### An Open Letter to a Certain Station Manager

Dear Sir:

Your business is broadcasting and my business is listening to broadcasts. Sometimes I think you are short-sighted, niggardly, and mean. Here is the reason why:

You deceive your listeners. You promise them a rich, full meal, but you feed them garbage. For instance: One recent afternoon you were supposed to broadcast a children's symphony. It originated in New York City in the Columbia network's studios. Your own program announcements mailed to RADIO GUIDE's program department had promised it. The Columbia Broadcasting System program folio had stated that you would broadcast it. So RADIO GUIDE and the newspapers printed it. But you didn't broadcast it. Why? Because some local fur company wanted a piece of the hour you had reserved for the children's symphony. They offered you money for it. So you sold it.

Certainly it was your "right" to do so. But what about the group of three hundred school children gathered in one high-school auditorium (because of your announcement that you would broadcast the children's symphony) who were cheated? What of the listeners who gave up their afternoon plans in order to hear that program? What of the women's study club in that suburban-library reading-room that had prepared to discuss this children's symphony performance and then found themselves listening to a piano-and-singer commercial?

What about their rights, Mister Station Manager?

Certainly you must sell your broadcast time if you are to make enough money to stay in business. We all know that. But we also know that you are operating a station in a medium which belongs to us, the people of the United States. If we choose, through our elected representatives, we can kick you off the air altogether unless your programs are in "the public interest, convenience, and necessity." (By what logic could you say that a piano-and-singer commercial is more "in the public interest" than a children's symphony, please?) Or, if



enough of us feel like it, we can change that law, too. We can prohibit all commercial radio and ask our government to take over broadcasting. In England, where the government runs things, when a program is promised it is delivered on the date and at the hour specified.

Not that we want to change things — yet. Not until we have given you every chance. But we must ask that you realize your duty to your listeners, who, because of

your announced programs, make their own plans conform and then suffer because of your own shiftiness.

Between program announcement and program broadcast there has been too much disagreement, too many changes, too many lies. Announce a program and broadcast it, Mr. Station Manager, or don't announce it at all.

### An Open Letter to a Certain Program Engineer

Dear Sir:

I wish you could sit with me in my study and hear your program coming in. You'd be entranced by the faithfulness and the beauty of the reproduction. Bass tones come in strong and resonant, treble tones are clear, with the "highs" sweet and pure. Puccini's "Vissi d'Arte" from "Tosca" is a delight. Listen with me a moment . . . it is the finale. Your pulses have soared, but now they subside as your soul relaxes with the music's end. The fortissimo is succeeded by the pianissimo, you lean back, happy, content, entertained . . .

Crack! Cra-a-a-ack. What is that clatter? You sit bolt upright. It dins in your ears, swirling from the loudspeaker in a piercing wave of sound. It is louder, keener than anything in the symphony. Worse, it is without pitch, without harmony, without rhythm.

You recognize it. Applause! Hands beating together. How it hurts the ears! How long it continues! You hold your ears to block it out. No, we won't turn it down. You would have to get up and cross the room for that, and I want you to suffer as I have suffered. You can't stand it? Don't be silly. Millions of listeners have been standing it for weeks. Not liking it, understand, but standing it because they love the music.

So now you must go, eh? And you leave saying you didn't know the applause sounded so awful. Then God go with you to your next broadcast, engineer, and may He give you the judgment to reduce that harsh clapping so that it will not mar the beauty of the music we have just heard, and which we still taste pleasantly in the palates of our hearts.

promised was simply what RADIO GUIDE recommended. In other words, he said that sets would be made available to listeners who want to buy them, that television broadcasting apparatus would be sold to broadcasters who might want to start their own stations.

Out of that has come the boom, the discussion, the ballyhoo about television.

What he said did not and was never meant to assert that the old problems of television had been solved to his or anybody else's satisfaction. What he said, however, was swept up by news-hungry newspapers and misinterpreted in a prairie-fire of publicity which roared, "Television is here." As the fire spread, salesmen of gold bricks called their printers for fresh supplies of gold-lettered stock certificates, television stock certificates.

**B**ECAUSE RADIO GUIDE readers want the truth and because they must be protected against fraudulent representations, this series of articles about television is being published.

Where does television really stand today? What are those old, unsolved problems?

Hark back to the X-ray invention that stunned our minds in the early 1900's. It is the end of privacy, we thought. People will carry gadgets that will enable them to look through walls, into pockets, into purses, through clothing. But up to now the X-ray has done little more than give us photographs of our insides.

Most people are thinking about television in the same confused fashion. We are thinking we may be able to see Son John when he telephones home from college. Or that we won't have to go out in the rain to see that football game. Or that the movies will go out of existence and we can sit at home instead. Or that we can do our shopping by pressing a button and seeing what the local department store is offering in house-dresses. Or that we can tune in any hour and get a good program. Or that television will replace completely the sort of broadcasting we now know.

It won't be like that.

First of all, understand the television transmitting station is much like a lighthouse. Television impulses, or rays, or vibrations, or whatever we call them, do not travel like broadcast waves, spanning thousands of miles. Television waves are like light-waves. They go only as far as the eye can see. In New York, for instance, the two transmitters which are planned for next spring are located on the tops of the Empire State Building and the Chrysler Building, the

two tallest buildings in town, and they will throw their signals only as far as the horizon, or approximately forty-five miles.

So we perceive the first difference between broadcasting and television, and the first limitation.

There is another limitation just as important, however. A television program must first be picked up by a television device which operates almost exactly like a motion-picture camera, except that it requires more and better light. So the programs we will get in our homes must be scenes that can be handled by a camera.

A prize fight? Splendid, probably, for you have been thrilled by them at newsreel showings. A football game? Yes, when the action is close. A baseball game? No, the subject covers too much ground. A play? Good, for the camera can get close to the subject.

At the sending end, the camera and its not-so-good-as-a-movie-camera lens controls everything. Remember that. When next you hear that you can watch a horse-race from beginning to end, when next you hear that the television millenium will bring the motion picture into your home, just remember also how weary it makes you to see the same newsreel twice or how little you enjoyed the latest Hollywood super-colossal Smello production of the "Three Mad Mutts" at the Bijou. Television in the home may be like that some evenings.

The home set will present something of a furniture problem, too. It is as bulky and unbeautiful today as was the broadcast receiver of the President Harding era. You will be able to buy a receiver for as low as \$150, or you may pay as much as \$1,000.

**T**HE pictures that come into your home will be about the size of a business letterhead, about eight by twelve inches in size. You will be able to see them only when you turn out the lights. That means another change in your listening-habit, Milady. No bridge during television, no conversation or wisecracks during a drama. Television demands all of your attention.

If you live on a street used by automobiles or trucks and are on a floor lower than the fifth or sixth, you may find your screen suddenly visited by a downpour of white flashes. Technicians call it a blizzard. Actually, it is an automobile passing in the street. Automobile ignition systems are tiny television stations of their own. They can be short-circuited by proper shielding and wiring, but there are 25,000,000 automobiles in the country now and more being added every year. Nobody has

suggested yet that they get off the streets so we can have television, or that they all be rewired. If they were, the job would take years.

Then, there is the problem of what television will offer as entertainment. Where are there enough new "sights" to cause us to turn out the lights and set ourselves to watch? News shots, perhaps, yet we have the word of one of the largest motion-picture companies, which has cameramen all over the world, that they are hard put to build even so few as three good seven-and-one-half-minute newsreels per week for their own theaters.

**S**OME prophets have anticipated an unlimited offering of motion pictures. Hollywood produces approximately 300 movies per year at a cost of \$300,000,000. If all three hundred of those were telecast at the rate of ten hours per day, the supply would be exhausted in thirty days.

What else? Special movies can be made, sets built, actors hired, stories written. But who will pay for those stories and actors and sets? Where are the brains that can turn out a continual stream of programs that will compete with other forms of entertainment?

Nobody knows those answers yet.

Another item of importance is the fact that your television receiver must be tuned exactly to your television sta-

tion. No fishing around for the station or program you want. Your set and your station are a team. When your station goes off the air, your set becomes useless.

In his home, next year, according to one of David Sarnoff's statements, the average New York television-listener may expect about two hours of entertainment per day. In his home, today, the New York broadcast-listener can take his choice of approximately 360 hours of entertainment broadcast by at least twenty stations that his set can bring in. It doesn't appear, yet, that television will cause anyone to toss his broadcast receiver in the ash heap.

We have written of the New York listener. What of other cities? Well, there probably will be a station in Hollywood and one in Chicago next year. But the remainder of the country? Better wait and see.

We have purposely avoided discussing the dollars-and-cents side of television. Before it, even experts grow confused. Probably it is the greatest reason why television for everyone is not even around the corner.



Such a great but ill-fated romance is that woven around the lives of Ruth Evans Brewster (the Big Sister) and Dr. John Wayne. Both Ruth Evans and John Wayne are idealistic, with conscientious interest in less fortunate human beings. These mutual characteristics, which have led Ruth to be a welfare worker and John to be a physician, have made the two sympathetic and congenial since their first acquaintance. When Ruth met John, however, he was already married — unhappily — to a wife who became a psycho-

pathic case. Despairing of ever being able to marry John, Ruth decides to devote her life to the Rev. David Brewster, who depends on her in times of misfortune. The day she marries the Rev. Brewster, John Wayne's wife dies. Rev. Brewster then disappears in an effort to release Ruth for her true happiness. She, however, declines the freedom within her grasp, realizing what the stigma of divorce would mean to a minister, and she continues to devote herself to a life of hard and self-sacrificing work. "Big Sister" is heard over CBS, Monday through Friday, 11:30 a.m. EST, 10:30 a.m. CST; for the West, 12:00 noon MST, 11:00 a.m. PST.

**R**UTH EVANS BREWSTER, as played by Alice Frost, is a sympathetic "Big Sister" whose unselfish, idealistic nature sometimes forces her to choke down the yearning to live her own life to the full. Since the death of their parents she has watched over her younger sister, Sue, and her crippled brother, Ned. It is through Ned that Ruth Evans meets Dr. John Wayne when the young surgeon takes an interest in the boy's case. When he cures the lad he wins the undying devotion of "Big Sister" Ruth. John reciprocates the feeling, but his wife stands in the way, and Ruth even refuses to take advantage of Mrs. Wayne's consent to divorce. When misfortune strikes John in Raventon, Ruth goes to his assistance. There she is stirred by the appalling social conditions in the town and decides to help fight for improvement for the mill workers, although she has to lock horns with unscrupulous Asa Griffin, boss of the town. Fate seems continually to "pick on" this young woman whose normal inclinations are so often denied expression, but through all her struggles and troubles Ruth's natural generosity and pluck sustain her and allow her to make the most of many trying circumstances. She still looks forward to real happiness

**D**R. JOHN WAYNE is played by Martin Gabel. John is a brilliant young surgeon. Both his deeds of kindness and his few errors are traceable to a generous, warm-hearted nature. From his first contact with "Big Sister" he has been impressed by her deep insight and courage. Although he made no unethical gestures, John would have married Ruth at the very first if his wife, Norma, had not stood in the way. Norma finally offers a divorce, but Ruth refuses to take advantage. This unwillingness to break up the Waynes is strengthened when Norma is nearly killed in an accident. John operates on Norma and succeeds in saving her life but not her sanity. As a result of this failure John is forced to resign from the staff of Riverview Hospital. Disgraced, he flees aboard a freighter. In helping fight a fire on the boat, John is blinded. He returns and settles in the small industrial town of Raventon, where Ruth discovers him and helps him win his fight for his sight and a new spirit. After Ruth marries the Rev. Brewster and John's wife dies, John continues his new practise, and with Ruth fights for social and political progress in Raventon. His love for Ruth is stronger than ever, and he never ceases to seek a solution



**NED EVANS** is the lovable but sometimes scapegrace member of the Evans brood. He has been the cause originally of bringing Ruth and Dr. Wayne together, and, thanks to the surgical expertness of Dr. Wayne, Ned is now able to walk. That release of energy finds its expression sometimes in mischief, but the natural honesty and straightforwardness of the lad always assert themselves in time to prevent real harm. Ruth has a great affection for her problem-child. Ned is played by Michael Junior O'Day


**SUSAN EVANS MILLER** (Dorothy McGuire) is better known as "Little Sister" Sue. She is still in her early twenties and has been married a little over a year to Jerry Miller, publisher of Raventon's crusading newspaper. Impulsive and flighty, Sue's life has been complicated by numerous "romances" before her marriage, causing Ruth Evans Brewster many sleepless nights. She has settled down as a staunch companion to Jerry, but she has lost none of her vivacious charm. She worships her "Big Sister"



**ASA GRIFFIN** (Teddy Bergman) is the political boss of Raventon and owns most of the slum property which Ruth and John, backed by Jerry's newspaper, seek to improve. **JERRY MILLER**, as played by Ned Wever, is a dashing, devil-may-care New York reporter. He seems at first to be involved in a blackmail plot against Dr. Wayne. He joins Ruth in challenging Griffin's vicious control by starting a rival newspaper to expose Griffin and rid Raventon of his vice

**FRED UTTAL**, announcer for "Big Sister," is called Fred by the redcaps in many cities. That's because he has been around. He has made the rounds selling punching-bags, greeting-cards and dish-washers. Then, while helping direct pictures in Hollywood, Fred followed a whim, auditioned, clicked, and became a popular announcer. He paints, reads, hopes to write

## The Toscanini Phase

**A** FEW days before his sudden recent death, Leopold Godowsky, celebrated pianist-composer, wrote to me about what he called "the public Toscanini craze and accompanying mass insanity." Just previously, too, I had read similar reaction about that conductor in one of the New York daily newspapers.

It is strange that so often in this land, when a man rises to superlative achievement and wins our high esteem, he also draws the misinterpretation of the unthinking and the conscious abuse of the envious. Furthermore, there are those novelty-seekers who tire of reading and hearing about him and his doings. American history has a long record of outstanding men who have been so belittled by many during their lifetime, only to be enshrined by all after their passing.

In analyzing the adverse opinions on Toscanini, they seem to resolve themselves—aside from some sincere disagreements with his interpretations and tempos—into criticism of his high-handed behavior and explosive temperament, and the rhapsodical praises of the Toscanini-can-do-no-wrong class of commentators, amateur and journalistic.

I do not believe all the stories of Toscanini's arrogance and irritability, many of which can be set down to publicity agents and to legends whose frequent repetition eventually gives them the semblance of truth. I have known Toscanini for many years and found him gentle, courteous, tolerant and invariably kind in his estimates of his colleagues of the baton. (Not all of them are as generous in their remarks about the maestro.) Too, I have attended his rehearsals, where in truth he was the martinet, exact, strictly demanding and uncompromising in his desire for musical truth, beauty and technical perfection. If those are faults in a conductor, then I completely misunderstand his artistic function.

The occasional sarcasms and outbursts of temper from Toscanini at rehearsals may be severe, but they get results, and I know from talks with his players that they do not resent them. They recognize the sincerity of Toscanini's intentions and the eminence of his art, and give every ounce of themselves to realize his purposes.

The fact that now and then some listeners might not conform to every

detail of Toscanini's interpretations matters nothing in the sum total of his remarkable performances. He has just finished the first half of his series with the NBC Orchestra and it is safe to assume that those concerts gave complete enjoyment and upliftment to the overwhelming majority of his hearers at the studio and on the air.

Lastingly memorable among other numbers were his superb presentations of Beethoven's "Eroica," Dvorak's "New World," Ravel's "Daphnis and Chloe," Tchaikovsky's "Romeo and Juliet," all his Wagner readings, and Samuel Barber's "Adagio for Strings." That list in itself justifies the enthusiastic victims of the "Toscanini craze" and of "mass insanity."


That ten-minute period in a symphony broadcast when the conductor

exits to change his damp shirt used to signal a general twist of the dials to blot out a steady stream of solemn talk on the meaning of music. Now things have changed since the advent of "Deemsie" and "Chotzy," sometimes known as Deems Taylor and Samuel Chotzinoff, official commentators of the New York Philharmonic and NBC Symphony respectively.

Both Deemsie (Paul Whiteman's name for him) and Chotzy got off to an early start in music. Chotzinoff

rounded off a career as a pianist and accompanist to Jascha Heifetz by marrying Heifetz' sister and turning music critic, first on the defunct New York World and then on the New York Post. Taylor piled up an impressive list of compositions, among them two operas produced at the Metropolitan, and published several books and many articles on music.

Short, and strongly on the bald side, Chotzinoff is somewhat stocky and Taylor almost ascetically thin. The latter's pince-nez gives him the look of an ex-divinity student, while Chotzinoff could be mistaken for a solid, responsible businessman. He likes an evening of chamber music at home, whereas Taylor is seen more often doing the town in white tie and tails.

Taylor and Chotzinoff have both broken away from the old type of analytical comment and are no longer concerned with whether the oboe plays in B flat minor and the brass section resumes the subsidiary theme in the twenty-seventh bar of the coda! Taylor has developed an easy manner which has made him millions of friends and Chotzinoff's popularity widens each time he is on the air.

The music commentation period is now a pleasure instead of a painful ordeal.

John Carter made his debut with the Metropolitan Opera at a Sunday night concert on December 11. Why not at a regular opera performance?

There's a rumor around that Toscanini has written a symphony. One hopes that it will equal his conducting in inspiration, although the record of successful conductor-composers is exceedingly lean.

One of the most useful books received by this department in a long time is Albert E. Wier's new "Encyclopedia of Music and Musicians," published handsomely and in welcome large type by the Macmillan Company, New York. The volume aims to be a ready-reference medium for the student and average music-lover desiring handy, concise and practical information on all tonal subjects. Mr. Wier's 2,089 pages achieve their purpose admirably by instantaneously furnishing data for which one used to grope laboriously in the other compendiums. The price of the Wier book is \$10 and altogether worth it.

EVERYONE knows that "Lucia" is essentially a coloratura soprano's picnic (chiefly owing to the decorative "Mad Scene"), and that the "Sextet" of that work has furnished an abidingly popular number in the hurdy-gurdy repertoire. Furthermore, musical cynics will say that the libretto of Donizetti's opera is childishly melodramatic and that its music consists of saccharine airs and spare and flimsy orchestration.

To some modern ears, all that may be true, but the modern requirements are not those by which to judge an old opera which should be considered solely in relation to the period of its composition. That period was 1835, and history records truly that Donizetti was one of the most brilliant writers of Italian opera during the middle of the nineteenth century.

ACT I

A grove near a Scottish castle. Seventeenth century.

The libretto of "Lucia" is based on "The Bride of Lammermoor," famous novel by Sir Walter Scott. Lord Henry Ashton (Enrico in the opera) learns from his hunting-companions that his sister Lucy (Lucia) is in love with

Lucia, in which the pair promise to remain faithful to each other.

ACT II

A room in Enrico's castle.

Preparations are under way for the wedding of Lucia and Arturo, after Enrico convinces his sister by means of a forged letter that Edgardo is unfaithful. As the preliminary marriage contract is signed, Edgardo returns unexpectedly, tries to halt the proceedings, but is overpowered and leaves, cursing Lucia for her faithlessness. The great "Sextet" occurs in this scene.

ACT III

Scene I

A room in Edgardo's castle.

Edgardo and Enrico quarrel and engage to fight a duel.

Scene II

A room in the Ashton castle.

Lucia's marriage to Arturo has just taken place. Raymond (Raimundo), chaplain at Lammermoor, announces to the assembled guests that Lucia has killed her husband in their bridal chamber. The chorus chants a number which Donizetti's critics do not consider nearly tragic enough. Lucia,

Edgar of Ravenswood (Edgardo) even though their families are feuding. Enrico declares that only Lucia's marriage with Lord Arthur Bucklaw (Arturo) can save the fortunes of the Ashton house.

Lucia enters with Alice (Alisa), her confidante to whom she sings her celebrated "Legend of the Fountain," which warns of her impending doom by turning its waters to blood. Edgardo, leaving on a political mission for France, has a farewell duet with

a white-robed specter, suddenly gone insane, horrifies the guests by appearing with a bloody dagger in her hand, which she flings from her and goes into her vocal "Mad Scene."

Scene III

A graveyard.

Edgardo awaits Enrico for their duel, but before the latter arrives, mourners come to tell him of Lucia's death. He sings a touching aria, "A Peaceful Refuge," and stabs himself.

NOT generally familiar are the Bach violin compositions performed by Totenberg. An unusually serious young interpreter, he has penetrated deeply into the spirit of these works and possesses the volume of tone and the technical command to do them justice. Bach wrote three sonatas for violin without piano support, and it is amazing to consider how fully he was able to make the solo instrument combine the melody with the accompaniment, the air sometimes being carried with one finger while the others fill out with counterpoint and chords. The sonatas with piano are of course correspondingly sonorous.

Between halves he goes out and returns in a few minutes juggling hot-dogs, soda pop and coffee for his party . . . Benny Goodman in the back with a gal. Eddy Duchin on the right, Fred Waring on the left. Ted Collins on the other side of the field, and a host of others too numerous to mention . . . The Clayton "Bud" Collyers walking home from church every Sunday morning. The lovely Mrs. C. wearing a beautiful corsage. Their florist has a weekly standing order to deliver flowers at the Collyer home, which is another way of "Bud" telling Eloise he loves her . . . CBS announcers Charles Stark and John Lang at a Saturday night party. At three ayem Stark ribs Lang because Johnny has to be at the studio at 8 in the morning and work through till 12 midnight and return again the next morning at 8, while he can sleep late the next morning. A radio columnist (initials are M. L.) joins in ribbing, regrets it next morning when awakened by phone call at nine and then can't fall back to sleep.

#### Behind the Scene

After last Sunday night's Bob Benchley broadcast the jitterbugs in the audience wanted to hear more of Artie Shaw's music and let it be known in a loud and long shout. When order was restored, the production man explained that the orchestra could not play again because it was against the rules of the musicians' union. A group in the balcony then yelled, "Down with the union," and before long more than half the audience joined in . . . Backstage at last Monday's Phil Spitalny's show. Songstress Maxine suffering with a severe sore throat has her doctor at the studio to swab her throat before she goes to the microphone to sing . . . Eddie Cantor misses his cue, and when he realizes

he should be in front of the mike, rushes over to it yelling, "OH! OH! It's my turn," and then looks at the audience and adds, "I can make a mistake once in a while, can't I?" Yes, Cantor can.

At the first Jack Benny broadcast from New York I walked into the studio just as the comedian was introducing the celebrities in the audience. NBC page Joe Wilkinsen is standing against the wall with his arms folded. Pointing to Wilkinsen, Benny belted, "and that fellow over there is Mussolini's son." Quick as a flash the page came back with, "Thank you, Mr. Allen," which turned out to be the funniest crack of the night. Five minutes before the broadcast, Jack thought of a new joke and he hurriedly wrote it in the script . . . Don Wilson gets up to make the usual prebroadcast speech and Benny stands a few feet away with his eyes on Wilson. In the middle of the speech, Don stops and yells at Benny, "Will you sit down, please?" and while the audience is chuckling Jack sheepishly reclines into a chair saying, "I'm only the star of the program." After Wilson finishes, Jack grabs a violin and proceeds to play "The Bee," when pennies are thrown at his feet. He stops, picks them up, and starts to walk down the aisle with outstretched hands seeking more contributions. After the broadcast, Phil Harris admitting his nervousness, which he hasn't been able to overcome. He isn't the only air performer that gets that same old feeling. That debbil mike really does get you—why, I dunno . . . Mary Livingstone (Mrs. Jack Benny) tells your reporter that she and Jack plan to stop off in Chicago on their way back to the Coast and adopt a little boy from "The Cradle," which is where they got little Joan.

Happiest about moving to Hollywood are Donald Novis and Cecil Underwood, the show's vocalist and producer, respectively. Both their homes are out west, and although Don has been here with his wife, Cecil Underwood's family never did move to Chicago. Announcer Harlow Wilcox is giving up announcing duties on "Arnold Grimm's Daughter" and his lucrative commercial film work to sell Johnson's Wax with a Pacific background. Bill Thompson, who is (1) Nick de Populus, (2) the Old Timer, and (3) Horatio K. Boomer on the program, will, I predict, make the biggest hit in Hollywood, even surpassing the Fibber himself. Bill's a natural comedian, and at dinner one night with him I nearly split my sides laughing at his antics. Harold Peary, actor; Billy Mills, the orchestra-leader, and Don Quinn, gag-writer, will likewise go west. One member of the cast, however, is in a quandary. He doesn't know whether to go to Hollywood or stay in Chicago. That's Hugh Studebaker, the Silly Watson of the show. In addition to his Fibber chores, Hugh is heard in the East as the star of "Bachelor's Children." Hugh is one of the finest actors in Chicago, and he hates to leave. But in addition to retaining his role in the Fibber show if he moves with it, he has also received some flattering Hollywood offers. I'd hate to see Hugh leave town, but should he go, Cinemaville will have taken one of the town's best actors from us.

### Can't Be Humored

With the Fibber McGee show leaving and Billy House's "Laugh Liner" making its final radio sailing on New Year's Day, Chicago will be left without a night-time comedy commercial program. It looks like a sad year in town, especially since there is no let-up in the foul play that is befalling the heroes and heroines of Chicago's innumerable serials.

### Exodus

The past year has seen other Chicago radio stars moving to Glomourtown. A few are Truman Bradley, ex-"Ford Sunday Evening Hour" announcer; Henry Hunter, formerly Terry Regan in "Attorney-at-Law"; and Jim Ameche, brother of Don, who was heard in male lead when "Win Your Lady" was on last summer.

### Following Don's footsteps





## For Writers Only

Editor, RADIO GUIDE:

Beginning in February, 1939, the University of New Mexico plans to add to its radio activities by offering a course in radio play-production.

Here's a chance for the writer of radio plays and short stories to see how his scripts sound in actual performance; moreover, the script as altered (if altering for timing or dramatizing is necessary) will be returned to the writer so that he may later use our suggestions if he likes.

The most interesting feature of this attempt to cooperate with writers in offering them a free laboratory for their work is the recording of programs. Even if a worth-while script is not "aired," the writer may hear it, at least in part, for we plan to rehearse and record one deserving script each week. The recording will be made on both sides of a cellulose disk which may be played on any phonograph with an ordinary steel needle, at the usual speed of 78 r.p.m. We can also record at 33 r.p.m. This disk will be sent to the author free of charge in return for the use of his script, but express charges must be collect.

## Secret of Success

Editor, RADIO GUIDE:

In the field of entertainment and music, style is that quality which in one instance produces a Kate Smith and the lack of which, in the next, relegates one to oblivion. The style which is associated with a personality carries through in everything that person does. Kate's singing appeals to certain people because that group enjoys the lovely lilting melodies offered in a manner known as the Kate Smith style. Also, whenever she talks on the air the same characteristics have to predominate in her speech. For instance, if Kate Smith were to tell a joke on the air it could not be narrated in a way associated with Beatrice Lillie, Mary Livingstone, Gracie Allen, Gertrude Lawrence or

Fannie Brice, because it would not be Kate Smith.

To illustrate the point, Kate would tell a humorous story in a manner which would be plain, homey, and understandable to all. Beatrice Lillie aims her humor, which is often satirical, at the blase and sophisticated, as does Gertrude Lawrence. Gracie Allen, with her silly banter, must aim her verbal carrying-on at those who can find fun in that which is basically silly and ridiculous. Fannie Brice lends characterizations and dialects to her joke-telling. Mary Livingstone, who plays the role of a stooge rather than a solo comedian, relies on cuteness intermingled with a bit of dumbness. Kate, who is now heard regularly in the dual role of commentator and mistress of ceremonies on the radio, can tell any wholesome story with the best of them, as was evidenced when she appeared last season with the two masters of mirth, Jack Benny and Fred Allen. There is no hidden meaning that the average listener cannot comprehend. It's story-telling without furbelows, mingled with a little American philosophy.

# RECORDS OF THE WEEK

A department reviewing the recordings of your radio favorites

**Classical:**

**DEBUSSY AND DE FALLA.**—The great Claude Debussy wrote his three magnificent nocturnes in 1898, *Festivals* being the most popular, *Sirens* the least-performed, probably because it includes sixteen female voices, *Clouds* the third. All three are performed in a new album in rare style by the *Orchestre des Festivals Debussy*, with a student of the composer directing, D. E. Inghelbrecht. Only flaw is sloppy brass in the distant parade effect in the middle of *Festivals*. But it's a prize package in any language. (Columbia set 344. \$6.)

Another neat buy is the De Falla album on Victor, the dances from his "Three Corned Hat" played with the usual smack of the Boston Pops Orchestra, Mr. Fiedler conducting. There are four sides, including "The Neighbors," "The Miller's Dance" and the final dance in the ballet. All sparkle with expected brilliance. (Victor album 505. \$2.50.)

**Popular:**

**ALBUMS and TWO SLEEPY PEOPLE.**—This seems to be album week, especially with Victor. Maybe Christmas is coming. Benny Goodman busts loose with a four-record swing session that is most pleasant, especially the four sides by the quartet. Teddy Wilson's impeccable piano, Lionel Hampton's inventive jibes, Dave Tough's neat percussion, and Benny's ever-welcome clarinet. The tunes selected are all in the popular immortals, but for one original by the quartet, *Opus 1/2*, which is swell. You'll get such as *S'wonderful*, *The Blue Room*, *Sweet Sue*, *Make - Believe*, *Sweet Georgia Brown*, *I Never Knew* and *I Must Have*

*That Man*, and you'll be glad. (Victor album P-3. \$3.50.)

Not so enthusiastic are we for the Jerome Kern album. Out of all the musical-comedy composers, we'd take Kern head and shoulders above the Frimls, Rombergs and the like. But these Victor Salon orchestra albums are too cluttered with overstuffed medleys and second-rate vocals, and less than half of this is on the plus side. Tunes from "Show Boat," "Music in the Air," "Roberta" and "Cat and the Fiddle" are the best, reviving such almost-forgotten but great songs as *Yesterday*, *One Moment Alone* and *The Touch of Your Hand*. Leonard Joy directs, and the singers include Felix Knight, Dorothy Chapman, Marie Louise Quevli, and Alan Holt. Take it or leave it. (Victor album C-31. \$9.)

*Two Sleepy People*, which is so in the fore these days, gets a variety of treatments on wax, including a none-too-terrific job by its composer, Hoagy Carmichael, singing with Ella Logan, a loud Fats Waller record, a dulcet, accented Jean Sablon reading, a neat Bob Crosby treatment, and one by the icky Kay Kyser band. You pick it.

*They Say* is a new tune making good material for the return of Ethel Waters to records, a gal who can still sell a song aplenty. *Bluebird*.

*Poor Butterfly*, the oldie, displays trumpeter Bobby Hackett in very special fettle with his own, and excellent aggregation. *Vocalion*.

*Most Gentlemen Don't Like Love*, another of the ultra-smart Cole Porter songs from the Broadway show "Leave It to Me" is now available by Larry Clinton's band. *Victor*.

# LISTENING TO LEARN

... A Ceaseless Search, an Unquenched Thirst for Knowledge ...

## L. A. Reports on Child Listening Habits

Report on a recent survey of child listening habits in the Los Angeles city schools was made by Pauline Winner at the First Annual Institute of Radio in Los Angeles on November 18. Miss Winner is teacher-coordinator of radio activities for L. A. schools. The purpose of the survey was to determine children's out-of-school listening-habits by asking them to check on nineteen popular programs one of these six possible ratings:

1. Know nothing about it.
2. Don't like it—never listen.
3. Listen when nothing better on the air.
4. Average—listen occasionally.
5. Among the best—listen frequently.
6. First choice—try never to miss it.

Two thousand eight hundred children from all sections of the city were included in the survey in all grades from primary through the twelfth. Among other things the survey indicated that:

- (1) There is a decided effect of age on the popularity of programs. Example: In the elementary grades "The Lone Ranger" rates first, ties for fourth in junior high schools, drops down to tenth place in senior high schools.
- (2) As children grow older some programs become more popular, others less popular and some remain the same throughout all age levels. Example: "Lux Radio Theater" increases in popularity with children as they grow older, "The Lone Ranger" decreases and the "Charlie McCarthy" program holds second place throughout all grade levels.
- \* (3) Pupils over age tend to like the sensational-type programs, while the pupils under age enjoy those which are universally popular.

The interesting facts shown in this report suggest a solution to one of the great mysteries of broadcasting, specifically: *How does the audience react to what they hear?* It seems appropriate at this time to encourage similar activity in other communities, where surveys might help bring an answer to this perplexing question, an answer that would help educators and radio experts solve some of their puzzles.

\*This point on the basis of pupils who are over age and under age for a given grade.

## Students Use P. A. System

Novel use of school public-address systems in Los Angeles schools was revealed by Elizabeth Goudy, director of radio for L. A. schools, by the following remark in her address before the First Annual Institution of Radio: "Of the many possible uses that radio may have in the classroom, that of utilizing the school's public-address system for broadcasts by the students themselves may contribute many desirable outcomes. The preparation and presentation of student broadcasts can motivate the tools of instruction—reading, writing and speech."

In a letter, Miss Goudy writes: "We on the West Coast feel that radio may serve not only as a teaching aid but as a public-relations medium. It enables us to interpret the public schools to the public."



Sterling Fisher's assignment is keeping a hand on today's job and an eye on tomorrow's

FROM Sunday morning, when the "Church of the Air" starts off another week in Columbia's schedule of educational programs, to Saturday night, when "Government Interviews Business" finishes that week, there has been a minimum of seven and one-half hours of educational broadcasting presented for Coast-to-Coast audiences over the Columbia Broadcasting System. Outstanding in this schedule are such popular presentations as "Headlines and By-Lines," "Americans All—Immigrants All," "The People's Platform," "American School of the Air," "Of Men and Books" and "Americans at Work."

The head man under whose direction Columbia's educational activity takes place is Sterling Fisher. He doesn't do it by himself, however; that would be an impossible task for a dozen men. But it is Sterling Fisher who guides the present and keeps an eye on the future of Columbia's radio-education. He is the man who rates honor when honor is due and brickbats when they are in order. So far, the tremendous

responsibility of educating by radio has been handled so admirably at Columbia that there has been little call for brickbats. The answer to this might be found in Fisher's able staff.

On the staff, Leon Levine first comes to our notice as assistant director in charge of education and director of "The People's Platform." We next find Helen Sioussat as assistant in charge of talks, and Ruth Allen as the broadcast director of "Church of the Air." Norman Corwin directs one of the "American School of the Air" broadcasts and is assisted with "Americans at Work" by Betzy Tuthill, Margaret Lewerth writing the script. A. Murray Dyer is doing an exceptional script-writing job for "American School of the Air," with which series the more familiar names of Earle Gill, William N. Robson, George Allen and James Fasset also be associated.


The duties and obligations of the above-mentioned individuals represents, quite accurately, Columbia's activity in the interest of education. These people, under Sterling Fisher's direction, are handling today's job.

Supervising the job that is being done today is only one part of Fisher's work. Another obligation, extremely more difficult and filled with all sorts of bogies, is looking into the unpredictable future of radio-education to advance its status day by day and keep Columbia abreast of the latest developments. Evidence of this "looking toward the future" was very pronounced in Fisher's speech to the Second School Broadcast Conference held in Chicago recently in which he accentuated future radio-education work, proposed a variety of new program ideas.

So it is ever with a hand on the pulse of today and a searching, critical eye on the possibilities of tomorrow—the assignment of Columbia's director in charge of education. Of his success we can truthfully say: The results, so far, are as much as could be expected and plans for the future look very promising.

## Next Step Is The Teacher's

Notes on the Second School Broadcast Conference held at the Morrison Hotel, Chicago, December 1, 2 and 3.

The Second School Broadcast Conference may have proved nothing, but it did show rather plainly that the next major step in radio-education for the classroom will have to be made by the classroom teacher. This makes the future of radio-education in schools the problem of every citizen, school-board member and school principal.

It is apparent that educators who are preparing radio programs for classroom use have as accurate a picture of their job and their responsibilities as is possible at this stage of the game, and are working in the right direction even though they still may be a long way from their goal. Of broadcasters who service communities with educational programs, it must be said that they too are aware of their obligations and in most cases are following the right course in fulfilling them.

That the most expertly planned and presented educational radio program, of which there are a great number today, can be a flop if the teacher does not know how to utilize it, needs no further proof than that which has already been established. On the other hand, as has been frequently shown, the average program can be made to fill a vital need if properly handled by an alert instructor. There is a wealth of evidence, excepting the demonstrations by students at the conference, that teachers will have to make the next step to cultivate the possibilities in this virgin field by taking advantage of such opportunities to educate themselves to radio as that presented at this conference and similar ones held in all parts of the country.

If the classroom groups that demonstrated the utilization of radio programs at the Chicago conference could be accepted as examples of an average class, we then could justify the tremendous expenditure of time and money that is being made in the interests of radio-education. These classes and their teachers were the unusual exception rather than a sample of the average. They did conclusively prove, however, that radio can do a useful job in the classroom if properly utilized by the teacher.

## At the Conference ...

Larry Roller, educational director of Ohio's United Broadcasting Company, remarked that Cleveland's situation is ideal. Commercial stations leave the job of classroom programs to WBOE, school broadcasting station on new high-frequency band, and concentrate on the more flexible adult-education and free-time listening programs.

whistle in my parlor, my bedroom, or my bath. Thanks to you, he is doing exactly that.

Perhaps you have not noticed how many of broadcasting's biggest shows are ending in a riot of whistling. Listen in; you'll be amazed. In the beginning, it was confined to such programs as Benny Goodman's. His audience was composed of jitterbugs who became so struck with themselves on account of the publicity they and their tribe received via newsreels, picture magazines, and newspapers that they decided to take over the program for their own noisy gratification. That broke the ice. If they could whistle at Benny Goodman one night, they could whistle at Fred Allen in the same studio the next night. And they did—and do. Next, they'll be whistling at Toscanini.

Whistling is not entertainment, Mr. Studio Head; it is a nuisance. If your best friend won't tell you, I will. Whistling destroys the illusion of beauty or character or realism or culture that must trademark every good broadcast. Eliminate it by simply enforcing laws against it in your studios and you will eliminate one of radio's harshest irritants.



# On Short Waves



FOR several years listeners in South America, particularly those in Brazil and Argentina, depended almost solely upon short-wave broadcasts from Germany for their daily news and musical fare. These broadcasts over Germany's powerful short-wave transmitters, radiated simultaneously on several different wave-lengths, are on the air daily from 6 to 7:30 a. m. EST, and from 4:50 to 10:50 p.m. EST. Beamed directly on the great Latin centers of population, namely Buenos Aires and Rio de Janeiro, with announcements in Spanish and Portuguese, cleverly designed programs for the Latin temperament and intellect, filled to the brim with neatly disguised but none the less dangerous Nazi propaganda, these German transmissions had already done considerable damage to the pan-American ideals of democracy and trade before our great radio moguls in the United States awoke from their sleep of indifference and began a feverish campaign to offset this un-American influence. With powerful new transmitting facilities, more effective aerials, announcements in Spanish and Portuguese, and excellent programs designed especially for Latin America, our broadcasts are rapidly gaining in favor south of the Panama Canal and, according to reports, more listeners daily are turning to the American stations for their entertainment and enlighten-

ment via radio. At Schenectady, N. Y., a skilled staff of General Electric engineers, working day and night, are putting the finishing touches on one of the world's most powerful short-wave transmitters. The new "Voice of Electricity," speaking to the tune of 100,000 watts, coupled with new beam-aerials, will, it is hoped, provide such satisfactory reception in South America that our Latin brothers will keep their dials tuned to the United States rather than to war-scarred, propaganda-filled Europe.

NBC and CBS are installing new short-wave antennas that will swing radio beams over South America like rays of powerful searchlights. These new antennas are the latest technical development in an effort to place the United States in the forefront of the intense international competition for radio supremacy in the western world. These antennas will enable NBC and CBS to extend their services to Latin America without diminishing the service to Europe.

John Larsen of Geneva, N. Y., notes the following shifts in frequency: COCD, Havana, Cuba, to 6.135; COBC, Havana, Cuba, to 9.98; HIZ, Trujillo City, D. R. to 6.315; HRP1, San Pedro Sula, Honduras, to 6.36; HC1GQ, Quito, Ecuador, to 9.18; HC2CW, Guayaquil, Ecuador, to 9.13, and HP5J, Panama City, Panama, to the frequency of 9.61 megs.
