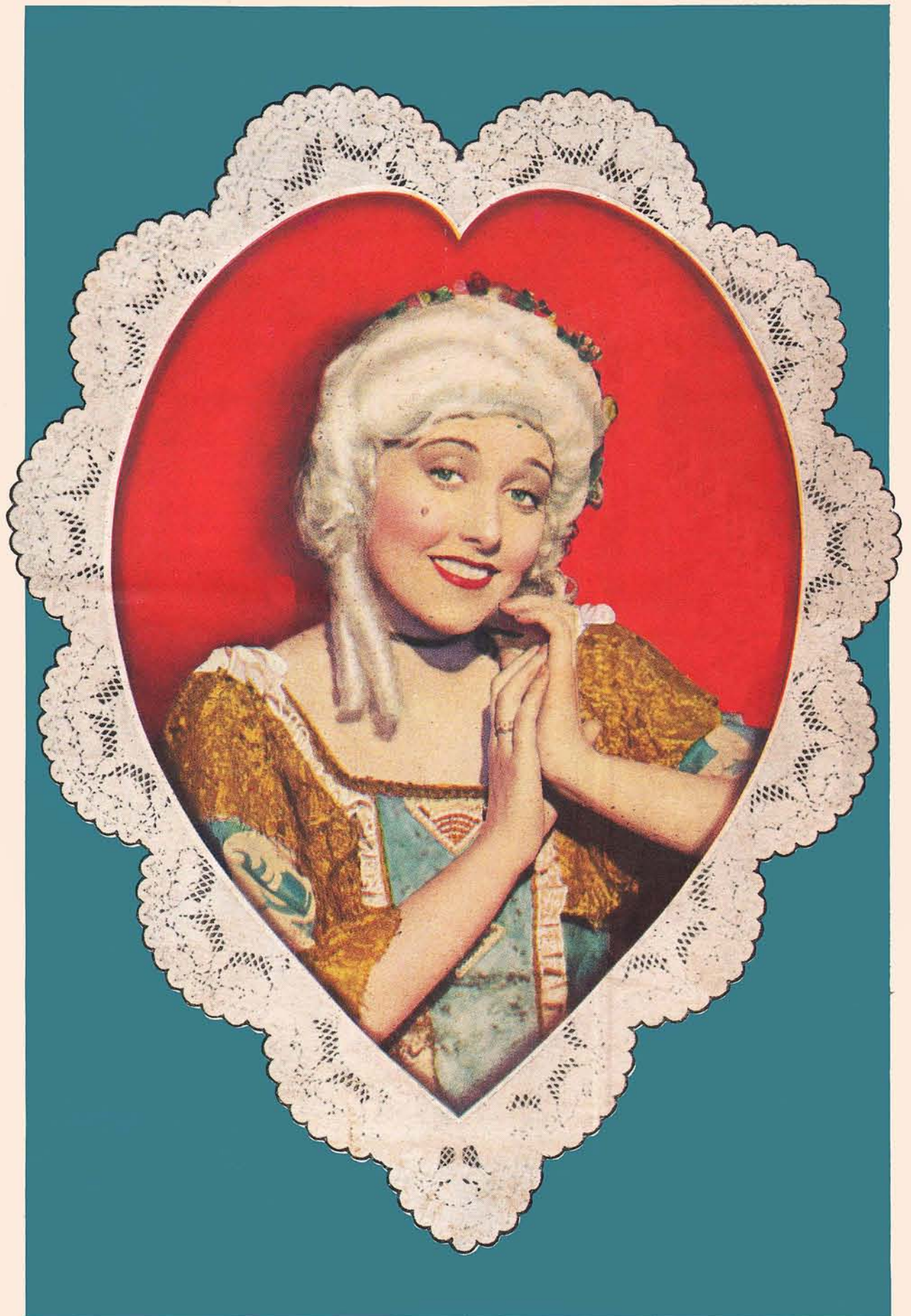

AWARDED TO THE NATIONAL FARM AND HOME HOUR

EVER since the formation of the National Broadcasting Company it has felt that the noontime belongs to agriculture; since 1928 it has! Back in the fall of that year NBC conceived the idea of a national radio program designed to fit the special needs of the more than thirty million American agriculturalists whose labors keep the bread-basket of the country filled. That was the beginning of the National Farm and Home Hour.

Now in its tenth year, this program, heard week-days over the NBC-Blue network, brings the farmer into daily contact with chief policy-making officers of the national government and provides him with a ringside seat at the most spectacular happenings in agricultural America.

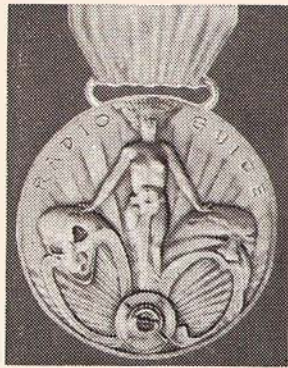
The United States Department of Agriculture is and always has been the chief collaborator with NBC in presenting it. Other cooperating farm organizations, numbering almost fifty and representing every phase of American agriculture, include the National 4-H Clubs, American Farm Bureau Federation, National Grange, Future Farmers of America, Farmers Union, and the Association of Land Grant Colleges and Universities.

Special broadcasts direct from the scenes of important farm events are a regular feature on the Farm and Home Hour. Each year microphones are to be found at various livestock expositions, corn-husking contests, har-

vest festivals, country-life meetings, and the conventions of major farm organizations to relay the story of the proceedings to Farm and Home Hour listeners.

A revue of rural America, this program is truly the farmers' variety show. In it, rural folk have chosen a much more meaty program as their own than have any of their urban cousins. Not only do they hear fine music but they listen attentively to guests whose messages are broadening intellectually and profitable materially. There is none of the song-and-patter or swing craze in this series. They learn politics first-hand, and they take more of a hand in self-government than does any other group of citizens in the United States. Needless to say, the National Farm and Home Hour is a vital factor in helping rural America form the views on which its votes are cast.

Not only has the National Farm and Home Hour's long record of radio service to farmers and homemakers of the nation won it the title of "Farmer's Bulletin Board," but it has actually become known as the voice of American agriculture. Because of its unselfish rendering of that service, Radio Guide joins with the nation in a salute this week to the National Farm and Home Hour. To it, the editors give its highest award, the Radio Guide Medal of Merit, which will be presented on the air Tuesday.

Greene, veteran of the 1933 expedition to Mt. Everest, will describe the "Assault on Everest." His talk will concern the new Everest expedition of seven men, leaving London last week. Although not a member of this latest expedition, Greene has helped in the preparation for it.

Dr. Walter Damrosch . . . Lincoln song
"Magic Key of RCA"—NBC-Blue, 2 p.m. EST.

One day after the 129th anniversary of Abraham Lincoln's birth, Magic Key presents Dr. Damrosch conducting his own composition, "An Abraham Lincoln Song." Dean of American musical conductors, Damrosch recently celebrated his 76th birthday. This program will also feature Consuelo De LaMar, lyric soprano, singing from her native Cuba.

Pescha Kagan . . . guest pianist
"Magazine of the Air"—CBS, 5 p.m. EST.

Guest on the "Magazine of the Air" will be an 18-year-old concert pianist, Pescha Kagan, who has been heard on the program before. She was born in Washington, Pa., of Russian parentage, studied in Vienna and under Josef Hoffman, and has been soloist with the Cincinnati Symphony and the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestras. Paderewski complimented her on her technique.

Frogs . . . jump for \$10,000
"Golden Gate Exposition Mining Day"—NBC-Blue, 6:30 p.m. EST.

Featuring a mammoth frog derby, this broadcast will be heard from San Francisco. Philip Bradley, president of the Alaska Juneau mine, has wagered \$10,000 that his frogs will jump higher and farther than the famous "Salome Jane" frog owned by Thomas Campbell.

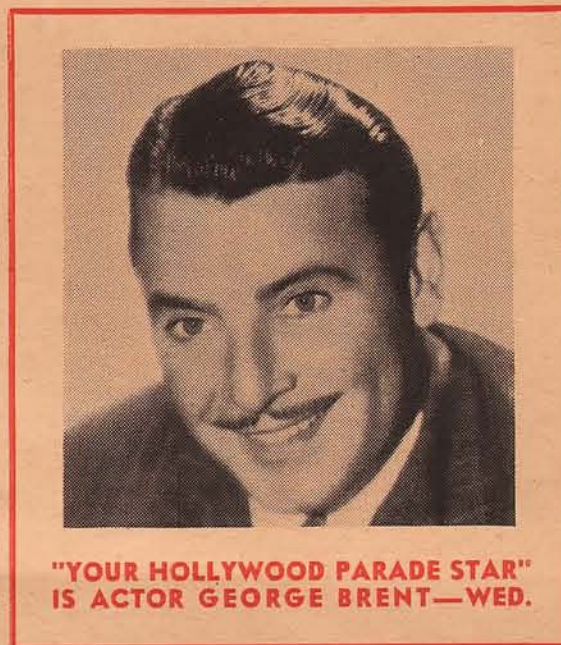
Pan American . . . Temples to Friendship

"BY ME YOU ARE GRAND"

EVERYBODY'S SINGING IT—"BIE MIR
BIST DU SCHOEN." PLAYED ON THE AIR
FOR THE FIRST TIME BY GUY LOMBARDO,
RADIO MADE IT THE NATION'S NO. 1 HIT

THE marquee of the little Parkway Theater, fast in the wilderness of Brooklyn and on the fringe of the clattering ghetto, was bright and cheerful that night, and its lights flickered the message that the Yiddish musical comedy, "I Would If I Could," was opening.

But the little crowd that milled around the marquee and gaped or bought seats was not cheerful. It was hard to be cheerful in 1933, for the world's head was throbbing with the depression hangover.

Inside the theater, Aaron Lebedeff, one of the Brooklyn boys and idol of the Yiddish theater, peered over the footlights and smiled. It took a good man to smile in 1933—a hero to laugh. Then Lebedeff turned to his co-star, looked into her eyes and sang:

"Bei mir bistu shain."

A haunting tune it was, a sweet melody. The audience swayed as he sang. It patted its feet. It smiled. It laughed.

"Bei Mir Bistu Shain"—By Me You are Beautiful!

Only those who understood Yiddish understood the song, but the spectators in the theater understood, and when they walked out that night in 1933, they were smiling.

The world looked brighter. Things couldn't be so bad as they seemed—"bei mir bistu shain"—it rang in their ears. Durn it, wish that melody would get out of my head.

Thirty-three passed with a ray of hope on the horizon, '34 ran away, '35 was a husky year—swing it! Thirty-six came and went, and the nation's

tempo was churning again—racing! Thirty-seven, and the nation got that sinking sensation in the pit of its stomach. Thirty-eight—

And across the East River—that dirty, tricky, vicious river—from the wilderness of Brooklyn to the wilds of Broadway there came the haunting melody—

"Bei Mir Bist Du Schoen."

NEW YORK hummed it, the people patted their feet. They laughed again, and radio flung it into the far corners of the land, and the people sang—it means, "You are grand!"

That's how it happened, neighbors. It took the latest song-hit five years to get across a little river, and a few days to get around the world.

And behind it all is one of those strange stories that can happen only in radio and in the United States. You hear a heap about freedom of the press, but some day some scholar is going to do an opus on freedom of the theater, for it is there America gets its moods.

There is no explaining "Bei Mir Bist Du Schoen," the song your radio probably is playing right now. It's the same old "Bei Mir Bistu Shain" that Lebedeff sang back in 1933, except that "Shain" has been changed to "Schoen," but it still means you're grand—you are beautiful—you are the tops—you are bella—you are wunderbar—every language tells how swell you are—you are grande, si si—tu es tres elegante—you are the bee's knees—honey, yu's de stuff!

JACOB JACOBS and Sholom Secunda earn their daily bread by putting music and words together. They got their heads in a huddle back in 1933 and created the original Yiddish song. It has been called Hebrew. It is not Hebrew. Hebrew is as dead as Latin. It has been called German. It is not German—it's Yiddish. The language is spoken by Jews. It's their tongue. It's difficult to say exactly how it started, and even Jews disagree. But their consensus is that the Jews, who went to Germany many years ago to escape persecution, merged some of their Hebrew words with German and the re-

sult was Yiddish. It's a musical language, softer than German, and expressive.

There is no English word to tell exactly what "shain" means—the nearest to it is beautiful—not beautiful in the slightly sense, but swell—great—fine. As an American will say to his girl, "Darling, you are the tops," an American Jew would say in Yiddish, "Bei mir bistu shain."

Jacobs wrote the original lyrics. They don't rhyme in English. Secunda did the melody. The music rhymes in any language, and by me it's grand!

The song was a fair-to-middling success in Yiddish, and the show did pretty well. But when the show closed after a run of one season, only in Brooklyn, the owners of the song sold it to J. & J. Kammen for \$30!

J. & J. KAMMEN are Brooklyn music-publishers, but publish only Yiddish songs. It was not unusual for songwriters to sell a piece for such a pittance. The chances were a million to one that if it wasn't a hit during the run of the show it never would be a hit, and would die in Brooklyn, which is a bad place, indeed, to die—but a nice place to live.

J. & J. Kammen gave the boys a check for \$30, and cataloged the song. The boys cashed the check, took \$15 each and forgot all about it. Secunda, a conductor, kept on writing Yiddish music. He now is at the Jewish Art Theater and is doing all right by himself.

The Kammen house stuck a few copies of the song on the racks, and they gathered dust. Then J. Kammen, a little, jolly fellow who at eighteen was the youngest conductor on Broadway, took "Bei Mir Bistu Shain" from view, stored it among the dead songs and went his way, selling more popular Yiddish tunes.

And thus ended the first chapter in the life of a song.

Guy Lombardo deserves a medal. Once a week in his broadcasts he presents a song that he believes will be a hit. He's usually right. Last summer he explored his file, snatched Bei Mir etc. from the bottom and told his orchestra, "Here it is—the hit!"

"Sounds like the leading dish on a Swedish menu," said one of his musicians.

"Play it," said Guy, and his boys rehearsed it. Their eyes sparkled as they played—again and again.

"It's swell," they said in unison, "by us it's hot!" And after rehearsal they walked away, feeling better and humming that thing.

The nation first heard it on the radio. It didn't click right off the bat, but other orchestra-leaders saw the handwriting on the wall and ganged Guy, demanding where he got the song. He told them.

And a new hit was born.

The musicians flocked to little Mr. Kammen in droves. He thought they were crazy.

"Give it here," they demanded.

"Where is it?"

"Where's what?" little Mr. Kammen asked excitedly, for only a miracle or a big feed could interest musicians that much.

"That Mister Shain business—the one we heard on the radio. Don't hold out on us!"

"Yeah," said another, "you know the song—My Dear Husky Jane."

"That's not the name," shouted another, "It's Buy a Beer, Mister Shain."

"Nope, it's 'My Dear Barney MacShane'—it'll take the Irish like an epidemic."

"It's 'Come Here, Liza Jane!'"

"It's 'My Dear Dusky Dame'—a Negro song!"

"You guys," said little Mr. Kammen, holding up his pudgy hands, "are nuts! The only song I've got like that is 'Bei Mir Bistu Shain.'"

HE HAD only a few copies! But little Mr. Kammen knows his music. He knew he had something. So he got together with the house of Harms, which publishes English songs. Sammy Cahn and Saul Chaplin set to work writing the English version. They changed the Yiddish "Shain" to the German "Schoen" so it would rhyme with again, and it does—crazy as it may look.

Since everybody wanted to know what the expression meant, the boys wrote it that way—it "means that you're grand." If a boy is singing it to his sweetheart, he says, "It means you're the fairest in the land." If a girl is singing it, "It means that my heart's at your command."

The singer could say "bella"—Italian for beautiful, or even "wunderbar"—German for wonderful—but whatever language he uses, it means you are grand!

It is pronounced "By meer bist doo shane."

The publishers had to dash to the presses for more copies, and before they could shake the daze from their eyes, the song had sold more than 200,000 copies. It jumped to the peak of "Your Hit Parade." From Sioux Crossing, Idaho, to Broadway, the folks sang it.

AL JOLSON, Eddie Cantor and George Jessel sang it—Jessel in Yiddish. Benny Goodman plays it every night! Lebedeff, playing at a Broadway theater, sings it at every performance, and the audience hums it and shakes the ceiling with cheers.

It has done something to America! You can't lick a people who can laugh and sing. Look back! Remember "Brother, Can You Spare a Dime?"

Only America could sing about its plight, could put its woes to melody. Then came "Who's Afraid of the Big Bad Wolf." It was an epic—a simple melody that made the people laugh at their troubles. It perked up the

spirits. Then came "Happy Days," and the nation was rolling again—rolling along to that dippy, dopey "The Music Goes 'Round and Around."

This nation's history from 1929 until 1938 has been written in songs—hum them:

Nineteen twenty-nine, the so-what, prohibition era—"Maine Stein Song"; the depression—"Hallelujah, I'm a Bum" and "Brother, Can You Spare a Dime?"; the awakening—"Happy Days" and "Who's Afraid of the Big Bad Wolf"; the new spree—"The Music Goes 'Round"; and the recession—"Bei Mir Bist Du Schoen."

The song knocked Hollywood back on its heels. It couldn't overlook a bet like that. Warner Brothers was producing "Love, Honor and Behave." It grabbed the song and stuck it in. And, for one of the few times, *Variety*, the magazine of the theater, announced a show as featuring a song, and not an actress or author.

THE show will be released in March, but "Bei Mir Bist Du Schoen" marches on. Its owners are worried lest its popularity wane before the show is released, and an effort is being made to soft-pedal the melody. It's like trying to check Niagara.

When Secunda realized that his 1933 melody was a sensation, he just laughed. He had sold it for \$30! But J. Kammen and the other owners did something virtually unprecedented in the hard-boiled music world.

"Secunda and Jacobs will share in the profits," said little Mr. J. Kammen. "We will compensate the author and lyrics writer. It's a matter of morals, not of law."

"The song is the first Jewish song ever to click after being put in an American version. One of the last Jewish song-hits was 'Du Greene Kosine,' which means 'My Green Cousin,' or 'My Country Cousin.' It came out in 1922 and went over swell."

The first time I heard the song was on a train. I was sitting in a smoker with three men discussing this and that. One companion was a southern industrialist. Another was connected with the Department of Agriculture, and the other was a Connecticut Yankee, en route to Arkansas, where he had business holdings.

OUR discussion, naturally, got around to business and politics. We all had different opinions. The argument got warmer, and then hot and we all got huffy. Eventually, our senses returned and we agreed to call the whole thing off.

"Let's go back in the club car," suggested one.

Back in the observation car was a small troupe heading for Oklahoma for a show. There were three men and a girl. They were near the corner of the car, and the girl was standing before the men, talking softly.

"Listen carefully," she cautioned, "and you'll get it. It's a knockout. We'll do it at our first performance."

Then she sang Bei Mir etc. I thought she was saying, "Oh, ain't it a shame."

But I patted my feet. My industrialist traveler was listening intently. "What's she singing?" he asked. "Sounds like 'my beer is the same.'"

WE ALL listened. The argument was forgotten. And, since I make my living asking questions, I asked the lady what she was singing. She told me, and sang it again.

By the time our train reached Chattanooga, Tenn., everybody in the club car was singing, and the porter was carrying the bass.



In Memphis, I tried to tell some friends about it, but I couldn't pronounce the title. Some guests were in my hotel room one evening, and I was trying to hum it. I can't tote a tune in a water-bucket.

"I know the song," said Charles Maughan of Station WREC, in Memphis, who was among my guests. "Hold everything. He fetched a radio from the station, contacted the Columbia Broadcasting Station in New York, learned when the song would be played again. And while we all ganged around the set, Maughan got the song for us."

The guests went away singing it. "If it wasn't for radio," Maughan said, "that song wouldn't be popular here for a month or so after it was

popular in New York. But now the same song that is popular in New York today is the hit in Hurricane, Ark., the same night."

When I got back to New York, the redcap who met me was humming it. So was the subway guard. And when I reached home, it was blaring on our radio.

"Isn't it a swell piece?"—the first words that greeted me.

By me it's grand. We should have a stamp issue for our musicians and the radio, for they have given us something to think about besides our worries. You can't lick a nation that sings.

"I've tried to explain—bei mir bist du schoen—it means you're the finest in the land."

IN BROOKLYN, N. Y., recently, one Salvatore Lamarcella, a fruit-peddler, lifted the door to the cellar where he kept his reserve supplies and stomped down the stairs into the darkness, whistling cheerfully. "It's a snake!" volunteered a bystander. "He says there's a ten-foot snake down there!"

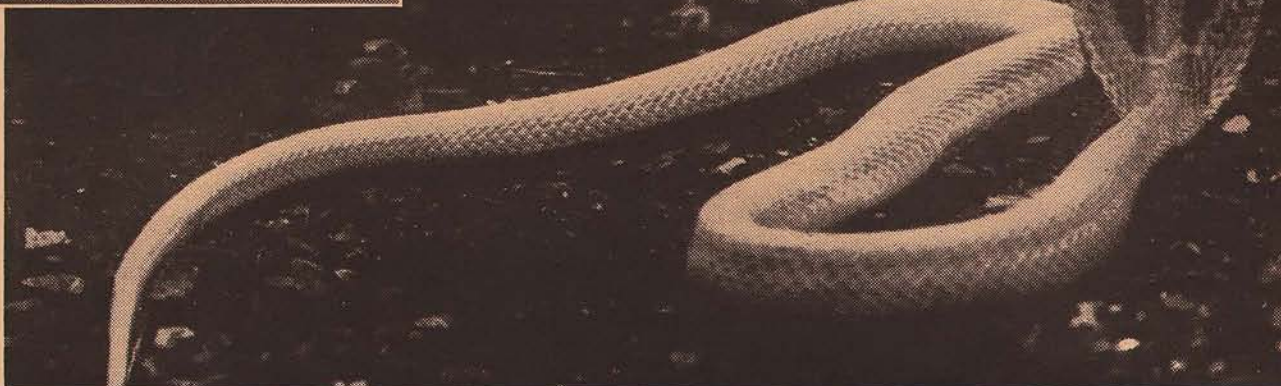
"Nuts!" said the policeman.

DOWN the stairway they clomped. Then, like the king of France's men, they clomped back up again. One of them made for a telephone. The other frowned on the crowd. Presently a car drew up at the curb and out popped two agents of the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Together they made for the fateful cellar door, bearing long poles topped with prongs. Within a few minutes they too emerged from Lamarcella's cavern, bearing between them what looked like a piece of heavy rope—except that it wriggled, a phenomenon not ordinarily ascribed to rope. The crowd on the sidewalk gasped and fell back. "Snake!" said somebody.

"Boa constrictor," said one of the S.P.C.A. men, laconically. "Little one. Baby." The crowd laughed uneasily, still vaguely appalled. The snake was only five feet long, instead of ten, as Salvatore had reported, but his error was pardonable under the circumstances. The crowd shuddered.

Unharmful and without difficulty the captive reptile was taken to Barrett Park Zoo, on Staten Island, and lodged in safety.

"It's either sleepy or lazy," its captors explained. How long it had been in Salvatore's cellar no one knew, but the best guess was that it had arrived only recently with a shipment of fruit from South America.

AFFAIRS like that don't happen often, even in Brooklyn—but in Brooklyn or anywhere else they make people pause to think. In the western world at least, the almost invariable reaction to snakes is a feeling of fear and revulsion, and there is something about the mere sight of snakes that shivers the timbers of the average man's complacency. Snake-fear is one of the oldest of mankind's fears.

Scientists say it isn't instinctive—that it's something acquired by every new generation and transmitted by that generation to the children of the next. Psychologists say that children are never afraid of snakes unless the fear has been implanted in their minds by a parental warning to avoid all crawling things. But once that fear is planted it becomes deeply rooted—sometimes ineradicable.

CURIOS facts about snakes, immemorial enemies of one part of mankind, oldest forgotten gods of another, will be the subject of a radio broadcast Sunday, Feb. 13, on the series known as "The World Is Yours," sponsored by the Smithsonian Institution and presented by the Office of Education of the U. S. Department of the Interior and the National Broadcasting Co.

Unquestionably part of our modern horror of serpents springs from the

story of the Fall of Man in the Book of Genesis. "... and the woman said, the serpent beguiled me, and I did eat. And the Lord God said unto the serpent, Because thou hast done this, thou art cursed above all cattle, and above every beast of the field, upon thy belly shalt thou go, and dust shalt thou eat all the days of thy life."

It was a force for evil in the Christian and Jewish faiths, but in other ancient religions the serpent often occupied a lofty place. An early Egyptian account of the creation, for example, recites that in the beginning there was nothing but darkness and silence, and that out of this Great Night evolved the World Egg, which eventually divided into the skies and the earth. One version is that a great world serpent warmed and hatched the egg, and thus gave life to the universe.

ANCIENT Egyptians also believed eclipses of the sun, which they could see but found hard to explain, were due to attacks on the sun god, Ra, by a great serpent, Apopi, who lived in the celestial river and from time to time assailed the sun god and his boatmen. The sun, they reasoned, was obscured in the fury of the fight as the snake was beaten off.

Ancient Hindus, in accounting for the universe, held that the world was supported on a series of foundations, the lowest of which was a great coiled world serpent floating in water. On top of the serpent was a great tortoise, and on the broad back of the tortoise stood four sturdy elephants who held up the earth.

Snake-worship antedates written history and goes back into the age of bronze. Apparently in the minds of

primitive peoples the snake was associated with fertility. In Greek mythology it symbolized wisdom and longevity, and was also associated with Aesculapius, the god of medicine. In modern India—although death from snake-bite is frequent—many natives consider snakes good omens and go out of their way to set out pans of milk and water for serpentine visitors.

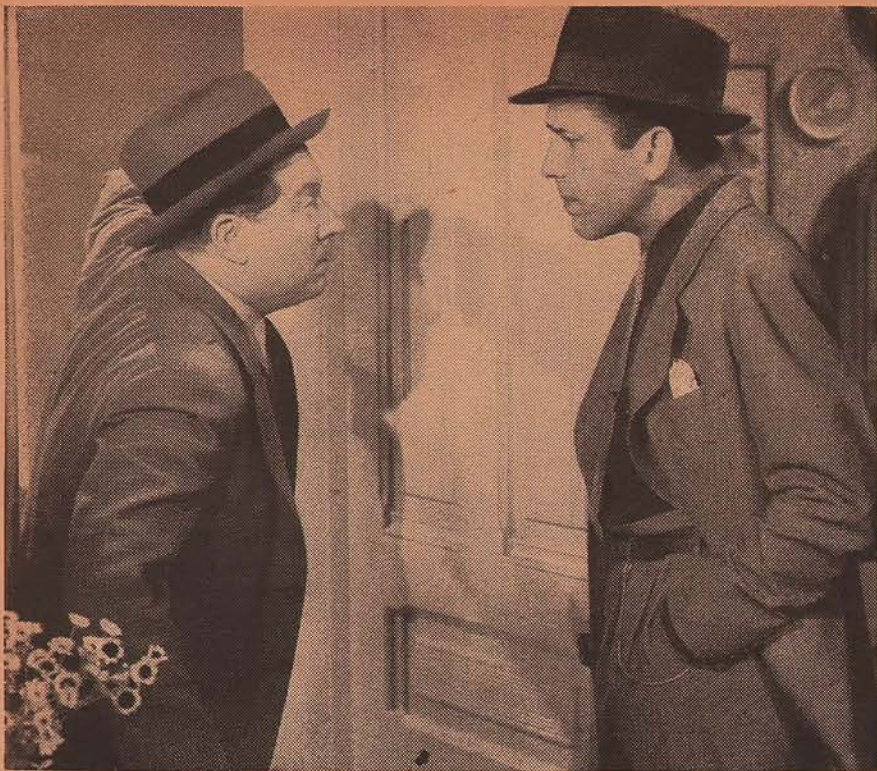
IN OUR time, and in the Western Hemisphere, there are few traces of snake-worship, but there are many evidences of the persistence of age-old fears. It is these fears that form the basis of the incredible snake stories and legends which gain currency and strength with the years, despite the attempts of scientists to dispel them.

A myth which has considerable standing among southern Negroes in the United States is the story of the "whip-snake," which is said to pursue human beings, wrap itself around their legs and lash them to death. No one has ever known an instance where this actually happened, but the belief in the whip-snake is persistent.

It is true that in the South there is a "coach whip," which has been known to follow people, apparently out of inordinate curiosity, but this type of snake will bite only if cornered and annoyed and seldom shows fight. There is, furthermore, no proof that it ever has behind its beady eyes any idea of setting upon a human being with intent to whip to death.

ALMOST everyone is familiar with the story of the "hoop-snake," which, according to legend, puts its tail in its mouth and rolls along merrily instead of crawling. The myth-makers

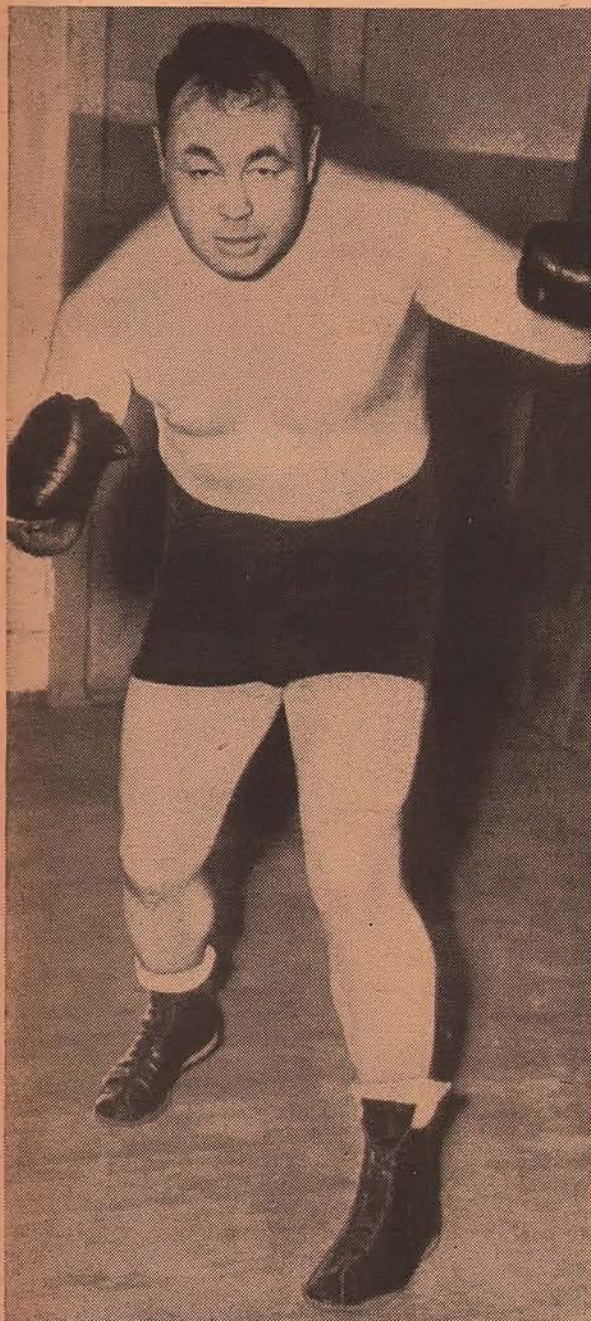

"**OBERON**," written in 1826, was the last work from the brilliant pen of Weber, and after conducting its world-premiere at Covent Garden, London, in April of that year, the composer passed away there only eight weeks afterward.

Today's overture concerns Oberon, the elfin king, Puck, and two young lovers who remain constant through all temptations. The opening horn-call is the summons of Oberon. Later is heard the broadly grand melody, "Ocean, Thou Mighty Monster." The overture ends in a blaze of brilliancy.

Dvorak's Concerto does not receive frequent hearing these days, and it is a pity, for the music is ingratiating, racy, and sparkingly scored for both the soloist and orchestra. Beethoven and Brahms, with their two concertos for violin, are towering opposition to other works in the same form. Only Mozart's, Mendelssohn's and Tschai-kowsky's retain some enduring hold.

THIS Wagner list displays the composer's cumulative art from his early "Rienzi" to "Goetterdaemmerung," composed thirty years later.

Melchior, sterling Wagnerian tenor, first reveals the mystery of Lohengrin's origin and the story of the Holy Grail; then follows the burst of impetuous song, "By Silent Hearth," with which the young cavalier, Walther, intends to make entry to the vocal contest for the hand of Eva; and lastly, the warm Melchior tones sound in the rapturous measures he addresses to Sieglinde ("Walkuere," end of second act) as he describes the allurements of the moonlit spring night and their invitation to love.

The March of Music

DIFFERENCES of opinion regarding the values of this and that have existed ever since early Biblical days, when Elisha and Naaman argued about the relative curative properties of the Rivers Jordan, Abana and Pharpar.

In music it is likewise. The controversies about the merits of Wagner, Strauss, Debussy and later moderns occurred in comparatively recent periods, but more ancient memories revert back to the time of Palestrina, whom Pope Pius IV honored so gloriously. Berlioz said later that the Italian's choral works are nothing but exercises in counterpoint.

Debussy disliked Bach; Beethoven and Chopin made him their daily musical bread. Berlioz called Handel "a musician of the stomach"; Gluck considered him "a musician of the heart." When Weber heard Beethoven's Seventh Symphony, he remarked: "Beethoven is now ready for the madhouse." When Beethoven heard Weber's "Freischuetz" he called it "a collection of diminished sevenths." Brahms fell asleep while hearing Liszt play one of his piano pieces. Brahms hated Tschaiikowsky's music; the latter hated Brahms'. Handel declared that Gluck "does not know more about counterpoint than my cook." Beethoven offered to uncover his head and go down on his knees before the tomb of Handel. Chopin had no taste for Schumann. Wagner derided Meyerbeer and Mendelssohn. And so it goes, *ad infinitum*.

Every attack rallies a champion. The wise music-lover will lend attention to all the opinions and try to improve himself. Shakespeare's advice applies beautifully:

"Give every man thy ear,
But few thy voice.
Take each man's censure
But reserve thy judgment."

A dissenter who facetiously signs his postcard "Tristan Murphy" asks: "Why do you musical writers call it 'grand' opera? What's grand about it?" Friend "Tristan" misunderstands the use of the word "grand," which derives from the Italian and French term "grande," strictly meaning "large" or "imposing."

That does not refer so much to the physical picture but means that in grand opera the plot is preponderantly serious and the characters sing continuously, as opposed to "opera comique," in which the explanatory dialog is spoken. We do not hear such works often in America, but students interested in the subject may find the complete listing in John Tower's "Dictionary of Operas and Operettas."

HANDEL has had an extensive public revival of recent seasons in England and Germany, particularly with his operas, of which there have been some specially endowed performances also in America, but not at the Metropolitan. The healthy sentiment, vigorous dramatics, and skilled construction of the Handel compositions insure them lasting life.

With the other vocal numbers delivered by Mme. Szantho, we enter the essentially romantic period. Thomas makes for easy appeal, but Wolf's "Morning Mood" and Strauss' "Dedication" (among the most popular of modern concert-songs) offer a far more sophisticated range of harmony and characterization. Wagner's "Dreams," an ecstatic reverie, presents material in theme and mood which he later amplified for the glowing love-duet of the second act in "Tristan and Isolde."

THE orchestral music of Saint-Saens makes for facile and piquant listening, perhaps a bit too much so for the taste of most conductors, who prefer to delve into more profound interpretations. That doubtless explains why so little of the melodic and elegantly written symphonic output of Saint-Saens is played today. Gounod, when he heard the C Minor Symphony, was much affected and said: "There is the French Beethoven." (A peculiar estimate!)

The symphony has two parts embracing all the traditional four movements. Organ and piano are included in the vivid and varied orchestration.

HERE is a feast for devotees of the early classics, covering the period between 1583 and 1761. To be thoroughly in the spirit of such music, one must make allowances for the limited orchestral means of the period and temporarily forget the fuller sonorities and richer colorings of the school that began with Haydn and extends to the present-day Stravinsky.

Palestrina, most eminent composer of the Catholic Church, served under several Popes, all of whom honored his genius. In 1564, the College of Cardinals, desirous of eliminating all secular melodies from ritual music, commissioned Palestrina to write a mass in every way appropriate for church performance. He obliged with three, the greatest of which, "Missa Papae Marcelli," still ranks as a supreme musical glorification. A sixteenth or seventeenth century "Ricercare" (stemming from the French word "rechercher," meaning to "search out") is a fugued piece employing all the constructive resources and learning of the composer.

Orlando Gibbons, appointed organist of Westminster Abbey in 1622, created the first compositions ever engraved in England. Although primarily a writer of church music, he deserts those sacred precincts to do some topical tonalizing illustrating the singsong bids of the outdoor vendors in medieval London.

Johann Stamitz wrote twelve symphonies, and it is informative to encounter one of those rarely performed simple scores in order to see how early the general outline was established which served as models for Haydn and his successors.

SOME orchestral composers never produce a great symphony; Beethoven wrote two such in a single year (1808), the Fifth and the "Pastoral." Of his nine, the Fifth is easily best known, possibly because most of us know that Beethoven himself gave us a key to its story by saying of the first four notes: "Thus Fate knocks at the door." Unlike Opportunity, the theme knocks more than once, and you can easily distinguish its entrance and development throughout the first movement, one of the most transparently constructed in all symphonic literature. The rest of the masterpiece may be said to interpret Man's struggles with Fate, alternate hope and despondency, and final victory. The second movement, gently consoling, has wonderful song for the string instruments. The third starts with timidity, but the kettledrum soon beats out rhythmic opposition. The final division, sturdily confident, ends with what has been aptly described as a "grand march of joy."

With the spirit of revolt everywhere manifest, Colorado Springs now joins the malcontents. However, its protest is not economic or political but concerns itself with a purely artistic matter. The city forwards to NBC a firm request for more representative music than it has been broadcasting recently in the Denver section.

It appears that the Metropolitan Opera performance on Saturdays was aired in full only once up to January 15, and that the Toscanini concerts have been heard only in part since their inauguration on Christmas night. The protest takes the form of a letter, and to give it more force, the 375 persons who signed the communication have secured its publication in Colorado newspapers. One passage reads: "From an approximate 120 radio hours is it too much for us to expect, with the above-mentioned programs and others of like quality, some ten or fifteen hours of good music a week? We think not."

We agree emphatically with the Colorado Springs solicitants, but wonder whether the fault lies with NBC, with KOA (Denver), or with the commercial sponsors. The last-named (if responsible) are alluded to in the missive with this remark: "We would emphasize the fact that those who profess some taste in programs represent quite as significant a purchasing power as those who have desired the withdrawal or curtailings of the offerings mentioned."

"Little" Guila Bustabo, we musical chroniclers used to call her, but while that young woman still is no giantess physically, she has grown far beyond the childish musical stage, and now impresses audiences here and in Europe as having arrived at real artistic status. The proof will be offered afresh when she gathers honors this Sunday afternoon as the soloist of the New York Philharmonic. The matter of youthful prodigies is an engaging subject, and shall get special mention in the near future.

Enid Szanthe, experienced alike in concert and opera, is an extraordinary racial combination, Irish-Hungarian, the former through her mother. At seventeen, Miss Szanthe won fame at the Bayreuth Festival, where she sang under Toscanini's direction. In 1935 she made her American concert debut and now is engaged for the Metropolitan. Like many other artists, she harbors superstitions. The night before she sings, she puts a copy of the music under her pillow.

When Lohengrin was sweeping Germany's lyric stages after its 1850 Weimar premiere (conducted by Liszt), Wagner, a political exile in Switzerland, said bitterly, "I seem to be the only German who hasn't seen my opera." It was in fact not until eleven years later that Wagner first attended a performance of Lohengrin. Since then the work probably has had more listeners than any other opera by Wagner, with the possible exception of Tannhaeuser.

ACT I

First half of the tenth century. The banks of the river Scheldt at Antwerp. The stage is thronged with knights, nobles and ladies of Saxony, Thuringia and Brabant; among them Telramund and his ambitious, scheming wife, Ortrud. The Brabantians are exercised over the disappearance of young Duke Godfrey, brother of Elsa, both of whom have lived under the care of Telramund, who intended to marry the latter. He believes, however, that she has killed the lad in order to gain his estates, and so Telramund weds Ortrud. The benign King Henry, unwilling to believe that charge against Elsa, sends for her and proclaims that justice shall be meted by ordeal through battle. Elsa, asked to name her champion, sings her mystic "dream," in which a knight clad in shining armor comes to her rescue. Trumpeters blow repeated summons to the mysterious hero, who fails to appear, the while the evil Ortrud gloats over Elsa's discomfiture. A sudden commotion follows the appearance of a swan-drawn boat bearing the personage of Elsa's vision, who announces his readiness to answer the challenge and marry the innocent maid, provided that she never asks his name, rank or whence he came. Elsa promises.

ACT II

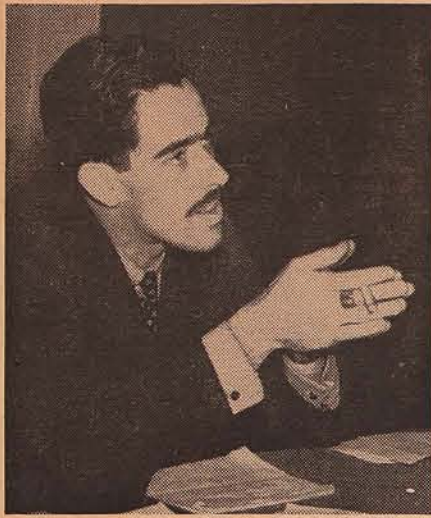
Night. Telramund and Ortrud cower outside the battlements of the royal castle. Herself a sorceress, she informs him that if Elsa could persuade the stranger to reveal his identity, his divine powers would cease. Elsa appears on her balcony and soliloquizes upon her happiness, but Ortrud disturbs Elsa with hints of the black arts practised by her champion. Dawn breaks and the wedding festivities begin, the course to the cathedral proceeding radiantly with the music of the immemorial nuptial march.

ACT III (Scene I)

The bridal chamber, to which the courtiers escort the wedded pair. Elsa questions her husband as to his identity, and despite his gentle protests, develops a frenzy of fearful curiosity. Telramund bursts in, only to be slain by his intended victim.

Scene II

Again the Oak of Justice, with the king and his court. The knight, after explaining the death of Telramund, answers Elsa's ominous question by delivering the great "Narrative," revealing himself as Lohengrin, Knight of the Holy Grail. Celestial harmonies rise from the orchestra as he steps aboard his swanboat. Thinking him gone, the incautious Ortrud passionately cries that it was she who transformed Elsa's brother into the swan that is to bear away Lohengrin forever. He prays, the swan sinks and in its place rises the youthful Duke Godfrey. Lohengrin, in sad thought, is borne away and the pale and frantic Elsa dies in her brother's arms.

"Let's Pretend" Fosters and Controls Child Imagination

Recently promoted from a limited Saturday morning airing to network stature, twice a week, the children's program "Let's Pretend" bubbles with fun and sound mental-emotional stimulus for children—manages neatly to avoid most of the juvenile-program traits that start parental headaches.

"Let's Pretend" presents special radio adaptations of folk-legends and fairy tales—and credit is due Columbia's creator-director, Nila Mack, for having kept her fairy-folk *real* without dampening either their appeal to children or overdoing their potential grip on young minds.

This week the children's cast selects new dramas from its growing repertoire—presents two well-loved yarns of fairyland. Educational? For the little mind, sound moral philosophy. For the adult mind, pleasant relaxation back in the byways of make-believe.

Tuesday the presentation is "Faithful John" from Grimm's Fairy Tales. On Thursday it is "The Queen Who Couldn't Make Spice Nuts."

Hall of Fame Pictures Lives of Nation's Great

America's greatness is a composite of great American lives. With this springboard for its theme the New York University Hall of Fame in cooperation with the National Broadcasting Company is presenting "a cavalcade of the lives of men and women whose works have contributed most to America's greatness."

This new series of biographical dramatizations took the air two weeks ago and has already strung an enthusiastic group of listeners on the listening-line for Saturday evenings.

This week the portrait subject is Walt Whitman, famous American poet of the nineteenth century, quester after ideal beauty, journeyman compositor, editor, schoolmaster and lover of life and people.

Scientist Describes Life in "Oldest City"

Thursday, CBS, 4-4:15 p.m.

Damascus, the oldest extant city in the world, is a mere founding compared with Tepe Gawra, current claimant to the title of "oldest city." This ancient ruin was discovered in 1926-27 by Dr. Ephraim Avigdor Speiser, who joins Watson Davis Thursday at 4 o'clock on Science Service Series to tell of the "modern" conveniences of prehistoric living and describe the evidences of city-planning and home comforts that existed not so long after Noah beached the Ark and started civilization's first resettlement project.

Dr. Speiser, practising archeologist, currently professor of Semitics at the University of Pennsylvania, and an authority of note on a galaxy of ancient and oriental subjects, will flush a covey of the biggest scientific and artistic surprises of recent years.

Listeners will enjoy a thrilling trip down the ages to one of the most interesting periods of human history—via Mesopotamia, one of the boom-lands of modern archeological exploration and discovery—and find that 3,000 B. C. was quite as amazing an era as the fanciful versions of 3,000 A. D. popularized today by H. G. Wells and Dick "Buck Rogers" Calkins.

Digging Toward "Dawn"

Just as the telescope and spectrographs are pushing back the frontiers of our universe, so are the scientists' shovels digging backward to the "dawn" of history. Until recently the "oldest cities" in the world and their records which gave a new starting-point for history were the Semitic cities of Nineveh (stone)—now modern Mosul, and Babylon (brick)—on a site somewhat removed from the present metropolis.

Now Tepe Gawra holds the distinction, and authentic records remove the "dawn" another eon.

The story of these fascinating records is the work of archeologists—the men and women who literally dig up the threat of human life; who frequently discover evidence of ways of life and high artistic accomplishment that beggar our pride in modern progress, and prove anew that there are fewer new things under the sun than we of a more "enlightened" age are wont to believe.

It is the powerful magnet of "surprise" that today draws scientific expeditions to ancient Mesopotamia, where much of the desert is strewn with the ruins of ancient cities; where once again nomad shepherds "watch their flocks by night."

Oddly enough, the very same thing happened to Betty Olson last October shortly after she started on a new NBC series, and it was Betty who was rushed in to substitute for Lucy.

The Andrews Sisters, who are heard on the CBS "Double Everything" show on Sundays, are enjoying a rapid rise to fame because of their now-famous Decca recording of "Bei Mir Bist Du Schoen." It seems that a great many people believe that the gals are colored because of their southern accent and their individual rhythmic style of vocal interpretation. It is not true. Though Patty, seventeen, Maxene, eighteen, and LaVerne, twenty-one, were born in Minneapolis, they have done most of their singing below the Mason-Dixon line and were favorites for about one year in Memphis and New Orleans night clubs and theaters. This accounts for their accent. They are thrilled over their sudden success, which has not gone to their heads.

IN THE MAIL: "Have just read your article in RADIO GUIDE about studio audiences having become noisy and not a little rowdyish—have heard from many friends who claim this very thing is spoiling some good programs for the listening audience in the quiet of their homes. Was so glad that you have taken up this matter. Certainly people will tune out this sort of thing. It seems to be getting worse and worse. Just want you to know how I agree with you and thank you for writing what you did. We are all with you!" —R. C. This is just one of the many letters received on this subject.

It's hard to believe, but it's true. People are coming from all parts of the U. S. A. just to be among those present at the Toscanini broadcasts, which reminds me that before this popular concert series made its debut, Phil Spitalny was having a great deal of trouble trying to get tickets for the opening broadcast. He asked everyone he knew, including this reporter, to try to get a pair of ducats for him. NBC had received 23,000 requests for tickets and the studio seats only 1,400 people, so you can imagine what they were up against. Anyway, five friends came through for Spitalny and he wound up with ten tickets which he could have sold for at least \$25.00 a pair—which was the price offered to me for the two I had. Lucky fellow!

I visited the Bob Ripley program on a recent Saturday night, and in the studio audience were such notables as Bugs Baer and George Rector, very good friends of Ripley. Announcer Ford Bond makes the usual speech before the program goes on the air, telling the audience how and when to applaud. "There are only 250 people in this studio," he states, "so you must applaud four times louder than you ordinarily would, so listeners-in will think there are at least 1,000."

Some of the song-writers must lose sleep in order to think up some of the titles for their selections. Take, for instance, Raymond Scott, who became famous through the CBS Saturday Night Swing Club. Scott and his quintet have recorded such numbers as "War Dance for Wooden Indians," "The Penguins," and "Reckless Night on Board an Ocean Liner." Now along comes Mike Riley, who drove the country screwy several years ago with his "Music Goes 'Round" ditty, with a new song called "It Looks Like a Cruller, Doughnut?" If that's the life of Riley, I don't want it.

While on the subject of songs, I want to give three cheers to Connie Boswell for her grand rendition of "Martha" on the last Paul Whiteman broadcast from the West Coast.

How do the broadcasting networks regulate the number of times a popular song can be repeated? Read "Aerialto Lowdown" next week and I'll tell you all about it.

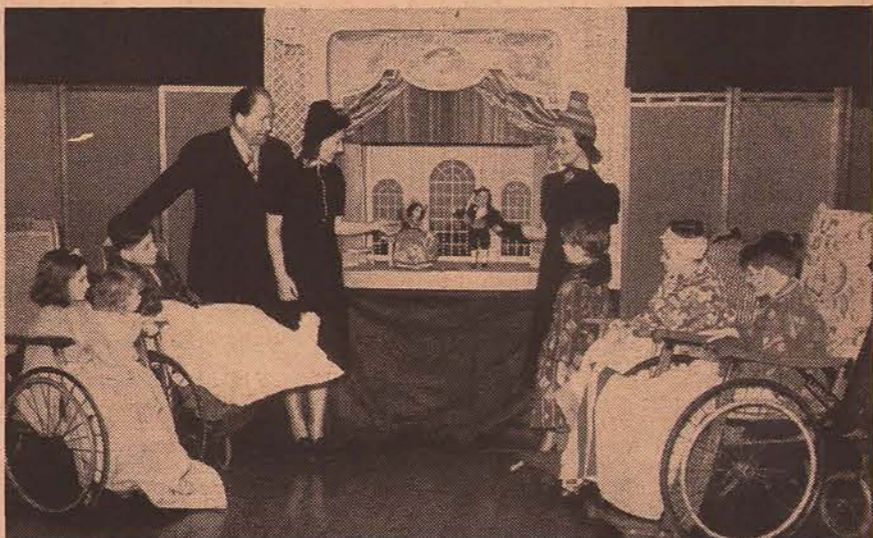
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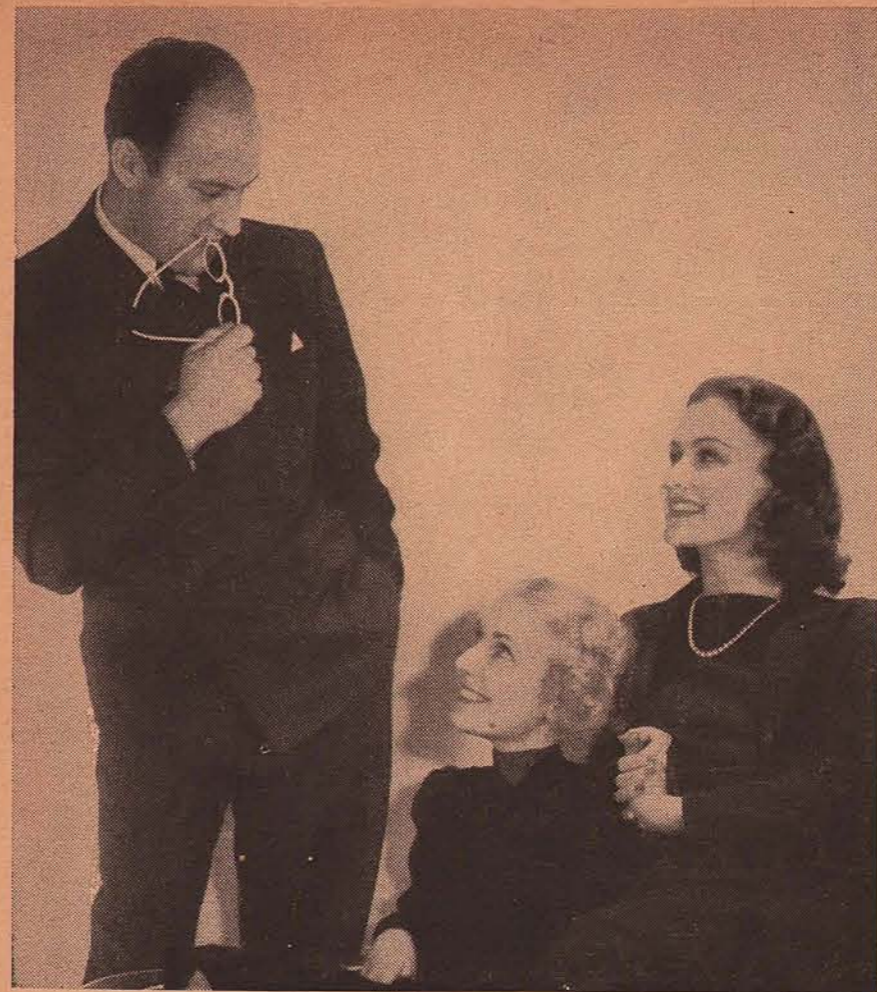

On Short Waves

Times indicated on this page are for Eastern Standard Time. For CST subtract 1 hour; for MST, 2 hours; for PST, 3 hours

AT ABOUT 9:25 p.m. EST, turn your dial to 9.59 megs (this is approximately half-way between GSC (9.58), Daventry, England, and HP5J (9.601), Panama City, Panama). If your receiver is sensitive and weather conditions are favorable, you will hear the faint hiss of a carrier-wave. At exactly 9:30 p.m. you will hear tinkling chimes, reminiscent of camel bells, followed by a soft-toned clock striking eight times. A man's voice, speaking in an unknown tongue, is then heard, followed by an oriental chant, accompanied by a high-pitched, wailing male voice, rising and falling in weird cadence. This monotonous and fantastic music continues, with only short interruptions for selection announcements in the same strange language, until 10:30 p.m., at which time the native program ends and music of a more "western" type is substituted. If you are still listening and the signal hasn't faded away, at exactly 10:40 p.m. EST you will hear an English speaker with an Oxford accent say, prosaically enough, "This is Delhi. The latest news-bulletin in English follows." Yes, you have been in tune with Delhi, India's new short-wave station, situated at the foothills of the lofty Himalaya Mountains, half-way round the world. Credit for a first report on this fascinating station, which has since been heard by your columnist, goes to James Pratt of London, Ontario, Canada. This broadcaster also operates on 6.085 and 3.49 megs.

Television in natural colors is the latest achievement claimed by British inventor J. L. Baird, who has been secretly experimenting with the process for years, but just recently has brought it to a successful fruition. "It has nothing to do with films," he said, "as the Union Jack can, for example, be reproduced in natural colors."

Those who were fascinated by that exciting film, "Mutiny on the Bounty," will undoubtedly be even more thrilled

to hear the actual descendants of the mutineers from the H.M.S. *Bounty* speak direct from their heretofore isolated home on Pitcairn Island, a tiny dot in the southern Pacific wastes, about half-way between New Zealand and South America.

This island, which practically has been cut off from the outside world since 1790, will receive, the latter part of this month, a modern short-wave receiver and a 60-watt transmitter, which has been built to operate upon the following frequencies: 478 kilocycles, 7.245 and 14.346 megs. This new broadcaster, when completed, will be identified by the call-letters VDGA. Power will be furnished by batteries which will be charged by an especially designed wind-charger. This radio installation has been made possible through the generous donations of material and labor by many amateurs and manufacturers under the instigation of the Coto-Coil Company, Providence, R. I., whose chief engineer, L. S. Bellem, is heading an expedition which sailed from Brooklyn, N. Y., on February 3, to deliver personally and set up the new equipment at Pitcairn.

Granville P. Lindley, chief electrician for the Byrd Expedition, who is accompanying the party as a representative of the NBC, will, by means of additional equipment which he is taking, arrange several broadcasts from the island for pick-up and re-broadcast here in the United States by the networks of the National Broadcasting Company. These short-wave transmissions—the first of which will take place early in March—will probably be broadcast on either 17.31 or 12.8625 megs. This end of the long ocean circuit will be handled by the RCA commercial transmitters at Bolinas, Calif.

Pacific Alaska Airways, Inc., of Bethel, Alaska, has received a license for Aeronautical Station KINF, which will operate on any one of the following frequencies: 1.638, 3.082, 4.125, 5.692, 8.015 and 8.22 megs.

WHAT would you do if your doctor said suddenly: "You have only two years to live"? What would you do? Go on a wild spree and make your last months gay, unfettered by conventions and repressions? Would you quit everything to go to Europe, China, Africa? Would you become deeply religious and spend your last two years in prayer? Joe Reichman, suffering from heart trouble, did none of these things. What he did, though, kept him from going crazy during those two years when he was marking time.

He had studied law. "You've always wanted to be a musician," he told himself. "You never took lessons because your family couldn't afford it. You never could think of it seriously because it would have been foolish to tackle a profession you weren't trained for.

"All right, then. You're going to be foolish now. You're going to do all the foolish, impractical, dumb-cluck things that you've always wanted to do, but which thought of the future prevented you from doing. You have no future, so what's to stop you? Go ahead—and toss caution to the winds."

So he got a job as a pianist. On his predicted doomsday he was thumping away at a piano in Florida. Later he went to New York. At first they slammed doors in his face. He had few friends. He had few contacts. But he had set out to make a name for himself as a bandleader.

HE TRIED desperately but found no success. It was when his hotel wouldn't give him any more credit, and when he saw no course open but to return home to St. Louis that luck changed.

As he inserted the key in the door of his hotel room one evening, he heard the telephone ring. This was news. In the four months he had been in New York no one had ever called. "H—hello," he said, hesitantly.

"This is Charlie Goodheart of the Music Corporation calling," came a voice. "We want you to open at the Hotel New Yorker tomorrow at noon. Can you get your band together by then?"

Reichman had once auditioned for Goodheart, unsuccessfully. He thought he had been forgotten. He had no band now. He had no union card. He had no orchestrations. But he said "Yes." And he did as he said he would. He found bandmen, and he opened at the New Yorker next day.

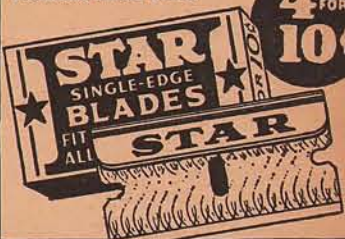

say that this snake has a poisonous barb in its tail and that when it stings its enemies they die. Travelers have been known to relate stories of hoop-snakes who rolled slam-bang into trees and stung them with such force that they could not disengage themselves and remained prisoners. The trees were said to have died of poisoning.

Scientists laugh at the hoop-snake. They also laugh at the idea of the "milk-snake," which, in many farming regions, assumes the proportions of a were-wolf in the folklore of husbandry, by virtue of its supposed habit of sucking away the milk supply of unattended cows. This idea is false.

THERE is, it is true, a milk-snake which frequents barns and barnyards in a more or less praiseworthy quest for mice, but there is no evidence that it ever milked a cow. And there is plenty of evidence that it couldn't. It would be impossible for a snake, with its recurved teeth, to fasten itself to a cow's udder and suck milk. Nevertheless there are people who swear by the existence of the milk-snake and who attribute to its evil appetite variations in the flow of milk from cows.

Another common belief, among a score or more listed by Karl P. Schmidt of the Field Museum of Natural History, in a leaflet on "snake stories," is that the age of a rattlesnake can be told by the number of rattles it bears. "This is true," says Schmidt, "when the rattle is complete with the original button with which the snake was born, though the number of rattles varies with the amount of food taken by the snake, and certain other conditions, so that the average figure, three rattles per year, is subject to individual fluctuations."

Equally foolish, say the scientists, are the beliefs that rattlesnakes will not cross a horse-hair rope and that when confined and tortured they will commit suicide by striking themselves. Men who have studied snakes agree that they are immune to their own venom, and that it would be impossible for them to kill themselves in this highly poetic fashion.

ANOTHER common assumption is that snakes charm birds and mice. Investigators have found that this is not the case, that often mice which are tossed into a snake pit are indifferent to serpents right up to the time when they are gobbled up. This belief is thought to have arisen from observation of the snake's familiar motionless, unblinking contemplation of its prey. A snake couldn't blink if it wanted to. It has no eyelids.

All sorts of legends have grown up around snake charmers. Devotees of this curious profession are thought to wield magic power with the music they play. Yet snakes have no external ears and are apparently unable to hear sounds conveyed on airwaves. The accepted explanation is that the serpent sways its body as the snake-charmer sways his. When the charmer stops moving, the snake stops, music or no music.

It all points to one conclusion. The snake is badly misunderstood—like a lot of villains.

FRED SMITH MARCHES ON

MR. FRED SMITH, the advertis-ing man, of New York City, was galloping toward a train the day he was supposed to be inter-viewed, and he explained politely that he had little or no time to talk about the B. & P. & C. U. O. of F. S. of A., but he did pause for a few remarks and courteously proffered a bunch of papers which clarified the situation.

The B. & P. & C. U. O. of F. S. of A. refers to the Benevolent and Protec-tive and Completely Universal Order of Fred Smiths of America—an asso-ciation of all the Fred Smiths, sub-titling itself, with becoming modesty, "the silliest society in the world." This Wednesday, February 16, it holds its second annual banquet, a running ac-count of which will be broadcast by NBC.

The founder of the society is Mr. Fred Smith, the advertising man, of New York City, who last fall managed the successful campaign of Bruce Bar-ton for Congress. Other members of Mr. Smith's committee for the 1938 Fred Smith banquet are Mr. Fred Smith, Mr. Fred Smith, Mr. Fred Smith and Mr. Fred Smith.

IN ORDER, after Mr. Fred Smith, the advertising man, of New York City, they are Mr. Fred Smith, the clerk of Dutchess County, Poughkeep-sie, N. Y.; Mr. Fred Smith, the coal-dealer, of Plainfield, N. J.; Mr. Fred Smith, the title and mortgage man, of New York City; and Mr. Fred Smith, the advertising man, of Plainfield, N. J.

In order to keep identities untangled, members of the committee sign them-selves like this: Fred (Advertising) Smith, Fred (Fuel) Smith, Fred (Dutchess) Smith, Fred (Mortgage) Smith, and Fred (Research) Smith. That way everybody keeps out of chaos and in his proper place.

It's all very confusing, but recently it was confusion thrice confounded, because Fred (Research) Smith, who was christened "Research" last year, has since gone into the advertising business, and now, in the interests of accuracy, has to be called Fred (Ad-vertising No. 2) Smith, to distinguish him from Fred (Advertising) Smith.

The B. & P. & C. U. O. of F. S. of A. was organized last year. It has a plat-form, but it advocates no action of any kind except doing something com-pletely silly and aimless once a year to keep from growing old and smug. Fred Smiths, according to the associa-tion's bulletin, believe that most of the world's ills arise from worry, so their platform is "Don't worry about any-thing and never get into trouble."

THE first banquet, last year, was a great success. Nearly 100 Fred Smiths and Mrs. Fred Smiths attended. This year the committee hopes that from 300 to 500 will be present, and invitations and tickets are going out to Fred Smiths everywhere. Four mem-bers of the B. & P. & C. U. O. of F. S. of A. are listed in the current Who's Who, and there are a half-dozen others in Who's Who who are eligible to join the organization.

The radio program to be broadcast this year in connection with the ban-quet will deal with the history of the Fred Smiths since the dawn of time. It will be called simply, "Fred Smith Marches On."

HIGH BOY

TALLEST man in network broadcasting is Edmund Birch Ruffner; "Tiny" to his friends and fans because he stands "only" 6 feet 6 inches from the tip of his big toe to the topmost light-brown hair of his head, as photo shows. (One page is too short to do justice to the man.) On the air more than 9,000 times, "Tiny" is currently heard as announcer on the Al Jolson show over CBS Tuesday nights at 8:30 o'clock EST.

One of the most popular men in the business, Ruffner has always aimed high, lives up to his size. His radio debut was as a singer in Seattle in 1922 from atop an office building. In 1929 he came out tops in the first announcer-golfer tournament ever held. He has run the gamut of jobs in radio, became announcer for the old Maxwell House Show Boat and now has graduated to the position of vice-president in charge of radio at the Hollywood office of Ruthrauff & Ryan, advertising agency. Originally his newspaperman father had him trained for opera and occasionally the radio audience hears him sing—not too inartistically for comfort. Looking for higher aims, "Tiny" awaits the advent of television with optimism. He's made many friends, is credited with saving a would-be suicide and a near-drowned boy. He wants to travel. LAURITZ MELCHIOR: Highlights in the Life of the Greatest Heroic Tenor



Left motherless when three months old, young Lauritz spent most of his early days in the Melchior School for Boys conducted by his father. Handsome, sturdy, and with a fine voice, he soon drew attention from Great Britain's future queen

ON SUNDAY of this week Lauritz Melchior steps before a microphone on The Ford Sunday Evening Hour in one of his few radio appearances of the season. Unlike Richard Crooks, Lily Pons, Richard Bonelli, Lawrence Tibbett and others of the dignified Metropolitan Opera Association, Mr. Melchior is still a "guest star" rather than a "regular." Why this situation prevails, especially in a season when classical music occupies the No. 1 place in the radio budget, is a question often debated in the profession, which recognizes the big Danish man as the greatest Wagnerian tenor of all time.

Melchior made his Metropolitan debut the same day as did Marion Talley, Kansas City's protege. Odd to note is that Melchior's matinee performance drew a slight six inches of type from most newspaper critics while Talley's story was front-page news. This was no reflection upon the performance of the tenor, but, instead, a tribute to the publicity experts backing the talented Miss Talley.

A Dane by birth, Melchior was taken from Copenhagen to London in the entourage of the Danish Princess Alexandria when she became Queen Alexandria of Great Britain. In England he sang in the choir of the church attended by the Queen. Later he returned to Denmark to begin study in the school of the Danish Royal Opera. In 1924 was the sensation of the Bayreuth Music Festival. That latter appearance so impressed Gatti-Casazza, then impresario of the Metropolitan, that he immediately arranged for Mr. Melchior to come to America.



After three years in opera, young Melchior changed from baritone to tenor on the advice of his teacher



At 21 Lauritz was a pupil at the School of the Royal Opera, where only talented students got home leaves



For 12 years Melchior has maintained a 3,000-acre hunting estate, well stocked with wild game, and this lodge in Chossewitz, Austria. Each summer he manages to spend 3 or 4 months there with his wife, his friends and his two children



The lodge is decorated with game Melchior killed, has a telephone and radio in every room, including the baths, has many American conveniences. Sometimes the tenor entertains as many as 150 guests at one time at a hunt or lunch

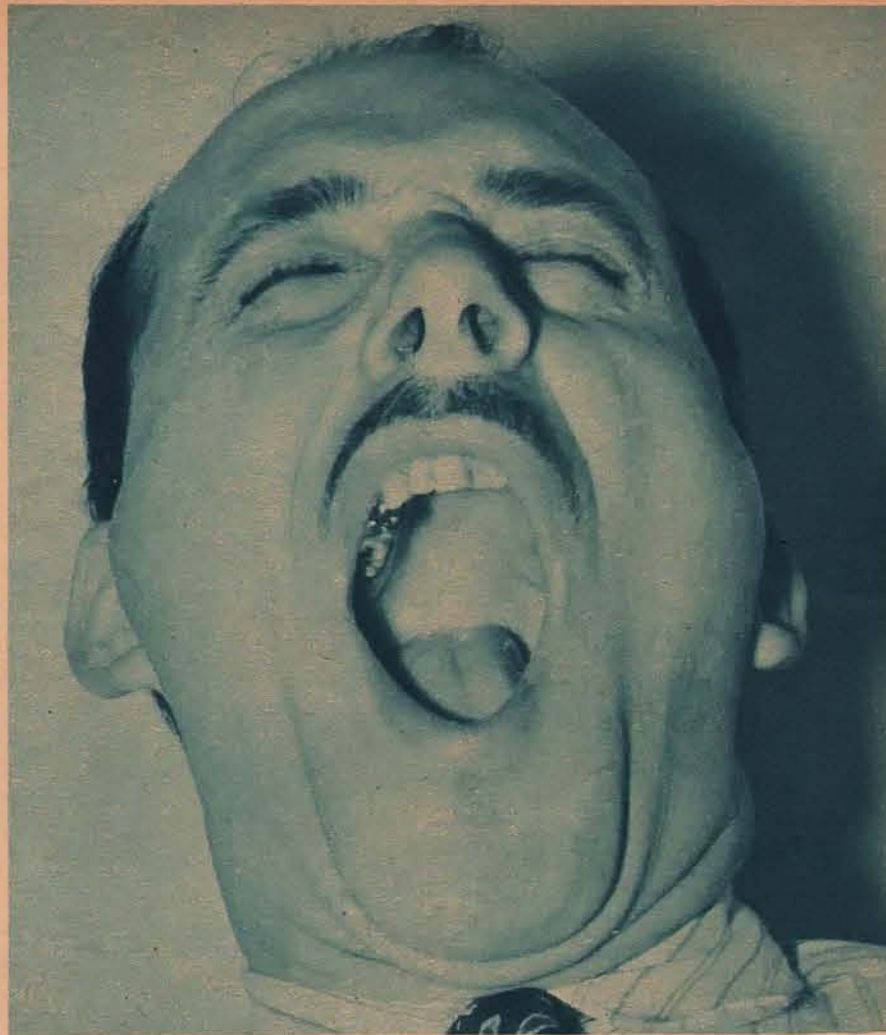

BUSIEST MAN...

RADIO is a busy business, run by busy people, but probably the top-ranking, all-time busybody of the airwaves is Ray Bloch, orchestra leader, choral director, singing coach, arranger, piano soloist—and family man! His days (and the better part of most of his nights) are spent in the unceasing hurly-burly of broadcasting: rehearsals, conferences, programming, the making of new arrangements and a dozen other time-consuming activities—all this in addition to actual time on the air! An important figure at both the National Broadcasting Company and Columbia, Ray Bloch has so many musical organizations under his baton that he actually has found it impossible to contrive appropriate names for all of them! But every one of them, name or no name, bears the unmistakable imprint of Bloch's own personality! He has had—is having—an amazing career.

Born in Alsace-Lorraine (the date was Aug. 3, 1902), his parents brought him to the United States at an early age. His father, a chef, encouraged his musical ambitions, made considerable financial sacrifices in order that his son might have the best of instruction. The elder Bloch was wise in this action, for his son's talent was obvious. Ray Bloch was singing in choirs when he was eight years old, and leading them at twelve! He was still in his early teens when he got his first job. It paid \$6 a week, that job as office boy for the New York foreign-language newspaper, *Courier des Etats Unis*! Music was Bloch's first and only love, however, and it wasn't long before he was playing the piano in New York ballroom orchestras. Characteristically, he moved quickly from that job to a better one, and before long he was leading his own orchestra, touring the major vaudeville circuits. Ray Bloch offers ample proof of the statement that it's the busiest people who get the most done. In spite of everything, he has found time to compose a number of songs. Latest to be published is "Shindig," and another one, "In the Same Old Way," is due shortly. Ray Bloch has been married since 1923 and has an eight-year-old daughter. His luck, he says, is good. He once fell asleep behind the wheel while driving, came out of the resultant crash without a scratch, although the car was a total wreck. He's five feet six and a half inches tall, weighs 140 pounds, has black hair, brown eyes—enough energy for three men!

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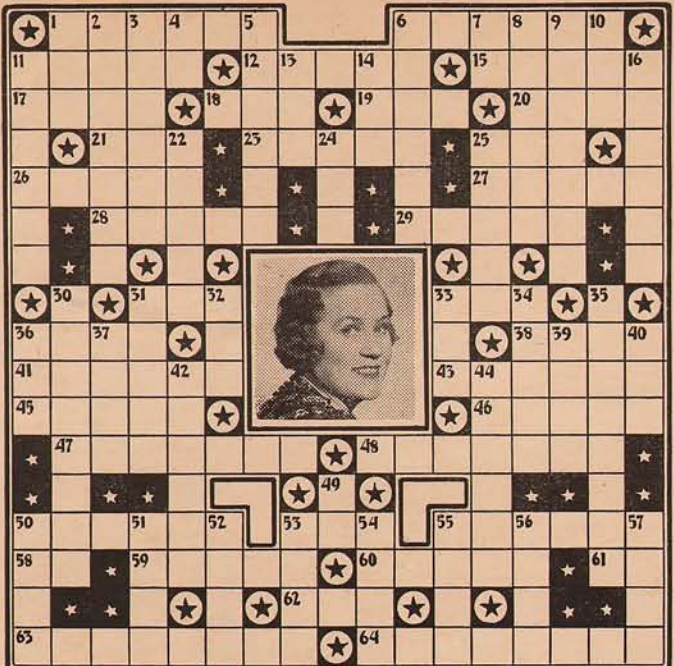

MORE ABOUT ACCENTS

Another, who might have been brought up where cows are called "caows," gets an announcing job and makes a desperate effort at a New Yorker's, Bostonian, southern, or some other accent.

Good advice to these announcers is: "Be yourself."—*Francis Anthony, North Bangor, N. Y.*

"In the second, the mirror could say 'nay' because of unattractive teeth, and not even the most enthusiastic Camay fan can claim that it does the work of tooth-paste or of a dentist! Your mirror could say 'nay' if your hair is frowsy, your lipstick bad, or for a dozen other reasons.

"The third states that beauties use Camay but does not attribute their beauty to Camay—so it lacks punch, sales appeal, and reason!"—RUTH McCauley Thorne, 1316 Live Oak, San Angelo, Tex.

"I like Chipso because it does my washings with miraculous speed and mildness, and my farmhouse cleaning tasks are safely and satisfactorily finished, while my hands remain unharmed."—M.L.L.

"This is a good entry, but it's a shame that M.L.L. turned literary instead of staying natural. Farm washings are different from those city people have, so why didn't she mention the ground-in grime from the fields that makes her washing harder, and how Chipso gets it out safely? Instead of saying

just farmhouse tasks, why doesn't she tell how muddy floors, milk-cans and greasy cream-crocks are more easily and quickly cleaned with Chipso? If she had emphasized either of those two things, I expect this lady would own a Benrus watch today. Chipso could use that kind of statement as excellent sales copy in any advertisement for farm-wives."—MRS. LEE FIGG, 320 No. Temple Ave., Indianapolis, Ind.

"I like Ivory because Ivory leaves my hand-painted china clean and fresh without injury to delicate gold rims and lends the designs a more distinctive lustre."—L.R.

"Your entry lacks selling punch. It's flat. It didn't make me feel like tearing to the nearest store for a bar of Ivory. I see two reasons. First, it's more of a play on words than it is a simple, sincere statement—and the play on words isn't so good, for 'fresh china' is rather peculiar and 'distinctive

This Contest World News About It

More and more magazines are entering the contest field as sponsors. In addition to the *Click* contest announced here last week, *Pictorial Review* is expected to announce one soon. *Pleasure*, a new fifty-cent magazine devoted to sports and amusements, is now conducting a \$5,000.00 photograph contest.

In response to numerous requests from readers, RADIO GUIDE will publish an article on the "contest investigator" soon. "Investigators" are the shadowy behind-the-scenes men of contesting. They are the ones who try to find "suitable" winners in certain contests... Some sponsors are hurting their own reputations by listing only the cities in which their winners live. Contesters write congratulatory letters to the winners, and often they are returned marked "Addressee Unknown." The writers then decide that no prizes were paid and refuse to enter that sponsor's contests again. It is not true that the prizes were withheld—at least not in any case we know about—but the sponsors make a mistake in allowing this impression to get about.

A reader suggests that listening to Edward G. Robinson's "Big Town" program Tuesday nights on CBS helps contesters learn when strict grammatical forms may be forgotten... A new contest to name a magazine dealing with hobbies, home work and spare-time earnings will probably be started by the time this is read. It will be open to Canada. Details will be available from the Contest Editor, Lock Drawer D, Gassaway, W. Va. This is not the same as the "Trade and Barter" contest announced several weeks ago... Nash-Kelvinator Corp., sponsor of "Professor Quiz" on CBS and his weekly contests, will soon start a \$9,500 limerick contest advertising Leonard refrigerators.

Winners in the General Electric contest were announced on the "Hour of Charm" program on NBC. There were more than 275,000 entries sent in by members of the 14,000,000 families to whom electrical dealers sent literature. *Contest World* for February announces its annual National Contest Popularity Poll, the most coherent and complete and constructive contest activity 1938 has spawned. The poll covers such points as large grand prizes as compared with more but smaller ones; length of contests; various forms of "purchase proofs"; publicizing winning entries; sectional contests as compared with national competitions, and many more.

Incidentally, unless Everett Lane expands his activities, the National Contesters Association will appear to have been misnamed. Its influence at present is too ineffectual to be considered a national force. Perhaps the convention now being planned will build an organization of more significance. Contesting needs it!
