The Menace of Bad Children's Programs

No subject is of more importance to radio listeners and to broadcasters themselves than the menace represented by poorly conceived and supervised programs for children. Because women's clubs have charged that some of our current programs are bad for their children, and because the networks have gone to great lengths to insure the psychological fitness of their broadcasts, RADIO GUIDE will publish from time to time the opinions of important thinkers in this all-important field of entertainment and instruction.

Below follows the first of the series. It is the opinion of Dr. Jay B. Nash, of New York University. We present it because of its stimulating content, because we believe it will make many parents listen more closely to the programs which attract their children's ears.

Now, here is Doctor Nash:

"Parents are on the verge of an uprising against many of the children's hour radio programs. Many organizations and individuals have taken action, and hundreds of others want to know how to organize protests that will help them to protect their children. Three very effective ways to protest are available to parents: Letters of protest may be sent to the radio station through which the program is rendered; they may be sent to the sponsors of the programs; or they may be sent directly to George Henry Payne, Federal Communications Commission, Washington, D. C.

"What is it which constitutes the real menace in connection with these programs? As I see it from an educational and a character-building standpoint, the objection to the programs is twofold, analyzed as follows:

"Radio Listening Encourages Inactivity. If the growth and development of children are to proceed harmoniously—if the potential capacities of children are to be tapped—the process involves activity. The child must act, must do things. The



play activities of children have served these purposes through the history of the race. In these play activities, children have run, jumped, dodged and balanced; they have molded clay and sand; they have piled boxes one on top of another; and have experimented with scissors, paste, hammers, nails, and paper, wire, etc. In this experimenting with things, they have found themselves. The founder of modern education, Comenius, says, 'When a child works with materials, he not only makes things but he makes himself.' This is profoundly true. Knowledge is more than informa-

tion; knowledge is acquired from experience. Children learn to think as a result of the things they do. From this standpoint, the radio has very little to contribute to the child's education.

"Some parents welcome the radio because it 'keeps the children out of mischief.' In other words, it relieves the parents of the responsibility of planning in connection with the children's play activities—a weak plea indeed.

"Therefore, mere listening falls far short of achieving any positive results. From this standpoint, the best radio programs for children

are poor. The worst are not only a waste of time but have a tendency to be vicious. Most of them, however, are not necessarily bad—just stupid.

"Radio 'Thrillers' Tend to Emotional Instability. Many of the children's hour radio programs are in the motion-picture 'Perils of Pauline' stage. Children are keyed up through blood-curdling 'conflict' scenes. They thrill at 'The Octopus,' 'The Shadow,' 'The Mystic Hand,' and then are left hanging with the words, 'More tomorrow.' Back they come, glued to the radio, forgetting their play activities—even their meals—to be stirred again by 'low animal conflict' scenes. These children relive these scenes during the day and through restless sleep at night. These are just the type of 'conflict' scenes which the child should not have—nor should the adult have them. These personal 'conflict' stories bring out the deep-seated fighting ego—the worst of our 'animal' instincts. Our social selves represent a very thin coating. Society needs to minimize the 'I' drives and to strengthen the 'We' drives.

"We have seen these basic, selfish drives centered around the fighting individual, loosed in dictatorial countries. They have no place in the education of the child who is preparing to live in a democracy.

"They like them.' Of course they do. The mob liked to pilfer in Vienna. Men liked to persecute others when to their advantage. We are thrilled by a mystic, 'shadowy' conflict, but that does not prove it is a good expression. These mystical programs are particularly bad—yes, they are vicious—for the children, disturbing their sleep and giving them false impressions of society patterns.

"One large broadcasting chain has formulated a group of principles which preclude exploiting the children during this evening children's hour. Other individual stations have done the same.

"This has been done at a considerable financial loss in most cases and parents should express their approval to these various stations as a partial recompense for their financial losses. In the attack upon the vicious programs it is well to realize that the parents in America are awake and they will become articulate."

Do you agree? What is your own experience with your own children? RADIO GUIDE would like to have letters telling of actual experiences which may point a way toward better entertainment for all.

HAS SWING SWUNG?

IS SWING REALLY ON ITS WAY OUT?
SWING-LOVERS SAY "NO," MANY SAY
"YES." READ THE ANSWER HERE

THERE is a warm, gratifying feeling around the cockles of my heart as I write that my operatives, A to Z, have reported that swing is earmarked for limbo, that the wild, weird moanings and groanings you hear are the death-rattles of the cock-eyedish music the world has known since savages first stretched a hide over a hollow log and tried to beat the devil away.

Really, Operatives A to Z report that the torrid trumpets that flourish and flounder and weep and wail and give my radio delirium tremens actually are the horns of Gabriel tooting a requiem for "barrelhouse" and "gutbucket."

Operatives A to Z may be wrong, however. They have been. They are the ones who reported here that the Strouds never had been married. Too late I learned that there had been an epidemic of marriages among the Strouds.

But just as I became convinced that swing is like death and taxes, along came the operatives and said a consensus of National Broadcasting Company bandleaders is that swing is on its death-bed.

Ruby Newman, broadcaster of waltzes from Radio City's Rainbow Room, was the first leader quoted by the operatives. "Fox trots," said Ruby, "probably always will be the 'bread and butter' music of dance orchestras, but the success of my waltz programs proves to me that swing is on the way out."

I sent the operatives back into circulation to learn exactly what swing is. The bandleaders couldn't say, and now even the operatives are fighting between themselves. But they turned up some weird facts about swing which I will report, and then I will seek cover and await the nasty letters from the "alligators" and "cats" and "ickies" and other species addicted to "barrel-

house" and "gutbucket." Swing is a verb. You are slaughtering English when you say "swing music." That makes swing an adjective. Of course, a covey of "ickies" and "alligators" and "cats" and "gutbucketers" are really interested in English.

It is as old as music, for it's simply improvisation. Improvisation means you play what you feel; "go out of your head," the "ickies" call it. For example, you have a toothache and you feel like trying to explain your misery in music. You pound and beat a piano as pain pounds and beats you. You are improvising.

There is a legend that Ludwig van Beethoven lost a penny one day and got peeved about it. A penny was a heap of money. So the master plopped down at his piano and tore into the keys. He was improvising. He was angry. He was putting his feelings in music. The great mas-

ter wrote "Fury Over a Lost Penny."

I am not saying "Fury Over a Lost Penny" was swing. Oh, no! If I said that, Leonard Lieblich, our music critic, would come to my office with five bars, an overture and cleff me one.

After Beethoven improvised his "Fury," he could have swung it; that is, give it its head—just go wild with it—pound it, beat it, jump on it, snarl at it, shriek and grumble. Then he would have been "jamming" it. He might have made it a "Killer Diller," a scorching bit of swing. If that had happened, the master would have been "jiving." Does it make any sense to you? No.



All right, let's take this tack: Stand outside a school some afternoon when classes are dismissed. Hear the children shout with glee. They are giving themselves "the head"—shouting and improvising. There's a melody in those shouts. If you knew music and

could arrange the shouts of school-children from their improvisations you could swing the improvisation by stepping up the tempo—jamming it. Out of it all might come a great swing classic.

Silly? I think so. But hear how Raymond Scott wrote "Dinner Music for a Pack of Hungry Cannibals."

Scott's band was rehearsing. The drummer was sitting by a microphone and a sea-shell was on the mike. Yes, an ordinary sea-shell—one of those things that go "w-h-ho-ho" when you put it to your ear. A trumpet-player was blowing into a pail of water. The result was a hissing sound with a wild, muffled drum effect in the distance.

That, said Scott, is the beginning of that dinner music for the cannibalistic brethren. The music is supposed to make you think you are approaching an island, an exotic island—palm trees! Sand! Winds! Waves! Whispering grass! Chiggers!

The music surges! You can picture the cannibals coon-jining and swinging it while the pot boils. It's very realistic. You almost can hear the boys fussing over whether the missionary will be served with mustard or Thousand Island.

Scott's dinner-music is the tops, the "alligators" tell me. But I'm partial to his "Reckless Night on An Ocean Liner." I get seasick when I hear it.

Now I'm not picking any quarrel and I mean this as a compliment, but the best swing music I ever heard is a fox-hunt with the hounds "giving it their head" and "jamming." It's genuine swing, if Operatives A to Z make a correct report.

The hounds take off, panting and leaping. They smell a fox. Then they improvise. Really. They just bay what they want, then mouth and groan and yelp. Then they start swinging when they get close to the fox, and the



chorus rises and soars and almost blows the stars out of the sky. There's a swing song for you—"Moon Madness of a Pack of Cock-eyed, Red-bone Fox Hounds!"

Have you any idea what swing is now? All right, forget it. Even those who do it don't understand it. Louis Armstrong says "It's something you've either got or you haven't got." Duke Ellington says "It don't mean a thing if you haven't got that swing." Bunny Berigan of Columbia says it's a certain lilt that creeps into music when you're being completely yourself.

"I'll show you," said Bunny. He put his trumpet to his lips and blew. It was a chorus of "Occi Chiornia." It was cock-eyed, punch-drunk music.

No two musicians swing alike. It's personality music, freedom of expression. Such music is barred in Germany. Negro bands are not allowed to play in that country and Negroes are natural swingers. Then, too, swing is supposed to induce a feeling of freedom. If that's freedom and liberty, then give me death.

"Alligators" and other swing victims will argue seriously that Germany bars swing because it's impossible to regiment a swinging multitude. They say a people who will let themselves go and whoop and bounce simply haven't time or inclination to go around stiff-legged and "heiling Hitler." Maybe they could swing that "Heil Hitler" chant. Did I say let Hitler swing?

The vocabulary of swingsters is marvelous. It's something that makes word-lovers go into trances, for the "alligators" and "ickies" really are swinging the American language. And American language is the only language that can stand such a strain, the only language flexible and tough and expressive enough to give swingsters "their head."

What would an Oxford professor say if he heard this statement:

"Don't die on me because we are going to jam and then jive and take it off the cob and get with the gutbucket. The cats are crying for a killer diller. Mute that derby on the second chorus. We need a lift on that woodpile, then let it ride. Go hard on

the agony-pipe and grunt-horn and don't be corny."

For the benefit of those whose brains are swinging, here is a primer of swing expressions:

Barrelhouse or **gutbucket**—real low-down music.
Jam—to improvise.
Jive—same as **jam**, only wilder.
Cats—swing fans.
Ickies—cats who love sweet music.
Alligators—swing addicts.
Killer diller—a hot swing tune.
Corny—amateurish.
Off the cob—better than corny.
Agony-pipe—clarinet.
Woodpile—xylophone.

"Alligators" will argue until doom's day about when swing really got a toe-hold in America and whence it came. This much is beyond controversy: it is typically American, and swing as we know it is the stepchild of jazz. Negro bands of the South have been swinging music a long time. Many of the musicians can not read music, so they just play what they feel, improvise, and because they are natural musicians they make a melody of it.

King "Papajoe," a New Orleans Negro, was swinging music years ago.

Nick LaRocca and his Dixieland Jazz band used to swing it when I was a boy. He had a trumpet, clarinet, trombone, piano and drums in his band—a wild combination. He and his boys had to make up their music as they played, as none could read music. Some of his best hits were "Tiger Rag" and "Livery Stable Blues."

His style was wholly different from the Handy school of musicians. Handy began the blues; out of the blues came jazz and out of jazz came swing as we know it.

Please believe me when I say I mean this with all respect. But I heard

swing music when I was seven. It was at a Negro camp-meeting, a religious revival. The Negroes "got happy." They shouted and sang. They improvised. Out of that came a melody. I've heard Negroes swing the most sacred spirituals. And I've seen white folks come from miles around and listen, and "stomp" and smile and weave.

One of the easiest songs for a Negro to swing is "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot." But when swingsters started swinging "Loch Lomond" it started a row. So in defense of "alligators," I suggest it's rather silly to raise a howl about swinging a Scotch ballad when Negroes have been swinging spirituals for many years.

But many radio stations have barred the swinging of "Loch Lomond," "Comin' Thro' the Rye" and other sentimental ballads. General Manager Leo Fitzpatrick of Detroit's WJR objected strenuously. "They'll be swinging 'Nearer My God to Thee' next," said Mr. Fitzpatrick, and many anti-swingsters applauded him.

My! My! Mr. Fitzpatrick should attend a Negro revival meeting. I've never heard "Nearer My God to Thee" in swing time, but I've heard them swing "Revive Us Again" and "On Jordan's Stormy Banks I Stand."

Operatives A to Z polled musicians and "alligators" and compiled a list of arguments pro and con. The result was amazing. They found hundreds of musicians and radio listeners who will fight in favor of swing. Here are a few of their contentions in its favor:

"It stems from one of the oldest musical traditions—pure improvisation. Bach, Beethoven and Chopin gave whole concerts of improvised music. It gives musicians opportunity for greater expression, it puts the emphasis on music itself, it demands a greater technical ability than does the straight type of music. A swing man is not afraid to try something new. Swing was created by American musicians without benefit of foreign influences. The waltz is Viennese, the tango is Spanish, the rhumba is Cuban—swing is American. Europeans consider swing extremely artistic."

Arguments against swing include: "It has no sentimental appeal and emphasizes primitive rhythms. It allows too much freedom to the performer and it excites the audiences instead of soothing them. Swing players do not play evenly or smoothly with a simple melodic line that anybody can hear and whistle. It is not refined."

I do not like swing. Maybe I don't understand it. But neither do I like the arguments against it. I'm in favor of anything that gives more freedom to individual performers and I'm for any melody that can't be whistled.

Bandleaders quickly will take up the cudgel in the argument. Paul Whiteman, a fair judge, says swing is a form of jazz. "It is native," he says, "and like folk-music of other countries will some day form a vital part of American symphonic literature. There are many influences contributing to American music and jazz is its musical melting-pot, into which poured the blues, the hillbilly tunes, the work-songs, the Negro spirituals and the moderns. The future musical organizations will be forty-piece brass and wood-wind orchestras."

Brother Paul also makes a sage observation about dancing and slaps the wrists of those who wail that swing has made dancing immodest.

"Dancing today is really more decent than the old waltz," says Whiteman. "The Big Apple is like a square dance. In truckin', the dancers are not near each other. It's fine exercise. Morally, it is healthier than some of the dances in the past eras where dancers clung to each other."

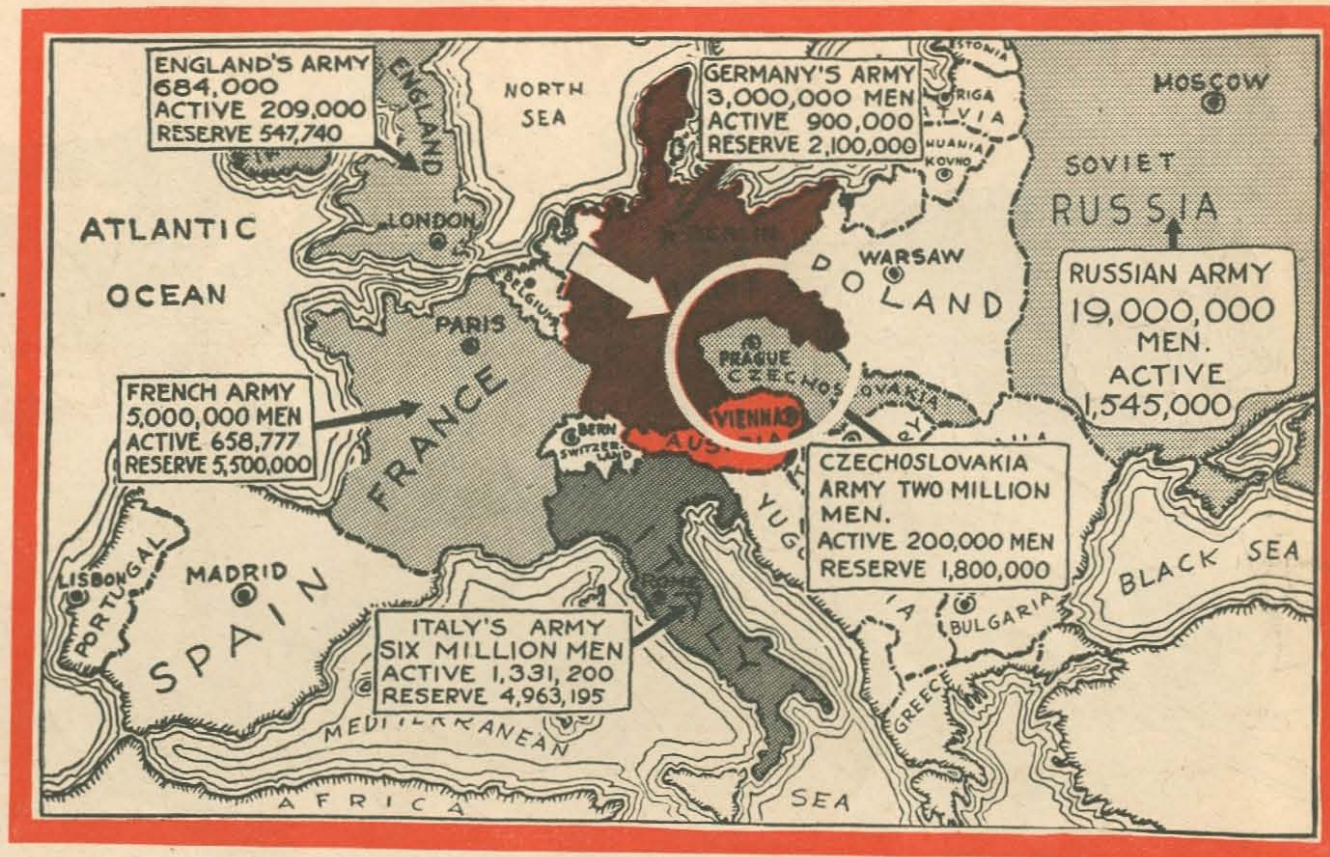
Bunny Berigan says: "Swing represents the trend of the times. It is the music of the future. The waltz has had its day."

NEWS!

It floods our homes today as never before. Our own glimpses into the lives of RADIO GUIDE readers show that more people listen to news broadcasts than to any other program. The world is crackling with events, history books are being acted out just beyond the horizon or just across the alley. Men are killing, looting, organizing, idolizing, advancing, retreating.

But where and why and how and when?

We want to know, and our loud-speaker tells us. It tells us faster, more clearly, more efficiently than any of man's other devices.

One night not long ago, radios in ten million homes were suddenly stilled. Listeners waited, ticking off the silent seconds in their minds. The soft hum of electricity turned abruptly into a rasp, a throat being cleared, perhaps, or the rattle of papers. Then, booming words:

"SPECIAL news bulletin! Adolf Hitler's German army invaded Austria tonight. Thousands of Nazi tanks and infantrymen are pouring across the Austro-German border and marching on the city of Vienna. Austrian troops have retired to their capital and thus far there has been no armed resistance."

That was only the beginning. From that hour, commentators and special bulletins and regular newscasts delivered to our ears the most vital fare the air offers. You could count with the fingers of one hand all those who tuned off those broadcasts. We got Boake Carter's slant, and Dorothy Thompson's, and Edwin C. Hill's and two dozen others. Whether we liked it or not, we were swayed this way and that by events as they were relayed to us. We hated the Nazis for their persecution of loyal Austrians and innocent Jews, or we admired them for the relentless efficiency of their machine. We cursed them as bullies or envied them for getting what they wanted.

Much of the world is angry today. There are hot-spots on every continent. Through our newscasts we feel the heat of outbursts in Spain, China, or along the Manchukuo border. Nearer home, we hear the crackling flames of pump-priming, politics and Depression. Things are popping everywhere.

These hot-spots must be understood properly in order to realize their significance. Today we hear much of Sudeten Germans in whose behalf Hitler threatens to upset the peace of a world. What are they? Why are they so important to Germany? Why has France announced that she will fight if Germany marches into Czechoslovakia? Why does Russia agree to supply China with arms? Why, to stray to other fields, does Japan send a boatload of sailors and marines to occupy an apparently useless island in the middle of the Pacific?

These questions are in every listener's mind at one time or another. Sometimes the news commentator explains. Usually it depends on his nationality and the wishes of his government.

News can be dangerous. Mussolini learned that years ago, so today no Italian reads a newspaper until it has been censored by Signor Mussolini's men. In Germany, Hitler polices both newsprint and the air. Only recently a German police officer crept down a suburban street in Hamburg, stopped in front of a suspect address, and slipped into the yard of a modest home. Nazi spies had told him what to expect. Here was a German, they had reported, who was committing the crime of listening to other than German broadcasting stations. The policeman placed his ear against the shuttered window. An English voice was speaking. News, from England, that Hitler could not control. Dangerous news!

TWELVE hours later a German judge glared at the citizen before him and pronounced sentence.

"You are guilty of treason to the state," he said. "Your punishment will be twenty years in prison."

We in America are raised on news and on the belief that freedom of news and the press is part of our birthright. We say to ourselves, "That could never

happen here." We say to ourselves, "Our papers tell us the truth, and our radio commentators tell us facts."

Do they?

Is our radio news honest?

Are our commentators and radio newswriters free of bias?

Listen to them tonight and tomorrow and down through the week. Prick your memory for flashes you have heard. Is it all news or is it part news and part coloring; is it partly tarred with the clever brush of propaganda?

A flash hit our ears months ago but it is still remembered. It said: "A squadron of Italian bombing-planes under the personal leadership of a son of Benito Mussolini successfully accomplished the dangerous crossing of the South Atlantic Ocean today, hopping from Africa to South America in one jump."

THAT was news, but it was also propaganda. It spoke between the lines of Fascist daring, courage and efficiency. John T. Flynn, an experienced and reliable journalist, reports that, "day after day the news comes through, cooked, colored, selected, guarded, censored by advertising agents." That is American news. But what of foreign news? Before it gets to these shores it is gathered by such government-controlled agencies as Reuters of England, Havas of France, Stefani of Italy, Tass of Russia, Rengo of Japan. What good is it, what does it mean, how much of it is true when it finally reaches our ears?

Recently the assertion has been made that sponsored news should not be permitted on the air because it offers too great a chance for abuse. For example, a great rubber company might have a news commentator on whom millions had come to depend for an accurate picture of the nation's news-front. Suppose that company's employees strike, picket the plants, and are attacked by company policemen, many of them being killed. Decidedly, it is not to the advantage of the company to place the news of those deaths and the rioting in its newscast. Just as decidedly, if they do not they are suppressing news that the public should have.

It is generally agreed that Europe is

moving toward a war which almost certainly will involve the United States. When that war comes we will face a grave and shocking crisis. More than one hundred millions of people will need to come to a decision for themselves, which, expressed in turn through their representatives, will become the will of their government. People without access to all the news and without the means of understanding all the news cannot make anything but one-sided decisions.

The map above dramatically illustrates the military establishments of Europe. It shows the tinder-box of Czechoslovakia half surrounded by a hostile Germany.

Because Hitler wants that country, all of us may be under arms next year, or rolling bandages, or placing a gold star in our windows.

With governments tottering about us, our own future as a nation depends upon intelligent action on the part of both leaders and the masses. Intelligent action depends upon our understanding of our condition and our interpretation of facts that are true. A free flow of news and a correct evaluation of that news is needed today more than ever. It can be obtained only by a knowledge of the inner bias, prejudice, enthusiasm, or phobia of the organizations or personalities who gather it, write it, and broadcast it.

To understand a Boake Carter broadcast, one should know if Carter is a labor-baiter and a Red-hater. One wants to know if Dorothy Thompson is a secret Fascist. Or if Trans-Radio News and the United Press are composed exclusively of news-writing enemies of President Roosevelt and the New Deal.

THESE things will be discussed in future issues of RADIO GUIDE in order that radio listeners may winnow the grain from the chaff.

Because of this importance, listeners should know the men who merchandise news. Know a man and you know how much of his story to believe. Know a situation and its implications and you know the true significance of events as they happen. Toward that end we hope to contribute our modest bit.

Frivolous Nocturnes

WITH so much excellent musical material on the air during the early hours of the evening, it must strike some dialers that suddenly at ten o'clock the presentations usually lose caste lamentably and in many instances even become puerile.

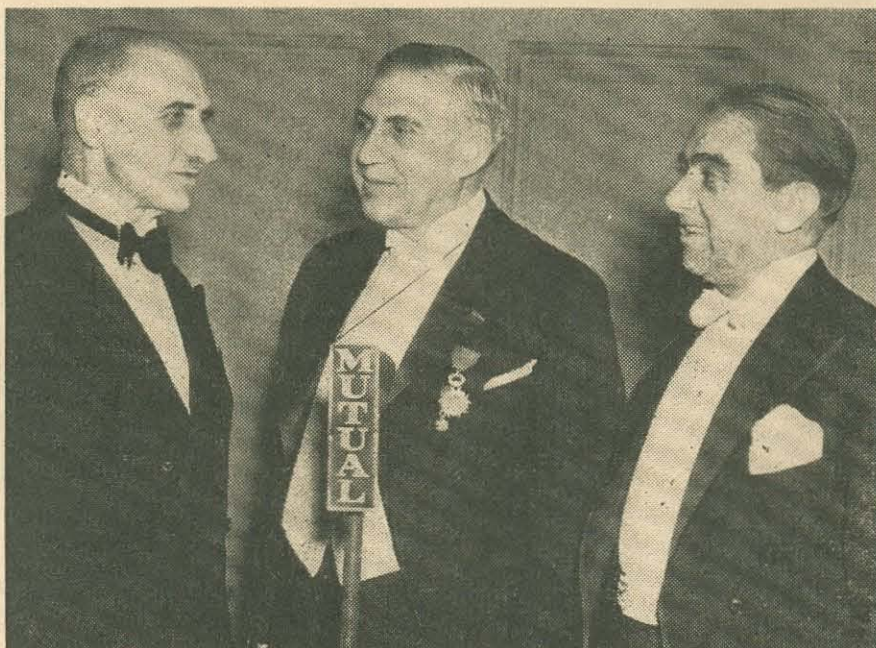
The only explanation of the poor late-night programs seems to be that both the advertisers and the broadcasting concerns have made up their minds that the overwhelming majority of Americans leap to bed at ten o'clock, and by 10:01 p.m. are saying their "Now I lay me down to sleep," an assumption quite preposterous. Midnight is far nearer the bedtime of the average person, and after ten o'clock his taste is no cheaper than before that hour—provided he stays at home. Many, in fact, resent having the deep shades of night made hideous by blaring jazz bands; having their dispositions shaken by the ribald sounds of revelry in the drink-and-dance resorts.

There is every reason why some fine solo and instrumental music would be welcome to most of us as relief from the varied earlier programs, with their comedians, dramatics, debates, and quizzical question-asking-and-answering. Speaking for myself, a dash of Beethoven is not unacceptable after crooning Bing Crosby or some Mendelssohn after the adenoidal McCarthy.

As a practical suggestion, I submit that "Keyboard Concerts" (5 p.m. EDT Wednesdays), "The Story of the Song" (3:30 p.m. EDT Tuesdays), Columbia Concert Hall (5 p.m. EDT Mondays), and the NBC Music Guild programs (Tuesdays at 2:30 p.m. EDT and Saturdays at 12 noon EDT) might be moved to late evening hours. They are among the most edifying artistic programs on the air.

Around the Clock

Concluding with the question of late-hour programs, let it be mentioned that there is one of outstanding musical appeal, "A Little Night Music" conducted by Bernard Herrmann, but unfortunately it comes only at occasional intervals instead of weekly. On Monday evening, June 13 at 10:30 p.m. EDT, CBS, Mr. Herrmann confines his list to one composer, Bernard van Dieren, born in Holland but long resident in London, where he died recently. As his music is complex and chiefly intellectual in appeal, Mr. Herrmann pays a real compliment to those listeners who stay up until at least 10:30 at night.

The Story of the Song

THE "Winterreise" (Winter Journey) cycle of twenty-four songs, of which Fritz Lechner sings twelve on this program and the remainder on the same series June 21, includes some of the loftiest lyrical inspirations of Schubert, like the familiar "Der Lindenbaum" No. 5 (The Linden Tree); "Fruehlingstraum" No. 11 (Spring Dream); "Die Post" No. 13 (The Post); "Die Kraehe" No. 15 (The Crow); and "Der Leiermann" No. 24 (The Organ Grinder).

To appreciate the cycle fully, one should understand German or else read the English translation of the text, whose story is that of a soul-wracked wanderer, betrayed by his sweetheart. His aimless journeyings find him heartsick and tortured as he pursues his way in implacable winter, with only a few intervals of hope, of passing sunshine.

THIS two-piano pair typifies full unity, for Alexander Kelberine and Jeanne Behrend are joined not only musically but matrimonially.

The lilting waltzes from Richard Strauss' "Der Rosenkavalier" lend themselves admirably to performances on two pianos, but even more welcome are the products from the pens of American creators of light music, a tonal field in which this country shines preeminently. It is narrow-minded for the higher musical circles to regard with disfavor all the "popular" products, as some of them are strikingly lovely in melody and harmonization and strongly original in rhythm. Gershwin's music is international in appeal. The best of Kern, Youmans, Porter, Schwarz, Rodgers, seems more acceptable to me than a great deal of the long-winded, dry and strident symphonic stuff we get from Europe these days.

ONCE a puzzle to critics, Brahms' first symphony now is a favorite of the public and seems to have taken the place in that regard of the "Symphony Pathétique" of Tchaikowsky. The more one hears the Brahms No. 1 the greater must be the admiration for its perfect form, haunting tunefulness and many moments of arresting rhythms and rich instrumental background.

The present-day practise of orchestrating works composed by Bach originally as solos for harpsichord or organ flourishes industriously, in spite of the croakings of dry-as-dust pedants. They regard it a sacrilege to tamper with any note from the sacred pages of Bach, and always appear to forget that he did the same thing to other composers, arranging, adapting and transcribing any of their compositions which pleased his fancy.

Conrad Mayo, young Italian-American baritone, has opportunity to shine with his resonant baritone voice as he sings of the busy Figaro from "The Barber of Seville."

CONDUCTOR MOLINARI has contrived to give us a quasi-novelty in the way of an operatic overture, for the one to "La Forza del Destino" (Power of Destiny) is not often performed at concerts. The reason for the neglect is strange, as the composition contains a succession of likable tunes and is orchestrated with generous brilliance.

The opera was the medium for the debut at the Metropolitan of Rosa Ponselle in 1918, when she jumped from vaudeville to a premiere with Caruso, an unprecedented honor for a youthful singer.

The late Ottorini Respighi left three works dealing with the Eternal City, the first being "The Fountains of Rome." The divisions of the symphonic poem are "The Fountains of Valle Giulia" at dawn, "Triton Fountain" at morn, "Trevi Fountain" at midday, and "Medici Fountain" at sunset. The composer expresses sentiments and visions aroused by four of Rome's fountains and their surroundings.

The opening part portrays a pastoral landscape and damp mists; the second part calls up frolicsome, dancing naiads and tritons; the third brings Neptune and his cohorts in procession; the nostalgic fourth is about tolling bells, birds in bed-time twittering, then follows the silence of night.

Radio City Music Hall
Inaugurates New String Quartet Series

Sunday, June 12, 12:30 p.m. EDT, on NBC

MUSIC HALL'S new series of well-known American string-quartet organizations in representative chamber-music compositions is another proof that Erno Rapee maintains the high artistic quality of the Sunday noon concerts under his supervision. Unlike some other program-makers, he evidently does not believe that the coming of summer calls for more frivolous musical communion than is customary in colder seasons.

Thoroughly informed music-lovers are aware of the fine delights offered by the repertoire of chamber works, but less serious listeners still need that enlightenment. A sufficient incentive for them should be the fact that the greatest composers have left a priceless heritage of ensemble examples, in the way of two-instrument sonatas, trios, quartets, quintets, sextets, septets, and even larger numerical combinations.

"Chamber music" is the term properly applied to all music intended for domestic use. Before the public concert became a recognized institution, chamber music was employed in contradistinction to music written either for the church or the theater. Wealthy and understanding patrons of the tonal art in the earlier centuries were especially devoted to cultivation of chamber music and had their own subven-

tioned composers and ensembles for the production of such artistic entertainment. It flourished richly during the Italian Renaissance, at the French Court of Louis XIV, and the establishments of the German kings, princes and lesser noblemen.

Haydn was the first major master to bring the form of string quartet into the form approximating that of his successors, chief among whom are Mozart, Beethoven, Schubert, Schumann and Brahms. The loftiest tribute to Haydn came from Mozart, who said, "It is from Haydn that I learned the art of writing quartets." Both composers piled up a large number of inspired works in that field, and no modern foursome would dream of omitting them from their repertoire.

In the latter half of the nineteenth century America began to have public concerts of chamber music and several organizations specializing in it toured this country from Coast to Coast. The famous Kneisel Quartet was founded in 1886, and in 1902 the equally celebrated Flonzaley Quartet came into existence. For many years their concerts helped to build up wide interest in chamber music, a campaign now carried on by the young players of the Gordon, Stradivarius, Musical Art, Perole and Coolidge Quartets.

Molinari Conducts Tchaikowsky's
Pathétique Symphony

Saturday, June 18, 9 p.m. EDT, on NBC

"I LOVE it as I have never loved any other of my musical creations." That was written to a friend by Tchaikowsky, and referred to the latter's sixth and last symphony, known as the "Pathétique," a title bestowed upon the work by the composer himself after its first performance in 1893.

Tchaikowsky's adoration of his symphony was shared by the public, although, tragically enough, he did not live to know it, for he died shortly after the premiere at St. Petersburg.

His death had in fact something to do with the immediate wave of tremendous interest aroused all over the world by the "Pathétique," that suggestive title seeming to be proof of the early report that he had committed

suicide. The truth is that he succumbed to an attack of cholera, brought on by drinking a glass of unboiled water during a slight local epidemic of the disease.

However, the "Pathétique" made its own irresistible appeal aside from the story connected with it, an appeal based on its intense emotional character, which stirred the imagination of every susceptible hearer. Before the symphony became universally familiar, I remember many performances at which I saw hundreds of the auditors wiping tear-stained faces. I confess that I was among them, and to this day I am deeply moved by the beatific main melody in the first movement and the overpowering melancholy of the final pages.

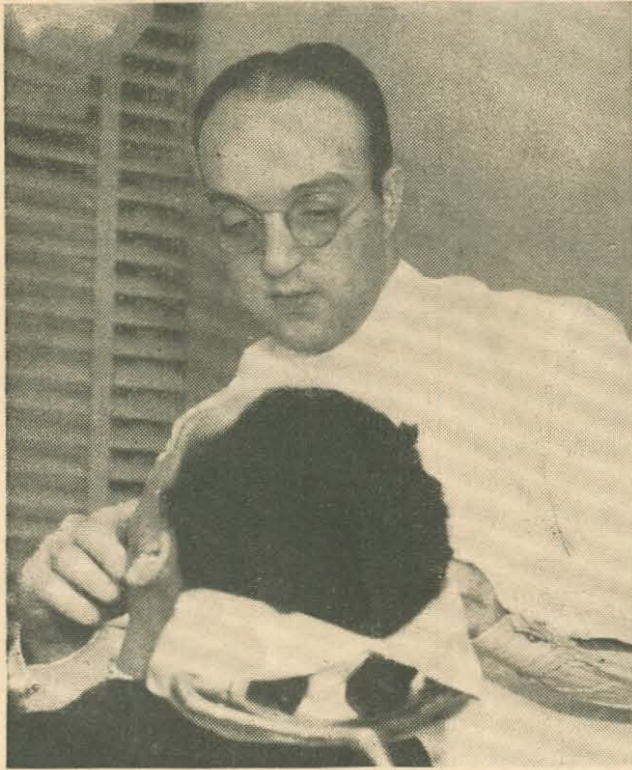

If a list of individuals who are peace-loving in spirit and belief were compared with a list of those who have opposing tendencies, the difference would be inspiring. It is sad to note, however, that as widespread as this tendency of individuals is towards peace, the fact remains that there have been only a few instances where peace-loving people and peace have abided together for any great length of time. Outstanding among European countries in this respect is the enviable record of Sweden, a record that boasts of eighty years of peace.

Thus, "Eighty Years of Peace" has been chosen by Hendrik Willem Van Loon, noted commentator now in Europe, for the title of his talk honoring the 80th birthday anniversary of Sweden's ruler, Gustav V. Commentator Van Loon's talk will be heard over NBC on Wednesday.

King Gustav will speak the following morning, Thursday, during a broadcast of the civic celebration of his birthday. Both programs will be short-waved to America from Stockholm.

Sweden's beloved King was born on June 16, 1858. He was very active in affairs of state in his youth, repeatedly acting as regent during the absence and illness of his father, Oscar II. On December 12, 1907, he succeeded to the throne of Sweden, taking for his motto "With the People for the Fatherland."

Battle of Gettysburg Honored by Pennsylvania

Thursday, CBS, 10-10:15 p.m.

The second and last program in the short two-broadcast series sponsored by the Pennsylvania State Publicity Committee will be dedicated to the 75th anniversary of the historic battle of Gettysburg and the final joint reunion of the Blue and Gray which will be celebrated on the 16,000-acre battlefield of the national shrine at Gettysburg, June 29 to July 6. An address by Governor George H. Earle will highlight the program. Robert Golden's orchestra will offer a medley of Civil War songs as the musical portion of the broadcast.

On Short Waves

THE International Telecommunications Conference, recently held at Cairo, Egypt, made some important changes in those short-wave bands on which the broadcasting stations are located.

In what is now known as the intermediate wave-band, provision for broadcasting has been made between 2.3 and 2.5 megs (about 125 meters). Then there is a second band from 3.3 to 3.5 megs (about 87 meters), and a third new band between 4.77 and 4.9 megs (about 62 meters). These new bands are reserved for relatively local broadcasting services in countries lying in tropical or semi-tropical regions.

In the short-wave band proper, that is below 50 meters, the 49-meter band, which was 150 kilocycles wide has been increased to 200 kilocycles and the new allocation is from 6 to 6.2 megs. A new band 100 kilocycles wide, between 7.2 and 7.3 megs, has been created by allowing broadcasting to share with amateurs, except in the American continent. This will be in the neighborhood of 41 meters. Then the 31-meter band which was originally 100 kilocycles wide, has now been extended to 200 kilocycles, the new figures being 9.5 to 9.7 megs. No changes have been made in the 25- or 19-meter bands. The 16-meter band, however, has been extended, making it 100 kilocycles wide instead of 50, the new limits being 17.75 to 17.85 megs. The 13-meter band has been extended from 100 to 300 kilocycles, the new band running from 21.45 to 21.75 megs. These changes in the allocations of wave-bands will definitely come into effect on September 1, 1939, but most stations will have made any necessary alterations in frequency long before this date.

The new regulations, while not offering a panacea for all of the ills of overcrowded wave-bands, are at least a step in the right direction and should sufficiently relieve the general situation that much improved reception will result.

If conditions for reception from Sweden are favorable on Thursday,

June 16, at 10 a.m. EDT, listeners may try for King Gustav's 80th birthday address direct over SM5SX (15.155) of Stockholm, Sweden.

August Balbi of Los Angeles, Calif., reports hearing VUD2 (9.59), Delhi, India, at the unusual time of 10 to 11 a.m. EDT . . . According to Ray Shaffar of Waterloo, Ia., OAX1A (6.334), Chiclayo, Peru, is temporarily out of QSL cards but will verify all accumulated reports with new cards as soon as possible . . . Harold Schrock of Bloomington, Ill., has received information from "Radio Malaga," Spain, to the effect that it broadcasts daily in the interest of General Franco: On 7.22 megs from 10 to 11 a.m. and from 5 to 6:30 p.m., and on 14.44 megs from 6:40 to 9:45 p.m. EDT. The transmitter power is 700 watts . . . Preceding the 11:30 to 11:45 a.m. EDT transmission from HVJ (15.12), Vatican City, a clock may be heard ticking for five minutes, then the Clockes des Saint Pierre sound the hour, and the transmission starts with these words, "Laudetur Jesus Christus."

The spelling-match rage has spread to Great Britain. On Sunday, June 12, at 7:30 a.m. EDT, London and Dublin will tangle in an international spelling-bee which will be heard over GSF, GSG and GSJ . . . 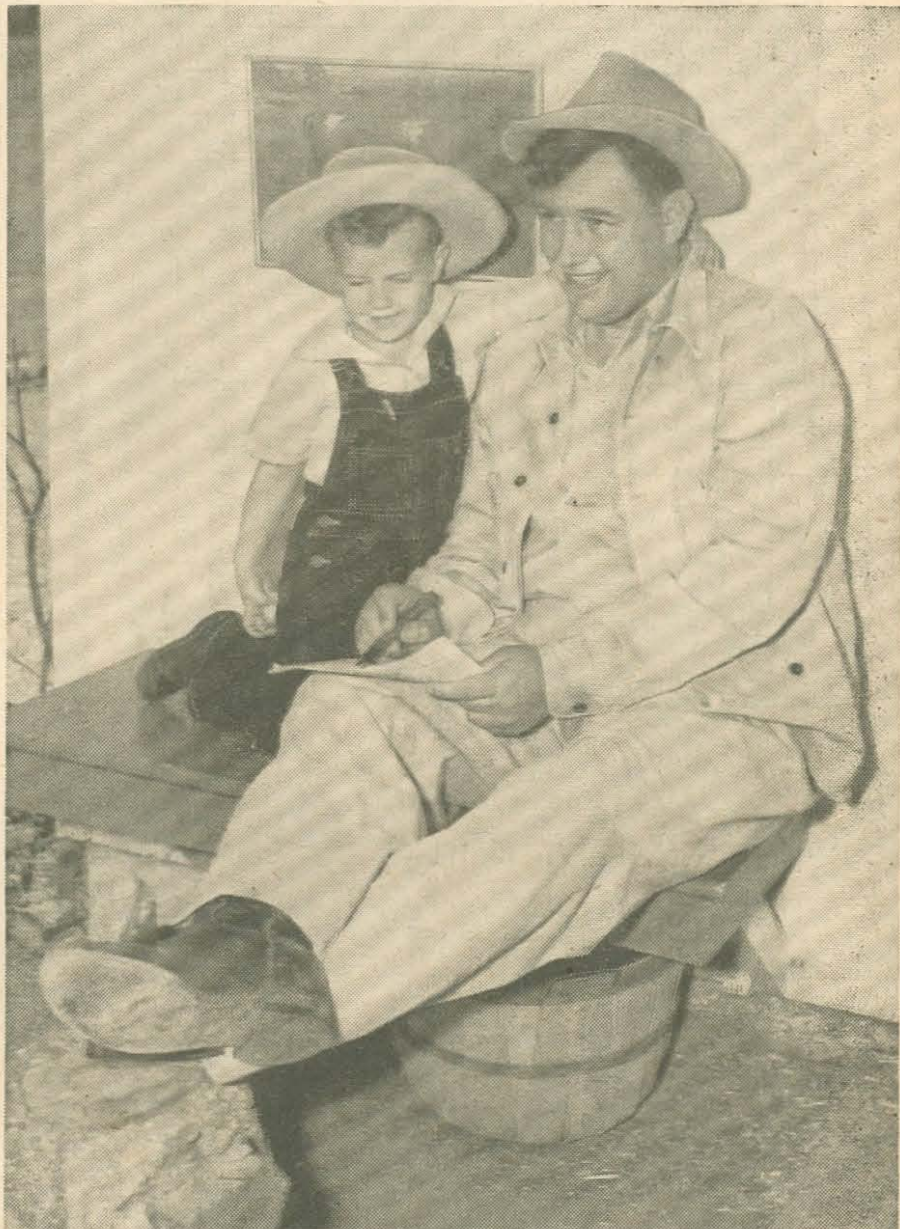

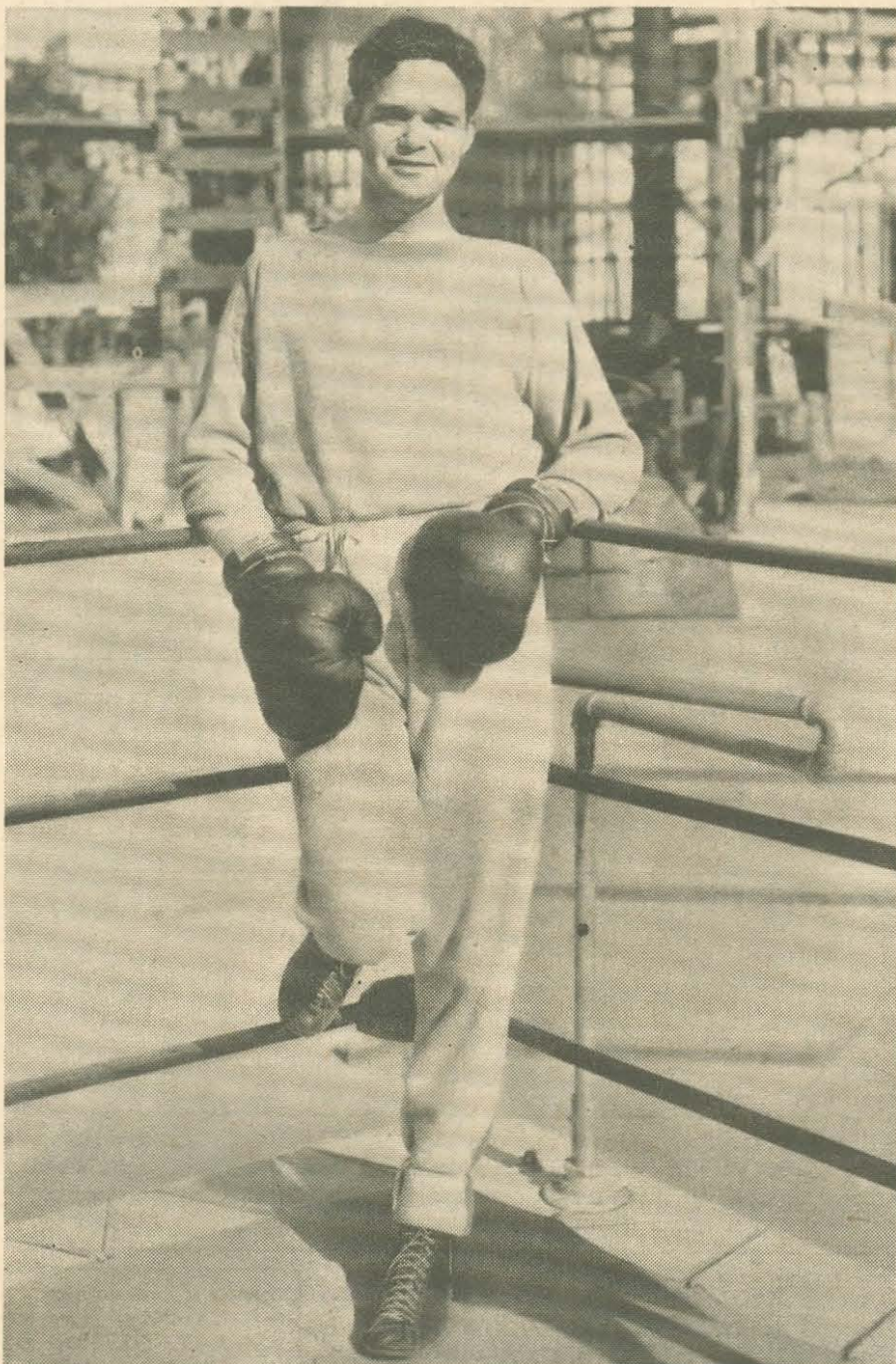

Other featured members of the Dude Ranch include Lucille Davis as Mrs. Smythe-Smythe, who can never remember whether she's been married six or seven times, but who is enjoying her vacation at the Circle D very much indeed, my dear; Bill Marquis as Lord Chumley, an Englishman who is just beginning to find out that he isn't in danger of being scalped every moment that he stays in the Northwest; Ernestine Flannery as Virginia Calhoun, a Southern gold-digger from Mississippi, who started out to land Lord Chumley for herself, and now that she is about to succeed, has actually fallen in love with him; and Jimmy Barber as Colonel Calhoun, Virginia's father—a synthetic Southern colonel paying ardent court to Mrs. Smythe-Smythe and her millions in hope of becoming her seventh—or eighth?—husband.

Traditional Western music from the Ranch-House gang, under the erratic baton of Arizona, rounds out an evening at the Circle D—to make an hour crammed full of the true spirit of the Northwest.

Dude Ranch comes from the pen of Jimmy Barber, production manager of KGVO, and with the enthusiastic cooperation of his cast of talented actors, he has created a set of characters whose names are household words in the territory served by KGVO.

As glamorous, as colorful, as exciting and as dramatic as dude ranch life itself is KGVO's "Dude Ranch" program—whose assigned hour from 8 to 9 MST on Tuesday evenings is a highspot in the week of radio entertainment to Northwest listeners.

HAS SWING SWUNG?

George Hall retorts: "The waltz is a lasting influence, not some musical fad."

Tommy Dorsey cuts in, "There will be swing as long as there is youth to scream for it."

However, the consensus is that swing is passing, or at least growing up and calming down. There always will be swing masters like Scott and Goodman. Most of the "name" bands never have played "gutbucket." Some not only resisted it but campaigned against it.

Lou Breese, of Arthur Murray's Dancing School, is one. Breese says his music is strictly for dancing and is opposed to swing.

Horace Heidt also thinks swing is finding itself. Eddy Duchin never has swung a tune and other leaders point to his enormous popularity as proof that swing is fading.

RAYMOND SCOTT and Benny Goodman are the hopes of the "alligators." Scott particularly has been criticized by anti-swingsters. But Mr. Scott can take care of himself and has a right to be heard, so he says:

"Music to me is any sound which creates an emotional reaction, whether it be the booming of cannons or the perpetual rolling of the seas.

"History illustrates that the lasting value of musical works has never been weighed in one generation and even our foremost composers never received fullest appreciation until after their death.

"I have attempted to elevate the standard of present-day swing music by combining classical forms of descriptive idioms with the hot-cha razz-ma-tazzle of rhythmania. Although I have tried this in a popular vein, more or less, there are today recognized symphonic composers who are employing the same musical formulas in their writings. Stravinsky (ragtime for 11 instruments), the late Ravel (Bolero), Morton Gould (Chorale in Fugue in Jazz Form) and many others are among those who are exploring the wider fields of jazz rhythms and advanced harmonies in an attempt to unshackle the limited bounds restricted by our early music.

"To those who dislike 'Twilight in Turkey,' 'Powerhouse' and other tunes of mine, I can only plead for tolerance."

Well put, Mr. Scott. However, Operatives A to Z still insist that a majority of musicians say swing has swung and that time will prove them right.

DeMille, Jean Hersholt, Frances Langford, Ruby Elzy, Raymond Paige, Louella Parsons, Lud Gluskin, Dave Broekman, Joe Penner, Gene Austin, Lanny Ross, Lum and Abner. No sponsor in America could afford such an array of stars—\$150,000 would be a conservative estimate of the money that would be required to engage all of them for one night—but they gladly appeared on the CBS dedicatory program! And the stars, no less than the thousands of spectators who jammed the studio for the opening, were thrilled at the combination of beauty and utility that is Columbia Broadcasting System's new home!

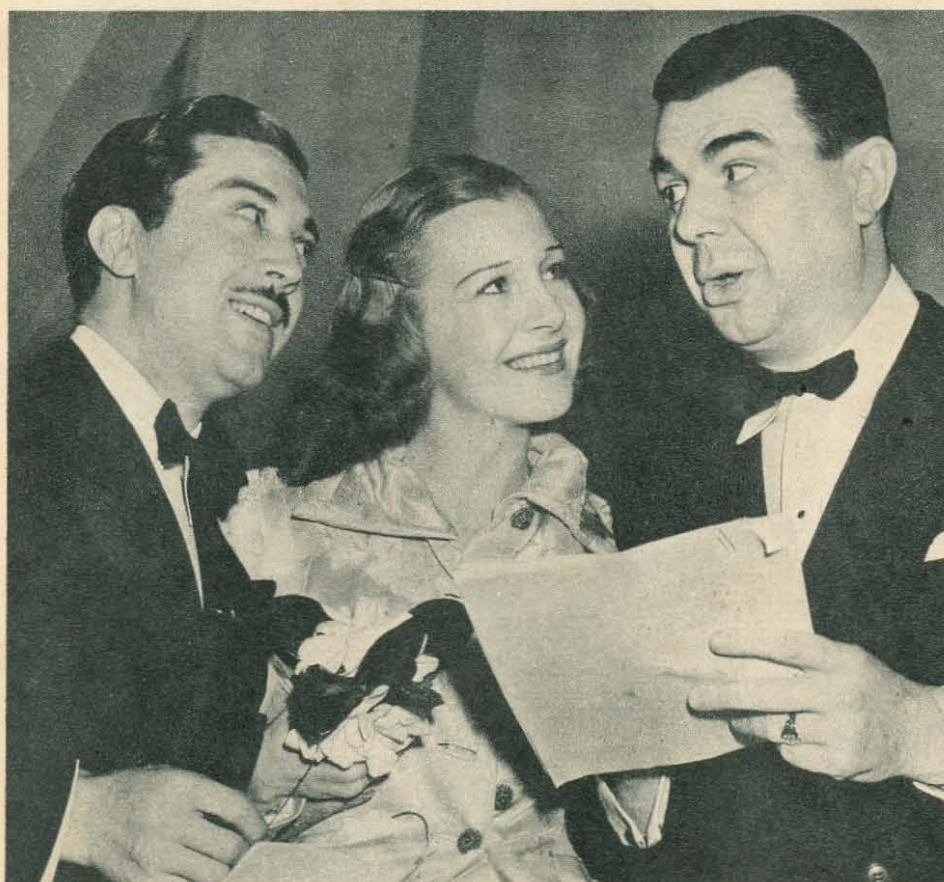

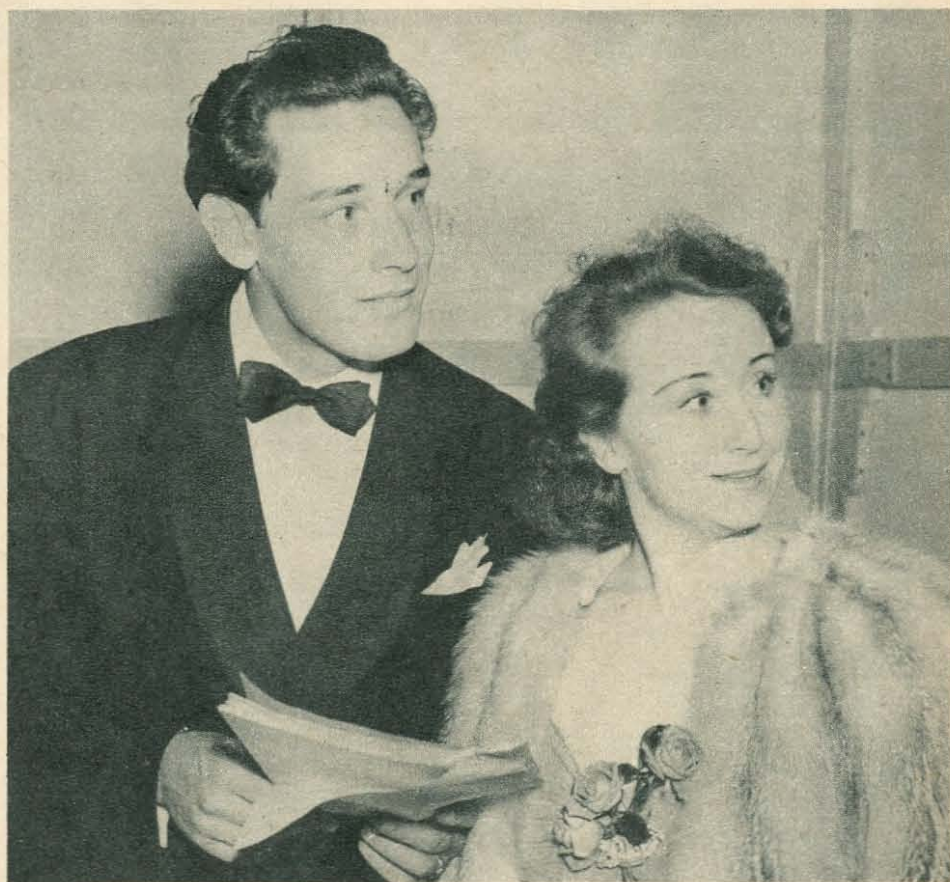

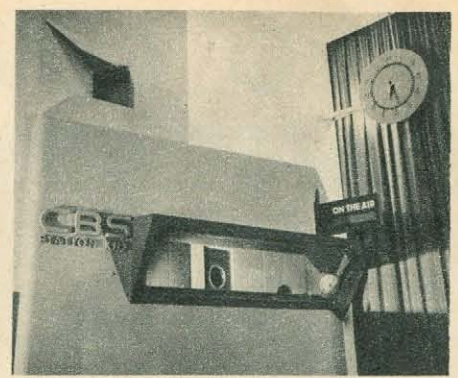
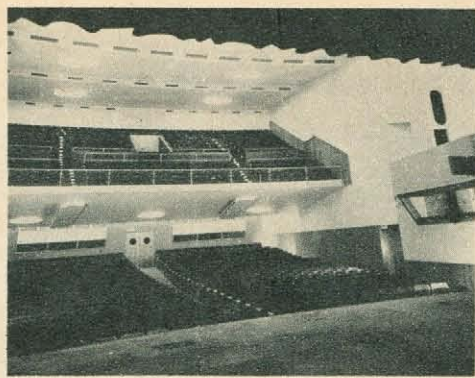
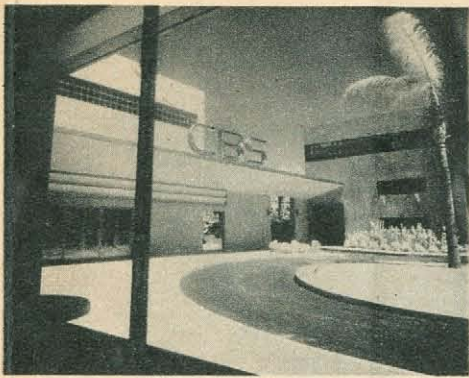

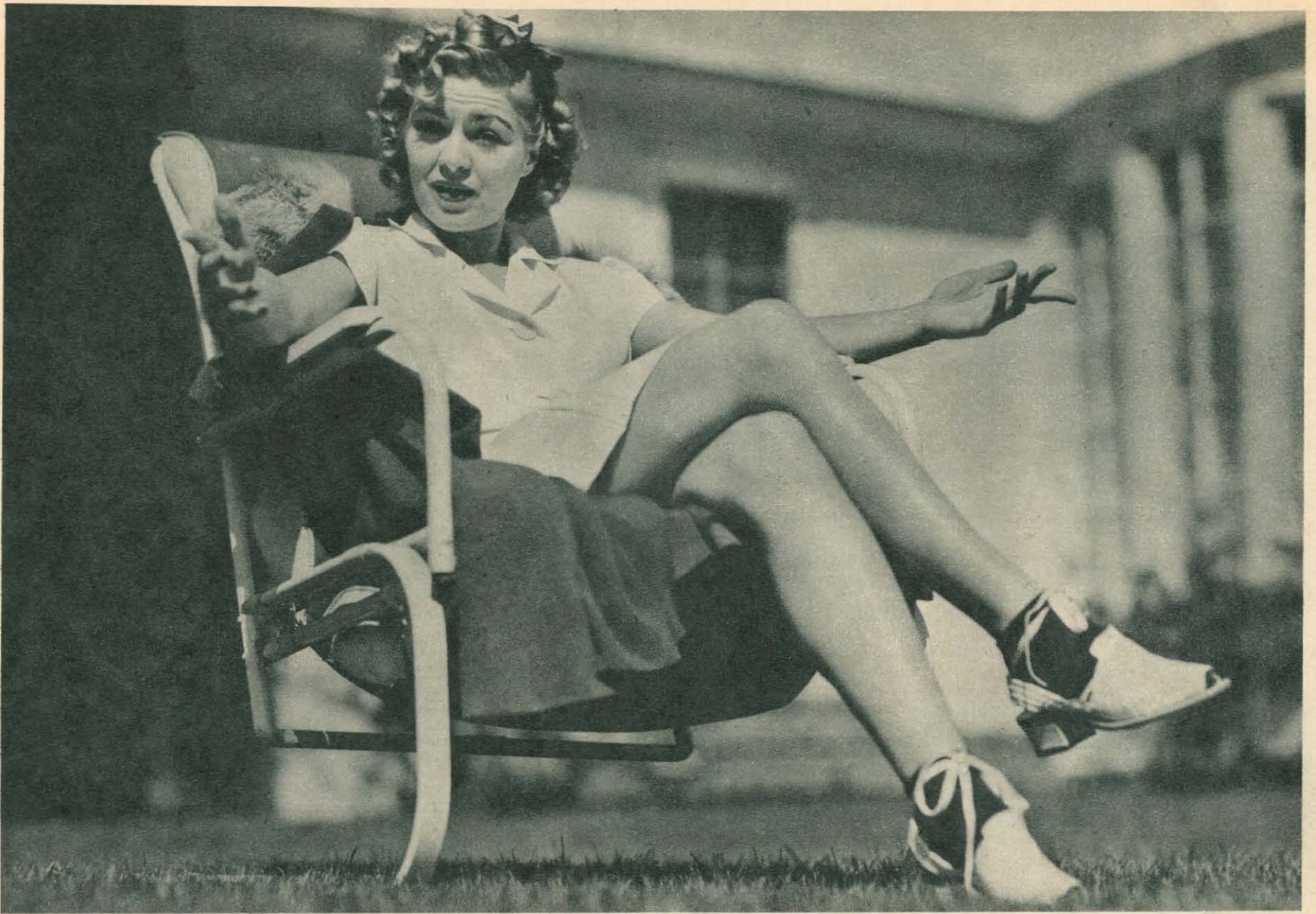

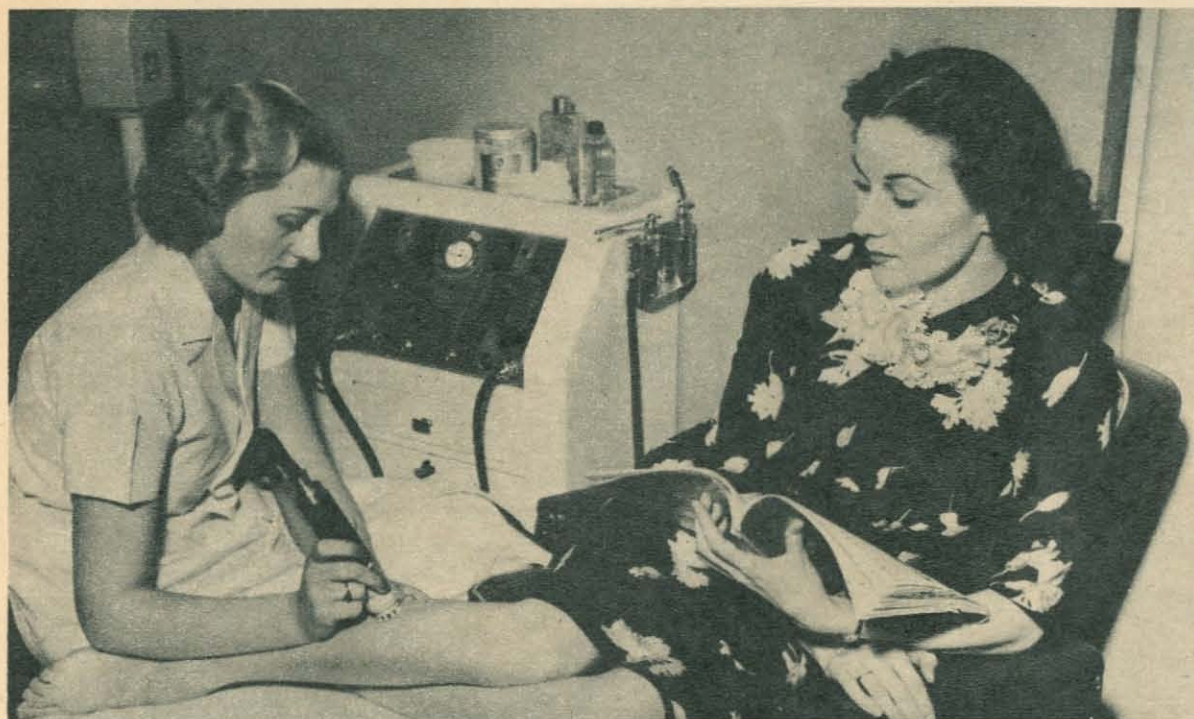
