Medal of Merit

A Weekly Award for Excellence in Broadcasting

AWARDED TO ARTURO TOSCANINI

WHEN Arturo Toscanini conducted the New York Philharmonic-Symphony orchestra on April 26, 1936, it was said that he was "conducting not only the society's last regular concert of the season but in all probability his final broadcast in America. He will henceforth confine his conducting to concerts abroad."

America politely refused to stand for it. Less than a year later David Sarnoff, president of the Radio Corporation of America and chairman of the board of the National Broadcasting Company, announced that he had invited Signor Toscanini to return to America to conduct a great orchestra assembled by his network.

The man whom authorities unanimously term "the world's greatest conductor" accepted that invitation. Despite his impending seventieth birthday, the great Italian agreed to make the 6,000-mile trip—in order to serve a cherished ideal.

The machinations which fostered his return to America were complex and widespread. Samuel Chotzinoff, the conductor's personal friend, went to Milan, Italy, to discuss the proposition. Sarnoff himself kept the trans-oceanic telephone busy. They spoke for America's music-lovers in asking his return.

Once Signor Toscanini had accepted, Herculean preparations began in America. NBC assembled the first full-time, full-size symphony orchestra ever maintained in America solely by a broadcasting organization. Musicians of recognized tal-



ent were selected from orchestras in Philadelphia, Chicago, Detroit, Cincinnati, Minneapolis, Paris, Madrid, Brussels, Budapest and many another city of musical prominence. Mischa Mischakoff, the celebrated violinist, became the orchestra's concertmeister, with a corps of distinguished assistants. Artur Rodzinski and Pierre Monteux were engaged to conduct before and after Toscanini. The expense of the undertaking was tremendous, yet no detail was skimped.

The series, which reaches its climax in Signor Toscanini's current broadcasts, bespeaks the progress of radio itself. Broadcasting has matured much in recent years; perhaps now it has reached a full maturity in this achievement, finally set for itself a definite pattern for its future growth.

Signor Toscanini brings an ideal to NBC's Saturday night programs. That ideal is two-sided. From his earliest youth he has worshipped only perfection in music. From the time of his first prominence he has tried to offer the perfection he has made to the largest possible audiences. In conducting these programs for America's radio listeners, he is serving both of those purposes, realizing his ideal.

Because he has forgotten everything selfish which might have deprived listeners of his world-famous genius, because he has given wholeheartedly of a spirit which the world needs greatly today, Radio Guide is deeply sincere in presenting to Signor Arturo Toscanini the Radio Guide Medal of Merit.

Lawrence Tibbett . . . new series

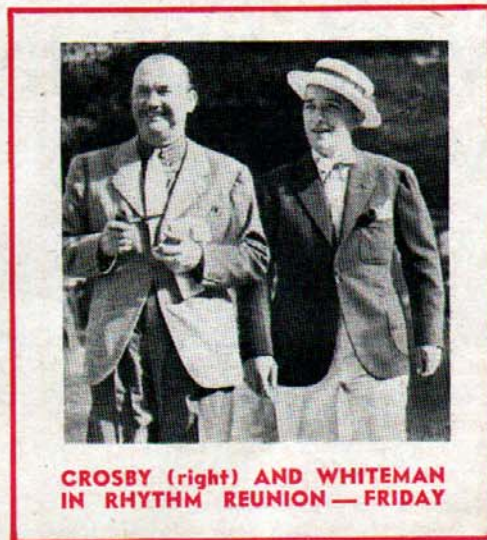
"Chesterfield Hour"—CBS, 9 p.m. EST.

No matter what song becomes 1938's first new hit as New Year's Eve is celebrated this Friday night, "Sweet Adeline" will be a favorite the country over. Wherever merriment is in full swing, "Sweet Adeline" is sung in full voice—in swanky night clubs, at bars, at home parties, and on the air! The story of "Adeline's" birth and growth makes reading as thoroughly fascinating as the song itself. To increase the enjoyment of revelers who will sing it, Radio Guide presents the story of the song of the week!—Ed.

THE boys haven't done right by "Sweet Adeline—My Ad-o-i-i-i-ne." She got a raw deal in the shuffle. For Adeline—"for thee I pine"—was created as a simple little country girl, meek and mousy, the kind of girl you'd be proud to take home to Mother. She was a sweet thing in her youth, 'way down east, where she grew to virtuous maidenhood, unspoiled, unswayed.

She wore bustles and a heap of petticoats in those days. She was a poor girl—poor but proud, and earned only a few dollars a year. But they were honest dollars without taint. So charming was she, and so sweet, that sometimes the swains gathered around the barber shops on Saturday nights and sang of her beauty. In all their dreams her fair face beamed.

And after the gang toasted her virtues in song the boys often would switch off to another raging melody of the era, "There'll Be a Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight."

Maybe that's what put ideas into little Adeline's head. Anyway, the city

slickers got hold of her and she forsook the stern road of righteousness, turned a couple of cartwheels and a somersault, and landed right in the middle of the primrose path. She hurled away her bustle and yanked off her petticoats. She put paint on her cheeks and scarlet on her lips.

And "Sweet Adeline" went to town. The heroine of the gentle bucolic melody of 'way down east became the Diamond Lil of the bar and grill. She was a good girl, but they done her wrong, and the pegged-pants rounders of the city streets wailed and wept in their beer over her plight.

She became the martyr of prohibi-

tion, and she began making dough, filthy lucre. Her eyes got bleary, and her cheeks sagged. Her neck got flabby. She had swapped her glory for a schooner of suds. But the boys bunched around lamp-posts and sang hosannas to her fair face until cats meowed in echo and the milkman took up the chorus.

IT'S a sad story, fellows. And the wages of gin is death—or breath. But I'll bet you the next one against the house that old Adeline, and her two sisters under the skin, Sweet Rosie O'Grady and That Wild Irish Rose, have had a whale of a lot more fun

out of life than such sissies as Annie Laurie and Maggie.

Sweet Adeline was born in Somerville, Mass., in the late nineties, but she learned about life during prohibition. Harry Armstrong created her one night under a gas-lit lamp. He never dreamed that his Adeline would spend most of her life hanging around lamp-posts. Or that the gaslights would become Mazdas. Or that the gentle creature of whom he sang would help support him. Or that she would be manhandled in all languages, including the Scandinavian.

Harry is another one of those guys who had rather write the nation's songs than its laws. In fact, his song had a lot to do with its laws. For if "Sweet Adeline" didn't help chase prohibition into limbo, then nothing did. After all, civilization can stand only so much. And when Sweet Adeline became Miss America of the giddy, gilded era, the nation simply rebelled.

SHE'S still the swellest gal of our barroom ballads, with "My Wild Irish Rose" a close runner-up. "Sweet Rosie O'Grady" is in the show-money, too, but she's not in Adeline's class.

Harry Armstrong always liked to sing and play the piano. He was a callow, rather timid fellow back in Somerville during his boyhood. You would never think Adeline was born in Somerville. It was a quiet town where life unfolded itself gently and without excitement. It was a town of homes and husbandries. Of course, there were a few poolrooms, and other places called dens by the preachers, but Harry and his pals didn't hang around them much.

But there was a gaslight at the corner of Main and High Streets, and Harry and the fellows would meet and talk, just like boys have met and talked ever since man first beat his war-club into a walking-stick and evening gab-fests became the secret delight of masculine hearts.

There was a lot for a fellow to talk about in the 1890's. There was a rumor of a war with Spain, and some of the gang had even been to that hectic city of New York, where trollies were pulled by horses and elevated trains were pulled by steam locomotives.

So about the corner Harry and all the lads forgathered for their gossip and harmonies, and would lay neatly into that "Break the News to Mother" with full-chord progression and the barber-shop manner.

THE folks up at Somerville didn't mind the corner forums, but they objected to the songs. And oftentimes when the lads chanted a little ditty they would be met with shoes and catcalls, and even that venerable cry of "strawberries," which served as the Bronx cheer of its day.

The boys' repertoire of songs was limited to "Mother," "Nellie" and "Dolly." So Harry devised a canticle suitable for foursome yodeling. And then, fellows, a new star was born—"Sweet Adeline" first breathed the sweet nectar of life in the shadow of a lamp-post.

There is no marker there to honor the event. There are no monuments to "Sweet Adeline," except a million hangovers and a thousand cases of delirium tremens. But there should be a pilgrimage to the corner where Adeline was born. And you well-met fellows who meet her at conventions every year, you jolly companions of festive fraternity houses, you pining pals of brass-rail rendezvous, you should visit her birthplace and lean on the lamp-post and sing just one song for memory of the old gal.

Only the chorus was sung first in Somerville. The words were simply doggerel. The boys sometimes even would take those Nellie and Dolly songs and tie them up with a chorus of Adeline. Harry knew he had something in that chorus, but no one else agreed. Not even the town constable, who would run 'em in every night, after they beat the eardrums of the villagers until the folks' nerves were frayed.

IT'S a shame that Harry did not know Dick Gerard in those days. Adeline would have had a much happier childhood, for it was Gerard—now Richard Gerard Husch, a special clerk in the New York Post Office—who supplied the lyrics and title and pushed Adeline out in front among the barmaids.

But Harry had a hunch the chorus would click. He shoved a few copies in his pocket and went up to Boston, where he submitted them to a publisher, but they bounced back like a rubber check. Then he sent them to Marks and Stern in New York. They came back like a rick-rack ball. It was all very discouraging, but Harry stuck Adeline in his trunk and fetched her with him to New York.

He was a good ragtime pianist, and the first day he entered this town he got a job in a beer-and-sawdust joint in Coney Island. That was in 1898. And the first night while Harry was pounding the keys about Sweet Rosie O'Grady, then the outstanding favorite in the froth-and-pretzel opera, a big cop tipped him off to a job at the San Souci, a music hall in Manhattan.

"It was a swell joint," Harry recalled. "The Rogers Brothers played there, and so did all the good vaudeville stars and teams of the day. I got

fifteen dollars a week, and roomed with the bouncer, Handsome Harry Howard. I didn't have time then to work on Sweet Adeline, but I had her in mind. I still had the music I had written back in Somerville, but I knew the song would have to be polished up a bit. I met a lot of big-shots while working at San Souci, and made contacts that have been very valuable.

"The bouncer, Handsome Harry, and I got along famously. A nice little guy who was a drug-store clerk up around Third Avenue and 86th Street used to come down to the place every night for a few beers. He would listen to my music and gossip. He and I and Handsome Harry got to be pretty good pals. And upon his suggestion, Handsome Harry and I agreed to let him room with us. He was a nice kid to have around the house, always quiet and well behaved. But he had some crazy ideas; at least I thought they were crazy. Gee! I wish sometimes I'd strung along with him. I had plenty of chances, I guess. This fellow wanted me to go in with him in a place he opened over in Fort George. I couldn't see the set-up and turned him down. He had a wild idea about some vaudeville and nickelodeon places around town. I hooted at the idea."

Harry shook his head and smiled wanly when he recalled it.

"My drug-store friend was Joseph M. Schenck, who later made millions in the movies. If I had listened to him—" Harry shrugged his shoulders and broke off the sentence.

DON'T feel bad about that, Harry, for if you'd listened to him we wouldn't have had "Sweet Adeline," and after all, hadn't you rather write the nation's songs than make its movies?

The San Souci job was pretty good, but when Harry got an offer to play at the Bohemian, then between Broadway and Sixth Avenue, he chucked his job over for a twenty-five-dollar-a-week engagement.

The new job also gave him some leisure time. So he completed the

"After I did him that favor I asked him to do me one and gave him my music to 'Sweet Adeline.' Jimmy hummed it over and thought it over—then he shook his head. He said it was too tough. What a chance he missed! "Isn't it funny to think about all the cockeyed little things that might have changed the whole course of human events? Now just suppose Jimmy Walker had written the lyrics to 'Sweet Adeline.' Jimmy was the prohibition mayor of New York, and Adeline was the first lady of the city. What a combination that would have been. But Jimmy couldn't see it, so I went to Charles Lawlor. He's the one who wrote 'The Sidewalks of New York.' Lawlor thought about it a while, too, and then said the music was too old-fashioned and too slow." Adeline too slow—Adeline, the gin girl, too old-fashioned!

I GUESS she was in those days," Henry recalled, "because I wanted the words to be about a sweet girl. I was about to give it up. Then one day I ran into Dick Gerard. He took my tune and set lyrics to it. We worked over it at night. We called it first, 'You're the Flower of My Heart, Sweet Rosalie.' I liked that pretty well."

The two boys took Rosalie to Witmark's, one of the big publishing houses. Witmark looked her over and shook his head. He said Rosalie was a lousy wench—the name was no good. And on the spur of the moment Gerard changed it to Adeline. Witmark scowled when he saw that.

"Adeline is worse still," he told Harry and Gerard, "and besides, I don't like that line, 'for you I pine.' What does that mean? Sounds goofy to me. Whoever heard of anybody pining for anything?"

Apparently Mr. Witmark had never cried in his beer.

Gerard liked the line, however, and wouldn't take it out.

"The line's got to stay in," Gerard told Witmark, "because it rhymes with Adeline—'Sweet Adeline, my Adeline,

Gerard got a job with the post office, and with his wife and five children lives in Queens County, New York. He has probably the largest private collection of popular songs in America, some thirty-two thousand songs.

Adeline was doing pretty well around the barber shops until the early twenties, when the scourge of prohibition settled on the land. Maybe it was the needle beer or the bathtub gin, but anyway, something happened about that time that caused the Saturday night songsters to go back into their memories and drag Adeline out by her bass—and tenor.

In the first place, the music just fits a tipsy tenor and a boisterous bass. They began singing it first in a big way down on the Bowery, where a man could get tipsy for a nickel, drunk for fifteen cents and murdered for a mere dollar.

And then when Park Avenue began to go to the Bowery for its excitement, it brought Adeline back up among the champagne and the shenanigans, and there she stayed.

FROM New York she toured the country and became the "It" girl of the goofiest chapter of American history. During the height of prohibition "Sweet Adeline" reached her pinnacle and was as much a part of the American scene as worthless stock, silly slogans and short skirts. She was throaty and husky, but had a hangover when prohibition died. Soon thereafter Adeline became anemic, and has been shriveling up ever since.

True, she will never die, but she certainly is ailing.

For some strange reason it's not as much fun to sing of Sweet Adeline's virtues after a drink of good legal whisky as it was after a hooker of bootleg, or a shot of bathtub gin. She just doesn't belong any more.

"Sweet Adeline" never was a million-dollar tune," Armstrong said, "but she held on steadily, and has been copyrighted in some fifteen countries. Our annual royalties average from eight to nine hundred dollars apiece."

DICK GERARD, who is short and stocky like Harry, still writes songs. Among his latest was "I'm Only Someone Waiting for No One at All."

After Adeline soared to the heights in a drunken spree, the team of Gerard and Armstrong wrote a sequel called "In the Golden Autumn Time, My Sweet Elaine," but the autumn frost caught Sweet Elaine just as she began blooming, and the tune never amounted to much.

"I still think Elaine is a good song," said Dick. "I got a check just the other day on Adeline. It came from Sweden. Seems funny to pick up dough from those countries. The song has been copyrighted in the Argentine, and I'm wondering how the Latins will like its slow melody."

Dick knew Jimmy Walker better than Harry, for he came from the same part of Greenwich Village as the former mayor of New York. He says Jimmy was a good writer, and that the skit "Phoebe Snow from Buffalo," which Jimmy wrote for Miss Allen, was a humdinger.

Harry and Dick do not agree on modern swing. Harry sees merit in some of these contemporary songs, but Dick hates swing and jazz and such, and predicts their doom.

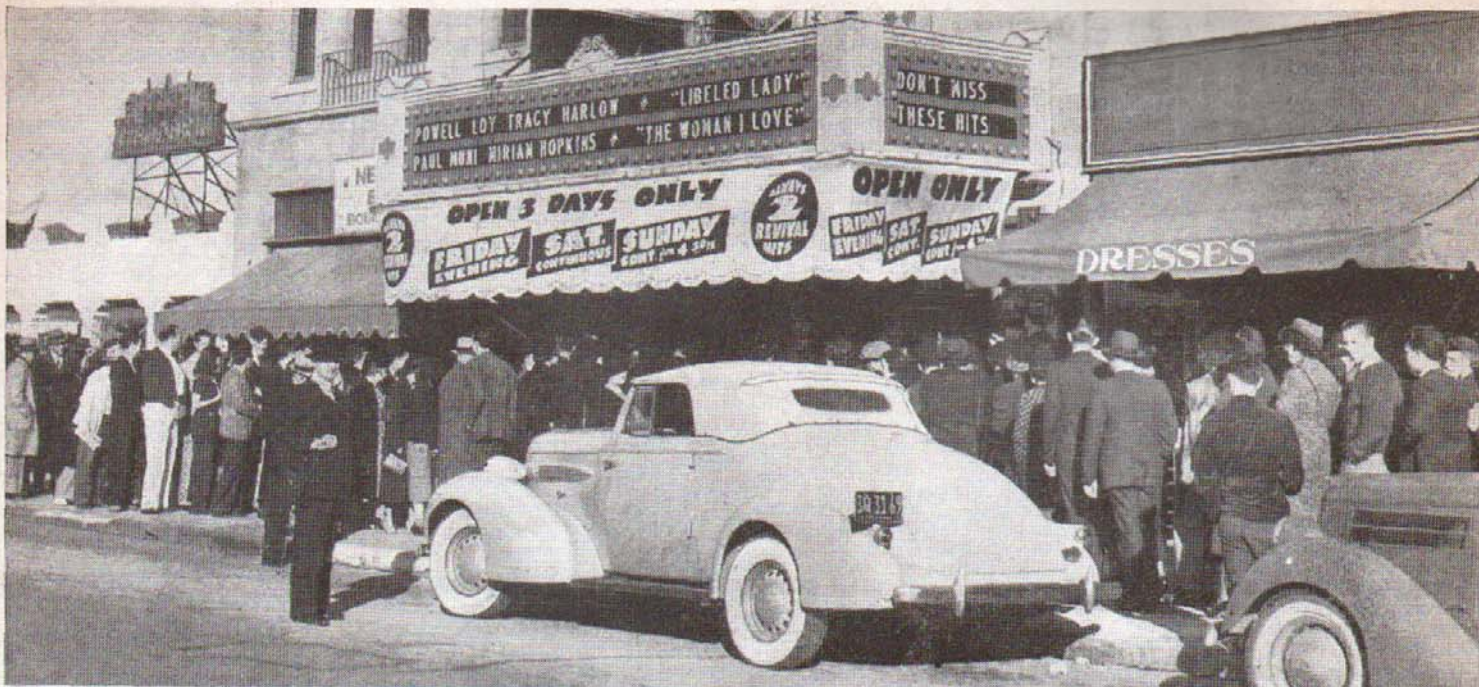

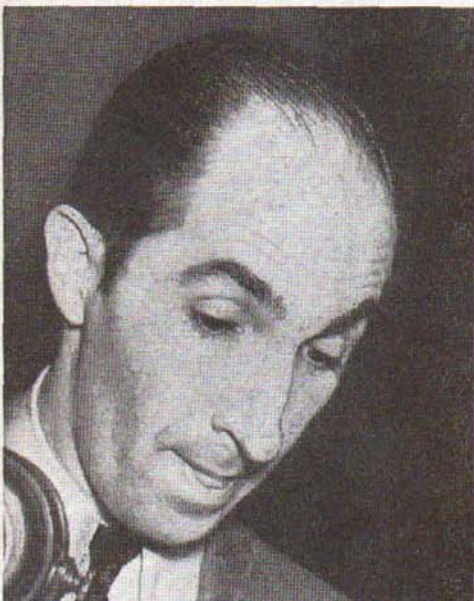

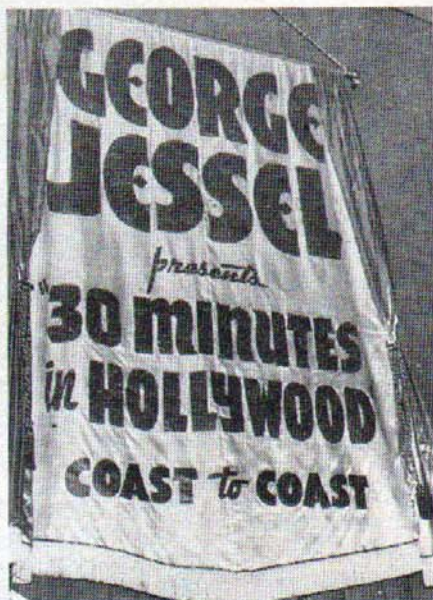

"MOTHER" SCHUMANN-HEINK'S LIFE WILL BE DRAMATIZED BY "CAVALCADE OF AMERICA" WED.

MADAME ERNESTINE SCHUMANN-HEINK died November 17, 1936. A month later the painstaking producers of radio's "Cavalcade of America" were on the air with a dramatization of the life-story of the grand old lady of opera. So impressive was the broadcast that as the last strains of music died away, Schumann-Heink's son, Ferdinand, who had listened attentively to the program, turned to friends and said quietly, "I felt as though my mother were there."

To Jeanette Nolan, 25-year-old radio actress, and Helen Oelheim, dark-haired young Metropolitan contralto, fell the task of playing the role which "Mother Schumann" had lived. They were hugely successful. Ordinarily there are few repetitions in the Cavalcade series, but requests for a second performance of the Schumann-Heink drama became so numerous that the producers decided to air the show again this year. Miss Oelheim agreed to sing, but Jeanette Nolan had disappeared, and there was no voice as satisfactory as hers.



Early last spring Miss Nolan and her husband, John McIntire, likewise a member of the Cavalcade company, had departed for Montana to fulfill an ambition to write the great American play. They were living one hundred miles from the nearest town—Kalispell, Montana—in the Yaak River country, in the north-

west corner of the state. Moreover, they were grimly determined to stay there until their play was finished.

An accident brought them back. McIntire became ill and had to go east as far as the Mayo Clinic, at Rochester, Minnesota, for an operation. Then his doctors advised him not to return to Montana, suggested instead that he spend the winter in New York. So the reluctant playwrights returned, and to the vast relief of Cavalcade's producers made themselves available for a repeat performance of the drama of Schumann-Heink.

The play will be broadcast Wednesday, with Jeanette Nolan taking the part of the beloved old singer and Miss Oelheim singing two of the songs which Schumann-Heink loved to sing: "Silent Night, Holy Night," and Brahms' "Cradle Song."

"Mother Schumann" would have enjoyed tremendously all the to-do about her. She was seventy-five when she died, but so full of the zest for life that even at that age she had begun a second career.

Born in Prague in 1861, the daughter of a major in the imperial Austrian army, she sang in her first public concert at the age of fifteen, at Graz. She earned \$6 for her performance. Her first fling at opera, in Vienna, was a failure. Later, in 1878, she won a debut and a four-year contract at Dresden, but lost her job when she married Herr Heink, a secretary at the opera house. Heink left her. Then she got a chance to sing at Hamburg. She divorced Heink, and married Paul Schumann, a first-rate actor, with whom she lived happily. She sang at Bayreuth before coming to America to join the Metropolitan in 1898.

The years beat down her voice, and her Metropolitan appearances grew more and more infrequent. Concert receipts dwindled. No temperamental prima donna, she turned to vaudeville and recitals in movie theaters. When radio came she appeared on the air now and then (inevitably at Christmas), sometimes remarking wistfully: "Don't worry, people. I'm not going to sing."

She went into the movies with a new interest in life and was a hit in her first role as the old singing-teacher in "Here's to Romance," starring Nino Martini. She liked her work. She wasn't too proud to learn. She wanted to be known as "Mother Schumann," not as Madame Schumann-Heink, the Wagnerian contralto. She wanted to start at the beginning again. "I do vot dey tell me," she said.

IN THE early 1820's one Amelia Alderson Opie, an Englishwoman, wrote a book of moral preachments against falsehood entitled, "Illustrations of Lying in All Its Branches." She named eleven such branches, including "lies of first-rate malignity," "lies of second-rate malignity," and "lies of wantonness; that is, lies told from no other motive but a love of lying."

"My first apology," she wrote in her preface, "is for having, throughout my book, made use of the words *lying* and *lies*, instead of some gentler term, or some easy paraphrase, by which I might have avoided the risk of offending the delicacy of any of my readers."

Evidently unafraid of any such eventuality are the members of the Burlington (Wis.) Liars' Club, founded in 1929 as a practical joke but now so firmly established that it is incorporated, has chapters scattered over North America from Canada to the Canal Zone and holds an annual contest to pick the world's champion liar.

The best-known liar in history was Ananias. But Ananias lied for selfish reasons, quite unlike those of such fabulous characters as Baron Muenchhausen and unlike those of the early lumber-camp narrators of the Paul Bunyan legends, who made a sharp distinction between an outright lie and a tall story. The Burlington Liars' Club does likewise. Its members are honorable citizens. They specialize only in tall stories.

THE club holds its annual festival of falsehood in Chicago on New Year's Day, choosing its champion then. A broadcast over NBC will carry to the nation the cream of the crop of this year's fabrications. Scheduled for appearances on the program are President and Mrs. O. C. Hulett; Secretary and Mrs. L. J. Stang; Vice-President and Mrs. Gilbert A. Karcher; and Attorney E. J. Cook.

Last year, Mrs. Stella Barnhouse, of Fowlerville, Michigan, was called the "World's Best Liar." She won a medal in the form of a lyre for her story of the huge Michigan mosquito who had attempted to swallow a mule and been kicked to death by his victim.

Second place went to Roman Links, of San Francisco, who delighted the judges of the contest with his tall story of the San Francisco fog so thick that he sprayed it with black ink, hacked it into pieces and sold it for coal.

Third place was awarded Mrs. C. B. Forman, of Attalla, Alabama, who submitted the unlikely story of a tornado so capricious that it blew the knot out of an Alabaman's four-in-hand tie, whipped it around a greeting card and Christmas package and delivered the parcel to the Alabaman's cousin in the next county.

Lies about animals invariably place high in the Liars' Club ratings, but in the eight years of the club's existence, incredible as it may seem, no fish story has won first place.

**BING CROSBY, WHITEMAN BAND
ALUMNUS, SINGS FOR PAUL ON
NEW CHESTERFIELD SHOW FRIDAY**

AT SEVEN, Paul Whiteman hated violin practise so heartily that he had to be locked in his mother's sewing-room when practise hours came around. One day, in a rage, he smashed his violin against the sewing-machine.

He grew up, nevertheless, to become one of the best-known musicians of his times. It was he who topped jazz with a high-hat, made it the subject of critical profundities, and brought it before tail-coated, evening-gowned audiences. It was he who shoved Gershwin and Grofe up the stairs toward fame.

Harry Lillis ("Bing") Crosby, playing cowboy-and-Indian, used to gallop about Spokane, astride a broomstick horse, shouting "Bing! Bing! Bing!" (whence his nickname) as he mowed down legions of foemen.

His family wanted him to be a lawyer. In college, at Gonzaga, he made such a hit with the glee club that with Al Rinker, a fellow student, he organized an orchestra, left school, got a job in a cabaret and then in vaudeville. Along came Whiteman, at the height of his glory, and signed the pair as vocalists.

In New York, Harry Barris joined them and the trio sang as the Rhythm Boys. They toured with Whiteman for three years. Then, in 1930, while they were in California making the picture "The King of Jazz," they left him and began an engagement at the Cocomanut Grove, in Los Angeles. There Crosby began making a name for himself as a soloist.

Friday Whiteman takes to the air with a new series of broadcasts under the sponsorship of the makers of Chesterfield cigarettes. Main feature of the program is Whiteman and his band of twenty-six, but an added attraction is a list of guest stars, many of whom the hunch-playing Whiteman discovered and started on shining careers. His first guest will be "Bing" Crosby.

The first five programs in the series will originate in Hollywood, where Whiteman and his orchestra are appearing at the Cocomanut Grove. After that they will come from one of the Columbia Broadcasting System's radio theaters in New York, with Deems Taylor coloring them with his commentary. Paul Douglas will be the program's regular announcer.

Whiteman says his new series will consist of "popular programs, devoted to tune favorites, old and new, but I hope to introduce many of the works of contemporary composers, with the emphasis, of course, on new American composing talent."

More important even than the glittering entertainment which the show promises is the possibility that out of the new series may come a discovery as important to modern music as the discovery of the late George Gershwin, whose immortal "Rhapsody in Blue" was given its premiere by Whiteman.

The itch for innovation has beset Whiteman since the beginning of his career. Critics rate him an able musician; stage folk call him a smart showman. Monotony worries him. He likes new ideas, experimentation, hunches, spur-of-the-moment action, and tries anything once.

At the Palais Royale, in New York, Whiteman inaugurated a new era. Dancers for the first time paid theater-ticket prices to hear an orchestra. Then Whiteman took his dance band into the theater, while showmen frowned and said it wouldn't work. But it did.

Whiteman appeared at Carnegie Hall. Men and women in formal dress made up his audience. Music critics wheeled out their dictionaries, moved ponderously into action. They wrote seriously about jazz. It was a new force in music. Whiteman was its Toscanini. And his name is magic, still. He was the "King of Jazz" in those days. He's the "Dean of American Popular Music" now.

THIS New Year's Day the Golden Bears of the University of California meet Alabama's Crimson Tide, clean-slated (but once tied) in four trips to the Rose Bowl. Both teams were undefeated in the season just ended, although California's record was marred by a scoreless tie with Washington.

At New Orleans, in the Sugar Bowl, Louisiana State (defeated this year by Vanderbilt, 7 to 6) meets Santa Clara, undefeated and untied and victor over Louisiana State in last year's Sugar Bowl battle.

At San Francisco, an all-star team of players from western colleges and universities meets a team of eastern stars in the annual East-West charity game, sponsored by the Shriners.

NBC broadcasts the Rose Bowl and Sugar Bowl games, with Don Wilson and Ken Carpenter at the mikes in Pasadena, and Bill Stern in New Orleans. Ted Husing will cover the Orange Bowl game for CBS, and when it is over at approximately 4:45 p.m. EST, the network will shift to the Cotton Bowl at Dallas, Texas, where Bryum Saam reports the last half of the game between the University of Colorado and Rice Institute. MBS has exclusive broadcast rights for the East-West game.

He gave music lessons and walked great distances to save centimes. On one such occasion he was struck by a bus and suffered injuries that proved fatal. Only after death did fame lift him on high.

Maily's celebrity came during his lifetime, as a composer and public recitalist on the organ and piano.

NOW seventy-two years old, Jan Sibelius is at last winning universal attention with his seven symphonies. Previously they had been neglected while orchestras everywhere played his easily appealing "Finlandia" and "Valse Triste."

Among the conductorial disciples of the Finnish composer, none is more ardent than Erno Rapee, whose zeal in the cause inspired him to give his recent Sunday noon course of Sibelius symphonies.

Millions of persons with no other opportunity to hear those works made their acquaintance through the Music Hall series.

Mme. Kirsten Flagstad has successfully been performing Sibelius songs in this country. Jan Peerce should win further acclaim for them, what with his emotional delivery and abundant equipment of tone.

The March of Music

Edited by Leonard Liebling

"... An ampler Ether, a diviner Air..."—Wordsworth

MANY of us are whole-heartedly behind Dinty Doyle, radio commentator of the *New York Journal and American*, in his campaign against what he calls "phony applause" from listening auditors in broadcasting studios. It is ridiculous to see the invited stooges swell, abate and stop their hand-clapping at the command of a radio monitor. To the performer, such applause means little, and to the home dialer, it means nothing at all. The practise is an insult to the intelligence of everyone concerned.

Speaking of applause, those purists who object to it between the movements of a symphony at concerts might turn back the pages of musical history and learn something surprising; for instance, that in the days of Mozart it was customary not only to clap the hands but also to comment audibly during a performance. He always estimated the effect of any particular passage in his works by the degree of applause and ejaculatory favor it received at the moment of hearing. That practise endured well into our century. I remember that during my student days in Paris, I used to hear concert and opera-goers applaud in the middle of an instrumental number or aria and shout "Bravo," "Magnifique," "Extraordinaire," etc. No one wishes to go back to such naive ways, but there is nothing wrong in applauding after the conclusion of the separate symphonic movements.

Americans really are the most polite concert and opera audience in the world, for they applaud everything, good or bad. Not so in other countries, where an inferior performance often gets hisses and jeers. In Latin lands, the noises are frequently accompanied by showers of tainted vegetables and eggs.

At the Metropolitan Opera, one encounters mercenary plaudits, formerly supplied by a "claque" paid by the management; today, those exuberant palm-pounders are engaged by some of the leading singers, who claim that they need the encouragement of an applauded entrance and the stimulus of innumerable curtain-calls.

The custom is an old one, dating from the time of Nero. He carried a horde of compulsory approbationers about with him everywhere. It was, as a matter of fact, dangerous not to applaud Nero. Petronius dared it, then wisely committed suicide.

The current Voice of Firestone entertainment on Monday evenings, conducted by brilliant (and busy) Alfred Wallenstein, has been adding variety to its programs by offering the piano art of Vera Brodsky in arrangements for that instrument and orchestra. A renowned concert interpreter, she brings to light music the same exquisite finish in technique and refinements in tone which distinguish her performances of the music of the masters. The welcome innovation is a distinct credit to the Wallenstein discernment and taste. Miss

ATMOSPHERIC echoes from medieval days sound in the opening number by Arcangelo Corelli (1653-1713), a noted composer and leading violinist of his period. The *Concerto Grosso* (subtitled: "Made for Christmas Night") is one of a set that appeared only six months before Corelli's death. He employs clear-cut themes with the strictly classical form and counterpoint of the time.

Mme. Novaes will have fruitful matter to interpret in the fourth piano concerto by Beethoven, wherein the soloist must to a large extent become a member of the orchestra. An oddity of Beethoven's construction in this work is the few gracious introductory measures allotted to the pianist, after which the other instruments discourse at considerable length before the keyboard is called upon again.

ALFRED WALLENSTEIN seems as versatile in the selection of programs as in their interpretation.

Formal beginning on the present occasion is Bach, most monumental fashioner of fugues, in whose endless ingenuity of craftsmanship and diversity of moods he remains unsurpassed.

Most of Bach's fugues were originally written for clavichord or organ, but other musicians later provided many of them with magnificent orchestral dress.

Extreme purists deem such amplifications sacrilegious, but their richer colorings and greater sonorities are a source of deep musical pleasure to persons not so ethically severe. Anyone who has enjoyed Leopold Stokowski's orchestral garbings of Bach's works would subscribe heartily to the practise of transcription.

"Dance" and "The Tomb of Couperin" are other keyboard compositions magnified into orchestral expression. Ravel is here the admired transgressor who defies the purists, and of course they can say nothing when he does so with his own piano suite written as an act of homage to Francois Couperin (1668-1733), surnamed "the Grand." His tomb is at the Church of St. Gervais in Paris, where the marvelous Couperin family officiated as organists through two centuries.

Alexander Glazounov (pupil of Rimsky-Korsakoff) visited America just before his death a few years ago. Typically Russian in warmth of feeling, opulence of tints, and robustness of humor, Glazounov's music is well represented by this "Grand Dance of the Fiances," from his ballet, "The Ruses of Love." The excerpt, however, has purely romantic character, with solos for the violin and cello.

Brodsky writes her own piano parts, and the skilful orchestrations are furnished by the highly gifted Morton Gould.

Twice in the past six months the playing of a wedding march has resulted in unusual experiences for Dr. Charles Courboin, noted Belgian organist, who recitals each Sunday noon over WOR-Mutual. On the first occasion it led to his engagement as organist at the Roosevelt-Du Pont nuptials in June. Again last month a wealthy Philadelphian, after hearing the artist's recital over WOR, telephoned Dr. Courboin, and offered to pay all his expenses if he would travel to England next April and play the same wedding march during his nuptials in Bath Abbey. Engagements in the Middle West threatening to keep Dr. Courboin from accepting the offer, the Philadelphian graciously advanced his wedding date five days!

An operatic record belongs to Lauritz Melchior of the Metropolitan Opera, featured Monday on the Banks presentation. He has sung the role of the titular hero of "Tristan and Isolde" more often than any other living tenor, the number of his performances totaling more than one hundred. A prodigious student, Melchior says modestly, "I learn something new each time I interpret the part, and I expect to know it tolerably well when I do my thousandth performance."

Helen Jepson and Donald Dickson, young American singers, assist at the General Motors farewell this Sunday. The several years of the concerts have brought memorable enjoyments which will be missed. Another departure—temporary, one hopes—is that of Eugene Ormandy as a conductor for Ford. He has won a devoted radio following.

Guioimar Novaes, Brazilian pianist to be heard tomorrow with the New York Philharmonic, is another who belies the old tradition that musicians should not intermarry. Mother of two children, Mme. Novaes is happily wedded to a Brazilian composer and devotes herself to domesticity except for the time occupied with her annual short concert tour in America. A friend who asked the composer whether his wife's practising interfered with his work received the humorous reply, "I write whenever she stops to turn the pages." Reminding of the anecdote about the lad who was supposed to be practising the piano. Hearing nothing, his mother called to him, "What are you doing, Tommy?" "Practising the pauses," was the unexpected reply.

by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart

Unusual sentiment attaches to the Metropolitan Opera revival of Mozart's "Don Giovanni" at this particular time. Just 150 years ago, in Prague, the masterpiece had its first performance anywhere. The Czech capital memorialized the event the other day with a Mozart festival of hallowed atmosphere and brilliant performances, resulting in the most complete triumph ever achieved by the always needy composer. Even so, the payment for "Don Giovanni," destined to win permanent greatness, was exactly \$240.

But, Prague adored Mozart, and he adored Prague, and spoke with deep affection of its people shortly before he died in 1791.

ACT I

At the Metropolitan the opera is done stylistically, with some of the aria sung before the curtain, while the stage sets are being changed for the many scenes, the first of which has the wily Leporello waiting for his master, Don Giovanni, while that libertine is intriguing to win Donna Anna at her home. He emerges, followed by the girl and her father, the Commandant, who engages the Don in a duel, and falls. His slayer flees with Leporello. Donna Anna and her fiancé, Don Octavio, swear vengeance.

In the second scene of Act I, the despoiler and his aid, plodding along a lonely road, encounter Donna Elvira, whom Don Giovanni has deserted while they were eloping. Leporello engages Elvira's attention with an ironical aria and Giovanni slips away.

In the third scene, a rustic pair are celebrating their betrothal, assisted by singing and dancing villagers. Giovanni desires the girl, invites the company to his castle (there he sings the spirited Champagne Song), detains her while they entone the entrancing duet "La Ci Darem" ("Your Hand in Mine, My Dearest"), one of the most popular of all operatic gems. Donna Elvira appears and denounces Giovanni, thereby opening the eyes of the dazzled and hesitant Zerlina, who chants her penitent song to Masetto, "Batti, Batti" ("Chide Me, Chide Me"). Donna Anna and Octavio trail the rake, the latter apostrophizing his affianced with "Dalla Sua Pace" ("On Her All Joy Dependeth"), an aria of rarest loveliness. All go to Giovanni's party, which opens the fourth scene with an entrancing minuet, danced by the assemblage.

ACT II

Giovanni utilizes the noisy gaiety to lead Zerlina into a secluded chamber. She emerges screaming, and Giovanni follows her, sword in hand and dragging Leporello, but the trick avails nothing, and again Anna, Elvira, and Octavio expose the villainy of the host, who promptly disappears.

Scene two brings Giovanni's further pursuit of Zerlina, and another reconciliation with Elvira. Also, Masetto, attacking his rival, gets himself a severe whipping. Leporello exchanges cloaks with Giovanni, and aping the latter's manner, lures away Elvira.

Scene three climaxes with an arraignment of Giovanni by Octavio, and the latter's delivery of the ravishing "Il Mio Tesoro" ("My Beloved"), a towering test in classical style for tenors.

Scene four and Giovanni and Leporello, stumbling through the darkness, come upon a statue erected to the memory of the Commandant. Defiantly, they invite the effigy to supper.

In scene five retribution overtakes Giovanni. He sups to music, when the stone Commandant enters after the unafraid gallant's sword has tried to halt the unwelcome guest. The Commandant grasps Giovanni with an icy hand, who, unrepentant and bold to the end, is dragged to his doom.

Critiques . . .

HEADLINES & BY-LINES

Kaltenborn, former editor of the *Brooklyn Daily Eagle*, Columbia's "dean of radio commentators," veteran of the Spanish-American War, and the only man ever to ransom himself from Chinese brigands by the comical expedient of juggling a piece of straw on his nose (paging Mr. Ripley), untangles the knots of conflicting news from the foreign fronts. Author of the best-selling "Kaltenborn Edits the News," he bristles with the wit and conviction that make his interpretations sparkle with common sense.

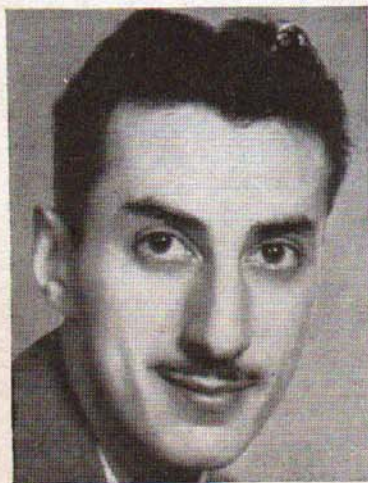
Esperanto . . .

A greeting in Esperanto, the universal language, precedes Linton Wells' discussion of "That's Life." It may not mean much to you—but every word from there to the end of his sometimes fiery, always mellow script will make you say, "That man knows what he's talking about!"

And he does! Men and nations—bullets and bolsheviks—diplomats and dukes—fakirs and fuehrers—they are all in the pattern of his amazing experience as a world-girdling wandering reporter. And in one twelve-minute weekly shot he gets an astounding amount of that experience and understanding across to his listeners.

Listen... and Learn

Brazil's Coup d'Etat to Be Explained Thurs.

Getulio Vargas, Brazil's new head man, will explain the coup d'etat that put him at the top of the first corporate state to be established in the western hemisphere when his henchman and Minister of Labor, Industry and Commerce, Dr. Waldemar Falcao, speaks directly to the United States by short wave and the Columbia network on Thursday evening, Dec. 30, at 6 p.m.

Vargas, who represents the Brazilian group that finds the deliberations of duly elected legislative bodies cumbersome and non-cooperative, has effected a deft version of the march on Rome, the Munich Putsch and the crossing of the Rubicon, all rolled into a new act in the history of the American Republics.

His first gesture to a world that wonders how these things happen, and why, will be a special airing for American consumption of his reasons and immediate objectives. The spokesman for the new corporate state apparently runs true to the pattern of lieutenant-dictators, for his portfolios of office

and influence already include Labor, Commerce and Industry. Quite probably he will be blessed with the added duties of Minister of Foreign Relations, Education and Propaganda if he does a good job on this broadcast.

Nevertheless, here is a program that no serious listener will miss. What Dr. Falcao says will provide a springboard for intelligent interpretations of this extraordinary and significant event. It will bring to American listeners a first-hand portrait of the situation in Brazil as seen by her self-appointed political saviours, and this in itself will be valuable grist for the mill of our own political cogitations.

Friday's papers will bulge with editorials raising the warning hand against the sinister plague of propaganda—the insidious prostitution of radio's nobler uses to the purposes of political self-interest. But few listeners will not be able for themselves to cull the chaff from the facts and get a sounder picture of the workings of dictatorial projects.

Resolutions . . . Ten Cents a Dozen



DON'T mistake that rumbling in the air for thunder out of season. It's just the uprushing flood of New Year's Resolutions about to be released. The new crop is bubbling impatiently in the shiny cauldron of good intent—as we all prepare to whitewash the old year's record with a fanfare of new resolve.

Meanwhile the old world mumbles "phooey."

It was mumbling "phooey" when the Pharaohs prompted the favor of the gods with bloody sacrifice . . . and it will still be mumbling when we catch up with Buck Rogers.

And that thin, soft wisp of mocking laughter? What's that? That's the cosmic chuckle at our annual attempt to spare ourselves the pangs of reflection—our New Year's effort to stare down the nude little fellow with the old man's scythe.

BUT . . . *The Moving Finger, having writ,
Moves on: nor all your Piety or Wit
Shall lure it back to cancel half a Line,
Nor all your Tears wash out a Word of it.*

That's our favorite Persian poet's way of saying, "What is, is!" And regrets, if regrets there are, are as stupid as they are ineffectual. Piety, wit and new resolutions cannot cancel "half a line" of your role in 1937.

And so with last year's resolutions currently assayed at about ten cents a dozen and a new year to be met with another gesture—we hazard one suggestion.

*Forget the petty self-denials and try this—
Entertain One New Idea Every Day!*

There's something to get your teeth into! There's the one sure way to avoid stagnation—the only indictment that we need fear as we face the blazing challenge of another year.

Golden Voice of Rome . . .

LET'S TALK IT OVER

Wed. Thurs., NBC-Blue, 2:15-2:30 p.m.

Her voice and personality charmed the listeners of thirty European countries . . . she supervised the French and English broadcasts of Mussolini's Station 2RO . . . and announced herself into a niche in radio's hall of fame as "The Golden Voice of Rome"—then came to an enthusiastic American audience as ace of women interviewers on the weekly "Let's Talk It Over."

That's Lisa Sergio—and a vibrant combination of Latin culture and American enterprise she is—both on and off the mike.

His material is solid, factual—with no taint of Hollywood or Broadway gossip.

You'll remember him, perhaps, as the mellow-voiced gentleman who short-waved from London those candid reports of the events surrounding the abdication of King Edward last year.

Now in this country to become an American citizen Cooke will be heard regularly as movie and dramatic critic for the National Broadcasting Co.

His special Christmas-season broadcast will cover current stage and cinema attractions on the Great White Way—"A Visitor's Guide to Broadway." This review will provide screen and drama lovers with the next-best alternative to an orchestra-circle seat—the play parade through the sensitive eyes of a man who knows his theater.

Cooke shuns all Broadway and Hollywood gossip because he insists on sticking to the belief and observing the rule, "the play's the thing"—and that's what you get.

Thematic Listening

Screaming headlines spill the thunder of the moment, but perspective designs the true pattern of history. Today's little event may be a key block in the finished puzzle of the future—and to see and understand the true portent of the things that are but news today is better to divine the shape of things to come.

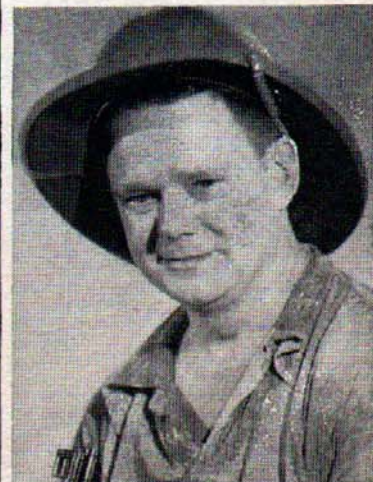

HOLLYWOOD SHOWDOWN

ROBERT MONTGOMERY, president of the Screen Actors' Guild, has issued a statement to the press saying, among other things: "I expect a greater exchange of movie and radio talent next year . . . Radio is a great training medium for young screen stars. They can't bauble their lines, for in radio there are no retakes . . . Radio is also a great build-up medium for them . . ." The dots indicate that, for brevity's sake, parts of Montgomery's remarks have been omitted—but nothing important has been purposely deleted. I quote the fascinating young actor because I'd like to do a little stating, too. First: Most motion-picture stars, old or young, do not have adequate rehearsal in microphone technique. Second: They have the darnedest habit of baubling their lines all too frequently (except on "Lux Theater," where FIVE rehearsals are held previous to the airing) and thereby ruining good scenes. Third: Why should radio BUILD UP movie stars? If they aren't built up already, their salary fees paid are too high for their contributions to the air—their oftentimes bad contributions. In fact, entirely too many motion-picture stars are making the air hard to breathe.

As a noteworthy example, I point to the recent poor performance of Mae West on the "Chase & Sanborn Hour." Mae was nervous. She had all the best lines (probably at her demand) in her sketch with Don Ameche. Her material definitely was not airworthy nor wholesome. Yet she probably received radio's record one-time fee!

The public also is tiring of the Hollywood dateline, especially when its glamour is dimmed by poor work or material. Why, the fans of Lum 'n' Abner have insisted overwhelmingly upon that pair's return (in their serial sketches) to the Pine Ridge, Arkansas, locale. L&A fans are tired of Hollywood. So are other tuners-in. Says one of many letters to your Hollywood reporter: "In regard to radio going Hollywood, I, for one, think it is getting monotonous. I appreciate good humor, but I do get tired of listening to so much silly wise-cracking and common, ordinary conversation, even if it is from the mouth of a movie star. Why such big pay for so little? This is taking the joy out of seeing movies. Too much of anything is unwise, especially if it isn't done well."

Newspaper publishers won't like this yarn—but it's true. At the Brown Derby the other night, after watching Miss West's broadcast, a newspaper boy came running in excitedly. "Extra, extra," he shouted, "I just heard it over the radio that Japan sunk an American gunboat!" . . . So I bought a paper—which didn't as yet have the story!

Rom-antics: Claire Trevor going places with Victor Orsatti . . . When young Betty Jaynes and Doug McPhail sing love duets on the Metro-Maxwell House show, they aren't fooling! . . . That whisper that Rudy Vallee is long-distancing the blond Robin Adair is all so much guesswork; Rudy's calls still go to brunet Gloria Youngblood, and it's someone else saying sweet things to Miss Adair . . . Priscilla Lane and Wayne Morris like one another, maybe . . . It's Paramount's assistant chief cutter who's lurching Martha Raye these days . . . Another twosome is Katherine (Sugar) Kane, the Oakie songstress, and Johnny Downs . . . Alfred G. Vanderbilt's FIRST date on his current Hollywood visit was with Swingstress Gertrude Niessen, but you know Alfie. Speaking of la Niessen, watch for her own new composition, "Right Now," a grand song. Gertie has two new Coast-to-Coasters in prospect,

and New York and Miami night-club dates waiting for her signature.

Who could that songstress be long-distancing from backstage of the theater studio where she works? Excerpt from her patter: "You can't stop me from calling you or wiring you." And she's married to a lad who isn't out of town! . . . Jimmie Fidler will be able to eat next year despite recent blasts

for her real genuineness, so here they are. Martha has neither gone high-hat—nor Hollywood. Her critics would make her appear so, but don't believe them. No girl is more regular, plays more benefits, or has a bigger heart.

at "radio gossips." His signed contracts for 1938 will gross him \$284,000—a matter of \$4,000 a week for radio, \$50,000 for a Warner Brothers picture, and \$500 a week for his syndicated column . . . Patricia (Honey Chile) Wilder was secretly screen-tested last week by Selznick for the Scarlett O'Hara role in "Gone With the Wind" . . . Amos 'n' Andy's Genevieve Blue is played by Madeline Lee, a Dallas gal. A&A are generously giving her swell lines, and she's putting them over! . . . Bob Hope, a-making Paramount movies now, is getting together a program that will have Ben Blue well cast.

One of Hollywood's most-misunderstood gals is Martha Raye, the Jolson songstress. She really deserves plums

The same show brought a rib for Phil Harris from his band. They thought it was terrific, hooted, applauded and yelled when this piece of business came along: Ed Beloin, Christmas shopping, said, "I'd like to see a chain for Phil Harris." A clerk responded, "What kind do you want, watch, dog or daisy?"

Alice Faye did a bit of visual heckling, too, on a recent Chesterfield program. She clipped, unknown to the victims, spring clothes-pins on the coat-tails of Announcer Carlton Kadell and Leader Hal Kemp. When each came on stage, the audience tittered, Kadell and Kemp were mystified—then later horrified when they learned the cause of the giggles . . . The Kemp band situation changes again from that announced exclusively in this column several weeks ago. Sary Dowell will stay with the band till it reaches the East and then may be put at the stick of another Kemp-Holden band unit. Maxine Gray will take a leave of absence to take screen tests; may rejoin later. A new girl will substitute. Skinnay Emms, too, will rejoin the outfit when through picture-making. Kemp, however, will lose Phil Fent, guitar player, who stays here to open a photograph studio, and the second trombone player, whose name slips my memory. The band leaves Hollywood Christmas Day, plays two one-nighters in Texas, a private New Year's party in Washington, and on January 7 will open a six-week theater tour in Washington, D. C.

Another amusing bit of by-play the tuning audience missed was the funny snowstorm effect Harry von Zell created when he was interviewed as a "blizzard" on a recent Phil Baker opus. Von Zell had stuffed his coat pockets with torn paper and kept tossing the scraps high into the air . . . And while talking of Baker, here's a basket of plums to Phil for starting the Dobson-Baker talent agency just to promote the lesser members of his cast and others whom he feels are overlooked.

If you haven't heard the first several Lucky Strike "Hollywood on Parade" performances, you'd better hurry up and tune right in these Wednesday nights. The premiere, featuring smooth, suave likable Dick Powell as master of ceremonies and singer, and showing off Thrush Rosemary Lane to advantage singing "Roses in December," was a most plump demonstration that, with proper direction, material and rehearsal, a movie company CAN put over a broadcast. The opener entertained ably also with a condensed version (complete, no preview) of "It's Love I'm After," starring Bette Davis, Basil Rathbone, Olivia de Havilland and Patric Knowles. A tribute to "Mr. and Mrs. Hollywood" as exemplified by happily wed Eddie and Ida Cantor was a worthy piece by Powell, and the music of Leo Forbstein's orchestra, an interesting "visit" to the Central Casting Bureau, the songs of the Dudley Chambers chorus and the Lucky Seven (six men and a girl) group rounded out an almost perfect hour. The weak spot, if a flaw must be found, lay in the nervous and not quite top delivery of Gary Cooper's monolog, "Golden West." On the other hand, the many scintillating acts, including Rufe Davis' clowning, gave the show a one hundred percent grade.

I am reminded that this is practically Christmas—maybe before you've read this paragraph. But how would you like to peep at the unusual and costly gifts the radio stars are giving their spouses and heart-beats? Your Hollywood reporter has been snooping and peering into all of the stockings and will report to you next issue!

LAST week I mentioned that I was going to visit the guest-relations department at NBC in order to get some information for RADIO GUIDE readers on how to obtain tickets for a broadcast. Jerry Martin, in charge of the department, has an ingenious system of handling requests, but first I want to tell you what happens to all the tickets. The sponsor of a program gets seventy percent of the total allotment, and the remainder is distributed to the various department heads at NBC. If you write in for tickets, you will get an answer. But save yourself time and trouble: don't ask for tickets to a Rudy Vallee broadcast—they are impossible to get. If you ask for tickets for a particular program and the supply is limited, you will be offered tickets for another program of less importance. Don't write more than once in, at least, four months. If you do, you will get a polite turn-down. A card-file system is kept of all requests with the name and date of the broadcast tickets sent. When a letter or card comes in, it is immediately checked with the card-file, and if you received tickets within the four months—you "no get." Don't do what one person did. He wrote four letters—one to WJZ; another to WEA; another to NBC; and still another to RCA. All letters are sent to the same department, and it didn't do any good. He got a nice letter acknowledging all four letters and thanking him for his interest in the NBC programs. Anyway, if you just want to see a broadcast and are not particular which one, write to the NBC guest-relations department; but I warn you, don't ask for tickets to a popular sponsored program. I told you last week what they do with them. Next week I shall tell you how ticket requests are handled by the Columbia Broadcasting System.

While I waited for Jerry Martin to come into his office, Dorothy Dreslin and Christine Johnson, NBC songstresses, strolled in and approached one of Mr. Martin's assistants. Miss Dreslin spoke up: "A friend of mine from out of town is coming to New York next week and she is very anxious to see the Benny Goodman broadcast. I know it's a very popular program and tickets are hard to get, but I'd really appreciate it very much if you will get two for me." The assistant squirmed in his seat and replied: "You should be ashamed of yourself. I should chase you out of here." The gals wondered why, until your reporter advised them that Benny Goodman is heard over the Columbia network. Were their faces red!

Incidentally, here's something interesting that Mr. Martin told me. NBC has received twice as many requests for tickets to the Toscanini series of broadcasts as all other programs combined. This in itself is proof that more people are interested in symphonic music than ever before, thanks to radio.

Gale Page left the Windy City for the film capital to make additional screen tests for Warner Bros., who seemed quite impressed with tests she recently made in New York. Gale had to shelve no less than thirty-nine pounds prior to her appearance before the kleigs, which is quite an order in any woman's life. The songstress wrote to a friend that it has rained ever since she arrived in California, and she is wondering if they took her first name seriously.

By the time you read this paragraph, Jessica Dragonette will be in Hollywood for concert appearances, and at the same time will discuss some business with a movie concern relative to her working in the flickers.

Maybe I'm wrong, but I don't believe Dr. Frank Black is any too happy about Toscanini coming over. Dr. Black was given a dispossess from his spacious office and has moved into less-pretentious quarters. His office was given to Maestro Toscanini.

blank pistol a few minutes before the program hits the airwaves so that the studio audience can be prepared for it during the course of the broadcast and not get frightened when it happens. I wonder if it might not be a good idea to warn the listening audience of the outburst of gun-shots. I have heard several listeners of this program remark that they have been plenty scared by the sound of gunshots, especially when they are in the house alone.

While on the subject of sound-effects, you may be interested to know that the siren used on the CBS "Gang Busters" program takes so long to die down that they have to place it outside the studio so that the sound-proof

Candid Comments: Mae West's "Adam and Eve" skit on the recent "Chase and Sanborn" program seemed very amusing to the studio audience, but to this writer it was very unfunny. Moreover, the double entendre lines uttered by the actress have no place in radio and should never have been allowed. They can hang a "No Children Admitted" sign on a theater marquee, but it is not possible to keep the youngsters away from a radio. Miss West also proved definitely that she is not suited to radio by the way she stumbled over her lines; so if I never hear her again over the air, it will be soon enough.

New Yorkers who like their swing music are going to get a real treat on Sunday night, January 16, when Benny Goodman and his orchestra will offer a concert of swing music. Incidentally, don't miss Goodman's recordings of "Camel Hop," "Loch Lomond," and "Jingle Bells." You'll also enjoy Hal Kemp's rendition of "In Dutch with the Duchess"; Wayne King's playing of "Prince Charming" and the "Evening Star"; and Dolly Dawn's recording of "You're a Sweetheart."

Hardly a week goes by without some news of one of your favorite programs changing time, the day of broadcast, or network. According to the mail, one of the many reasons RADIO GUIDE is so popular with its readers, is the fact that they can find out about these changes each week in the columns of their favorite radio publication. "That was clever, and timely, for if memory serves, crime was in season about then. But lo, the next dozen soap contests were overloaded with 'grime wave' entries!"

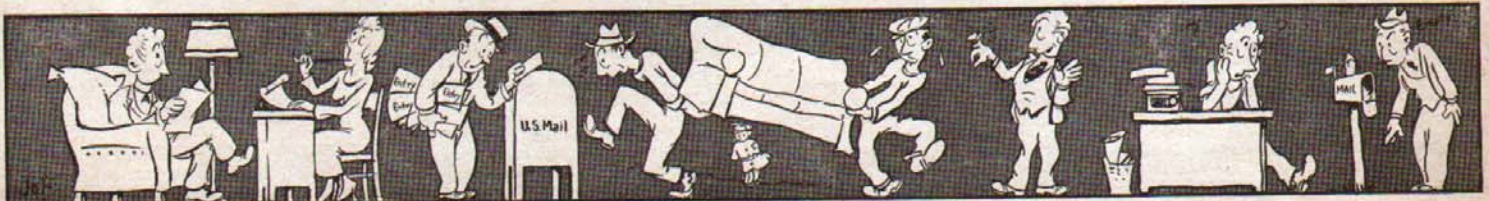

RADIO IS NO ESCAPE!

SHE entered radio to escape being cast in oldsters' parts but found she couldn't get away from it! That's the story of Jeanne Poli, young and attractive WICC staff addition who plays in the WICC-Colonial network Sunday presentation of the "First Offender"; and broadcasts the Listeners' Corner and Commuters' Clubs on WICC's early-morning program schedules.

To go back to the beginning, Jeanne comes from a famous theatrical family in Woodmont, Connecticut, halfway between Bridgeport and New Haven. The granddaughter of the theatrical magnate, Sylvester Z. Poli, she followed in the family footsteps at an early age and she still remembers her first stage appearance on the boards of the old Hyperion Theater in New Haven as a prize pupil of Madame Annette's dancing class. "It was a disastrous appearance," recalls Jeanne, "because a horrid little boy insisted on sticking his foot through the long gauze of my skirt and I did look a little bedraggled." That ended Jeanne's early attempts in the theater until school days took her to St. Elizabeth's Seminary for young ladies in New Jersey.

That's when the trouble started! Since she had a nicely modulated voice in the lower register, Jeanne was always cast in the men's parts! "I longed to play heroines," she says, "and I always ended up behind the footlights in trousers and a mustache!" Following a long apprenticeship at St. Elizabeth's in one-act plays (always cast as the male lead), Jeanne went to the Fairmount School in Washington, where she again (in an all-girls school) succeeded only in playing the part of "Earnest" in "The Importance of Being Earnest."

FORTUNE smiled for a while after she left Fairmount for further study in New York, and she actually succeeded in playing three women's roles, although they happened to be character parts: "Liz" in "The Distaff Side"; the lead in "Kind Lady," and the grandmother in "Family Affairs." Her dramatic coach at Fairmount, it seems, advised her to go to New York for further study, and Jeanne started in at the American Academy under Philip Loeb, Theater Guild director. After a brief time she entered the Alviene School, studying under Stuart Beebe and doing extra-curricular work at the Wayburn Schools, in fencing and musical-comedy dancing.

Coming home last summer to her family in Woodmont, she received a telephone call from a friend who was cast in a radio production over a New Haven station. The friend said, "Come along," and Jeanne answered, "Why not," and both went down to see the program director. It wasn't long before Jeanne was a favorite at the studios, taking part in all sorts of productions: detective dramas, home-circle dramas, fashion talks, everything. Her name and her voice became an immediate subject of interest to Connecticut radio fans, and it wasn't long before she received an offer from Guy Hedlund, drama director of WTIC in Hartford.

She accepted, commuting back and forth to Hartford, and gained considerable experience in radio production fields, but, she wails, she was always cast in character parts.

Another offer came her way that year and Jeanne went back to the New Haven station to broadcast special women's programs and newspaper features.

And then one morning she got up early. She tuned in on what she had come to regard as "her station"; decided the announcer who was broadcasting the "Early Birds" program was having too much fun and promptly

went down to help him. Early morning audiences seemed to like her bright addition to the program and she stayed. She had loads of fun doing it, so why not? Every bit of experience helped her.

In the fall of 1937, "The First Offender," a series of productions in which she had figured prominently on the New Haven station, was offered to WICC and the Colonial network, and Jeanne was asked to come along. Thinking she might be allowed to play new parts, Jeanne accepted, but soon found herself cast in character parts. She played dope fiends, gunmen's molls, worried mothers, while the ingenue roles were either eliminated from the scripts or went into other hands!

Shortly after her debut over WICC, Station Supervisor Joseph Lopez offered her a chance to continue her

broadcasting work over WICC and assigned her to the 7:00 a.m. "Commuters' Club." After one week her schedule was increased to include a one-hour "Listeners' Corner" program, including several features as well as the "Commuters' Club," and special broadcasts by musical organizations and women's clubs were given over to her capable supervision.

IN HER spare time she writes music, her earliest effort including the class graduation song at St. Elizabeth's Academy. She adores the music of Tommy Dorsey, entertains the members of the "First Offender" cast during rehearsals by piano selections, and recently turned down a screen test because she thought she wasn't ready for it. Scoots up and down the countryside in a long, yellow roadster. Likes reds, creams, browns and yellows in clothes, though she doesn't care about dressing up and is just as happy in a sweater and skirt. Sometimes that's all she has time to get into in order to reach the WICC studios for her 7:00 a.m. program. The station is eighteen miles away!

Questioned about radio, she says simply, "Oh, I like it." But she hasn't given up the idea of wanting to play heroines in radio plays. She still believes her persistence will some day be rewarded. Around the studio she's nicknamed "The Royal Duchess," because of her relation to the Marchioness Lippo Gerini, of Florence, Italy, a maternal aunt.

FORECAST OF WORLD EVENTS FOR 1938 TO BE HIGHLIGHT FOR CBS LISTENERS NEW YEAR'S DAY

THE saddest words of tongue or pen undoubtedly are "It might have been," and probably the sweetest (although song-writers won't agree, of course) are "I told you so." The latter is a favorite not only with backseat drivers and nagging helpmeets but with writers and economists who assume the responsibility of forecasting the future. And why not? After all, the man who dons the robes of a prophet runs sizable risks, and who but a churl can begrudge him, modestly uttered, "I thought so all along" when his predictions come true?

Whether he be a cracker-barrel philosopher, a mystic, a professional seer, a political pundit, a newspaper columnist, or a professor of economics, he can seldom resist the attraction of

tions, and, in our own hemisphere, Brazil's venture into nationalism.

At home, the chief matter of speculation are the real depth of the current business recession, the extent of the apparent changes in the relationship between the administration at Washington and big business, what shape our sorely tried foreign policy will assume under increasing pressure in the Orient and in Europe, the outcome of next year's congressional elections, who will emerge in the vanguard of presidential possibilities for 1940.

Japan has taken the major cities of China, and the conflict between the two powers in the Orient seems likely now to degenerate into guerrilla warfare, to be determined finally on the basis of who can hold out longest under economic strain. But what of Russia, in the meantime? Will she be dragged into war with Japan as Japanese troops push further into the Asiatic continent and the inevitable border clashes between Soviet and Nipponese patrols make headlines for the world's front pages?

a bright New Year's Day and the opportunity to peer into the future and scrawl his prophecies on a clean slate. His reward, an outside chance that sometime, somewhere, some months later, he can sit back in his easy chair, light a cigar, and remark laconically, "Well, that's what I've always said, you know." Forecasts and forebodings are as common on New Year's Day as are good resolutions and vows for self-improvement, if not more common.

THE Columbia Broadcasting System has capitalized on this. New Year's Day, for the third year, CBS will bring to radio a kind of preview of history, a program composed of prophecies for 1938, by some of the world's best-known journalists, men whose knowledge of statesmen and their doings gives them a real foundation for a bit of crystal-gazing. No man in his right mind claims the power to predict sudden disaster, but the writers and commentators who appear on the annual New Year's broadcast by CBS are equipped, like many others of their craft, to predict the future as accurately as any human can.

Questions of outstanding importance in the mind of every person who takes time to look at the world nowadays are the war in the Far East, the extent of Russia's internal political storms, the Spanish civil war, the significance of the alliance binding together Germany, Italy and Japan; Italy's recent withdrawal from the League of Na-

AND what of the mysterious rumbling within the Soviet? Will the bloody purge of old bolsheviks go on? Will high-ranking bureaucrats and generals continue to disappear before firing-squads? Will Russia's internal troubles keep her so busy that she takes no part in foreign affairs, even in the face of growing threats from hostile Fascist states?

In Spain, General Francisco Franco has made huge gains. How long will the Spanish war go on? When, and if, it is determined, what will be the positions of the nations who have used Spain as a gridiron for their own fierce contests? Italy? Germany? Russia? Will fascism or communism emerge triumphant from the chaos of civil strife? These are questions of pressing import.

Speakers who will tackle these and other problems on the CBS' Program of Prophecies include: H. R. Knickerbocker, veteran war correspondent, who will talk from London on possibilities in the Sino-Japanese conflict; William Hillman, writer on European affairs, who will discuss the political and economic outlook on the continent and in England; Paul Mallon, Washington writer, who will talk on domestic events; Seymour Berkson, speaking on trends in the United States, and H. V. Kaltenborn, CBS news commentator. In addition, Louella Parsons, Hollywood columnist, will talk on coming events in the movie world in 1938, and David Walsh, sports commentator, will take a look at the future.

The speakers will be introduced by Bob Trout, of the CBS staff, who, with Kaltenborn, acts as a news commentator on CBS' "Headlines and By Lines." Their symposium of forecasts will cover every phase of possibility during the coming year from the danger of another World War to the marriage of Charlie McCarthy. It will be a peek into the future through the eyes of men who forever look ahead.

BIG BROADCASTER

WHEN a lad of 11, Bill Fields ran away from his home in Philadelphia to become an actor. But before he found work, he lived a hand-to-mouth existence for 4 years, selling newspapers, doing odd jobs. Finally he landed a job in an Atlantic City beer garden at \$5 a week, then a job that paid \$10 a week with board—and in his spare time he practised juggling, his heart set on a stage career. When he finally broke into vaudeville, it was on a cheap circuit that called for twelve shows a day, but Fields proved his ability, and by the time he was 20, he was touring the world as a juggler and pantomimist.

For 9 years he was featured in the Ziegfeld Follies and other Broadway musicals—and then, in 1925, he turned to the movies, became an outstanding star.

Scorning many radio offers, Fields finally signed a contract last year—and immediately became an air favorite, costarring with the irrepressible Charlie McCarthy. Today, Fields is dividing his time between pictures and radio—despite poor health. His latest picture, "The Big Broadcast of 1938," will be released on Dec. 31.

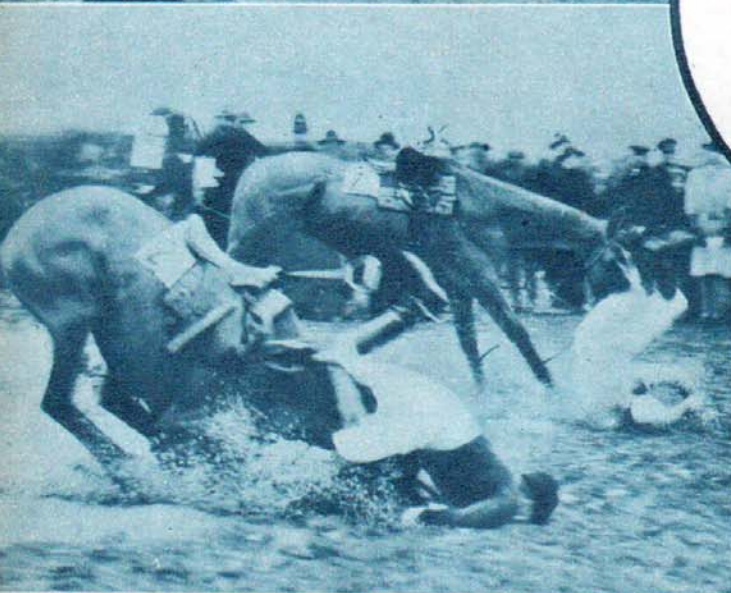

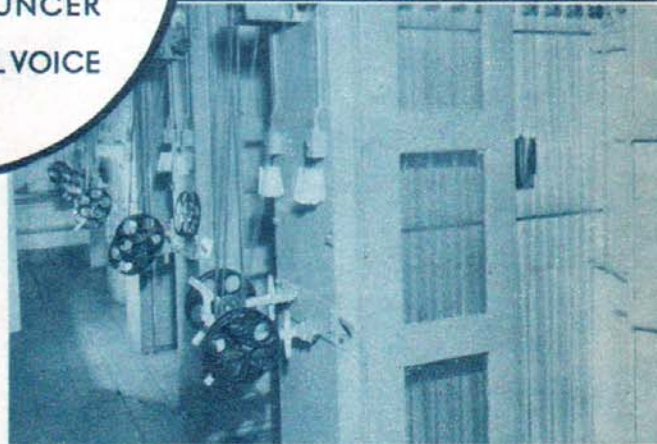

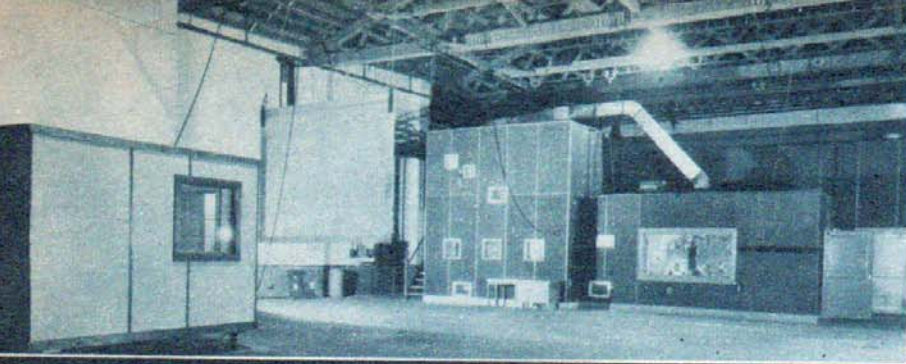

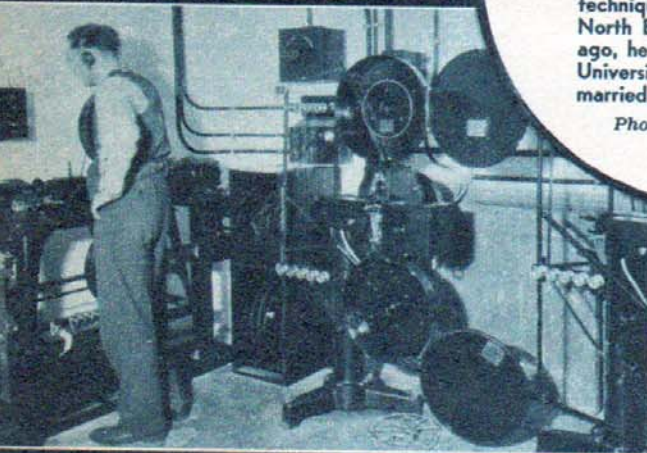

New Year's Eve on the air means the finest dance music in the world. This year, as in the past, all three major networks will extend facilities from Coast to Coast—and on to Hawaii, to celebrate New Year's in each time zone. From New York, MBS will air the music of Horace Heidt, Benny Goodman, Guy Lombardo, Tommy Dorsey, Richard Himber and Leo Reisman. Then, moving west,

the network will pick up Dick Jurgens, Bill Carlson, Shep Fields and Kay Kyser, all from Chicago. Instead of moving into the mountain-time zone, however, MBS will devote an hour to the rhythms of Vincent Lopez from Cincinnati, Sammy Kaye from Cleveland, Dick Stabile from Pittsburgh, and Herbie Kay from Philadelphia. After that, MBS carries on from the West Coast.

From San Francisco it will air the music of Joe Reichman, and after a fifteen-minute broadcast from Honolulu, it will conclude with the music of Everett Hoaglund and Red Nichols from Los Angeles. Meanwhile, CBS will be making the same kind of cross-country tour. From New York, it will air music by Jay Freeman, Benny Goodman, Eddy Duchin, Cab Calloway, George Hall and Rich-

ard Himber. Then on to Chicago for music by Frankie Masters and Orin Tucker. During the next hour, music from Denver will be offered to radio listeners. After that, CBS will pick up the bands of Ted Fio-Rito from Los Angeles and Sterling Young from San Francisco, and conclude with dance music from Hawaii. NBC will follow suit—with orchestras selected at the last minute



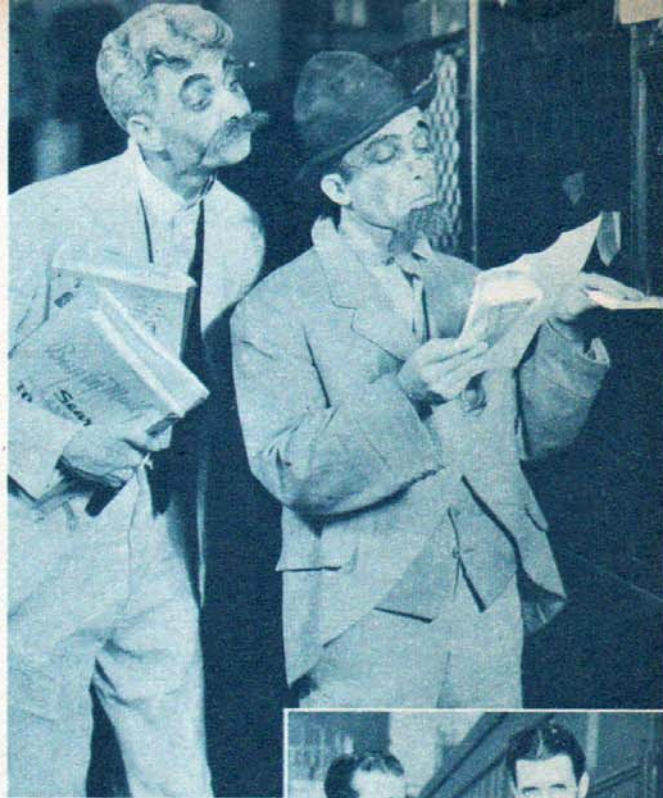

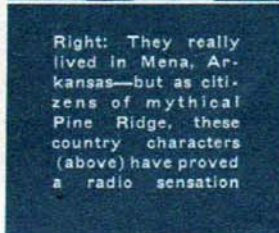

RADIO is unique in that it is the only medium entirely dependent upon voice for characterization. Yet costumes do have a place in this field. Often comedians wear them to amuse studio audiences, in the belief that if the audiences are sufficiently amused, their laughter, when heard on the air, will be contagious and add to the pleasure of listeners. Sometimes, when serious scenes are played, costumes are worn to create the proper atmosphere in the studio—and occasionally they're worn by entertainers who make up for their parts in order to have a clear image of the person they are attempting to portray.

Listeners, of course, are unable to see the costumes of air actors, and everyone gets his own individual impression of the character being portrayed. Yet if characterizations are skilfully done, listeners should be able to recognize them. Can you identify these faces?

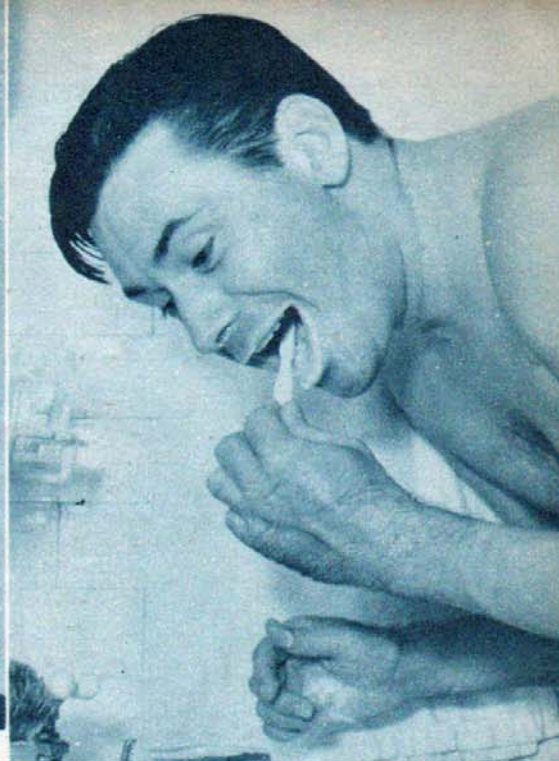

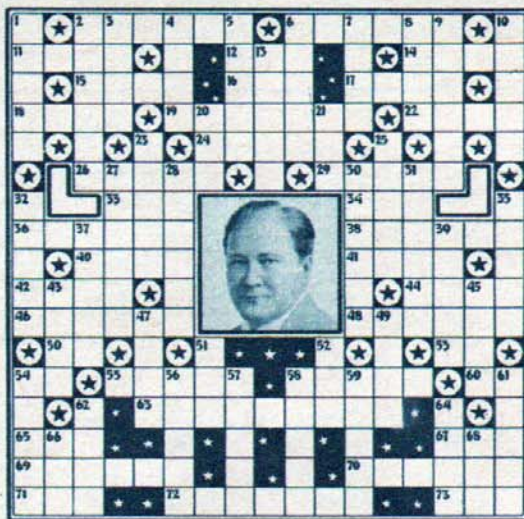

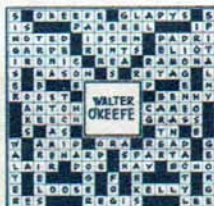

SHORT WAVES

BY CHAS. A. MORRISON, president, INTERNATIONAL DX-ER'S ALLIANCE

Broadcasts mentioned below are Eastern Standard Time. For CST subtract 1 hour; for MST, 2 hours; for PST, 3 hours.

BOTH of General Electric's international stations in Schenectady, New York, W2XAD and W2XAF, will be on the air continuously and simultaneously for 40 hours from 9 a.m. EST on Friday, December 31, until 1 a.m. EST Sunday, January 2, 1938, so that short-wave listeners all over the world may enjoy the programs broadcast in connection with the New Year's celebration. Dance bands from Coast to Coast will greet the arrival of the year 1938 in the various time zones.

Through the cooperation of NBC, the New Year's broadcast of the Sugar Bowl football game from New Orleans, will be heard at 2 p.m. EST on January 1, with the Rose Bowl game at Pasadena, Calif., following at about 4:45 p.m. EST.

Of particular interest to operators, will be the broadcast over 2RO3 (9.635), Rome, on Sunday, December 26, at 7:45 p.m. EST, featuring a running commentary from the Royal Opera House, upon the occasion of opening night.

Listeners to Daventry, England, will hear the following feature broadcasts this week: A program direct from the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem will be heard on Sunday, December 26, at 12 noon EST. The transmission is being designed to reflect Christmas in its true home and will include, it is hoped, the bells of Bethlehem and singing by a choir in the Church of the Nativity, as well as a description of the Holy Places. . . . On Sunday, December 26, at 3 p.m. EST, a special religious ceremony will be broadcast from Lambeth Palace, for more than seven hundred years the London home of the Archbishops of Canterbury. The address will be given by the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

The past, present, and future of the Empire Service from Daventry, which is now five years old, will be discussed in a talk by J. B. Clark, director of the Empire Broadcasting Service, on Friday, December 31, at 5 p.m. EST. . . . Before "Big Ben" strikes midnight, thus ushering in the New Year in Great Britain, a Watchnight Service will be broadcast from the Concert Hall in Broadcasting House, London, at 6:45 p.m. EST, on Friday, December 31. The first broadcast of 1938 from Daventry, starting at 7:01 p.m. EST, will show listeners how the New Year is being welcomed in different parts of the country—in remote villages as well as in important centers. Starting at 8:05 p.m. EST, a broadcast will be radiated from the Chelsea Arts Ball at the Albert Hall, London. This is one of the most famous and gala events of the year.

The new French broadcasting station at Essarts, near Paris, first announced in this column last week, is being heard irregularly between 5 and 8 p.m. EST, on one of the following frequencies: 6.04, 9.55, or 11.845 meg. No English announcements have been heard so far, and the broadcasts consist for the most part of semi-classical selections, apparently relayed from one of the Paris broadcast stations.

The first broadcast in the series from Northwest River, Labrador, which was scheduled for Sunday, December 12, was canceled owing to a last-minute emergency trip which the operator, Tommy Cunningham, was forced to make, thus leaving no one at the station to direct the program. . . . Another

Labrador station which has been coming in quite well of late is VO6J (14.272). This is a private commercial transmitter owned by an aircraft company, which also serves as a meteorological station for the Canadian government. The location is Sand Girt Lake, 300 miles above the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

E. H. Clark of Hollister, Calif., heard a new station announced as ZRX, between 10:33 and 11 a.m. EST. Although the announced frequency was 6.1, the station actually came in on approximately 6 meg.

Following is a complete list of the commercial stations at Bolinas, Calif., as furnished Earl Roberts of Indianapolis, Ind., by the Federal Communications Commission: KRR (2.776), KEF (6.71), KEN (6.845), KEL (6.86), KEB (6.89), KEE (7.715), KET (9.48), KEI (9.49), KER (10.39), KEZ (10.4), KES (10.41), KKQ (11.95), KKZ (13.69), KLL (13.72), KKW (13.78), KWE (15.43), KKR (15.46), KKL (15.475), KEM (15.49), KQZ (17.98), KQG (18.00), KQJ (18.02), KQR (18.04), KUN (18.06), KMM (20.78) and KSS (20.82).

The new short-wave station for Singapore, Straits Settlements, is under construction and if all goes well, will be on the air about next March. The suggested frequencies are 6.0125, and 9.53 meg.

W1XAL of Boston, Mass., will receive an increase in power from 20,000 to 50,000 watts if the petition of the World Wide Broadcasting Corporation to the Federal Communications Commission is successful. . . . The Columbia Broadcasting Corporation has requested permission to add a new frequency of 25.75 meg to those already in use by Short-Wave Station W3XAU of Philadelphia.

Cyril B. Will of Kenilworth, Ill., reports the new Cuban COCA, was heard testing on a frequency of 9.06 meg, Sunday at 6 p.m. EST. The station relays Broadcast Transmitter CMCA in Havana. . . . The new Italian Short-Wave Stations 2RO5 (15.17), and 2RO6 (15.3), may be heard testing and relaying the programs of 2RO3 at irregular intervals. Starting in February, these transmitters will adopt a regular schedule of broadcasting.

The international race for supremacy in the short-wave field is on. Present stations are being made more and more powerful, while new stations are being constructed at a feverish rate. From present indications it won't be many years until short-wave programs from the far corners of the earth will be competing in popularity with the best network offerings in this country.

Starting with this week, transmission number six, from Daventry, England, will commence at 9:15 p.m. EST, instead of 9 p.m. EST as heretofore. Sign off will be at 11:15 p.m. EST under the new schedule.

Ray Shaffar of Waterloo, Ia., writes that on Sunday, December 5, two of the most interesting stations on the air, namely VP3THE (13.74), base-camp transmitter of the Terry-Holden Expedition in Southern British Guiana, and OX2QY (14.368), winter-camp transmitter of the MacGregor Arctic Expedition at Reindeer, Greenland, were successful in establishing a two-way contact. During the course of the conversation Captain MacGregor said

the sun had been gone for two months, but that occasionally there was enough light from the moon and stars so they could see well enough to prevent them from stumbling over any obstacles. He said they had seen many foxes, some as white as the snow upon which they ran. A few gulls, and some birds resembling the American crow had also been observed.

Orrin W. Hufferford, the operator of VP3THE, related that they had lost track of the advance party, and that it had been several days since they had been able to contact them. When he had last heard from Dr. Holden, he said, they had already made a good collection of birds, animals and herbs. . . . VP3THE may often be heard working North American amateurs, utilizing frequencies of either 14.3 or 14.11 meg.

Roy Waire of Ballston Spa, N. Y., was fortunate enough to tune in FZES (17.28), of Djibouti, French Somaliland, on the morning of December 2, at 8:05 a.m. EST, when this station, which normally is used for C. W. transmissions, was testing with voice, saying "Allo, Allo, Ici Djibouti," over and over again.

Clarence Hartzell of Jeannette, Pa., informs me that a communication he has received from the Australia Broadcasting Commission, states that the call of VK3LR (9.58), Melbourne, has been changed to VLR. Pending the replacement of the present transmitter with a high-power one, the present power is being doubled. . . . An unconfirmed report states that the call of VK3ME (9.5), Melbourne, is to be changed to VK3LR. This station is an experimental one owned by Amalgamated Wireless, while VLR is owned by the government.

The 10-meter (28 meg) band is a happy hunting-ground for long-distance reception these days. On Sunday, December 12, between 9:30 and 10:30 a.m. EST, I logged ZEIJR in Southern Rhodesia, G5ML in Kentworth, England, GM6RG in Scotland, VP9R in Bermuda, VE1BR in Nova Scotia, CO2LV in Cuba, and YV5AA in Caracas, Venezuela. VK2GU (28.06), in Australia, is being heard with strong signals near 7 p.m. EST.

The appropriation of nearly two million schillings for the construction of a powerful Viennese short-wave station near Vienna. Within a year's time the music of Lehar and Strauss will be bounding into this country with an impetus of 50,000 watts. . . . The first of India's new 10,000-watt short-wave transmitters has been completed by the British Marconi Company, and has been slated for opening early in 1938.

The Netherlands government is constructing a high-power transmitter at Jaarsveld in the neighborhood of the city of Utrecht which, it is hoped, will be on the air by the beginning of 1938.
