

Nazi Tactics

Linton Wells, whose broadcasts on the RCA Magic Key program have made him a welcome quest in every home, gives us an interesting insight into German radio tactics. Those of RADIO GUIDE'S readers who have read James Street's stories about international broadcasting will find his report of significance.

During Mr. Wells' recent visit to South America, he attempted to tune in the speech President Roosevelt delivered on June 25. It had been announced well in advance and many others also wished to hear it. As it began, however, it was blotted out by a German piano recital from a super-power German station which went off the air immediately upon the conclusion of the President's talk. This was explicitly a violation of radio agreements and treaties which have been made by our country and Germany.

Such tactics on the part of the Hitler regime are typical, and reveal the unfair obstacles put in the way of our own nation when we seek friends beyond the Rio Grande.



AST summer, a total of 3,500,000 persons crowded into Chicago's Grant Park to hear the world's greatest music, performed by the world's greatest artists, in a series of concerts without parallel in the musical history of America. Crowds ranging up to 225,000 jammed the well-kept greensward in front of the big bandshell on the shore of Lake Michigan. When there were no more seats, they sat on the grass; they brought newspapers, blankets, pillows, folding chairs anything and everything. Grand-mothers came to the concerts, and so did babes in arms. The people came from big office buildings just across Michigan Boulevard from the park, and they came from the farthest-flung suburbs of Chicago. In their thousands and tens of thousands, they came to prove that a sternly realistic Chicago union leader had been right when he declared that, given the opportunity, the common people, the man in the street and his wife, would flock to hear the world's best music—the great classics of all time.

And the thousands who sat enraptured under the star-studded summer skies in Grant Park were only a part—a very small part—of the millions of music-lovers who actually made up the audience. For Grant Park concerts are broadcast to the nation by all three of the great networks: the National Broadcasting Company, the Columbia and the Mutual Broadcasting Systems have all brought the superb Grant Park concerts to the radio listeners of America. On almost any night in the week you can tune in a Grant Park concert.

There are other popular summer con-

certs in these music-loving United States. New York has its Lewisohn Stadium concerts, the people of Boston can hear a great symphony on almost any summer evening, Philadelphia has its Robin Hood Dell concerts—from Atlantic to Pacific, the list is long. But for sheer size, for wealth of star per-formers and vastness of audience, Chi-cago's Grant Park concerts stand alone.

Almost single-handed, one man cre-

ated the Grant Park concerts. The man was dynamic, hard-boiled little Jimmy Petrillo, member of the Park Commission of the Chicago Federation of Musicians. Petrillo has a way of getting things accomplished despite any chance ob-stacles that may be in the way.

This is a great thing for the people of Chicago, there's no doubt about that," Petrillo says, "but it's also a great thing for my people—the musicians in the union. I did it for them—for my

IMMY PETRILLO has done a lot for "his people." They say in Chicago that Petrillo is a czar, a dictator—that he rules over the musicians' union with an iron hand. They'll tell you that no union boss, not even John L. Lewis himself, is harder-hitting, more unyielding. But he does get things done, and that, after all, is what they pay off on. Since Jimmy Petrillo took over the union, a wave of prosperity has swept over Chicago musicians. No longer do dance-hall proprietors, theater owners, or other employers of musicians try to "squeeze" the men who provide music for them. They don't dare, because they

know that if they did, they'd find themselves on the receiving end of a phone call from Jimmy Petrillo—and after that, they might find it a little hard to hire

so much as one good musician in the city of Chicago.

Yes, Jimmy Petrillo, short, dapper, a fighting man from the word "go," knows how to take care of "his people." He's happy that the people of Chicago have an opportunity to hear great music beautifully played—but most of all he's happy for the hundreds of musicians who have found steady weekly em-ployment through the Grant Park concerts and the affiliated parks in outly-

ing Chicago.

There's nothing bashful about Jimmy
Petrillo. He's willing to admit that he
had more to do with the inauguration of the Grank Park concerts than did

anyone else, and he's perfectly candid in detailing the methods he used.

"First of all," he says, "I had to be a Park Commissioner. That took a long time. It was town he was been a long time. a Park Commissioner. That took a long time. It was tough, you know, to get, like all political jobs. But I got it, and then I went to work. It was my idea that the people of Chicago would understand and appreciate good music—and they do! Look, tell me," says the

earnest Mr. Petrillo, "tell me where else in this country you'll find crowds like we get out there. You won't, that's all, at least I don't know where you'd go to look for them."

"One fight I've had over these concerts," Jimmy Petrillo will tell you, "is over the question of paid admissions. See, the union puts up some of the money, and the Parks District puts up some. Well, every once in a while, somebody gets the bright idea, we'll charge admissions, make a little money out of these grounds that some out the out of these crowds that come out there. Maybe not much money, maybe only a dime or a nickel. You get 200,000 people, that mounts up. But every time anybody makes that suggestion, I fight it. And I'll keep on fighting it. You charge admissions out there at these concerts, and you'd find the whole picture was changed. The air would be different. Way it is now, the people can come and go as they like, it's a community spirit. But if we charged admission, it'd get commercial. I don't like that. I'll fight it."

People who know him will tell you that when Jimmy Petrillo really rolls up his sleeves and begins to fight, it's something to see—from a distance.

HARDLY a man of artistic temperament, you say. Right. Petrillo is no artist, but a hard-headed, practical man who knows how to handle artists—and how most artists need handling! Head of the musicians' union though he is Jimmy Petrillo is no musician himselfbut he has brought to Chicago such men and women as Lily Pons, Rosa Raisa, Marion Claire, Helen Jepson, Al-bert Spalding, Moritz Rosenthal, Vivian della Chiesa, Ephraim Zimbalist, and dozens and scores of others. Still to appear on this summer's series, for in-stance, are Gladys Swarthout, Alec Templeton, Jane Froman, John Charles Thomas, Bobby Breen! To hear artists of this caliber, Americans are willing to pay admission prices ranging from \$1.50 skyward—but in Chicago's Grant Park, a million dollars' worth of entertainment costs the audience nothing!



News on the Wing

Few professions, in America or anywhere else, are so adaptable, so easily made fluid to keep pace with changing times, as the profession of journalism. Particularly in the years since the World War, newspaperdom has undergone change after change. Old methods have been tossed into the discard, new and bizarre and striking ways of getting the news set up. In the old days-"the good old days" of American journalism, the days of Horace Greeley and the other greats of a period the like of which we will not see again, journalism, the presentation of the news, meant just one thing: paper and print. But all that has been changed now. News comes through in a dozen different mediums. Newest and most important of all is radio. Radio can bring the news to a million listeners almost before it has happened, and the dreams of many a newspaper publisher these days are full of weird figures, men and women who may be the reporters of tomorrow: reporters working with microphones and television transmitters instead of paper and pencil. Particularly well adapted to radio is the field of interpretive news, dramatized news reviews. There are many programs on the air today working on this basis. There is only one absolutely top-ranking one: The March of Time. Through the March of Time, the whole world passes before your loudspeaker. On the air Fridays at 9:30 p.m. EDT.

Three Years, One Million

Is there money in farming? Can a man hope to take great wealth out of the soil? Decidedly he can, if the example of Lester Pfister counts for anything. Pfister, scheduled to quest-star on the "It Can Be Done" program on Wednesday, August 31, started some time ago to experiment with new varieties of corn. Was he successful? He was, to the tune of exactly one million dollars! That is the money the Pfister hybrid corn earned for its originator within three years, making him just about the wealthiest man of his own acquaintance! Chances are that if you did you muttered to yourself something about wanton destruction of the taxpayers' property, something about grown-up little-boy vandalism. When firemen pour a stream of water into a house, someone among the spectators is sure to say, "Oh, they're ruining all that nice furniture! Wouldn't you think they could use chemicals, or something?" Few public servants are so thoroughly misunderstood as are firemen. A rare bird indeed is the citizen who knows the pressing reasons behind

a fireman's actions. This matter of window-breaking, for instance. In some types of fires it is imperative to break windows, because the pent-up smoke and gases, if allowed to become concentrated, may produce a terrible explosion. At other times, the windows must not be broken, lest they create a draft. For some kinds of fires, water is the only effective means of control; other types, fires of chemical origin, for instance, will react violently to water. Dry Farming

There are many more ways of farming than the world as a whole knows much about. The farmer of the Philippines, for instance, grows his rice in half-flooded marsh-land, as does his Japanese counterpart. Fantastic as it seems, it is perfectly possible to grow crops without any earth at all! Science has now proved that a mixture of nutrients in water will grow almost anything, the plants themselves being merely suspended in wire netting over the tanks of fluid. But most farming isn't that easy, rather to the contrary. Long hours, back-breaking toil, and a continuously uncertain outcome make the farmer's life a hard one. But there are many farmers who so love the land, the open spaces, the rich, good feeling of contentment that being in the midst of growing things can bring, that they would not leave it for anything else. They draw their life-blood from the earth, even though that earth is at times stubborn and recalcitrant. Europe's Lesso

What can we learn from Europe? It's a common enough question today as Americans look across the water at a continent either aflame or smoldering, from one end to the other. Most people feel, of course, that what we can best learn is what not to do. There is more than a grain of truth in that. It's a problem that will be thoroughly discussed on Wednesday, August 31, when Alma Kitchell interviews Mrs. Arthur Brin. The time: 2:15 p.m. EDT, NBC. The subject: "What American Women Can Learn from the Experiences Through Which Their European Sisters Are Passing." One such drastic lesson has been recently reported in dispatches from Germany. In preparations for what appears to be certain war, Adolf Hitler has found it desirable to conscript thousands of men for service in construction squads working on the border forts. When the trains carrying these men first made ready to leave Berlin stations, scores of women threw themselves on the tracks in a hopeless attempt to keep their loved ones from leaving them.

Severest Critic

Jimmie Fidler is the enfant terrible of the Hollywood radio columnists. He says what he thinks, and some of the things he thinks are well calculated to strike terror into the hearts of the movie colony. For no matter how big the star, he or she knows that Fidler's voice goes twice each week into millions of American homes, and a word or two from him may well spell the difference between success and failure. No other radio columnist is so unsparing with the rod of criticism, and when Jimmie Fidler starts to read his "Open Letter," listeners can be sure that they are about to hear solid, justifiable estimates of screen favorites. In addition to his radio program—on the air Tuesdays at 10:30 p.m. EDT and Fridays at 7:15 p.m. EDT (6:30 p.m. PST, for the West). Fidler writes a gossip column for newspaper syndication. Combining the "nose for news" with the slight naivete that a successful columnist must have, Fidler will probably be a top-notch star in his field for a long time to come.



Blackface Veterans

Comedians may come and comedians may go, but apparently the famed blackface team of "Pick and Pat" is going on forever. They first broadcast their amusing nonsense in 1927, and they've been big-time ever since. If that isn't a record, it will do until a record comes along. Pat Padgett and Pick Malone are both native Georgians, but they didn't meet until 1927, when both were in New York, broke, without jobs or prospects of jobs. They came together in an Automat, became friends after they had decided to pool their meager supply of nickels and have lunch. Their first job together lasted just two weeks. Next they went on the air-at 8:30 in the morning, with no scripts!-and scored an immediate hit. And they've been doing it over and over again ever since. At the present writing, it looks as if they'd never stop, and there are radio authorities who confidently predict that Pick and Pat will be doing their side-splitting stuff right up to the time when they have to be rolled up to the microphone in wheel-chairs.

In Ancient Days

The mysteries of the earth we live on are so many and so intricate that no one man can hope to wrest meaning from them all. But to the trained geologist the surface of the earth tells a fascinating story. To the layman, a hill in the countryside is just a hill; to a geologist it may be a sign-post, a trail-mark, left by a huge river of ice that passed by 50,000 years ago. Rivers, mountains, lakes—all have their stories to tell. If you like to learn something of the tremendous fascination of geology, tune in "The World Is Yours" on Sunday, August 28, at 4:30 p.m. EDT, NBC.

And nowhere, perhaps, do the peculiarities and quirks of individuality more strongly show themselves than in the hobbies with which busy people seek to amuse themselves. Front and center of hobby cultivation today, at least insofar as radio is concerned, is the "Hobby Lobby" program, broadcast at 7 p.m. EDT (7:30 p.m. PST, for the West), every Sunday by the National Broadcasting Company. This week five hobby-horse riders will present a veritable field-day for listeners. Scheduled for Sunday's program is Larry Nixon, of New York City, whose hobby is learning about tramp traveling; a Mr. Kincaid, of Cleveland, who collects airplane spark-plugs; and Irving Davidson of New York, whose hobby is the study of humor. The arduous business of tracking down cigar-store Indians to add to his collection occupies the spare time of Charles Sanders of New York, and he'll tell all about it. And Milton Feinberg of Philadelphia will tell how to grow rockgardens in watchcases!

GOOD AFTERNOON, FOOTBALL FANS

BY BILL STERN

We saw a boy playing with a foot-ball the other day. It reminded us that America's No. 1 college game is only weeks away from becoming our regular Saturday afternoon entertainment. Because there is so much to the game of which the listener must al-ways be unaware, and because Bill Stern of the National Broadcasting Company has brought to many audiences word-pictures of great games, we asked him to start our football-listening season with a written word-picture of the announcer's side of a football broadcast. Read this story and then listen on Wednesday to his description as last year's All-American Collegians play in the first game of the new season.

VERY Saturday afternoon in the fall of the year, I sit high up in one of the stadiums and become the envy of millions the country over.

In short, I'm a football broadcaster.

It's nice work—but don't try to get

it. Here's why:

Because you have to talk at a strained pitch for three hours without a let-up and maintain interest in a game long after you would have gotten

up and left. You have a chance to watch the teams for only three days, at the most, and then are expected to recognize any one of over a hundred men, from a distance of over a nundred men, from a distance of over three hundred feet, calling not only the right plays as they happen but the right players, as well as the ball-carrier and the tackler. Because all this must come forth as fast as it happens so that your voice beats the roar of the crowd. You must try to be impartial when one team is definitely inferior to the other. You try to paint with your eyes a scene that has never been really seet to canyon well do it. been really set to canvas, yet do it with words that all can understand. A smooth, continuous flow of words must go out over the air, even though you

yourself are listening to a cue coming through from New York on a set of headphones. Oh well, I could go on and on, but that's not the point of this

and on, but that's not the point of this story. Rather, let's review the 1937 football season.

It all started officially on September 1st in Chicago, when the College All-Stars played the Green Bay Packers. Hence, about four days early we hied Hence, about four days early we fined ourselves out to Chicago and began to study the players. The College All-Stars were picked from all the college teams in the country as a result of a popular poll, and were made up principally of stars of the previous year. Most of them I had seen play before, so it wasn't so difficult. The Packers were a different problem. As NBC does

not do pro games, they were all new names to me. It wasn't so easy to spot them all, but that took care of itself, and before we knew it September 1st

and before we knew it September 1st had arrived and we were all set for the kick-off of the '37 season.

This game was played in Soldier Field, Chicago, and playing football in Soldier Field is like playing water polo in the Atlantic Ocean. We couldn't even hear the cheers, our booth was so far away from the playing-field, but the echoes sounded pretty good. To improve matters, in the second half of the game a bit of a fog rolled in from Lake Michigan, with the result that there were moments when we couldn't see the playing-field at all. However, we went merrily along. Luckily, we and the game ended at the same time, and mighty glad we were to climb down from our lofty perch once more.

THAT held the fans for one week. Of course, a letter or two came in asking what the idea was of saying that there was no drilling of bands at half-time when the papers said that two bands had held the huge crowd spellbound with a highly intricate drill —but then, you know what kidders the



newspaper sports-writers always are. The next week, the game held in New York was sponsored by the Herald Tribune. To cooperate, we planned a special broadcast, with each of the players saying a few words over the air. We realized for the first time, much to our surprise, how many different foreign languages are taught in our institutions of learning. Why, would you believe it, the boys had mastered these languages so well that most of them

spoke with a foreign accent!

The game was played at the Polo Grounds and was a success in almost every way from a broadcasting view-point. I say almost, as one thing occurred to spoil a perfect afternoon. As this is primarily a ball-park at which they do not allow broadcasting, there is no broadcasting booth. Rather, you are placed in the regular scoreboard. Most of the slots, where they ordinarily put in the runs as they are made, left open for us to see through. This means that it is a continual game of hide-and-seek, dodging from one slot to the other. We tried to remember to keep the right holes closed so that the score would always be right for the forty thousand assembled there, but once in the excitement of a long run, unknown to us, someone took a touchdown away from the All-Stars by pushing out one of the scoreboard markers. Before we realized the mistake, about twenty thousand bleacher fans were threatening to kill the referee, thinking he had ordered the change.

NOW the season was to start in earn-est. The first big game was in Columbus, Ohio, where Ohio State clashed with T. C. U., as an opener for both. We got there, as usual, several days in advance and went to work studying the players. Francis Schmidt, coach of Ohio State, who the year before had been like a sphinx, took us to his heart and told us T. C. U. was too tough an opener . . . inside dope. Leo Mayer, coach of T. C. U., told us off the record that Ohio State was too tough an opener for T. C. U. We are just quoting this to show you what the inner workings are like to a radio announcer. They wouldn't have thought of saying that to you. Ohio State won the game, incidentally, but a little mite of dynamite named Davey O'Brien of Texas Christian was the best man on the field.

The one comical thing about this broadcast was that along in the third period our big NBC banner flying over the booth came down with a thud, draped itself across our window, completely blotting out the view, and it took minutes to free it-minutes when a nation was listening to the first big game of the year and when Ohio State was on its way to what proved to be the winning touchdown. No one will ever know what I would have liked to say in those minutes.

FOR the next week's game we went west. It was Notre Dame against Drake-little Drake not given a chance by the public but highly respected by the Irish. Drake lost, but went on to win the next six straight games after that. To us the outstanding part of the game was the moaning at South Bend that the team was not up to standard. It seems they had only 450 out for the team instead of the custom-ary 600. We got to know Elmer Layden pretty well and I can honestly say he is one of the best-liked and most-respected coaches in the business. He is one coach who actually has no secrets and comes as close to being

loved as a coach can.

Before the game, Coach Layden assured us that it would be an easy


broadcast as he expected to use only eight teams, not the full 450, and he did pretty near that. He used six full teams, and imagine our embarrassment when, in talking to him weeks later, we found out that while we had announced one team after another going in, he had switched backfields on several teams and lines on others. We were mighty glad to say good-by to South Bend before falling heir to a nervous breakdown—trying to remem-ber each player in that mob.

NEXT came the World Series weekend. This meant that we could get on the air for only the last half of the football game, as the series was on during the time of the first half. Well do we remember sitting in our booth biting our fingernails as the minutes ticked away in the Army-Columbia game. First, Columbia scored, then Army scored, kicked the extra point and took the lead. Columbia then regained its lead just before the end of the first half to go back out in front. We figured that the scoring was over, so as we took the air at the start of the second half, it was with a heavy heart. Imagine our joy, however, as the lead changed three more times, to wind up finally in Army's favor, giv-ing us one of the most exciting Saturdays in the season-and was Sid Luckman brilliant that day!

One thing happened that afternoon to disturb our calm. It was toward the end of the game. Army was leading, then came a moment of lull, in which we proceeded to read off some scores of other games. All was going fine, when suddenly we came across a piece of paper with the score of the game we were broadcasting. It was the wrong score, so as we read it we changed it to the correct figures. A few moments later another score was handed to us. Again it was our own game and again the score was wrong. We read it, and again we corrected it. A minute later came a message, "What's the matter, can't you read?"

THE Pittsburgh - Fordham taffy - pull came next. We had done this game two years in a row, and each year wound up with a nothing-to-nothing score, so this year we decided to skip it and grab the Harvard-Navy game in Baltimore. Result: We walked right into a Harvard O-Navy O tie. But that wasn't all we walked into. In the Baltimore stadium, the broadcasting booths, first of all, were on the wrong side of the field. This meant that if the sun was out it would be right in our eyes. Secondly, due to their moving the playing-field, the booths were on the ten-yard line. First, we tried to get them to change the booths to the middle of the field, then we prayed for clouds, but ended up on the ten-yard line on a cloudless day. The sun was in our eyes all afternoon and most of the play was at the far end of the playing-field. With the exception of the sun, the bad position to work from, and a scoreless-tie game, we had a swell afternoon.

The next week found us heading once more out west, out into the land of the Irish—Notre Dame. Navy was to clash with Notre Dame, so South Bend was our destination. We arrived early and once more began the game of memorizing some hundreds of players. Just to make things a little more complicated, Elmer Layden decided it had been too easy the last time, so now he wasn't going to make up his mind in advance as to who might play. After not sleeping for a couple of nights, we found that a few of the boys on the eleventh team had confessed that they were All-State players and Coach Layden was dusting them off as his start-

ing team. In came the Navy team and heavy, with some picking the Gophers with them cold weather. And was it by forty points. cold! We took the air that Saturday afternoon during a blinding snow-storm. The field was under a blanket of snow inches deep. The players tackled snowdrifts. The ticket-sellers froze. This spring when they opened the stadium for spring practice they the stadium for spring practise, they found a couple of newspapermen who had been buried there that famous Saturday afternoon last year. But seriously, it was snowing so heavily that we never saw the other side of the stadium, scarcely heard the cheers, and often called for hot coffee.

NO SOONER were we home than we were off for Minneapolis, where a little school by the name of Minnesota has some fair-to-middlin' teams. We arrived early, as usual, to watch the Gophers work out. They were the biggest, strongest, fiercest looking bunch of embryonic bachelor-of-arts students that these eyes have ever be-held. We also found interest in the game running high. Notre Dame was to be Minnesota's opponent, and the big boys from the West were all set to get in each other's hair. It seemed that Minnesota hadn't been licked at home since 1932, and the betting was pretty

SIXTY-FOUR thousand saw that game and sixty-four thousand got their money's worth. The day was beautiful, the booths good, and the teams evenly matched, all of which made a very smooth broadcast, but for one incident. One of our spotters was a former student, and was vitally interested in the outcome of the game—not only because of his former playing days but he had money on the outcome. Every time his team would make a few yards, he was the first to cheer, forgetting completely that he was working in a broadcasting booth. His remarks were something to hear. All afternoon I kept the mike as far away from him as possible, but lo and behold, came an exciting play, his team fumbled and the tide of the game turned. Out came an oath that would have made radio history. Luckily, I felt it coming and covered the mike with my hand. To the world in general, there followed a few seconds of silence, but to us in the booth an agonizing suspense until the controlman nodded that the remark had not gone over the air. Notre Dame won by the slimmest of margins, but (Continued on Page 17)

SCHUMANN, creating his quintet in 1842, was in the flush of his great love for Clara, whom he had married two years before. Their happiness and deep devotion are reflected in the romantic and spirited nature of this music. A few months after the completion of the quintet, it had its first performance at a private musicale in Leipzig. Clara was to have played the piano part, but fell ill and so it was read at first sight by a certain not-quite unknown composer named Felix Mendelssohn! He made some slight criticisms of the quintet, which Schumann accepted willingly. After the alterations and the publication, the composition at once took its place as a lasting favorite in the repertoire of chamber music.

A more introspective, somber and even tragic opus is that of Tschaikowsky, written in 1875 when he had a nervous breakdown and left Moscow to travel abroad in search of health. That spring his good friend, Ferdinand Laub, the famed violinist, had died, and to his memory Tschaikowsky dedicated the third of his four quartets. The composer's strong gift for the expression of grief is exemplified in the sorrow-laden chords of the first movement and the Funeral March constituting the third.

Amputated Music

Letters continue to come complaining of the minimum of good music on radio stations in the West, Northwest, South and Southwest; the writers say that even such occasional broadcasts are often ruthlessly cut off to make way for local jazz or hillbilly programs. The correspondents appeal to this department for help, but I do not know how to give it, except to publish this paragraph. Many of the local stations are not on the national networks, and the only remedy appears to be for listeners in such localities to band together in large numbers and send a concerted, signed request (or protest) to the offending stations.

Veteran Basso Art

Leon Rothier, long-time basso of the Metropolitan Opera (where the coming season will be his twenty-ninth at that establishment), made such a decided impression at his June 21 appearance on the CBS "Story of the Song" series that he has been re-engaged for its August 30 program. Being French, most of his roles at the Metropolitan were in that language, but his versatility enabled him to take part actively also in the Italian and German operas. His chief accomplishments are a refined sense of style, perfect French diction (which he often generously taught to his colleagues), and ability to act all his characterizations convincingly.

Now in his sixty-third year, Rothier is on the air, too, in his own series over Station WQXR, which broadcasts recorded programs in the New York area. Many noted artists have paid tribute to the fine French basso by making solo contributions to his radio programs.

All's Well with 1938-1939

There had been disconcerting rumors that owing to unfavorable business conditions some of the leading sponsored musical programs will not return to the air this winter. It seems, however, that the fears were premature, for business now is headed upward, and already announcement is made that we shall be able to dial Ford and Chesterfield as usual. From other sources the welcome news dribbles out that the rest of the elite programs also have secured time and may be expected to publicize their presence very shortly.

the human interest—the first prize went to Mrs. Gerschefski, Edwin's wife. Sitting as one of the judges was Howard Bærlow, and his vote for first prize went to the husband, but his fellow members were a majority against his opinion. "I like the composition greatly," said Barlow before the final verdict came, "and I'm going to program it, win, lose or draw." And so here it is.

The strange title of the Gerschefski score is not, as might be supposed, taken from a story or a poem, but refers to a picturesque river in Connecticut (near Norwalk) whose beauty is in danger of being marred by the erection of industrial plants along its shores. Now see whether you can find in the music, the composer's descriptive essays, his protest against materialism and his plea for the preservation of loveliness in Nature.

"Krakoviak" (from Glinka's cele-

"Krakoviak" (from Glinka's celebrated early Russian opera) is the name of a Polish dance, Borodin's oncepopular tone-picture of the lonely eastern wastes, returns to hearing after a too long absence from radio programs. The composition describes a passing caravan of horses and camels, Asiatics and Russians singing their native airs.

Look for the full revealment of the singer's sonority and temperamental drive in the satanic serenade by Berliev

HAVE told you before about the Neapolitan, Domenico Cimarosa (1749-1801), and his best-known and only surviving work "The Secret Mar-riage." Do you remember how reriage." Do you remember how re-markably prolific he was with his nearly eighty operas written in twentynine years? And his triumphal recepall over Europe? And that he excelled in comic librettos set to tunefully sparkling and fastidiously chiseled music?

When the "Secret Marriage," composed for the Austrian emperor, Leopold II, had its premiere before that monarch, he was so enchanted that he served the participants with supper and commanded an immediate repetition of the entire performance.

Cimarosa's end was tragic. Accused of taking part in the revolutionary demonstration against the march of the French troops into Naples (1799), he was condemned to death, pardoned and banished to Venice. Immediately resuming composition, he was at work on a half-finished opera "Artemisia," when he died suddenly. Report had it that political intrigants poisoned him, but the rumor was later disproved.

Cimarosa holds a world's operatic record, for in 1793, his "Secret Marhad sixty-seven consecutive performances at the Vienna Royal Opera.

CRANK BRIDGE, English composer, distinguished for symphonic and chamber music, has, however, won more renown in the latter branch of writing.

There is a reason for that, because Bridge's chief musical activity in his younger years was as a violinist in several famous quartet organizations, where he learned the nature and style of creations in the smaller ensemble forms. All his chamber works exhibit intimate knowledge of string instruments and their capacities.

The quintet, an early example from Bridge's pen, shows one fault of youth, the tendency to injudicious length, but already the coming expert displays important musical personality, sense of form and adeptness in workmanship. The slow movement reflects uncommon elevation and beauty of mood.

Bridge has not yet been made "Sir," a distinction conferred on most of the leading English composers, but his talents should eventually be rewarded with knighthood. By the way, he visited America in 1923-24 and conducted some of his orchestral compositions in New York, Boston and Pittsburgh.

Josef and Rosina Lhevinne Are One in Life and Art

Kraft Music Hall, Thursday, September 1, at 10 p.m. EDT, NBC

ISTINGUISHED pianists, Josef Rosina has resolutely refused to apand Rosina Lhevinne are able to give a warm affirmative answer to the long-asked question, Should Artists Wed? It has just come up again with Luise Rainer, film favorite, and Clifford Odets, acclaimed playwright, married about a year ago, now reported separated.

With the Lhevinnes no such career trouble ever manifested itself, and the coming season represents their fortieth year in public musical life, a period of unclouded wedded happiness and unbroken artistic successes indi-vidually and together. The anniversary is also the fortieth of their marriage, and both events are to be observed this winter with celebrations at home and on the concert platforms.

As the couple has two children, Josef naturally did more traveling and made more solo appearances, with the result that his name is perhaps better established than Rosina's, and that is according to her wish. She says-Mr. Odets will smile meaningly that when husband and wife are in the same profession, the woman must play second fiddle; in this case, second piano. The Lhevinnes carry out the idea literally, for since her marriage, pear as a soloist, but gives many recitals with Josef on two pianos. I might add that she is a splendid performer and when I heard her play the Chopin E Minor concerto privately a season or two ago, I was astonished at her musical command, highly polished style, brilliant technic, and unusual beauty of tone.

Josef, born in Moscow, began his musical studies when he was five and showed such precocity that the cele-brated pianist Safonoff (later conductor of the New York Philharmonic) took him into his class at the Moscow Conservatory, where the boy soon won the virtuoso diploma and gold medal.

Josef later gained the Rubinstein
prize and finally became professor of
piano at the Moscow Imperial Russian Conservatory. His American debut occurred in 1906, with the Russian Symphony Orchestra in New York Since then he has been touring this country and Europe when he is not teaching at the Juilliard School, where Rosina is also on the piano faculty.

The Lhevinnes will appear to-gether on the Kraft Music Hall program, and dialers are advised not to miss the occasion.

Bruno Walter Batons At Lucerne Festival

Monday, August 29, at 3:40 p.m. EDT on NBC

LTHOUGH his conviction that art should not be controlled politically or racially keeps Toscanini from assisting at Bayreuth and Salzburg, he made triumphal appearances recently at the Lucerne Festival in free Switzerland.

Following the glamorous Italian maestro in the Swiss lake-city, comes Bruno Walter, leading a concert of which forty minutes are to be broadcast to America on August 29, at 3:40 p.m. EDT, on NBC. The program will have some Wagner numbers as its special feature, a composer for whom the German conductor long ago established his love and understanding.

Walter, non-Aryan, is himself a victim of Nazi discrimination, being denied conductorship at the opera-houses and concert halls of Germany and

Teutonized Austria. Before Hitler and his executive buddies discovered the "degenerative" influences of non-Aryan music-making, Walter had been a prime favorite of the public in both of those countries. At that time no one even remotely suspected that he was weakening the Germanic character and poisoning the artistic taste of his compatriots!

Other countries are willing to take those terrible risks, however, and so Walter is showered with invitations to conduct there as often as his time permits during his prolonged tours throughout the year.

America has had him since his exile from Germany, and he served brilliantly for several seasons as co-conductor with Toscanini for the con-certs of the New York Philharmonic.



T'S nice being back on the job again after spending a vacation that I shall never forget as long as I live. Sho' 'nuff. Met some folks from North Carolina on the boat and they were mighty nice people, so if my scribbling suggests a touch of southern dialect "you-all" will know the reason why.

Wherever I went I asked at least one person about his radio-listening habits. For instance, up in Gaspe, Canada, our guide and chauffeur told me most of the townsfolk listen to the United States stations and that the news broadcasts were the most popular because they kept them informed of the latest world events. When asked his favorite program, he replied unhesitantly: "The Saturday Night National Barn Dance," and added that he believed he was expressing the sentiments of most of his neighbors. The next question was, "How do you like Charlie McCarthy?" I almost passed out when he replied, "Never heard of him." "How do you like Jack Benny?" was our next query. I quit asking questions when he replied, "Never heard of him either." Thus, sponsors can get a rough idea of what listeners across the border want from their loudspeaker.

Not much has happened along Radio Row during my annual holiday. However, after many phone calls here are the latest items to reach my ears: Texaco has purchased time on the CBS network for a half-hour program to be heard Wednesday nights starting October 5. At this writing the sponsor is trying to decide on one

of several big names for the show, which will more than likely originate in Hollywood . . . Bob Benchley, who was being considered several weeks ago by Texaco, now has Old Gold ciggy execs discussing the possibility of the humorist heading an air show for them.

They tell me Donald Novis has been signed for the Fibber McGee and Molly show when it resumes broadcasting,

which is good news . . . Frank Parker may appear on the first Burns and Allen shows, which will emanate from New York. Georgie and Gracie will stop off in Kansas City and make a personal appearance at the Jubilesta . . . Last year Dave Rubinoff was a featured attraction at this annual event. He has undergone several operations since then, and today is far from being in good health . . . Phil Stewart has prepared a program called "Phil's Philosophies," featuring himself, which is a cross between a Tony Wons and a Dale Carnegie. Understand several sponsors are interested . . . Another Chicago announcer has the interest of the motion-picture people. M-G-M, which took Truman Bradley from behind the microphone and put him in front of the cameras, has its eyes on mellow-voiced Franklyn MacCormack, who's also being considered by the sponsors of the "Sunday Evening Hour" as a logical successor to Brad in that spot. Methinks it's a good selection.

Several weeks ago, this column mentioned that Henny Youngman would be a permanent member of the "Monday Night Show" despite the fact he was publicized everywhere as having signed for only four weeks. Confirmation of this department's report was made the other day . . Cinemactor Edmund Lowe may be on the air in the fall in a series of Philo Vance dramatizations . . . Betty Lou Gerson has snared the starring role in "Arnold Grimm's Daughter." Betty has played in most of the popular dramatic shows originating in the Windy City . . "Attorney at Law" will be dropped from the airlanes when Fibber McG & M return . . . "The Farmer Takes the Mike" is slated to depart after the broadcast of October 9 . . . Uncle Ezra is expected back with "Station E-Z-R-A" in the early fall. In the meantime he can still be heard on the Saturday Night Barn Dance.

Programs that have been awarded contract renewals: Paul Whiteman, Major Bowes' Amateur Hour, "Big Sister," "Myrt and Marge," and "Aunt Jenny's Real Life Stories"... Uncle Jim takes his Question Bee over to CBS for a new sponsor starting October 5. He will precede "Gang Busters"... "Life Can Be Beautiful" is a new show to make its debut on September 5, and will be heard Mondays through

Fridays over the NBC-Red network . . . Father Charles Coughlin will schedule his air talks later than usual this year (5:30 p.m. EST) because it is reported he does not want to compete with the broadcasts of professional football games.

When Frank Crumit and Julia Sanderson return to the airlanes on September 20, they will add another audience-participation show to the already-crowded list. Their offering will be called "Battle of the Sexes," and will be heard in the current "Vox Pop" spot on Tuesday nights . . . "Vox Pop" moves to Saturday night starting October 1, and will compete with Prof. Quiz, which will make it a battle of the wits in every sense of the word . . It will be Kate Smith's eighth successive year on CBS when she returns to the air on September 29.

Starting sometime in October, visitors to New York will be able to visit Robert Ripley's "Believe-It-Or-Not Odditorium" which will present oddities from all over the world. It will be located on Broadway and Fifty-First Street . . . A series of movie shorts based on Dave Elman's "Hobby Lobbyists" will soon be released. Ditto for John Nesbitt's "Passing Parade" yarns. Nesbitt, by the way, has an uncanny knack of painting pictures with words.

Eric Rolfe is planning to take his frau on a fishing trip to Canada for his vacation . . . Red Evans just returned from an air trip to California and back

Andre Kestelanetz and his bride, Lily Pons, are due back from their South American honeymoon trip this week . . . Colonel Manny Prager, one of the Ben Bernie lads, has taken unto himself a bride . . . CBSongstress Doris Rhodes is studying piano and harmony . . . 





The paper, which she signed, would bind her until December 27, 1942, and eventually yield her \$1,350 for each broadcast . . . These box-car salary figures always amaze me.

As for Bing Crosby, he doesn't want to make any more money, or he'll be paying 80 cents, instead of 60 cents, out of his every dollar earned to Uncle Sam and California in taxes. Bing must be knocking down somewhere between \$300,000 and \$500,000 annually from his radio, pictures, records, songs and Del Mar racetrack. That venture, by the way, is up fifty percent in revenue over last year. Misquoted recently that he wouldn't make any more films after "Follow the Sun," in which he is currently engaged at Paramount, Bing explained that while he hadn't said that, he didn't want to make MORE than his present three or four pictures annually, but that he'd not cut down the number as it would mean throwing too many people in related film jobs out of work—and he doesn't believe in relief or the dole.

Robert Benchley, the sophisticated comic, if released from his film-writing contract, will join the radio kings with a starting pay-check of \$2,250 a week, signed by Old Gold cigarettes. The latter will increase in size until at the end of three years it reads \$4,000. The Old Gold program, if Benchley is free to take it, will start November 16 or 20.

And now the anti-climax. One morning last week I picked up a young lad, clad in dungarees, who wanted a lift west along Sunset Boulevard. He'd just come from Boston, was a singer, and had sung in New York over a na-

Max Eastman lends authentic background to game of words

Eastman Makes Lively Feature of Word Game

Wednesday, CBS, 10-10:30 p.m.

Max Eastman knows words and he has winning ideas about appreciation, hence Eastman belongs in the "Word Game"

Perhaps the most significant single word in the nomenclature of education and human progress is "thought." A close second, however, and closely allied to the first as its medium of expression, is the one composed of those very four letters, "word." This leads us to assume that a radio program built around "words" should be vital and therefore appealing to listeners, especially if it is presented in an informally entertaining manner.

They say that "you can't tell what's in a book by the cover," and everybody probably agrees with Eastman that you can't know what depths of design and possibilities of application lie in a word by simply considering its objective letters. The purpose of the "Word Game" is to explore in an enjoyable manner the world of words. As the master of ceremonies himself puts it, "All of us like to talk, at least when we can get anybody to listen. We talk with words, and this game is to see if we know about what and with what we're talking." In this refined version of the old-fashioned spelling-bee, contestants chosen at random are given the opportunity to define words exactly and use them in sentences, solve grammatical questions, give synonyms and antonyms, and even deal with the colloquialisms and slang of our elastic language.

Eastman himself should know what he's talking about, for he ranks high as a man of letters not only in one field, but in a number. He is widely known as a lecturer, a poet, an essayist, a humorist and an editor.

Edward Tomlinson interprets culture of neighbor Americas

Commentator Interprets Life in Other Americas

Sunday, NBC, 6:45-7 p.m.

In these times of international strife and national dissension, "Pan American" is an encouraging word, justly signifying the New World spirit of cooperation and friendly relations. And in the promotion and maintenance of this policy, Edward Tomlinson stands out as a key figure, due to his reputation as one of the foremost authorities on the life and affairs of South and Central America. So it is with real interest that Tomlinson is welcomed back to the airlanes with another radio edition of his famous commen-taries entitled, "The Other Americas." In these programs Commentator Tomlinson describes, relates and interprets the history, folk-lore, music, social culture, and economic and political trends of our American neighbors, especially as they fit into the pattern of international relations in our western hemisphere.

This tall, youthful, genial ace authority is actually an unofficial envoy, so commanding is his experience and knowledge in this field, even eliciting the wired compliments of Secretary of State Hull upon the inauguration of one of his radio series. In magazines and newspapers, over the air and from the lecture platform he has pictured and interpreted the life of the republics to the south of the United States for some fifteen years. He is equally at home in describing the cosmopolitan brilliance of Buenos Aires, the simple existence along the Tapijas River, the ancient civilization of the Incas, the social vicissitudes in Uruguay.

Born in Georgia of Scotch-English ancestry, Tomlinson studied music intensively as a youth in compliance with his concert aspirations. After two years of service in the World War with American and British forces, his attention turned more to international affairs and finally swung into his present field, to bring recognition from government officials of these continents as a beneficial agent.

nothing will compare to the excitement of those few seconds in which irreparable damage might have been done.

The following week found us back in the East for the Princeton-Dartmouth game at Princeton, New Jersey. Here was a Princeton team that had been having a very disappointing season, playing a great Dartmouth team that was unbeaten. Naturally the odds were on Dartmouth. Yet we were amazed to see Princeton assume an early lead of nine points, and at half-time lead the green team from New Hampshire nine to seven. This looked like an upset in the making, and we were just starting to congratulate ourselves on being in for such a surprise when the tide turned. Did I say tide? It was more like an avalanchel

Well, the next week started the rainy season. They tell me it rains in Ethiopia in the spring. Maybe! But the end of the '37 season would have made Ethio-pia seem like a dry spell. We got our first taste of it at the Army-Notre Dame game at the Yankee Stadium. they have no broadcasting booth, but rather you work from a box located in the mezzanine of the stadium. Not only did the spectators get soaked that afternoon, but our mikes and equipment took it on the chin, too.

THE following Saturday we journeyed down to Boston for the annual Harvard-Yale game; this annually is an outstanding game because of the high tradition that goes with it. It was raining again, mixed up with a bit of snow. This time we were sheltered in a new broadcasting booth that had never been used. It was swell, except that they placed some loudspeaker horns right in front of us, which meant that the audience would not only hear us but the announcer at the stadium as well, and as trying to get two announcers to agree on a football game is like trying to get a husband and wife to agree on a bridge hand, it promised to be an interesting afternoon. However, the horns were finally fixed so that our mikes would not pick them up and we went to work. The game was a good one, with a supposedly weaker Harvard team going out in front, being tied and finally regaining the lead to win, incidentally keeping alive a strange tradition: in all the fifty-some years this game has been played between these two institutions, the team to score the first touchdown has always been the winner.

We had been warned ahead of time to be particularly careful of our grammar that afternoon, as Harvard, being the center of culture and literature, naturally notices little slips that might pass anywhere else. Hence it was a distinct shock, right in the middle of a very exciting play, when we must been raving over the work of some Yale player, to get the following note flung hastily into the booth by a Harvard supporter: "You ain't so hot." After that we relaxed and felt more

Next came the most strenuous week in football for an announcer—a game on Thursday, Thanksgiving day, and one two days later, the last Saturday of the regular season. So we headed southward for the Alabama-Vanderbilt So we headed game in Nashville. The entire nation was up in arms about this game, as it had a direct bearing on two Bowl games—the Rose Bowl and the Sugar Bowl. If Alabama won, it was almost a foregone conclusion she would be in-vited to one of these. If Vanderbilt were the winner, she would most cer-tainly go on to New Orleans for the Sugar Bowl-both highly prized re-wards. Hence the eyes of the nation were on Nashville that afternoon. All week it was perfect weather, not a cloud in the sky and just the right chill in the air. Came the morning of the game and, you guessed it . . . rain . . . rain, and still more rain.

Vanderbilt's stadium is not one of the biggest in the country, but it holds about 25,000 people. However, they were actually advertising in the paper and over the radio for people to please stay home. All seats had been grabbed up long ago, and there wasn't a Chinaman's chance of any late-comers getting in. The press-box consisted of a wooden shack thrown together on one side of the stadium, much too small for the overflow of newsmen who arrived to cover the game. The broadcasting booths were built up on two of the

press-box, and if the press-booth was small, the broadcasting booths looked all the world like they had been built Chic Sale, a good-sized phone-booth would have put them to shame. To make everything complete, some wag had climbed up to them in the night and on our booth had painted "Women" and on the one next to us, "Men." This proved a bit embarrassing, but the powers that be at Vanderbilt were equal to the occasion, and the morning of the game they were en-tirely repainted. Result: Everything you touched or sat on was covered with wet paint. This, coupled with the steady downpour, was cozy.

The game was everything one could

hope for, with a substitute running out in the closing moments to boot a spectacular field goal and keep Alabama undefeated. But by far the most un-usual incident connected with this game happened before the game even


started. It was the night before, and as an added precaution we tried to find out what the bands were going to play at half-time so that no copyrighted numbers would go over the air. That night we tried to locate the Alabama band, which we knew was in town. From our hotel room we called every place they might be. Everywhere they reported that they hadn't seen them. Finally we gave up in disgust, only to find out the next morning that all the time we had been telephoning upstairs, the band had been down in the lobby of our hotel playing a concert. That was the only place we hadn't looked.

AS SOON as the turkey-day classic was over, we headed for Philadelphia and the Army-Navy game. Flying up in a thick fog, we arrived in Philadelphia Friday morning, and at once went to work on this annual creme de la classic. It was raining all day Friday. and by game-time Saturday was not only pouring but over the Municipal Stadium hung a low fog, the most dreaded curse of all for broadcasting. Rain may get you wet, the sun may hurt your eyes, snow may freeze you, fog blinds you, and on this particular day the playing-field might just as well have been in another country. For once Lady Luck smiled on us, for a few minutes before game time the rain turned to a slight drizzle and the fog lifted sufficiently to see the playing-field. I have often shuddered as I wondered what would have happened if it had not. The field was so flooded that the Cadets and Middies could not parade. This was a big disappointment to some 105,000 people assembled for the game. The game was one of the dullest of the season, partly because neither was a great team but mainly due to the terrible playing conditions. Very few passes were attempted, and those that were fizzled out. As a result it was a very glum crowd that sat idly by, getting drenched. Yet it was our job to keep up the traditions and make this the most glamorous game of the year. We'll say this, though: The game held far more glamour than one of our foremost movie stars, one noted for her sex appeal. She sat just in front of our and breezed in at the start looking like a DeMille production trying to find a cutting-room, but after sitting two hours in the rain looked more like

THE season regularly ends there, but now, with all the Bowl bally-hoo, it goes right on its way until January first for the post-season battles. Hence, it seemed no time at all until we were bound for New Orleans for the Sugar Bowl game between Louisi-ana State and Santa Clara—a great southern team battling a great Pacific Coast aggregation. I don't know whether you have ever been in New Orleans over New Year's Eve. If you haven't, you won't believe the rest of this story. Yet, if anything, I'll confine myself to understatements.

There is no city in the world that celebrates New Year's as they do there. It is something every one should see -and hear. For days they prepare for the coming event. The town is loaded up with fireworks-not the nice little crackers that Junior shoots off to the annoyance of the neighbors but all cannon crackers. In fact, if your fire-works aren't at least over sīx inches in length you are labeled a sissy. Everyone buys thousands of them and three days before the event they start shooting them off. bad. It is like any Fourth of July. The second day, they forget to stop during the wee hours of the morning, and on the day before New Year's millions are shot off a second. Sounds impossible? Just go there and see! As nightfall approaches, the din becomes almost unbearable. The main street, Canal, is one mass of exploding firecrackers, and it is impossible to hear yourself talk normally to a person walking right next to you. It's an unforgettable evening. This, coupled with the big football game on the following day, has the city on edge.

NEW YEAR'S day finally came, and as game-time approached . . . that's right . . . it started to rain. The old jinx was on us again. However, it wasn't bad, and compared with the weather we had seen in the East it seemed like a nice day. At half-time, due to there being a convention of football coaches in New Orleans, we put on the air some of the better-known, such as Elmer Layden of Notre Dame, Jimmy Crowley of Fordham, Bo McMillan of Indiana, Alonzo Stagg of the College of the Pacific, Harry Kipke ex- of Michigan, Harry Stuhldreher of Wisconsin, Lynn Waldorf of Northwestern, and many others.

But it was the closing few moments of our closing game that handed us another jar. With about five minutes still to go, our Morse man directly below us started to wave his hards wildly to attrack our attention. We saw him and hesitated, thinking New York had sent a cue or a message through on the wire. Instead of telling us what he wanted, as we paused, he merely became more excited and gestured with both hands. We now thought something drastic had gone wrong. Certainly no man would be that excited without reason. Again we paused and leaned out the window to him, expecting the worst, but all he said was, "Look, the sun's out."

THAT, ladies and gentlemen, as we say in radio, is all there is. The 1937 season is gone and almost forfotten, the '38 season approaches; we can't help wondering what it will bring. But for all of this we wouldn't give away a moment of it. The laughs, the heartaches, the thrills are all part of the game, a game that will never be dull.

So next time when you are sitting comfortably at home, listening to a big game, remember it is not always milk and honey for that man announcing the game, and many times he'd probably trade places with you at the moment. Or next time you go to a game, try announcing it yourself, try to keep up with the plays, the players, the gains, the losses, and the million and one things that crop up in any game. And remember, no second guessing, call it as you see it, for that's what he has to do. Lastly, call it not only as you see it but the split second you see it. Beat the roar of the crowd. He has to, for if he doesn't the crowd will very soon beat him, and that's the tip-off that he's behind the action. It's a great life if you don't weaken, and if you do, someone else will soon be in your place before the microphone.

RECORDS OF THE WEEK

A new department reviewing the recordings of your radio favorites

In introducing "Records of the Week" as a regular weekly department in Radio Guide, the editors acknowledge the mounting interest in records, as evidenced by increasing sales of records of all types of music, as well as the growing membership rosters of the "record clubs." The reviewer's attempt is to serve record-buyers of all dispositions. Readers particularly interested in certain types of records or in the records of certain artists are invited to make their preferences known to the editors.

Symphonic:

THE affinity between radio and fine music is spotlighted in the recent releases of two NBC orchestras... the first appearance of the famed NBC Symphony on wax... and the second appearance of the very fine NBC String Symphony.

Public Maestro Number One, Arturo Toscanini, out of the hundred-odd symphonies written by Franz Joseph Haydn, picked the Thirteenth to introduce the remarkable NBC Symphony to record-buyers. This orchestra gained a tremendous reputation in its first season, and bids fair to continue upward under the great Toscanini. Its brilliance is well exemplified in this album, and the pure and strong music of Haydn makes excellent listening. The work was recorded in NBC's famous Studio 8-H in Radio City just before the maestro concluded last winter's engagement. (Victor Album 454. \$6.50.)

Frank Black has already brought us "Program Number One," an album of obscure music for string symphony. He carries on favorably with the new set, "Program Number Two." Dr. Black has done a tremendous job of uncovering worthy unscheduled works. In this new album, he first offers thirteen charming waltzes by Johannes Brahms—the "Liebeslieder Walzer," which are not the familiar ones. They were originally written for two pianos and four voices, and are transcribed for string orchestra by Friederich Hermann.

Second in the Black series is "Ra-kastava" ("The Lover") by Sibelius. It is early Sibelius . . . the sentimental man we know in "Romans" or "Maiden with the Roses" rather than the powerful and mystic composer of "Finlandia" or the Fourth Symphony. But the great Finn always has a magnificent flavor of his own, and this is no exception. On the second record, his great trick of clinging to one note is noticeable and effective.

noticeable and effective.

Third in this series is "Sinfonietta" by the Frenchman, Albert Roussel, who died last year. It is a composition of startling nature, modern and volatile. Frank Black should certainly be congratulated in his service to music with these fine offerings. (Victor Album 455. \$7.50.)

Concert:

"POP GOES THE WEASEL" gives the Boston Pops a chance to be symphonically cute, but not too successfully so. It is one of those arrangements that brings polite chuckles from a live audience, but borders on the charlatan. So Help Me. Another in the fortunate cycle of Mildred Bailey records put out on the Vocalion label, low-cost and somewhat obscure brand. Mildred started singing back in the old Whiteman days, and still ranks way up. Vocalion 4253.

A Song of Old Hawaii. Tony Martin of the fine voice and Mannie Klein of the fine trumpet give way to that Polynesian weakness which seems so contagious, but so tiresome. Vocalion 4253.






