"American Viewpoints"—CBS, 10:45 p.m. EDT.



Kate Mayhew, eighty-four, is oldest, newest mother in radio



PROFESSIONAL MOTHERS

KATE MAYHEW, cute as a button and not much larger, brushed her wispish brown hair from her forehead and reminisced coquettishly on her motherhood, it being the proper thing to do at this season when mama gets the blarney and papa gets the bill.

"I remember quite well when I was the mother of Hamlet for the first time," said little Miss Kate, and laughed. "I was very upset at the prospect of motherhood. You see, I never had been a mother before and I knew my bread and meat depended on how good a mother I was. I went into rigid training for the ordeal, watched my diet, exercised every day and rehearsed for hours.

"Then came the night. The bands played. The curtain was rung up. The audience applauded. The lights flickered. And lo! I was a mother for the first time—the mother of Hamlet! Hamlet was a hard-headed young 'un. I wanted to thrash him several times. I thought he was a little bit pixilated. He went around talking to himself, and he saw ghosts! And he objected to my marrying his uncle! Imagine a son trying to dictate his mother's romance! What are children coming to?

"**T**HE next night I was a mother again, and soon I got used to it. I have been a mother thousands of times since. It's a good living. I was a child mother at first. In fact, I was in my twenties when Hamlet first was my son, my baby. That was sixty-three years ago! U. S. Grant was president! Some die-hards were still grumbling because we had bought Alaska for a few dollars, and our flag had only 38 stars. A lot has happened during my tenure of motherhood."

Little Miss Kate sighed and looked around her tidy apartment in midtown Manhattan, and then out the window at the seething city, at the millions buying flowers as tributes to their mothers.

"Mother's Day," said Miss Kate. "It's a beautiful sentiment. Will I wear a

flower? Of course. A white one. My mother would be more than a hundred years old. I have only one close relative, a niece. She's ill in San Francisco. And here I am in New York. I'll wire her.

"I have no children, no real ones. But many persons will wear a flower for me, for I have mothered many. Lillian Gish will remember me. So will Marc Connelly. I'm the old lady who lives in the shoe."

SHE seemed just a tiny bit sad as she talked, but quickly she discarded the mood and laughed again.

"I remember when I was Juliet's mother. She was a problem child if I ever had one. If she had come to me and told me about Romeo, I could have prevented that tragedy. I could have talked her father into agreeing to the match. Her father listened to me. Juliet was headstrong, impulsive. She broke my heart. It was tough being

Juliet's ma. You don't know misery until you lose your daughter as I lost Juliet—the little dope! She should have known Romeo was an all-right fellow and would be back."

Miss Kate stands under five feet even when she stretches, and she's the mother you hear on CBS' School of the Air.

"I'm just breaking into radio," said Miss Kate. "I've waited a long time, haven't I? But after all, I'm only eighty-four!"

Eighty-four, and beginning a new career! And poets chip words from the rainbow seeking expressions for courage. Sculptors chisel marble figures of heroines, and painters splash their faces on canvas. But for courage, I give you little Miss Kate, who is only eighty-four—the mother of radio and whacking out a new path for herself at the age when most persons are ready to sit before a fire and rock and knit and watch their grandchildren.

Incidentally, Miss Kate played roles of a mother and a grandmother the same year the Marconi family of Bologna, Italy, had a son and named him Guglielmo and watched him grow up to invent wireless. Marconi is dead, but wireless has brought a new frontier to mankind and created a new world for little Miss Kate to conquer.

Her eyes are frosty blue, and there are only a few gray hairs among the brown. She's a professional mother, and when you hear her voices (she has a heap of voices) she can make you think of all the different kinds of mothers in the world. She can tighten her lips, and her voice screams like a matriarch's. She can talk naturally, and her voice is gentle and soothing, like our mothers'.

You'll probably hear her on a Mother's Day program, for when radio wants a typical mother the moguls send for Miss Kate.

She was born in Indianapolis on September 2, 1853.

"I'm a Hoosier," she says, proudly.

Abe Lincoln was trodding the hustings in those days. Man had discovered his voice could be carried over wires, and thought he was smart.

KATE went on the stage in 1858 in the play "Pizzaro." Children were in demand for drama even then, and at five she was the Shirley Temple of the Hoosiers.

"I remember the Civil War," said Miss Kate. "There were big doings around Indianapolis then."

The war was in full swing when she went into stock as Little Eva in "Uncle Tom's Cabin."

The event was of tremendous historic importance, although Miss Kate perhaps never considered it so. The war had not been going well for the Union. Lincoln was up for re-election, and the fight was bitter. There were millions in the North who wanted to beat Lincoln and call the whole thing off, but there were more millions who wanted to fight on and save the Union.

"Uncle Tom's Cabin" was a blatant bit of propaganda against the South. So over all the North, the play was enacted. Feelings were aroused. It helped lick the South, it helped re-elect Lincoln. And little Kate was little Eva, the sweet girl with curls who made the North see red.

Did you ever think about that, Miss Kate? That you played a part in saving the Union—that your voice on the stage was worth a thousand muskets!

She began trouping at fifteen. Over all the country she went, and in 1873 she came to Broadway. Her show was "My Neighbor's Wife."

"Folks weren't so hard to please then," said Miss Kate.

In 1878 (Thomas Edison had discovered one of the principles of radio then) she married Henry Wedmen, orchestra leader of the show. They married in San Francisco. She has been a widow for forty-three years.

"I've been alone since then," said

Miss Kate, "but I never allow myself to get lonely. I never allow myself to worry. When I begin to worry, I memorize a poem or a story—study it for an hour, and my mind gets so busy with my memory work that there's no room in my brain for worry."

She prides herself on her memory. "I can remember just about everything, except the number of times I have been a mother or grandmother in the world of make-believe."

She lives alone, does her own cooking and housework. "Why, only today," she said, "I went 'way uptown to shop. I rode the bus and had to make three changes. I can take care of myself."

Last year she appeared with the Lunts and had to make three trips across the continent in six weeks.

"Pretty good running around for an eighty-four-year-old girl, eh?" said Miss Kate.

She has been in radio on bit parts for several months, but only recently did she join CBS' staff for parts in School of the Air. She looks about sixty. She never has trimmed her brown hair.

"It's too good a prop," she said.

Her living-room walls are covered with pictures of theatrical stars. "They are my children," she said. "That's

Marc Connelly's picture over there. It's the only picture he ever paid to have made. And there is Lillian Gish. She's the sweetest girl I know. She called me the other day. Lee Bowman is one of my boys. I helped him years ago. He's holding his own in Hollywood."

Radio and screen stars call Miss Kate "Aunt Kate" or "Grandma."

"I don't mind. I've mothered enough of them. But I don't like to play only mother roles. I don't want to be typed. I can play little-girl parts, too.

"I EXPECT to stay in radio now.

Radio is the most useful and wonderful thing we have. I don't like the horror stories, however. There are too many good things to be played for us to bother with the bad things. Have I any advice to offer? Yes—do all things in moderation, and stay cheerful and courageous. I like people with courage."

And I like Miss Kate.

She is by no means the only professional mother, but she is by far the oldest.

Marion Barney is the professional mother you hear on NBC's "Pepper Young's Family" as lovable Mrs. Sam Young. A native of San Francisco, she

came to radio ten years ago after years of experience in stock and the silent movies. She has been the mother of Elaine Sterne Carrington's "typical American family" since it first was presented.

Mrs. Wiggs of NBC's "Mrs. Wiggs of the Cabbage Patch" really is Betty Garde, and she's only thirty. Her first Broadway show was "The Nervous Wreck," but you would never know it, for she's a very composed young woman, and very refined. In fact, she had intended to attend Wellesley, but decided she didn't need a college education to be a radio star. She made her mike debut in 1933 and has played opposite many comedians, including Cantor, Bert Lahr, Cliff Edwards, Jack Pearl and Lou Holtz.

TO SEE her you would never think of Mrs. Wiggs. But that's her living. Her favorite pet is Mr. Wiggs. He's a dog.

One of the most famous professional mothers is Minetta Ellen, who plays Fanny Barbour, the sympathetic mother in NBC's "One Man's Family."

She really is a mother, and a grandmother to boot. Her two grandchildren call her Mimi.

She was born in Cleveland, Ohio,

and her father owned the Cataract House, a hotel that was a landmark. She wanted to be an actress as a young lady, but her family objected, so she studied elocution as a compromise.

Her first experience as an actress came after she was married and had a family. The campus players of the University of California selected her to play mother roles for their shows. Among the students with whom she acted were Barton Yarborough and Michael Raffetto. They are her "sons" now in "One Man's Family."

She toured with the Berkeley Players, and while in stock played the wife of J. Anthony Smythe. Smythe now is Mr. Barbour, her radio husband.

She never had appeared before a mike until she was auditioned for "One Man's Family."

"I'm glad I was a mother long before I became an actress," she said. "It helps me to understand Fanny Barbour so much better."

She lives in an apartment on the top of a San Francisco hill. Her home is filled with old furniture and books.

Perhaps the most famous radio mother is Gertrude Berg of "The Goldbergs," who has appeared on all three major networks.

"Mother's Day will mean much to me," she said. "I will go see my mother, and my two children will remember me."

Her mother is an invalid and lives at Tarrytown, N. Y. Her children are Cherny, sixteen, and Harriet, twelve. Cherny studies violin and Harriet studies piano.


"BEING a mother," she said, "helps me to understand Molly, and being Molly helps me to be a mother."

Both of her children want to get into radio work. Cherny used to write childish verse, but he has outgrown it. Now Harriet has got the poetic fever. There is something fine and homey about the Berg family. There is a friendly air about the home, a deep understanding.

Even little Harriet has it. There are no horizons for her, and at twelve she is worried about the fate of men, about our blunders and stupidity, our selfishness and blindness. She tells it

WHO ARE THE MOTHERS OF RADIO? THEIR STORIES HOLD MESSAGES FOR ALL MOTHERS

THIS is a topsy-turvy world, and times change in the theater just as they do elsewhere. There was a day, for example, when, if you were a stage butler, you might be sure that your lines would consist of nothing more complicated than an occasional "Dinner is served, madam!" But now you're likely to be the hero of the piece, and it's almost a cinch that you will be a maker of sparkling epigrams, a hatcher of plots, and a man with a past.

In the old days, the worst that could happen to you would be that you might be snatched out of the respectable obscurity of your butlery some time during the third act and identified as the murderer of the lecherous bondholder who had wronged your sister and deserted her some twenty years before. Even then you were likely to be excused, especially if the play centered around the doings of an eccentric private detective who not only brought his man to justice but dispensed it as well.

In those days, however, a butler, as the name implies, used to be concerned mainly with bottles and wine-cellars. Now he is likely to be involved in anything from domestic to international intrigue, and to be an authority on almost any subject from Byzantine architecture to surrealism—and he's sure to be a man who listens understandingly to Toscanini on his nights off.

He has replaced the beach-comber as a romantic figure.

MUCH of this change in the social standing of the butler is due to the activities of just such characters as Mr. William Powell of Hollywood, who bids fair to become a professional butler unless he watches his step. Possibly it all began with the creation of the Admirable Crichton in 1903, by Sir James Matthew Barrie. The Admirable Crichton, as you will remember, was a servant who could do anything, a veritable Robinson Crusoe in a tight spot and a man who was polished and cultured withal. Mr. Powell, like the Admirable Crichton, is suave and gentlemanly and accomplished. Anything Crichton could do, he can do. And he can make hearts flutter, too.

Remember "My Man Godfrey"?

It was "My Man Godfrey" that started the cinematic vogue in what might, for want of a better term, be called sophisticated slapstick, and gave rise to what movie men now call the "slapstick cycle"—which said cycle includes such amazingly popular successes as "The Awful Truth," "True Confession," "Merrily We Live," and "Nothing Sacred."

AND it was "My Man Godfrey" that strengthened the legend of the perfect servant, buttressed the romantic tradition of the Admirable Crichton, and established the suave Mr. Powell as butler extraordinary, and the sprightly Miss Carole Lombard as a top-flight comedienne. For that reason alone "My Man Godfrey" is an important work.

On Monday night of this week (May 9) at 9 p.m. EDT, the Lux Radio Theater (aired over the Columbia Broadcasting system under the guidance of Cecil B. DeMille) takes the play out of its screen setting and brings it to listeners in the form of a thrilling radio play. Like the original screen play, the radio version will star the talented Mr. Powell and Miss Lombard.

Taking part in the radio dramatization will also be Gail Patrick and Mischa Auer—for whom "My Man Godfrey" on the screen was a big step

toward stardom in the movies.

The story is that when "My Man Godfrey" was being manufactured out in Hollywood, members of the cast entered into the spirit of the enterprise so whole-heartedly, and with such an intelligent understanding, that instead of quoting lines from the scripts that had been handed them they fabricated their own dialog during rehearsals. The radio producers of "My Man Godfrey" guarantee that everybody who participates in the broadcast will have a script, but an effort will be made to capture the air of light-hearted foolery which pervaded the movie version of the play.

"My Man Godfrey's" significance as entertainment is chiefly that it started the "slapstick" cycle. It was a new kind of slapstick, too. It was sophisticated. In the old days, the villains and the fuddy-duddies of romantic comedy were the victims of such misfortunes as falling into horse-troughs and tumbling down stairs. Sympa-

thetic characters; i. e., those with whom the audience had a bond of feeling and kinship, were generally immune from such indignities. Now, in the new slapstick cycle, it is the sympathetic characters who suffer. Under current rules, for example, the heroine may be ducked in a pond, spanked by the hero, or shoved head first into a barrel of tar. Naturally, it's just good, clean fun, a fine time is had by all and there are always happy endings.

IT IS impossible, of course, to reproduce slapstick in its native purity on the radio, but it is possible, through lively dialog, to re-create the atmosphere that makes comedy sparkle, and it is toward that goal that the producers of the radio version of "My Man Godfrey" are working. Their task is made easier by the fact that the stars of the original cast are to appear in the radio play and that their personalities and mannerisms are

familiar to millions of movie-goers everywhere.

In "My Man Godfrey"—as in others of his plays—"The Baroness and the Butler" being the most recent example—the polished Mr. Powell is cast as a servitor, and, in accordance with the finest traditions of romance and democracy, wins the lady of his heart's desire, having first impressed her with the sheer virtuosity of his butting, then swept her off her feet with his personal charm, thus wiping out at one blow the barriers of snobbery between butlers and belles, and proving once again that a cat may look at a king, or queen, as the case may be.

For the benefit of those who were staring the other way when the movie came to town, a brief resume of the story follows: Irene Bullock (Carole Lombard) finds Godfrey (William Powell) sitting disconsolately on a city dump, where she has gone in search of a specimen of the "forgotten man," which she needs to win a scavenger-hunt. She takes first prize. Then she engages Godfrey as the Bullock butler, and he takes the job. Soon he has won his way into the affections of the family, with the exception of Cornelia, Irene's sister, who remains aloof and snooty.

UNFORTUNATELY, Godfrey, whilst serving cocktails to the assembled guests of the Bullocks at a party one day, is recognized by one Tommy Gray, a former classmate at Harvard, but contrives to get Tommy to keep his real identity a secret. It appears that Godfrey, whose name is Godfrey Parke, has been involved in a minor scandal in Boston and, having been exiled by his family, has become a gentleman adventurer. His stay with the Bullocks is marred only by Cornelia's bullying—which is bad enough, for Cornelia finally decides to dispense with Godfrey once and for all. She puts her pearls in his room, announces that they are missing, and calls the police.

When the police arrive, the pearls are nowhere to be found, and it is discovered that the family is in such financial straits that the jewels were uninsured.

The plot begins to thicken and there are several intervening complications before Mr. Bullock comes home one day to tell the other Bullocks that he faces jail because of his financial mishaps. Godfrey, as you might guess, rescues the whole tribe. The pearls reappear. Godfrey is happy. Irene is happy. Everybody is happy, and all is well.

There are several reasons why you won't want to miss this broadcast—among them the lustrous names of Powell, Lombard, Patrick and Auer, the brightness of the dialog, and the lightness of the comedy. If you still lack conviction you might recall that this is the play that gave impetus to the current liking for sophisticated slapstick, and if you need any arguments beyond these, you're an incurable realist and not entitled to admission to that vast company of frivolous but happy folk who like to think that a lot of butlers *might* be old Oxonians in exile or Harvard men with secret sorrows.



JOHN BARBIROLLI is as versatile here as he has been during his Philharmonic season recently finished. With a comprehensible bent toward the works of his compatriots, the conductor often lists their music, and today's concert offers an interesting exhibit by the late Fritz Delius, whose style was not so much typically English as it was a reflection of the mysticism of Franck and the romanticism of Debussy. "Irmelin" is an early opera by Delius, and the prelude well voices his lush melodies and exotic harmonies.

Sullivan's "Lost Chord" remains one of the imperishable songs, with its noble text and profoundly moving music. De Falla's ballet, with its naughty story and spicy score, is what an ancient Englishman might call "hot i' the mouth."

The March of Music

"... An ampler Ether, a diviner Air..."—Wordsworth

THERE was something of a dearth of good music on the air last summer and it is to be hoped that the bosses and sponsors of radio may deal more generously with us during the coming tropical months. Otherwise, with remembrance of the past winter in mind, we music-lovers might feel that we were passing from a feast to a famine.

There seems to be no logical reason why all the New York Stadium concerts could not be broadcast, or the Boston "Pops," or all the Hollywood Bowl and Philadelphia Dell programs. If that is too much, and some of the hours conflict, then why not alternate on different days? Many of the leading variety programs shut up shop during the thermal period, because sponsors feel that few listeners sit at the radio on hot evenings.


Should sponsors or radio companies shy at the expense of airing programs likely to appeal to a limited audience, there is the suggestion of a RADIO GUIDE correspondent, who declares himself ready to send a cash contribution toward defraying the outlay, and adds that there may be thousands of other persons willing to do likewise. The Philharmonic and Metropolitan lost no prestige by accepting dollar donations from radio followers and thereby set an example that is worthy of emulation. The suggestion of the correspondent is distinctly constructive and perhaps could help to keep us off the musical dole during this summer.

A musical radio premiere is the May 12 "first time" on the air of the Toronto Promenade Concerts, from the outdoor arena of the University of Toronto. This popular Canadian course, founded several years ago by the young Scottish conductor, Reginald Stewart, and conducted by him, patterns after the London Promenade Concerts, made famous by Sir Henry Wood, which are a feature of London life in summertime. Stewart won his earlier laurels as a concert pianist, but (like Iturbi and the late Gabilowitsch) he exchanged the keyboard for the baton. Now radio presents him with millions of new listeners.

Sir Adrian Boult, forty-nine-year-old English conductor selected to "guest" with the NBC Symphony Orchestra in two broadcasts, May 14 and 21, studied at the Leipzig Conservatory and was a disciple of the late Artur Nikisch, whom many countries hailed as the greatest conductor of his time. The influence of that artist is still apparent in Sir Adrian's vivid interpretations. Since 1918 he has been at the head of the London Royal Philharmonic, and for the past six or seven years of the BBC Symphony Orchestra.

is performed nowadays. The story, a sort of variant of the Don Juan legend, concerns a pirate, Zampa, who mocks the statue of his betrayed sweetheart, and as he pursues a newer damsel is thrown into the sea by the vengeful effigy. This dreadful tragedy is supplied by Herold with a score that has more smiles than tears.

Richard Crooks' interpretative talents are to vivify the honeyed lyrics by Guy d'Hardelot (a woman composer despite the "Guy"), the stirring emotionalism of Schubert's "Where?" and the gentle sentiment in "Una Furtiva Lagrima" (A Furtive Tear), the celebrated aria from the second act of Donizetti's "Elixir of Love."

The dance from Wolf-Ferrari's "The Jewels of the Madonna" sounds merry enough, but it has evil underlying import, for the trippers are the Camorra, a Neapolitan gangster fraternity, to whose lair the heroine Maliella rushes for protection after she has caused the enamored Gennaro to steal the jewels from the statue of the Madonna.

MR. FIEDLER appropriately catalogs light and lilted fancies for spring. Even the "Benvenuto Cellini" score deals mostly with jovial phases of that artist's piquant career. The Berlioz opera is just 100 years old, and failed at its Paris premiere, but the overture won lasting popularity.

On the title page of his "Suite Algerienne" Saint-Saens wrote, "Picturesque Impressions of a Voyage to Algeria." The march is the last of the four movements. Written at Blidah, the French military fortress near Algiers, the music expresses (according to the composer's own statement) his joy in viewing the garrison and the security felt under its protection.

Both emotions must have been overpowering, for Saint-Saens made his march of magnificent jubilation and pomp.

Ibert's orchestral conceit shows his amiable inclination and deft hand at orchestral coloring.

When Johann Strauss wrote his masterpieces, Vienna was a place where waltzes bloomed in fullest flowering.

CHOPIN'S two aristocratic piano concertos, with their fragrant themes and lacy figurations, represent the romantic style of writing at its best. The F minor examples is all tunefulness, with sensuous airs and glamorous decoration. In the slow movement the bit of drama in the middle part contrasts with the fresh jollity of the finale. Poetic sensibility and refined touch are essential for the playing of this utterly delightful work.

Madrigals used to be practised in the Elizabethan era when young persons of culture, going to parties, found their chief recreation in reading such music at sight. Martini was one of the early composers of part songs. Therefore, when an Elizabethan hostess would say to her guests, "Shall we have a little Martini before dinner?" it did not mean . . . but you can finish this sentence for yourself.

DECIDEDLY modern is this program, with only one of its numbers dating further back than our century. However, it is a fair guess that the composition in question, Beethoven's Seventh Symphony (premiered 125 years ago), will outlive the others, especially the second movement, the famous *allegretto*, seeming sure of immortality.

Of the three moderns, Ferruccio Busoni comes closest to Beethoven in form and method, although the "Comedy Overture" (written in one night) contains a few unconventional pages that would have appeared strange to the classical king. Busoni is staunchly admired by some as a composer, but to me he has always seemed a greater pianist than a creator, though his Bach transcriptions impress me deeply.

If you like short themes, brightness without much warmth, and harmonies that bite into the ear rather than soothe it, the Walton and Copland pieces will please you. For myself, I respect but do not love them. The rich tones of the viola are not often heard in solo utterance as exploited by Walton.

Cincinnati Conservatory of Music Celebrates 100th Broadcast with 90-Minute Program

Saturday, May 14, 11 a.m., CBS.

"COULDN'T you play 'General Grant's Grand March' or something else that has a tune to it?" asked one of the guests at a musicale where a young pianist had just finished performing some music by Bach, Beethoven, Chopin, Schumann and Liszt. The locale was Cincinnati. The period was the year 1866. The pianist was the father of the Music Editor of RADIO GUIDE.

However, his parent related the incident as an isolated happening, for an unusually large percentage of those early Cincinnatians were of German origin and consequently well versed in the best music. At that time, the city supported several choral organizations, was trying to establish a symphony

and a railroad started between Cincinnati and Chattanooga. The place must have had something more than material aspect, for Charles Dickens called it "beautiful" and "interesting."

Since Miss Bauer began her music school, it has had to change to larger quarters four times. Now it is located, with its campus, on a ten-acre tract, has a separate concert hall, two dormitories, an administration building, and all the other appurtenances of a flourishing collegiate institution. For years the fame of the Cincinnati Conservatory has been international, and some of the visiting foreign artists who paid exploratory calls were Lilli Lehmann, Nikisch, Caruso, Ysaye (who later became violin professor at the school),

orchestra on a professional basis, and in 1859 had given Jenny Lind the biggest audience she had attracted outside of New York. Chamber music was practised in the homes and most cultured families had members who either sang or played an instrument.

The young pianist aforementioned, the late Max Liebling, used to tell that when the swains of the city wished to make a particular impression on the young women of their fancy, they did not send them orchids or perfume but serenaded them with music, the suitors and their companions being the performers, all perched atop a truck, which would draw up in front of the fair one's home and play its melodious compliment.

A year after the "General Grant" episode, in 1867, when "The Maiden's Prayer" and "The Battle of Prague" reigned favorite as piano solos, a young woman of Cincinnati, who had gone for musical study to Stuttgart, Germany, returned to her native city and took charge of the music department at a fashionable seminary for girls. Her class quickly grew to such proportions that she made it into the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, and as the head of the piano branch she appointed Max Liebling, where he remained until he moved to New York.

When the Conservatory started, Cincinnati already was a prosperous center of commerce, a link between the South and the West. A bridge had been built over the Ohio River to Kentucky

Schumann-Heink and other celebrities. In 1912, Miss Bauer died, and now the Conservatory, a non-profit organization, is operated by the Cincinnati Institute of Fine Arts, a civic body that also directs the destinies of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, the Cincinnati Art Museum and the Taft Art Museum.

Aware of the vast importance of radio, the Conservatory went on the air for the first time in 1935, and this May 14 will give its 100th broadcast over the CBS network from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. EDT. Faculty members and students have taken part, some of the latter being developments of the new department of radio training and technique, founded by Dr. John A. Hoffmann, who became director in 1937. Incidentally, Dr. Hoffmann is himself a graduate of the Conservatory, where he studied singing with Miss Bauer. The symphony orchestra heard is made up of conservatory students conducted by Alexander von Kreisler.

An illustrious list of graduates of the Conservatory includes Everett Marshall, Suzanne Fisher, Jane Froman, Chalmers Clifton, Harold Morris.

Maybe that delightful pioneer of 1866 who asked for "General Grant's Grand March" is still alive and might be listening to the Cincinnati Conservatory orchestra on May 14 when they play Franck's D Minor Symphony. If so, perhaps radio has taught him that the music of the masters also "has a tune to it."





Max Eastman, author of "The Enjoyment of Laughter," is the master of ceremonies on a new CBS feature, "The Word Game," which, to quote him, has to do "not just with the out-sides of words, their spellings and pronunciation, but with their fine shades of meaning, the difference between those which seem almost alike, and their proper usage."

The program is a development of the old-fashioned spelling bee recently popularized in broadcasting.

Columbia Inaugurates Pan-American Series

Sunday, 3-4:30 p.m., CBS

With the whole-hearted support of the White House and the Department of State, the Columbia Broadcasting System, in cooperation with the Pan-American Union, has arranged for a series of five inter-American broadcasts on the subject of economic cooperation between the Americas.

The first of the five Sunday afternoon programs will be heard this week, with Secretary of State Cordell Hull as the principal speaker and with foreign ministers of several Latin-American countries speaking over short-wave radio from their own capitals. When the foreign ministers are not available by short wave, ambassadors in Washington from those countries will speak.

The stated objective of the series is to promote the good-neighbor policy outlined by the present administration in Washington.

The first broadcast, on May 8, will come from a meeting in the Hall of the Americas at the Pan-American Union building in Washington. Invitations have been sent to all members of the Diplomatic Corps, Congress, the Cabinet and the Supreme Court, and to the heads of various government departments. The U. S. Navy Band will play the national airs of the nations which participate in the conference.

The hour-and-a-half program will reach all parts of the United States, the Latin-American republics and Canada. The four broadcasts which follow will be shorter—running from 2:30 to 3 p.m., but it is expected that some twenty American nations will be heard from during the series.

RCA Sends Wells to Latin America

Linton Wells, roving reporter for the Magic Key broadcast of the Radio Corporation of America, left New York last week for a four-month tour of twelve Central and South American countries by airplane, canoe and mule train.

Beginning with the Magic Key broadcast of Sunday, May 8, and continuing for thirteen weeks, he will be heard in eye-witness reports of life and current events in Latin America. His first broadcast will originate from Managua, capital of Nicaragua, after a hazardous trip over the proposed Nicaraguan canal route.



YOUR reporter has been asked many times if comedy programs will continue to be as popular as they have been for the past few years. My frank opinion is that radio comedy is on the way out. The reason for it is very simple. Radio has not been able to develop comedy-script writers, and after all a comedian is only as good as his script. Amos and Andy are the only products of radio who have clicked in the comedy field. Fred Allen, Jack Benny, Eddie Cantor, Burns and Allen, Phil Baker and Ben Bernie cannot be classified as products of radio. They were graduated from the vaudeville stage with their own individual styles and techniques.

What's going to happen when these comics decide to call it a day, of their own free will, or at the request of their sponsors? I can't think of one name this side of the horizon to replace any of these mentioned. When Jack Benny vacationed last summer, his sponsor filled in with a show that proved to be anything but a success. This summer a script show will be presented during Benny's absence. Paul Whiteman's show started off with Oliver Wakefield, and comedy lines were scattered throughout the half-hour. Now the Whiteman show has changed its formula and become a musical show. The job of one, or possibly two, of the comics mentioned above is tottering. This, I think, will be the beginning of the end for radio comedy. I understand one show will go off the air entirely and the other will be replaced with a program that was heard up until a few weeks ago for an auto maker. It will be a slow process of elimination, but I firmly believe that within a few years radio comedy will be almost extinct.

I sat in the CBS Playhouse with one of the network publicists watching the Ben Bernie rehearsal. Buddy Clark walked over to where we were sitting, and was promptly scolded by the CBS space-procurer for breaking several appointments with their photographer. "I don't want my picture taken," chirped the singer. "Nothing will make my kisser better looking."

Wednesday is Buddy's toughest day in the week. He rehearses from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. for his WOR-WGN program in behalf of Lucky Strike. Then he has to rush over to the CBS Playhouse and rehearse the rest of the afternoon for the Ben Bernie show. From this rehearsal he has to speed

back to the WOR studio for his program, after which he returns in double-quick time to his hotel to dress for the Bernie airing. He comes back again at 11:30 p.m. for the repeat broadcast for the Pacific Coast. When this day is done and he lays him down to sleep, Morpheus finds him a happy and willing subject.

Wednesday, April 20, was a very trying day for Ork Pilot Tommy Dorsey and his music-makers. If anyone thinks a radio star or orchestra leader has an easy life, this and the Buddy Clark paragraphs should dispel that belief. Early in the morning, the Dorsey gang was at the RCA Victor studios making some new recordings. The band was also playing four shows a day at New York's Paramount Theater. Wednesday is the day for Dorsey's program, which meant hours of rehearsing at the NBC studios between shows. After that was over they rushed back to the Paramount for the third show, then back to the studios for the radio program. At the end of the airing the Dorsey crew scurried to the theater for the fourth and last performance of the day. Oh, yes, I almost forgot something. All that day Tommy was suffering with a very bad toothache and had his dentist come over to the Paramount and give him an injection to stop the pain. If you ask me, being a musician is nice work if you can't get it.

Then there's the case of Kay Kyser, who for the past few weeks has been playing one-nighters, returning to New York on Wednesdays for his Lucky Strike program. Ask any bandleader and he'll tell you what a tough grind it is playing a different town every night, traveling by bus and getting very little sleep. Kay, the boys, and the lovely songstress, Ginny Sims, were all dead tired when they arrived in New York last Wednesday. They rehearsed all day, and at program time they were a weary crew. As a matter of fact, just as Ginny finished singing her first number she started to swoon. Kay noticed it and ran over to the microphone just in time to hold her up. Back in the dressing-room she was given smelling-salts, and, like a good trouper, she was back in front of the microphone ten minutes later singing her second number, with none of the loudspeaker eavesdroppers being any the wiser.

In the past few columns I've men-

tioned the radio surveys made by telephone calls to determine the popularity of programs. A great many of you were kind enough to let me know whether or not you ever received such a call. In case you didn't hear it, Schlepman, who took the role of Prince Charming, called to his horse, "Hi-Ho Silverstein!" It stopped the show. The gag Charlie Butterworth told when he appeared as guest with Paul Whiteman the other week was another good laugh-provoker. Charlie, who had just returned from Europe, was telling the maestro that all the girls on the other side are taking up shorthand because they never know when they'll meet a dictator!

Rudy Vallee does quite a bit of radio-listening when he is at home. He has three costly radios in his New York apartment and he doesn't even have to get out of bed to turn on one of them. All he does is press one of the buttons on the night-table to tune in the station he desires, and there is a loudspeaker in almost every room. At his lodge up in Maine, he has a 29-tube set that cost him no less than \$3,200.

Two weeks ago Eddy Duchin was playing at the Orpheum Theater in Minneapolis, Minnesota. TWO new 25,000-watt transmitters, which will carry American radio programs to penetrate every country of Europe and all parts of South and Central America, have been installed and will go into operation in the immediate future at the NBC Short-Wave Station W3XAL, Boundbrook, N. J. The new transmitters will operate through four directive-beam systems and two non-directive antennae, occupying twenty-four acres.

The international service of NBC, the result of more than a decade of intensive experimentation in short-wave transmission, is given in six languages over sixteen hours a day.

Some of Britain's most famous dance bands, including the orchestras of Ambrose, Henry Hall, Jack Hylton and Roy Fox, have been engaged to play for a week each in the Concert Hall of the Empire Exhibition at Glasgow, Scotland. On Tuesday, May 10, at 4 p.m. EDT, Daventry listeners will hear Ambrose and his band inaugurate this series.

SHORT-WAVE SHORTS: A consulting radio commission has been established in Cuba which will set up regulations for improving short-wave broadcasts and eliminating interference. . . . The nightly broadcasts from 12:45 to 1:45 a.m. EDT over ZRH, of Roberts Heights, South Africa, which were well heard in the United States when they were transmitted on a frequency of 9.523 megs, are now being radiated on 6.007 megs. . . . PJC1 of Curacao, N. W. I., is now broadcasting on a new frequency of 9.091 megs, and requests reports from all listeners. . . . JZK (15.16), Nazaki, Japan, is testing near 1 a.m. EDT, preparatory to putting this summer frequency into general use. . . . VK2ME (9.59) of Sydney, Australia, is now broadcasting as follows: On Sundays, from 2 to 4 a.m. EDT, 6 to 10 a.m. EDT and 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. EDT. . . . Dewitt R. Goddard of the RCA receiving station at Riverhead, N. Y., in writing to Clyde Criswell of Mission Ranch, Ariz., states that ultra-high-frequency reception from Europe has been totally absent

for some time. France on 42 megs, and Germany on 42.5 megs, were last heard on February 19, while the last high-frequency signals from London were recorded on March 21. . . . The short-wave station on the Channel Islands, which a private concern attempted to set up and operate without a license from the British Postal officials has been silenced, following the confiscation of parts of the equipment by the authorities. . . . RNE, Radio Center, Moscow, U. S. S. R., has shifted back to its former frequency of 12 megs, where it is being heard almost nightly from 11:15 p.m. to 12 mid. EDT. . . . The owners of YSD (7.894), San Salvador, El Salvador, are now issuing attractive yellow, blue and white QSL cards to all listeners who correctly report transmissions of this station. . . . Earl Roberts of Indianapolis, Ind., writes that the following French commercial transmitters are being used for two-way telephone traffic with Morocco, Saigon and South America: FTM (19.355), FTK (15.88), FTA (14.612) and FTH (10.94). Reports can be sent to Radio France, 79 Boulevard Haussmann, Paris, France. . . . The "JZ" stations of Tokyo, Japan, are now making their usual form "thank you" letters in answer to listeners' reports of much greater value by stamping in the words, "reception verified" on them.

A new 400-watt short-wave transmitter is being installed at Kuala Trengganu in Malaya. . . . The French Radio-Orient Company has decided to erect a powerful station at Beyrouth. Broadcasts in French and Arabic will be featured.

The "Esso Hour" is the only program of its kind broadcast from Cuba. Heard over COCH (9.43) on Fridays at 9 p.m. EDT, it includes one or two guest stars from radio or theater, a popular Cuban comedian, an Argentine tango band, an instrumental quartet a la Benny Goodman, a typical male trio, a regular dance band of thirteen pieces with Cuban and American vocalists and a commercial announcer who also acts as master of ceremonies.

JUST CALL HIM EDDIE!

MEET EDWARD OTTO ROECKER—
THE LAD WITH A MUSICAL FUTURE

SHOUT "Junior" at him; yell "Roeckie" and he'll come. But never, never call him "Otto"! Even if it is his middle name, it's pretty dangerous to tag him by. You'd better stay on the safe side and just call him Eddie, because that's half of a name you're going to be hearing a great deal of from now on.

Edward Otto Roecker was born on the 24th of September in 1914. He spent his earliest school days at the Kaighn School in Camden, N. J. From there he went to the Fetters School, and next to the Camden Junior High. Eddie's father had been a featured singer with the old and famous Dumont's Minstrels back in the halcyon days of that troupe; and by the time Ed started his junior-high work, Dad decided it was time for him to begin vocal exercises. There happened to be two major extracurricular activities in the youngster's life about then—sports and songs. So Papa had no difficulty persuading his son to start learning the p's and q's of sharps and flats. Ed studied voice in earnest, and there began a singing career that is rapidly reaching national recognition.

After mastering his studies at junior high, Ed was graduated and entered Camden High School. His stay there ran the usual round of studies, dates, and sports, with special attention to singing lessons. Upon graduation from high school he was offered a musical scholarship at Temple University.

FOLLOWING four years at Temple, Eddie worked a while in the Campbell Soup plant, then went to Camden's RCA-Victor Company. This association was to mean a great deal to him. His initial job with the firm was that of a test-man on the radio-set assembly line, but in a short time he had worked himself up to a much higher position. On the side he sang at entertainments which the employes put on. These brought his voice to the attention of several important officials of the company, including Advertising Manager Joyce and Musical Director O'Connell.

Under their encouragement Ed had an audition at station WCAU, and shortly afterwards he was singing there regularly. At this time the Reading Anthracite Coal Company, which had been airing a series over WCAU, decided to sponsor a contest to discover the most talented singer in Philadelphia. Edward entered, came through the trial tests with flying colors, and skipped in a winner at the finals.

The week after the contest decision, on Christmas eve, Ed appeared on the company's regular show as guest star, being paid \$250 for his first sponsored program.

After a series of programs on WCAU he went on the WIP, then to WFIL. Next, upon a personal invitation from the late H. L. (Roxy) Rothafel, he joined the Roxy-Mastbaum Theater's stage show. When he made a hit there, Roxy invited him to join his radio cast, and Ed was featured on his first Coast-to-Coast series.

Following that he appeared for a while in vaudeville, then received a call to be a featured vocalist on the famous "Magic Key" programs, which the NBC-Blue network had been airing each Sunday at 2 p.m. under the banner of the Radio Corporation of America. Ed gave a performance that afternoon which was so outstanding that it brought him to the attention of the one and only Paul Whiteman!

Two weeks later Ed was guest star on Paul Whiteman's "Woodbury Soap" program, and once again distinguished

himself. Directly after his appearance, Whiteman offered Eddie a five-year contract—which Roecker did not accept!

It was at this point in his career that Ed sang for the Studebaker dealers of Philadelphia. So well was he liked by this group that later on they presented him with one of his really prized possessions, a handsome new Studebaker car!

After he had made several more Coast-to-Coast guest appearances, Edward was offered a fifty-two-week singing contract to be a featured star of the Model Tobacco "Pick and Pat" program. On March 1, 1937, he started out on it, and to this day his appealing baritone voice is heard over that series.

If you had to use one word to describe Edward Roecker, you'd probably say that word was "wholesome." He's as clean-cut as they come, and thoroughly regular. When he was asked what he thought of the "Pick and Pat"

cast, he said: "Those two guys are a pair of the swellest fellows I've ever had the pleasure to meet. Benny Krueger (the orchestra leader of the series), I'll never be able to thank enough for his perseverance and patience with me; and as for Frank McMann (show's producer)—well, he gambled by putting a comparatively unknown kid on his show, and I only hope I've not fallen down on him. He's been an inspiration to me, and I hope he knows I appreciate it more than I can say."

As Cap'n Henry might put it, "It's only the beginning." Several more nationally known sponsors are keeping their eye on this boy, and another year promises to find Edward Roecker up among the Kenny Bakers, the Frank Parkers, the Nelson Eddys.





EDDY REPEATS VICTORY; JESSICA DRAGONETTE WINS IN CLOSE VOTE





Radio's No Crime School

Broadcasters, it turns out, are not heels, after all. They are not corrupters of youth. They are not leading boys and girls into profligate or criminal lives, as we have been asked to believe by sundry women's clubs which have laid aside their tating from time to time to joust with the windmills of radio.

We owe this gratifying knowledge to the New Jersey Juvenile Delinquency Commission, which recently asked 1,500 boys why they went wrong. The result:

Influence of older boys . . .	535
Influence of boys the same age	404
Movies	262
Newspapers	161
Radio programs	75

Read these figures again, you mothers who feel a vernal urge to crusade against radio. Read them and thank your stars that the one source of entertainment and information which is available to your child at no cost and at any time is the least dangerous of the influences in his life.

Room for Both

Evidence of the growing feud between publishers and broadcasters came out of the recent convention of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association when J. M. Bunting, general manager of the Bloomington (Ill.) *Daily Pantagraph*, complained that newspapers, by printing radio programs and publicity, were helping radio to take away millions of dollars in advertising and urged that free publicity be discontinued.

We think a clearer view of the situation was taken by M. H. Aylesworth, publisher of the New York *World-Telegram* and former president of the National Broadcasting Co., and by Frank E. Tripp, general manager of the Gannett papers. Aylesworth said he regarded radio as a complimentary medium and as neither a menace nor dangerous competition to newspapers. Tripp declared that as to business lost to radio by the newspapers, it was up

to the newspapers to develop new ideas that would appeal to a generation of advertising buyers who have been reared "in an era of radio, showmanship, big magazine circulations, color advertising and million-dollar contests."

There is food for thought there. Our own view is that we need both the newspaper and the radio in America, that there is plenty of room for both, and that under the spur of competition both will be improved. The newspaper and the radio have useful functions in modern society, and there is no reason why they should not exist together.

A Balanced Diet

It is our job to listen to the radio regularly. We must take the good with the bad and make the best of it. We don't like a certain daytime serial and we think the singer on a certain big-time Sunday night show is far below standard. But that is merely our personal taste. We seem to be in the minority.

But there is one listening condi-

radio diet prepared on a more systematic schedule.

Regardless of your opinion of the midnight horror-drama, "Lights Out," it does give us some late-at-night variety. But that's hardly enough. Frankly, we miss the music of Chandor's violin, the organ recitals of Jesse Crawford, the melodies of the Poet Prince, even the nearly forgotten NBC Slumber Hour.

Summer will soon be upon us, and more and more big commercial programs will take vacations. That vacant time must be filled with sustaining shows built and produced by the networks. As long as new shows must be built, why not use the summer as the season of experiments? Why not try some of those experiments at night after the paid-for shows are off the air? Give a few of the bands a rest. And give the listeners a balanced diet.

On the 20th of April (1898) President McKinley approved a resolution demanding the withdrawal of Spain from Cuba and setting noon of the 23rd of April as the latest date for a reply to the demand. Before this could be delivered by the American minister in Madrid, the Spanish government sent him his passports. On the 22nd the President declared a blockade of Cuban ports; on the 24th the Spanish government declared war, and on the 25th the United States declared that war had existed since the 21st . . ."—Ed.

TRUMAN BRADLEY, announcer for the Ford Sunday Evening Hour for the past five years, is "Mme. Huntingford" to thousands of women who never suspect his identity.


Bradley was born in Sheldon, Mo., in 1905, studied law at Kansas City School of Law. When money gave out he became a Kansas City salesman, later went to Hollywood to work in his sister's publishing office. There he met Goodman Ace, of radio's "Easy Aces," whom he had known in Kansas City, and became stage-struck. After a few weeks in a stock company he became an announcer on a local station. Harry von Zell, announcing on the West Coast, left for New York and persuaded Bradley to follow him. The latter became a CBS staff announcer in New York in 1929, moved to Chicago in 1932, still lives there.

In Chicago, Bradley was the original "Brad" in "Easy Aces," played in serials, announced special-events broadcasts such as that covering the Chicago stockyards fire in 1934. He commutes by plane to Detroit for the Ford Hour, has flown 60,000 miles to make these broadcasts.


Named by Chicago stylists one of the city's ten best-dressed men for the last two years, Bradley was called radio's most eligible bachelor until he married less than a year ago. Now divorced, he is being screen-tested by M-G-M as a "romantic type."

With his sister Elene he purchased all the stock in Mme. Huntingford, Inc., 42-year-old cosmetics manufacturing company, in August, 1937. They now operate it together, making thirty cosmetics, including many face creams.


Then he went to Chicago, where he tried radio by doing bit-parts on local stations. Came network shows, and Bushman had a part in nearly every program originating in that city.




But Daddy was unhappy about it, as Baby Snooks soon learned. This, remember, from a woman who is the mother of grown children

She won the suit, but during the proceedings she was served with subpoenas for yet another action. Last year Fannie Brice suffered the intense humiliation that must come to any woman whose husband renounces her affections for those of another when Billy Rose announced his intention of obtaining a divorce from Fannie, marrying Swimming Champion Eleanor Holm Jarrett. The divorce proceedings will be instituted shortly. In 1927, after sticking with him through a maze of troubles that included a five-year jail sentence, Fannie divorced Nick Arnstein, Broadway figure whom she had married in 1918. Trouble is nothing new to Fannie Brice. But she keeps on laughing—and the world laughs with her.

The concerts were started experimentally in 1934 in the tradition of the great Prom Concerts established at Queen's Hall, London, by Sir Henry Wood.



So You Like Contests?

COMES now the final instalment of the season for this department. The news-hopper is filled to the brim:

The third annual National Contest Popularity Poll conducted by *Contest World* has been tabulated. The following types of contests were selected as most popular: Statement (2,451 votes); slogan (1,805); limerick-jingle (1,672); "naming" contests (963); letter (894), and picture titles (664) . . . Contestants voted four to one for contests with a wider distribution of prize money among small winners . . . They voted for longer contests . . . Voters were asked whether they are now using products introduced to them by contests, and 3,040 said "Yes," while only seventy-six said they were not. Naming these products, those who voted affirmatively put these at the top of the list: Oxydol, Ivory, Camay, Crisco, Admiration Shampoo, Gold Medal Flour, Pebeco. The first four, of course, are Procter and Gamble products, and nobody must be told that Procter and Gamble sponsors more contests than any other company in America.

The Chicago *Evening American's* "Funny Film Faces" contest offered 201 prizes, but 207 were paid, because of ties . . . Top winners were Mae Tiebel, Cicero, Ill., Walter F. Lasky, Roy Lang and Lucille Burr, of Chicago . . . In the Chicago *Tribune's* first "Paging the Movie Stars" contest, the \$1,000 first prize went to Harriet Kern, Galena, Ill., Elsie Harzheim, Chicago, won \$500, and Mrs. Verne C. Lewellen, Green Bay, Wis., won \$250.

CONTESTANTS berate sponsors and they deplore tactics of contestants, but there is a situation right in contesting that deserves at least as much censure. A small-time western "expert" sells a bulletin "service," more than half of which is mere fluffery for more things which he sells his readers. This is not on a par with advertising in a publication, in our opinion, for at the price at which the bulletin is sold it should be considered a more personalized service . . . A recent issue of *Department Store Economist* chronicles a contest in which six babies were offered as prizes to qualified parents! We're convinced now—there's no limit to contest wonders!

The last time we marveled at the extent of contesting was in our April 9 issue, in which we evinced some surprise that a church had advertised a contest. In the April 15 issue of *Contest News*, Gilson Willets set us straight in interesting fashion: "Religious contests are nothing new. The first contests were conducted more than a thousand years before Christ walked on earth. They were sponsored by religious groups. Today conditions have not changed. Today the commercial contests are more widely advertised than the religious contests and hence we hear more about them . . . In the first column of *National Contest News* appeared, among other items, an offer by the Lutheran churches, through the *American Lutheran*, of a forty-seven-day all-expense trip to Europe for the best 'Soul-Saving Slogan' submitted by April 15, 1829!"

Some weeks ago we condemned an organization which sells complete entries to simple contestants who don't realize that if the entries were good enough to win they would not be sold for two or three dollars. Here's a letter one of our readers sent to the contest "service": "Contesting is my hobby; it plays an important role in my life. Anything done to hurt it, whether intentional or innocent, hurts me. Your offer to sell solutions and statements will cheapen and cripple contesting. I'm no fool, and I'm not buying your entries, but thousands of others not so well posted will. Their entries will all sound alike and sponsors will become disgusted . . . I'm against you—teeth and toe-nails!"

MRS. DELPHIN DALE, P. O. Box 334, Los Gatos, Calif., won the \$100 prize in the "Epic of America" contest on the Mutual network. Second prize of \$50 and a silver plaque went to John Collins, 7751 Luella Ave., Chicago, Ill. He is thirteen years old.

Gilson Willets will announce his 1938 all-American Contestars very soon. Each year his selections recognize the outstanding big winners—on the basis of consistency, especially—in this fashion. Questionnaires filled out by those nominated for the honor constitute a survey of contesting al-

most as inclusive as that conducted by *Contest World*, as summarized in this column. Nominees answer the same sort of questions. Last year in selecting the publication, exclusive of contest journals, which they found of most value, the nominees gave RADIO GUIDE a majority, with the *Saturday Evening Post* second and *Readers' Digest* third.

Too many people seem to think that unless they study in a contest correspondence school they don't have a chance to win. This is absolutely untrue, and the teachers themselves would be the first to deny such a situation. Most of the contest correspondence schools are very helpful, especially for people who intend to give real attention to their entries. They are not essential; they are helpful.

RADIO GUIDE stands corrected, in this fashion, by an earnest reader, Fred B. Mann, of Danville, Ill.: "In reference to the Ivory Soap winning entry criticized by Mr. Wilmer Shepherd in your issue of April 2: I admire Mr. Shepherd and his work, I admire your column, I admire the winning Ivory Soap entry which was given. But I consider that Mr. Shepherd and you misuse the word 'clever' in all your advice about Procter and Gamble contests. When you both say, as you continually do, that entries in those contests should never be clever, I believe that you mean that the entries should never be 'wisecracky.' Take the sample which was given—'Mother, always wash my clothes with Ivory Soap, etc.' That was a dandy entry, but it was a dandy because it was clever. It was clever because, although small daughters never say such things, the writer of the entry wrote it so well, gave it such an air of sincerity, that the judges actually believed that one small daughter had actually said it . . . You gentlemen who give advice to testers, and very good advice it is, generally, should not be so careless with that word 'clever.' We don't know about Mr. Shepherd, but as for us, we accept the admonition and the correction. We hadn't meant to give the impression we obviously have.

This department suggested at the opening of 1938 that automobile man-

ufacturers could be expected to turn to contests to boost their lagging sales. They certainly have, as demonstrated by contests announced here in recent weeks. Here are two more:

Five Nash sedans, valued at from \$880 to \$1,230, will be given away by that manufacturer for statements of fifty words or less telling "How I can save money by trading my old car now." Only persons who own 1934, 1935, 1936 or 1937 cars can enter, and the motor number of the entrant's car must be registered. Get an entry-blank—and valuable winning hints—from your dealer. Entries must be mailed to "Contest Judges, Nash Motors Division," 14250 Plymouth Road, Detroit, Mich., before midnight, May 20. The dealer must countersign the blank.

Six Chevrolet master de luxe cars are prizes in a picture-puzzle contest now running. Contestants identify objects whose names begin with "c," in a drawing which is part of the official entry blank. A twenty-five-word statement must also be submitted. Entries must be countersigned by the Chevrolet salesman, and mailed before June 1 to Chevrolet Contest, 420 W. Milwaukee Ave., Detroit, Mich. Words listed incorrectly will be subtracted from the total number of correct words.

THE summer sees many commercially sponsored programs leave the air. With those programs go many of the contests whose news has made up this column. Other contest sponsors not connected with radio seem to take a summer layoff, too—and contestants themselves seem more interested in the attractions of the outdoors than in the lures of contesting. Because of this mutual disinclination to do much about contests when nature is at her best, the editors of RADIO GUIDE have decided to let this department take a summer leave of absence. Contests will carry on into and through the summer, to be sure, but our prediction is that 1938 will bring the biggest boom contesting has ever seen along about the time when leaves begin to fall and the good citizenry turns indoors for its sport. When that time comes, let's hope this department will find again as wonderful an audience as it has during the past contest season. Till then, the best of luck!
