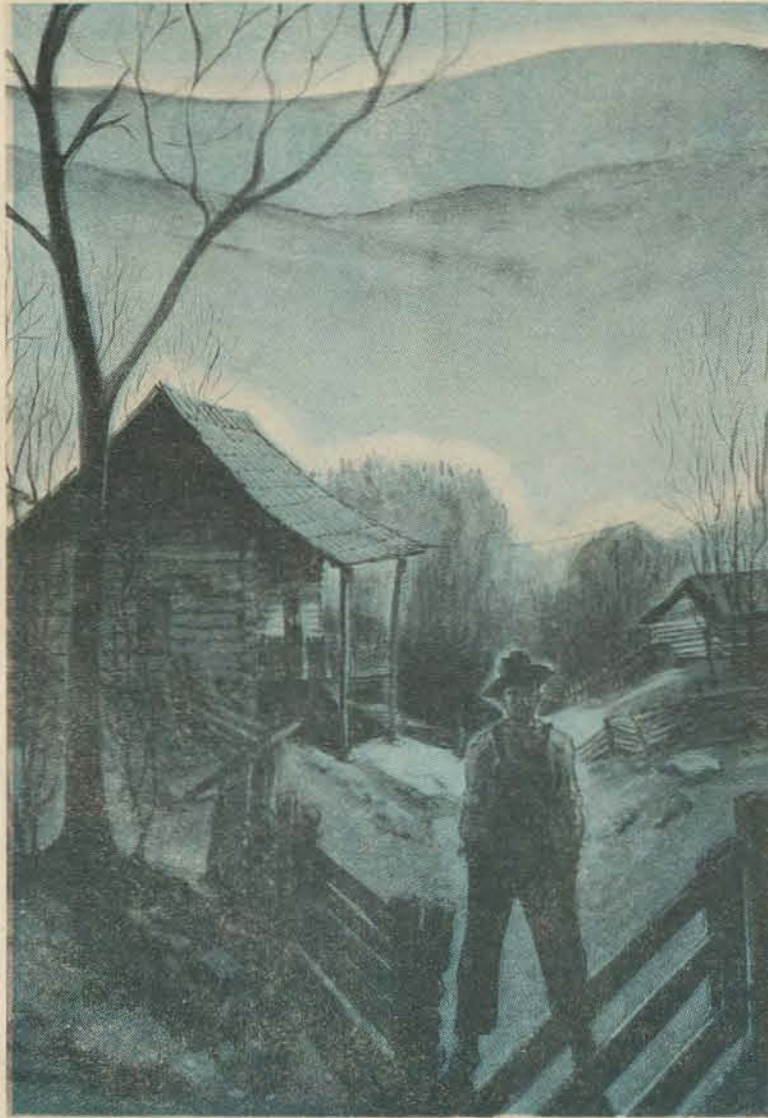

Mountain Magic



DEEP IN THEIR BELOVED KENTUCKY HILLS, THEY LISTEN IN AMAZEMENT TO A MODERN-DAY MIRACLE—RADIO!

THE boy was twelve years old, blond, freckled, ragged in blue hand-me-down overalls and cap. He looked at me in wonderment.

"What is a radio?" he asked.

What is a radio!

The boy meant it. He wasn't joking. He'd never heard a radio, never seen one. Radio was all news to him.

I can hear your questions. Where'd you find the kid? An African jungle trading-post? Siberia? Some head-hunters' village on the upper Amazon? An English-speaking twelve-year-old who wouldn't know a radio if you showed him one? We give up. Where did you find the kid?

I found him right here in the United States. I found him in a creek-bottom cabin in Knott County, Kentucky. His name is Benjy Robertson, and if you don't mind difficult traveling you can look him up yourself. He's an obliging little fellow who'll help hitch up a mule to haul your car out of the creek, and even tell you something about himself—if you ask him enough questions.

I asked him lots of questions, standing in the rain beside a bogged-down car, standing on—or in—the muddiest road in Kentucky, waiting for his father to hitch up the little white mule and haul us up the hill. All the regular questions. Did he go to school? What grade was he in? Had he been to town? He had answers for all of those. But radio? He'd never even heard the word!

Sit still a minute and think what that means. You're Benjy Robertson. You live with your father and your mother, brothers and sisters, in a creek-bottom cabin in the mountains. You've always lived there. Your father has always lived there, as his father did, and his father before him, as far back as anyone can remember. Your world is Knott County. A trip to the county seat, ten miles away, is an event. You've never read a newspaper. In 1931, a scant six years ago, the first car was brought into the county, and the schools and stores were closed, so that everybody could see it. From April until June, you're completely isolated. You've read all your books—yes, all three of them. The mailman gets in once a week, if he's tough—and lucky—and he hasn't any mail for you anyway. You just don't get much mail.

WHAT would you want most? To keep you in contact with civilization, with ordinary, every-day news; to take your mind off the four walls of a dingy one-room cabin, off the mud and the snow, and the creek forever swirling over the door-step—what would you want? Radio, of course. Any child knows the answer to that one, you say. Wait a minute. Any child? The Kentucky mountains are full of children—and adults, too—who not only don't know that simple little answer but won't believe it if you tell them!

Down at the University of Kentucky, in Lexington, there's a man named Elmer G. Sulzer. Mr. Sulzer is publicity director for the University,

manager of the University's radio station, and he has an almost fanatical interest in the mountaineers.

"Listen to me," he says, jabbing with an earnest forefinger. "Some of these people haven't materially changed their standards of living for a century or more. They're living as we lived a hundred years ago. They're driving ox-teams while the world goes by them in airplanes. They need help, and they need it badly!"

Two years ago, Mr. Sulzer went to work.

Books? Schools? Roads to the "outside"? The mountain people were getting these things, slowly, and they were valuable, although the books were few, the schools far apart, and the roads terrible. But the one thing that would do most, and do it quickest—radio—wasn't even thought of!

Sulzer worked on his own at first. Later he enlisted the support of the

University of Kentucky, private individuals, clubs and civic organizations. He bought radio sets—battery-powered, because of course there is no electricity in the mountains—packed them into isolated communities, set them up in carefully selected places in charge of carefully selected people.

SCHOOLS are generally selected as "listening centers," and community houses—usually in connection with a church—run a close second. Private homes are almost never used, because a radio set is so great a luxury, so immensely valuable to the mountain people, that it must be available to them at all times.

Responsibility for the set is vested in one person, a school-teacher, a clergyman, a village official—someone of proved conscientiousness. He is responsible for maintenance of the set, and for its proper use.

"Planned listening" is the key-note of the campaign.

"Anything these people hear on the radio is educational to them," Sulzer told me, "but we pick the best programs and try to see to it that they listen to them. The best way is to bring together a group of 15 or 20, have them hear a program, a political discussion, for instance, and then talk about it. That was the way we began."

Results were immediate and gratifying. Word of the new miracle spread fast over the mountain grapevine. Applications for "listening centers" poured into Sulzer's office. They were carefully sifted, checked, investigated, and as fast as money could be obtained, radio receivers went into the mountains. But the money wasn't easy to get. Radio was moving into the mountains, but it was moving slowly. That was the way things stood, up to a few months ago.

THEN one day a story telling of all this came to the RADIO GUIDE offices. Interested, editors looked for the story behind the story, found it in the need of this most primitive of American people for radio communication with the world outside. RADIO GUIDE, as representative of the radio industry, and of radio performers and fans everywhere, decided to help in the work Mr. Sulzer and the University of Kentucky had begun.

But before active work could begin, one question had to be answered. It was the same question that is in your mind right now: Do the Kentucky mountaineers really need radio? Is radio vital to them? In a way the question answers itself. Do you really need radio? But that isn't enough.

So I went to Kentucky. With me went three radio sets, gifts of RADIO GUIDE to three mountain communities.

EIGHT o'clock in the morning, a low, gray sky, a persistent drizzle of cold rain. That was the scene as Mr. Sulzer and I drove out of Lexington. The three receiving-sets were jammed into the back seat of Sulzer's "mountain car."

Twenty miles from Lexington, Lexington overflowing with crowds attracted by the opening of a new race-track, Lexington's hotels jammed to the roof with wealthy men and lovely women, the streets a parade of expensive cars—twenty miles from all this, we hit a gravel road, the foothills of the mountains came into view, and we had the first taste of one of the most startling contrasts in the United States: the contrast between the cities of 1936 and the Kentucky mountains—of 1776!

We lunched in Jackson, in the center of a county so famed for feuds, fights, and labor flare-ups that it has been known for years as "Bloody Breathitt."

From Jackson through Quicksand, then over a clay road, rain-flogged to gluey mud, through Lost Creek, to the little cross-roads village of Dwarf. The

only people in sight were five or six men sitting on the porch of the inevitable general store—sitting, quietly staring, saying nothing. A gas pump stood on lonely sentry-go in front, the last one, Sulzer explained, for some distance. We filled the tank, turned off the road, and headed for the hills.

The first scheduled stop was Vest, a mountain hamlet only eight miles off the highway. We never got there.

There's part of the answer to the question. Do the mountain people need radio? Are they really cut off from the world outside? Listen! Despite experience, a powerful car, and heart-breaking effort, we couldn't pound our way past the five-mile mark from the road. If we couldn't get in, how can the mountaineers get out?

The road to Vest ran along—and through—a little creek. Not much of a creek, at low water. The mountaineers told us that. "Not enough water in that creek to drown a pussycat!" Just enough to make traveling risky, uncertain, uncomfortable. In places the road ran along a high bank, slippery, sloping clay, studded with sharp rocks and tough, battered old tree-stumps. A narrow road, rutted, treacherous.

FOR miles we alternated between high bank and creek bottom. I lost count of the number of times the road slid suddenly down the bank into the creek, ran along the bottom, perhaps for thirty feet, perhaps for a quarter-mile, then climbed the bank again on the other side.

The car slithered along in second. On wet back-country roads eight miles an hour is fair speed, and it's safe to run at ten in the "good" places, but fifteen will ditch the best big-city driver who ever beat a red light.

In Vest, Thomas Sutton, school-

master, was waiting for the RADIO GUIDE receiving-set that had been promised his community. Three miles from Vest—a sudden jar as a four-foot section of Kentucky road dropped from under the wheels, slid into the coffee-colored creek; the rear wheels spun, the car tottered uncertainly on the crumbling edge of the bank, balanced, settled down—stuck fast!

BURNING rubber drifted in blue smoke from the wheels as Sulzer raced the motor. I pushed until I was breathless. The car didn't move an inch.

Still, we were in luck. Across the creek, set in a little clearing, there was a mountaineer's cabin, ancient, wobbly, weather-beaten. A man and two boys stood on the doorstep, watched us fight the car until we gave up. Then, calmly, unhurriedly, they walked across the creek, climbed the bank and looked us over. A mountaineer of 40 or so, and his teen-age sons. The man stooped to peer under the car, the two boys did likewise; he tested the firmness of the ground with a lusty kick; manfully, his sons followed suit.

"I b'lieve you're stuck, Cap'n," the mountaineer told Sulzer. "I'll fetch the mule."

Waiting for the mule, we talked to the younger of the two boys. His name was Benjy Robertson, he told us. He was twelve. He went to school "over there a piece." He'd been to town, yes, "sometimes." Hindman, the county seat, is about ten miles away. Benjy was a forlorn little figure, standing there in the rain, his hands in his pockets, his head hunched down. I looked around at his little world: the gray, ramshackle cabin, the ragged clearing, the creek, the road, mud-clogged and ugly, the eternal mountains. Here he would grow up, live out a narrow life, and die.

"Would you like to have a radio here?" I asked him.

"Radio? What is a radio, Cap'n?" I tried to explain, but it was almost impossible. I gave up as his father and the older boy crossed the creek, leading a little white mule. Five minutes later, the mule pulling, the mountaineer smoking the air with "mule-talk," Sulzer and the two boys and I pushing, the car rolled onto the road. Ahead the muddy track curved around a steep hill. Mule- and man-power might get us up. So for the next half hour we fought that car up the hill, foot by foot, inch by inch. At the top, winded, mud-splashed from head to heel, we knew we could never get through. Head down, trembling, the little white mule couldn't pull the car another foot. A second slope loomed ahead, the road axle-deep in mud. We turned the car around and slid it down the hill, the hill we had fought so hard to climb. Five miles later, back in Dwarf, we left the receiving-set at the general store, to be packed in on mule-back the next day.

There is no more striking loyalty than the loyalty of the mountain people to the South, to Kentucky, and to their own kind. I thought of that as I sat before an open coal fire in "The Teacherage" at Cordia, and listened to the story of four mountain children who grew up deep in the hills, shook off every tradition-rusted shackle, es-

caped to the "outside"—and then came back, of their own free will and gladly, to teach their people.

High on the side of a Knott County hill, its barked logs blending into the mountainside, there stands a big two-story cabin. This is "The Teacherage," in mountain parlance, and here four mountain women spend their days and nights, cheerfully living a life almost monastic in its rigor—so that their people may have a chance to learn.

THE Lott Creek Community School at Cordia. It sounds prosaic, doesn't it? It isn't. In truth, it isn't the name of a school at all. It's the name of a battle—a long, grim, hard-fought battle. A battle against an unrelenting nature, against time, tradition, indifference, poverty. It started when the first log for "The Teacherage" was rolled into place in 1932, and it continues to this day.

Two young mountaineers brought us into Cordia. Just after we left the highway to strike into the hills again,

we saw them walking ahead in the dripping, smoky dusk. Indifferent to the rain and to the puddled roadway, they slouched along. They were going home—eight miles! There was no room in the car, but we offered them the running-boards. In exchange, they told us of a short-cut to Cordia, and they rode in with us—that is, they rode most of the way. One of them fell off twice, the other, once. They took their tumbles with stolid indifference, walked slowly after the car until we could stop safely, then climbed on again, without a word. The man on my side—and he was a man—seemed surprised at my alarmed concern for him. He was quite all right, he said. A little thing like that . . .

SULZER explained in a low voice as we lurched through the dusk.

"Reason these people are like that," he told me, "is that they've been 'falling off,' so to speak, all their lives. They're used to hardship. They don't get sympathy, and they don't expect it. That explains their courtesy, too, and their helpfulness. They must help each other, constantly, or they can't survive." Sulzer's fervor mounted. He loves these mountain people. "In spite of all their backwardness," he blurted out, "I sometimes think the mountaineers are the most genuinely civilized people in Kentucky."

Cordia came suddenly around a bend to meet us. We saw the sturdy, square schoolhouse first, then, clinging to the mountainside a couple of hundred yards away, a neat stone path running down to the road, "The Teacherage." Our guides waited while we hurried up the path, carrying the second receiving-set. They stood huddled together beside the car in the rain, until I shouted back to them to get in.

"The Teacherage" was an astonishing place, with its low, beamed ceiling, its fireplace, a spinning-wheel in the chimney-corner, and everywhere, shelf after shelf of books. Most surprising, apart from its size—many mountain cabins have only one room—was the newness of the place, and the obvious care that had gone into its building.

While Sulzer set the radio in place and began the laborious business of attaching batteries, aerial and ground, I talked with Miss Alice Sloane—

mountain teacher. Her story is typical. Born in the hills, she wrung the last drop of knowledge from the mountain schools of her childhood. Then she went "outside." Four years later, armed with a college degree, bursting with eagerness to teach her people all that she had learned, she went back to the mountains—to stay. Her home is in Cordia, The Teacherage is her home, the mountain people—all of them, from seven to seventy—are her pupils, and a trip outside no longer seems worth the danger and difficulty.

She has four assistants: Miss Edna Ritchie, Miss Ernestine Stanford, Miss Mildred Davidson, and her brother, Robert Sloane. All mountain-bred, all in their middle twenties.

"We built all this ourselves," Miss Sloane told me. "The people came with tools and material, we cut the logs and built it all ourselves. Everybody is proud of it, especially proud of this house." She looked around the orderly "Teacherage." Smooth wall-panels, wide window-seats, the funny little stairway. "Young people come here now and tell us that when they get married, they'll build a cabin just like ours. Some of them will, too!"

THERE are four grades in the Cordia school—seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth—and 43 pupils. "Some of them come six miles over the mountains to school," Miss Sloane said, "and they're often here at 5 o'clock in the morning, clamoring for books to read before school begins."

Radio is going to mean something in Cordia. Not only to the school children—it will be invaluable to them—but to the grown-ups. Regularly they will gather in the big living-room of The Teacherage, around the blazing fireplace, to hear things they've never even dreamed! Everything will be new to them. Programs you take for granted every day will bring strange and wonderful secrets to the mountain people!

And the mountaineers are appreciative. In a Clay County cross-roads store I met a work-bowed old mountaineer who told me what radio would mean to the hill people.

"I b'lieve hit's the helpfulest thing in the mountains," he said. "My old lady, now, she gets a heap of good out of the radio set. She takes receipts down from a lady in Lou'ville, she listens to the jig-music, she hears about a heap of things she never heard about before, and hit takes her mind off her troubles."

"I wouldn't part with it, myself. Politics, now. Up here in the hills, you can find men who think old Teddy

Roosevelt is still pres-dent. That ain't right, and radio sets is the thing that'll fix it!"

The old mountaineer sat silent for a moment.

"You want to know how radio helps the mountain people," he said. "Well, young feller, you can write this down: Radio is the best road out of the mountains! And now I'm through talkin'."

A New York baritone was singing in the mountain stillness when we left The Teacherage, earnest thanks from five brave people ringing in our ears.

OUR guides took to the running-boards again.

"Hit's pitchy-black tonight," one of them said, "hit shorely is. You ain't never goin' to get over the Big Hill 'fore morning," he added cheerfully.

I answered him two miles later. I told him he was right. We'd been rolling up a creek, the water splashing around the wheels. There was no other road. On the right, the mountain loomed up. On the left, a willow-lined high bank. And dead ahead, a "pot-hole" in the creek bottom. None of us could

see it. There was a jarring lurch as the car nosed in, the motor sputtered dead, and water poured in around our feet. One of our mountaineers flew headlong into the creek.

He got up slowly, shook the water out of his eyes, took a deep breath. "y Goddie," he said sorrowfully, "I never seed that hole!"

There was a house half a mile "up-creek," he told us. He'd send a mule. An hour later four men came down the creek, bright little miners' lamps bobbing on their caps, leading a big mule. The mule brushed against me as he passed, stopped quickly, rose on his fore feet and kicked. "He kicks with both feet," one of the men explained apologetically, "but he ain't really a mean mule."

He was a good mule, though. When the mountaineers had waded into the cold creek water and hitched him up, he pulled the car a quarter of a mile to the road. An hour later, the motor dried, we started over the mountain. Our two guides left us. They'd had enough. They'd rather walk, they said. I'd had enough myself, but I couldn't walk—I didn't know the way.

ONE of them stopped me as I was getting into the car.

"The road is awful dangerous," he said. "It ain't safe a-tall at night. You better be mighty careful."

One of the mule-drivers offered us "a place to sleep the night," but Sulzer wouldn't think of it. The third of our RADIO GUIDE receiving-sets was due at the Hyden Community House in the morning, and on the subject of getting radio to the hill people, Mr. Sulzer is not rational. Rain or no rain, mountain or no mountain, we were going through.

I don't want another such ride.

The road climbed steeply upward. Twenty-four hours of rain had lashed it into greasy mud. Shelf-like, it clung to the mountain, a rock wall on one side, a precipice on the other. A three-foot skid meant certain death—and we skidded! Back and forth, from one side to the other, the wheels churning mud. But always Sulzer caught the car on the brink, wrestled it back to safety, handling it with infinite skill. Deep puddles pock-marked the road-

way, and when the front wheels hurled liquid mud against the windshield, we drove blind for perilous seconds. You stop a car carefully on such a road—or else!

We made the top—I still don't know how—and Sulzer stopped to rest. I looked out of the window at the ground. There wasn't any ground. The car was about a foot from the brink, and I was looking straight down—about 500 feet!

If we went over, my chances of getting out were nil.

I mentioned the matter to Sulzer.

"I was thinking of the same thing," he said. "If you don't mind getting wet, and if you think you can hang on, you'd better ride the inside running-board. Then if we go off you can jump, and maybe you can get the door open for me."

So I rode down the mountain on the running-board. I hugged the side of the car, but passing branches tore at me, I was bumped by rocks, smeared with mud, drenched to the skin. But I stayed on. And we came down the mountain!

As we rolled off the hill into the little mining town of Hazard, I turned to Kentucky's No. 1 Radio Missionary.

"You're a nice fellow, Sulzer," I told him, "and I like you—but you're crazy. I wouldn't go over that mountain again for five hundred dollars."

He answered quickly.

"If I had a set for those fellows who pulled us out," Sulzer told me, "I'd go back tonight. You forget that these people are a century behind the rest of the world. There's no time to lose!" You can't argue with the man.

AT HYDEN, in southeastern Kentucky's Leslie County, we left the third RADIO GUIDE receiving-set the next day, in charge of Mr. and Mrs. P. P. Estridge, who manage the big Hyden Community Center. Mountain-bred, "outside"-educated, they have dedicated their lives to the hill people. They watched Sulzer as he proudly nailed a bright blue-and-white "Listening Center" sign to the house.

"I'm glad to see that sign go up," Estridge told me. "It means—oh, more than I can say. More people coming to the Center. Ten times as much interest in what we're trying to do for them. It means new, higher standards of living. It means—well, they say a picture is worth ten thousand words. If that's true, a radio is worth ten thousand pictures."

Twelve mountain boys live in the rambling Community House during the nine months of the school year. They are in their middle teens, alert, eager, ambitious boys who have glimpsed the bright fields of knowledge outside their hills, and who are full of hopes that could not have come to their fathers before them. They want—and deserve—everything in the world can give them.

As Sulzer connected the set, they clustered around him in a tight little circle, and when the tense voice of a Louisville news commentator cracked into the room, they were breathless with excitement. They couldn't quite believe it. Their excitement was contagious—and enviable. They were enthusiastic as only youth can be; they were watching a miracle.

I walked down a long lane to the car with one of these boys. He had something to tell me. Would I like to know what he was going to be when he left school? I would. What was it?

"I'm goin' to be a radio-talker," he blurted out, "like that man we just heard from Lou'ville. When I get out of school, I'm goin' to Lou'ville and study to be a radio-talker!"

I'll bet the kid will do it, too.

"From what I've heard, those Pennsylvania Dutchmen eat coloratura sopranos alive," Gus Haenschen averred. "And even if they don't, you'll need a compass to find your way back to New York."

And Virginia knew that these and her many other friends in Manhattan were worried about her despite their quips—that they figured this was one of her whims that was very apt to have tragic overtones—a move which she was bound to regret.

However, if they had known Virginia as well as her adoring husband, Edgar H. Sittig, the cellist, they would have recognized a desire of sterner stuff than a whim—an urge long felt but unrecognized which owed its crystallization, strangely enough, to a Pekinese pup.

"Chin-Chin was really back of it all," said Virginia, housewifely and dainty in starched dimity, and remarkably amiable for one approached while baking a chocolate cake and asked for a magazine story.

I HAD known for years," she explained, "that, despite our friends and generally happy existence in the city, there was something vitally missing—a something I couldn't seem to lay my finger upon. It took Chin-Chin to bring it out.

"The funny thing about it was," she laughed, "that Hansi (that's her private name for her husband) must have been feeling much the same way as I, all along."

Summers spent before marriage in the Pocono Mountains of Pennsylvania had given him a taste for the simple life, he guessed. Would it work, he wondered, if they were to build a home down there and commute to the city on week-ends for radio work?

Would it work? There was the question. And though it did have alarming proportions when they sat down to discuss it, the idea lost none of its glamor for the home-makers.

Virginia knew that she'd miss her friends in town. And, if it were to symbolize those niceties of living to which she was so well accustomed, her Melba toast, as Munn was to soon point out, would be missed as well.

Her reception, once she reached the Pocono Hills, was another uncertain quantity. Would the glamor that attached itself to her name act as a barrier between her and the neighborly contacts with those country folk for which she so fondly hoped? She would never know until she had made the move.

AGAINST all this she pitted her desire to live close to nature—and people. A consuming desire to enjoy the business of living, not as a prima donna, heard weekly over the Columbia network in her programs with Rubino, the violinist, but as unpretentious as any one of her many listeners.

So off they went one morning, kit and kaboodle, down to the Pocono Hills. The first few months there they spent with Hans' father and sister

while completing plans for their own fieldstone house, which was to rest on a wooded hill surrounded by rolling acres, and miles from Stroudsburg, the nearest town.

It wasn't an altogether happy Virginia the greater part of that time. In fact, there were many occasions when she secretly wished herself back in New York. Delayed mail deliveries, not enough hot water—until now an accepted quantity—a limited luxury, and other admittedly minor complaints, all lent edge to her loneliness.

Virginia smiles now at her anxiety over getting off on the right foot with the genial Pennsylvania Dutch who were soon to accept her as one of their own. But it was no fun at first. She hasn't forgotten those first months when, on shopping bent, all eyes seemed turned her way.

She soon came to realize that this same honest curiosity would have been disclosed over a new tractor or mowing machine, but at the time it was tremendously harassing. She could all but hear their whispers—"So great an artist, yes, but can she put up fruit?—Will she be happy here with us who know so little of her world?"

IT WAS on such a shopping expedition that she found what she has always considered a champion in Mr. Tommei, the fruit and vegetable man. "Mrs. Sittig," he said in his quaintly explosive way, (she has always been Mrs. Sittig to folk in Neola) "there is something I should tell to you."

ladies of the church bake their cakes and with their men folk go to the green churchyard, where, one by one, each cake is placed on an improvised table of planks on a couple of sawbucks.

Around this, in a hand-holding circle, those who have placed a dime on their chances of winning parade to the music of Sciota's town band. When the band stops playing, the marchers stop marching. An appointed churchman spins an arrow that rests on a pivot upon the table, sights down its shimmering length and calls out the winner.

If, on the following afternoon, the townsfolk noticed any reticence on Virginia's part to fall promptly into the spirit of things, it wasn't apparent. And when someone suggested that Virginia and her husband separate far from each other in the circle, the better to enhance the chances of either to win a cake, she knew that the bars were down.

She credits that first "cake-walk" with breaking the ice—for giving her the coveted opportunity of becoming Mrs. Edgar Sittig, country wife and neighbor. Evidence came in the days to follow when all of Neola came up to the Sittigs' place, just getting under way in the clearing above the Creek Road, to pass the time of day and watch the work as it progressed on the stone house with the sloping eaves.

While Virginia plumbed her mind for recipes to swap with the women, Hans talked with the men. Charley Hobbs offered 600 feet of black walnut, fresh from his acres, for panels for the recreation room. Another suggested revamping the chimney design to assure its drawing in all kinds of weather.

THE bathroom fixtures caused Virginia some doubts. Gold-plated and fearfully shiny, she feared that some might consider that they were putting on airs. However, opinion seemed to be that if the Sittigs wanted that gold-plated truck in their bathroom, it was their own affair, but wouldn't it be a good idea to put it in the vault of the Neola bank for safe-keeping until it was screwed into place?

This, to Virginia's way of thinking, is a zestful commentary on the willingness of the people of her community to accept the outsider and his idiosyncrasies at face value.

In the year that has passed since they moved into their new country home, Virginia and her husband have

become so thoroughly acclimated to the ways of the hills that they feel almost out of place—and quite uncomfortable—when business forces them to spend protracted periods in town. Their suite of rooms at their New York hotel would appear to the average metropolitan "cave-dweller" to be more than commodious, but not to Virginia.

"It's not only the rooms that seem stuffy," she sighed, "but conversation and everything. Actually, I no sooner arrive in New York than I want to get out of the place and back home in the hills where Hansi and I can get up in the morning and look at the creek (she pronounces it "crick"), go to fires, and talk over fences about the ailments of Mr. Voige's calf."

Though it is difficult to picture this charming young woman reveling in the indisposition of calves, or even running to fires, it does point to something. Virginia thinks that it's proof of the age-old saw that if one wants something enough, and concentrates on it, it will always be found available.

"I can hardly picture myself doing the things a year ago that are daily occurrences now," she said, "but I love being able to do them. In wanting to be just a country wife and a neighbor, I guess I thought at first that it was something one learned to be, like—like a concert soprano or something." She found it wasn't like that at all.

And Virginia was more than delighted to find that the folks in the Pocono Hills got quite as much pleasure out of her radio work as from her excellent cakes. They are quite as critical of one of her talents as the other, too. She discovered this very early in the game when her closest neighbor, Charley Hobbs, brought her a prize turkey for Thanksgiving.

"Mrs. Sittig," said Neighbor Hobbs, who, though excellent farmer and breeder of turkeys, would not be apt to be taken by those who don't know him as a music critic. "I liked your 'Una Voce Poco Fa' last night so much better than those light things. It seems like they'd see that it's pieces like that that suit your style."

But greater even than her satisfaction in her personal triumph in making a dream come true, was the complacent feeling that came with the information that Munn, the tenor, and Bandmaster Haenschen had likewise moved to the great open spaces!

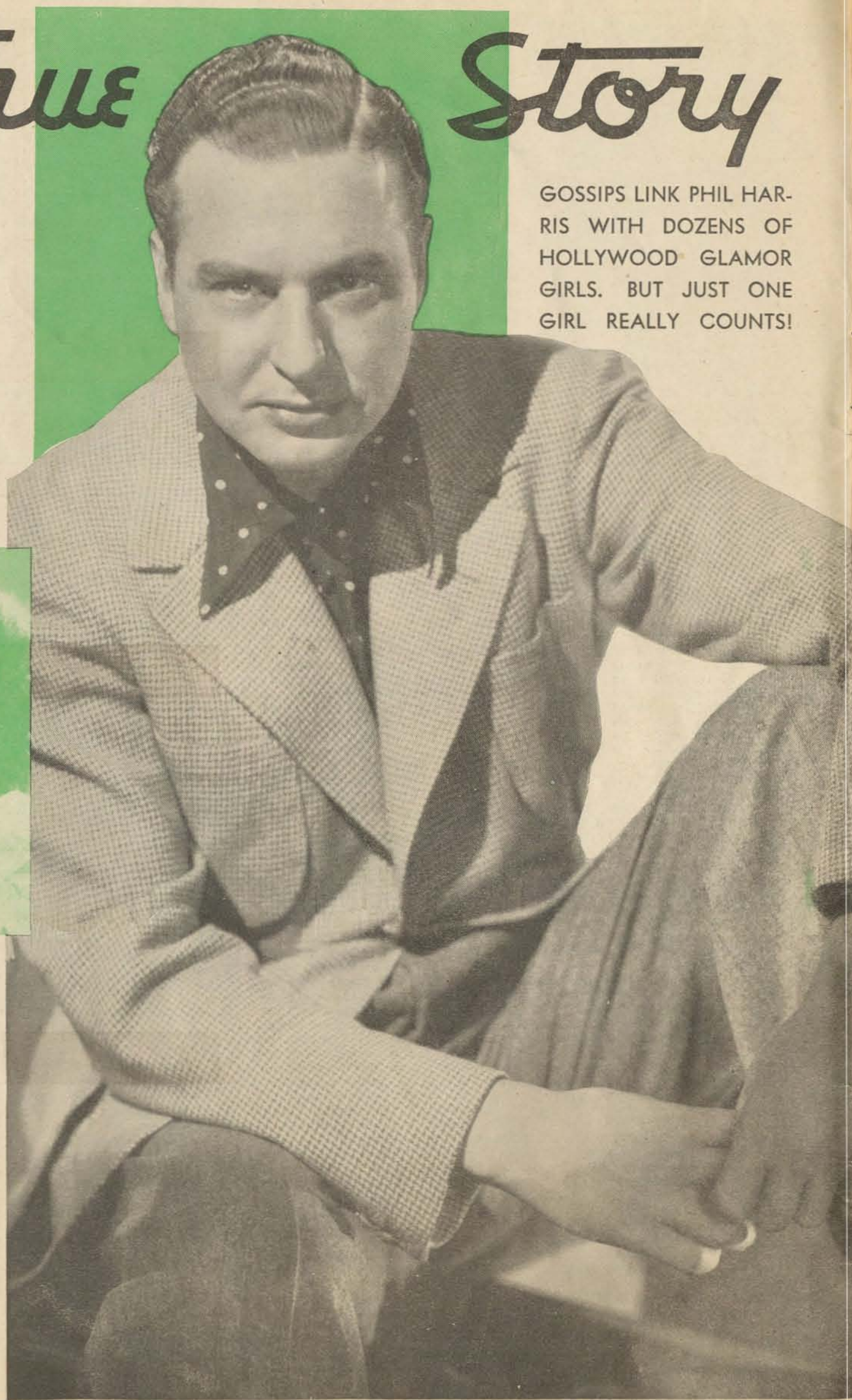
Marcia Ralston: She's been Mrs. Phil Harris for 9 years!

"MET" TENOR LAURITZ MELCHIOR!

THE pool-rooms of this fair land of ours are full of pale-faced gangling, cigarette-devouring bravos who guffaw at the merest mention of a writer, painter or singer and say—in effect—"Sissy!" I have met small-town business men who certainly should know better, but they say the same thing. Just what these Tarzans themselves have accomplished to prove their own superior masculinity is one of those mysteries which will never be solved, but they believe that artists of any description are effeminate.

All I can say is that I wish they could meet Lauritz Melchior.

Melchior is a tenor. What is worse, he is an opera tenor. When he steps out on the stage he puts on rouge, powder, lipstick and eyebrow pencil.

But this same Melchior weighs, I should say, something in the vicinity of two hundred and ten pounds, and nearly all of it is muscle. He stands about six feet two in his stocking feet. He was a ranking amateur boxer as

a youngster. And he can outwalk, outride, outshoot, outswim and—if it comes to that—outsmoke and outdrink any ten pool-hall Tarzans in Tufftown. They grow 'em big in Denmark.

Lauritz was born in Copenhagen. His grandfather and his father were founders and masters of a boys' school there known as the Melchior School. They had had much experience in educating boys, and their experience had shown that the best way to turn a youngster into a happy and successful man was to let him find his own natural bent and then follow it. From the start Lauritz wanted to sing. And his father, who did not think artists were effeminate, let him do it.

THE boy's mother was dead. The two women who were closest to him were the family's housekeeper, an extraordinary woman who later offered him her life savings when he needed money to study, and his sister Agnes.

Agnes was blind. (She teaches in the Royal School for the Blind in Copenhagen now.) She used to take Lauritz down under the stage of the Royal Opera House, where special boxes were reserved for the blind, and let him listen to the performances with her. There he sat, clutching her hand feverishly, his face the only one in all the rows of rapt faces with eyes to see, and listened to the glorious torrents of song overhead. He knew the music of a dozen operas by heart long before he ever saw one. And, as might have been predicted, he decided that it was in the opera world that he would find his place. He was admitted as a student at the Royal Opera School, reserved for the most gifted youngsters in Denmark, while still in his teens.

To jump from the beginning of his artistic history to the end, he made his American debut at the Metropolitan Opera House in New York in 1925 and he is today recognized by all critics as the world's leading Wagnerian tenor.

But to take up that side of his life which has nothing to do with his singing . . . We can skip the opinion of the pool addicts, since they don't mean anything anyhow; but lots of other people wonder what a man who sings in opera does with his spare time. Does he spend his free hours drinking tea and rhapsodizing over *Siegfried* with fat women in satin who carry little dogs on their arms, or does he lead the life of an ordinary human being?

MELCHIOR, it must be remembered first of all, must travel. The fact that he is the greatest living Wagnerian tenor means that whenever and wherever the Wagnerian cycle is being presented he must be summoned. He sings in Covent Garden in London, dashes to New York, dashes south to the *Teatro Colon* in Buenos Aires—he was on the *Graf Zeppelin* when it made its first trip to South America—and dashes back to the *Staatsoper* in Berlin. And then it's time for him to go to London again. But wherever he is, wherever his travels take him, you stand a better chance of finding him out in the country living in a tent than you do of finding him in a luxurious suite in the local Grand Hotel.

His Summers he spends on a three-thousand-acre estate in Germany, in the midst of a dense, wild forest. All

Danes love the out-of-doors. "I don't believe in singers wrapping themselves up in woolen shawls like a lot of old women," Melchior puts it, and the words are a direct reflection of his early days, when, to try to imitate his accent, he "bawx-ed." He can't box any more these days because, after he had his jaw dislocated a couple of times, doctors pointed out to him that singers with their jaws around under their ears might have a little trouble with their diction. But his outlook on life is still that of an athlete.

UNABLE to "bawx," he takes twenty-mile hikes, skis, swims, skates, climbs mountains and goes big-game hunting. Not long ago in South America, I should add, he had the spine-chilling experience of finding himself hunted instead of the hunter. He was in the La Plata River region shooting "viled picks"—wild boars, that is to say. While the native beaters skulked through the brush with their dogs to scare up boars, Melchior sat with characteristic stolidity under a bush and waited. To appreciate what that means you have to know something about wild boars. They are almost always hunted from horseback. To meet them on foot is to get your legs gashed by their tusks or, as has happened more than once, lose your life. The Danes, as Shakespeare realized when he wrote Hamlet, are a wonderful people!

At any rate, Lauritz was sitting solemnly under his bush when his eye caught a fleeting glimpse of yellow in

a tree-top near by. A moment later the mass of trailing lianas and flaming orchids still nearer him trembled almost imperceptibly. Imperturbable as he is, it gave him a tingling sensation to realize that while he, Mr. Melchior, was hunting wild boars, an equally wild panther was hunting him, Mr. Melchior! He had the choice of two things to do. He could keep his eye on the panther and wait for a shot at him, while at any instant an infuriated boar might come charging out of the jungle. Or he could keep his eyes open for boars and let the panther sneak up and drop on his back when it got overhead. Deciding that it was preferable to be gored than clawed, he sprawled on his broad stomach and trained his rifle on the gap between two trees. The only way the panther could get from tree to tree, he reasoned, would be to jump the gap, and while it was in mid-air he would be able to take a shot at it. If he only wounded it, of course, it would fall practically on top of him!

The panther jumped the gap. He caught it in mid-flight with a bullet. Then, calm as ever, he rolled back to wait for the beaters and the boars . . .

Incidentally, a word may be in order here as to Melchior's theory of hunting. He is shocked to the heart by our American "sportsmen" who go out during the deer season and kill everything in sight. He kills only danger-

ous or objectionable animals, and—on his estate at Chossiwitz in Germany—only those elk and deer which are old, or malformed and therefore poor for breeding purposes. Europeans long ago learned the lesson of conservation which we in America are only beginning to observe.

I THINK there is left little doubt that Lauritz Melchior is the possessor of a certain amount of physical courage. At a rehearsal at the Met not long ago, in the scene from *Siegfried* in which he forges a sword, he struck the anvil too hard a blow with his hammer and a jagged piece of metal splintered off and ripped a long gash in his leg. He tied up the cut with a handkerchief and went on rehearsing. That is not what I should call temperament . . . And, speaking of that sword, when he sang *Siegfried* for the hundredth time, more than twice as many times as anyone else has ever sung the role, the opera company decided to have a sword made and presented to him. "You want a sword to gift me?" demanded Melchior. "Good! I make one!" And he went out to a blacksmith shop on Long Island and hammered out his own version of a viking's two-edged weapon. It was rather fitting, somehow. He has a great deal of the viking in his nature.

But even more in contradiction of the traditional picture of the opera tenor is his rough-and-ready sense of fun. He makes no attempt whatever to stand on his dignity. In camp, where he spends so much of his time, he is

always the cook, as Richard Crooks will testify. His camp *chef d'oeuvre* is an ox-tail soup with brandy, which must simmer steadily for two days and nights—and the Lord have pity on whoever has to carry wood to the stove! He teases his wife until he drives her to distraction. She is a very pretty Danish movie actress who fell into his back yard—actually, since she was dangling from a parachute—while she was making a movie thriller, and he calls her *Kleine Fafnir*, *Fafnir* being the horrible dragon of the Wagner operas!

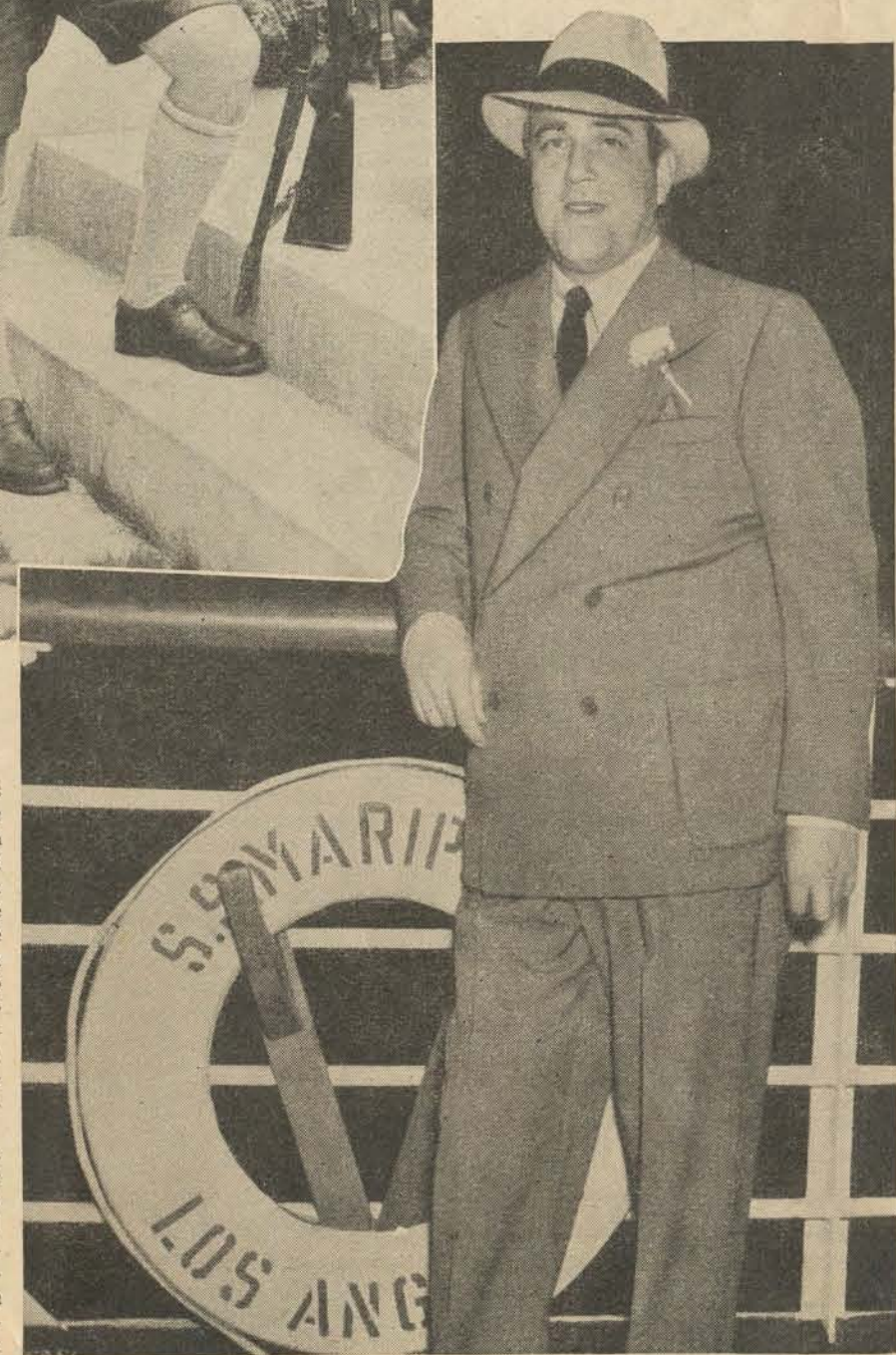
An American girl who visited at the estate in Germany last Summer made the serious mistake of sleeping with her windows open in good healthful fashion. Lauritz, an inveterate tinkerer, was out in the garden experimenting with a new pumping-plant in the early morning. He had it connected to a fire hose, and the open

window was not to be resisted. He knew where the bed was. His years of hunting have given him a good aim. There were shrill feminine shrieks and the bedroom had to be bailed out with buckets!

AND at the Opera surprise party in New York last year the socialite audience gasped to its diamond-studded heels—and no offense intended—when the curtains parted to reveal two acrobats in flesh-colored tights and what are impolitely known as G-strings. The ground man was tiny Lilly Pons. Floating above her on wires, suspended with one foot in the palm of her hand, was the enormous Melchior, beaming and blowing kisses to the balcony.

Colossal vitality, a roaring gusto, a laugh that a bull might envy—that gets him, in a few words! One of his best friends is Peter Freuchen, the explorer, the only living man who has ever crossed the Greenland ice cap. Freuchen froze his foot and chopped off his own toes with an ax. I don't think he is a sissy, and I don't think he would like Melchior so much if Melchior were one.

One thing more, and then I'm done. Pool-hall heroes please note: The greatest living Wagnerian tenor smokes big black cigars so strong that they smell like burning buggy-whips!



THERE was no doubt that the man was drunk. He was, in fact, tight, boiled, plastered, blotto and spifflicated.

"... a prowler in the rear at that address."

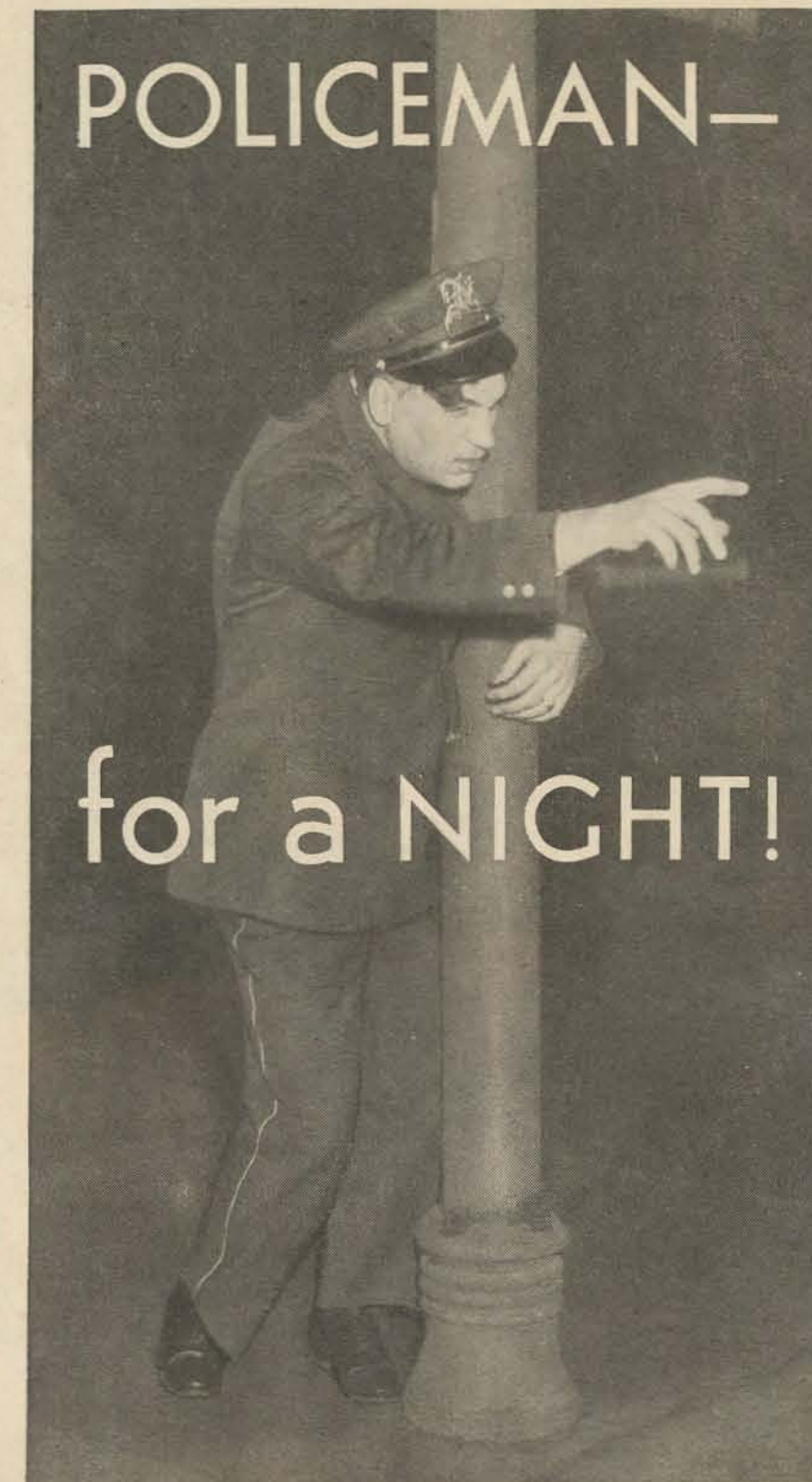
A pause, then:

"What do you want to know? My love-life, maybe? Me, a married man? I'm in love with my wife—that's not news. Or is it? Well, I didn't think you wanted to know about my love-life anyway. You don't look like a man who would want to know about my love-life.

"So if we don't talk about love-life I'll tell you about Fio-Rito the dual personality. That's a good story. First, I will tell you about the name Fio-Rito. If I don't, you'll spell it Fire-Eater, or Rio Rita or something. Instead it's F-i-o-dash-R-i-t-o. Just like Fio-Rito that famous bandleader. Ho ho ho. There is a man. There is a band. How I love that band!

"But about Fio-Rito the dual personality. Probably you won't believe this story. It is a true story. You want to know about songs I have written? Sure, hundreds of songs. Well, seventy-eight, at least, and hits, too. And you say why don't I plug my own songs more. I can tell by that you have been reading

my press releases. Still, it's true. I don't plug my own songs. I drive my publishers crazy. I plug other people's songs. They hate it.

"There is a reason for that. It's like this. First there is Fio-Rito the composer. Then there is Fio-Rito the musician. So Fio-Rito the composer writes a song. But Fio-Rito the composer can't take his song to Fio-Rito the musician and plug it, because Fio-Rito the musician would give him too much of a break. Maybe he would play the song all the time. So, to avoid this, I play my own songs only once in a while, and until they get going, I don't plug them. You see? It is all very clear, and plain.

"That reminds me of a song called 'Now That You're Gone.' I wrote that, and it was a hit. You remember that song? Ta-dum ta da. It went like that. Ta-dum ta da. Well, everybody else

was playing that before I even touched it. My publisher came to me.

"'Fio-Rito,' he said, 'do I have to beg you to play your own song?'"

"Once I wrote a symphony. Maybe you have heard that I'm writing a symphony now. Well, that is not true. When I was young—19—I wrote a symphony, and some day maybe I'll write another one. But you know how it is with that sort of thing. For that you have to lock yourself up and not answer the phone or open the door, do nothing but write a symphony.

BUT my son Tito, now, I'll bet he will write a symphony before he's 19. I'm teaching him piano right now. Probably you don't believe that. Tito isn't three years old yet, but every day I give him a piano lesson—five minutes every day. When he is a little older, fifteen minutes every day.

"I do it like this: Every day—at the same time every day, remember—I say, 'Now, Tito, we'll play the piano.' Then I say, 'Now, where is the bow-wow?' And he reaches down and strikes some bass notes. That is the bow-wow, you see—dog, bow-wow—that is how I make him remember. Then I say, 'And where are the little birds?' Then he strikes some notes high in the treble. Then I say, 'Now, sing doh.' So he strikes a note in the middle of the keyboard, any note, and sings 'doh.' We do that three or four times, no more, then I send him off to play. Five minutes is enough for a child a year and a half old. You have to be careful that it doesn't bore them so they hate to practise.

"With Tito, by the time he is seven or eight years old, he will love the piano so much that it will be like not eating all day if he doesn't practise. Then, a little later, he will be so good that he will enjoy it more than anything else.

"After that—he'll have his name in lights. 'Tito Fio-Rito!' I can see it now. Tito Fio-Rito is a swell name for the lights. Short, and catchy. We always call him Tito. His name is Theodore, like mine, but we never call him Junior. I wouldn't call him Junior. Tito is much better. That's the diminutive for Theodore. Young Theodore.

"Speaking of young, I suppose you know all the boys in my band are young. It would average 22 or 23. But when they are young like that they sometimes raise hob. You remember Candy? Sure, everybody remembers Candy. He was the fellow who played bass viol and sang bass and soprano at the same time. He was a wild man. I remember one time at Cleveland we were playing at the Mayfair room or someplace. Candy didn't work all the time, of course, he just did an act once in a while, and the rest of the time he wandered around amusing himself.

"One time we were playing some

nice, quiet, sweet number and everybody was dancing, and there were soft lights and everything was peaceful and swell. Suddenly I hear somebody yell 'Hey!' Then there is an awful crash. It sounds as if somebody had dropped a tray full of dishes. I turn around, and there is Candy, laughing at a waiter. The waiter was mad. It seems Candy tossed a plate at him when his back was turned and then yelled. The waiter tried to catch the plate. But he missed. Fio-Rito was sore, the waiter was sore, the people who were dancing were sore—everybody was sore but Candy. Candy is out on the Coast someplace now. San Francisco, I guess. He is a great guy, but he is young. He likes to move.

"We have had a lot of luck on the Coast. Not only long runs, and things like that, but we have had good ideas on the Coast—new and different effects and orchestrations, you know, things like that. That is the big thing in this business—something new all the time. You know that trick with the trombone. The slide? Everybody does that now. You go up or down with the slide—zooooo—like that. We did that first. We were the first to give viola a big place in a dance band, too.

"You think other bands have used my ideas? You should hear what I think! But I don't care. I have more ideas. And Fio-Rito is still working.

"But here I am talking all the time, and you probably want to ask me questions. You want to know where I was born, maybe, things like that? Or doesn't that matter? Anyway, it was in Newark, New Jersey, on December 20, 1900. I started to play piano when I was five years old, but don't let anybody tell you I was playing Liszt then, or Bach. First I played 'The Star Spangled Banner'—with one finger. My uncle gave me lessons. Then when I was sixteen I played the piano in a movie theater. Then when I was 18 I played piano with Ross Gorman's orchestra in Atlantic City. When I was 21, I was in Chicago, at the Edgewater Beach hotel, with my own orchestra, and I wrote my first song when I was 21, too. That was 'Love Bird.' Maybe it was not such a good song, but it was an awful lot of song, then, to me.

SINCE then I have just been playing. That's all—and that's plenty. Hollywood, New York, New York, Hollywood. Pictures, the Coconut Grove, dance spots, hotels, radio, all the time, all up and down the country. Some life, isn't it? Boy, that's what I think! I love it!

"Well, I'm late. Let's see, where was I going? Anyway, I'm late. Where's my hat? Where did I put that hat?"

"Wait a minute! There was one thing I was going to tell you. There was a story. You know, I was telling you about Tito's piano lessons. One day I was talking with Tito's doctor. I was telling him about the boy's piano lessons.

"The doctor said, 'So Tito is going to be a great pianist like his father, eh?'"

"'Great,' I said, 'he's going to be a genius!'"

"The doctor laughed. 'Oh,' he said, 'you mean like Eddy Duchin?'"

"Well, I am late. Good-by!"

There was a running down the hall. A door slammed. It was Ted Fio-Rito and he was gone.

NBC Symphony Presents New 'Gulliver'

The dean of American conductors will honor the dean of composers in a birthday tribute on Thursday, April 15, when Dr. Walter Damrosch conducts the NBC Symphony Orchestra in Edgar Stillman-Kelley's recently completed symphony, "Gulliver."

During this first radio presentation of "Gulliver," Dr. and Mrs. Stillman-Kelley will be present in the studio in Radio City. Both Dr. Stillman-Kelley and Dr. Damrosch will speak briefly on the program. Dr. Stillman-Kelley will celebrate his 80th birthday on April 14.

In 1913 Dr. Stillman-Kelley wrote a symphony called "Gulliver" in one movement, which was entitled "Voyage to Lilliput." The present "Gulliver," however, is an entirely new symphonic composition in four movements: "Through the Paleontoscope," "On a Strange Shore," "The Capture of Gulliver by the Lilliputians" and "Gulliver's Rescue and Return to England."

The symphony will have been performed only twice before, on April 9 and 10, when it was played by the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Eugene Goossens.

Dr. Stillman-Kelley is noted as composer of "New England," a symphony; "Alice in Wonderland" and "Aladdin," orchestral suites, and numerous choral works, symphonic poems and compositions for piano.

The program also will include the overture, "In Springtime," by Carl Goldmark, and both of Grieg's two elegiac melodies for strings, "The Last Spring" and "Heartwounds."

First Game Is To Be Aired On April 19

Spring is really here!

The umpire's cry of "Play ball!" at the first game of the 1937 baseball season in Griffith Stadium, Washington, D. C., on Monday, April 19, opens the radio season on sport events of the Spring and early Summer.

Among sports events scheduled for broadcast by the National Broadcasting Company alone are two opening baseball games, the famous Boston A.A. Marathon, leading turf events, including the Kentucky Derby, the America's cup races off Newport, R. I., track and field meets and the leading golf and tennis matches in this country and abroad.

Track and baseball come first on the NBC sports calendar. The season's opener between the Washington Senators and the Philadelphia Athletics, featuring the toss of the first ball by President Roosevelt, will be reported by Graham McNamee and Tom Manning from America's capital city, Washington, on Monday, April 19, over the NBC-Blue Network.

On the following day, Tuesday, April 20, the same two NBC reporters will be at Yankee Stadium, New York, to give a play-by-play description of the opening game of the World Champion Yankees versus the Senators. This game will be broadcast over NBC Stations WJZ, New York, and WMAL, Washington.

The Boston A. A. Marathon, one of New England's most celebrated track events, will be described to the NBC-Blue network audience on Monday, April 19. The start of the 19th annual running of the 25-mile race will be heard from Hopkinton, Mass., and the finish will be heard from the headquarters of the Boston A. A., on Exeter Street in the Bay State Capital.

The classic Kentucky Derby will be heard exclusively over NBC networks with Clem McCarthy, NBC's ace commentator of the raceways, at the microphone on Saturday, May 8.

Richard Bonelli Is New 'Universal Rhythm' Star

Richard Bonelli, star baritone of the Metropolitan Opera Company, will be placed in top spot on the new edition of the "Universal Rhythm" program beginning Saturday, April 17.

Alec Templeton, blind English pianist, the Landt Trio and Curia Mahr, and Rex Chandler's orchestra will round out the cast.

Bonelli, who has had an unusually active season, sandwiching in concert and radio work with his regular opera schedule, was recently voted "favorite of the opera" by the Women's Musical Clubs of New York. His "Universal Rhythm" offerings will include light classics as well as currently popular favorites.

Templeton, who came over from England with Jack Hylton's Continental Revue in 1935, is currently appearing at the Rainbow Room in Rockefeller Center and has been hailed by the critics as one of the best entertainers ever to appear at this top-of-the-town rendezvous. Coupling humor with keyboard versatility, his presentations range from currently popular songs and semi-classical to classical numbers.

He improvises compositions on the spur of the moment, working with any five notes suggested by the audience, and he weaves into a symphonic arrangement any four or five tunes the audience chooses to suggest. These requests are often as far apart as "St. Louis Blues" and the "Second Hungarian Rhapsody."

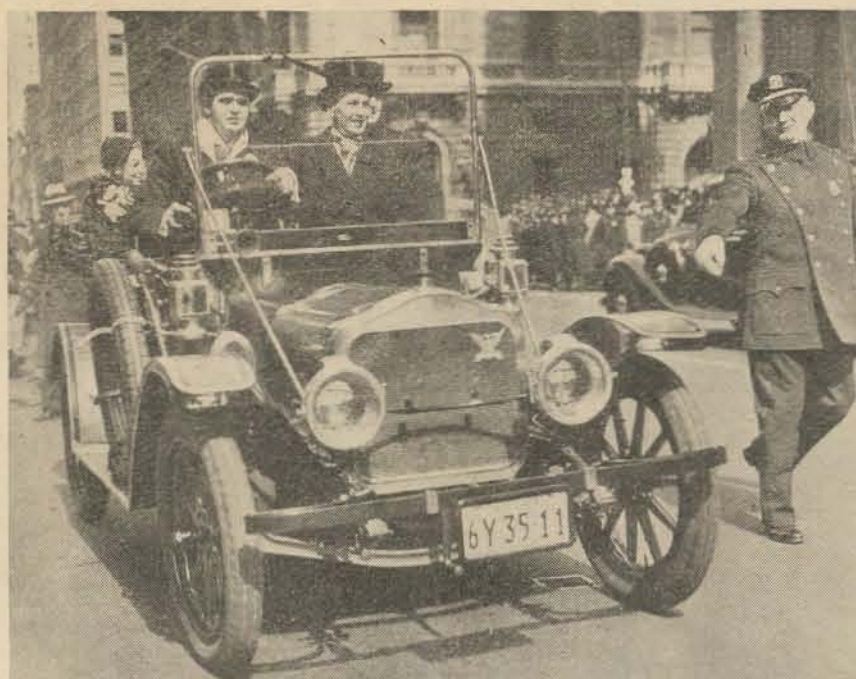
Miniature Railroader On Guest's Broadcast

Autos of Ancient Vintage Run In Fresno College Annual 'Hack Race'

Dilapidated, antiquated mechanical marvels of the past, struggling over a five-mile course with hazards including an irrigation ditch, hidden gopher holes and a heavily ridged abandoned vineyard, will compete in the Fifth Annual Fresno (Calif.) State College Hack Race on Friday, April 16, with a nation-wide radio audience listening to a bump-by-spill description of the event.

Restricted to automobiles more than 10 years of age and with a book value of not more than \$50, the race has become an annual Fresno event under the auspices of *The Collegian*, official publication of Fresno State College. The race is run on a 40-acre lot just outside the Fresno city limits. The course is seven-eighths of a mile in length, with five laps required to win. So rough is the going that last year only five out of 25 cars finished. A sixth car was pushed across the finish line by spectators so that all six prizes donated by Fresno merchants might be given away. The leading hack completed the race in 17 minutes.

An average of one car a year catches fire. Rarely does a hack end the gruelling drive with all parts intact. Repairs are not permitted during the race; unless a hack is able to finish without assistance it is ruled out.

Stationed at three vantage points will be two NBC announcers, Cliff Engle and Dresser Dahlstead of San Francisco, and Announcer George Ross of KMJ, NBC affiliate in Fresno, who will bring radio dialers a vivid word-picture of the laughs and thrills which accompany each race.

Artist of the Week LILY PONS

LILY PONS is the reigning coloratura of the decade, the foremost stuntster of her species, at whose cackling outbursts manicurists and taxi-drivers alike stop and marvel. She continues in the ancient line of ranking prima donnas: Patti, Jenny Lind, Melba, Tetrazzini, Galli-Curci. For a century now one or the other of them has ruled the soprano roost.

Patti established their right to regal acclaim once and for all. She was the first to travel in a private car, the walls and ceiling of which were covered with gilded tapestry. The curtains were of silk damask, and the furniture was upholstered in the same material. Her drawing-room was fitted in white and gold, with paintings by celebrated artists. The lamps were made of gold and the woodwork was of sandalwood. The same wood was used in the piano . . . and in that day, no king or emperor enjoyed such

luxurious, traveling accommodations. Since that time, the public has come to believe that nothing is too good for the singer who has the public at her feet. Into such a position did Lily Pons ascend when, a poor French girl, unknown in her native country, she made her sensational debut at the Metropolitan.

Not the possessor of the greatest natural voice in the world—it was and is very small, though a natural coloratura—Miss Pons has had the foresight to make the most of it and to manage her career wisely. By continuous study, she has improved her voice in power and expressiveness, not to mention exactitude of pitch. For years, she was afflicted by an uncontrollable nervousness. As soon as she knew she must sing, she would faint and take to bed. She lived in mortal fear of making a mistake. After all, coloratura singing is not unlike walking

a tight-rope. Stage fright she has overcome and, during her years with us, she has endeared herself to thousands by her unaffected charm. Those who know her personally count her among their most refreshing friends. She has learned what "eet ees zat zee American publike wants . . . and she ees geeving it to them."

Sunday the New York Philharmonic-Symphony Society concludes its ninety-fifth regular season and its seventh consecutive year of weekly broadcasts. Since the advent of radio, it has offered—as befits the country's foremost and oldest symphonic organization—our premier broadcast music series. Next Winter it will be back at its old stand again for a twenty-eight-week period, four weeks longer than this season. John Barbirolli will be the conductor for all its broadcasts except four in mid-season, at which composers Georges Enesco and Igor Stravinsky will be in charge.

A question buzzing about in many listeners' minds is whether the Philharmonic-Symphony concerts will continue to maintain their pre-eminence. While Arturo Toscanini was the organization's musical director, there was no question of doubt. Other conductors might come and go; standards of performance might vary, but during those weeks when the incomparable Italian stepped on its podium, the Philharmonic-Symphony played as no other orchestra in this or any other country. It was in fact as in reputation the world's greatest orchestra.

That period, alas, has come to an end. The orchestra has entrusted its leadership to a young and talented Englishman of Italian parentage, a man of sincere and hopeful aspirations, Mr. John Barbirolli. He commands respect from his men and his audience. The orchestra plays as he wishes. But he is a young man . . . and his conceptions are not those of a mature master. It will be interesting to hear him grow, and, if he "has it in him," as they say, the Philharmonic-Symphony will indeed be fortunate.

The orchestra's management and directorate evidently felt that of guest conductors there had been a sufficiency. Anyone permanent would be welcome. There are undeniable advantages accruing from a single permanent conductor. Much depends on the leader.

Certain it is that when those in charge of the Philharmonic-Symphony offered Mr. Barbirolli a three-year contract they had no inkling that Mr. Toscanini would return to New York.

Marion Talley is signed to return next fall with Josef Koestner, conducting . . . Now that the Metropolitan is leaving us for a few Saturdays, you can hear Opera from Radio City Music Hall, if you can tune it in—there aren't enough outlets—and if you don't mind none too accomplished soloists . . .

A Synopsis of The Metropolitan Opera

With Rosa Ponselle singing the leading role, the opera "Carmen," broadcast from Cleveland, brings the current Metropolitan season to a close on Saturday.

Among the three or four most popular operas of all time, "Carmen" came to its deserved recognition but slowly. Chief obstacle to its success was its originality. The work appeared at the time Wagner was bursting into a startled—and, in the main, alarmed—world of music, and the conservatives frankly expressed their belief that Bizet was merely an imitator of Wagner: a belief that brought him little credit in their minds.

"Carmen" was not to be denied, however. Its greatness was manifest in the first overwhelming success of its London performance, and it remains today on the pinnacle of immortality.

The first act of this spirited master-work of Bizet is laid in a public square in Seville. The curtain rises on a group of girls, workers in a cigarette factory, whiling away the noon hour. Outstanding among them is Carmen, who is openly expressing her pique at Don Jose, a soldier of the garrison in the town, who is indifferent to her charms. She sings the fascinating, sensuous "Habanera," the first air of the opera.

Don Jose's fate is sealed with this song. He cannot now forget Carmen, even when Micaela, his betrothed, appears with a letter from his mother.

After Micaela's departure, Don Jose's attention is drawn to the cigarette factory. A commotion has broken out. Carmen, quarrelling with another girl, has stabbed her. Arrested, she is placed in the custody of Don Jose.

Experienced as she is in the arts of love, Carmen wastes no time. She sings for Don Jose—and to him—the world famous "Seguidilla," a dance-song. She makes violent, and obvious, love to him. And he cannot but be moved. She begs him to untie her arms. He agrees. The soldiers come to take her away, and in the confusion, she escapes.

Carmen has gone to a tavern in the suburbs of Seville, a place frequented by gypsies, smugglers, and the like. A wild gypsy dance is in progress, and Carmen makes a new friend—Escamillo, the toreador. Escamillo sings here one of the best-known songs in all opera: The "Toreador" song. (Incidentally, in the idiom of the bull-ring, there is no such word as "toreador." The generic term for bull-fighters is "torero," but Bizet, a Frenchman, may be excused for his ignorance in this regard.)

Now, Don Jose is heard singing in the distance. Carmen begs him to join the band of gypsy-smugglers—but even as she begs, the sound of soldiers' trumpets is heard in the distance. Carmen, annoyed with Don Jose's indecision, tosses him his cap and sabre, bids him leave. Now his passion overcomes him, and Don Jose sings that great love song, the "Air de la Fleur." In spite of all, Don Jose is determined to go back to his duties as a soldier—when suddenly his captain, Zuniga, enters the inn. Zuniga orders Don Jose to leave, and insolently eyes Carmen. Enraged, Don Jose flings himself upon his superior. The fighting men are separated, but the die is cast—Don Jose cannot now return to the army. He has disgraced himself.

Act III opens in a rocky pass. Don Jose, passionately in love with Carmen, has forgotten the army, his mother, and his betrothed, Micaela. He is Carmen's slave. It is night. The smugglers, with their bundles, appear. Carmen, gypsy-like, reads her fortune in the cards; and finds the dreaded spade—the sign of death—ever reappearing.

Escamillo, come to rejoin Carmen, is fired upon by Don Jose, but escapes unhurt. The rivals are about to fight when Micaela again appears, this time with the news that Don Jose's mother is dying. Together, the rivals depart.

The final act of the opera is set before the entrance to the bull-ring of Seville. Carmen enters with Escamillo, who takes leave of her as he enters the ring with the song "Si, tu m'amas" (If you love me). Carmen knows well enough that Don Jose is near by: she resolves to face him. She will meet her fate. She does not have long to wait. Don Jose pleads with her, begs for her love, knowing even as he does that her heart is with Escamillo. She does not deny it, and Don Jose, drawing his knife, rushes upon her. Thus Carmen meets her death.

Across Jackson to Michigan Boulevard, the procession wended and then north to the Drake, where by order of Mayor Edward Kelly, Whiteman was crowned King of Music for the Chicago Civic Charter Centennial celebration. Present at the coronation were his alumni and discoveries, Tenor Jack Fulton and the King's Jesters, the latter dressed as jesters in honor of the event . . . Comment: Paul beat two circuses, now showing in Chicago, to the draw by two days with his parade!

Speaking of the Big Top, last Saturday evening (April 10) may be

UMBRELLA COURT

UMBRELLA COURT IS ON THE AIR!

The lively tune of "Let a Smile Be Your Umbrella" roars out from the organ in the KSTP studio and the largest audience that regularly listens to a Northwest program settles back for a half-hour of fun—and education.

When the managing editor of the Minneapolis Journal asked the promotion department to build a program that would inform the people of the Northwest on subjects of general interest, it looked like a huge task. Bob Barclay, alias Mark Question, genial Judge of Umbrella Court, finally hit upon the present program. He felt that it would be not only a good idea to inform the people, but he also felt the listeners should have a part in the show, as well. The question-and-answer routine was an obvious necessity,

on the principle that the umbrella of community knowledge may ward off many a shower of community misunderstanding and misery."

The court is rapped to order and the first quaking witness comes before the bench. Here, while drawing four questions from the inverted umbrella, said witness gives name and address, and if young and pretty, perhaps the telephone number. The judge waves the witness to the stand and begins the interrogation. Sometimes an obviously wrong answer will send the spectators into gales of laughter and the bailiff has to restore order in the court. Recently a witness was asked, "Who is to be football captain this coming season at the University of Minnesota?" It was possible the young lady would not know, but when she said Bernie Bierman, who is nationally known as the Minnesota coach, the roar of laughter

but to get away from the old "bank night" pattern he decided the questions would be drawn from an old inverted umbrella. To add color, and not a little noise, he installed a fire siren to greet correct answers. For those sorry people who broke down on the witness stand he prepared the mating-call of the wild duck, better known as the "raspberry" or "Bronx labial bouquet." Perhaps the witnesses, as the "questionees" are called, find solace in the fact a first prize of ten dollars awaits the winner each court session. Three other prizes of five, three, and one dollar each are given runner-ups.

MR. BARCLAY carefully reads the letters of application, picks witnesses representing young and old age-groups and usually equal numbers from both sexes. These witnesses receive a special subpoena commanding them to drop all business on a certain date to appear in Umbrella Court. Since early last Fall, when the program began its run, there has been only one violation of this summons.

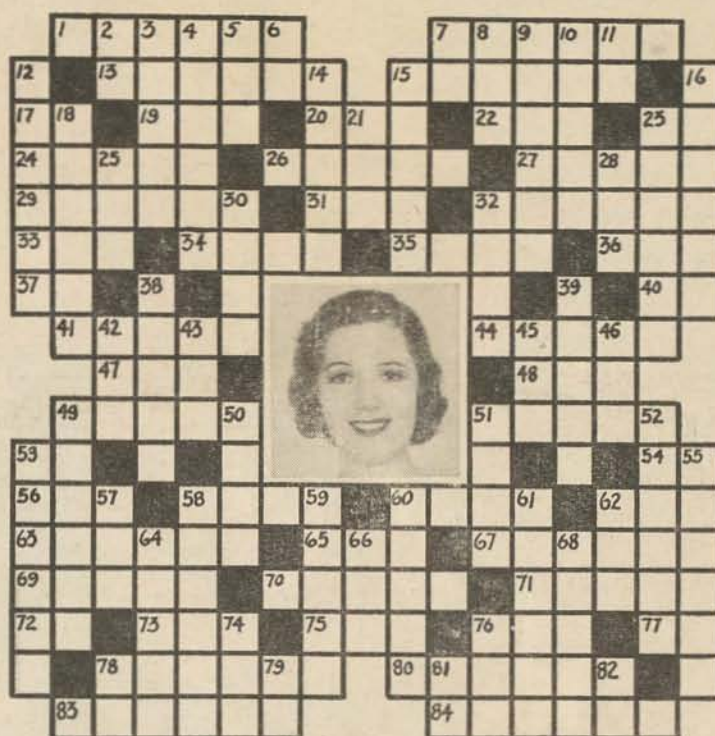
The KSTP studio in the Radisson Hotel, Minneapolis, is packed to overflowing a half-hour before the program begins. There are no admittance cards and the line of waiting fans extends far down the hallways. Following the theme and opening announcements, Tim Ramsland, clerk of court, introduces the judge of community affairs, Mark Question. Somberly clad in a flowing black gown the judge begins: "Here we go—here we go. What you are is what you know—or vice versa. You stand tonight before the bar of Umbrella Court, designed

drowned out the plaintive call of the "raspberry." Incidentally, the same night a witness was asked to name the athletic director at Minnesota. Again it was possible that a non-student wouldn't know this, but when the young man said Lotus Coffman, who happens to be president, the audience went into minor hysterics. Sometimes the questions deal with observation, such as, "How many passenger elevators are there in the lobby of this hotel?" "How many light globes are there on each post?" "How many coin tubes are there on the coin-changers of the Minneapolis street car conductors?" Invariably these questions are stumbling-blocks for the witnesses. Questions are asked concerning points of interest in the Twin Cities and surrounding territory. When some unusual story has appeared in the newspapers a question may be asked concerning the main character. Facts of general knowledge are important.

THE participants' scores are kept on a blackboard with correct answers counting twenty-five points and ten points deducted for wrong answers. A perfect score is one hundred and fifty points and in the history of the court, there has been only one person to attain this goal. If ignorance is bliss, the average Umbrella Court witness is inclined to be somewhat blissful.

Umbrella Court boasts of being one of the original radio programs of its type, and though lately similar set-ups are heard over national hook-ups, the cleverly put questions and the informality of Umbrella Court make it the most popular show of the Northwest.

THE COVER PORTRAIT

BENAY VENUTA flutters the lids of her blue-gray eyes as she says the notion that she is descended from Benvenuto Cellini is "probably just a gag!" But then she tells of her own life—very little, if any, less intriguing than that of the Italian goldsmith.

Benay was born in San Francisco, and went through her early educational paces in Los Altos, Palo Alto and Hollywood. In Hollywood High School, some of her classmates were Karen Morley, Sally Eilers and Kathryn DeMille. She broke records as captain of the high school swimming team—and put into effect the theatrical ambitions she'd had since the age of four. She wrote several original plays, and acted in school theatrics.

Then, with the encouragement of her parents, she joined a Fanchon and Marco unit at Grauman's Egyptian Theater, in Hollywood. After three years on the stage, she was taken to Europe by her grandfather, and placed in a finishing school. "Very trying," she calls the days when she was the

only American girl at the Beaupre, in Geneva.

She turned down an opportunity to be presented before Their Britannic Majesties so she could return to Hollywood. In 1930 she made her first radio venture in San Francisco. Then, on a hunch, she went to New York and WABC. That was the beginning of a radio career that has brought her voice to millions of listeners.

Her fascination of the sea has also taught her its dangers—for, in the West Indies, she once knew the thrill of having sharks surround a grounded yacht on which she was—theoretically—looking for sharks! Later she was without food or water, when a yawl was becalmed in the Mediterranean.

But she also enjoys less precarious diversions. She likes to paint furniture, and take snapshots, which she later tints. Proudest of all her hobbies is her ever-growing music library. And listeners will affirm that she's making the most of it. Her air appearances prove it!

Editor, RADIO GUIDE: Nobody interested in progress would deny the talented neophyte his merited opportunity. Formerly, in theatricals, as in every other line, apprenticeship was provided for in the regular manner. The worthy and ambitious performer crashed the profession in the time-honored manner by becoming a professional in a small way and making good on his opportunities. In my opinion, the notion that a mad scramble of talent is necessary to produce the best available is the veriest poppycock.

And why any particular credit for the promotion of amateurism on the air? The idea certainly is neither novel nor original. Amateur nights were long a feature of houses devoted to the lower branches of theatricals.

SHORT-WAVE reception during the past few days has been the poorest in weeks. Signals in general have been weak, noise level high and Summer static noticeable even on the 25-meter band. Despite this, however, European stations continue to provide quite satisfactory reception. EAQ-2 (9.488) of Madrid, Spain, is particularly noteworthy in that it is providing consistently heard signals of remarkable strength. DJD (11.77), at the moment, is furnishing the best entertainment value of the Zeesen stations, while GSD (11.75), with slightly weaker signals, is the best of Daventry's evening transmitters. TPA4 (11.714), Pontoise, France, is well heard from 9 p.m. EST (8 p.m. CST) to sign-off. The Czechoslovakian transmissions to North America, Mondays and Thursdays, commencing at 8 p.m. EST (7 p.m. CST), are enjoyable at present over OLR4A (11.84). Morning reception on the 16-meter band has improved considerably with GSG (17.79), Daventry, the best of the group. Reception from the Antipodes has been weak and unsatisfactory, with PLP (11), Bandoeng, Java, and VK3LR (9.58), Melbourne, Australia, still being received with fair strength.

VK6ME (9.59) of Perth, West Australia, is now operating week-days from 6 to 8 a.m. EST (5 to 7 a.m. CST).

Afghanistan will have its new 20,000-watt short-wave transmitter on the air before the end of this year.

The new Illinois state police radio network consisting of WQPC, Chicago; WQPG, Sterling; WQPP, Pontiac; WQPM, Macomb; WQPS, Springfield; WQPF, Effingham and WQPD, DuQuoin, each operating on a frequency of 1610 kilocycles with a power of 1,000 watts, was officially inaugurated on April 9.

The Australian government is contemplating high-power short-wave stations capable of disseminating throughout the world an Australian official news and publicity service. The plan calls for a group of six separate transmitters and a network of twelve semi-beam type aerials.

A VERIFICATION received by G. W. Rockwell, Halifax, Nova Scotia, states that PJC1 are the call letters of the new short-wave station owned by the Curacaoese Radio Vereeniging at Willemstad, Curacao, Dutch West Indies. The former frequency of 9.47 megs has been abandoned, on account of interference, in favor of 5.93 megs, but a new frequency on the 31-meter band will be utilized just as soon as a crystal can be ground. The station operates daily from 6:36 to 8:36 p.m. EST (5:36 to 7:36 p.m. CST).

CQN, Macao, is reported to be operating on a new frequency of 10.065 megs, where it is being heard weakly on Mondays and Fridays from 7 to 8:30 a.m. EST (6 to 7:30 a.m. CST).

HCJB, "The Voice of the Andes" and the pioneer missionary broadcaster in South America, located at Quito, Ecuador, at present broadcasts simultaneously on 4.107 and 8.948 megs daily from 7:30 to 8:45 a.m. EST (6:30 to 7:45 a.m. CST), and daily except Mondays from 11:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. and from 5 to 10 p.m. EST (12:30 to 3:30 p.m. and from 6 to 11 p.m. CST).

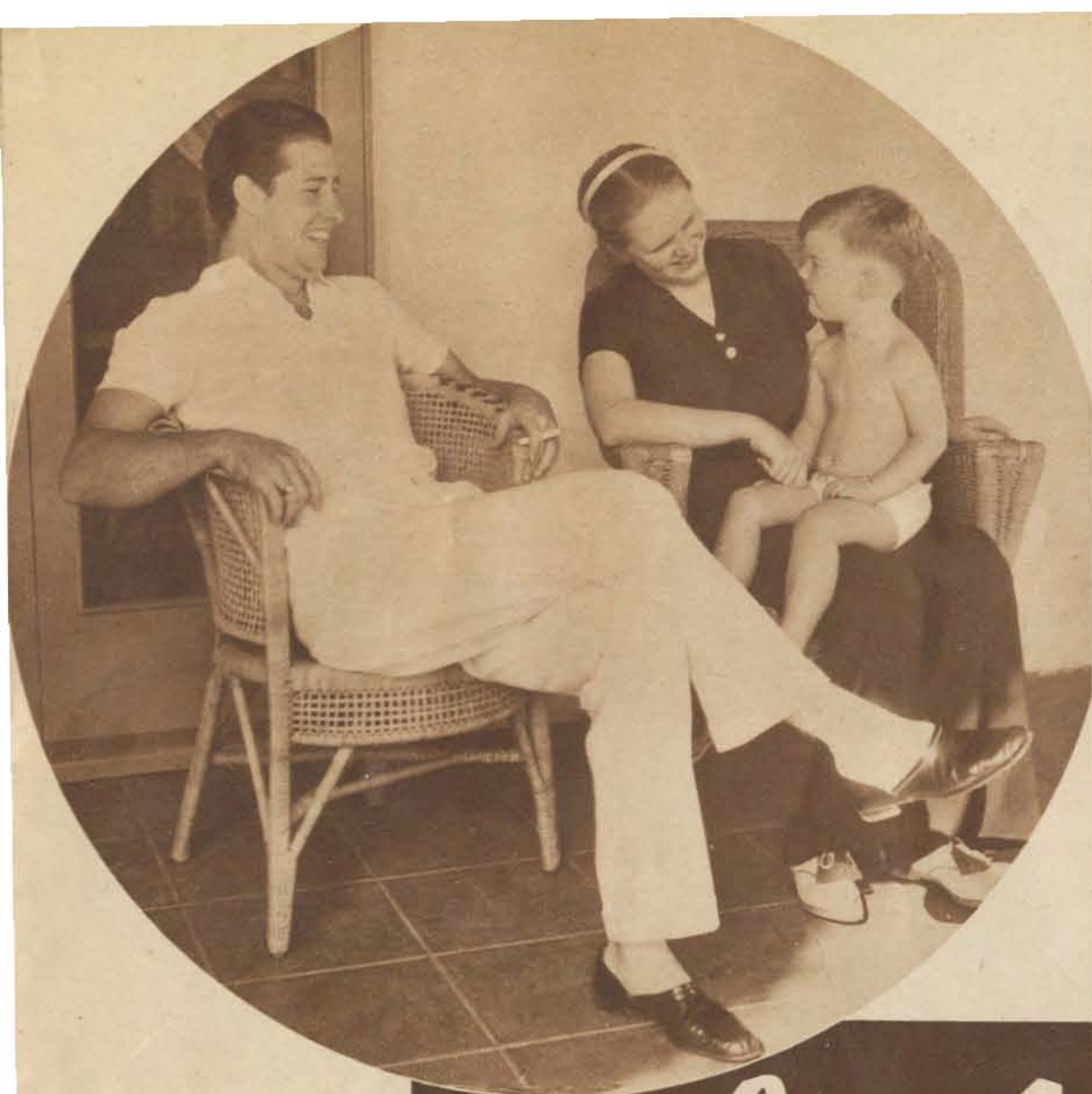

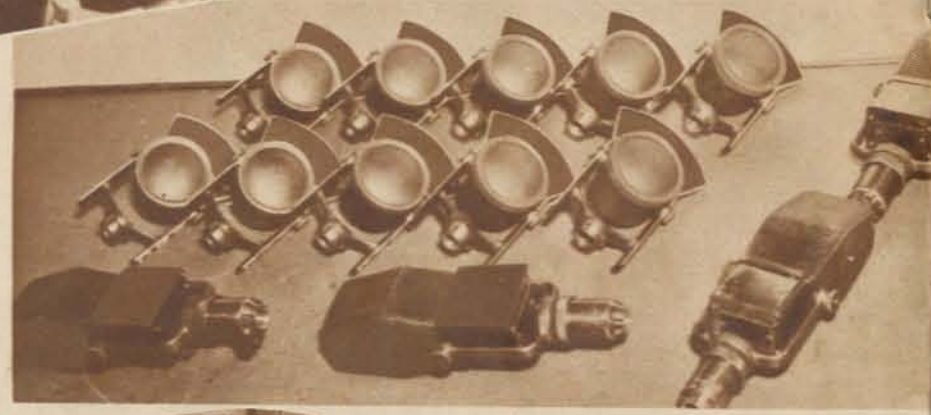

Above: Teletypes, operating like typewriters by remote control, provide NBC with United Press and Press Radio Bureau news. Flashes are rushed from here to the news desk, or broadcast over the mike standing behind the men



Above: Here are some of the mikes used by NBC Field Men while away from the studio. Mr. Jacobson has over 200 microphones of all types and sizes in his department, valued at about \$14,000. They're kept ready for use at a moment's notice—so Special Events men can "grab 'em and go!"

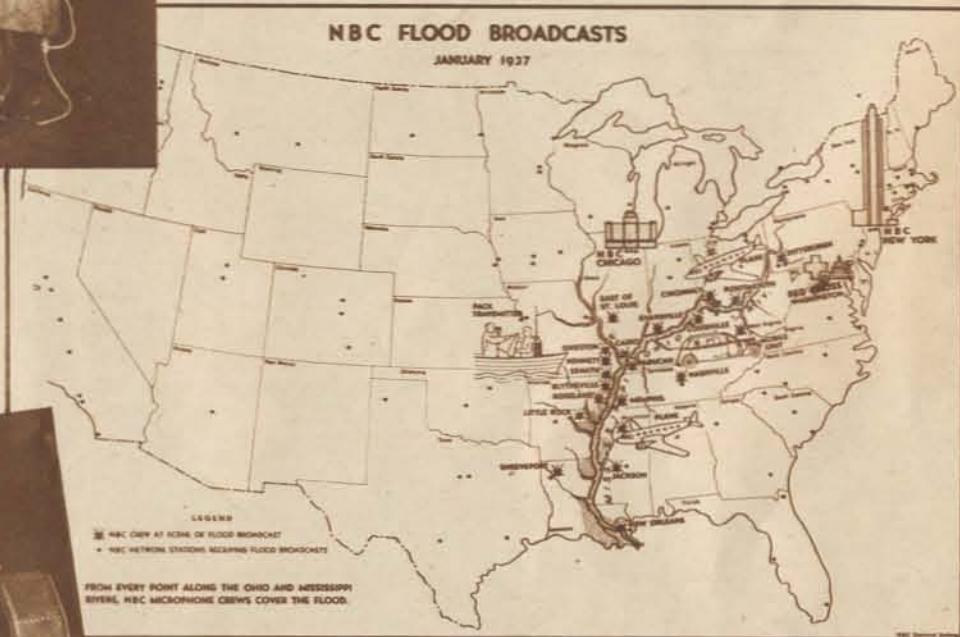

1. Three generations ago! This dignified old man is Aaron Perlman, father of Louis Perlman, whose son Jacob Perlman you know as Jack Pearl! This rare old photograph was taken in 1875, in Warsaw, Poland

2. The second generation. Louis Perlman came to America and married here. This rare picture of Jack Pearl's mother and father was taken in New York City on their wedding day, January 1, 1893



5. Here's a real rarity! It's an honest-to-goodness school report card, issued by the Department of Education in New York City, vintage 1908, and Jack took it home to his mother and his father in February of that year. It shows Jack's real name, Jacob Pearlman

6. In 1912, Jack Pearl went to a photographer in Mobile, Alabama, and had a series of pictures taken in what he fondly imagined were "dramatic poses." The photo above, least dramatic, turned out the best. He wanted to illustrate to booking agents his ability to do these poses

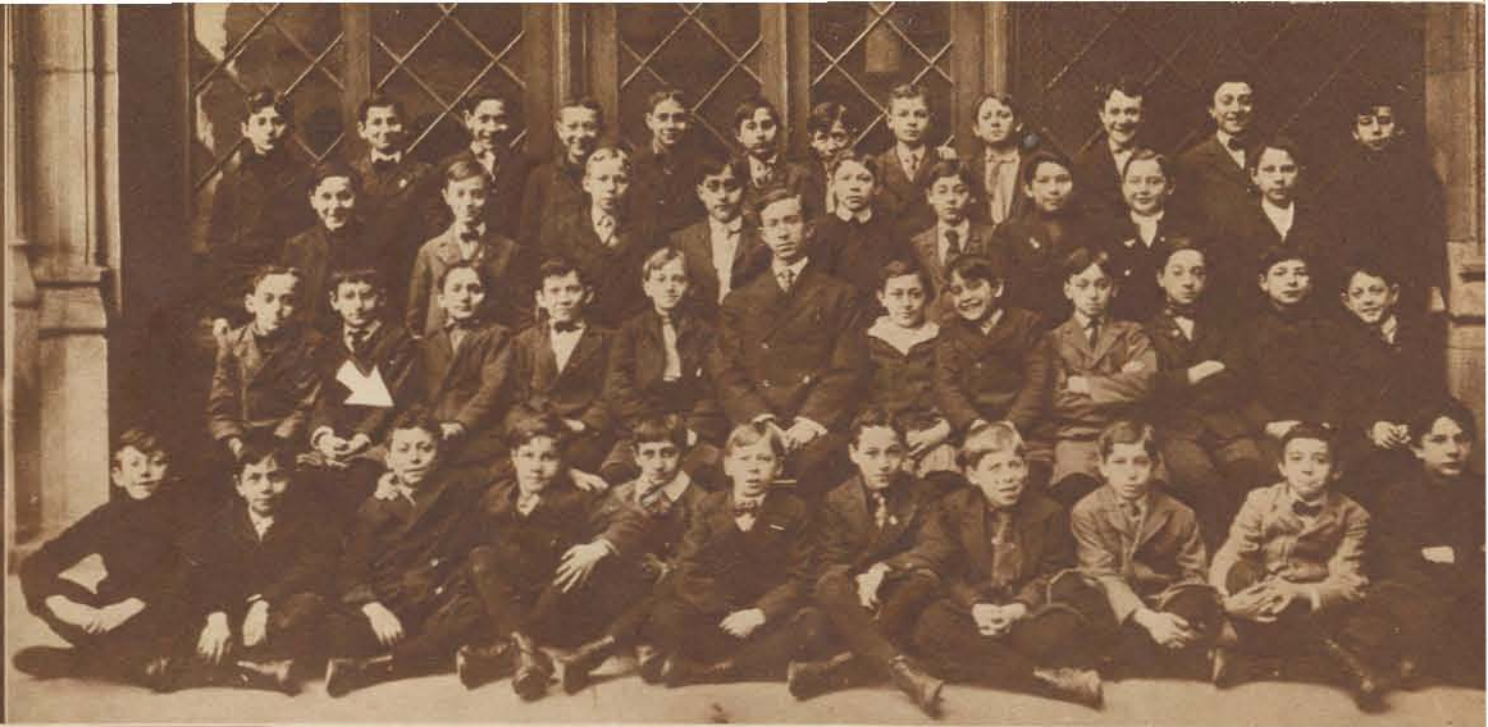


12. Jack's success as a burlesque player continued, his star ever in the ascendency. His name in lights meant a full house, he was a favorite wherever the company toured. Here he is in front of the old Olympic theater in Buffalo, N. Y., in the Winter of 1920. The car? It's an old Maxwell!

7. Above: New Orleans, and Jack Pearl, exactly fifteen years and six months of age, joined Gus Edwards' "School Days" troupe. Edwards knew talent when he saw it. Can you find Jack? He's the boy wearing a cap, near the center

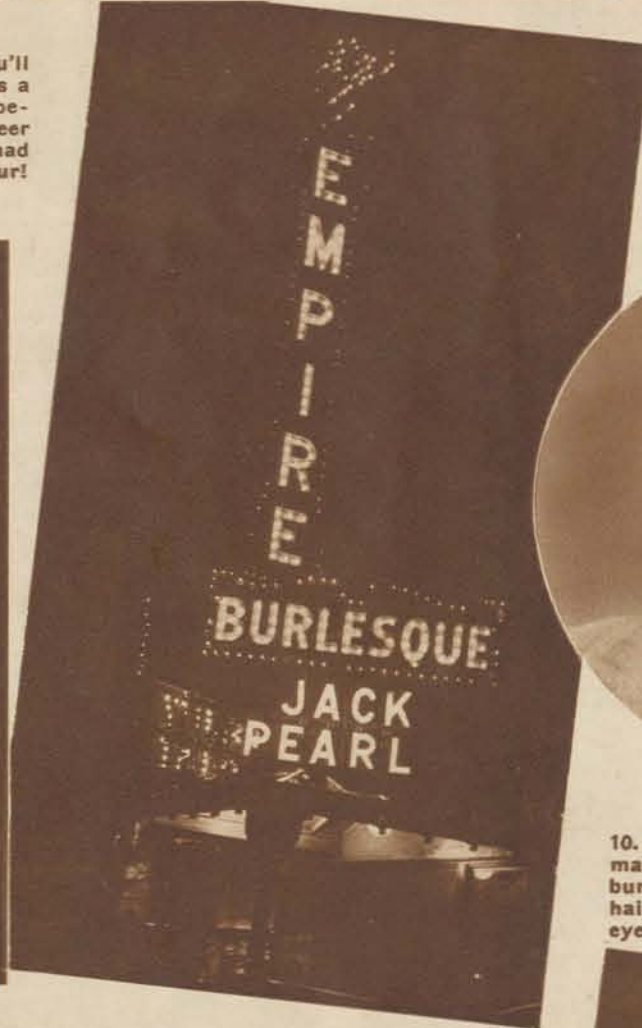


13. The year 1921, and along came love again—this time to stay! Two years later, Jack Pearl was married — and he is still married to the same girl. Here they are in a Coney Island photographer's studio, sitting happily before a painted ocean on a painted beach



3. If you know your tintypes, you'll recognize this as an old one. It's a picture of Jack Pearl taken long before any stray thoughts of a career in the world of the theater had come to him. Jack was just four!

4. A few years later the future "Baron Muenchausen" entered New York's Public School No. 171, a dark old building on 103rd Street. There are forty-three boys in the photo above, but you should be able to pick out Jack Pearl without any difficulty. As a hint, we'll tell you he's one of the eleven boys in the front row. Give up? Well, he's the third from the left!



8. Above: Sixteen years old, Jack Pearl had been in show business just six months when this photo was taken. Inscribing it "To my dear little family" and adding individual messages, he sent it back home

9. The biggest thrill that ever comes to an actor—his name in lights! The Empire Theater in Toledo, Ohio, was the scene of this triumph, and the date was 1916. By this time, Jack Pearl was a burlesque star



10. And here's Jack in typical make-up, as he looked to those burlesque audiences, his thick hair covered with a "bald" wig, eyes darkened, wearing a mustache

11. Yes, Jack had a first love. And here she is! Her name was Rose Goldman, and, like most first loves, she married someone else, lived happily ever after



14. Left: Finally Broadway beckoned, and Jack Pearl moved into the Big-Time. His friends were innumerable, and his fame widespread. Here is a picture taken in 1931. Left to right: Jack, a girl companion of Gov. Frank Murphy of Michigan (then Mayor of Detroit), Gladys Glad, showgirl, and Mark Hellinger, newspaper columnist whom she later married

15. Another big turning-point in Jack Pearl's life came when he met Billy K. Wells, veteran writer of Broadway shows. Billy and Jack put their heads together, and the result was the famous "Baron Muenchausen" characterization for comedian Jack. The Baron "made" Jack



16. And here they are! "Baron Muenchausen" himself and "Sharlie," otherwise Cliff Hall. Radio was made to order for The Baron, and he had not been long on the air before his "Vas you dere, Sharlie?" was famous

17. Here's Jack's sister (the "Tillie" of the autographed picture on page 27) with her husband, Moe Brillstein, and their two children, Bernard and Sammie. Jack's sister and her family live in his New York City apartment



18. The theater and radio conquered, Jack Pearl moved in on Hollywood. Star of the stage, star of the airways, he saw no reason why he shouldn't be a star of the movies as well—and he was! Here he is on a "Meet the Baron" set with Marie Dressler, Lionel Barrymore



19. You saw an earlier picture of this man on page 26. He's Louis Perlman, Jack's beloved father, known and loved by everybody in show business



20. Left: True love triumphant! Here are Mr. and Mrs. Jack Pearl today. Before her marriage to The Baron, Mrs. Pearl was Winifred Desborough. She was born in London, met Jack at a show in the New York Winter Garden in 1921. Life together has brought them everything they could want—fame, fortune—above all, happiness!

21. Back to the beginning of things! Jack Pearl revisits the house he was born in, at 76 Cannon Street, New York. It is also the house in which Horatio Alger lived, and probably Jack Pearl is thinking that Alger never wrote a success story more fantastic—or with a happier ending—than the story he himself has lived

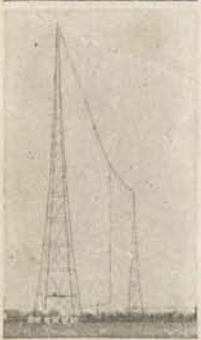
