Happy Listening

GUGLIELMO MARCONI, the genius who gave us radio, is dead.

At first glance, these mournful words fit badly under the title, "Happy Listening." But, on second thought, do they? Guglielmo Marconi's gift to shut-ins, to those in remote places of the earth, to persons bored with themselves and their own families, to folk too poor to afford other sorts of entertainment, broadcasting can never be anything but "happy listening."

Before Senor Marconi died, he said: "It is good to know that I had a small part to play in giving to the nations of the world the means to talk to each other and to understand each other—and thus to bring about lasting peace."

David Sarnoff, who did much to bring radio to America, said yesterday: "The world has lost a great man. Science has lost a great genius. And I have lost a great friend."

Those words, we believe, echo sentiments in the hearts of millions of listeners. When the networks paused in their busy days last Wednesday to observe one minute of silence at the time of the funeral in Italy, uncounted prayers must have risen from homes the world around to accompany Guglielmo Marconi's soul.

MAGICAL SALZBURG

IN 1916 four men came calmly together in Austria, in the center of the hell that had burst over Europe two years before. They had gathered to talk of a dream that seemed at that time and that place the height of folly: they were planning a festival, the greatest festival of music, of opera and spoken drama, of all the arts, that the world had ever seen. The whole universe, it seemed, was in flames; the most disastrous war in history was occupying the attention of half the world, yet this small group of men, with the confidence of greatness, talked of peace, of art, of music.

The men were Richard Strauss, one of the foremost living composers; Hugo von Hofmanstahl, the playwright; Max Reinhardt, ruler of the world's theater, and Franz Schalk, Viennese conductor. They lived to see their dream come true, for in 1926 the first Salzburg Festival was held.

AS THIS is written the little Austrian town on the banks of the River Salzach is once again humming with activity. Thousands upon thousands of visitors are pouring into Salzburg. They range from simple country-folk and tourists to the great and near-great of half a hundred nations. There is a saying in Austria which runs, "Sit in the *Peterskeller* in Salzburg in the summertime, and you will see everybody who is anybody in the whole wide world." Americans have been going to Salzburg this summer in boat-loads; and in a wider sense, everybody in America, *everybody* is going to Salzburg—for on Monday afternoon (EDT), August 2, the National Broadcasting Company will offer the performance of "Don Giovanni," with Bruno Walter conducting, and on Thursday afternoon (EDT), August 5, "Die Meistersinger" will be aired, with Arturo Toscanini, one of the greatest conductors who ever lived, on the podium! Toscanini opened the great forty-day festival—Saturday, July 24—by conducting a performance of the immortal Beethoven's only opera, "Fidelio," and then returned to the podium on July 30 to direct Mozart's opera, "The Magic Flute."

THIS is a work-a-day world we live in—hard, practical, realistic. We have few shrines, and we tell ourselves there is little time to spare for worshipping at those few. But of the world's artistic centers, Salzburg, for all its comparative newness, is one of the best-loved. There is every reason why it should be so. In the first place, think of what is done in Salzburg! This year, ten operas are being given at Salzburg. In orchestral concerts, the works of Haydn, Schubert, Weber, Beethoven, Strauss, Mozart, Verdi, Bruckner and Brahms will be heard. Max Reinhardt will stage the great drama "Everyman" as only Reinhardt can stage it. There will be an open-air performance of "Faust." There are so many smaller concerts and recitals by cathedral choirs, orchestras, string groups, and individual artists that one can hear them all only by traveling at a mad pace through the crooked

little streets of Salzburg from the time the Festival opened until it closes!

People who have been in Salzburg during Festival time are never quite the same again, and they cheerfully admit it. They spend a month listening to the greatest music man has made, played by the greatest artists. They leave the *Mozarteum* after a concert dazed by the beauty they have seen and heard, to hurry to the *Festspielhaus*, the center of everything in Salzburg, for another treat; they go from there to the great Palace of the Archbishop, perhaps, to watch a spectacle in the courtyard. From the time they breakfast on hot rolls and jam and coffee buried under a mound of whipped cream, in a little restaurant high on the Monchberg mountain, until the last bottle of wine is popped open in the

Peterskeller at three o'clock in the morning, they are never quite still.

People live anywhere in Salzburg during the Festival, but whether they pile their luggage in a little Gasthaus room with one window and no water, or in the old Osterreich Hof, doesn't matter much. There is too much to be seen, too much to do. The house where Mozart was born and spent much of his life must be seen, of course.

There is the great fortress of Hohensalzburg, once the strongest in all the Germanic countries, looming 400 feet above the town with a precarious little cable railway climbing up to it. There is the river, running through the center of Salzburg, the sloping foothills and the snow-capped mountains that hem it in. There is the great Cathedral, consecrated in 1628; the Benedictine Abbey

of St. Peter, founded in 696, and the Castle of Mirabell. Then, when one is tired—and Salzburg's delights will tire the hardest—one can always sit in a convenient *kaffeehaus* and watch the passing parade of the world's great artists. Nowhere else in the world will you see so many of the men and so many of the women who rule the world of art today.

ALTHOUGH actually of recent date, the Festival can be traced back for hundreds of years. In the days of the Renaissance, Europe was ruled by men who cherished the arts, did everything in their power to foster them. Every court, no matter how small, had its regular staff of musicians, of actors, of writers. The great wars that had devastated Europe were over, and noblemen turned from fighting to vie with each other in the arts. There was no need for a paying audience, with its attendant complications; the magic words "box office" had yet to appear. The princes of the state and the church footed the bills, and never blinked an eye at astronomical figures. There were often more performers than people in the audience; a cast of from ten to sixty thousand was not out of the ordinary, and the costumes and properties used were the most valuable obtainable, often actually priceless. And of these ancient-day impresarios, the noble prince-bishops of Salzburg were among the greatest. It was natural that their traditions should survive, natural that the Austrian people should have hoped, down the centuries, that some day the glories of Salzburg would be revived.

Too, at Salzburg at least three of the great cultures of the past come together. It is in the center of the country, and therefore convenient. The Austrians have preferred since time immemorial to stage their dramatic events out of doors—the market-place is a common setting—and the natural beauties of Salzburg form a setting no mind could conceive and no hand execute anywhere else.

There is yet another reason why Salzburg was chosen as the site of the Festival, and this is one of the most important: Wolfgang Amade Mozart was born in Salzburg. The house still stands. In the *Mozarteum* there are preserved innumerable relics of his life. The key-note of Mozart's music has been called "Eternal Sunshine," and where could the man himself be venerated more deeply, or his music better played, than in sunny Salzburg?

EVERYONE goes to see Mozart's house in the Dollfussplatz. The little street was the Getneidegasse on that bitterly cold Sunday—the date was January 27, 1756—when the little boy was born, to be christened with a name much too big for a baby so frail. Johannes Chrysostomus Wolfgangus Theophilus, the priest intoned to the little group huddled around the holy-water fount in the cold, barren cathedral. And thus began a life that was to flare like a meteor, pitifully short, but unbelievably brilliant, across the sky, its

in O'Neill a kindred spirit. The device which O'Neill used so tellingly in "Mourning Becomes Electra"—that of having the characters speak aloud the thoughts that were in their minds—is one that is familiar to every radio listener.

O'Neill was born in a Broadway theatrical hotel on October 6, 1888. His parents were both actors, his father, James O'Neill, widely known for his enormous successes in the title role of "Monte Cristo." This dashing, romantic play was ideally suited to the temper of the times, and James O'Neill toured the country with it. And young Eugene Gladstone O'Neill, destined to thrill the English-speaking world with

plays of far greater significance, spent the first seven years of his life traveling up and down the land with the troupe headed by his father. These seven long years formed the base of the intense dislike for the theater as a physical environment that was later to rise so strongly in Eugene O'Neill.

THE O'Neills were devout churchgoers; when young Eugene passed his seventh birthday, he was sent to a Catholic boarding-school—the first of a succession of them. Later, full of youthful confidence, he entered Princeton University, from which august institution of higher learning he was expelled in his freshman year—not, be-

it recorded, for scholarly deficiency, but as a result of a prank, the exact nature of which is still a mystery.

In 1909, succumbing to the wanderlust that has always held him enthralled, O'Neill went off on a gold-prospecting trip to the Honduras. He didn't find any gold, and he was shortly back in the United States. Soon O'Neill left America again. This time as a sailor bound for Buenos Aires. Many of the plays that have made O'Neill famous are founded on the sea and on sea-faring people, and they all have their genesis in this 1910 voyage to South America. But while O'Neill enjoyed the sea and ships and sailors, they didn't loom large in his own scheme of things: he didn't like working aboard ship any better than he had liked clerking in the New York mail-order house. He wanted only to spend his time with sea-faring men, storing their lives away in his mind for use years later.

THE pattern of O'Neill's life seemed pretty well fixed in those early days. Inevitably, after every foray into the world outside, he returned home, went to work for his father. On his return from South America, in 1911, it happened again. This time, he actually joined the O'Neill troupe as an actor! But acting wasn't in his blood, he didn't like it and knew he never would. The writing-bug was

beginning to stir him. After a few months on the stage he tried for a reporter's job on the New London, Connecticut, *Telegraph*—and got it. O'Neill liked that better, particularly when he was allowed to write a column of his own in addition to routine reportorial duties.

But the strain of the hectic, irregular life he had led almost from birth caught up to Eugene O'Neill before he had time to settle down into his new-found groove as a newspaperman. His nervous, unsettled temperament, the strain of long hours and creative work, had undermined a constitution never very robust; and too, few newspapermen and fewer sailors are teetotalers, and you can't live with them and not drink with them. Eugene O'Neill had lived and worked and drunk with them. Doctors told him that if he continued to work, tuberculosis would find him a ready victim. And so the next five months he spent at a sanatorium in the wooded countryside of Connecticut.

It was a blessing in disguise. Pronounced past danger and discharged in 1912, Eugene O'Neill went to live on the Long Island estate of some friends. For a year he slept out-of-doors, exercised religiously, and, perhaps most important of all, spent endless hours alone with his own thoughts. He wrote a one-act play, "Wife for a Wife." It was the first of a series of

HE IS the greatest playwright living today. Millions of people of almost every nationality have thronged the world's theaters to see his plays—but he has seen only three of them, and those three reluctantly!

When he sent his first two plays to a New York producer they were rejected—not because they failed to come up to standard, but because the producer wouldn't even look at them!

Newspaper reporter, small-time actor, sailor before the mast, he was a ne'er-do-well until broken health sent him to a sanatorium—and to fame!

He was born on Broadway—actually!—but he hates the Great White Way, is happiest in a lonely shack on the shore of the sea!

He spent the most formative years of his life in the theater; his was a theatrical family, his life and his life-work have bound him irrevocably to the theater, yet he dislikes all theaters, can barely be persuaded to go near one!

His name? Eugene Gladstone O'Neill, foremost living dramatist, three-times winner of the Pulitzer Prize, winner of the 1936 Nobel Prize for Literature—and newest recruit to radio!

For, beginning Monday night, a cycle of four plays by this notoriously radio-shy dramatist will be presented to the American listening audience by the National Broadcasting Company. "Beyond the Horizon," first of O'Neill's plays to win the Pulitzer Prize, will

probably be the first on the air, followed by "The Straw," "Where the Cross Is Made," and "The Great God Brown." And when, on the night of August 2, you tune in the first play in this unique O'Neill cycle, remember that this is more than a broadcast—it's an event!

Eugene O'Neill's niche in the Hall of Fame of the American stage is secure. Greatest of American dramatists, he is also the best known—but still not as well known as he should be. It is this deficiency which the National Broadcasting Company plans to overcome with the presentation of its "O'Neill Cycle." Tremendously effective on the stage, moving and impressive on the mere printed page, the works of Eugene O'Neill are expected to prove sensational radio drama. Says John F. Royal of NBC, "The fine dramatic intensity of O'Neill's work is admirably suited to radio projection!"

CHIEF reason, perhaps, for the radio adaptability of O'Neill's plays, as well as for their essential greatness, lies in the fact that he has always scorned convention, has always expressed a hearty contempt for useless, hide-bound traditions of whatever kind. O'Neill is the greatest experimenter in the field of drama today, ever on the alert for a new twist or an unexplored by-path. It is only natural that radio, which has been forced to make its own rules of dramatic presentation as it developed, should find

eleven one-act dramas, has not yet been produced. When he sent two plays he had written to a New York producer, that worthy read the accompanying letter, sent them back unopened with the explanation: "Plays by actors' sons are never any good!"

Maybe they aren't, thought Eugene O'Neill. Wondering, he packed up and went off to Harvard, expressly to study dramatic writing in the famous "47" Workshop. From Harvard he went to Greenwich Village, in New York, in those days the center of American intellectual activity, and from Greenwich to Provincetown. In Provincetown, Eugene O'Neill and the famous Provincetown Players came together and history was made. "Bound East for Cardiff," a touching one-act drama of the death of a veteran sailor on a fog-bound ship, was produced in 1916. Later it and other plays were offered in New York, and finally, in 1920, "Beyond the Horizon" was presented by a professional company. It won the Pulitzer Prize, the first of three O'Neill plays to do so. "The Emperor Jones," familiar to millions not only as a play but as a film and an opera as well, quickly followed, with "Desire Under the Elms" next.

Americans who had never heard of the rising star of Eugene O'Neill thrilled to "Anna Christie" when Greta Garbo brought it to the screen. To the name of one of the all-time greats of the American stage—George M. Cohan—was linked the name of

Eugene O'Neill's only comedy—"Ah Wilderness"—and the play and the film have been seen in almost every country in the world. Only radio can spread Eugene O'Neill's fame wider, and that radio is about to do!

It will be a bigger gain for radio, and for America, than for Eugene O'Neill. Of money and fame he has more now than he cares for. Nearly all of his plays have been successes, and many of them six-figure successes at that. Royalties have come to him from England, France, Germany, Japan, and half a dozen other countries. He has a fat royalties check waiting for him in Russia if he wishes to go there to spend it!

THREE times married, O'Neill has three children. Most of his writing he does on the seashore, on Cape Cod, in Bermuda, or the coast of France. He writes in longhand in great cardboard-covered notebooks. has his next thirty plays completely outlined, waiting only to be written! He is intensely shy, hates the bustle and rush of city life, really enjoys solitude, doesn't worry in the least about the gyrations of the world outside. It is said that in 1920, when "Beyond the Horizon" was awarded the Pulitzer Prize, a friend of O'Neill's found him walking on the beach.

"Gene, you've won the Pulitzer Prize!" he said.

O'Neill looked up, startled. "What in hell is that?" he asked.

MONDAY night brings the drama of the week! That drama this week is Shakespeare's stab at slapstick—"The Taming of the Shrew," with "Little Caesar" Edward G. Robinson starring as Petruchio. Frieda Inescourt will portray Katharine. Broadcast by CBS as the fourth drama in its Shakespeare cycle, "The Shrew" demonstrates better than any other of his works the Bard's appreciation of the type of fun he found at taverns near his Globe Theater.

This common-man's classic is as new today as it was over 300 years ago when it was written. The broken head of the music-master might have been conceived for a Mack Sennett masterpiece; the shrewish tongue of Katharine might be that of "Tizzie Lish" of Al Pearce's Gang; Robinson might be acting the part of a character created by Charlie MacArthur, as well as by Shakespeare.

The plot of the "Taming of the Shrew" is really two love stories—of Bianca and her suitors, and of Katharine and Petruchio; the first in a serious vein, and the second in the comic, but they are so well interwoven that they become doubly interesting. Baptista, a rich gentleman, has decided not to allow his daughter Bianca to receive any more suitors until her older sister, Katharine, is married. Katharine is known to have such a violent temper as to make her unapproachable. Bianca is banished to the house, but her father consoles her by suggesting she may amuse herself with studies, and promises to get her a master. Lucentio, also wealthy, has overheard all this, and having fallen in love with the lovely girl, decided to disguise himself and become her Latin instructor.

Petruchio arrives in Padua seeking a wealthy bride, his father's death having made him a man of means. Bianca's suitors eagerly suggest that he espouse Katharine, warning him that however rich she might be, she has the reputation of a shrew. Petruchio deems himself competent to cope with any woman's temper and enthusiastically declares he will woo and win her.

Petruchio calls on Baptista, says he has heard of his beautiful daughter Katharine and he wants to marry her. He forces the father to name the dowry, and so anxious is he to rid his household of the troublesome Katharine, the father makes it very high. Petruchio wants the contract drawn up, but Baptista prefers that his daughter be won. Just then the music-master rushes into the room wailing because Katharine has broken a musical instrument over his head.

Katharine appears and makes cutting remarks, but when she finds she cannot disturb Petruchio's amiability, she hits him. He begs her to marry him—then, despite her denials, tells her father he will marry her the next Sunday. The matter of Katharine's marriage being settled, the suitors for Bianca's hand urge their claims.

Petruchio arrives late for the wedding, thereby irritating Katharine into saying those famous words about he who woo'd in haste means to wed at leisure. When he finally appears, it is in disreputable clothing and on a poverty-stricken nag. He calls loudly for his bride, makes a big fuss at the wedding, even striking his newly-made wife, and finally refuses to allow her to remain at her own wedding feast.

When finally the bridal couple arrives at the groom's home, wet and weary, the food arrives, but Petruchio declares it isn't fit to eat, and throws it on the floor. Merchants come with gowns, but he will have none of them. She finally gets so that she agrees with anything he says.

In the meantime, Lucentio's persuasive ways have gained Bianca's affection, displacing the other suitors in her eyes. They slip off secretly and marry. The last scene is at Lucentio's house, and the men make a wager as to the obedience of their wives—and Katharine's promptitude wins the money for Petruchio. Petruchio has her get the others and give them a lecture on wifely obedience.

"The Taming of the Shrew" has long been a favorite—its plot is simple, the story is well told, the action is rapid. There is no let-up of amusing scenes.

Robinson, who will play Petruchio, is most famous for his gangster roles, such as "Little Caesar" and "Scarface," although he never played underworld characters until he went into the films. He prefers good parts—the characterization is most important to him—and Petruchio is just the sort of a role in keeping with the cinema characters he played—that of a dominating, "never say can't" sort of a person.

BERKSHIRE FESTIVAL AND KOUSSEVITZKY — THURS.

DR. SERGE KOUSSEVITZKY, conductor of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, will lead the organization in two of the summer season's finest musical presentations, to be given August 5 and August 12 over the NBC-Blue network from the Young Berkshire Symphonic Festival.

The Berkshire Festival, now in its fourth season, is composed of two series of three programs, given on successive week-ends. NBC will broadcast the first of each series in its entirety from the permanent site of the festival, "Tanglewood," a delightful 210-acre estate between Stockbridge and Lenox, Massachusetts, overlooking Stockbridge Bowl (Lake Mahkeenac).

Here the famous Boston Symphony Orchestra, most of whose members participated in the Boston Pop Series, broadcast over NBC earlier this summer, will assemble under their conductor, Serge Koussevitzky, who will return from Europe to conduct.

Dr. Koussevitzky, latest of a long series of eminent conductors of the Boston Symphony, has long been known for his scholarly readings of the finest in symphonic literature. His radio programs have been uniformly of the highest order, embodying a nice balance between the familiar classics and brilliant compositions by contemporaries. Among the composers whose works he has introduced, as a conductor in Russia, are Debussy, Ravel, Fanelli, Paul Dukas, Stravinsky and Scriabine. His career at Boston has been equally notable.

Born in North Russia in 1874, Koussevitzky received his first musical education at home. At twelve years of age he became the *chef d'orchestre* in the theater of his native town, composing whatever music was needed for the plays put on at the theater.

The brilliant boy set out for Moscow when he was fourteen to continue his studies. Here he made a choice that later resulted in his becoming a performer rare in music—a double-bass soloist (the "bull fiddle"). He not only became the double-bass soloist in the orchestra of the Imperial Opera, but succeeded his teacher as professor of the instrument at the Conservatoire. For ten years he toured Russia and western Europe as a contrabass virtuoso, and composed a number of works for the instrument. Shortly after he became conductor of the Boston Symphony, he astounded New York critics by his amazing performance as soloist at Carnegie Hall.

Koussevitzky's main ambition, however, was to become a conductor. In 1907 he formed, out of the pupils of the Berlin *Hochschule fur Musik*, an orchestra with which he worked for two years. Then he returned to Russia and organized the famous Koussevitzky Orchestra.

He continued his brilliant career as conductor right down to the early years of the World War. He was appointed director of the Russian State Orchestras after the Russian Revolution of 1917 and continued in that post until he left Russia in 1920.

In the disturbed years following the conclusion of the World War, he conducted orchestras in all the leading cities of western Europe—Paris, London, Barcelona, Madrid, Rome, Berlin and many smaller cities. He became conductor of the Boston Symphony Orchestra in 1924 and has continued there with great success since.

SUNDAY'S TREAT WILL BE CORNELIA OTIS SKINNER

GUEST treat of the week is the air appearance of America's premiere character actress, 35-year-old Cornelia Otis Skinner.

One of the most important stars to appear on the horizon of the entertainment world, Miss Skinner has carried her already-famous family name to still greater heights, has been known and loved for years, both here and abroad, for the convincing manner in which she presents character sketches in monolog. As a writer she has had many articles and poems published in the leading magazines of this country. In radio, although her performances on the air are comparatively few in number, she has established herself as a top-ranking star, eagerly awaited by millions of listeners. And on Sunday night (EDT), August 1, she will be on the air over CBS on the "Good Gulf Summer Stars" program.

Born in Chicago on May 30, 1902, while Otis Skinner and his wife, Maud Durbin, were playing Shakespeare, little Cornelia literally grew up in the theater. From her earliest childhood she "played actress," and in 1921 she made her Broadway debut at the Empire Theater. For the four years that followed, Cornelia Otis Skinner was an established actress.

Then, late in 1925, she gave up acting in plays entirely. The urge to express herself that she had felt in her early youth had revealed itself once more—but this time she wanted to play on the stage alone, unsupported by a cast.

Putting into practise a form of dramatic expression seldom used since medieval days, Miss Skinner devoted all her time to the monolog, and with the series of character sketches that resulted, she made a triumphant tour of the United States. Then she went to London, and her success repeated itself there.

Applauded by two nations, she had already won herself a lasting place in the theater. But still she wasn't satisfied. As suddenly, as decisively as she had given up play-acting, she gave up straight monolog and yet retained both by creating a new form of dramatic art, the solo drama. This called for a full-length play—but differed from all others, featuring only one performer.

A new idea in a field where new ideas are suspiciously received and seldom used, the solo drama was in every sense a pioneering venture. Miss Skinner, unguided by precedents, had all the odds against her when she set to work on this new stage technique. But she wrote such a play while she was in London, and after receiving the whole-hearted approval of the British, it won the applause of Broadway. So did four others that followed.

Author, poet, playwright, producer, a troupe in herself, Cornelia Otis Skinner in private life is Mrs. Alden Sanford Blodgett, mother of 7-year-old Otis Skinner Blodgett.

Although Miss Skinner has had a sponsored radio program in the past, her theatrical work has taken so much of her time that lately her air appearances have been infrequent. Unfortunately, there will not be time on Sunday night for her to give a complete solo drama, but she again will give radio's millions an opportunity to hear the monolog type of acting which has made her a part of the American stage tradition. It will be one of the highlights on the dial this week.

WOMEN CAN MAKE MUSIC—TUES.

LISTENERS within hearing distance of any of the up-and-coming stations connected with the Mutual Broadcasting System will not wish to miss the performance to be given on Tuesday night by a remarkable organization, directed by an even more remarkable woman.

The organization is the Woman's Symphony Orchestra and the woman is Ebba Sundstrom. The occasion is the regular Tuesday night Grant Park Concert which is being broadcast by MBS.

Men probably won't like this broadcast. Or if they do, it will be admitted grudgingly. For the Woman's Symphony is a thoroughly feminine organization without an atom of male direction about it, and Miss Sundstrom is the sort of young woman musician who, despite being told by innumerable males that she was stalking straight ahead to disaster, proceeded to steer her own course so wisely that she got what men had told her was unattainable.

What she got was the directorship of an all-woman orchestra. Listeners can measure its worth on Tuesday. But first, measure the woman who is the orchestra's director and driving force.

Tall, blond, and lithe in the special way that seems to be characteristic of persons of great talent, she has come a long way since her birth in Lindsborg, Kansas. That Kansas background is a challenge to the male pundits who supervise our American culture and insist that a Middle-Western background chokes the genius from those unlucky enough to be born there.

In Lindsborg, Kansas, was Bethany College and the celebrated Bethany Oratorio Society. Miss Sundstrom's parents were both charter members of this organization. It is not completely surprising, then, to find little Ebba picking up her first violin at the age of seven and playing it with remarkable juvenile skill. When her parents moved to Oklahoma (more of that fatal Mid-Western background), she was thirteen and she organized a trio. Had there been a Major Bowes Hour then, she would have scorned it, for her group was strictly for hire—professionals!

From one musical stepping-stone to another, she made her way with the unerring drive of her Norse ancestors, a blond Brunhilde alone in a musical world ruled by men, entirely unaware as yet of her destiny as a great artist.

In 1925, Chicago womanhood surprised music-lovers with an idea which brought mingled huzzas and jeers from bystanders. They decided to form a woman's symphony. It wasn't a new idea, but a woman's symphony had never been successful and critics cried loudly that it never could succeed. Nevertheless, a handful of determined young women who found their careers in music blocked by the fact that all regular symphonic organizations employed only men, decided to attempt the impossible.

In 1925, the Woman's Symphony Orchestra of Chicago made its debut, "manned" by women, with the exception of the conductor. He was Richard Czerwonky. But the concertmeister was Ebba Sundstrom.

In some orchestras, a concertmeister is a figurehead; in others, he is the power behind the throne. How much of a power Miss Sundstrom was became apparent only when Conductor Czerwonky had been succeeded by a woman conductor, Ethel Leginska, and she in turn had given way to Ebba Sundstrom.

Many visitors to Chicago's Century of Progress in 1933 and 1934 carried away stories of Sally Rand and her fan dance or the startling sights of the Streets of Paris, but just as many spent rousing hours in attendance at the Floating Theater and the Ford Gardens where Miss Sundstrom and her triumphant organization gave to hundreds of thousands of listeners a vigorous demonstration of the "man-sized" repertory of her orchestra.

Tuesday night, millions will be able to hear what other thousands have already heard—and to be convinced that Ebba Sundstrom has not yet reached the end of the trail which is blazoned, "For Men Only—Women Keep Out."

Lindsborg, Kansas, and Bethany Oratorio Society are proud of Ebba Sundstrom, and so are the artists of the Woman's Symphony Orchestra of Chicago. So too will be those women everywhere who glory in the success of their own sex in fields where men are customarily unchallenged.



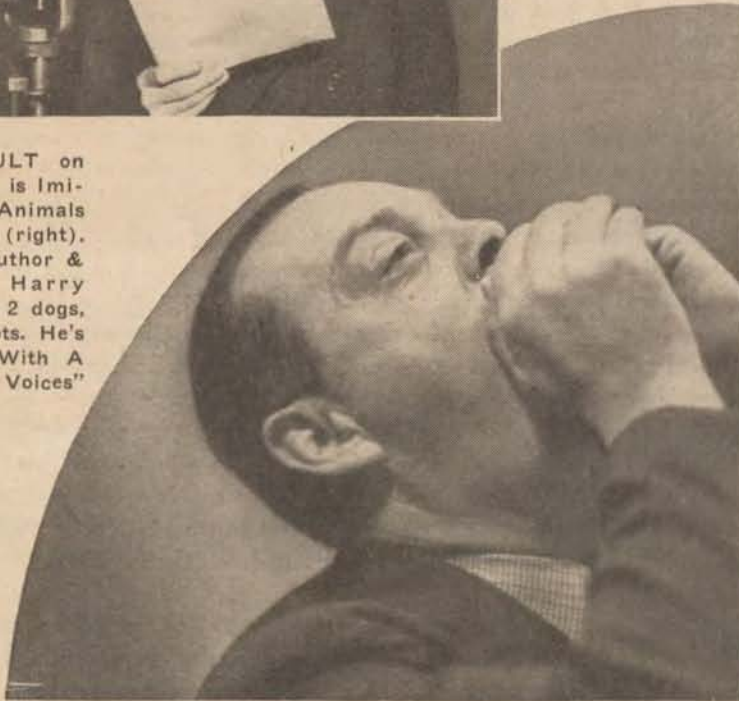

IN THE issue of RADIO GUIDE dated July 27, 1935, this column paraphrased a prediction that Hollywood was destined to become the second largest radio center. I had just returned from a two-week vacation spent in the flicker city and this prognostication was based on the fact that so many radio stars were already out on the Coast at the time making pictures and many more were slated to follow.

Looking back two years, it doesn't seem that I was wrong. As a matter of fact, if you look through the program schedules you will notice that practically every big-name radio show, with the possible exception of Rudy Vallee's, originates on the Coast. At

that time, the few NBC shows originating in Hollywood were put on in a small theater studio on the RKO lot. Months later the network had to build four new studios to take care of the influx of radio shows to the Coast. At the present moment plans are being made for additional studios, and from where I'm sitting, it seems that in 1935 I under-estimated a bit, for I firmly believe that by next fall Hollywood will be the largest radio center.

On September 4, Milton Berle will take his Sunday night show back to the Coast for an indefinite stay. During the week, the comic will be working on the RKO lot making another picture.

Also headed for the West Coast to do some work before the movie cameras, will be Shep Fields and his Rippling Rhythm orchestra. The bubble-blower will appear in Paramount's "Big Broadcast of 1938."

Enough about programs going to the Coast—here are a few notes about some eastern airings. B. A. Rolfe's "Magazine of the Air," heard over CBS, will be aired five times weekly starting August 31 . . . The Louis-Farr heavy-weight bout will be broadcast over the NBC net with Clem McCarthy giving out the word-picture . . . Universal Rhythm switches back to its old Saturday night spot when the auto sponsor's Sunday Evening Hour returns to the airlines . . . Cal Tinney, who was heard on the air several seasons' back as editor of the Ooligah, Oklahoma, newspaper, returns to the air in the fall to emcee a new variety show.

Irene Rich switches her airings from Friday nights to Sundays starting August 15. On that date she will have made one hundred and fifty consecutive weekly radio appearances without even taking time off for a vacation.

Walter O'Keefe wishes to make it known that he is discarding his title of Broadway Hillbilly. This trademark has been his for the past five years and it all started when his gag-writer pinned the title on him in 1932, when negotiations were on for a new radio series which never went on the air. Incidentally, you may have heard Harry Von Zell address Walter as Michael and wondered if Harry didn't make a mistake. Well, he didn't, because the right name of the Town Hall

Tonight headliner is Michael Walter O'Keefe.

Which reminds me to tell you that the correct name of the emcee on the Sunday night Fireside Recitals heard over NBC is Charles K. Field, as announced, but most radio listeners know him better as Cheerio, who has been broadcasting for ten years under this name without being identified.

Walter Winchell came back to New York from the Coast, but stayed only long enough to do one broadcast from the East. They tell me Walter likes California so much that when he got back to New York he appreciated Hollywood all the more.

His friendly enemy, Ben Bernie, will be Coast-bound in a couple of weeks to work on his next picture, and I'm told that upon arrival he will enter a dramatic school for a few easy lessons on how to be an actor. Winchell please note.

John Royal, program chief at NBC, left for foreign shores last week and they tell me the real reason behind the trip is to get Paderewski's signature on an NBC radio contract.

Wendell Hall writes that his song "Rhythm of State Street," which was aired for the first time on RADIO GUIDE's program last fall, has been adopted by the State Street Council as their official Chicago song and that Arthur Murray has devised a new dance called, "The State Street Shag." May I have the next Shag with you?

They tell me that Richard Himber's former auto sponsor is planning to put on a special one-hour broadcast in tribute to Marconi, that will feature some of the earliest stars to face a microphone.

If Bing Crosby ever loses his job as emcee and crooner, he can always get some work describing a horse race. Several Fridays ago, Bing broadcast a description of a race from the Del Mar track of which he is part owner and did a grand job. The race was called "The Motion Picture Handicap," and was so close they had to take a picture of the nags crossing the line, which prompted one of the movie directors to tell Crosby that it was ideal to end "The Motion Picture Handicap" with a photograph finish.

It was then decided to let Ella have her own way, and attempts were made to soothe that well-known bugaboo known as temperament.

Things did not go on too smoothly after that, and it was finally decided that the only thing to be done was to convince Ella that she was trying to do too much . . . she was convinced and resigned from the production.

Time Marches On! . . . and now we relate the incident that happened about five years ago with Ken Murray playing the lead. Ken at that time signed a contract with Universal studios for four weeks for \$3,000. Since then he has stepped right up in radio, and recently signed a contract with Rufus LeMaire at the same studio . . . but this time it was for seven weeks, and the price reported to us is \$35,000.

Lum and Abner, those Arkansas boys who certainly know how to "dicker," have put over another of their famous deals. The plumful dicker just completed was with their sponsor. The lads have signed a new contract that calls for eighteen months' work . . . but it is reported to call for \$335,000 for the two boys!

Irene Saltern, whose name is pronounced like the French wine, is an internationally famous fashion expert from Paris. Until recently she has been the technical fashion adviser at Universal Studios. Now she is going into radio.

Miss Saltern has prepared a fashion program of half-hour duration that will knock the network moguls right off their swivel-chairs! The program, which has five sponsors bidding for it now, will be released through a network here and sent to foreign countries via the transcription route.

Arlene Harris, of the Al Pearce program, was rumored by the great Walter Winchell as anticipating. It so happens that Arlene, who is married to Doctor Harry Harris, is NOT expecting an arrival. You can mark that down in your stork column.

Alice Faye, who is rumored off-again on-again with her many romances, isn't so definitely off with Tony Martin. There may have been a lovers' quarrel, but she was seen at the boxing-matches at the Hollywood Stadium just two days before this went into writing . . . and her escort was

Tony Martin . . . and they DID look at each other that way.

Frances Langford, who was tops among women in RADIO GUIDE'S Star of Stars election, is romancing again . . . this time with the same George Jean Nathan. QUITE A CARD!

OH YES," says Clellan Card, "two of us Rutgers boys are doing quite well in radio. Besides myself, there is my classmate, Ozzie Nelson—you've probably heard of him."

Thus introducing modest Clellan Card, WCCO announcer, master of ceremonies, actor, dialectician, continuity writer and last but not least, "The Working Girls' Friend." While pausing for station identification it might be well to tell how Clellan came about this "tag."

Early risers who listened to the WCCO time-signal programs in 1934 had their sleep-befogged heads cleared by a pleasant-voiced individual who insisted upon telling jokes and riddles of ancient vintage at six-thirty in the morning. Young employed women, who of necessity rose early, came to love the voice of this somewhat bored-

electric refrigerators on the side until 1931 when he became station manager of WDGY, Minneapolis. In the spring of 1933 he went into radio advertising and specialized in continuity writing. One year later he returned to WCCO as announcer, writer and sketch actor. Here he inaugurated the early morning time program featuring cobwebby, musty, moldy jokes he picked up during archeological expeditions in old bookshops. This program ran for one hour each morning, and Clellan says after each presentation he could hear Joe Miller turning over in his grave. Now, listeners only hear Clellan from seven to seven-fifteen each morning as this Card has got himself a sponsor, resulting in less work and more pay. Besides his programs, announcing the Gene and Glenn shows, straight work, and various special broadcasts, he has been doing electrical transcriptions and

sounding, clownish individual who just couldn't be as old as his jokes. They began writing him letters asking for advice on matters concerning love, finance, fashions and foods. Mr. Card, upon receipt of his first batch of mail, looked twice in a mirror to assure himself he wasn't Beatrice Fairfax or Dorothy Dix. Then he began answering the letters in his own unenlightening way. His ridiculously humorous solutions to the "problems" sent in gained him the moniker, "The Working Girls' Friend."

CLELLAN CARD'S first radio job was announcing for the Rutgers College Glee Club over WJZ in 1924. Between his college career and an eventual entrance into the investment business he believes three incidents stand out in his young life. One was a job pounding spikes with a railroad section crew, another was singing "Mammy" on the steps of the Capitol building in Washington, and third was being thrown out of the Ritz-Carlton in New York. With this background he entered the investment business. The resounding boom of the market crash in 1929 gained resonance with the aid of Clellan's losses as well as his clients'. His son, born that year, was not yet able to support Mr. and Mrs. Card in the manner to which they were accustomed. A successful audition landed Clellan work in WCCO script-shows where he worked with Rolfe Ylvisaker, now a member of the "Gangbuster" cast.

He wasn't any too certain about the radio business, however, so he sold

making commercial film shorts.

He has announced many big broadcasts on the networks and two years ago he appeared in the dramatized commercials in conjunction with the Minneapolis Symphony broadcasts. Clellan considers his outstanding radio experience and perhaps the highlight of his career, pinch-hitting for Ted Husing on the Burns and Allen program when it originated from WCCO, New Year's Day, 1936. His work on the two broadcasts with this team was highly commended and later he assisted just as aptly on network shows with Fred Waring and Horace Heidt.

Radio does not take all the time of this thirty-three-year-old father of two boys, "who definitely are not going to be radio announcers." He considers himself a bit of a chef and likes to broil steaks in his own inimitable manner and eat floating-island dessert. An enjoyable pastime is re-arranging furniture.

"IT'S a lot of fun pushing a piano around," he says, "when you know you don't have to do it for a living—yet."

Despite his casualness before the microphone, his excellent radio voice and likable personality, Clellan has ambitions other than broadcasting. He hopes some day to write and produce radio shows as an agency representative and also move to California to raise his children there.

Clellan Card likes to meet his listeners and learn their reactions to his program and consider their suggestions and constructive criticism.

MUSIC of the MASTERS

SOONER or later you are certain to tune in the beautiful sister of Jose Iturbi, Mlle. Amparo Iturbi. She made her radio debut May 2, playing the Haydn Concerto with Howard Barlow and his Little Symphony. Later in the month she made her concert debut in America. Detroit critics were laudatory: "Beyond any question, an artist of gifts above the average . . . and those gifts have been brought to a splendid maturity. A full-spirited vitality seems to be a family trait. Amparo Iturbi does not need to hang to her brother's coat-tails, for she clearly belongs to the top flight of pianists of her sex."

However, her lively brother was observed scampering between backstage and out-front and he is going to see that she has the proper build-up. She is strikingly like him in appearance, sturdy of stature, dark of complexion, grave of manner, and she answers applause with the same kind of graciousness that Jose displays—glad, but seemingly a little astonished that she has pleased so much.

She was born in Valencia, Spain. Her musical education, she says, was most informal, "a little savage!" No professor, no conservatory, no patrons, no prizes . . . only one teacher, her only Brother Jose. He was playing and teaching at eight. His little sister followed him about whenever possible, imitating everything he did. Later she worked with him when there was time, modeled herself musically on him as she grew up, and finally developed into a pianist with the same clear touch as he. Of course, she can never hope to be as great. For hasn't her brother announced to the world that, in music, women can never be as good as men?

THERE must be some mistake about the news that Lawrence Tibbett will return to the airlines in September. That month Mr. Tibbett will be touring the continent of Europe, appearing for the first time in his life in opera and concert, in countries as far apart as Roumania and France. In October he will go to England and will return to American shores only in time to join the Chicago Opera Company in a performance of Verdi's *Otello*. Mr. Tibbett leaves immediately after his Metropolitan season for a five-month concert tour in Australia. However, he does have a Sunday broadcast scheduled early in December.

Mr. Tibbett had a mixed reception in his first European appearance. London critics were a bit reserved. They resented the fact that he was advertised as "the golden-voiced baritone." They found his metal seemed harder than gold. They were incensed, too, that he announced before a song: "I will now sing you a beautiful Handel air." Since Handel spent the better part of his life in London they feel they know better than any American which of his airs are beautiful.

One London critic thought he should have been a tenor instead of a bari-

tone, and another felt he was a bass. He was accused of "just bawling" and of being "a bit theatrical." The erudite scribes took pains to show everybody that, although he might be good enough for America, he couldn't quite make the grade in London.

Another artist whom the London critics have found difficulty in accepting wholeheartedly is Kirsten Flagstad.

Both Mr. Tibbett and Mme. Flagstad, however, find themselves in good company. For it was no less a personage than Arturo Toscanini whom the London critics disparaged six years ago. When he took the New York Philharmonic-Symphony on its tour of Europe, they refused to believe that there was such a great man as Toscanini. "He was good, oh, yes!" they admitted, but nothing exceptional. Nothing better than what we have here at home." Now, after the whole

world has been chanting his praises, he is counted exceptional even in London.

William S. Paley for Columbia and John F. Royal for NBC are scouting about Europe for exceptional artistic affiliations. Mr. Royal attended the opening of the Salzburg Festival and arrange the final details of the maeconerfered with Arturo Toscanini to tro's coming to America.

According to present plans, the series will begin in late October. Mr. Toscanini will arrive about Christmas for ten weeks. Additional guest conductors are under consideration. Whatever hour and evening is selected for this event, you must plan to be in front of your loudspeaker. No other musical program will compare with it.

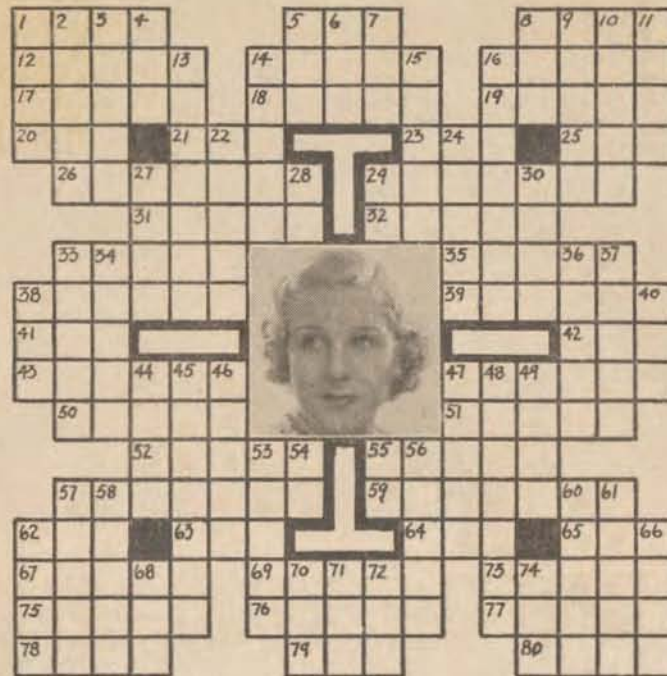

counterpart never to be seen again.

In many odd little ways, the life of Mozart, who is largely responsible for the Salzburg Festival, and Beethoven, whose own "Fidelio" opened it this year and who always occupies an honored place in its repertoire, twisted across each other. Both had their great triumphs, both lived in grim tragedy and died in despair—and once, for a time, they were master and pupil! When Mozart was 28, an acknowledged master idolized by all Europe, the young Beethoven was brought to him, a short, stumpy, ugly, shy, pock-marked boy, arrogant, proud as a Castilian. He played, and Mozart marked him for posterity with the words: "Keep your eyes on him; some day he will make a stir in the world!"

Mozart's father was a capable musician, and when the boy's older sister, Marianne—Wolfgang called her Nannerl—was seven, she had her first piano lessons. Wolfgang was sent away to play, but he could not be kept from the old pianoforte. He insisted that he should learn too, and he prevailed. His father lifted him to the bench, placed

his chubby little hands on the keys—they were black keys, instead of white as we know them today—and the boy immediately began to fumble for pleasing chords. He knew instinctively, at the age of three years, what many of us are never able to discover!

AT FIVE, Mozart played the violin, too. One day, when the group of happy Salzburg musicians who gathered regularly at the Mozarts' for informal concerts Sunday afternoon were setting up their music-racks, Wolfgang demanded that he be allowed to play second fiddle. Ordered from the room, he still insisted, until finally the kindly old man who regularly played second fiddle interceded, with a wink to the elder Mozart, as if to say, "No one will hear him, anyway; let him amuse himself." But Wolfgang was heard. A few bars were played, and the old violinist lowered his instrument with tears in his eyes to allow Wolfgang to play on alone! At six, he wrote a concerto that was much too difficult for anyone to play. The first of his forty symphonies he produced when he was a child of eight!

When Mozart had reached his sixth

birthday, musicians who had spent their lives in study acknowledged the boy their peer, and his father decided that this valuable little property must be exploited promptly, before it was too late. For while people would pay well for wonders performed by a six-year-old, their generosity would decrease with every inch he grew. So Papa Mozart, Nannerl and Wolferl set out on a tour of Europe. They went everywhere, Vienna, Prague, Munich—even to London. And everywhere they were wildly applauded. For Nannerl, though handicapped by her sex, was a great genius too, and when she appeared with her brother, the impact of their brilliance overpowered commoner and king alike. The tour lasted three long years, and while it gave Wolfgang a long head-start toward the fame and power that were to enrich his life finally, no one can say what it did to shorten that life. Travel was by coach; the roads were wretched, and when even the castles were cold, unsanitary and primitive, one can imagine the state of road-side inns.

TRIUMPH and bitterness crowded hard on each other after the Mozarts returned to Salzburg. Their friend, Archbishop Sigismund, was gone. There was a new archbishop now, and the Mozarts found him cold to their pleas for the aid all artists expected in those days. Wolfgang went to Italy. He wrote the opera "Bastien and Bastienne" at twelve. He was made a Knight of the Golden Spur by the Pope. He performed the incredible feat of copying—from memory—the great "Miserere" of Allegri, the most jealously guarded piece of music in the world at that time, after hearing it twice! His artistry grew faster than his body ever could. Mozart was a little man, short. His hair, honey-colored, hung loosely about his head. He was alternately wildly happy and dreadfully depressed. He sometimes worked in solitude and at his leisure, and he sometimes composed immortal airs on urgent commission, in the bedlam of a musicians' practice-hour. In short, he was a spirit living in a world made for lesser men. His life rushed to its close, harried by ever-present poverty. He had married Constanza Weber, and there were two children. In September, 1791, he finished "The Magic Flute," and a few months later he started the "Requiem" on commission. He never finished it. One day he was very ill—it was as if his soul had suddenly collapsed—and he died quickly. The day was December 5, the year, 1791.

Beethoven's life lapped Mozart's by some twenty years. He was born in 1770, recognized as a prodigy before he was four, and, like Mozart, brought to the attention of the great of his time. His life ran a slower course than his great predecessor's had run; he did not appear in public until he was thirty. Like Mozart, he was haunted by poverty and unhappiness. He too had great triumphs, of course, but he suffered great tragedies too, the greatest of which was the loss of all hearing. The deafness came in 1819, and of course it scarred his mind immeasurably. He finished the last piece of work to bear his name on October 31, 1826, and died, in the midst of a terrific thunderstorm, March 26, 1827.

There will be thunderstorms in Salzburg this summer, and there will be days of bright sunshine as well. And thus, perhaps, will two great masters be united, in a musical setting which they could not have bettered, nor even dreamed of seeing, in the time and place in which they lived.

SHORT WAVES

BY CHAS. A. MORRISON, president, INTERNATIONAL DX-ER'S ALLIANCE

(Figures in Parentheses Are Megacycles)

GENERAL Electric's short-wave stations W2XAD and W2XAF will become the strongest in America and probably in the world upon completion of the new 100,000-watt transmitter, permission for the erection of which has just been granted by the Federal Communications Commission. The new transmitter will be a linear, radio-frequency amplifier and may be used by either of the two short-wave stations.

"The previous strength of 18,000 to 25,000 watts for W2XAD and W2XAF, respectively, has rivaled the world's strongest short-wave stations, and the greater signal strength should permit worldwide reception throughout the year," according to B. W. Bullock, assistant broadcasting manager of the General Electric Company.

W2XAD now broadcasts approximately 220 hours a month and W2XAF 290 hours. It is anticipated that this will be increased as the result of the greater range of the new transmitter, which is expected to be completed by the early part of next year.

R. B. Oxrieder of State College, Penn., is hearing a new Cuban, believed to be COCW of Havana, on a frequency of 6.324 megs. The announcer usually includes broadcast stations CMW and CMHX in the announcements.

A MATEUR radio came through nobly last month in an emergency call. On a small island in the Pacific Ocean, 75 miles from Los Angeles, Calif., a tiny four-months-old girl was in need of medical attention. Amateur station W6JLF, operated by I. P. Elliott, the only contact that San Nicolas Island has with the mainland, established contact with an amateur in Redondo Beach, Calif., who called the police, who in turn notified the Los Angeles police and the Coast Guard. The latter had a boat ready to sail by the time a doctor arrived, and before morning the boat, carrying the doctor, hove to on the lee side of desolate San Nicolas Island, and another mark was chalked up on the already enviable record established by amateurs.

The new schedule of broadcasts from short-wave stations LRU and LRX, "Radio El Mundo," Buenos Aires, Argentina, is as follows: Over LRU (15.29), daily from 7 to 9 a.m. EST (6 to 8 a.m. CST); over LRX (9.66), daily from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. EST (8:30 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. CST). On July 1, these short-wave stations were used in relaying the inaugural program of the new blue and white network of "Radio El Mundo," comprising key station LRI in Buenos Aires and affiliates in Rosario, Cordoba, Bahia Blanca, Tucuman, Mendoza, Resistencia (Chaco) and San Juan.

Mr. Jardillier, Minister of Posts, Telegraphs and Telephones for France, is reported to have recently stated that the new short-wave transmitter of "Radio Coloniale" was nearing completion and that experimental broadcasts would soon be carried on, with a

power output that would be gradually increased until the station's ultimate maximum power of 50,000 watts had been reached. Reception of the French station should be greatly improved.

In a letter from Leonard Sawyer of Woodstock, N. H., I learn that DJP (11.85) of Zeesen, Germany, may be heard Mondays at 7 p.m. EST (6 p.m. CST), relaying a program from Belgrade, Yugoslavia, for the benefit of Slavic emigrants in North and South America.

Ashley Walcott of San Francisco, Calif., sends the following informative notes: A station on 9.415 megs, the same frequency as PLV of Bandoeng, Java, has been relaying the Javanese NIROM programs intermittently each morning from 5:30 to 9 a.m. EST (4:30 to 8 a.m. CST). . . Erlanger & Galinger of Manila, Philippines, tested their new short-wave transmitter on 11.84 megs for two weeks in June and then it went off the air. On the first of July the station resumed broadcasting on an announced frequency of 9.57 megs and it may be heard daily on this frequency from approximately 4:30 to 9 a.m. EST (3:30 to 8 a.m. CST). A slight heterodyne from W1XK may be noted . . . OPM (10.14) of Leopoldville, Belgian Congo, may be heard phoning in straight speech, irregularly from 8:30 to 9 a.m. EST (7:30 to 8 a.m. CST) . . . "The Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, station on 15.43 megs verified for me in May as IUG, not IUD as reported by several other short-wave listeners. As for the code signature being IUD, not IUG, nearly all operators of the Italian Colonial telephone stations have notoriously poor fists for code and it would be extremely difficult to tell the difference between a dot and a dash" . . . FZE (17.28) of Djibouti, Somali Coast, is heard calling Paris on phone, once or twice a week near 8:30 a.m. EST (7:30 a.m. CST).

The owners of broadcast station KSTP in St. Paul, Minn., have been granted a permit to erect a 1,000-watt apex station to operate on 25.95 megs . . . The Knickerbock Broadcasting Company of New York City, N. Y., will erect a 100-watt apex station to operate on 26.55 megs.

The "Government Radio Station," Rangoon, Burma, is still being heard on the Pacific Coast daily from 9 to 9:35 a.m. EST (8 to 8:35 a.m. CST), on an announced frequency of 6.007 megs. A letter from W. J. Byrne, engineer-in-charge of the above station, states that the broadcasts are merely experimental, are intended primarily for reception and report by various radio stations in Burma, and not for the entertainment of the general public, although reports from listeners who may happen to pick up the broadcasts are most welcome . . . A new station, ZGB of Kuala Lumpur, Federated Malay States, whose announced frequency is 13.643 megs, may frequently be heard between 7:30 and 8:30 a.m. EST (6:30 and 7:30 a.m. CST), phoning PLQ of Bandoeng, Java, in inverted speech.

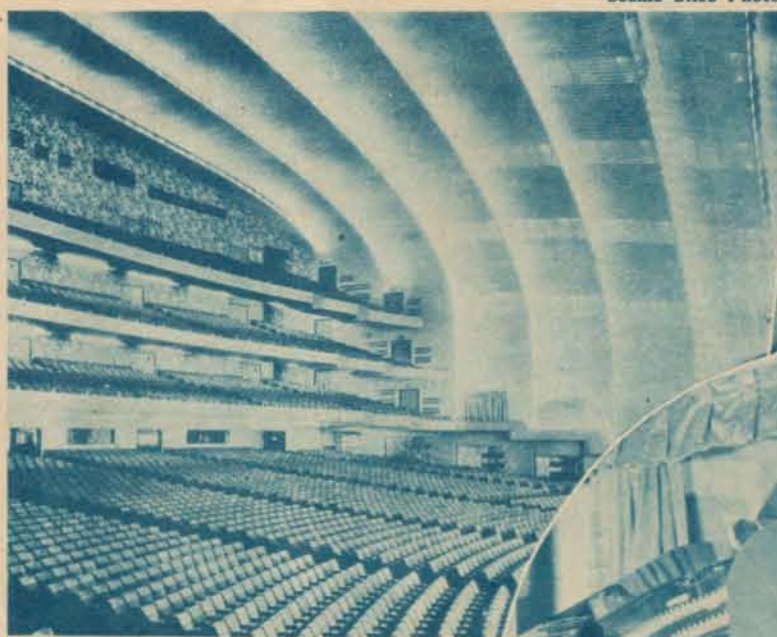

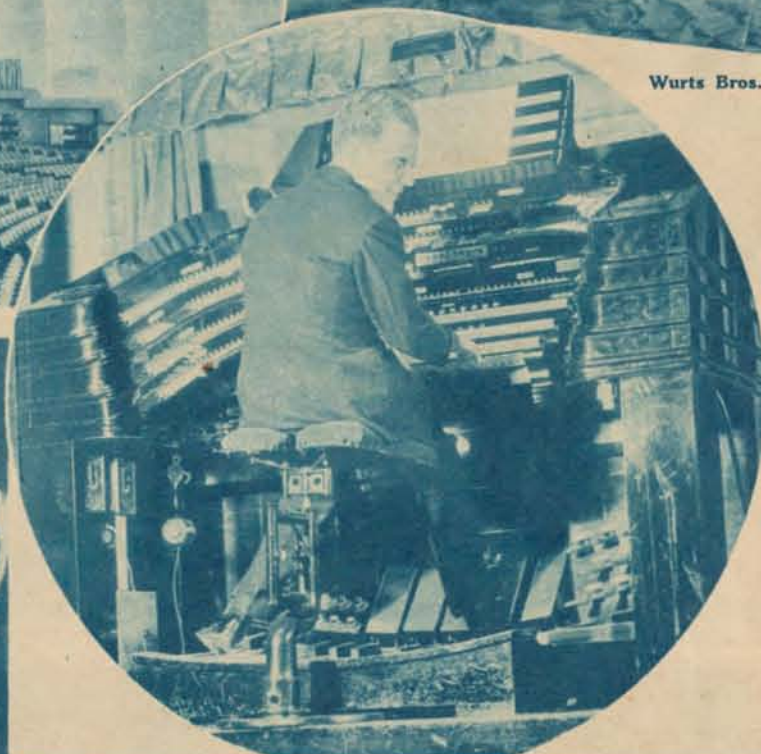

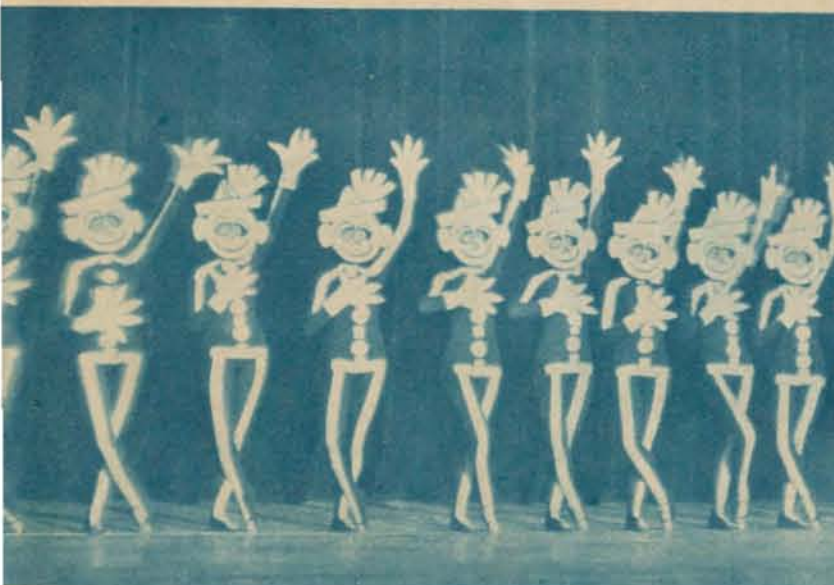

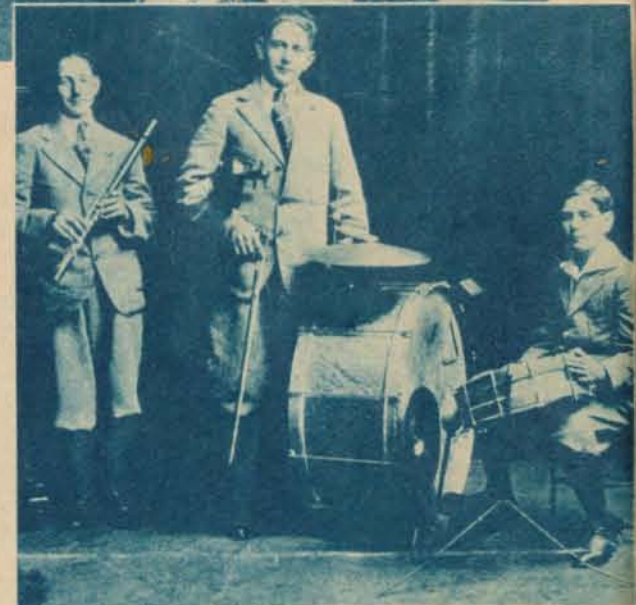
