in the Northwest, staying long enough in Wyoming to get the handle attached to his name. A thoroughly







modern representative of the Wild West, Jack at the time of his adventure in show business was working on a dude ranch.

day the Youman family made a decision, and soon afterward Jack, 19;

A few weeks previously the foreman of the ranch had called Jack into his office and told him to pack up his duffle for a trip East. Object—to stir up a little business for the coming Summer. Jack heard about the Amateur Hour and decided to give it a try. His store clothes were back in the hotel, and he wore the full regalia of a working cowboy. Slung from around his neck was a worn but tuneful guitar.

"Howdy," he said to the Major.

AS THE laughter of the studio audience subsided, the Major peered at the would-be star over his glasses. "Well, cowboy, what can you do?"

"I reckon I can sing a song."

"Only one?"

"No suh. I know I32 cowboy songs."

His matter-of-fact drawl brought another laugh, but he smiled easily. Here was a man with natural stage sense. He launched into a plaintive ballad and drew such a response that the Major asked him for another.

When the votes were in by telephone and mail, Wyoming Jack was up with the leaders. His reward—a week in vaudeville. The last half of the week he played New York's Palace Theater, a goal that many professional entertainers reach only in dreams. Then he got a chance to sing in place of Johnny Marvin, NBC's Lonesome Cowboy, while Marvin was off the air making personal appearances. The dramatic side of his rise to fame failed to affect him very much. He'd never thought of a career on either stage or radio, he said.

of a career on either stage or radio, he said.

"I got doubts about this show business bein' worthy of a real he-man's attention," he drawled casually backstage at the Palace. "I reckon I better get out and hustle business for the ranch or I'll be losin' my job."

WIIICH remark was not without results. He went back to the ranch, and business boomed to new heights.

More engagements waited in New York if he decided to return. He sold his 132 cowboy songs to a music publisher. This Fall after the ranch season was over he did return, and is now with one of the Major's

touring amateur units.

Wyoming Jack O'Brien was nonchalant about his success. Not so some of the others. Cruel, grinding poverty is not a stimulant to nonchalance. There was the case of the Youman brothers from

Chicago.
As a result of their prize-winning perform-As a result of their prize-winning performance a brother and sister were reunited after 27 years apart, a widow left the New York City relief rolls, a family said goodby to hardship and three youthful brothers began a career in vaudeville.

The Youman brothers were known as the Hospital Hounds out in Chicago because they spent so much time entertaining veterans in hospitals there. Their father was Daniel Youman an appendixed tool-maker One

George, 18; Skippy, 17; and the father set out for New York in a bat-tered automobile. They were bound for the end of the rainbow—a chance on Major Bowes' Ama-

city high in spirits but low in funds, they put up at a modest little hotel on the Lower East Side, and dispatched a letter to the Major. They had an audition and were accepted. The performance of the You-man brothers was one of the most dramatic ever heard on the Amateur Hour. They boys were slender and more or less shy but the audience took them to its collective heart at once. Their act was a series of imita-tions of leading dance bands played on the clari-






Radio's Leaders Started in Diverse Occupations and from Unexpected Corners of the Globe to Attain Their Present Stardom

EW industrial enterprises have as interesting an organization when compared to radio's talented personnel. Some have come to the mike after deliberate and heart-breaking effort; many have come because they resembled newspaper men in being unsuitable for anything else—and both varieties have come from all quarters earth

and both varieties have come from all quarters of the earth.

No parallel would be closer than the one offered by P. C. Wren's description of the makeup of the French Foreign Legion. Except for the appreciable difference in salaries, the Legion of the Burning Desert and the legion of the burning airwaves have two essential dissimilarities. I. You may enter the Foreign Legion with no questions asked. 2. Women and children are not eligible. Radio, however, becoming increasingly more competitive than its elder brothers, the stage and screen, wants to know who you are, why you are, when you were and everything else that goes toward the compilation of a psychiatric chart. Despite its severity, though

were and everything else that goes toward the compila-tion of a psychiatric chart. Despite its severity, though, the hordes who have broken down the barrier marked "first attempt" are noteworthy. Perfection of radio as an entertainment and adver-tising medium rapidly is thinning the opportunities that make the basis for Cinderella stories, but the present headliners could combine their histories for material that would be more thoroughly stimulating.

RADIO audiences, judging by their contribution to Postmaster Farley's department in the way of licensing their fan mail, are not aware of the irony that would follow correction of their misconceptions. Ted Fiorito, Andre Kostelanetz, Peter Van Steeden, Mario Chamlee and a score of others are indiscriminately accepted as celebrities of foreign birth. Yet Fiorito is a member of the country that has stationed the Statue of Liberty in New York Bay; Van Steeden is Dutch, but as American as an aborigine, since he came over at the tender age of 3; and Chamlee is a member of the Metropolitan Opera Company with an exotic appelation that functions only to satisfy those music-lovers who insist upon an expensive dash of what is foreign.

The British-sounding John S. Young, Frank Knight and David Ross are distinctly American, according to birth certificates registered at the turn of the century. Boake Carter is the only news commentator born under

Boake Carter is the only news commentator born under the Union Jack.

So much for common errors in race delineation.

Who then are the foreigners?

It would be proper to accord the conventional courtesy to femininity by first mentioning Jessica Dragon-

And speaking of Britain, one is tempted to expose the national identity of West End Bottle. He fills out his income tax report as Harry McNaughton, and had his first panties fastened about him in the tight little isle whose accent he stresses.

Guy Lombardo, who collects many American dollars despite a Latin name, is really Canadian; Lou Holtz is foreign only in his choice of foods. But Beatrice Lillie is a titled member of English nobility. WE ARE bounded on the South, as the teacher taught us, by Mexico. The geographic oven sent us Tito Guizar, who did his bit for Mexican opera; Xavier Cugat, who turned to music when Rio Grande bronchobusting proved too much for him, and charming Margot, his ward.

It is common knowledge that radio's classical converts, including Arturo Toscanini, Andre Kostelanetz and Jose Iturbi are foreign, but the geographic scope of their work leaves one confused as to the place of birth and that of recognition. Leopold Stokowski's foreign-sounding name belies his birth in the United States.

States.

Nor are the various places of birth the sole phase of interest in the pattern that makes radio a Foreign Legion. Just as the Heywood Brouns, Walter Lippmans, Arthur Brisbanes, Paul Gallicos and Westbrook Peglers

are the classicists of journalism because their ambitions always had been to be newspaper men, so do those deliberately in radio line up along the classical side.

A young man named David Broekman is director of the music department of Columbia Broadcasting System's West Coast studios, but instead of being representative of the type that drifted into radio, just as the delinquents drift into the Foreign Legion, Broeckman must be classified with Frank Black, Iturbi, Heifetz, Spalding, Kreisler and the others who were primarily musicians, and secondarily interested in radio as a medium of expression. In most instances, at least where musicians of the Black and Broeckman caliber are concerned, there could have been little deliberate planning for radio careers. Radio was in its wailing infancy at the time they looked upon the rendition of music as a means to the ever important economic end.

From the disillusioned ranks of Hollywood's better paid extras came the vibrant Virginia Verrill. Not even the best efforts of Hollywood's suppressing press bureaus could conceal the fact that Miss Verrill had loaned her voice to several of those movie stars who could not justify a singing assignment.

THE careers of the more successful picture people who

THE careers of the more successful picture people who have taken to the air are worthy of a ten-volume compilation. A spontaneous association of ideas calls to mind Helen Hayes, Leslie Howard, Wallace Beery, and Dick Powell.

Somewhere should be noted that the adventures of Nick Dawson, hero of Dangerous Paradise, during the World War and a half dozen Latin-American revolutions would qualify him as a true soldier of fortune. Unexpectedly and unintentionally did Rudy Vallee leave the pursuit of law at Yale, and James Melton likewise left the lumber business. Melton believed for a long while that he would be connected with his father. He had studied ship-building and design, but their use is put to practice only on the yacht he now owns.

And so it goes throughout the radio world, from foreign-born page boys and receptionists, to technicians and the batteries of secretaries, bookkeepers, et cetera.

When one learns that Paul Whiteman drove a taxicab prior to his phenomenal rise as the initiator of George Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue, his subsequent marriage to Margaret Livingstone, the movie star, and his entry into radio, one stops to reflect on the Harry Richmans and Ray Perkinses, who came from the Navy, and Major Edward Bowes of the U. S. Army.

They all have come to the melting pot of talent that has drawn from the East Side and West Side of New York and the world, awarding English prizes to Belgian-born Alois Havrilla, and committing other anomolies peculiar to only one other agency, that same French Foreign Legion.

# Jazz Cuts Its Eye-Teeth

OME day many years from now, when the Twentieth Century is history and when you and your friends long since have departed this world, a conductor will step out onto a platform and raise his baton. And from the band before him will crash the first really American motif, the music of this mightiest of nations, in this soon of a race of new men, the prayers

motif, the music of this mightiest of nations, embodying the song of a race of new men, the prayers and hopes and achievements of a great people.

Somewhere in that strong and wondrous music will be the wild, primeval strains of present-day American jazz. It will not be the whole body of that music, it may be only a small part; but as surely as jazz has gripped this nation in this last decade, it will be a prime, motivating factor in the American song. And today, hundreds of years before that music can be written, we are building its foundation.

That, in my opinion, is the most important function of contemporary musicians and of the public. Yes, the public, too. For you, as you whistle the latest Irving Berlin tune or dance to a new Ferde Grofe arrangement, are proving the worth of our work. You have taken to your hearts this yet unpolished, rough, rhythmic mood called jazz, and by so doing you have made it inseparable from what is basically American.

Luckily I was enabled to play an im-

mood called jazz, and by so doing you have made it inseparable from what is basically American.

Luckily I was enabled to play an important part in making jazz what it is today. But before I go on and enumerate just what has happened during my two decades on the podium, I should like to make my position clear. I found jazz a ragged, unkempt urchin wallowing in the gutter. I clothed it in the garments of respectability and brought it into the American home. But I neither introduced nor originated jazz. No one man could lay claim to that. The foundation of jazz is lost in antiquity. It is basically African, sprung from the boom of savage tom-toms, recechoing through the jungle. And it is that wild African rhythm, applied by Negro slaves to English and Continental music that they first picked up from their owners on the plantations.

What I did was recognize in the barbarous and unmelodious strains of jazz as it was played twenty years ago, something that should be developed and brought out. I did not know what to do to it myself; I tried several times and failed. But I was lucky enough to gather around me a group of able and talented musicians, and I recognized their capabilities. I organized and directed them; I corrected their faults, restrained their over-ambitious impulses, and with their help I laid the foundation for present-day jazz.

It was back in 1915, during the San Francisco Fair, when something within me first stirred in response to the barbarous jazz of the Barbary Coast. I had come to San Francisco from Denver, my birthplace and boyhood home, to play the viola in an organization at the Fair. I played under Max Bendix, the director. There I met Art Hickman and Steve Douglas, considered the greatest ragtime fiddler. I heard that raw music in dance halls, dives, saloons, and it rose within me. I wanted to do something with it but I didn't know what.

FTER the Fair closed I had to find work. I drove a cab for a while and listened to more of that chilling, thrilling, jumbled syncopation. And finally I got a job at Tait's cafe, playing jazz. But I lasted only two days—they said I "couldn't jazz." I wandered the streets of the Barbary Coast in my cab, straining my ears for what scraps of ragtime I could pick up from the curb. I told Art Hickman, over foaming glasses of beer, that he should apply the harmonic principles of a symphony to his jazz band. Art couldn't see it, said it couldn't be done.

done.

Finally I mustered seven brave lads and decided to form my own band, playing that jazz as I thought it should be played. But the War broke out, and I enlisted in the Navy. There I got my first real training as a bandmaster, and I had to forget about symphonized rag-


time for a while.

After the War I lived a hand-to-mouth existence for some time, trying to organize a band of my own. I had a nervous breakdown and lost more than one hundred pounds in four months. But I finally got a break and built up a band of good musicians.

Jazz before that time had been nothing but rhythm played by any and every instrument as the whim of the

individual struck him. There could be no involved orchestration or arrangement because every man carried the rhythm and to deviate was to lose the basic theme, to destroy the number itself.

In my new band I had Ferde Grofe at the piano and Mike Pingatore playing the banjo. Mike had invented a new kind of banjo with an improved sounding chamber, one that could be heard above the choir instruments. Together we worked out our ideas for the incorporation of involved scores and arrangements.

EVERY number we played was to be based upon four-four rhythm, four beats to a bar, with the accent varied perhaps, but with that basic four beats to a bar remaining the same. And the piano, the banjo and the drums were to keep up that regular boom-boom-boom-boom, come what may. The piano and the banjo could carry the melody we were playing, keep more or less religiously to the original notes and chords. But the choir instruments—the saxophones and brasses and strings—would sway off, carry the symphonic variations, the nuances and moods we would write in.

We tried it and it was terrible. We tried it again and it wasn't quite so bad. We kept plugging at that same idea, writing and rewriting arrangements. Finally we introduced it at the hotel where we were engaged.

The public didn't seem to mind. As a matter of fact,

The public didn't seem to mind. As a matter of fact, they enjoyed it as a novelty.

We were booked into the Belvedere Hotel in Santa Barbara, California, then into the Alexandria in Los Angeles. There we went over in a big way. The movie celebrities made the Alexandria their headquarters; we met Rudolph Valentino, Charlie Chaplin, Tom Mix, Mabel Normand, Gloria Swanson, William Farnum.

WE FELT that we finally were on our way. But New York and the East were still distant. The big time was not ours. I decided to make the break, and went to

EVERY music critic of importance in New York was there. They had come to ridicule, but they stayed to applaud. When, after our twenty-six numbers, they called for encore after encore, my heart was full.

In the seventeen years since we introduced the complicated arrangements to jazz, much has happened to it. Our fundamental principles have remained the same, but all one has to do to realize the improvement is to listen to recordings we made in 1918 at the Ambassador, or in 1923 at the Palais Royal.


The main improvement has been in the instrumentalists themselves. Players have become more accomplished, more versatile. At one time one of my saxophonists was master of thirteen different instruments.

Already steps are being taken to insure the future development of this modern American music. Instruction in it has been incorporated into the curriculums of most music schools. There is the Museum of Modern Music at Williams College, Williamstown, Massachusetts. And in this connection I would like to mention the Elfrida Whiteman scholarship, named in honor of my mother.

When that great American music finally is written, when it crashes forth in all its grandeur as the finished musical product of this nation, then will I and my contemporaries not have lived in vain.

ALL odds the outstanding addition to our musical menu this season is the Boston Symphony. Listening to their broadcasts Saturday nights over NBC, it is easy to understand those who contend that the Boston Symphonic and the Bo

derstand those who contend that the Boston is the finest symphonic ensemble in America. Only under TOSCANINI does the New York Philharmonic excel, and that is perchance the product of an incomparable individual genius.

Certainly the Boston string choir has no parallel elsewhere. The individual members have played together for decades. The quality of their collective tone is unmatched. And they have the distinct advantage of a single conductor.

It is all well enough to have a variety of temperaments and talents on our podiums. In New York and Philadelphia it is the practice, because the great heroes of the baton, TOSCANINI and STOKOW-SKI, cannot be persuaded to devote themselves continuously to one orchestra for an entire season.

The results are not always satisfactory. Orchestra men inevitably fall into the habit of giving their best only when the

big gun is there. Performances under all other conductors suffer, therefore. When the great maestro is away, the orchestra men seem to feel they are on vacation too. Needless to say, the audience naturally takes its vacation then and leaves an empty house.

Aware of this situation, the New York Philharmonic Symphony has reduced the

Aware of this situation, the New York Philharmonic Symphony has reduced the number of its conductors. MR. KLEM-PERER is presiding for the entire first three months, and in that time has a chance thoroughly to accustom orchestra and audience to his work.

MR. KOUSSEVITZKY in Boston, sharman his reason with no one is not sub-

mg his season with no one, is not subjected to the odium of comparisons, favorable or unfavorable. It is his orchestra. You can tell it the minute he steps on the stand.

And the results that he obtains are not drowned out by ladies saying, "Yes, but

I prefer Mr. X. He looks so much more handsome on the stage . . . and his hair ah!

As a matter of fact, Mr. Koussevitzky is a model of sartorial perfection. It is unfortunate that television and teletouch are not here, so all the radio listeners could visualize him better. If he chose, he easily could have been a great actor.

As it is, he's unquestionably the finest conductor of Tschaikowsky and Sibelius . . . and to many listeners' tastes, the most satisfactory interpreter of all the classics. No matter where he ranks, his discriminating catholic taste and his ringing catholic. ing, catholic taste and his ringing enthusiasm for all great music, old and young, mark him as an outstanding musical figure

of our day.

How much we have missed these past Winters by not hearing his concerts from Boston, we know now. And while NBC is wise enough to continue them every

week and not allow commercials to interfere, we shall not miss a single concert



right hand to his left, and began shooting The smaller man leaped into the air like a stricken rabbit. His pistol clattered to the floor, his hands clutched at his breast. He crashed head first upon the steps leading down into the vestibule, and rolled to the bottom at Conroy's feet.

The tall man had fired another ineffective shot at the policeman, then turned and darted back to the apartment door through which he and his companion had

"I was sleeping in there with my little son, Sol," Sucherman said. "The first I knew there were burglars in the house was when a light was flashed in my face. I sat up and saw there were two men pointing pistols at me."

At Fillmore station the lone prisoner identified himself as Sam Wasserman, alias Sam Waterman. Records disclosed he had served a penitentiary sentence in Michigan

served a penitentiary sentence in Michigan after he and another man had been caught red-handed in the act of robbing a store. Later he had been arrested in Chicago for rolling drunks, picking pockets and other robberies.

"I didn't do any shooting; honest I didn't," he said.
However, he could not explain how two pistols which had been discharged, had been found in a pair of galoshes on the third floor where, he admitted, his two companions had not been. They couldn't

have gone up with him, for both had died instantly.

The grand jury quickly indicted Wasserman on a charge of murder in the first degree for the slaying of Detective Murphy. Brought to trial before Judge Samuel I. Miller, the young man pleaded guilty, threw himself upon the mercy of the court and offered as a reason why clemency should be shown him that his crimency should be shown him that his criminal record did not show him ever to have indulged in "rough stuff," and therefore his claim that he had taken no part in the shooting should be accepted as true.

Wasserman, however, escaped execution. Doubt was raised as to his sanity, and eventually his sentence was commuted to life imprisonment.

Of such stuff is the story of Marguerite Ryan of the Bronx. Mrs. Ryan's husband had been unemployed for more than a year. They had two children and had been forced to accept relief from the city for saveral months. A phonograph was

been forced to accept relief from the city for several months. A phonograph was one of the few amusements left to the Ryan family, and one day the mother was playing her favorite, a recording of Depuis le Jour from Louise by Mary Garden, when she had an idea.

Before her marriage she had been a choir singer. Why not learn this aria from Mary Garden's record and try to get on that Major Bowes' Amateur Hour she had heard so much about? She practised faithfully by herself and was able to persuade a teacher to give her lessons with payment deferred for a few months. Then a serious operation interrupted her plans serious operation interrupted her plans

As soon as she was out of the hospital she made application and waited patiently

for a reply. Finally it came, and a day for the audition was set. It was success-ful. One Sunday night Mrs. Ryan stood before the microphone. The hour she had been fighting for had arrived!

At that instant the strain of those days At that instant the strain of those days in the hospital and the unceasing battle to regain her voice made itself felt. She gave way and broke into tears. But she wasn't to lose that opportunity of a lifetime so easily. The Major suggested that she wait until later before singing. And sing she did—that aria of Mary Garden's.

When she had finished the studio audience broke into spontaneous cheers stopped only by the Major's famous "All right, all right." He motioned for silence, then sprang his big surprise.

"We have a very distinguished guest in the audience tonight," he said, "a great singer who was the toast of all Paris after she made her debut in the opera Louise at the Paris Opera House some years ago. She sang the same aria Mrs. Ryan sang tonight—Miss Mary Garden."

For two hours after the audience had departed Mary Garden and Marguerite Ryan sat in a corner of the studio talking. They talked of careers. Mrs. Ryan has by this time made a good start on hers. She has been touring theaters throughout the

has been touring theaters throughout the country for several months.

But triumphs of another kind have been chalked up to the credit of the Amateur Hour. For instance, there was the celebrated Affair of the Diamond Tooth, definitely proving that all that glitters is not gold. Sometimes it's a diamond.

Mary Perry was a dusky daughter of Harlem and a feminine edition of Cab Calloway. When she sang she rolled her eyes. The studio approved, enthusiastically. She had a solid gold tooth of which

she was very proud, but she admitted shyly that her one consuming ambition was to have a real, genuine diamond set

in it!

A Mr. Cross of Portland, Maine, was a broker in diamonds and he was so pleased with her singing that he sent a real diamond to Mary in care of Major Bowes. When the singer departed to join one of the amateur touring units, the diamond had been set square in the middle of the gold tooth. That tooth was a brilliant triumph under the glare of the footlights.

This is part of the story of the Amateur Hour, part of the human chronicle that is taken from life and transplanted to the air each Sunday night. Its details are many and varied, but the spirit and motive behind it are one. That is what holds the Major to his task at an age when most men in his circumstances would have retired.

For the Amateur Hour has become a huge enterprise reaching out to every section of the country. Eight traveling units are on the road, giving jobs to more than 100 amateurs. 




