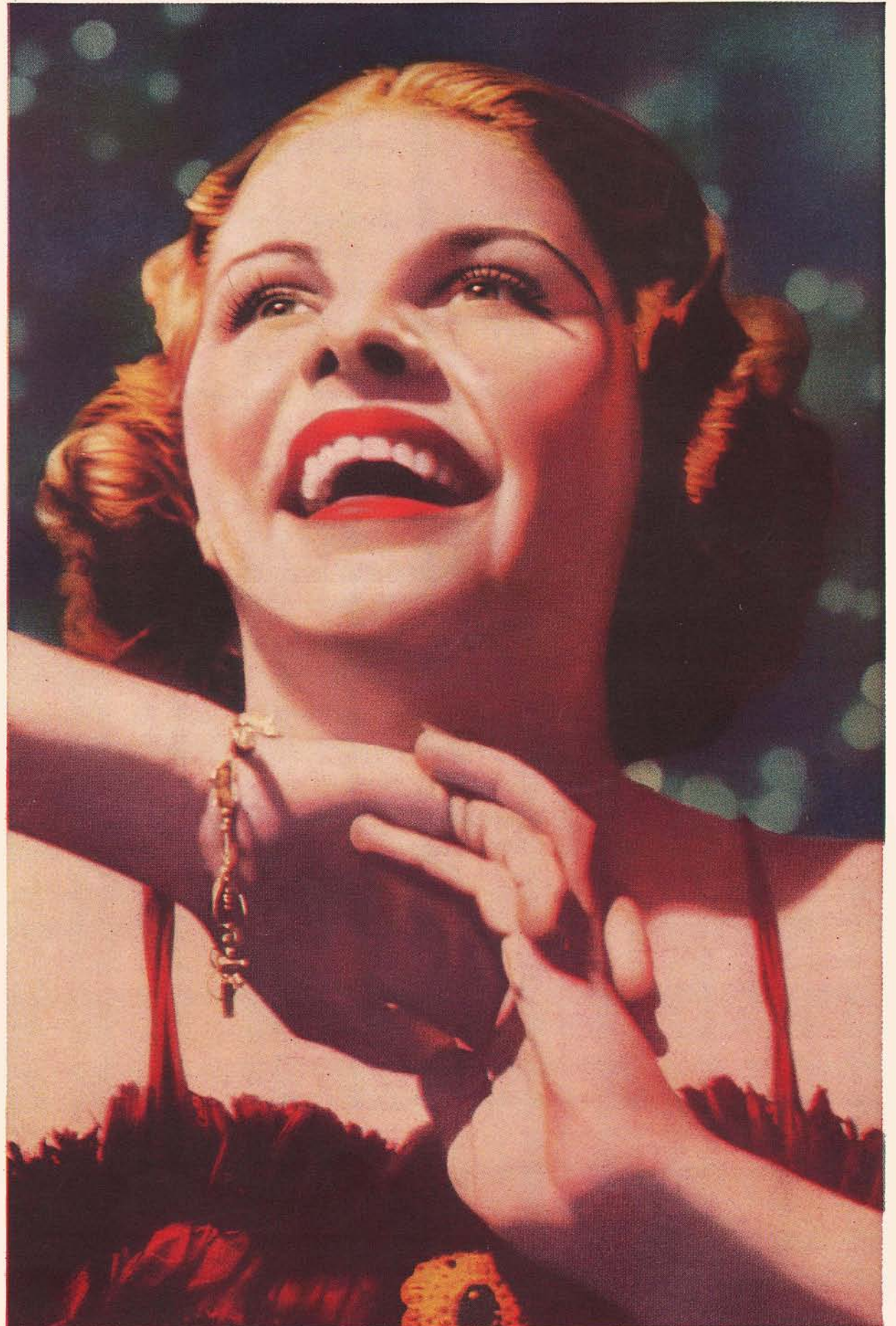

### AWARDED TO DR. ALLAN ROY DAFOE

**T**HE country doctor—what a fabled character! Unsung. Unkept. Devoted to his flock with passion defying reason, yet a sloth among scientists, curing more with earnestness than skill. Withal, a pitiful, pathetic old fellow, dazed by the big parade passing him by, hibernating in his niche carved from Nature's bed-rock.



What a shock to have this most comfortable of illusions shattered! What a surprise for the appercart of our indulgence to be upset!

When the Dionne quintuplets were born, when they lived through their first hectic days, when they grew and celebrated successive birthdays, it was news—news to charm the world's heart, to dampen the world's lashes with tears of long-distance joy. More significant, though, than the sudden sensation of the Dionnes was the gradual appreciation of the Dionnes' doctor. This quiet Canadian stirred from our minds an old idea; gave us a new understanding. What greater achievement is there?

That backwoods life-saver, Dr. Allan Roy Dafoe, up-ended the hollow image of the country doctor in most of our minds as a dignified dunce, a lovable, bumbling pill-mixer. Dr. Dafoe revealed through his own introduction to the world that today's country doctor is very little different from the practitioners of the great cities, the scientists of the great medical centers. In so doing, Dr. Dafoe performed a service both to the public and to his profession.

Throughout his years in Callender, Ontario, Dr. Dafoe has first served "his people." He has served the people first since his horizon broadened beyond Callender. Primarily, through his talks each Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoon on CBS, he has given the public a brand-new appreciation of the country doctor—a revision of our thought that was sorely needed. Further, he has provided radio's listeners an excellent course of home study in health and child-training—plus the entertainment necessary to make us absorb that education!

Practising doctors seem to consider services to their profession secondary. Dr. Dafoe's second great service has been to give the obscure doctors of the world an ideal. His broad familiarity with widely divergent facts and ideas has shown a way for many who considered their outposts too remote. No small feat, that!

Because Dr. Dafoe has so imminently served a public that sought him out and a profession he sought to better, Radio Guide honors him this week as one of radio's truly great. Since their introduction on October 5, 1936, his radio programs have been a noteworthy source of information for parents that will not be fully appreciated until today's babies look back and add their thanks to our own. 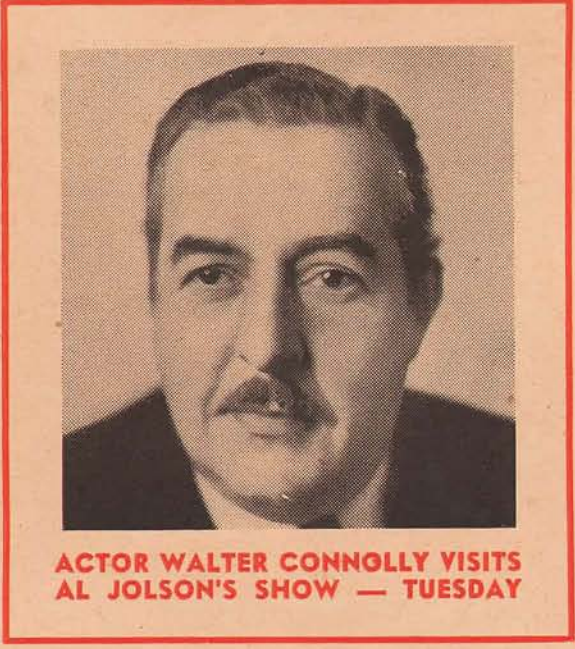
## TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 22

## ECHO OF YESTERDAY

### RADIO GOES TO PITCAIRN, BRINGING THE WORLD TO DESCENDANTS OF MUTINEERS OF THE BOUNTY WHO FLED THERE 148 YEARS AGO

A modern radio station is being installed on Pitcairn Island and soon the 199 descendants of the mutineers of the *Bounty* will broadcast to America over networks of the National Broadcasting Company.—News Item.

FLETCHER CHRISTIAN, a giant of a man with a strange vision of freedom in his sad eyes, gathered his frightened followers on a boulder that stood like the Rock of Ages against the growling, grumbling, greedy sea, and with dread in their hearts and forlorn hope in their souls they watched flames flash and flicker up the rigging of *H.M.S. Bounty*.

The spars fell and sparks danced above the stricken ship. Her flag went up in a burst of glorious fire and soon was charred into ashes, a thimbleful of ashes that shortly before had represented the might of all England. The blue waters around the ship turned to yellow and smoke rolled into a blanket and hung over the horizon of the South Seas. The *Bounty* shuddered, settled and vanished.

The watchers were silent. The *Bounty* was gone! Behind the little group that saw her death was an adventure without parallel in history! A dare without equal! For they had defied the unknown, had sneered at death, and now they would not compromise with the fates.

But their faces were drawn as the *Bounty* burned, for tomorrow for them was a mystery.

Fletcher Christian turned from his followers as the ship disappeared and the waters hissed, and entered in his record—"Births, Deaths, Marriages and Remarkable Family Events"—the following:

"Jan. 23, 1790. *H.M.S. Bounty* burned at Pitcairn Island."

And there, said Christian, was the last connection with the world. They were isolated, marooned, 4,000 miles from white men, and alone on a lonely island in the loneliest sea of the world.

But now radio has gone to Pitcairn Island, and the new entry in the "Births, Deaths, Marriages and Remarkable Family Events" probably will be in March and in all likelihood will read:

"A radio station has been installed. Pitcairn Island is no longer isolated."

ONE hundred and forty-eight years from the season when the *Bounty* was burned, the descendants of Fletcher Christian and his comrades—the madcap mutineers who struck a blow for the rights of men who go down to the sea in ships—have shattered the isolation that their fathers ordained and have become a part of the radio brotherhood of man.

A group of manufacturers donated equipment for the new station which will permit the islanders to become a voice and ear of the world. The set will get its primary power from ordi-

nary storage batteries, for Pitcairn has no power plant.

The National Broadcasting Company has completed arrangements for American broadcasts with the Pitcairn Island Expedition, which will erect the station on the lonely island, far from ship lanes—a dot of land and coral thousands of miles from nowhere.

THE expedition is sponsored by F. C. Henrickson, president of the Coto-Coil Company of Providence, Rhode Island. L. S. Bellem, Jr., and Granville P. Lindley, two other Rhode Islanders, will install the new transmitter. Lindley was the chief electrician of Byrd's second Antarctic expedition.

Broadcasts from the island are expected to begin the middle of next month. The expedition left New York February 3 and will arrive at their destination on Sunday, February 27. Two weeks will be required to install the equipment, after which the two members will spend an additional eight weeks testing and experimenting.

The islanders became radio conscious about a year ago, when the schooner *Yankee* dropped a hook and Alan Eurich, the ship's "Sparks," went ashore. The island had a tiny receiver, donated in 1920 by a British company on condition that Andrew Young, descendant of one of the mutineers, would learn the code. He learned it, and taught it to many islanders.

In 1928, an amateur operator from New Zealand installed an ancient

transmitting set. It included a gas-line-driven generator which kept the storage battery charged. But there's no gasoline on Pitcairn and soon the set was useless. All Young could do was wait until a ship happened by to refill his gas tanks. So all in all, Station PITC—the call-letters of the world's outpost—operated only every now and then, mostly then.

That was the situation when Operator Eurich of the *Yankee* went ashore. He wrote a story about the station and it was published in *QST*, official organ for radio amateurs. The "hams" asked American manufacturers to chip in and present Young with a new station, and the Pitcairn Island and NBC programs were the results.

The new apparatus is equipped with a windmill charger, which will give life to the 12-volt, 300-ampere-hour battery. There will be enough juice to run the station ten hours a day. The transmitter can operate either as a code-transmitter or as a radiotelephone, with a maximum power output of eighty watts.

To make broadcasts possible to the United States, the manufacturers backing the expedition have built equipment powerful enough to short-wave programs from Pitcairn to the RCA West Coast receiving station at Point Reyes, Calif.—a distance of 4,500 miles.

DURING the expedition's stay, the broadcasts will feature talks by Radio Engineer Bellem and Construction Engineer Lindley, and will include descriptions of the romantic island and interviews with the islanders.

The islanders are grateful for radio, but those business houses that gave the station have shattered a glorious legend for the rest of us. For who has not thrilled at the name of Pitcairn Island? Who has not built aircastles on its shifting sands? Who among you has not lived on the island in a world of make-believe, has not sailed side by side with Christian through seas of romance, has not seen the crawling, smelly slums of England whence came the *Bounty* mutineers, and has not traveled with them over the world and under the world to Tahiti and then down, down off the charted course, down an unknown sea to a paradise of coral and palms and eternal rest?

But now radio is going to Pitcairn! What a world of achievements those simple words foretell! For the islanders will be your next-door neighbors. No longer will they be something strange and far away. And their yesterdays will be told only in histories and their tomorrows will be like ours—Bulova-watch time! Charlie McCarthy! Ben Bernie and all the lads! Now they will go to Pitcairn, and Pitcairn will come to us.

The world, my friends, is no longer a stage—it's a radio dial!

AND radio has turned down and folded the last chapter of Pitcairn's history of isolation. The next thing we know they'll be having income taxes and traffic laws and maybe a New Deal, and then where will our island of idle dreams be?

It was one hundred and fifty-one years ago that pig-headed old George III commissioned Capt. Jonathan Bligh to sail the stout little warship *Bounty* to the South Seas, gather breadfruit trees and take them to the West Indies and plant them so the slaves would have cheap food and could live cheaply and work harder in human bondage for the power and glory of England.

A crew was got, mostly from the slums, and the *Bounty* sailed from

Spithead in 1787, and in October of 1788 hove to at Tahiti, almost around the world from England.

The voyage had been tortuous. There had been calms and storms and other things that try men's hearts. Bligh was a driver. He had orders to get breadfruit for his majesty's slaves, and nothing was going to defeat him—not even the sea. But he reckoned not with the courage of men.

THE crew had taken almost inhuman punishment, and when the *Bounty* sailed from Tahiti after a twenty-three-weeks' stay, she had a hold full of breadfruit trees for slaves, and a fo'c's'le full of grim Englishmen who would not be slaves.

Christian, his spirit rebelling because Bligh was beating and driving his crew, could stand it no longer and planned to desert ship alone. But a seaman saw him attempt to get a boat away and told Christian that several of his comrades would mutiny.

The next day Christian and twenty-four seamen mutinied and cast Bligh and twenty-one loyal sailors adrift in an open boat with ample provisions. Bligh, one of the greatest sailors of all time, sailed the tiny boat more than three thousand miles to safety. He had vowed to bring the mutineers before an admiralty court, but while he was battling the sea, Christian sailed the *Bounty* back to Tahiti.

Realizing that England would hunt him down, Christian attempted to persuade all the mutineers to go with him to an undetermined destination. Only nine would venture back aboard the *Bounty*.

But these carried nine Tahitian wives. Six other Tahitians—three with wives—also sailed on the voyage.

CHRISTIAN, even if he knew, never told his companions where they were going. They sailed 1,400 miles northwest and came eventually to tiny Pitcairn Island, which had been discovered in 1767. The first thing Christian did was to begin a chronicle of their adventures, calling it "Births, Deaths, Marriages and Remarkable Family Events."

The world soon forgot about the Pitcairn Islanders, and no wonder, for their haven was 4,600 miles from San Francisco, 5,300 from Sydney, Australia, and 3,800 miles east of New Zealand.

Disension cropped out soon after the paradise was founded and the women got the blame. In 1793 John Williams' wife, Fasto, died and the Englishman took unto himself the wife of one of the Tahitian natives without the native's permission. The native men—all six of them—plotted murder, but the colored wives of the white men got word of the plan and warned their husbands by singing a song—"Why Do the Black Men Sharpen Their Axes? To Kill the White Men."

THERE was war in paradise, and five of the original mutineers, including Christian, were butchered. Another, Alexander Smith, was seriously wounded and the remaining three escaped. Then they in turn, aided by the widows of the slain mutineers, murdered the six Tahitians. And that left only four men and eleven women. Smith became the leader, and the islanders began tilling the ground and living peacefully, absolutely oblivious to the rest of the world.

The next viper in Paradise was that old demon, rum. William McCoy had learned how to make moonshine. He used a copper kettle from the *Bounty* as a still and brewed a powerful potion

of panther juice, which they called "tee-root" because it was made from the tee-root. McCoy bootlegged some of the stuff, but drank most of it himself, and on April 30, 1798, he got loaded to the gills, tied a stone around his neck and jumped into the sea.

And then there were only three white men. Violence returned in 1799 when Matthew Quintal threatened the lives of Smith and Richard Young, but Young and Smith joined forces, put Quintal on the spot, rubbed him out, and then there were only two men. Young died a natural death in 1800, and Smith had Paradise to himself, except for a lot of women and the half-caste children.

But he managed to get by in spite of this handicap, and everything was going pretty well on Pitcairn in 1808 when Matthew Folger, a Yankee skipper hard out from Boston, in the good ship *Topaz*, hove to at the speck in the South Seas and went ashore for water.

HE WOULDN'T believe Smith, but when the Englishman showed him the record and proof of the adventure, the hard-headed old Yankee skipper swore under his breath and drank a slug of tee-root to the courage of the men. He brought news to Pitcairn. The French Revolution was history—Napoleon was on the march—Europe was seething. A little republic called the United States had opened its eyes, cast aside its swaddling-clothes, and was yowling for a place in the crib of nations.

The Yankee skipper told Smith such glowing stories of the United States that the Englishman even decided that his islanders should have a democratic form of government like America's, and to make it complete, Smith changed his name to John Adams, then president of the United States. And John Adams became the first president of Paradise.

The *Topaz* sailed away and brought to the outside world the story of the *Bounty*. But it was such an incredible era that the story soon was forgotten.

THE islanders thrived in body, but not in knowledge, for there was none to teach them. The only book on the island was the *Bounty* Bible, but Smith read that aloud to his people and taught the children to read and write. And then in 1822 an English ship dropped anchor at Pitcairn and the crew went ashore for fresh victuals. John Buffet and John Evans, two of the seamen, were so entranced with the island that they jumped ship and remained there.

They were reasonably well educated men and took up the teaching job. They noted that the islanders, in appearance and manners, were like a typical group of middle-class English—dockworkers and laborers. They had ugly, knotty hands, and wore no shoes. They spoke English very well, and despite the constant intermarriage, their minds were stable. In fact, only one case of insanity ever has been recorded on the island.

When steamships came in and the story of Pitcairn Island came out, romanticists went there to satisfy that strange yearning that all men have—to see strange places, particularly South Sea islands of romance. And now comes radio to the isle of idle dreams. Happy listening, you islanders! And welcome to the greatest family on earth—the radio listeners of the world.

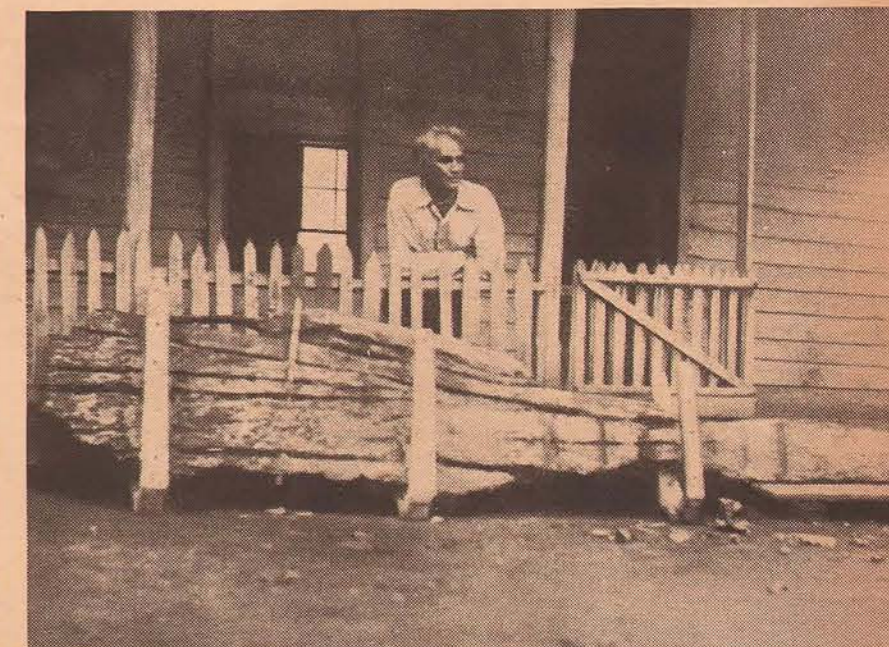
But I can't help wondering what old Fletcher Christian, or even Captain Bligh, would say if either could see you now, waiting for the sound of the gong and station identification.

In a new full-hour series, NBC begins the development of drama from the time of ancient Athens to present-day Broadway

IT'S a far cry from Athens and Aristophanes to Broadway and George S. Kaufman; and Time, the old warehouse man, has carted away a lot of scenery in the years between. Thousands of playwrights and players, and thousands of plays, have lived and died, and legions of critics have pickered over their bones.

The devious history of the drama during those years is the subject of a new National Broadcasting Company presentation, "Great Plays," which opens on Saturday of this week for a ten-week run, during which ten of the world's great stage pieces, rewritten especially for radio, will be played before microphones.

Beginning with Aristophanes' satiric comedy, "The Birds," the list includes examples of the Greek theater, the medieval morality play, the *commedia del' arte* of Italy, the pre-Shakespearean and Shakespearean drama of England, the French theater, the English theater of the eighteenth century, nineteenth-century American, Irish, and contemporary American drama.

The author of the radio versions of all the plays in the series and the man behind the entire undertaking is Blevins Davis, of the NBC staff, recently of the School of Drama of Yale University, and even more recently distinguished for his work as NBC's historical commentator at the coronation of King George VI of England.

Davis has been engaged in research on his enterprise since early last fall, studying in particular the background of the original production in the case of each play. He will have complete supervision of the NBC series, which, although it is designed primarily as

entertainment, fits nicely into the pattern of the broadcasting company's educational program.

DAVIS' business is illusions, but he has no illusions about his business. He concedes that radio is a somewhat limited medium for dramatists, since, so far as the general public is concerned, it transmits nothing but sound and, as yet, no visual images. But he thinks many of the shortcomings of radio drama can be eliminated by prefacing each play with a comprehensive and intelligent summary of background information. In other words, since there is no scenery for radio drama, the stage must be set, and set perfectly, with words.

That's the idea behind "Great Plays" and the thing that seems likely to distinguish the series from previous attempts to revitalize the buried classics of the theater. A good share of each full-hour broadcast will be given over

to a commentator, who will describe fully not only the scene of the play but the circumstances under which it was produced, the appearance of the audience, the theater, the stage, the salient characteristics of the period which the drama represents, and its relationship to its times.

Drama grew out of religious ritual, and, more immediately, out of song and dance in honor of ancient deities. Out of the sanctified chorus lines which pranced ceremoniously and sang hymns to pagan gods came the first actors—the bold and enterprising fellows who stepped to the front of the stage to engage in dialog, and, eventually, to steal the show.

TRADITION has it that in 534 B. C., in Attica, where the Greeks honored Dionysus, god of wine and fruitfulness (known to the Romans as Bacchus), one Thespis led a chorus and, instead of exchanging dialog with his chorus,

parleyed with a person whom he called an answerer. The Greek word for "answerer" afterwards was used for actor.

The song and dance have never died, although their uses have been altered. They're still singing and dancing on Broadway, in honor of various gods. But acting has become a profession, and the descendants of the pioneers who elbowed their way out of the obscurity of the Greek chorus now have temples of their own, called theaters, and their names spelled out in lights.

"The Birds," first production on the NBC-Red network calendar of "Great Plays," is a satiric extravaganza in which Aristophanes deals with such pressing problems as taxation, city-planning and the founding of an ideal metropolis. It is as thoroughly modern as the currently successful Broadway production of the *Living Newspaper* . . . "one-third of a nation" . . . which has for its theme housing conditions in the twentieth century.

THE drama was still in its infancy in Aristophanes' day (about 444-380 B. C.), but it had already taken on social significance and was dealing so openly with contemporary problems that it was a well-established practice for a chorus to pause in the middle of a play and recite in unison the author's views on some social or political question of the day. This break was called the parabasis.

In 414 B. C.—the same year in which the production of "The Birds," which will be described in the NBC-Red program, took place—the parabasis,

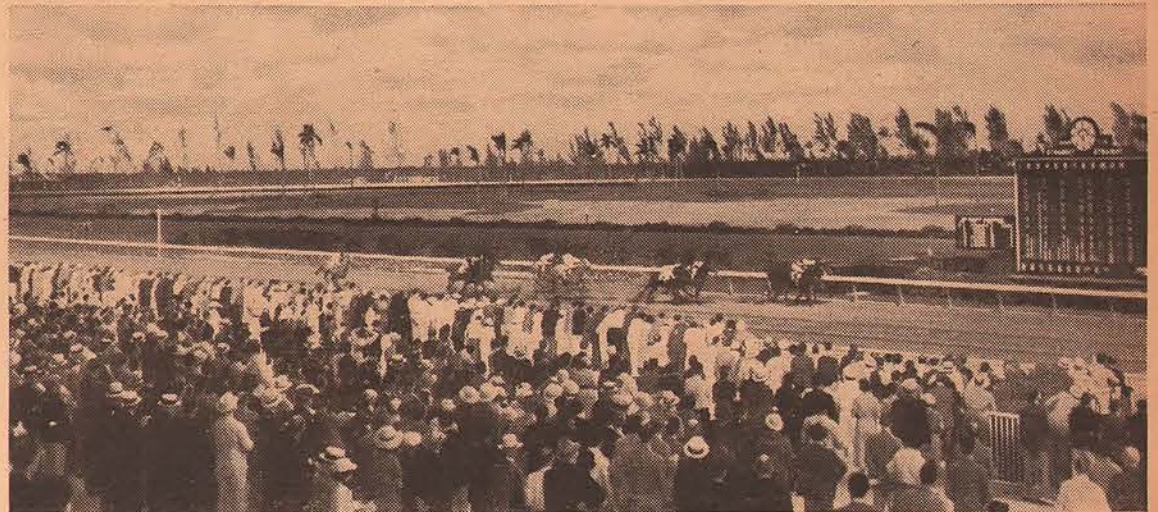

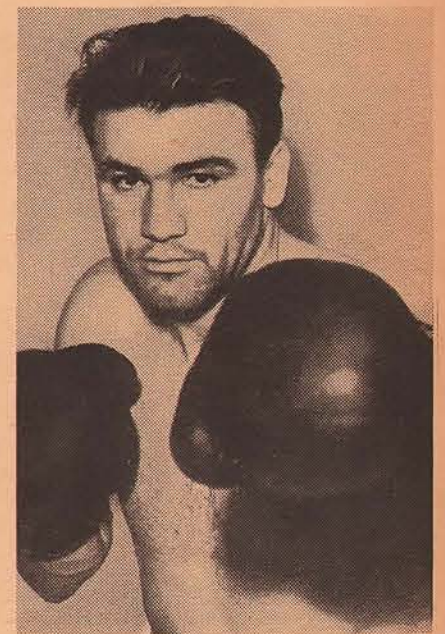

**S**METANA'S merry measures are making frequent yet welcome radio visits this season, but one never tires of the Czech composer's tunefulness.

In Rimsky-Korsakoff's orchestral proclamations there is usually a definite narrative. "Antar," desert recluse, hunts but spares a gazelle, only to discover later that the gentle creature is in reality the Queen of Palmyra, who takes him to her palace, where her fiery embraces finally consume him. Two motives stand out in the four-part opus, Antar's (violas and woodwinds) and the Queen's (flutes and horns). The composer paints with brilliant technique and glittering colors, climaxing in the portrayal of amorous passion and the transfigured harmonies as Antar sinks into death.

# The March of Music

Edited by Leonard Liebling

"... An ampler Ether, a diviner Air..."—Wordsworth

**M**ANY persons wonder why Stradivarius violins (known in the musical profession as "Strads") came to win their renown and to achieve such precious financial value. Publicity attendant upon the 200th anniversary of the death of Antonio Stradivari and the recent celebratory New York concert at which a small orchestra used nearly one million dollar's worth of his examples, doubtless renewed curiosity concerning their maker and his history.

Born in the Italian town of Cremona in 1644, Stradivarius, as he has come to be called, was apprenticed as a lad to Niccolo Amati, eminent constructor of violins and cellos, but destined to be outshone by one who, in the opinion of later experts and many generations of celebrated violinists, stands at the head of all fashioners of musical instruments.

It is claimed that his first violin was made by Stradivarius when he was only thirteen. Certain it is, however, that he continued to turn out his marvelous products until almost the last days of his life—he reached the age of ninety-three. A pupil of Amati, Stradivarius imitated the style of his illustrious teacher for quite a while after he left that workshop, but later he adopted his own models and methods, shaping his violin bellies larger and flatter than Amati's, improving the arching, ennobling the design of the scroll, and selecting, seasoning and varnishing the wood with infinite resource and art. The resulting glorious tone, which seems to improve with time, is one of extreme mellowness, sweetness and brilliance when desired.

During his lifetime, Stradivarius made something over 1,000 violins, about 300 violas, cellos and basses (at that time not yet used in the orchestras), and also some lutes, guitars and mandolins, all exquisitely wrought.

Even in Stradivarius' day, his violins brought a fairly high price, about \$120 each. At the beginning of the nineteenth century, the figure began to grow appreciably, and now, in the case of some examples, is soaring toward the \$100,000 mark, as much as some great paintings bring.

It is interesting to reflect on all the renowned hands which have played the Stradivarius violins and cellos, the triumphs and thrills they have furnished; and perhaps, too, the regrets and tears when owners had to part with their prized instruments.

Stradivarius' home can still be seen in Cremona, and if you ever visit it, try to envision the scene in Paul Stoeving's book "The Violin" (written about forty years ago) describing the last years of the master craftsman's life: "A venerable old man—a thin, stooping figure, in cap and leather apron, with a face furrowed by thought, in his little kingdom, surrounded by talented pupils (among them Bergonzi, Guarnerius and Guadagnini) watching, following and helping the

**T**O PARAPHRASE a current popular song, "Bie mir ist Wagner Schoen." Evidently also in Cleveland, with this diversified roster of his works.

The "Flying Dutchman" overture opens with the "Curse" motive, announced by bassoons and horns, and the strings denote the fury of the winds and waves. Later we hear the assuaging theme of Senta, whose love and pity save the Dutchman from eternal doom. Fix your attention upon those two melodies and note with what wonderful resource they are combined.

It is appropriate programming to have Richard Strauss ending the concert, for he was the next great German creator after the Bayreuth master, whose orchestral system he adopted and amplified. At this writing, Strauss is having renewed vogue at the Metropolitan with his "Salome," "Elektra" and "Rosenkavalier."

COMPLETELY under the sign of Americanism are two of our programs this week. The present one, offered by the League of Composers (which does highly useful sponsoring of new works), presents the more typical list in the sense that European influences are less pronounced.

Jacobi, living for a while with the Pueblo Indians, included their motifs in some of his works, but he does not believe that the future of American music is based on the Red Man's tunes. Today's example is merely an expression of a bright mood in light instrumentation.

Elie Siegmeister belongs to the extreme leftist group in tone, subscribing to realism rather than to beauty. The words of this ironically sinister song are by Michael Gold and interpret the heartlessness of a steel corporation in a worker's death.

Louis Gruenberg's specialty, symphonic treatment of jazz—something that Paul Whiteman has always championed—is not particularly evident in his two songs.

Twenty-three-year-old Robert McBride has been composing since he was thirteen and now teaches other young Americans in his capacity as instructor at Bennington College.

HERE are an American pair following contrary tendencies, due to differing racial foundations and training. Parker, born in Massachusetts, studied in Germany; Loeffler, an Alsatian, had his musical education in France. So the former's pages make bows to Wagner and Brahms; and the latter's render homage to d'Indy and Debussy. Neither used themes, harmonies or rhythms which sprang from our own soil.

Parker's "Mona," based upon a Druidical tale, won a \$10,000 prize given by the Metropolitan Opera for the best "American" opera. The prelude has full and rich orchestration, treating dignified melodic matter.

Loeffler devotes his composition to the eighth eclogue of Virgil, which tells about the Thessalian girl who tried to hold her lover through magic incantations.

Both men have passed away; those on the League of Composers program are among the living!

snow-haired, patriarchal genius. . . . It is a charming picture one can thus conjure up, an idyl worthy of the brush of a Rembrandt."

Brightening the Ford program is Rose Pauly, the electrifying Electra (in Richard Strauss' opera of that name). The Hungarian soprano gained her present membership at the Metropolitan because of the sensational hit she made last year at a New York Philharmonic concert, when she figuratively lifted hearers from their seats with her dramatic intensity and lavish outpouring of warm tone.

Inquirers ask why "The March of Music" does not include annotations for all the Toscanini programs. The reason is the Maestro's tardiness in the final selection of numbers. Frequently, by the time he announces his decision, RADIO GUIDE is on the presses. Whenever the Maestro makes up his mind far enough in advance and NBC forwards the news with its usual courtesy, this department will be delighted to discuss the music.

His "Milestones in American Music" series is devoted by Dr. Howard Hanson to the composing sons of our land, whose cause he has always championed and furthered practically. About eight years ago he went to Europe and led many concerts there of which the programs were entirely American. As a result, some of the foreign critics wrote that they were surprised at the high quality of our output, and others expressed their surprise that we composed any symphonic music at all. (They probably expected to hear concerts of jazz as typifying the only American creative ability in tone.)

Although director of the Eastman School of Music at Rochester, N. Y., since 1924, Doctor Hanson has not allowed his own diligence as a composer to lapse, and among his major works of the past few years are his "Northern" symphony and the opera "Merry Mount," premiered at the Metropolitan in 1934. All the Hanson music shows keen inventiveness and rare skill in orchestration. A string quartet, which received its premiere at the Coolidge concerts in Washington, won outstanding success and was widely acclaimed by critics.

To many discriminative judges, "Aida" represents the most perfect Italian opera of the melodramatic school. The libretto is a cannily built and cumulative drama of human love, hate, vengeance, nobility, heroism and tragedy. The action never ceases, and is emphasized by music of glowing beauty and powerful descriptiveness. Two numbers, the opening tenor aria, "Celeste Aida" (Celestial Aida) and the resounding march of the great triumphal procession and pageant, are familiar even to persons who have not attended the Verdi opera itself.

ACT I

An ante-chamber in the palace of the King of Egypt. Ramfis, the high priest, informs Radames, ambitious young military commander, that the Ethiopians are again marching on Egypt, and adds that the goddess Isis has made prophecy of a new warrior who shall be made leader against them. Radames intones his hopes of being the fortunate one so that he may return to Aida, whom he loves, and lay his laurels at her feet.

The Princess Amneris arrives, enamored of Radames, but when she witnesses the meeting between her slave, Aida, and the youthful general she realizes their mutual love, and her jealousy is aroused. Aida's country is Ethiopia. Egypt's King chooses Radames to head the defending troops.

In the second scene, the Temple of Vulcan, Ramfis blesses Radames' sword, while the High Priestess chants a ritual air and her sister vestals perform a sacred dance.

ACT II

A chamber in Amneris' apartment. The Princess, evilly intent on making Aida reveal her love for Radames, tells her that he has fallen in battle. The artless girl falls to the ground in despair, but realizes her error when Amneris proclaims that Radames lives and is returning as the nation's hero. Trumpets sound the arrival, and sparing Aida from the death sentence for her presumption, Amneris decrees that the unfortunate maid witness the triumphal reception of Radames.

Radames is carried on in a chariot and behind him are the captives, including Amonasro, father of Aida, the latter seeing Amneris place the victor's crown on Radames' head, and learning the priests demand the death of the prisoners, Radames pleads successfully for their lives, and the King announces as the hero's reward the hand of Amneris.

ACT III

Amonasro prevails on Aida to ascertain from Radames the road by which he will march on Ethiopia, and momentarily her patriotism conquers her love. Radames is moved to reveal his plans and suggests they fly together to Aida's native land. Amneris overhears the plot, denounces Radames, who surrenders his sword to the High Priest.

ACT IV

The entrance to Radames' prison cell. Amneris pleads with him never to see Aida again, but he refuses. Ramfis and his brother priests pronounce sentence on Radames—to be buried alive.

Radames is entombed, alone, as he believes. But Aida has found an underground entrance and comes to die with him.

### Commentator Airs Current British Comment

Fridays, NBC-Blue, 9:15-9:30 p.m.

Weekly digest of sentiment from the Cheviot Hills to the Straits of Dover is "They're Saying in England," new NBC trans-Atlantic letter by Howard Marshall heard each Friday evening directly from the British Broadcasting Company studios in London.

The voice of Britain, first tenor in the chorus of diplomacy, is seldom loud, usually interesting, traditionally significant. For listeners, there are two program profits: a swift marshaling of the thoughts in the British popular mind; a digest of foreign opinion to counterbalance domestic "angles."

Marshall, cultured spokesman for the "They're Saying" series, is best known to American listeners for his stage-setting sketches of pre-coronation events. An Oxfordian, thirty-eight, sportsman, editor and versatile BBC commentator, he brings a solid background of practical experience to his interpretations of his countrymen's current thoughts.

### Experts to Discuss Farm Export Problem

Sunday, NBC-Blue, 7-7:30 p.m.

The cause of the Trojan War, 1184 B. C., is popularly ascribed to the infidelity of the famous Helen. The real cause was restrictive tariffs imposed by Troy on commerce through the Dardanelles.

Modern trade and tradesmen still fight wars of price, legislation and "defense" over tariff principles.

In the U. S. today, agrarian and industrial interests glare at one another and denounce or demand tariffs that often mean prosperity for one group at the expense of the other.

Sunday evening, a panel of business experts headed by an authority on international economics, Edward Tomlinson, will rally to the question "Is Agricultural Prosperity Dependent on Foreign Trade?" and attempt to reconcile the conflicting problems of developing a foreign market for the farmer and protecting home industry against foreign competition.

Tariffs and their adjustment, and the question of expanding home markets for the nation's exportable surplus of farm products, will be key elements in the discussion.

The purpose of the forum, says Tomlinson, is the charting of "paths to prosperity" through "free and open discussion of international trade."

"Think on these things"—and you put an ice-pack on that feverish temptation to judge people and events by their current colors. You begin to see the revolutions of today as key designs in the pattern of evolution tomorrow. You begin to sense some of the revolutions that progress unheeded—destined to flower in a future generation.

Five noted feminists will keynote the simultaneous, world-wide celebration of "International Day," Friday, with a five-nation round-robin discussion of "The Role of Women in the Modern State." NBC short-wave pickups will bring Lady Astor from Plymouth, England; Mrs. Halvadan Koht from Oslo, Norway; Mme. Friday's selections include: "March Miniature" from Tchaikowsky's Nut Cracker Suite; "Hens and Chickens" from Saint-Saens' Carnival of the Animals; Charpentier's "On Mule Back"; "The Flight of the Bumble Bee"; "Perpetual Motion" by Strauss; "Dance of the Sugar Plum Fairy" and "Children's Overture" by Quilter.

One man looks at a tree and sees apples; another, lumber; a third, an inspiration for a poem. So too with composers of music. To one the flight of a bird is a dance; to another the song of the wind.

## Lincoln Legend Told in Smithsonian Exhibits

Sunday, NBC-Red, 4:30-5 p.m.

Abraham Lincoln—to his cabinet, an executive—to the world, the Great Emancipator—to most of us a legend, comes to life again in the narrative-drama of "The World Is Yours," Sunday afternoon.

Six score and nine years ago that legend began in a cabin in the Kentucky hills. Today it goes deeper than the simple success story of a frontier lad who make the grade. It's an epic narrative of personal revolt against inherited lethargy and the limitations of a humble childhood, and the still greater story of revolt against injustice and human suffering.

The legend is many sided. From it critics have drawn indictments of Lincoln's methods, denunciations of some of his decisions—but history has not yet impeached his motives. His was a life of revolt—quiet, but strong—typical of the revolutions "of, by and for" the people that made America.

This week we may walk with trouble-weary Lincoln across the Mall from the White House to the old, red stone, Smithsonian Institution and view with him many of the collections that inspired and gave him solace.

The "World Is Yours" retraces those steps and reconstructs several of the most interesting and little-known episodes of Lincoln's life, as radio re-opens the nation's treasure house "for the increase and diffusion of knowledge among men," and the "Old Timer" says, "The world is yours."

## Diabetes Ranks Ninth Among Lethal Diseases

Wednesday, 2-2:30 p.m. NBC-Red.

When your pancreas strikes—so does diabetes. For this little gland is a principal traffic officer of the body. It secretes the hormone, insulin, which regulates the metabolism of carbohydrates—or the proper production of sugar in the form and amounts that the muscles can use—and when it goes off duty diabetes is the traffic jam that results. You get too much and the wrong kind of sugar in your blood.

These traffic jams are the ninth most frequent causes of death in America—only tenth, including homicide, suicide and accidents.

Of unusual interest therefore will be the American Medical Association's discussion and outline of methods for "Overcoming Diabetes" to be heard Wednesday in the current series on "Your Health."

His broadcast will be aired a half-hour earlier than at present, once the time has been vacated by the Oakie College, which is definitely slated to bar its doors and campus.

Talk is also that Milton Berle has been asked to replace Cantor for Texaco, but whether the show will fold until fall after the March 23 airing or continue a few weeks until summer, has not been decided. # AIRIALTO LOWDOWN

BY MARTIN LEWIS

**"BEI MIR BIST DU SCHOEN"...** do you think it's grand? This song has enjoyed an amazing popularity, but most folks seem to be tiring of hearing it so often on the networks. I have received several letters from readers who want to know why the networks can't do something about the constant repetition of tunes. Well, something is done about it, but there are several reasons why the listener may not be aware of the steps taken by the broadcasting companies.

Both NBC and CBS have clearance departments, through which program routines (lists of songs and the script) must be sent for a final okay. At CBS the rigid ruling is that no song may be repeated within a two-hour period unless some very unusual case comes up. All programs, sponsored or unsponsored, must submit their routines two weeks in advance. Orchestras that broadcast from clubs and hotels have to submit their schedules a week in advance. They are notified if they can't play a tune, leaving ample time for a substitution.

Over at NBC we find deference to the sponsors . . . their rule is that no tune should be repeated within a period of from two to three hours, but if the directors of a commercial program are insistent enough, they are usually allowed to play what they want to. All programs must receive the network's final okay, however, although the time when they submit the scripts is up to the producer. The National Barn Dance has its 1938 Christmas program in the files and okayed already.

Regardless of how the clearance is handled, both networks, you see, have some regulation of the number of times a tune can be played. However, when you hear a popular tune like "Bei Mir Bist Du Schoen," it makes an impression, and even though you may not hear it again for two hours—lucky you!—it will seem like a shorter time. Then you must realize that you constantly change the station on your dial, and if you hear a song at nine o'clock on CBS, and at 9:30 on NBC, although you may not hear it for two more hours on either of those stations, you are still hearing it too often . . . but that is not the fault of the networks. As long as directors and musicians think you want to hear a song, they'll play it at every opportunity, and if you don't want to hear it, I guess the only thing for you to do is to turn the dial or shut the radio off.

George W. Hill, head man at *Lucky Strike*, is definitely convinced that he has a hit show in "Kay Kyser's Musical Klass," heard at present on Tuesday nights over WGN in Chicago and WOR in New York. The first four days after the initial broadcast for the ciggy sponsor, 7,300 letters poured in, which prompted Mr. Hill to move the program to New York. Before many weeks roll by, this outstanding show will be heard from Coast to Coast.

The Frankie Masters orchestra, heard on the "It Can Be Done" program, has been playing one-night stands in the surrounding neighborhood between broadcasts. Recently, however, Frankie has had a great deal of trouble with shaky bandstands. It seems that three of them were so shaky that he fell off onto the dance floor. Says Frankie, "From now on I'll direct the band from the floor—I seem to end up there, anyway."

Undoubtedly many readers have heard the new Mutual show called "True or False," which is broadcast on Monday nights. Two teams are enlisted, then Dr. Harry Hagen, conductor of the program, makes a statement and a member of each team answers "True" or "False." A New York radio scribe suggested that Dr. Hagen make

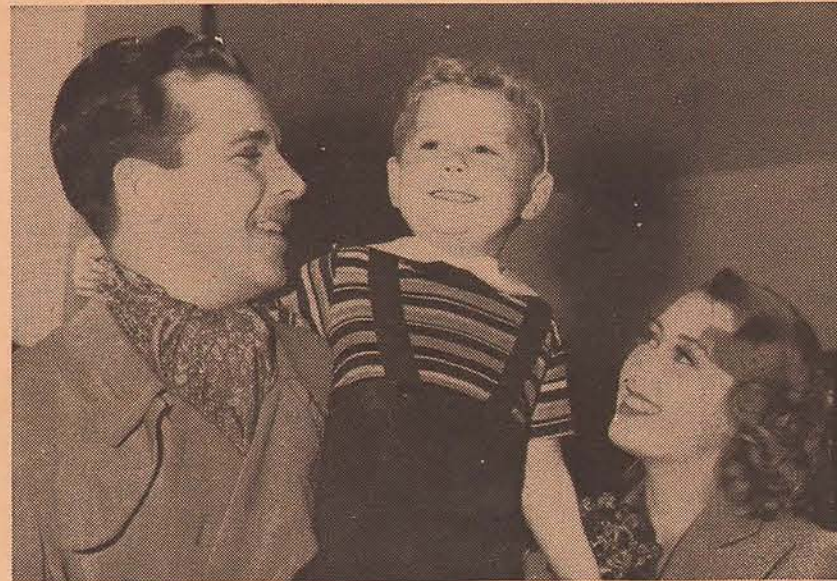
up a team composed of New York radio editors. The idea appealed to the doctor, but, according to reports, the reason the scribes have not appeared on the program is because if they should lose to the opposing team, or make a poor showing, it would look very bad for them, and it might have telling effect as far as getting future publicity for the show from the boys. I still think it would be both interesting and amusing.

I was sitting in the press department at NBC on a recent Tuesday night, and was both surprised and amazed at the great number of phone calls that came in wanting to know where Parks Johnson and Wally Butterworth's "Vox Pop" program would originate that

night. NBC is literally swamped every Tuesday night by the number of requests for this information. Most of the callers are out-of-towners who listen to the program regularly and would like to go on the show. As a matter of fact, all these calls prompted me to hop over to the Governor Clinton Hotel, from where the broadcast was to emanate that night. I got a kick out of watching Parks and Wally enlist the onlookers to appear on the show. For practically every program there are more people willing to go on than time will allow. Most of them are a little panicky at first. One man standing beside me was the next to face the mike. He held up his hands and they were wet from perspiration. However, the fright rapidly disappears, because the boys have an uncanny knack of putting the participants at their ease. The big laugh of this particular broadcast came when Parks was interviewing a Mrs. Lewis from Utah (no relation). She was stuck. Just at that moment the production-man held up two fingers, which was the cue for Parks to know that there were only two minutes left for the program. The gesture was irrelevant, but the woman, thinking she was being prompted, answered brightly, "Two." This sent the onlookers into hysterics.

At the NBC press department one night, a call came in for Abe Schecter, NBC's director of news and special events. The caller was told that Mr. Schecter was out of town. Whereupon, the person at the other end of the line asked where Schecter could be located. He said he had an important message for him and would reach him by a long-distance call. He was told that Mr. Schecter could be reached at the Shepherd Hotel in Cairo, Egypt, where he had gone to put on a special broadcast for NBC. There was no answer from the other end—just a thud!

Lauritz Melchior made a lot of youngsters happy recently by making a personal appearance. A \$5 prize was offered for the best short account of his visit submitted by a student of grade-school or high-school age. The award was won by Jane Toivonen, and here is her entry, which explains what Melchior's visit meant to her:

## A BELOVED ARTIST

The second of February is a great day in the history of the New York Institute for the Education of the Blind. Mr. Lauritz Melchior, one of the world's most renowned Metropolitan Opera stars, very kindly consented to come to our school and sing for us. This, of course, is something which cannot happen very often. Everyone—even the deaf-blind students who could receive vibrations with the help of radio—was deeply touched by Mr. Melchior's singing. One could not help but feel that this was his way of telling us what was in his heart—that this was one experience he would not forget.

Melchior has a blind sister who heads a school for the blind in Copenhagen.

## THE LOG CABIN THAT JACK BUILT

UNLIKE the boy wonders of fiction, Jack Haley did not starve first nor live in a garret the while he courted radio fortune. He simply became an overnight success last year as star of his own NBC-Red Saturday night program after a brilliant career in vaudeville, on the legitimate stage, and in motion pictures. On January 29, Radio Guide's singing cameraman, Gene Lester, visited Log Cabin to see the program that Jack has built and to capture—in pictures—the entire show.

Born in Boston, Mass., in 1901, Jack ran away from home at the age of eighteen to become a song-plugger. From that he graduated into vaudeville as a comedian, and reached the apex of circuit fame—the Palace Theater in New York. Then came musical-comedy roles in "Gay Paree," "Good News,"

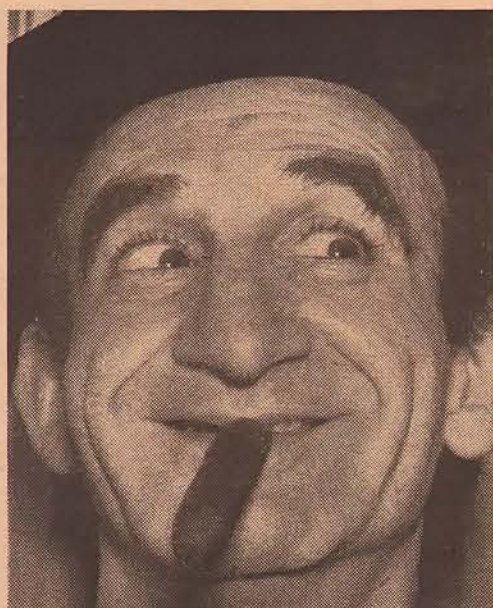
"Follow Through," "Free For All," and "Take a Chance." A film official saw Haley perform in "Take a Chance," and signed him for "Sitting Pretty," with Ginger Rogers and Jack Oakie, thus launching the third phase of the comic's career. Leaving Broadway for Hollywood, he appeared in such films as "Here Comes the Groom" and "Pigskin Parade"—became a box-office sensation as the mike-frightened crooner in "Wake Up and Live" with Ben Bernie and Walter Winchell.

Last July, Jack decided to enter radio and made a series of performances aboard the Maxwell House Show Boat. So pleased were sponsors with the response to Haley's antics that when the new Log Cabin Show bowed last October, Jack was made its comedian and star, to the acclaim of listeners.

# On Short Waves

THE generally poor short-wave reception that prevailed during the entire month of January and that has continued thus far into February has been due largely to an unusual activity of that magnetic phenomenon of the far North, the aurora borealis. This disturbance creates actual noise in receivers, similar in sound to certain types of man-made interference. It further blankets all frequencies, affecting the strength of most stations and almost completely absorbing any short-wave signals that must cross the north pole, or polar regions, to reach us. Transmissions from VUD2 (9.59), the new Delhi, India, station described in detail in the last issue, would fall in this category, as would those from RAN (9.6), Moscow, U.S.S.R., to a lesser degree.

On Sunday evening, February 6, the Soviet station was unusually loud, and at 9:30 p.m. EST, the Delhi broadcaster came on the air with the loud-est signals yet heard from this place. On the same evening, a news item from Daventry noted the absence of any aurora borealis disturbance and said that the phenomenon would appear again on Tuesday, February 8. From the above, one can readily see that many factors may have a bearing upon your ability to hear or not to hear far-distant stations.

Two more high-power transmitters, costing in the neighborhood of \$250,000, will soon be added to the six already in use at Daventry, England. These will be used primarily for the projection of programs in Spanish and Portuguese for reception in Central and South America.

The fate of Dr. Schmidt and his four companions, composing the Soviet Arctic Aerial Navigation Expedition, who established a camp on an ice-floe near the north pole last March, which has since drifted 1,100 miles to the proximity of the northeast coast of Greenland, and now marooned on a single iceberg, will depend entirely upon the efficiency of their short-wave station, UPOL or RAEM (14.41), in directing a rescue party to them. This station has been heard occasionally near 9 p.m. EST. Any listeners hearing mes-

sages from this station are urgently requested to communicate with RADIO GUIDE at once.

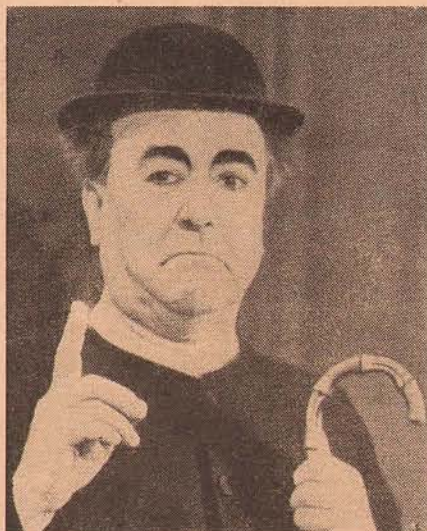
Warren Stark of Wauwatosa, Wis., writes that TI8WS of Puntarenas, Costa Rica, formerly operating on 7.55 megs, is now being heard on 6.365 megs, with a powerful new transmitter.

The S. S. Manhattan, which has just been equipped with a 400-watt short-wave transmitter, WIEA, works WOO at Ocean Gate, N. J., on any one of the following frequencies: 4.412, 8.83, 13.21 or 17.64 megs, and works the European shore stations on any one of these frequencies: 4.43, 8.86, 13.32, or 17.6 megs. The significance of this item lies in the fact that this ship is the first American merchant vessel to adopt radiophone for ship-shore traffic since the S. S. Leviathan stopped running. The S. S. Washington is being similarly equipped.

Rudolph Kure of Cincinnati, O., writes that the daily American Hour from Rome, Italy, is now being heard over 2RO3 (9.635), IRF (9.83), and a third transmitter, IQY (11.9), which was added on Sunday, February 6.

As a result of careful study to improve coverage of Latin America, NBC has changed the time allocation of its use of short-wave frequencies beamed toward Latin and South America to the following: Over W3XAL on 17.78 megs, daily from 5 to 7 p.m. and on 6.1 megs, daily from 7 p.m. to 1 a.m. EST. NBC has intensified its program service to Latin America by transmitting special versions of the Saturday night NBC Symphony Orchestra concerts and the Saturday afternoon Metropolitan Opera broadcasts with all announcements and verbal comment in Spanish.

Earl Roberts of Indianapolis, Ind., reports that for the past two Saturday afternoons he has heard CR7BH (11.718) of Laurence Marques, Mozambique, Portuguese East Africa, signing off at 4 p.m. EST. He states that the station has a clear channel at this hour and comes in surprisingly well.

# So You Like Contests?

**U**NQUESTIONABLY the most important contest form today is the short statement. Years ago complex puzzles, essays and word-building contests constituted the bulk of offerings. Now nearly half of the really important contests want short statements suitable for use in advertising. An analysis of them is appropriate.

Wilmer Shepherd is undoubtedly the master of the short statement. His numerous approaches to the exercise of statement-writing are a constant source of inspiration to many. Second only to him is Kenneth R. Close, author of "How to Write Winning Contest Statements," an excellent review, including examples of winners.

Mr. Close defines the contest statement of from 20 to 50 words as "billboard advertising," designed for hurried reading or announcement on the air. These he classifies in two general groups, the omnibus type, which attempts to enumerate all the favorable points about the product, and the "single theme" type, which concentrates on a specific point. Agreeing with Close, our conclusion is that the latter is definitely superior, for omnibus statements most often are confusing and meaningless.

Close's functional test of a winning statement covers four points. First, the statement, in its opening key words, must attract attention. Second, it must arouse sustained attention. "The thought, language or emotional reference must be sufficiently unique and appealing to induce complete, concentrated reading of the statement." Third, the statement must convince the reader of some superior merit or merits of the product, and fourth, a key phrase or thought must be fixed in the reader's mind. In other words, Close is of the opinion that a statement must include a slogan—certainly an admirable virtue, but one many others would not consider necessary.

The most valuable section of "How to Write Winning Contest Statements" is a list of nineteen statement devices and forms. They are listed very briefly below:

1. *Personal experience*: "I was a World War nurse, and, knowing the devastation wrought by gas, I want protection from this horror in my own home . . ."
2. *Analogy*: "Just as Spring brightens and polishes Nature's domain, so Bab-O adds new light, life, etc. . ."
3. *Pun*: "Barbasol blades have the edge on all others . . ."
4. *Simile*: "Soft as a whisper, comforting as a mother's caress, Johnson's Baby Powder's silky smooth texture makes chafing disappear."
5. *Contrast*: "From Father's tough skin to Baby's pink . . ."
6. *Jingle*.
7. *Selling idea*: "I always buy duplicate pairs of Realsilk stockings, dyed with Triple-Fast dyes. Then, no matter what treatment they receive, I always have a pair of stockings to match, so long as I have two which were originally of the same shade."
8. *Problem*: "A busy businesswoman—day after day, week after week, walking, walking, walking—always on my feet. Realsilk Flat-Seam Sole solved my problem, etc. . ."

9. *Sales Talk* (more conversational than No. 7): "Wearing Realsilk stockings of fresh silk means keeping step with progress . . ."

10. *Humor*: "I'm a big hulk, over 200 pounds. Ten hours a day in a hot office, on my feet most of the time. What a test of socks! . . ."

11. *Cumulative effect* (in which each statement becomes more powerful than its predecessor): "Vest-pocket prestige, desk-top efficiency, life-time satisfaction . . ."

12. *Balance or rhythmic effect*: "Shaeffer's goods are outwardly beautiful, inwardly dependable and always economical."

13. *Class appeal*: (Flattery with such phrases as "men well able to pay more" or "women accustomed to the best").

14. *News type statement*: "Disastrous newspaper headlines tell the story of unsafe gas refrigerants, working under pressure in leaky compressors and connections. Carrene, the safe, efficient refrigerant, works within a sealed rotary mechanism . . ."

15. *Slogan-statement*: "Kelvinator—The Refrigerator of Today with the Conveniences of Tomorrow: Always Automatic—Always Economical—Always Dependable."

16. *"Buy Now"*: "Advancing prices say 'Buy a Frigidaire NOW!'"

17. *Seasonal or special appeal*: "In every game, Certified Cremo cigars score the winning touchdown by three standard ground-gaining plays: quality, cleanliness and economy."

18. *Acrostics* (in which the product's name provides the initial letters for the lines or words of a statement): "Men Everywhere Are Demanding Of Wives—Guard Our Lean Dollars" (Meadow Gold).

19. *Outline*: (In this type the reasons for a conclusion are put in the form of an outline, as if for an essay).

Many will feel that Close's nineteen forms could be grouped better in fewer classifications—but there is one virtue to this arrangement: it suggests many approaches, and any one of them might suggest a winning entry!

In addition to Close's work, many others periodically write about winning statement contests. Most books consider them. There is no more profitable field for study in contesting!

ment, they all won big prizes—which lends support to the contention of some of our readers that nobody can spot a winner! We're perfectly willing to agree that we can't! There are some entries which are so obviously superior that anyone can recognize their excellence; others simply seem to have more good points than bad, and their winning depends more on their competition, probably, than on anything they can boast themselves.

In introducing one of the lessons of his course, the "Trustee Technique," Shepherd also lists some of his students' winners. In these, the writers "repose confidence and faith in the sponsor's product," as in a trustee. This faith is demonstrated "dramatically by entrusting to it something easily harmed or something dear . . . The product fully justifies this faith by being kind or beneficial to that which is entrusted to it." In other words, as Shepherd explains it, "The product plays the role of a trusted friend, makes good, and merits your continued reliance and loyalty." Here are the winners:

"I like Chipso because my most cherished material possession is an antique knitted bedspread; this I have repeatedly washed with Chipso without harming one delicate age-worn thread."

"When baby was crawling, Lava Soap alone kept her knees clean without chapping; Lava has been a kitchen and bathroom fixture ever since."

"I use Ivory Flakes for washing my silk stockings because, like an old friend, they're always dependable, whether I rely on them to preserve color, elasticity or texture!"

"I like Ivory Soap because it never mars the rainbow appeal of the children's prints. My neighbors call my wash the 'weekly miracle'."

"Centennial Silk-Sifted Flour is so dependable that I can trust my young daughter to make light biscuits when I entertain."

## This Contest World It Just Rolls Along!

The most inspirational story of contesting we have ever seen was in Gilson Willets' Christmas Day edition of "National Contest News," published in Scripps-Howard newspapers. This department suggests here that it be reprinted and made available through National Contest Headquarters to contesters . . . Contesters who became interested in soap-carving when P & G sponsored its annual competitions for "Small Sculptures in White Soap" will be interested in a new soap-sculpture kit which retails for about half a dollar . . . Results in the second Old Gold contest for 1937 remain a zealously guarded secret as this is written. Announcements of winners seem likely to come around the first of next month, however.

Joan Lambert, formerly Wilmer Shepherd's assistant, has opened her own entry-criticism office in Philadelphia . . . A reader complains that she receives smaller prizes which have been shipped without insurance in pitiful shape—broken, bent, irreparable. Is this common?

which, as might be supposed, had become rather annoying to civil authorities, was checked by law. But the theater had already demonstrated that it could be used as a vehicle for social reform, and many a playwright since has employed it for that purpose.

The performance of "The Birds" will be described as having been staged in the Theater Dionysus, at Athens, where the Athenians had assembled for plays produced at the annual religious festival in honor of the wine god. It was the ritual of the cult of Dionysus, probably more than any other, that gave drama its original impetus, and the selection of a play performed in the theater built in his honor has especial significance.

THE second play in the series is an English morality, "Everyman," most famous and most perfect of its kind. "Everyman" was produced in 1529, while the church of medieval England held in its hands, all unconsciously, the future of the theater.

Davis' radio play is an adaptation of the "Everyman" interpretation made famous by Edith Wynn Mathison and Charles Rann Kennedy. It will be broadcast from the nave of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, in New York City, a church which is an acknowledged masterpiece of architecture and a fit setting for a reproduction of the famous old morality.

The boys' choir of St. John's and the great cathedral organ will provide special music for the broadcast, and Bishop William T. Manning, of New York, will speak on the relationship between the modern drama and the church, a relationship that has often been forgotten in ecclesiastical assaults on the theater.

The Italian drama will be represented by a performance of "The Great Magician," a *commedia dell'arte* compiled and written by Lawrence Carra. *Commedia dell'arte*, at its height in Italy in the sixteenth century, was pure improvisation. The professional actors who played in it had only skeleton outlines of the plot—called scenarios—to guide them in each play. Their dialog they made up as they went along.

THE modern Irish theater will be represented by a production of Synge's "Playboy of the Western World," made famous by the Abbey Players of Dublin, whose theater is the workshop for the greatest playwrights of Ireland.

The last play in the series, as yet unselected, will be taken from the broad field of contemporary American drama, to give listeners a chance to hear at least one native stage piece that has been popular in the bright-light center of New York City—the modern capital of the theatrical world.

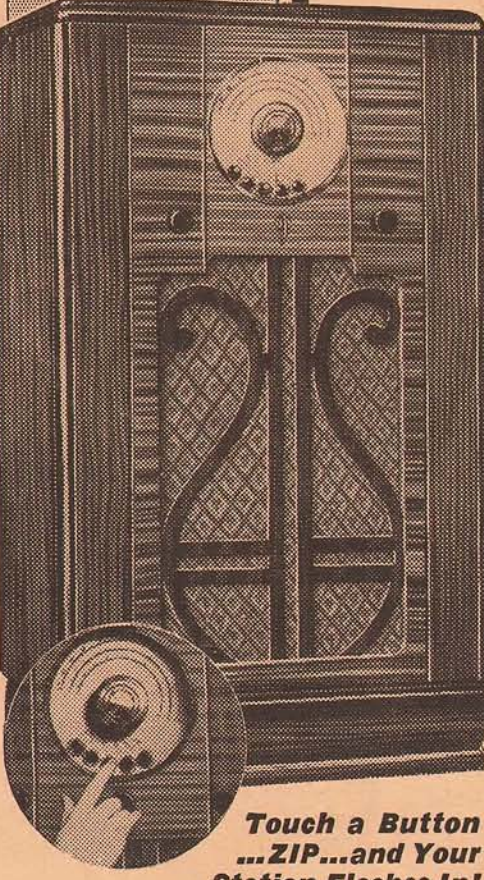
Davis makes no claim that the series he is writing is a complete story of the drama. His object has been merely to pick out and reproduce ten peak performances in the history of the theater, and there have necessarily been many omissions. But representative plays of all periods have been included, and the entire program is an excellent outline of the development of drama.

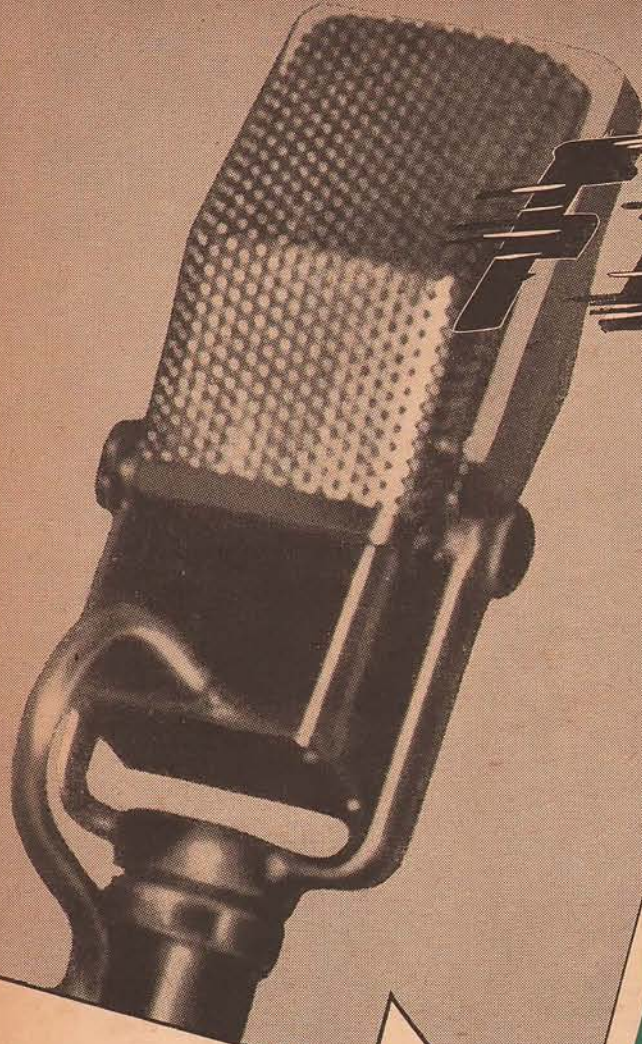

## TELEVISION: Most Complete Photo-Story Ever Published



**1927** Television was first publicly demonstrated by American T. & T. in a broadcast between Washington and New York with crude results



**1928** Images were transmitted from England to America. Pictures were still hardly recognizable, though screen-lines were thinner than in '27

**D**URING the past ten years tremendous progress has been made in the field of television. This new art, which transmits moving scenes to distant points by means of electrical waves, there to be viewed almost simultaneously with their inception, will undoubtedly in the course of time tend to revolutionize the radio industry. The idea of television was old long before electricity was in general use for communication. The problems presented such unlimited difficulties, the tools needed so numerous and various, that it has taken many years to produce scientists and inventors competent to create the necessary material.

Sixty-five years ago, electrical devices embodying the particular requirements for realization of this idea were devised. In 1884, Nipkow patented a disk with spiral holes which was once in general use. Other tools were invented from that time on, but it was not until about thirty years ago that one of the greatest contributions to television was discovered—the vacuum tube.

In 1925, apparatus for television was exhibited by C. F. Jenkins in America and J. W. Baird in England. Two years later The American Telephone and Telegraph Company gave the first complete public demonstration of television by transmitting images from Washington to New York. In 1928, Baird announced the transmission of images across the Atlantic from England to America. Work has gone steadily forward on this radical departure from all known forms of communication until today there are regular television programs from the major networks throughout America, England, Germany and France. During 1937, one of the largest television stations in the United States conducted a series of experiments by installing sets in the homes of its engineers. These tests, conducted day and night under favorable and unfavorable conditions of every description and in all sections of the country, have been an important factor in eliminating former errors in design of apparatus both for sending and receiving. In England several hundred receiving sets have been sold for experimental purposes.

Wave lengths for television differ greatly from those for sound-broadcasting and do not travel satisfactorily over long distances. Fifty miles is the average distance a television program can be transmitted successfully. This necessitates the erection of many television stations in order to serve even one large city. Erection and equipment of these stations runs into hundreds of thousands of dollars involving tremendous investment. Although television is now practical in its scientific phases, there is still much to be done before it can be brought into practical use for the general public. The cost of regular receiving sets—\$350 to \$5,000—is almost prohibitive to the average radio owner, but with constant research, new inventions and improvements making such rapid strides, this condition is expected to be overcome within the next few years, and television programs will then be as important in our daily lives as regular radio-broadcast programs are today.

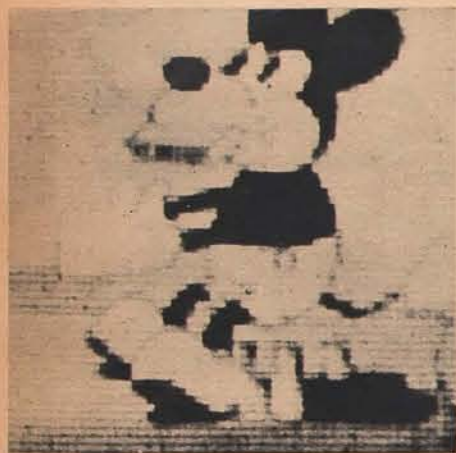

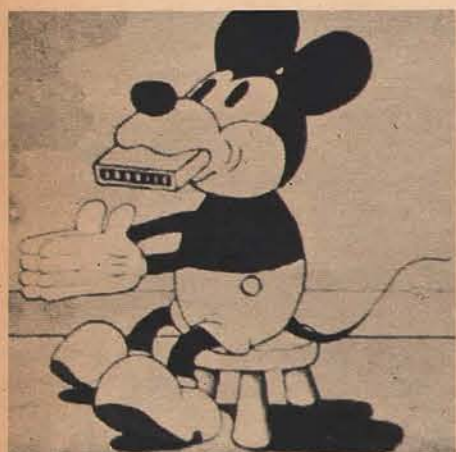

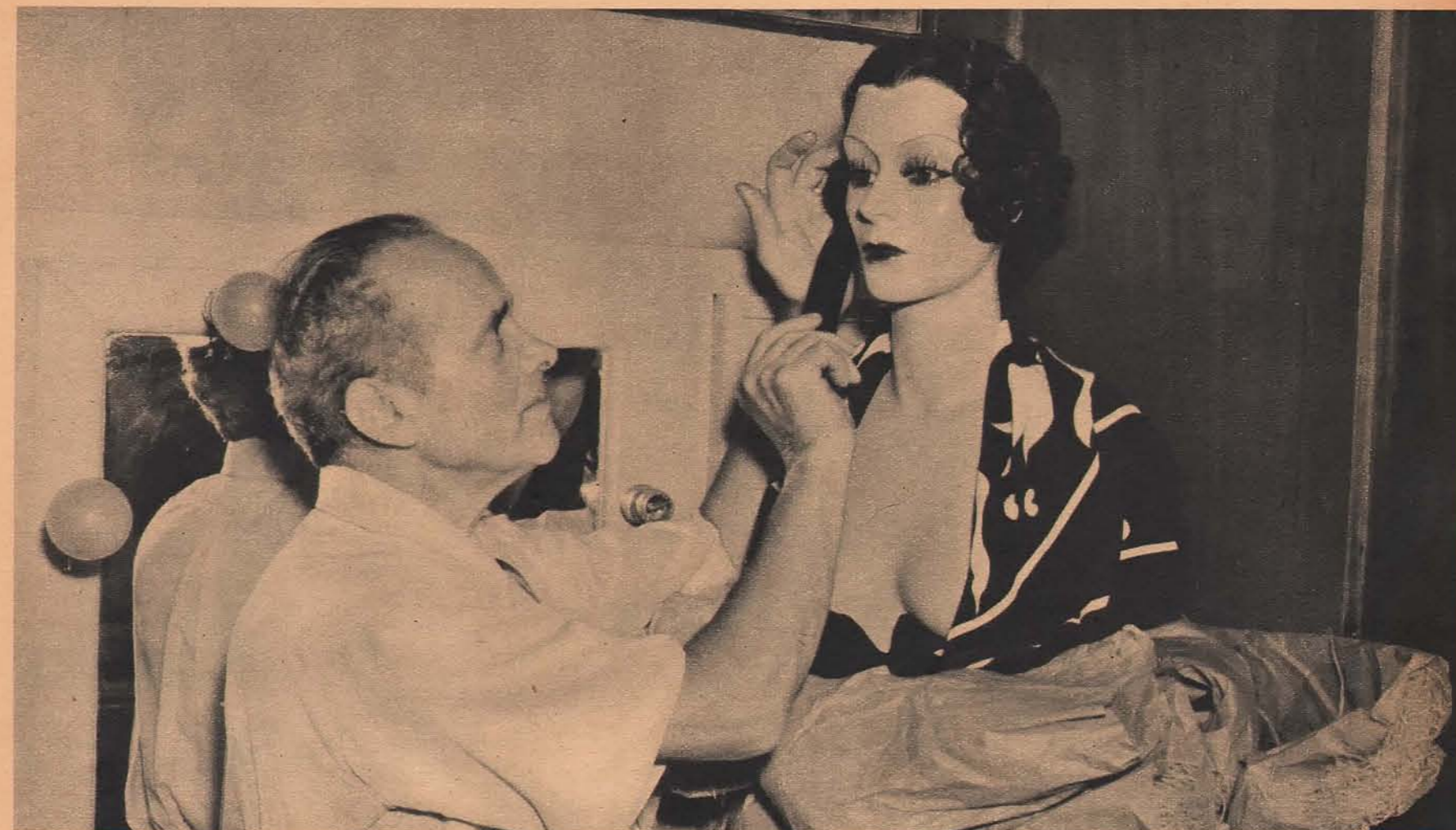

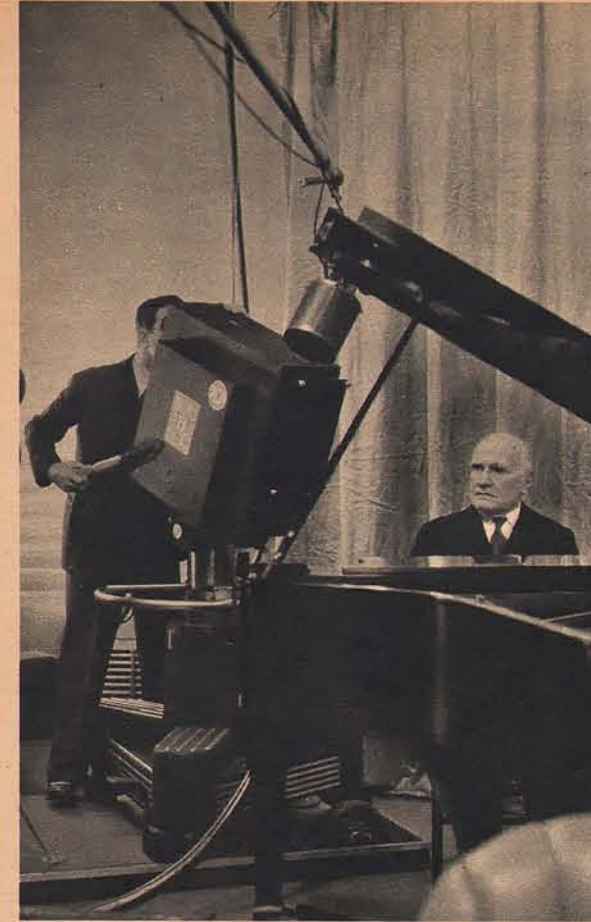

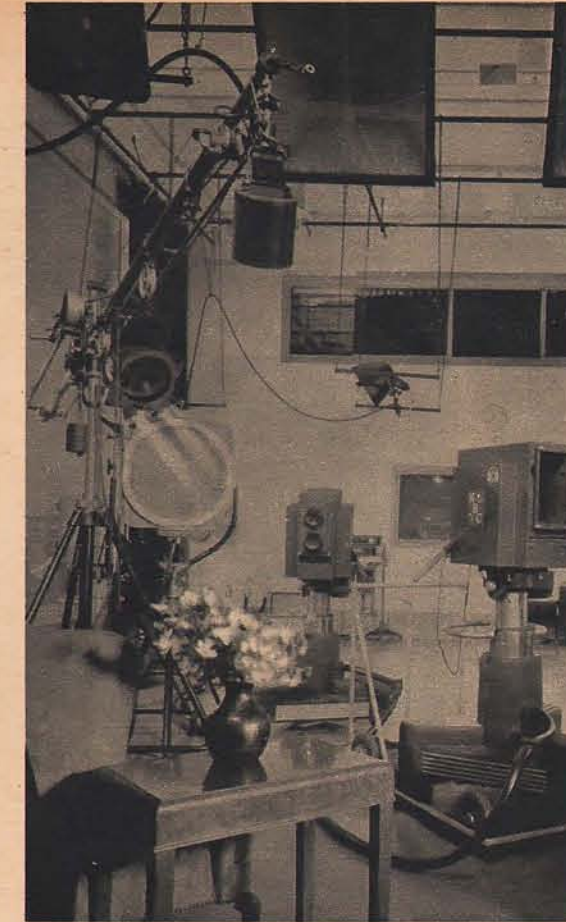

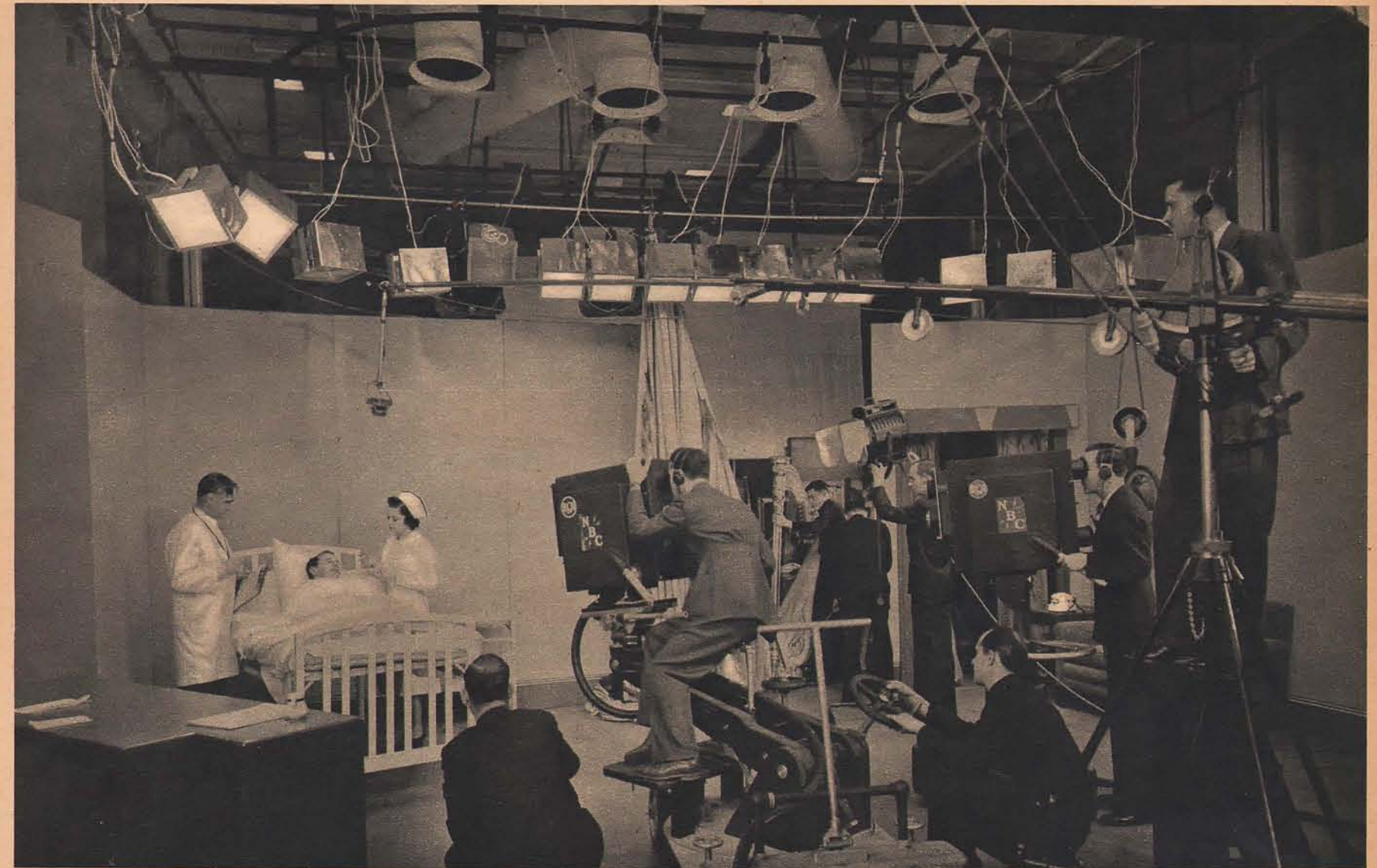

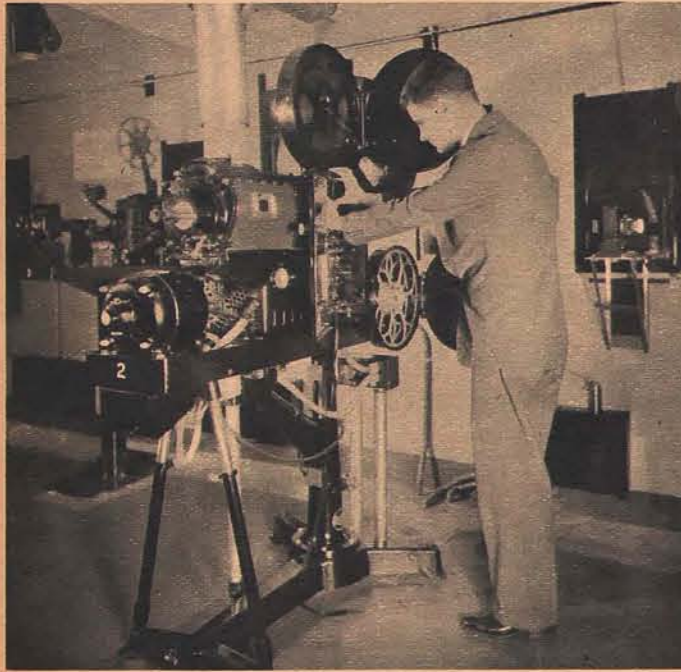

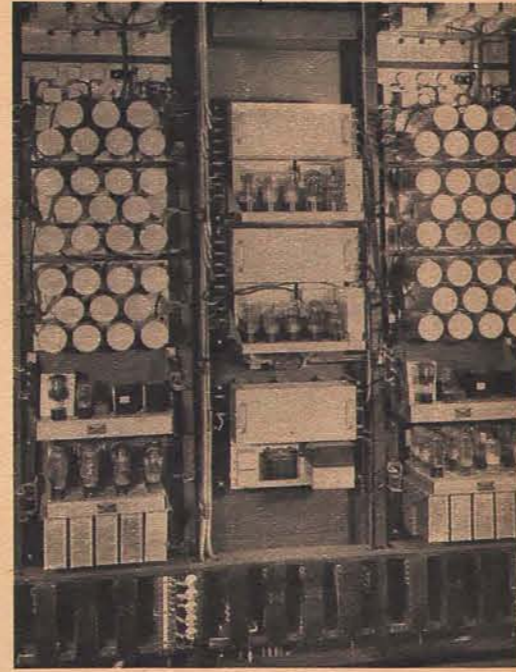

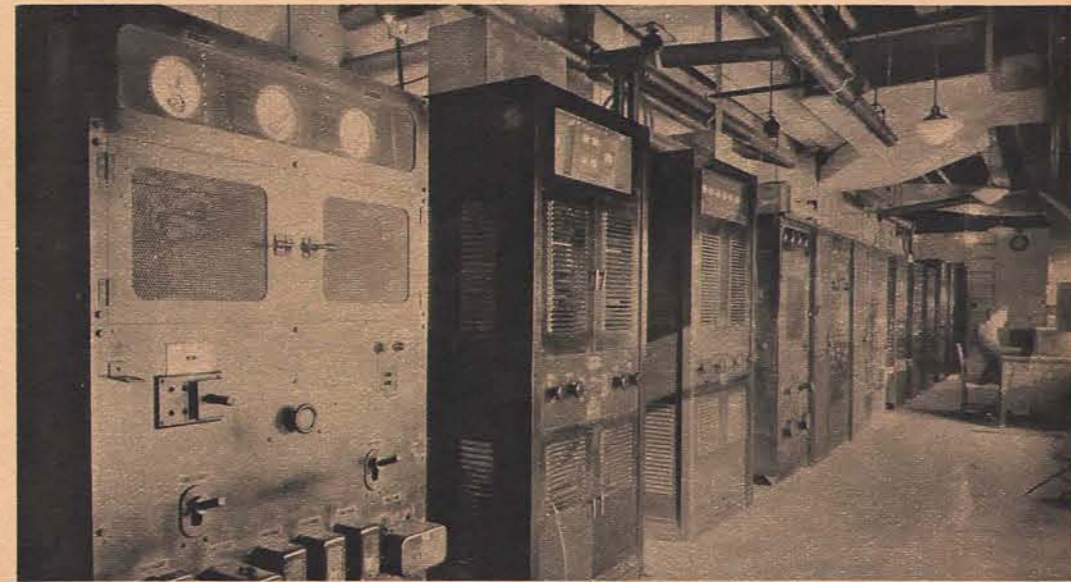

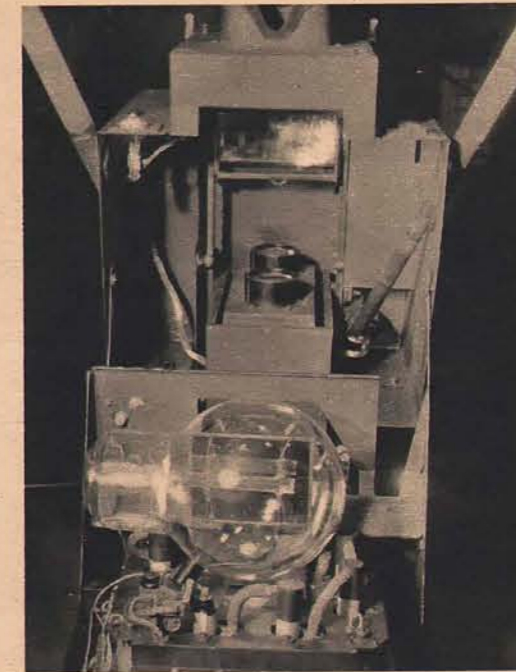

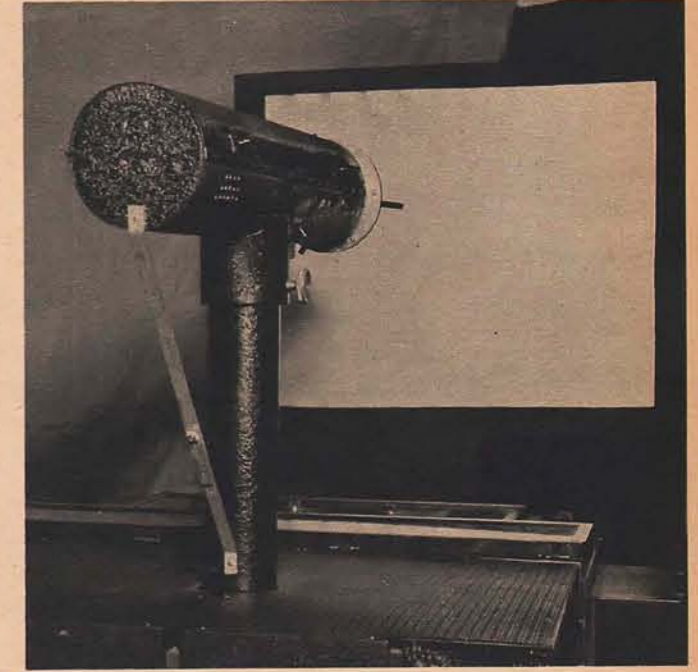

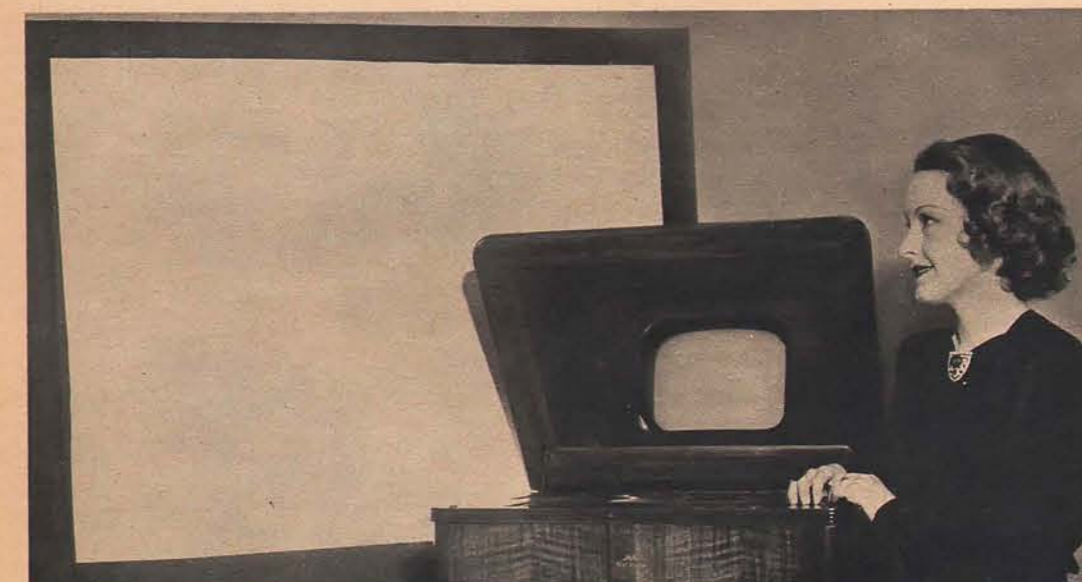

# STUDIO ON THE STREET

BY GEORGE MARSHALL

THE evolution of Fifty-seventh Street from a grotesque shantytown to its present splendor as a center of the arts and the more elegant retail trade can be recalled by many New Yorkers. From the so-called shantytown it was transformed into an exclusive residential section for such famous families as the Whitneys and the Vanderbilts. And now, in its third stage, it can really be referred to as the most cosmopolitan trade center in the world.

Contrary to general opinion, the busiest corner in the world is at Fifty-seventh Street and Fifth Avenue. The street has not only been a favorite of the socialites and the elite, but it has served as well as the scene for the inception of many industries, particularly the aeronautical; for it was on Fifty-seventh Street, between Fifth and Sixth Avenues, that Curtiss

On the ninth of last December the bureau put on the first in the series of broadcasts known as "The Sidewalk Reporter." Programs of this type have met with the approval of listening publics everywhere, and a number of stations are featuring them. Every Thursday from 3:30 to 4 p.m., WHOM sends its Sidewalk Reporter, alternately using Ray Marshall and Ray Green, out on Fifty-seventh Street to interview the passers-by. Broadcasts take place in front of the building in which the WHOM offices are situated. The programs are not, of course, an innovation; still, they have a zest of their own by virtue of the unique clientele found on Fifty-seventh Street.

Opinions on questions of importance vary according to the people who provide the answers. "The Man on the Street" has been unjustly classified under one general heading. The man

Wright, a pioneer in the industry, had his first business office. The exact address was 29 West Fifty-seventh Street.

In this building are the main offices and studios of Radio Station WHOM. This progressive station has made itself so popular with the foreign listening audience that at present it ranks with the leading stations in the country which cater to the foreign public. A glance at two hours of its most typical entertainment makes this popularity understandable.

ON ONE Sunday morning, between the hours of 9 and 11, WHOM presented an Italian variety program, an Italian amateur hour, a Polish-American program, a German program, a radio dance chain, a Spanish hour, a Bible truth hour, the D'Amico program, a Lithuanian program, another Polish-American presentation, an Italian prosperity program, the Cassinelli program, a varied Italian program, a presentation entitled "Visions of Italy," a half-hour of Irish music, a Greek program, and the "Back Home" hour.

The activities of WHOM, however, are not limited to foreign language programs. Its English department can boast of staffs in all branches of broadcasting. Its "Special Events" bureau has been working diligently and wholeheartedly to present to the American public truly interesting programs. The Pulaski Memorial Day parade, the unveiling of the Columbus statue in Hoboken, the election results, and broadcasts from theaters—these are some of the activities to which this department has been devoting itself during the last two months.

in the Bowery has a definite opinion to express as well as the shopper; so too has the "theater crowd"; but an opinion which has not before been caught on the radio is that of the Fifty-seventh Street man. He represents a rich variety with a flavor of its own.

For to this street come the patrons of the arts, the clients of New York's leading department stores, the residents of the most exclusive hotels. Over the "street microphone" their opinions are eagerly sought.

The originality of their ideas and the extemporaneous nature of the broadcast provide many a half-hour of stimulating entertainment. Further interest is incorporated into the program by the inclusion of a contest. Listeners are asked to submit questions of general interest, prizes and privileges being extended to the winners.

Fifty-seventh Street is truly the street of versatility. A more interesting center for a street broadcast could hardly be conceived. Listeners to the programs hear the voices of night-club entertainers, musicians, painters, and prominent members of society.

A Stradivarius, a piece of archaic sculpture, a Rolls-Royce, a Russian sable coat—these are all to be had on Fifty-seventh Street, and those thronging its sidewalks for the purpose of making such purchases may all be members of the station's "talent."

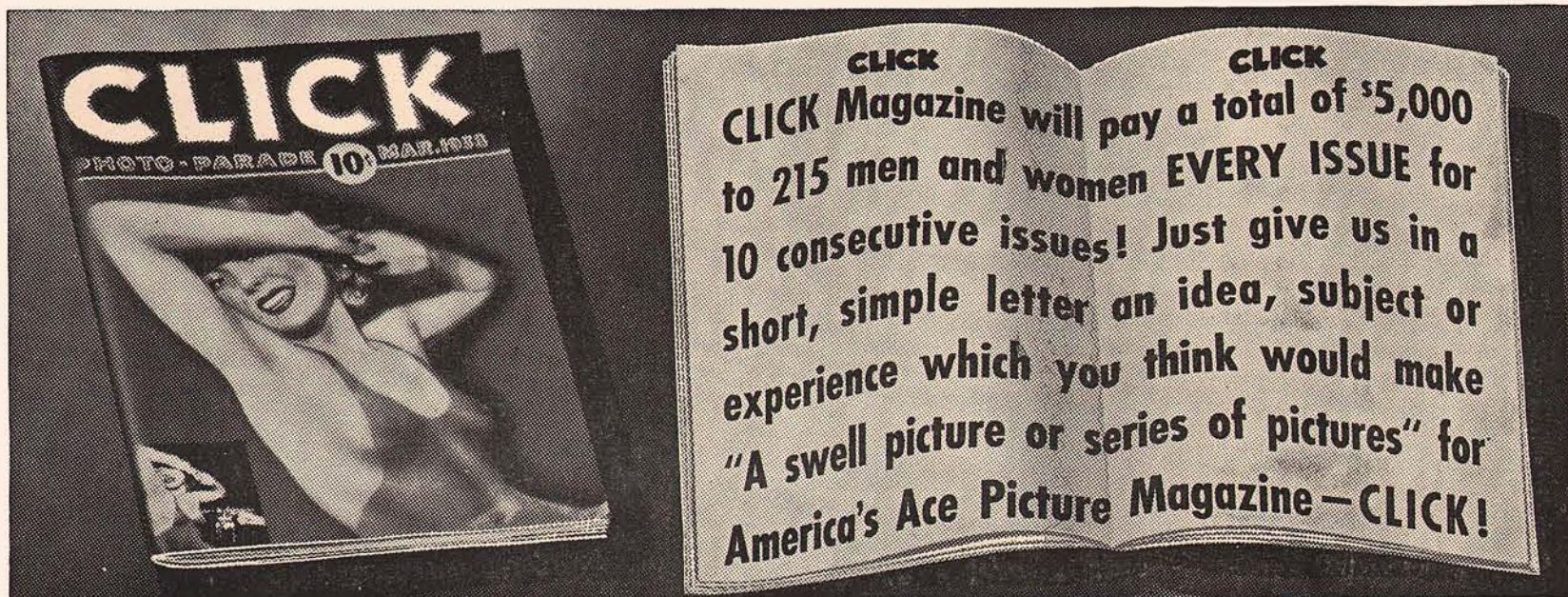

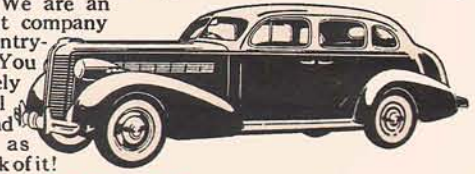
