

AND then it was my turn to tell the judges my story. All my tragic history! This was what was behind the story I told them:

About eight years ago, Mother, Dad, and I moved to a fairly large city in Indiana. Our neighbors took us to their hearts, and made my 'teen age years very happy. I went to parties, played tennis, danced, had dates.
Dad's business was booming. Mother,

happy as a lark, joined all the clubs in town. Merrily she baked, and bossed, and busied herself for every bazaar and banquet.

It was the Saturday Afternoon Luncheon and Bridge Club, however, that Mother loved best. For days, she would fuss and plan and cook to outdo the other ladies, and on the Saturday it was her turn to entertain, every grand cloth and ornament, from wedding-present days on, was brought out to be shown and admired. We were middle-class people, living life to the full as we knew it.

I was just 20 when I got my first

job. Thrills that come just once in a lifetime! After my first day as bookkeeper in one of the city's big department stores, Dad said, "Guess I can retire now that my big girl is working." I knew he was terribly proud of me.

# —BUT FOND MEMORIES OF HER GOOD DEEDS STILL LIVE!

UT of the world of great spirits, Ernestine Schumann-Heink journeyed to keep a rendezvous with Josef Koestner, her favorite musical director, and Marion Talley, her protege.

More than a week after her death, she sat at their table in spirit . . . It was like this:

A few days before she passed on, the Titan of the opera accepted an invitation to dine with Koestner, his family and Marion Talley at a quiet little German restaurant just off the gaily lighted film capital boulevard.

"I will be there, Joe, and don't forget the onion soup," she said.

Mother Schumann-Heink was there . . even though only in spirit.

Lights were dimmed in the little Hofbrau restaurant. The checkered tablecloths could be seen but faintly. A softly glowing spotlight focused on an empty chair at the head of the table. It was Schumann-Heink's chair . . . with bowed heads, seated about the table were Josef Koestner, his wife, his son and Marion Talley.

They were keeping thier rendezvous keeping it with heavy hearts and tear-filled eyes,

With sorrowful dignity, the proprietor of the Hofbrau, famous for the German food it serves the notables of Hollywood, gave the signal to the five-piece girls' orchestra.

upon note seemed to tremble and echo, the spotlight on an empty chair seemed to take form . . . a smiling form . . . it seemed to place outstretched hands on the heads of both Koestner and Miss Talley, who sat with heads bowed, eyes wet, remembering with gratitude the grand woman who had played so vital a part in their careers and in their lives.

It was Schumann-Heink who encouraged the career of Miss Talley when she was but a thirteen-year-old girl. It was she who recommended Koestner to Miss Talley as a conductor when she was preparing for her present series on NBC. It was the famous diva who chose Koestner for her radio conductor and would have no other, who turned down an engagement in the Hollywood Bowl because Koestner could not come west from Chicago to conduct for her.

AS THE music ended, not as it usually ends with an abrupt finale, but with a lingering softness and sweetness that seemed to blend with a fading melody, and as the words "sleep in heavenly peace" floated off into the distance, both Miss Talley and Koestner lifted their eyes to the vacant chair before them.

They saw there, with eyes of imagination, the kindly face of "Mother" who loved them so well, a face deeply lined with the sorrow of losing her



ROADWAY, they say, is the meanest street in the world. It's Heartbreak Allen and Pickpocket Lane. It's the street where they pat you on the back with one hand and rifle your pocket with the other— where they call you "pal" when you're

"That guy Berle never told an original joke in his life," a certain Broadway clique will tell you.
"Berle couldn't haul himself up by

By way of example, let me show you two scenes which reveal how Berle's reputation for joke-lifting and apronstring-hanging has been used against him in Broadway's efforts to kick him down.

Go back to Chicago in 1935. Phil Baker stands on the brightly lighted stage of an RKO playhouse. His accordion, disconsolate and neglected, folds its creased middle and waits while Baker and Bottle hew to the dialogue, letting the quips fall where they

On the other side of the footlights, the spectators howl with merriment, their sides caught in unanimous stitches. Suddenly the mirth is shattered by the sound of a falling object.

Somewhere up in the gallery, a highschool girl has dropped her handbag, with lipstick, eyebrow pencil and "mad-money" scattering noisily. After the crash, there is a deadly hush. Then Baker turns to the audience . . . "Don't look now," he warns them.

ried electricians, a nervous cast is re-hearsing the "Vanities of 1932." Slightly bald and more than slightly lanky, the excited Carroll himself marches up-stage in a white heat. "You so-and-so, you muffed your lines," he barks at one performer, "and as for our good, kind soubrette here, she sounds more like a hill-country ingenue." In the midst of his tirade, he wheels suddenly and faces the darkened theater

"As for you, Mrs. Berlinger," he shouts, "you laughed in the wrong

Those two incidents tell a storybut not the whole story. The first tells of a Milton Berle, who, if you believe his enemies, rode from stage to radio on a broomstck of second-hand jokes, with shades of Winchell, Baker and Benny riding to heel, all yelling "Stop, thief."

The second tells of Sarah Berlinger. a modern stage mother whose devotion to her son has become almost as leggendary in the vicinity of Broadway and 42nd Street as that of the late Mrs. Janis to her daughter, Elsie.

VIEWED casually, these incidents only skim the surface, but if you use a magnifying glass on them, you may get a deeper insight into the sub-For instance, if you inspect the first closely, you may see Milton Berle's side of the story which depicts him as a gag-thief whose laughs and his laurels depend on someone else's jokes. "I'm not a plagiarist," he told me

angrily. "I don't lift jokes and even if I do, what of it? They're better after I've doctered 'em than they ever were before." With that, he chewed his gum vigorously and blinked a couple of times. If you mention plagiarism he gets pretty rabid on the subject. Rabid because he thinks he's the victim rather than the violator, and because he insists that it was his ingenuity and not his stupidity that first got him into the limelight as a joke-robber.
"Even when I was just a young

punk," this grizzled patriarch of not-yet-thirty declared, "I figured that



the echoes of other traditions which, along with the famed date of March 4, are swept into the records as history

marches forward.

After the last word of the inaugural address has been swallowed by our microphones, the President will step into his automobile for the ride back down the avenue to the White House, down the avenue to the White House, his home for the next four years. Only this time, according to present calculations, the street of Presidents no longer reigns confidently supreme as the only possible thoroughfare down which a Presidential column could pass. With his every movement followed by the eyes of radio reporters, the President will lead the procession down the broad back of Constitution Avenue, that new boulevard which has been constructed beside the row of marble government buildings that are the keynote of the new Washington.

BUT even a precedent-breaking Pres ident may decide at a later moment to march his parade down time-honored Pennsylvania Avenue along which Jefferson walked, Jackson rode a horse, and modern Presidents have motored.

In front of the White House lawn, In front of the White House lawn, there stands a house from America's past: a model of Andrew Jackson's white-columned old home, the "Hermitage," which the seventh President built in his beloved Tennessee. It is this stately model house, glass-enclosed, which the thirty-second President will use as a reviewing stand for the parade which will shuffle past in a blare of martial music and a continual sparkle of color. Into your livinga blare of martial music and a contin-ual sparkle of color. Into your living-room, as each celebrated band in the gay procession passes the reviewing stand, will float the authoritative notes of the ruffles and flourishes with the shrill tones of the bugles blending into the stern roll of the military drums. At this point in the parade route, at President Roosevelt's first inaugura-tion on March 4, 1933, band after

at President Roosevelt's first inaugura-tion on March 4, 1933, band after band swung into the cheerful strains of the official song of the day. You may still recall those recurring choruses of the Franklin D. Roosevelt March, composed by the new Secretary of the Treasury, the late William H. Woodin

Woodin.

Another official figure missing from this year's ceremonies will be the Secretary of War, the late George H. Dern, whose funeral the President attended in Salt Lake City this past Summer. Gone also will be Herbert Clark Hoover, who in 1933 rode along Pennsylvania Avenue in the Presidential car, providing the dramatic spectacle of an outgoing President sitting becar, providing the dramatic spectacle of an outgoing President sitting beside his successful opponent. Those familiar with the faces of the unofficial White House family will miss two men who, during their lives, were closely identified with the Washington scene, Colonel Louis McHenry Howe, frailbodied, giant-minded secretary to the President; and strong, able Gus Gennerich, for years personal bodyguard to the man who this day begins his second four-year administration.

To capture the atmosphere of this year's inauguration, you need a descriptive adjective like triumphant, residing or explorant for the event we

shall be covering for you is a mighty
celebration of the greatest landslide
election in modern times.

It will be our job to catch, with our
little microphones, that indefinable
atmosphere which, in addition to the

features, makes every special event

Four years ago, radio listeners, like

the spectators on decorated Pennsylvania Avenue, hung in suspense as the country waited for its first national look at the official Franklin Delano Roosevelt. This year, with the Roosevelt voice familiar to every listener, the delay mostlight will be forward. the glaring spotlight will be focused on the show itself. As the nation's history has marched onward, so has the history of radio. In 1937, the Columbia Broadcasting System concentrates its equipment in Washington for a radio presentation that is four years more elaborate and efficient than was the long day's broadcast schedule of the last March 4 inauguration in

was the long day's broadcast schedule of the last March 4 inauguration in history.

On that day, some twenty-seven Columbia microphones sucked in the color and the feeling of a vivacious Capital City in fancy dress. This year, that number will be increased to at least thirty-five of these supersensitive ears for all the world. Behind the scenes, the advance planning of microphone pick-up locations is a major job in itself. For a midwinter inauguration, broadcasters as well as statesmen, must prepare for a thermometer that refuses to climb above the freezing point. In addition to protecting sensitive technical apparatus and more or less sensitive commentatecting sensitive technical apparatus and more or less sensitive commentators from ice and snow, radio men must be ready to change their plans on short notice. Because of the shift on the calendar from March to January, a raw and biting day may force the swearing-in ceremonies from the Capitol steps to the Chamber of the Unites States Senate, inside the Capitol building. This means that a complete broadcasting set-up must be carefully arranged in the Senate Chamber merely on the outside chance that harsh weather will prevent the customary outdoor induction into office of the President. of the President.

RIDING on the wheels of progress, speeding ever faster, the inauguration has become a huge, swiftly moving exhibition, spread over a vast area. To keep pace with the changing technique of such public events, radio relies increasingly on portable shortwave transmitters. In Washington, if you had applied soon enough for your tickets, you would see the peryour tickets, you would see the per-formance from a wooden grandstand erected over the curbstone, and your view would be the same from the beginning of the Inaugural day until its

At home, next to your radio, you will

move with the commentators from point to point. You will look down on Washington from the top of the Washington Monument, as the announcer high up in that 555-foot stone column talks to you through his short-wave microphone. You will get a picture of the swarming thousands of spectators in the Plaza as they look from the top of the Capitol dome, gaze down on tree-lined Washington streets from a drifting blimp, swoop over the long thread of the parade in a speeding airplane, and ride alongside the Presidential car as the radio reporter in his short-wave-equipped automobile drinks in the scene with his eyes while his lips give you the story. his lips give you the story.

As A matter of fact, this comprehensive, many angled impression received by the radio audience is a broader picture than that witnessed by any individual commentator on the contract of the protection of the contract of the spot, each of whom has one task to do

At President Roosevelt's first inauguration, for instance, I was stationed on the roof of the Willard Hotel on Pennsylvania Avenue. The day was bright and sunny, but cold. It was cold at nine in the morning when I got there, but it seemed a lot colder before I left at five that evening. All through the afternoon, the procession tramped along on the avenue below. It would have been a relief to march with the paraders, just to keep moving. About the only warming exercise I did get that March 4 came in the middle of the afternoon, when a party of celebrators who had been protecting themselves from the last blasts of Winter with a fiery liquid cold-killer found their way up to my roof and decided it might be fun to toss me off the roof into the middle of the parade. I disagreed.

Although that was the first inauguration in which I actively participated, I have watched several others shake the Capital out of its ordinary routine. Dimly, I can recall Woodrow Wilson, in an open carriage, raising his silk hat decorously to the cheering citizens shivering on the pavements and kept in order by armed soldiers, as he slowly drove home to the executive mansion at 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, March 4, 1917. from one location.
At President Roosevelt's first inaug-

WARREN G. HARDING, if the picture in my memory is right, rode swiftly to the Capitol in a closed black limousine, surrounded by khaki-uniformed officers of the U. S. Cavalry. I again stood on Pennsylvania Avenue of the day that Calvin Coolings

ragain stood on Pennsylvania Avenue on the day that Calvin Coolidge repeated the Presidential oath in his distinctive, dry voice, the central ceremony in an inauguration which was unusually quiet and modest in accordance with the President's wish.

unusually quiet and modest in accordance with the President's wish.

March 4, 1929, provided a driving rain that dripped down the curve of the Capitol dome and turned Pennsylvania Avenue into a glistening river through which the damp procession bravely splashed.

Weather control belongs to the future, but in this twentieth century that future rushes upon us at so bewildering a speed that perhaps it is not too fantastic to play with the possibility of placing an early order for a warm, sunny day on some distant January 20. Television, too, belongs to an onrushing future, but how near that future may be is the subject of a swarm of guesses daily. Some day, certainly, you will relax at home as a new president steps onto the screen you have set up between the davenport and the bookcase, and, turning earnest eyes upon you, launches into his inaugural address. Perhaps even on January 20, 1941, as we focus our microphonic television camera upon the broad Washington streets, I may have the Washington streets, I may have the privilege of saying to you: "Thus, ladies and gentlemen, you see the beaming smile of the new President of

the United States, as he waves his right hand cheerily at his applauding audience. You may observe from the deep flush on the President's face that it is a cold day in Washington, a day that brings the color into the cheeks of all of us. New you may notice that of all of us. Now, you may notice that the President is pulling a pair of gloves over his hands. They are fur-lined, as you can see if you look closely . . ."

BUT there's no time to waste on stor-BUT there's no time to waste on stories of the future. It's getting late. The throng is already pushing against the ropes in front of the Capitol, and in a matter of minutes the President will arrive. In nearly two-score different points throughout the city the microphones are ready for the biggest broadcast of the new year, so let's start

Head wounds were common. An orderly shaved the man's ripped-open head and scrubbed it with soap and water. A piece of gauze soaked in bi-chloride was stretched over the entire head. The surgeon out the gauze over the day stretched over the entire the head. The surgeon cut the gauze over the wound and then made an incision to one side of it. Small holes were bored around the fracture, after which a small perforating instrument was used to cut away the skull between the perforations. The skull over the fractured area was lifted out whole. With a glass syringe, we washed out the loose bits of brain with our solutions. tions. If a bullet or a piece of shell was buried in the brain itself we tried to draw it out with strong magnets.

A HOSPITAL for brain cases was opened close to the front. Fifteen hundred cases were brought to it in one night. And all of these brain operations were done under local anesthetics, with the soldiers smoking cigarettes to try to control their nerves! If we have another war—and only you who are reading these lines can keep us from having one—gas bombs will be dropped on your own street,

keep us from having one—gas bombs will be dropped on your own street, in your own town, from the air. Are you ready for them? Do you know what gas does? Have you ever seen its work? I have. Men touched by mustard gas came to me with their bodies swollen up like ballons from head to foot. Every inch of a man's skin was covered with huge, yellow, ghastly, burning blisters. As they lay there, shrieking in their agony, they used to beg me:

there, shrieking in their agony, they used to beg me:

"Nurse! Kill me! In the name of heaven, get a pistol and shoot me! Get me out of my misery!"

And I wanted to. I wanted to quiet

And I wanted to. I wanted to quiet these shrieking human horrors—to save them if that were possible, to silence their screams when I knew that life for them was to be only hours of Hell. But I could do neither. Soldiers who die are lucky. Those who live must know the real glory of war.

PHOSGENE gas is nicer. It only PHOSGENE gas is nicer. It only blinds you for life, I saw whole lines of men blinded by it—long line after long line of them, their eyes bandaged, stumbling along, each man with his hand on the shoulder of the man ahead of him. They are hidden away in our veterans' hospitals today, those blind men. We don't see them. But they are there, by the thousands. I saw men stumbling along, groping, fumbling, their uniforms torn and burnt and bloody, trying to walk in

line with their comrades. Their eyes were burnt out. Your eyes may be burnt out, too, and your mother's eyes, and your babies' eyes, if you ever let us have another war!

Then there were what we called the shell-shock cases. The very noise of the shells, the fear of them, drove men insane. They, too, with their twitching lips and their vacant, staring eyes, still sit in the hospitals by the thousand—twenty years after! The thought of them sitting there, to me, is as terrible as my memory of those other hundreds who lay dying before my eyes, choking and strangling, with my eyes, choking and strangling, with the glood gurgling in their torn throats —begging me for water when I had no water to give them.

SAW men with gaping holes opened in their chests, so that their lungs could be seen, exposed like some kind of pulpy, bloody fruit. You could hear the air hissing in and out as they gasped. Thank God they did not gasp for long!

I saw men who had been hit full in I saw men who had been hit full in the face by bursts of shrapnel. Ears gone, eyes gone, nose gone, mouth gone, teeth gone, jaws gone—their heads were nothing but hollow shells, into which you could have thrust your hand. And still they were alive!

I saw men with their skin flayed off them by gas and flame-throwers. They were shipped home later to their wives and families, or, more often, to gov-

and families, or, more often, to government hospitals, in little tubs like bathtubs, full of olive oil. Alive!

I saw men who had jumped down

I saw men who had jumped down into an enemy trench and been caught, like an apple-on-a-stick, on upflung bayonets, the long steel blades going clear through them. Alive! Alive and closing their eyes, biting their lips to shreds, to keep from screaming out their pain!

I saw men with the tops of their heads blown off so that, when the gory bandages were unwound, their brains fell out into the nurses' basins.

Alive!

And I say this to America:

NOT pretty flags fluttering in the breeze, not stirring marches played by the bands, but this is war!—this ghastliness, this wreckage of youth and life! This is war, I say to you who read this record of what I, only one nurse, saw!

And to you who read this in Radio Guide, particularly to those younger readers who are under twenty-five, I say—Never, never let us know this horror again!

## MUSIC IN THE AIR

### By Carleton Smith

APPY NEW YEAR! It's good to begin the New Year at home. Toasting my feet in front of the fire, I shall be listening with you to the incomparable wealth of entertainment every radio set pours into our ears. A wanderer returning from far-away shores finds the number of symphonies and operas at any dialer's command staggering. If you turn far enough, one way or the other, some first-class music always comes out. And 1937 will bring us more good music than we've ever heard before.

music than we've ever heard before. More symphonic programs are now heard every week than at any other time in the history of radio. Still heading the list is the New York Philharmonic-Symphony on Sunday afternoons, with John Barbirolli conducting and Deems Taylor commenting. So successful has the young Englishman been that his contract has been extended to three seasons. He was chosen after less than a score of was chosen after less than a score of concerts to be the permanent conductor of the nation's oldest symphony orchestra.

Mr. Barbirolli has one trait in com-mon with Toscanini and Stokowski and other great conductors, and that is an ability to lead an orchestra: the ability to make the men play as he wants them to play. Offnand, one would think that ability sufficient. But it isn't. The important question is: How does he want them to play?

FIND Mr. Barbirolli an interesting conductor with a feeling for color, rhythm and movement. He never lets a performance drag. But he is young, immature, and his powers of penetration are not integrated nor well detion are not integrated nor well defined. Few symphony orchestras of the caliber of the New York Philharmonic-Symphony would trust their fate to a man so youthful. But, as Mr. Barbirolli is able and sincere, he may succeed and, in the long run, prove successful. That depends entirely on his future development. Time alone was given the appropriate the property. can give the answer. Barbirolli does have unusual gifts as a conductor. It is related of him, for instance, that he once lost the entire score of a Bax symphony—but he reproduced the entire score from memory in one night.

They will all be heard during the 18 broadcasts that are now scheduled from the Metropolitan. Most welcome would be the addition of Wagner's "Ring des Nibelungen." If you have a yen to hear the great tetralogy, let the Radio Corporation of America know your desires. The only reason plans are not being made to include the Metropolitan's Wagner Cycle in the list of broadcasts is the feeling that not sufficient listeners would be interested. ers would be interested.

TWO leading Metropolitan artists, Elisabeth Rethberg and Ezio Pinza, whose joint recitals have brought joy to music-lovers on three continents, are to join their voices together on Sunday, December 27, at 10 p.m. EST and let us hear rarely-heard music greatly sung. Mme. Rethberg is certainly one of the finest living sopranos and Mr. Pinza is the greatest living Italian bass. Let us hope that they will sing Mozart duets for us.

The Motors Concert on the following Sunday, January 3, will bring us a concert of modern American music, with Paul Whiteman conducting. And for those who treasure the infrequent

for those who treasure the infrequent appearances of Yehudi Menuhin, it will be good news to hear that he will emerge from his retirement in California for one public appearance, a broadcast with his teacher, Georges Enesco. The date is early February.

THERE is also a possibility that Arturo Toscanini might return to America for concerts in April. The beloved maestro told me several weeks ago in Vienna that if a special festival or occasion arose, he would be willing to come back for a month. He is conducting this week, if all goes well, in Tel-Aviv and in Cairo, Egypt. He has agreed to conduct in England in May, but refuses to allow his per-He has agreed to conduct in England in May, but refuses to allow his performances there to be rebroadcast to the United States. He is fearful of the trans-Atlantic rebroadcast conditions. Should he come to America this Spring it would be the outstanding event of our musical year; for he remains the greatest living interpretive musician.

SAMSON AND DELILAH will be given by the Metropolitan Opera this winter, with Gertrud Wettergren, Rene Malson and Ezio Pinza in the leading roles. In "The Tales of Hoffman" Lawrence Tibbett will sing all three baritone roles, with three female leads.

'Le Coq d'Or" will be sung in French and will have the singers acting out the story, instead of the ballet, as was done at the last revival. Lily Pons and Mr. Pinza will have the leading roles. Mile. Pons is delighted to do comedy

Mile. Pons is delighted to do comedy for a change, and she has taken dancing lessons with a famous ballet master on the West Coast, presumably Adolph Bohm.

"Norma" will be presented with the new French-Italian dramatic soprano, Gina Cigna, in the title role. Mme. Cigna has an enormous reputation in Cigna has an enormous reputation in Europe for her clear, crystalline singing, and while she has not the beauty of voice of Rosa Ponselle, she will assume all Miss Ponselle's roles, as our great soprano is determined she will succeed in films. She has slimmed considerably and it not making any opera appearances until her present film work is completed. She is, however, under contract to appear at the Metropolitan later in the season.

The "Sweethearts of the Air"

GEE! But I'm Happy!" Those words are the title of the last song hit written by the veteran composing team of Peter de Rose and May Singhi Breen. It was published in last week's issue of Radio Guide—and it might well be the pair's offi-

—and it might well be the pair's official theme song.

Thirteen years ago, de Rose met May Singhi Breen at station WEAF, then an independent, now one of the key stations on an NBC network. At that time, de Rose was a noted popular pianist and Miss Breen had an impressive air following as "The Ukulele Lady." Their professional relationship began then and there, and it's still going strong!

DURING the thirteen years they've been on the air—and few network stars can boast so long an unbroken term of stardom—Peter de Rose and May Singhi Breen have turned out at least one hit-song annually. "Words by May Singhi Breen, Music by Peter de Rose" is a famous trade-mark.

Many of the best known tunes of the past decade have come from the prolific pen of Peter de Rose. The list is a long one: "When Your Hair Has Turned to Silver"; "Somebody Loves You"; "A Home in Wyoming" and "Have You Ever Been Lonely" (the last two in collaboration with Billy Hill); "Nightfall"; "When You Were Only Seventeen"; "You'll Always Be the Same, Sweetheart" and "What Makes You So Adorable" comprise only part of the total.

"Wagon Wheels," one of those phenomenal songs that periodically sweep the country, was written for the "Ziegfeld Follies of 1934" by Peter de Rose.

DEFINITELY more than merely a successful Tin Pan Alley song-writer, de Rose has been honored as a valuable contributor to American folk-music. In 1934, following a national poll to discover the American composer whose contributions to American music love had been most valuable, do sic lore had been most valuable, de Rose was given an honorary cup by the American Creative League of Music Students, presented by Arthur Cremin, president of the league and director of the New York schools of

De Rose was commissioned to write the official song "Texas Star" for the Texas Centennial.

Texas Centennial.

If they ever took time out to compile them. Peter de Rose and May Singhi Breen would probably discover themselves the holders of numerous records of one kind or another. Publication of one song hit every year for eleven years, for instance, is a mark for anyone to shoot at; and their record as big-time broadcasters during that time is equally unusual.

May Singhi Breen and Peter de Rose were married six years ago—and they're still married, and happily so. They're happy with their work, and happy with each other. So, you see, it's no wonder they wrote a song and called it, "Gee! But I'm Happy!"

TO SEE the Briarhopper band coming into the WBT studios in Charlotte, North Carolina, with all their instruments, you might think the New York Symphony was to play a concert. But there are only six members of Dad Briarhopper's family. Chief of the outfit is Dad Briarhopper himself known to his mother and

per himself, known to his mother and father as Johnny McAllister, or "Mae." Johnny doesn't care which instrument he picks up when, without looking, he plunges his hand into the pile and takes one.

If it's a fiddle, he begins sawing with all the assurance of a Kreisler; a banjo, he picks with the delight of a darky on

a cabin porch; a guitar, he strums with the ease and soulfulness of a South Sea native; if it's a mandolin, he plucks it like a Cossack on a balalaika. But the part he likes best in his role as Dad Briarhopper is when he steps before means he hardly ever sings in more than two songs a day. He has a wicked-looking contraption which he swings around his neck to hold his harmonica, which he plays with the abandon of a Minnevitch and the ease of an artist, at the same time strum-ming away on one of the group's many stringed instruments. stringed instruments.

Elmer Briarhopper, who occasionally plays the piano as Clarence Etters, doesn't do much either. When he isn't playing the piano or violin, he is singing. Otherwise, he rests.

per family promise to gain a huge following among listeners to the popular show. Homer Drye, fourteen years old, is what "Chock" Crutchfield, WBT's program director, termed a "natural." When Dad Briarhopper announced on the show one day that he wanted a boy and girl to join the cast,

Bill Briarhopper, sometimes known as Bill Davis, gets a kick out of his fiddle, as well as good music. Standing before the microphone with one foot patting and his whole body bubbling in tune, he rolls his eyes (Dad Briarhopper says Bill flirts with the audience!) and keeps time with his whole body. Even his buttons shimmy rhythmically. And every once in a while Bill "calls the figgers," lending a barn-dance atmosphere to the show. Don Briarhopper, alias White, is a musician. Further than that it is difficult to classify him. Don is another who plays whatever instrument he can find and plays it well. He is the mainstay when it comes to singing, too; for anything from a solo to a quartet contains his tenor.

THORPE WESTERFIELD is the silent member of the Briarhopper group, except for the sounds he makes with a guitar, violin, mandolin, banjo and harmonica. Silence in Thorpe's case





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

publicity was the answer to what it takes to get ahead in show business. I couldn't quite picture myself taking champagne baths or sleeping with pet pumas, so I went into a huddle with Richy Craig, Jr., and we planned a gag feud."

Craig wrote letters to newspaper columnists accusing Berle of stealing his wise-cracks. Berle, in turn, made counter-charges. The papers, quick to sense hot copy in the backstage feuding of these two trigger-quick comics, made a Roman holiday out of the battle.

Delighted with their success, Berle and Craig were on the verge of going even further and instituting a friendly plagiarism suit, when Craig suddenly

"So," says Berle, shrugging tailored, expressive shoulders, "here I'm left holding the bag."

BERLE'S right, of course. Craig is dead and there's no way of proving at the now-famous feud was merely a publicity stunt cooked up between them. In fact, when Berle tells his story today, Broadway wiseacres only laugh at him. But Berle laughs right back at them because he maintains that even if he can't prove the feud story, at least he can prove that he's not a

at least he can prove that he's not a gag-grabber.

Hold Sarah Berlinger's picture underneath the magnifying glass. Immediately you'll see a whole panorama of events that began almost a quarter-century ago when a Bronx ragamuffin cut up his mother's muff for a mustache, swiped his old man's Sunday pants, his brother's rusty derby, and won \$2.75 for impersonating Charlie Chaplin.

You'll see Sarah Berlinger herself, younger maybe, but no peppier than she is today, sacrificing her home life and the joys of caring for her husband

and the four other little Berlingers. You'll see her trouping with Milton, swallowing her own ambitions, her own dreams of happiness, to make him a great stage star.

YOU'LL see family scenes in a ram-shackle tenement house on Kelly shackle tenement house on Kelly street in the Bronx . . . School scenes are there too . . classroom scenes in New York Public School 184 . . "How far would I have gotten by the time I was 13?" Milt ponders. "About 7B maybe? Yeah, better make it 7B . . . Well, that's where I was when I stopped going . . ."

stopped going . . ."
There are motion-picture scenes, too, There are motion-picture scenes, too, in the moving pageant behind the portrait of Sarah Berlinger . . pictures of ten-year-old Milton in custard-pie comedies with Flora Finch and John Bunny . . Pictures of him emoting opposite Pearl White in old-time melodramas, with Pearl, as Milt remembers her, always being pushed off "dangerous cardboard cliffs into a swirling torrent of water which usually turned out to be a pile of feather turned out to be a pile of feather

mattresses . . ."

If you look close enough, you'll see stage pictures, too, of Milton at eleven, at thirteen, at fifteen, touring the better vaudeville circuits, billed, much to Sarah's delight, as "The Child Wonder." Reviewing these childhood scenes for me, Milt also mentioned Irving Berlin, whom he remembers as a little anxious man dressed in khaki, even then struggling to gain a foothold in Tin Pan Alley.

"I first saw him on the stage of a neighborhood theater," Milt recalls, "plugging one of his own songs, "O How I Hate to Get Up in the Morning.' I was so impressed with it that I asked him to let me do a chorus."

ONLY once in his life was Sarah ONLY once in his life was Sarah Berlinger unable to help her son in his fight for stardom. "When I was sixteen," Milt said, "my voice began to squeak and crack, and for a while, the lean days were on us again." He was no longer the child wonder. He was a gawky adolescent—too old to play winsome kild parts too gangling to be a some kid parts, too gangling to be a romantic juvenile. So he had to go back and start all over again, this time

back and start all over again, this time as an adult.

But always Sarah Berlinger (Milt changed his name to Berle in 1922) was beside him, building up his ego, encouraging, helping.

Paradoxically enough, it took world depression to give Milt his first big break. In 1932, the management of the Palace found itself without a master of ceremonies, so they hired him to fill in. Night club engagements followed. Big time vodvil circuits. Recognition! It was what Sarah had dreamed for more than twenty years. Then one day Earl Carroll sent for him. "I want you for the Vanities," he said briefly.

All of which returns us to our starting-point—the picture of Sarah Berlinger in the Earl Carroll Casino, laughing at her son's jokes whether they were funny or not. She's still laughing.

Ear glued to loudspeaker, she laughed when he appeared on the Rudy Vallee program, when he guest-starred with Fred Waring for eight consecutive weeks, and again, when he took over Fannie Brice's show early this season. And if rumors are right, lots of other folks must be laughing, too, because they're saying now that the Community Sing sponsors will drop the Sing in order to star Mrs. Berlinger's little boy on his very own program.

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


