## Medal of Merit

A Weekly Award for Excellence in Broadcasting

### AWARDED TO RADIO STATION WQXR

**R**ADIO has the greatest power of any medium on earth to sway thought, to communicate ideas, to entertain. Yet like Harriet Beecher Stowe's "Topsy," radio "jes' growed"—for, a few years ago, nobody knew who would listen to the gadget; many wondered whether anybody would, after the novelty wore off; none had a clear idea of what the public would accept and appreciate.

Experimentation has shown some paths not to be followed—as when Miss Mae West inflected a syllable or two too many; purposeful observation has shown which offerings have been well received—and others have been fashioned from the same pattern. Through it all, the scientist's system of trial-and-error has served radio, and well. Through it, broadcasting has developed both variety and quality.

The daring of the bolder broadcasters has brought many a triumph. Today a new one seems ready to thrust itself across our threshold. At New York's Station WQXR, an idea is awaning; soon it may mature into a radio revolution!

WQXR was licensed as a regular commercial radio station in 1936. About five years before, it had been licensed to conduct television experiments. Inventor John V. L. Hogan, who had been responsible for such developments as single-dial control and the improved heterodyne receiving system, used recordings to accompany his attempts to solve the mysteries of visual transmission. The records he played were those he enjoyed

himself—arias from the operas; passages from the great symphonies. There was no ballyhoo on the programs—there was nothing but unadulterated entertainment.

Shortly, letters began to come to the little outpost on science's frontier—but not from television receivers. The letters came from people who said that the station's programs were messages from heaven; that they kept their dials tuned to WQXR's fine music as long as the station was operating. As they became even more expressive in their appreciations, Hogan obtained his commercial license—with a widespread audience already built! Stringent advertising requirements were laid down. The program content remained approximately what it had been before: eighty per cent are still recorded music; other programs include comments on books, the theater and cinema, music, the ballet and other cultural interests.

WQXR is the first "specialized" radio station—perhaps the forerunner of stations which will concentrate on drama; others which will broadcast the news so promptly that newspapers will disappear, and so on.

Because it has scrupulously avoided all the tricks which sometimes leave radio open to criticism, because it has found a new idea and developed it where everyone else has hesitated, and because it offers the possibility of a whole rearrangement of radio, this week Radio Guide's editors award to John V. L. Hogan and his station WQXR the Radio Guide Medal of Merit.

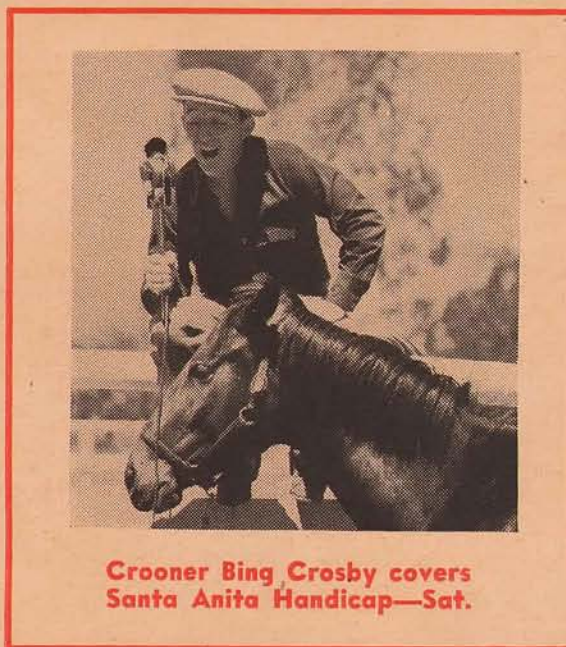
V. F. W. . . . "Hello America"

# STORIES OF THE SONGS YOU LOVE

## "DOWN BY THE OLD MILL STREAM"

**M**ORE than one hundred million persons have sung to the glory of the eyes of blue of Buda Godman, the village queen who became the empress of the charlatans, the little girl who traded her gingham dress for prison garb, who broke a man's heart but who gave the world a tender melody, and tender memories, although she had none for herself.

So this is the saga of a moody, melancholy man who loved not wisely but who put his sentiments to music down by the old mill stream, and of the woman who inspired him, then cast him aside.

He died in his sleep, and the nation paused to honor him.

She reports each week to a parole board, for the prison gates still are ajar, waiting for her should she step back to the primrose path she trod so gaily.

She holds her coat collar over her face as she walks down the street, so none will know that she is Buda Godman, the village queen. Her hair is white. There are many lines around her mouth, and there are crows' feet around her eyes, but her eyes still are blue.

And as she shuffles along, afraid and unknown and lonely, she often hears the multitude singing of her—"with your eyes of blue, dressed in gingham, too."

I wonder what Buda Godman thinks about when she hears "Down by the Old Mill Stream?" Buda Godman, the cheat, the "con" girl who took her fun where she found it.

Somehow, it doesn't seem to matter any more that she was a fraud—the song wasn't. It doesn't seem to matter any more that her life was wasted, for to millions and millions she always will be the little girl in gingham who walked along a stream, holding hands with Tell Taylor and inspiring him to write that gentle tune!

**S**HE is forty-seven now, but she always will be sixteen to all who have sung her praises in bars and barber shops, or even in the moonlight. She has been the foundation of friendships of congenial comrades who have toasted her beauty in beer, and then cried in it.

Next to Sweet Adeline, her eyes of blue have caused more headaches than anything except income taxes. Some day, somebody is going to build a bar in tribute to Sweet Adeline and the Village Queen. That's the only monument they'll ever have, but they deserve one, for they have worked for the house for many years and got nothing out of it except a few press notices and a hang-over.

Lovers owe a debt to Buda Godman too. Who hasn't walked along some stream and sung and hummed the melody about her blue eyes to a sweetheart, a village queen? The chances are odds-on, however, that the village queen never wears gingham and doesn't like to walk along streams, because her high-heeled shoes might get muddy, or the weeping willows and luscious grass might prick her stockings and cause a run.

But Buda Godman bothered not

about her shoes when she strolled along the Blanchard River in Ohio with Tell Taylor, and he sang to her and asked her to be his wife.

That was thirty-one years ago, and Buda wore cotton stockings, and then she changed to silk, and to keep in silk she stole, and then she changed again to cotton stockings. Tell Taylor changed and the Blanchard River changed, and the willows were cut away and the grass died, and factories spewed their filth into the old mill stream.

Only the song did not change. The Blanchard River is a tiny thing, so small it has been snubbed by gazetteers. It is born west of Ottawa, Ohio, and meanders about fifteen miles west of the town. For a hundred miles it roams. It's only a fork of the Auglaize River, an insignificant thing, watering the land and doing its chores.

Thirty-five years ago it was a beautiful little river, gray and clear, and trees trooped along its banks and fish played in its deep pools, and children swam in it and lovers strolled along its banks.

The Misamore water-mill was near a bend in the stream, and every day the river turned the wheel and the wheel ground corn for the farmers—every day except Sunday, and then the day of rest was upon the land.

Tell Taylor lived on a farm near the river. Everybody knew Tell. He was born on October 14, 1876, at Vanlue, in Ohio's Hancock County. He went to town when he was a boy, to Findlay, and sold shoes. Then he taught school in the country, but he was not happy. There was music in his heart so he moved to the Blanchard River and

tried to write music. The inspiration was not there. He sat for hours by the old water-mill and tried to create. Then he met Buda Godman. She was sixteen, and he met her at the water-wheel.

Buda Godman was never a small-town girl. She looked demure and gentle. It was easy to fool a poet like Tell Taylor. But she came from a reckless clan, race-horse bookies, gamblers.

Back in Chicago, where she was born, her father was a race-track figure, and Buda knew all the answers before she was fifteen. She simply didn't fit into the Blanchard River scene. But Tell didn't know—all he saw were her eyes of blue and his village queen in gingham.

Buda Godman in gingham! Madame Pompadour in rags! Cleopatra in muslin! It just doesn't add up!

Taylor told her she loved her, and she murmured consent to a marriage. Maybe she wasn't to blame. After all, sixteen is a silly

age. But they were married, and the villagers shook their heads. In 1907, Taylor took his bride to Chicago, where he tried to eke out a living writing songs. Buda wasn't used to work, not as long as the ponies ran.

Taylor loved her hopelessly, desperately, and in 1910 he went back to the Blanchard River, seeking peace. She went there too, and one day they walked along the stream.

"With your eyes of blue—you were dressed in gingham, too," he laughed as he reminded her of their first meeting. Then he paused—"That's it! That's it. I've got it—my song!"

And "Down by the Old Mill Stream" was the result.

Buda divorced him the same year,

and crossed the river. Taylor never recovered from the blow.

"It was there I knew, that you loved me too"—what mockery. So he, too, crossed the river and went to Chicago to write songs.

His one hit swept the nation. It was a real love-song back in pre-war days. Everybody sang it. Then came prohibition. Sweet Adeline was rolling across the country from Massachusetts, gathering disciples as she rolled from speakeasies to the gutter. Adeline was the belle of the bars, but the Old Mill Stream was a runner-up. It was natural for the boys to get full of raw liquor, and sing Adeline and then wander off to the Old Mill Stream. It was a shame that Adeline and Buda Godman never met—they had a lot in common.

**T**HERE is a certain swing to the Old Mill Stream that simply fits in with beer and cheese and good fellowship. Often, however, in the speakeasy days of the gilt and goofy era, the boys tried to make the old stream roll to the clang of highball glasses. Then the stream flooded over until the population prayed fervently that Adeline would fall in the mill-stream and get it over with.

But nothing could kill Adeline. There was a gal who could take it. And nothing could stop the old stream. It just kept rolling along until more than four million copies of the song were sold and Tell Taylor got prosperous.

He married again, and was divorced again. His friends said he never forgot Buda, but he didn't know where she was. He bought a big farm near Findlay, and raised horses. He had learned about horses from Buda. He had a golf course on his farm.

Prohibition came and went, and the Old Mill Stream kept right on rolling. But the Blanchard River had changed. Factories went there, and the old water-mill was torn down.

The village queens went to work in the factories, in the hamburger joints and hot-dog stands. Smoke from a hundred stacks wrote a new alphabet in the sky, and the Blanchard River turned green, then yellow with the poison and refuse from the mills. The fish died, and the swimming-holes became useless. A sewage plant was built not far from where the old water-mill had stood.

**T**AYLOR protested, and health authorities went to the river to see if it could be returned to its healthful beauty. But when they saw it, they shook their heads. It was beyond redemption, as Buda Godman was beyond redemption.

Taylor was heavy-hearted. The only gay time of his years was his annual visit to his pal, Roger Lewis, a Chicago druggist who tried to write songs. Lewis had written "Oceana Roll," and he and Taylor visited together and talked of happier days.

Taylor was writing another song, "On the Banks of the Old Mill Stream," and he and Lewis planned great things. Tell was well off, for as late as 1935 his Old Mill Stream was played 5,532 times on the two major

networks. But he wasn't happy. He kept wondering where Buda Godman was—his village queen.

He would talk much of her, and then he would doze in his chair. Last October 23, he rocked in his chair and talked to Lewis about their plans to write a new hit, and about Buda. He had been visiting his crony for several days. Then he dozed off to sleep. Lewis tiptoed away, fearful of waking his friend. And when he tried to awaken him, Tell Taylor was dead. His heart had stopped while he slept.

They took him back to the Old Mill Stream and buried him, where the soot from the factories could fall on his grave.

**B**UDA GODMAN read of his death in the newspapers, and there were tears in her eyes of blue. The picture of her life must have spread before her eyes, an ugly picture, as ugly as the factories and grime and soot that had changed the Old Mill Stream from blue to green to yellow.

After she divorced Tell Taylor, she returned to Chicago to the race-tracks, and there she met Dapper Dan Collins. Chicago was bustling in those days, jammed with big men and big money. Buda was such a sweet-looking girl, big blue eyes and a soft voice.

She was the kind of girl men would confide in, pour out their woes to, so she became the queen of the badger game, that venerable racket in which a girl lured a man to her apartment, then screamed. And a fake husband would run in, and the victim would pay off. The victims seldom appealed to the police. They were ashamed.

She became soiled, as the river was soiled by soot. The refuse of the world passed by her, as the refuse passed down the old mill stream.

In 1916, she was indicted for "shaking down" Edward R. West, a Chicago coffee importer. Several of her male pals went to prison, but Buda disappeared. Obviously, powerful influences were on her side. She knew a lot about many men, and they didn't want her to talk.

For fifteen years she was "lost" to the world.

**H**ELEN SMITH had eyes of blue and a soft voice when she came to New York. She knew the ropes, and her trim figure was prominent in the night clubs and speakeasies. She always smiled when the boys put their heads together over a schooner of suds, or a hooker of "red eye" and sang "Down by the Old Mill Stream."

She was seen often with a prominent millionaire. She lived in a swanky apartment that cost \$175 a week—the village queen in silks and satins.

She traveled everywhere. She stopped walking down the primrose path and began running.

The dream ended in 1932.

Jewels valued at \$305,000 had been stolen from Harvey C. Glemby. The giddy era was dead, and America had sobered up. The underworld was no longer glamorous, but police showed it for what it is—a sordid world of cowards.

Helen Smith was indicted for a part in the robbery. Her millionaire stepped forward and said he would assure her future if she were given her freedom. The police shook their heads. The courts said no. More powerful influences were brought to bear in Helen's behalf, but the courts held fast.

Helen confessed. She said a pal, Sam Entratta, had given her the jewels to sell. She tried to sell them to her "benefactor"—to the man who had been kind to her.

And she asked of him \$10,000 more



than the thieves had told her to ask! The village queen wanted more than her share!

When Entratta was convicted and released on bail pending an appeal, he killed himself in her apartment.

**H**ELEN SMITH told almost everything. But she fibbed about her age, and never told that she was Buda Godman—the girl in gingham with the eyes of blue.

The court was not lenient, and ordered her to Auburn prison in New York for from four to eight years. She took off her silks and satins and went back to gingham.

In Auburn she was a good prisoner. Her comrades called her Helen. And

they told her how pretty her eyes were. And during recreation hours when the radio played "Down by the Old Mill Stream" Helen would smile wistfully and look beyond the prison at the river that flows by there.

The parole board freed her in 1935, but she must report once a week. It was a few days after Tell Taylor's death that she walked to her parole officer. No one noticed her. No one cared. She was just a white-haired woman, with blue eyes and lips that quivered.

And when she was released again after a good report, an officer told a newspaper man:

"Know who she is?" "Nope," said the newsman, "but

she's got pretty eyes."

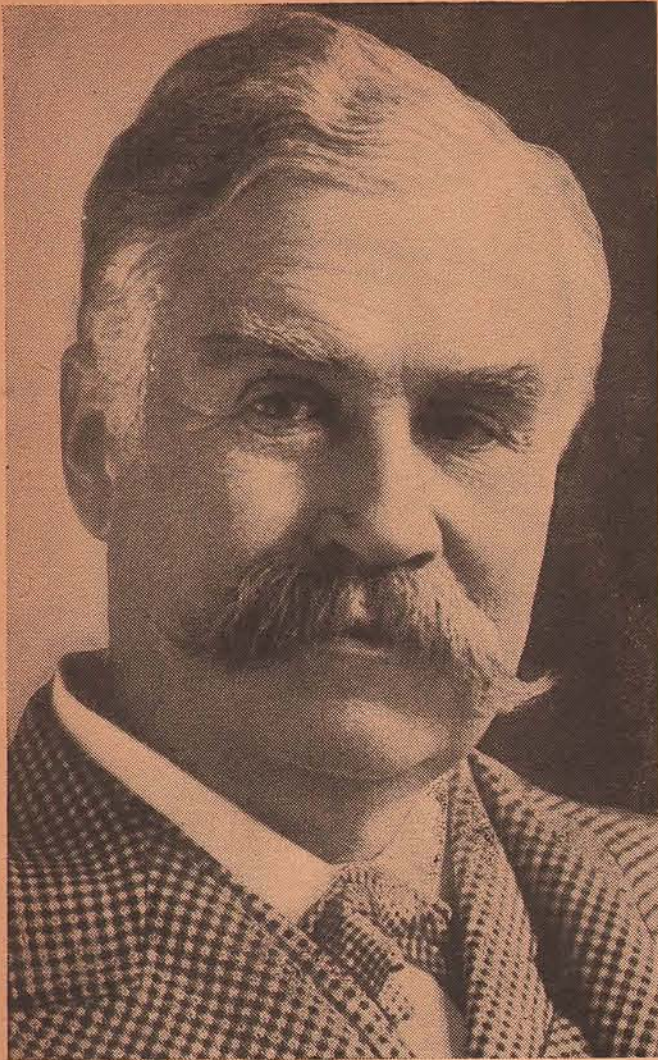
"That's Buda Godman."

The parole board refused to tell more, or even where she is. "Regulations of the board," said a parole officer, "do not permit us to reveal her whereabouts. Under our policy of protecting the past lives of paroled prisoners, we cannot consistently approve of any personal publicity in connection with Miss Godman."

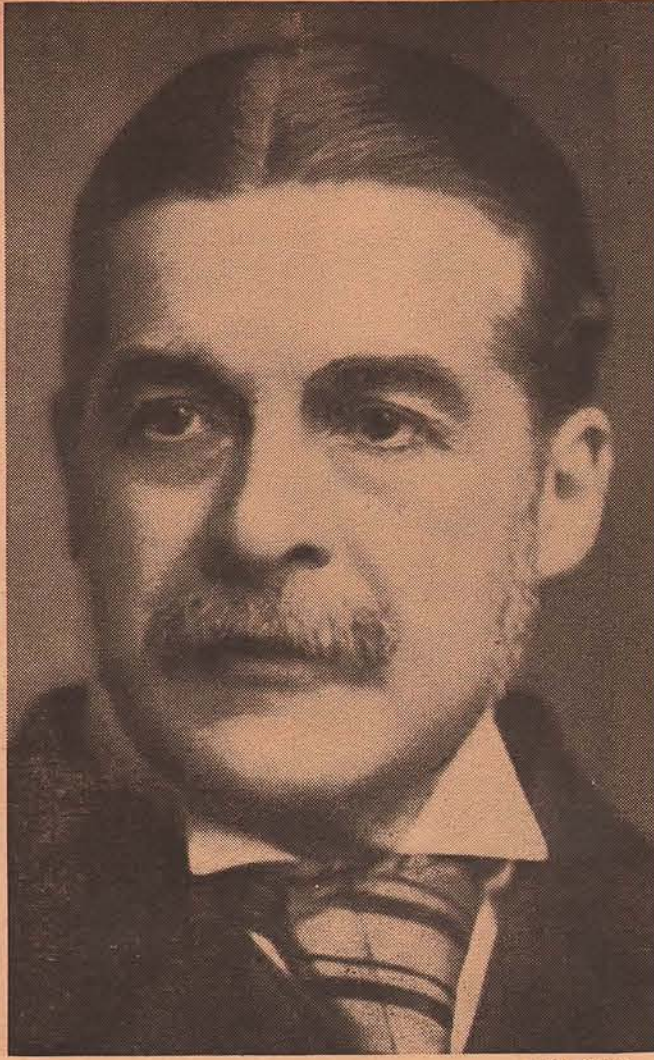
But she's somewhere in New York, for she must not go away. If she should try to run away, she could be found easily.

Anyone would know Buda Godman anywhere—well, because her eyes are so blue.

# WORDS and MUSIC

MASTERS OF LIGHT OPERA, GILBERT AND SULLIVAN WROTE  
"THE GONDOLIERS" IN 1889. FRIDAY MBS WILL AIR IT

IT IS remarkable that Fate should have brought together two men whose talents were as well matched as were those of Gilbert and Sullivan. But it is even more remarkable that men whose personalities were so different should have been able to survive clashes and quarrels and work together for a quarter of a century.

Gilbert was irritable and short-tempered. During his career as a dramatist, he fought frequently with the actors, producers and critics of his plays. He is said to have walked into a drawing-room once and exclaimed in mock amazement: "Hm! A dozen men here, and I'm on good terms with all of them!"

Sullivan was good-natured and amiable. He had little difficulty in finding and keeping friends, and he was beloved for his social graces almost as much as for his music. He was the most popular composer in Victorian

England, honored and admired both by royalty and commoners.

Gilbert was the dominant figure in the duo. Sullivan followed his lead. It was he who set Gilbert's words to music. But there were times when it was plain that Gilbert's arrogance annoyed Sullivan.

Neither Gilbert nor Sullivan was satisfied with his lot. Gilbert, probably until his dying day, entertained a haunting ambition to be remembered as a serious dramatist, but although he wrote some seventy plays in his time, they have been long forgotten. Sullivan, likewise, felt that he was wasting his talent on light music, and often tried to break away.

Gilbert is remembered mainly for his comic operas and for "Bab Ballads," the verses he wrote and illustrated as a contributor to the magazine "Fun." Sullivan, however, wrote serious music which outlasted his lifetime.

SULLIVAN'S "In Memoriam," motivated by his father's death, and "The Lost Chord," written shortly after the death of his beloved older brother, Frederic, are still played. His incidental music for Shakespeare's "The Tempest" is enduring, and his hymn-

tune, "Onward Christian Soldiers," is familiar everywhere.

William Schwenck Gilbert, who wrote the words of the Gilbert and Sullivan operas, was born in London on Nov. 18, 1836, the son of a retired naval surgeon who put in his spare time writing voluminous novels and pamphlets.

Arthur Seymour Sullivan, born May 13, 1842, was the son of a poverty-stricken Irish musician, Thomas Sullivan, who taught and copied music for a living. Arthur's mother was Maria Clementine Coghlan Sullivan, a penniless girl of Italian descent.

SULLIVAN said later that after he had reached the age of five he cared for nothing but music. Even as a small boy he could play every instrument in his father's band.

The man who brought Gilbert and Sullivan together was Fred Clay, a facile composer of popular music, who had followed Sullivan as a student at Leipzig, and who had written the music for several of Gilbert's early operettas.

The first Gilbert and Sullivan collaboration was "Thespis," an extravaganza, produced on Dec. 23, 1871, and not notably successful. It closed after a month's run, and the pair separated

—Gilbert to go back to the drama and Sullivan to the composition of sacred music.

Richard D'Oyly Carte appeared on the scene in 1875. Carte was convinced that there was money to be made out of a marriage of talent between Gilbert and Sullivan, and he was a shrewd producer. For many years he had run a theatrical booking agency in London, the best of its kind.

Gilbert had already suggested another operetta to Sullivan, and under D'Oyly Carte's prodding they turned out "Trial by Jury," the music for which Sullivan composed in a period of two weeks. It was produced at the Royalty Theater on March 25, 1876.

"Trial by Jury" was an instant success, and Carte quickly formed the Comedy Opera Company, financed by himself and four others, two of whom were music publishers, and moved into the Opera Comique Theater.

THEN came "The Sorcerer" in 1877, and in 1878 "H. M. S. Pinafore," which ran 700 nights in London, and was so popular in America that toward the end of the year it was being produced, in pirated versions, in eight theaters in New York.

Gilbert, Sullivan and Carte hurried to the United States in 1879 with a Pinafore Company of their own, and in 1879 brought out "The Pirates of Penzance" in New York.

"Patience" came out in 1881 at the Opera Comique, and was later shifted to the Savoy, where all the rest of the operas were produced. "Iolanthe" appeared there in 1882; "Princess Ida," in 1884; "The Mikado," in 1885; "Ruddigore," in 1887; "The Yeomen of the Guard," in 1888; "The Gondoliers," in 1889; "Utopia, Limited," in 1893; and "The Grand Duke," in 1896.

Even after the success of "Trial by Jury," Gilbert and Sullivan were lukewarm toward further collaboration.

In America, where the partners had found such popularity, Sullivan had suffered from Gilbert's quips and gibes at social functions. Some authorities say Gilbert was jealous of Sullivan's music. He himself knew nothing about music, and was frank to admit it, but he was irritated that Sullivan should be able to create such melodies.

IN 1883, Sullivan was knighted, but Gilbert, whose biting satire had wounded official feelings in high places, was overlooked. This, too, may have had something to do with the Gilbert and Sullivan difficulties. Gilbert wasn't honored with knighthood until 1907—seven years after the death of his collaborator.

Frequent wrangles between the partners reached a climax in 1890, when Gilbert quarreled with D'Oyly Carte because Carte, he said, had exceeded his authority in purchasing some 500 pounds worth of carpeting for the Savoy Theater. Carte forthwith dragged Sullivan into the fray by writing to Gilbert that he (Carte) and Sullivan were tired of Gilbert's interference in matters that did not concern him, and that if it were kept up they would get a new librettist.

There was a terrific uproar in Carte's office when Gilbert called to tell Carte and Sullivan what he thought of them and stomped out furiously to begin a law suit, filed while "The Gondoliers" was at the height of its popularity. Gilbert tried to throw the Savoy into receivership, but did not succeed, although he did win an accounting and

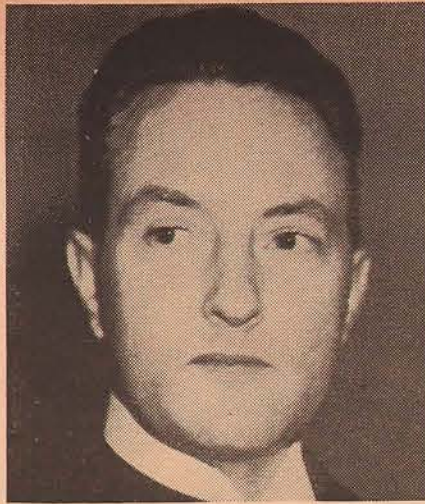

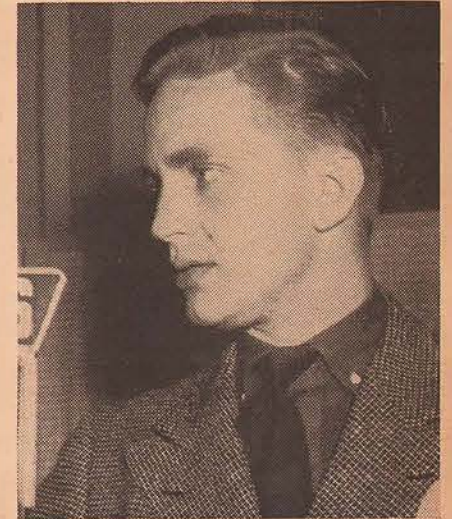

THE greatest living German composer, Richard Strauss, is enjoying a season of wide vogue on our shores. Aside from frequent symphonic production, three of his operas find haven at the Metropolitan at present.

"Don Juan" and "Till Eulenspiegel" are extreme contrasts, the one passionately romantic, the other sparklingly humorous. The former was Strauss' first published tone-poem. His Don is one who restlessly seeks in one woman all the enticements of femininity. His amorous quest fails after trials glowingly voiced in the orchestra, and a final trumpet passage proclaims his summons to death.

"Buerger als Edelmann" (Commoner as Nobleman) is a little separate com-

# The March of Music

NEXT December Kirsten Flagstad will observe the twenty-fifth anniversary in her singing career. The quarter-century moved rather uneventfully for the Norwegian vocalist after her debut in her native city of Oslo, until a few years ago when a Metropolitan Opera talent-scout "discovered" the world's leading Wagnerian soprano and captured her for that institution. What followed is musical history and needs no new telling. Whether or not the Metropolitan will observe the Flagstad anniversary with any special honors is undecided at this moment, but the *New York Times* guesses humorously that "she probably will celebrate quite unostentatiously with performances of 'Tristan,' 'Walkuere,' and 'Siegfried' in one week—or something equally simple!"

No matter how much fun the scoffers poke at the ample figures of the singers who appear as Isolde and Bruennhilde, the fact remains that those roles call visually for heroic build and vocally for tremendous physical endurance. Listen to "Tristan and Isolde" or "Goetterdaemmerung" and marvel how the heroine is able to supply such volume of tone for hours, in companionship with a large orchestra mostly emphasizing sonority and stress. Such artists, known as dramatic sopranos, are exactly the opposite type of their lyric sisters, the Manons and the Mimis; and even further removed from the coloratura speedsters who negotiate agile trills and runs as the Lucias, Gildas and Violettas.

Some sopranos have set a deadline against Wagner throughout their careers and could not be induced to include even his lighter roles in their regular repertoire. Marcella Sembrich made an exception in the case of Eva (youthful heroine of "Meistersinger") and often assumed the part, prettily, to be sure, but not in the traditional style of German romanticism. Nellie Melba once told me that "Wagner ruins the voice," and explained that she suffered throat-strain and thought her best tones gone forever after making a single essay in Wagner, when she tried Bruennhilde in "Siegfried." It was at the Metropolitan in 1896, and the glorious Australian soprano failed dismally. The canary attempting to be an eagle!

However, at least two coloraturas triumphantly bridged the gap between florid flights and the weighty utterances of Wagner. They were the great German, Lilli Lehmann, and our own Lilian Nordica. Both started as purely decorative warblers and ended as famous Isoldes and Bruennhildes.

Apropos Mme. Melba's belief that Wagner is a voice-destroyer is easily refuted by the fact that many of his singing interpreters have continued in opera successfully after passing their fiftieth year.

One of the most inspiring Tristans I ever heard was Heinrich Knote, when he did the role with the Wagnerian Opera Company at the Manhattan Opera House (New York) in 1923—the year that brought his fifty-third birthday.

edy inserted by Strauss in his opera "Ariadne auf Naxos." He jibes orchestrally at the bourgeois host and even parodies the dinner he serves at a sumptuous banquet.

The "Salome" excerpt deals with the gruesome moments when the sadistic princess caresses the dead Jokanaan's haed, but Strauss finds radiant music with which to soften the appalling incident.

His ultimate fame, as some competent judges prophesy, will rest upon his songs, two of which Mme. Pauly has programmed. They are not as generally known as Strauss' "Caecilie," "Tomorrow," "Dedication," and "Serenade," but nevertheless they have the same merits of tuneful themes and meaningful treatment, with especially opulent accompaniments.

AN ENGLISHMAN is our distinguished conductor at this concert. He has gained particular fame as leader of the Toronto Orchestra. He exhibits no chauvinism, for only one short English composition by Landon Ronald come to hearing this evening.

Rimsky-Korsakoff's example is an introduction to his early opera, "A May Night," and offers exotic airs garbed with instrumental brilliancy.

The glories of the Flagstad voice and interpretative powers are not called upon for the stress of her usual Wagnerian performances. But she is no less appealing in the gentler offerings.

There is nothing more moving in concert coalism than Mme. Flagstad's interpretations of her compatriot, Edward Grieg, whose strongly national flavoring must of necessity come close to her heart. Her singing of the ever popular "I Love You" gives that composition a character not heard as a rule from other artists. They usually make it a passionate declaration; Mme. Flagstad transforms it into a tremulous, tender avowal. The number she presents for Ford listeners, "Thanks for Thy Counsel," is not nearly so well known as "I Love You," but possesses all of Grieg's flowing lyric quality and deep expressiveness.

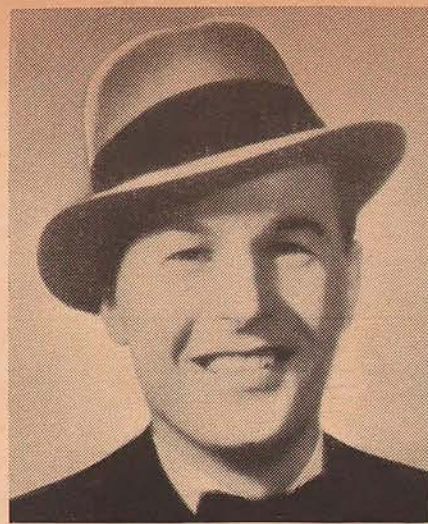

CHARLES GRIFFES' untimely passing robbed America of one of its leading white hopes in symphonic music. As a susceptible youthful student in Paris, he naturally acquired modern Gallic touches, but it is reasonable to assume that had he been spared to develop in America, he might have found a style and idiom expressive of our people and life.

His symphonic poem, concerning the sybaritic Khan, is worthy of a Debussy or Ravel and in places matches their facility in orchestration and command of subtle instrumental colorings. The mystery and voluptuousness of the Orient combine tellingly in the suggestive "Khan" score.

It follows a composition worlds removed from such suffused and luxurious writing, and to hear it after Haydn is to realize how much further music goes today in descriptiveness than the direct melodizing and arbitrary counterpoint of the classical period.

Massenet is represented by an ingratiating vocal episode sung by Herod and envisioning the seductive beauty of Salome whom he madly desires.

The foregoing paragraphs are in consonance with the welcome announcement made by NBC that Toscanini, following the last of his ten scheduled radio concerts on February 26, has been prevailed upon to add another broadcast on March 5, and with a program entirely devoted to compositions by Wagner. It is familiar knowledge that those works could not well be revealed with more understanding and eloquence than when they come to life under the leadership of the insuperable Italian. Toscanini's sailing for Europe on March 9 ends his wonderful Saturday evening communications for American music-lovers, but they should feel expectant over the rumor (unconfirmed at this writing) that he will return next season for twenty broadcasts.

One of the current thrills at the Metropolitan is Richard Strauss' "Salome" with Marjorie Lawrence in the role of the seductive and sinister Judean princess. However, this Sunday will witness Rose Pauly's assumption of the part, but not at the Metropolitan or even in costume, for her appearance takes place at the New York Philharmonic concert. Nevertheless, the event should be stirring, for Mme. Pauly has a way of being so realistic in her vocalism that she almost makes a television set of your radio. Sunday she is to do the closing scene of "Salome." It promises tremendous outpouring of tone and emotion when she apostrophizes the severed head of the Prophet.

Perhaps the most effective explanation of the difference between music of the lower and higher grades is that of Ruskin, art critic who wrote: "The best music, like the best painting, is entirely popular; it at once commends itself to everyone and does so through all ages. The worst music, like the worst painting, commends itself in like manner, to ninety-nine people out of a hundred, but after doing them its appointed mischief, is forgotten and new modes of mischief composed."

In her new book, "From Jehovah to Jazz," Helen L. Kaufmann points out that our real musical start in this country was based "on the fear of God." She might have added that now it rests partly "on the love of George Gershwin."

VERDI'S "Rigoletto," second in worth and popularity to his "Aida," has of later years been the vehicle for epochal solo debuts in America. The forever-luminous Caruso sang his first tones for us as the Duke, at the Metropolitan Opera in 1903.

"Rigoletto," based on Victor Hugo's drama "The King Amuses Himself," has a tremendously active and compelling libretto.

#### ACT I

The Ducal Palace in Mantua, Italy, during the sixteenth century. The Duke, an incorrigible rake, ruling a debauched court, tells a confidant about his pursuit of a young girl.

A song, "Questa o Quella" (This One or That One), voices the Duke's admiration of Count Ceprano's wife, with whom he dances so fervently that her husband's jealousy is aroused.

Rigoletto, malevolent hunch-backed jester, arranger for many of the Duke's amours, taunts Ceprano. Rigoletto has been discovered indulging in a regular nightly rendezvous with an unknown charmer.

#### ACT II

The end of a deserted street. Rigoletto's dwelling. Gilda, the jester's daughter, greets her father. Of course, she is the "mysterious" one of the Duke, and the "charmer" of Rigoletto. The Duke, lurking outside in the courtyard, learns of the relationship. Rigoletto leaves, and the maid and her ducal admirer (whom she knows only as "Walter") sing their love duet.

Alone she delivers her aria, "Caro Nome" (Dearest Name). Masked courtiers, led by Ceprano, appear for revenge, and tell the returning suspicious Rigoletto that they wish to abduct Ceprano's wife (who lives across the street) for the Duke. The jester joins the plot, is masked and blindfolded, and unknowingly holds the ladder against his own wall.

#### ACT III

Salon in the Duke's palace. Gilda has been brought to the next room, where the Duke joins her. Rigoletto seeks his daughter, trying to hide his grief under assumed jauntiness. Gilda enters and the pair utter their devotion and distress, Rigoletto ending with his resolve for revenge upon the Duke.

#### ACT IV

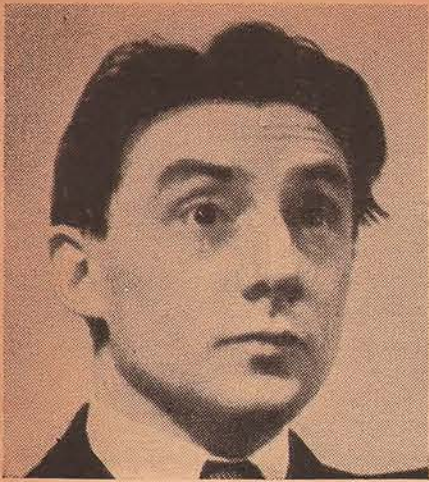
The inn kept by Sparafucile and his sister Maddalena. Rigoletto and Gilda are outside, the latter disguised as a young cavalier, to aid her intended flight from Mantua, which her father decrees after he is convinced she still loves the Duke. That noble intriguer, in soldier attire, comes for a drink and sings his great cynical air "La Donna e Mobile" (Woman is Fickle). Maddalena flirts with the willing Duke, Gilda overhearing his ardent declarations.

Sending off Gilda, Rigoletto hires Sparafucile to murder the Duke and deliver his body in a sack. Maddalena, now another victim to the Duke's wiles, makes her brother promise to slay any other guest who might come, and deliver his body instead of the Duke's.

There is a storm. Gilda, drawn irresistibly, returns, knocks, and is stabbed. Rigoletto receives his gruesome booty, but as he drags the sack away he hears the Duke singing "La Donna." The horrified father opens the bundle, finds his daughter's body.

## "Great Plays" Moves To Cathedral Studio

Saturdays, NBC-Red, 5-6 p.m.

"Everyman," the second presentation in the National Broadcasting Company's current series designed to trace the development of drama through the ages will be broadcast from the magnificent nave of New York's famous Cathedral of St. John the Divine at 5 p.m. Saturday afternoon.

Cast and equipment forsake the work-a-day confines of the Radio City studios in the interest of absolute authenticity in setting and color for this program—as Church and Stage renew a cooperation that has been clouded with misunderstanding for four hundred years.

Sending a radio troupe "on location" is a fairly unique, certainly commendable stunt. And while it will provide the actors with less rather than greater opportunity to perfect illusions of action, the locale may well inspire and reflect greater sincerity and feeling in the portrayal. Listeners will be carried back into the very atmosphere of the original "Everyman" presentations in the cathedrals of England about 1529.

Listeners who heard the first of the great plays, Aristophanes' "The Birds," are familiar with the unusually effective and informative treatment that Director Blevins Davis has created for the presentation of his revivals. A commentator assumes the role of a candid spectator of the period in which the play was first presented—unfolds after the manner of a special-events broadcast a complete word picture of the original theater, stage-settings, the entrance and reactions of the contemporary audience, reports important facts concerning the author and the play and inserts sidelights of interest with regard to other dramatists of the theater of the day.

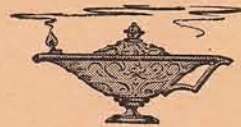
The current presentation "Everyman" is the best known of the old morality plays—so called because they were designed to illustrate for the simple medieval folk the workings of Vice and Poverty on lives unredeemed by love of and adherence to the Church-taught principles of conduct. As a group the morality plays grew out of a still earlier form of ecclesiastical drama, the *mysteries*, based on Holy Writ, and originated as little more than animated tableaux to illustrate sermons and lesson-stories from the Bible.

NBC's series of "Great Plays" is most heartily recommended. "Everyman" should prove to be a novel, imaginative and especially worth-while listening experience.

## Comment from the Past... For Today



ONE sultry day, about 2733 B. C., the God-Emperor Cheops was bored. The royal family was at the summer palace down the Nile. It was too hot to try a spin in his new chariot. So he just sat in the garden, sipped spiced wine and brooded on affairs of state.

"Egypt's in a fair way these days," thought Cheops. "Good harvest... only the usual amount of wrangling among the priests. That's healthy, I suppose... I'm fed up with conquest. Yep, everything is fine... except perhaps those stupid rumors questioning my divinity, and those rumblings in the army about another raid over Palestine way... H'mmm..."

"By Ra! I've got it! I'll build a great pyramid... something to prove I'm a god—a job to keep the field marshals from fretting."

So it was decreed. The astronomers, mathematicians and engineers went to work on the plans. The priests huddled with the oracles to decide on the proper day for breaking ground. And the army was tickled pink with its job of rounding up a host of slaves and all the land tenants who were behind in their taxes—for the construction gang. Horse and foot—officers and men, they could strut and order and curl the lash to their heart's content.

"Let the core be of granite and the outer part of marble," said Cheops.

So the granite was brought from quarries down the Nile. And the marble from... historians would like to know—and where it later went, stripped from the Pyramids when Cheops was a mummy.

The desert was filled with a great bustle of building, but progress was slow—for engineering was mostly a matter of muscle. *And for every block that was put in place a man wore out his life.*

*In Xanadu did Kubla Khan

With walls and towers were girded round*

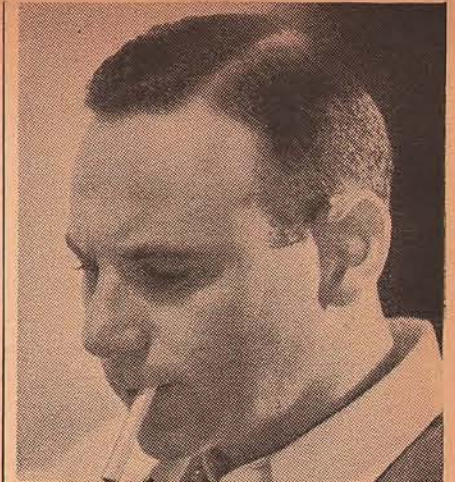
... and for every foot of wall and tower—a man wore out his life.

Chasins takes his cue for a discussion of Ravel, the man, and his place in the musical scheme of things, past, present and future, from his presentation of two of the composer's most famous works. Each was composed for the piano. The first "Pavane"—the second "Sonatine," selections rated by musical critics as Ravel's "most popular" and "greatest piano work," respectively.

## Design for Listening

Theme of the Week:  
The Story of Electricity

Few natural phenomena have intrigued inquisitive minds for a longer period of time than electricity. Its successful harnessing is one of the most fascinating stories in the great saga of modern science.

The ancients knew electricity as the eerie ability of a particularly obnoxious eel to jar or "shock" the arm of anyone who touched it. Later they recognized the same force as the strange cause of repulsions, attractions and sparkings which occurred when amber, glass and similar substances were rubbed with certain kinds of cloth. And indeed this queer property of amber was responsible for the name we give this amazing form of energy—amber to the Greeks, was *elektron*.

Seeking an explanation of these actions and reactions, the early scientific investigators arrived at a theory of electricity as a fluid which passed between "charged" bodies under the compulsion of the still unknown force. And only as recently as the era of the American Revolution were the positive and negative factors of electricity proved and defined—the result of Benjamin Franklin's leisure-time experiments.

Today we take this mysterious phenomenon in our casual stride. No longer are we awed by the gigantic dynamos that flank our waterfalls or nestle next to huge furnaces down on "the other side of town."

We are awed no longer—until the scientists themselves stand forth and say, "Yes, we can make and ship and resolve electricity into many forms of energy—use it to drive ships across the seas—but what is it? We do not know, exactly, even yet."

# HOLLYWOOD SHOWDOWN

BY EVANS PLUMMER

**D**ESPITE the national crisis excited by Mae West's appearance December 12 on the Chase & Sanborn Hour—or perhaps because of it—the listener-rating of that Sunday program jumped remarkably during the past two months. This sudden increase in popularity while Congressmen and certain organized crusading groups were turning the heat on Mae and the program's coffee-selling sponsors piqued the curiosity of your Hollywood correspondent. What does the public want? The way to find out was to ask. Therefore, on Sunday, February 13, at the exact hour of Charlie McCarthy's airing, a crew of telephone girls was employed to ask certain questions of listeners. The results that follow are indeed surprising:

Five questions were asked: (1) Are you listening to Charlie McCarthy's broadcast? Sixty-nine percent were. (2) Did you hear Mae West when she appeared on this program? Seventy-two percent did. (3) Did you approve or disapprove of her appearance? Fifty-four and seven-tenths percent approved. (4) Are you a regularly attending member of a church? Fifty-two percent said they were. Finally, (5) would it make any difference to you if radio provided a few more risque situations? Sixty percent responded that it would be okay with them if radio had additional blue scripts and gags!

Taking only the listeners who *actually heard* the Mae West sketch into consideration, it is interesting to note that the majority (59%) of these approved, and of the latter, most (56%) were church-goers, while of those (41%) disapproving, only one-half attended church. Furthermore, of the group (28%) who *did not hear* the Adam and Eve playlet, yet were opinionated enough to approve or disapprove, 57% disapproved, and of these, 67% were church-goers. It is difficult to imagine how anyone who *didn't hear* the sketch would be in a position to judge it one way or another!

Noteworthy also is the fact that only half (54.5%) of the Mae West "hear-disapprovers" stuck by their guns and were not listening to Charlie and his crew on February 13, but perhaps they may be excused by saying they had other things to do. However, for a comparative "other things to do" factor, only one-fifth (19%) of the Mae West "hear-approvers" were not tuned to Charlie on February 13.

Analyzing the fifth question—whether or not radio today should be a little more tolerant of risque material—of the majority (60%) favoring tolerance, roughly one-third were church-goers; of the minority (40%) opposed, approximately two-thirds attended church regularly. In closing, I venture to conclude that this private, impartial survey conducted by Hollywood Showdown will cause many sponsors, radio producers, ministers and reform groups to stop and think . . . At any rate, your Cinema City snooper declines to comment—either way!

March 28 marks the last appearance of Ray Noble with Burns and Allen. The English batoneer will do a personal-appearance tour in England and on the Continent and is to be replaced starting April 4 by Jan Garber. Meanwhile, Gracie Allen is shopping for three race-horses to start a stable of her already selected colors, brown and white, and George, timorously, is hoping her nags won't run backward.

Rom-Antics: Frances Langford, Hollywood Hotel's "Moonglow Girl," has finally weakened to those love-song lyrics, and through the abetting of his sister, Louise Locher, soloist with Les Parker's band, managed a meeting with Movie Romeo Jon (Charlie Locher)

Hall of "Hurricane" fame. Now the Langford-Hall twosome is a steady one . . . Jerry Cooper continues to squire about lovely Starlet Joan Mitchell; was last seen with her February 13 at the Beverly-Wilshire during the Phil Baker-Charlie Tobias guested CBS "Melody Shop" airing, listening intently to the plump Connie Boswell rendition of the Baker-Tobias tune, "With Love to You, My Darling." 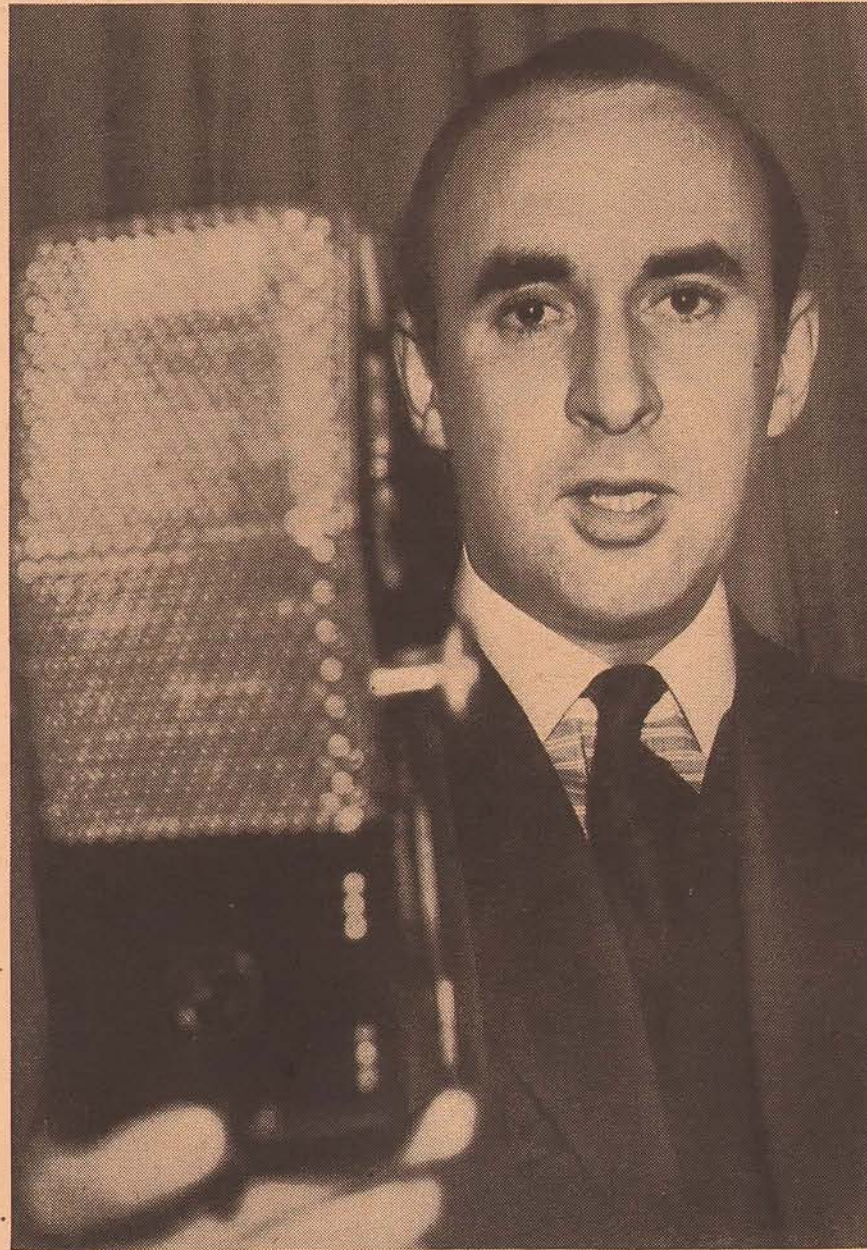

He and the very cute little King sister, Yvonne, threaten the laurels of Astaire and Rogers with a soft-shoe routine that is really hot stuff . . . The three femme Kings and Brother King do a square dance, and—as if that isn't enough—the whole band gets up and does "The Big Apple." By the time they get through, the audience is having as good a time as the band. In fact, a good time is had by all!

Hollywood introduced another movie star to real radio dramatics when Ralph Bellamy appeared on Kate Smith's broadcast recently. The real dramatic artists of radio get little or no recognition, as you may have noticed, and that fact only adds to Bellamy's genuineness as revealed by this incident: Betty Garde, the actress who is heard with Al Pearce and as Mrs. Wiggs of the Cabbage Patch, as well as on many other programs, was Ralph's leading lady. She usually takes that role when Kate Smith's guest is an actor, and she is used to not being mentioned on the air even though her leading man receives plenty of publicity and build-up. Imagine her surprise, the night of the broadcast with Bellamy, when she arrived at the studio and was greeted by a beautiful corsage of orchids, sent by Ralph Bellamy to his leading lady of the evening!

Purely Personal: Fibber McGee assumes a new role. He is now manager of a promising young Chicago welter-weight boxer . . . NBC Announcer Howard Clancy struts down Fifth Avenue on Sundays, swinging a cane . . . The wife of CBS Announcer Charles Stark looks enough like Movie Star Virginia Bruce to be her double . . . 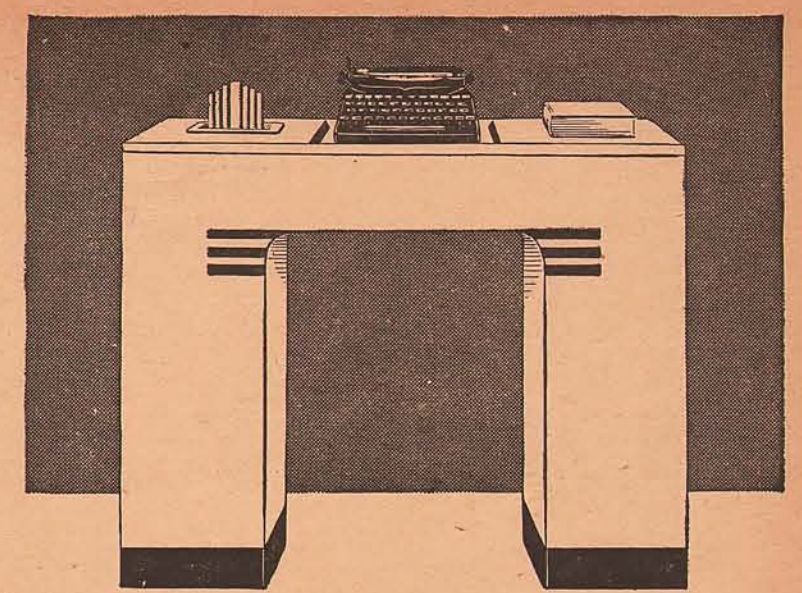

LOCAL color in the Empire will be the keynote of "World Cruise," a new weekly variety feature from Daventry, starting on Friday, March 4, at 3 p.m. EST. The setting of "World Cruise" will be the quarterdeck of that mythical and melodious vessel, H. M. S. St. George. Simonstown, South Africa, will be the first port of call on an imaginary world trip that takes in the Antipodes, South Seas, and West Indies.

A scientist who made a discovery that has saved countless lives but himself died under the guillotine, will be commemorated in "The Breath of Life," to be broadcast from Daventry on Tuesday, March 1, at 7:15 a.m. EST, and on Friday, March 4, at 10:50 p.m. EST. This program, the first in a new series entitled "Great Scientific Discoveries," tells the story of Antoine Laurent Lavoisier, the French scientist who perfected the discovery of oxygen . . . On Saturday, March 5, at 8:10 p.m. EST, listeners to Daventry will have the unusual experience of hearing folk-songs and dance music of the Mendes, played by a quintet of natives from Sierra Leone, in West Africa.

The regular American Hour from Rome, which is heard nightly from 7:35 to about 9:15 p.m. EST, is now being relayed by 2RO3 (9.635), IRF (9.83) and a new station, IQY (11.9), which joined the network on February 6 . . . "Canada, 1938," that country's most elaborate program, broadcast by a network of Canadian stations reaching from Coast to Coast, including Short-Wave Station CFCX (6.005), Montreal, is now being heard on Fridays at 10 p.m. EST.

# RADIO LOBSTER SHIFT

WITH the Eastern Seaboard whipped by one of the worst storms in years, Announcer Gene Morgan speculated dimly on his trip home as he prepared to read the closing announcement for the night. "Nothing ever happens on this lobster shift," he mused as he looked up at the studio clock.

The big-sweep second-hand inexorably marked off the time.

1:44 . . . 1:44.5 . . . In another half-minute, WMCA would be off the air and Announcer Gene Morgan on his way home to bed.

In the master control-room the declamatory ring of a telephone . . . "Hold everything!" . . . frantically gesticulates Engineer De Stacy through the glass partition separating Studio "E" from master control. "Just a minute," *ad-libs* Morgan through the microphone. "The control-room is flashing me a signal not to go off the air. There must be some emergency. Please stand by."

1:46 a.m. "This is WMCA in New York City. We have just received a flash that a transport plane is lost. Newark Airport has requested listeners of WMCA to cooperate with it in trying to locate the whereabouts of the plane. Anyone living within two hundred miles of New York City—please open your windows or go outside and see if you can hear the motor of an airplane. If you can, please call WMCA at Circle 6-2276 immediately or phone Newark Airport."

ON THE other end of the telephone in the control-room was WMCA's special events director, Dick Fishell. Fishell had put through a hurry call to Newark Airport and talked to Fred Fuld in the traffic departments of Eastern Airlines. The details were quickly relayed. The plane, piloted by Captain Fred Jones, had left Newark Airport at 8:32 that evening, bound for Washington. A terrific gale and rainstorm had compelled the plane to turn back a half-hour out of Newark. The 90-mile wind had swept Pilot Jones off his radio beam. At 1:45 a.m.—more than five hours later, the plane apparently was still in the air, being buffeted by the gale . . . and with gasoline tanks running low.

"Maybe your radio listeners can help us in locating the plane," came the plea from Newark. "We'll cooperate," answered Fishell, who immediately called the broadcasting station—holding a telephone wire open to Newark for further communication with the airport.

1:50 a.m. . . . a call from a listener near Philadelphia who thought he had heard a plane in that area . . . 2:20—a call from a "ham" operator in New Britain, Conn. He had heard a plane in that vicinity. A quick call from the master control-room to Fishell to Newark.

A FEW seconds later on a short-wave radio, Fishell was listening in to a radio message from Newark Airport to "Flight 85" (the designation of the Douglas airliner). "You have been located in the vicinity of New Britain. How much fuel do you have in your reserve tank?" . . . Ten minutes later again by short wave, Fishell heard Pilot Jones . . . "Calling Newark Airport. I'm over a big city. Don't know what it is."

"Stay over that town and we'll see if we can identify it for you," came the anxious reply from Newark.

"You bet you," Pilot Jones courageously replied. "It might be Bridgeport, but I don't know."

Frantically, Fishell roared into the telephone to WMCA's master control: "Wake up Bridgeport! The plane's fuel is low—they can't last much longer." Announcer Allen Stuart gasped into the microphone . . . "We're calling all

citizens of Bridgeport. Open your windows! Wake up your neighbors! Ask them to listen for an airplane! If you hear it, call Circle 6-2276. Call Circle 6-2276."

A minute or two later—and a call from Bridgeport. "I can hear something above the storm. I think it's an airplane."

A flash to Newark. And from Newark by short wave to the plane . . . "You've been definitely identified above Bridgeport."

"I see a radio beacon of some sort," answered Jones. "What beacon is that?"

"Hold on, we'll check." Dead silence for 45 seconds. "Hurry it—hurry it!"

Newark . . . "Just a second. (excited voice) It IS Bridgeport. You're about 15 to 20 miles from East Hartford. We

"Just a minute. That's East Hartford. Go ahead down and report when you've landed."

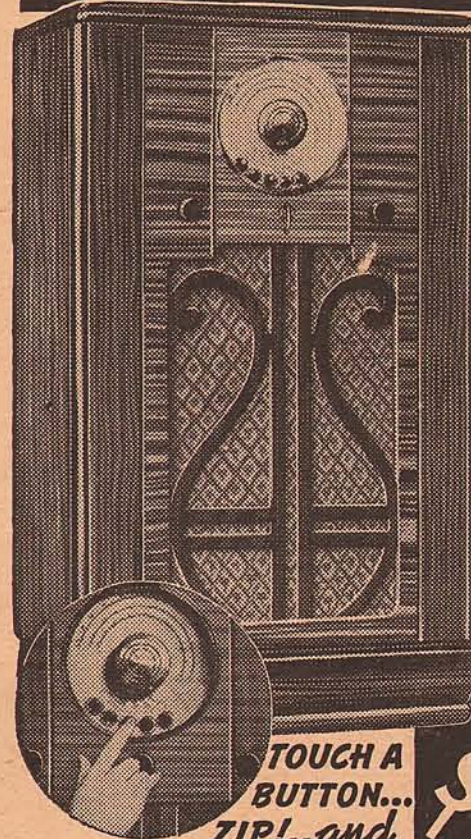

# Backstage at the Metropolitan Opera

HARD WORK, ARDUOUS PREPARATION PRECEDE ITS GREAT PERFORMANCES!



This is no masquerade—it's a serious rehearsal of a group of Metropolitan songbirds. The opera they are preparing is "Die Walkure," the great Wagnerian work. Because they must learn to handle their spears and shields with complete ease and skill, they carry them now, but it's not a dress rehearsal

Most people, when they think of opera performers, think of the great stars, the Melchioris, the Flagstads. **O**PERA, as a distinctly individual means of musical and dramatic expression, sprang, like the modern-day literary drama, from the works of the great dramatists who flourished in the Golden Age of Greece. In those immortal plays, the actors were supported by a chorus, the function of which was to sketch in background material, and, often, to furnish music. Opera had its real beginnings in Florence, about the end of the sixteenth century, and the first public production was "Eurydice," by Jacopo Peri, in 1600. Italy, the home of opera, still leads the world, and no opera singer feels that he has reached the pinnacles until he has sung before an Italian audience. Next to Italy, France and Germany have produced the most great operas. America has contributed but very few.

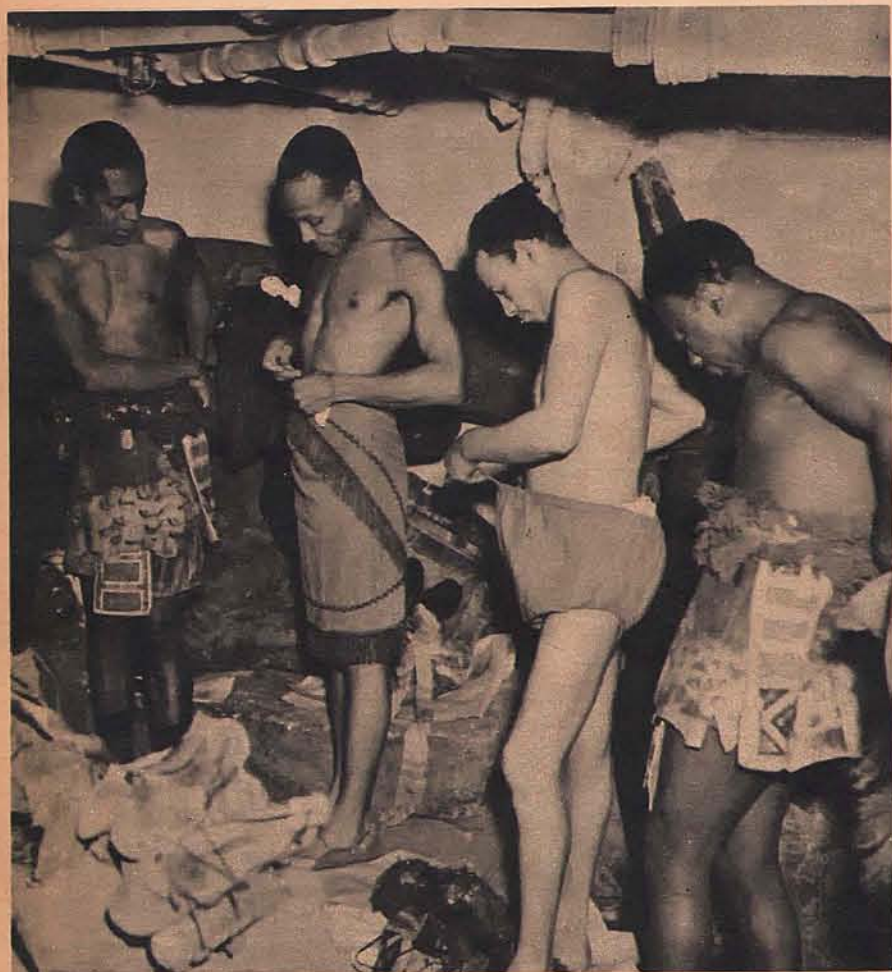

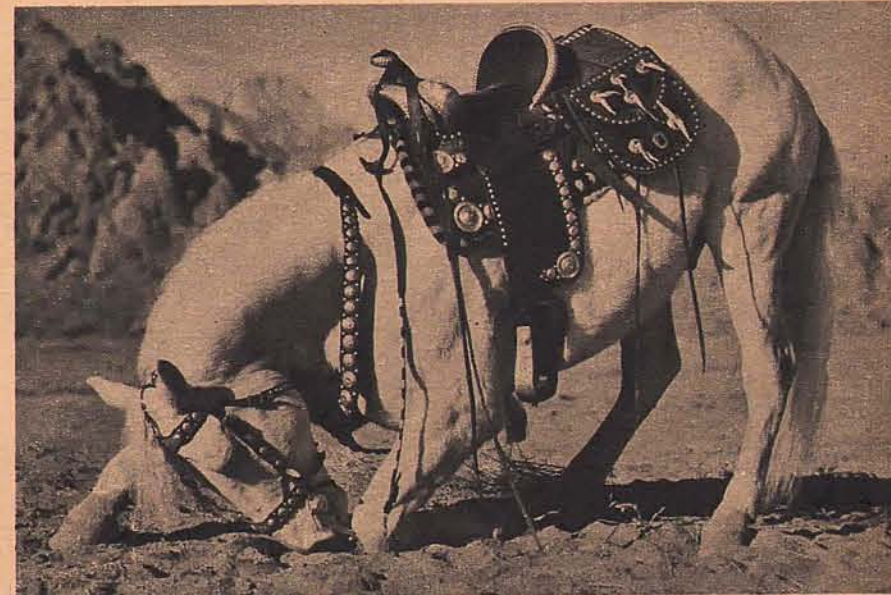

financial settlement from Carte. In 1893, after going their separate ways for a little more than two years, the three—Sullivan, Gilbert and Carte—were back together again. They

produced "Utopia, Limited" on Oct. 7 of that year. By comparison with the earlier works, it was unsuccessful, and had only an eight-month run. "The Grand Duke," their last cooperative effort, opened on March 7, 1896, at the Savoy, but survived only 123 performances. The golden era was gone. Sullivan, in poor health for many years, died of heart trouble in 1900. Carte died a few months later, in 1901. Gilbert lived on until 1911, became a country magistrate, and was drowned while trying to save a young girl from drowning.
