

RADIO-PANDEMONIUM IF UNCONTROLLED

THINK ABOUT RADIO

THE sinking of the *Titanic* during the night of April 14, 1912, focused the attention of the world on the problem of radio regulation—proper provision for safety of life at sea. If regulation had required continuous watch on passenger liners, the *Californian*, which was only a few miles away, might have heard the *Titanic* distress signals and rescued many more than were saved.

Soon, by law and international regulation, the use of radio on ships was extended. This illustrates one aspect of regulation, namely, the proper adaptation of radio to public purposes and the necessity for efficient use of the facility.

The relatively simple problems of regulation presented by the early ship-emergency service soon assumed vast ramifications by the rapid development of the art. Following the World War, almost unbelievable adaptations quickly followed one another.

The very usefulness of radio created the greatest problem. The demands of human enterprise and ingenuity greatly exceeded the facilities of the radio spectrum. Untrammeled use could result only in pandemonium, as the laws of nature do not yield to the enterprises of men. Scarcely more than a decade ago we witnessed confusion in the broadcast band created by the rush to establish stations and share in the profits of commercial operation. Regulation was in the nature of things. It had to come to assure order and the full expression of the art along useful lines. The Federal laws enacted in 1927 and 1934 provided efficient standards for regulation.

Under regulation, indiscriminate use yielded to planned service. The Government received its limited allocation of frequencies for the national defense—for the use of the Army, Navy and Coast Guard; for the conservation of vast forests, the administration of national parks, communication with light-houses; for airways beacons and to facilitate the work of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Almost three thousand police stations have been established in 375 cities. In addition, fifteen states maintain state-wide police networks.

Facilities have been afforded for the safety of life at sea and in the air. World-wide radiotelegraph and radiotelephone communication is available at all hours and seasons and is made possible through scientific selection of usable channels.

All the people of the United States may receive the benefits of broadcast service. Provision has been made for international broadcasting, for television, image reproduction and other useful services. The work of fifty thousand American amateurs (there are only sixty-five thousand in the world) has been well ordered. Proper allocation would still be futile without regulation requiring licensees to keep abreast of the rapidly progressing art. A station's signal must be free from distortion and a high precentage of modulation must be maintained to assure good reception and to prevent interference with stations in the same or other classes of service.


Hand in hand with technical excellence must go program excellence, and increasing recognition of the responsibility of broadcasters, as well as the Federal Communications Commission, for proper administration of the Communications Act. Listeners too have a responsibility to make their experience known to the commission, for after all the service rendered to the listening public is the best guide to the determination of what is in the public interest. Without these safeguards it might be that, as the courts have said, "This great science, instead of a boon, will become a scourge." The ether belongs to the people and it must not be made a theater for the display of vulgarity, profanity, greed, fraud or passion.





A DATE WITH A KING

BY THE ALADDIN-LIKE MAGIC OF RADIO WE ARE PRIVILEGED THIS WEEK TO VISIT WITH THE ROYAL AND RENOWNED RULERS OF MANY GREAT NATIONS

On each of those days we have a date
with royalty. We're going on a tour of the world,
to visit with kings and queens, with emperors, with princes, with presidents and high officials of other

Our itinerary is all arranged and there is no expense. Like Aladdin of old rubbing the magic lamp and floating through the air on a rug, we will simply flip a switch and the modern magic of radio will whisk us away from our commonplace homes to far places to sit with and speak with the great of many nations.

of many nations.

In the most expansive world coverage yet attained, radio will bring us this thrilling opportunity as the "Salute of Nations" to the New York World's Fair of 1939 and as a pledge to its theme, "The World of Tomorrow." On each Sunday until the opening of the fair on April 30, 1939, a special message will be broadcast to the world from one of the nations to be represented at the fair. There will be speeches by the rulers and other dignitaries. will be speeches by the rulers and other dignitaries of these countries, accompanied by special music. The radio system of each country will carry its own message. In addition, the programs will cross the ocean by short wave, to be relayed by all our major American networks throughout the United States and sent on by our short-wave systems to the further reaches of civilization. Such a comprehensive set-up is at least a magnificent gesture toward making the exposition the prophecy of a better world to come.

If we are to make the most of our trips abroad and our associations with these leaders of the world,

then we should know something about the object of all this international activity.

The New York World's Fair of 1939 will be "the biggest show on earth," dwarfing anything yet presented as an exhibition. It's a \$150,000,000 enterprise—which is ten times the amount President Jefferson paid Napoleon Bonaparte for the Louisiana Purchase. It is expected to lure 75,000,000 visitors in six months—a number equal to three-fifths the

population of the United States.

The hub of the fair and its publicity motif is a towering spike, or trylon, 700 feet high and a globe, the perisphere, 200 feet high, situated at the center. of the grounds. The trylon is the voice of the fair, speaking announcements to the visitors and speak-ing symbolically of towering triumph to all who see. The perisphere is the theme center, for on it is painted a vast panorama depicting all the elements of society coordinated in a better world of the

To guide us further in appreciating our projected tour to the fullest extent, let us jot down in our date-book a few notes.

Sunday, January 1. Our first destination is Paris, France. As President Lebrun sits before a microphone in the studios of the French radio sysmicrophone in the studios of the French radio system, speaking France's salute to the World of Tomorrow, we will be sitting beside him and thinking. Thinking what? Perhaps through our minds will run the strains of an old song of twenty years ago. "Over There"; and we will vaguely recall, perhaps, that the picture on the music sheet represented General Pershing shaking hands with Marshal Foch across the ocean—something like that. Maybe we will be thinking of "Good-bye Broadway; Hello, France," and other tunes with the same theme. This time when we go "over there" we'll be saving This time when we go "over there" we'll be saying our good-bys and hellos with hope rather than with sympathy, with resolution to live together amiably rather than die together heroically. President Lebrun may say something like that to the world as we sit beside him.

What can we say to M'sieur Lebrun after his address? We can mention that their Eiffel Tower, symbol of their great exposition fifty years ago, is still taller than the futuristic trylon. We can remind him that our Statue of Liberty, a gift from France,

still stands as a token of mutual respect between our nations.

Sunday, January 8. Here will be our chance to find out first-hand if Ireland is a "piece of heaven," if the blarney-stone does loosen tongue, and if the colleens are so pretty. When we meet with President Hyde and Premier De Valera at their broadcast in Dublin, we can say to them-as they undoubtedly will say to America over the air—that undoubtedly will say to America over the air—that relations have always been good between our two great countries and will continue to be so in to-morrow's world. We can tell them, too, that we have many Irishmen besides Corrigan in America that we're proud of, and that we have a big place in our hearts for the Irish humor, doggedness, luck, and pluck.

SUNDAY, January 15. We have been privileged to meet so far two presidents and a premier. Now we are to meet on this date our first real king, and a distinguished king he is, Christian X, who has ruled Denmark wisely and well for a quarter of a century. There was "something rotten in Denmark" in the days of Hamlet, but now now. King Christian will be too modest to boast in his radio speech, but when he is through we shall tell him that his country's lesson to the World of Tomorrow is that a happy, healthy nation depends upon the good will of the people toward each other and the concern of the government—no matter what form of govern-ment—for the welfare of the people.

We shall also remind his majesty that a thou-

sand years ago Leif Erickson sailed from Iceland, over which King Christian rules, to the North

American continent, forging a noble tradition.

Sunday, January 22. On to picturesque Holland and a visit with Queen Wilhelmina, ruler for fortyone years, as she delivers her message of salute to the World of Tomorrow. When we speak with the gracious queen, we shall compliment her that a tiny country can hold together so well an empire over fifty times its own size. Then we shall deliver this pointed message of good will; "You know, your own people established the great New York City which is now to hold this world exposition."

Sunday Japany 29. In contrast to little Hol

Sunday, January 29. In contrast to little Holland, on this trip we'll visit the largest nation of them all, Soviet Russia. Perhaps it will be harder to find many cultural links here, both for us and for their official spokesman, who has not yet been chosen. Our philosophies of government are far chosen. Our philosophies of government are far apart, and our countries have sometimes exchanged hot words. At least, there must be in the hearts and minds of the people the same essential desires and motives which stir in us. We don't know whether we'll meet Stalin or somebody else, and we don't know what the spokesman will say. We are eager to meet face to face a person who represents the abstract principles which we abhor in our country and to see what will be the nature of country and to see what will be the nature of Russia's salute.

Sunday, February 5. This week we will sim-

ply make an informal call on a neighbor—a good neighbor. We'll chat with Governor General Lord Tweedsmuir after he broadcasts from Ottawa over the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. The governor general will probably say to America and repeat to us: "Our governments and our people are not perfect, but let all the nations follow our example and the Utopia of tomorrow would be much nearer

Sunday, February 12. We'll have a chance to make the personal acquaintance of that much-head-lined ruler, King Carol of Roumania, whose turbulent career, mixing matrimony and government, parallels somewhat that of the abdicated king, Edward of

Great Britain.
Sunday, February 19. We'll meet in Oslo another distinguished ruler of a colorful north-country,

other distinguished ruler of a colorful north-country, King Haakon VII of Norway.

Sunday, February 26. Our itinerary takes us to Belgium, one of the martyr countries of the Great War, and a visit with King Leopold III as he addresses the radio world.

Sunday, March 5. Prince Paul, regent of Jugoslavia, a country born of that Great War, will be

our host.

Sunday, March 12. Now, if the tentative plans materialize, we will finally be introduced to an emperor, one of the few so-called rulers in the world. We are going to Rome, Italy. Even though Emperor Victor Emmanuel III is considered a figurehead and Benito Mussolini usually makes the speeches, will be interesting to meet and hear from the

titular head of Italy.


Sunday, March 19. Admiral Nicholas Horthy, regent, will speak for Hungary and will, perhaps, tell of the future aims and plans of that country,


which is to us the land of gypsy music.
Sunday, March 26. This will be the thirteenth of our expeditions, and we hope it will not prove a jinx to Poland, the country which we will visit—and a country which has had troubles enough of its own. What will President Moscicki say to us and to America? Perhaps something like this: "The World's Fair celebrates the 150th anniversary of the inauguration of the Father of His Country. Poland has recently celebrated twenty years of independence since the World War. Let us meet at the fair and celebrate our liberty together."

WE WILL say to the president that we in America are great admirers of Poland's Paderewski, immortal genius of the piano, who found time also to serve his country as its former premier.

serve his country as its former premier.

Sunday, April 2. We will make our next visit with a bit of reluctance. Despite the traditional Oriental courtesy of the Japanese, we are a bit dubious of their hospitality. We will remember the bombing of the Panay. We'll remember that China is too busy and too distraught defending itself against Japan to participate in the exposition. least we can do, however, is to politely invite Prince (Continued on Page 17)







THE RADIO PLAYBILL: THIS WEEK-"SCATTERGOOD BAINES"



HIPPOCRATES BROWN (played by John Hearne) is Scattergood's man-of-all-work — but that term means to him as little work as he can get away with. General handyman in the store, Hipp looks after sweeping, deliveries, and other chores, including the tasks involved in helping Scattergood keep Coldriver running

SCATTERGOOD BAINES (Jess Pugh) is the benevolent master mind who rules the destinies of the Coldriver townspeople, always circumspectly and genially but none the less effectively. A consummate psychologist, he puts his ideas across with such deft subtlety that his hand is rarely seen; and he usually manages to solve each problem to the mutual benefit of its principals, himself, and Coldriver in general. Like everyone else, the residents of this typical town make ridiculous mistakes at times, and inevitably it is the kindly and wise Scattergood whose common sense points the way to a reasonable solution. The Coldriver folk regard him as an amiable leader and, somehow, he never seems to fail in the emergencies that overtake his fellows



What Price America?

ERE is 1939, and two World's Fairs are imminent in America, both designed primarily to call universal attention to our typical achievements and products. So far we have heard much about the architecture, industries, inventions and historical mementoes to be shown, but little is being said about the musical activities of the pair of great expositions. That little is chiefly announcement of the importation of foreign orchestras and soloists, and performances of operas written by Europeans and sung and conducted by them. Just what picture does that offer of the progress of American music dating from the Plymouth Rock landing and of the things being done contemporaneously by our own composers and artists?

There was a time when we lagged far behind Europe in the significant creation and presentation of music and perforce were compelled to bring both from abroad. Without wishing to wave the flag too violently or make the eagle scream too boastfully, may it not be recorded in all truth and justice that today we equal other countries in all musical matters, and in some even surpass them? In answer, this department of RADIO GUIDE emits a vociferous "Yes!"


These World's Fairs should invite opportunity for the American public finally to shake off its musical inferiority complex and end servile curtsying to everything tonal that comes from overseas. We imitated Europe through the years and copied its models; now is the hour to show that we have assimilated them completely and need no further guidance and patronizing condescension. Musical creative genius is at a standstill abroad; nothing of towering importance has been penned there since the World War. Our American symphonic composers produce works at least as good as those by their younger colleagues abroad, and American conductors, singers and instrumentalists are as able as the latest across the Atlantic.

America used to be told that it possessed no folk-music on which to build a typical symphonic structure, as had been done in Europe. Then our musicologists undertook research and discovered a wealth of indigenous material in the Indian, Negro and cowboy heritage of tune, the early examples of California, the Southwest, the northern lumber camps, the Middle West, ro-

mantic Louisiana, and the mountains of Kentucky and the Carolinas. With the revival of those melodies were evolved new rhythms and characteristic harmonies not to be found in any music but that of America. Ragtime, jazz, blues and even swing made the world listen and like, and not only did our better composers utilize the novel idiom in their serious opuses but Europeans borrowed it and tried-most unsuccessfully-to incorporate it into their own writings.

Meanwhile, in symphony, our composers need no apologies as originators or craftsmen; in opera, no European has of recent years offered a better example than Taylor's "Peter Ibbetson"; in the piano-orchestra form, we lead with Powell's "Negro Rhapsody" and Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue."

The World's Fairs should present that picture eloquently and convincingly and show the world that we have come

of age musically. There should be folksong cavalcades with appropriate pageantry, restoration of early American operas and concert compositions, and finally a parade of our contemporary music-but everything sung, played and conducted by the musicians of this country.

Against the array of present-day foreign composers, let the World's Fairs feature ours. In the field of light music, let us offset Lehar, Linke, Oscar Strauss and Kalman with Gershwin, Kern, Porter and Rogers; in the serious domain, let us play our trumps with

Hanson, Copland, Taylor, Sowerby, Mc-Donald, MacDowell, Harris, Sessions, Wagenaar, Schelling, Mason, Gruenberg, Bennett, Ives and others.

Let us announce to Europeans that we have definitely stopped imitating them; let us invite them to imitate us hereafter.

Speaking Up By V. V.

Will radio provide greater opportunities for young American artists in the future than it has in the past?

"Speaking Up" put that question to several of the men who control the musical destiny of radio, hoping to catch them in the prophetic mood usually associated with the advent of a new year. The answers they gave us were undoubtedly significant and we shall publish them in full in this column next week.

The Magic Key of RCA plans to salute the New Year with an "extra special" program on January 1, lasting two hours. Among the artists to be heard will be Kirsten Flagstad, Dr. Waiter Damrosch, Ezio Pinza and Larry Clinton, the man who made Debussy and his "Reverie" into a best-seller. Frank Black will conduct, alternating with Dr. Damrosch, and a two-way conversation will link the San Francisco and New York World's Fairs.

With pardonable pride, we notice that among the semi-finalists of the first half of the Metropolitan Auditions of the Air series were three March of Music choices, Mack Harell, Robert Topping and Robert Nicholson. The second half of the series starts Sunday, January 1.

HAVE YOU HEARD THAT: The earliest and oldest Christmas music is found in the Gregorian Chant, the medieval collection of ecclesiastic hymns, anthems and melodies covering the entire year, according to the liturgy of the Catholic Church, sanctioned by Pope Gregory the Great and used for more than a thousand years . . . the earliest carol is supposed to be the Anglo-Norman "Seignors ore entendez a nus" . . . carols in England began as popular songs . . . although English carols are better known in America, those from other countries are much more beautiful . . . Palestrina was one of the first of the great composers to write Christmas music.

RUSSIAN Alexander Glazounow (1865-1936), once officially suspected of being a Nihilist, sounds gentle enough in this music, which has easy flow of melody and facile handling of instruments. Dating from 1904, the violin concerto has been an abiding favorite with some of the most famous violinists, including Heifetz, Elman and Zimbalist. Piastro, too, shines in the work and plays it with especial affection and understanding, for he told me that he performed it several times in Russia, under the baton of the composer.

Echoes of old Vienna end the program with lilt and piquancy. One wonders whether Johann Strauss, were he living today, could write such lighthearted music in a city given over to tyranny and persecution.

otte Lehmann's warm voice and moving characterization of the Princess will again be the chief feature of Strauss' merry and melodious opera. No one equals her in portrayal of the charming, worldlywise woman who, with wistful grace, realizes her advancing years, sadly renounces romance.

The Princess .

With the rise of the curtain we follow the eternally wistful tale of a beautiful woman growing old and losing her lover to youth. We hear her plaint at the end of the first act, and admire her acceptance of her lot in the last act.

At today's revival, there is the added attraction of Rise Stevens' participation, the young American mezzo-soprano who made such a strikingly successful New York debut recently in "Mignon." She is cast as Octavian, the youthful cavalier who intrigues to win his lovely bride.

ACT I

The boudoir of the Princess (The action takes place during the eighteenth century) Octavian, the Princess' seventeenfarewell to youth, and designates Octavian as the messenger with the rose for Sophie.

ACT II

Drawing-room of the Faninals

To exquisite waltz strains, Octavian enters, dressed in white and silver, bearing the rose. At first sight he and Sophie fall in love. The Baron finds them in tender embrace and fights an awkward duel with Octavian, in which the old amorist is lightly scratched on the wrist and comically frightened. Sophie refuses to marry him, to the consternation of her father. Octavian, plotting the Baron's exposure, sends him a forged billet doux from the pretty "maid" of the Princess, fixing a rendezvous for dinner. Ochs dances about in hopeful delight.

ACT III

A room at an inn

Ochs and the "maid" at table. She plays all sorts of tricks on him, helped by sympathetic accomplices, one of them a woman who accuses the frantic Baron of being the father of her numerous children. The police arrest him

year-old lover (the role is written for soprano and is always done by a woman) declares his devotion. The pair imagine they hear the Princess' husband approaching and Octavian hides. But the intruder is only the fat and lecherous Baron Ochs, cousin of the Princess. He asks her aid in his suit for the hand of pretty Sophie Faninal. Octavian, now disguised as a maid, flirts with Ochs while the Princess' servants complete her toilet and entertain her with music. Ochs delivers a silver rose to the Princess with the request that it be sent to Sophie, that being the ancient symbol of betrothal. The Princess, alone, sings her haunting as a dangerous seducer. Sophie appears and denounces Ochs, who is saved by the arriving Princess from the clutches of the law. Octavian resumes male attire and the tormented Ochs realizes how he had been duped. The Princess unites and blesses the youthful lovers and a vocal trio of exalted beauty expresses their joy and her own affecting resignation.

The stage is left empty. Entrancing chords sound on the celesta. The Princess' little black slave trips in, recovers the Princess' dropped handker-chief, runs out again, and the curtain falls on this most delightful of all operas.

DEMOCRACY AT WORK

THIS WEEK THE OPENING OF THE 76TH CONGRESS GIVES PROMISE OF COLOR, A VITAL MESSAGE, GOOD LISTENING

HERE is the confused and occasionally blatant babble of many voices. There is the sound of scraping feet here and there. Through the teeming activity can be felt an undertone of suspense. The hum continues unabated. Then-

Bang! Bang! There is slightly less

More bangs of wood on wood. "Order, please!" The strident hum

Bang some more. "The 76th Congress will come to order." The forceful voice of Hon. William B. Bankhead, speaker of the House of Representatives, can now be distinguished, calling for order. Finally he gets itand the 76th Congress of the United States is in session.

The chaplain asks God to direct the destinies of a democracy at work. Congress is ready to roll up its sleeves once more to mend the social and economic structure rather than political fences.

On the rostrum sit Speaker Bank-Vice-President Garner, and head. President Roosevelt. On the floor of the House sit the senators, representatives and delegates of the United States and its possessions. In the gallery, outshining the Metropolitan Opera's diamond horseshoe with big names, sit the special guests of the politicians.

In our homes we sit comfortably by our radios, as much—yes, more—a

part of the activity than those on the scene. We, the people, are the final governing voice, for this is a democracy of, by and for us.

This year, as usual, radio, operating in the public "interest, convenience-and entertainment," brings us an inside view of our government going to work to-

"-form a more perfect Union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquillity, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty for ourselves and our posterity—"

These words from the preamble of our honored Constitution will be in the backs of our minds as Congress proceeds to its spotlight feature, the report upon the state of the nation by our President, Franklin D. Roosevelt.

"Members of the 76th Congress of the United States, my friends-

THERE will be applause—here genuinely enthusiastic, there mildly courteous; there will be attentive interest. There will also be a few congressmen muttering in their collars, and a few radio listeners privately booing at space, chiefly for the sake of hearing themselves taking a voice in the government. That's the voice of the militant minority. That's democracy. That's the American way. It's healthy.

President Roosevelt, even as he

utters that familiar trade-mark, "my

friends," knows that those listening to his words do not all consider themselves his friends. But he considers them his friends. If he does not, he should not be their President. He knows that. They must be his friends for the sake of government and the national welfare.

The President knows that this very

As close as these sled-riding children to the great Capitol, so close to our government are we, the people, of a democracy

Congress will be less friendly to him than any he has yet faced; but F. D. R. is a fighting champion. He comes before his co-workers in Congress— the only President other than Woodrow Wilson to deliver his opening messages in person—looking the friendly and unfriendly in the eye with equal candor.

Call it courage, publicity, determination, inspiration, or stubbornness -but you can't deny it's color. And how we, the people of America, eat up color-whether it's dished out by a Babe Ruth, a Greta Garbo, a Jack Dempsey, a Douglas Corrigan, a Dizzy Dean, a Bing Crosby, or a Franklin D. Roosevelt.

THEY all pack the house and stand them in the aisles. Even many of the booers of Ruth, Dean, and Roosevelt come to scoff and remain to pray.

Take the word of Joseph J. Sinnot, the veteran House doorkeeper, for in-stance. He thinks the opening of the 76th Congress, with Mr. Roosevelt's personal appearance as the feature attraction, must be the "greatest show on earth." He has only 600 gallery seats at the disposal of guests, and the thousands of applications have broken the all-time record.

Of course, you can't credit all that box-office pull to the President's natural appeal. The Republicans are getting a good, healthy bite of the gov-ernmental pie for the first time in several long, lean years. They're mak-ing the most of it! Why not? That's that militant minority again. That's democracy.

Moreover, there will probably be more radio listeners taking in the pro-ceedings this year than ever before, except, perhaps, in the year of Roosevelt's first personal appearance. The major networks are prepared to see that the listeners miss nothing. Besides carrying the message of the President, the broadcasting companies will have microphones stationed at various points of vantage. Celebrities will be interviewed and announcers will describe the background and sidelights of the scene.

Americans are taking a more and more active and constructive interest in politics. They know this will be a vital and an exciting session of Congress. They are wondering how it will affect their own lives. Under the heading of "Establishing justice," what will

As predicted a couple of columns ago, Johnny Green and his orchestra will take over the baton on the CBS and NBC "Johnny Presents" programs starting January 28 . . . Last week you read here that Walter Woolf King may not be on the Cantor show when Eddie leaves New York. This has since been confirmed. Announcer Bert Parks got the job, and he resigned from the CBS staff in order to go west with Cantor . . . Tommy Riggs and his entire cast, including "Betty Lou," of course, will trek westward sometime in

February . . . Attention, kiddies! "Buck Rogers in the 25th Century" is coming back to the air via transcriptions starting sometime in April . In order for Kate Smith to sing "Silent Night Holy Night" on her Christmas programs as she has done for the past eight years, the songbird puts her request in twelve months in advance because of the network rule prohibiting use of the same song on consecutive programs. It's a case of first come, first served, so Katie doesn't take any chances of anyone beating her to it . . Joan Edwards is making her first stage appearance in a Broadway theater this week. It was only

about two years ago she graduated from Hunter College . . . Bea Wain, who introduced "Heart and Soul" over the networks with Larry Clinton's orchestra and then sang it again in a Paramount short, has been signed by Warner Bros. to make another movie short. This time she'll feature "Old Folks," another tune she radioed first.

Two new announcers have been added to the CBS staff. John Harper hails from WJR in Detroit and John Hundley, an actor who is making his debut in radio . . Betty Garde, popular radio actress, is to be featured in a Broadway show titled, "Primrose Path." Betty, who seems to have played more mother roles on the air than any other actress, will have the role of a young mother in the show . . Apparently Fred Waring is taking television very seriously. How It Began

How does an author conceive the idea of a script-show? Your Tattler found the answer in a talk with Ken Robinson, continuity director at NBC, who also authors "Dan Harding's Wife." Four years ago Robinson, a reporter for the Chicago Evening American, was giving newscasts over the NBC station in Chicago, WENR. Being in radio and naturally inquisitive, he began listening to the various script-shows on the air. He was astounded by all the trouble and woe inflicted upon radio's numerous serial characters. Why not write a down-toearth "homey" show, he thought—one depicting

the real-life problems a lone mother had to face in raising her children? And so "Dan Harding's Wife" was born. Exactly three years ago Robinson wrote up three episodes of his brain-child, dashed down to the Merchandise Mart with it, and the following Monday it was on the air. On January 21 the show will start its fourth year on the air. The jovial, good-natured NBC continuity chieftain told your Tattler some behind-the-scenes stuff about the show. Try as he may, Robinson cannot write the show at his office. The program must be written at the workshop in his suburban Beverly Hills home. Every episode has been written there. He has pictures of all the characters on his wall at home-and it is there he gets in the mood of his show. So real have the characters in the show become to him that Robinson does not address the actors by their own names but by their names in the show. How far in advance does he write? About two weeks. Like "One Man's Family," each episode of "Dan Harding's Wife" is numbered and titled, but Robinson doesn't name each episode. Instead, producer J. Clint Stanley and members of the cast get in a huddle before show-time and christen the episode for that day.

It was episode number 725 of "Dan Harding's Wife" that your Tattler witnessed. Another of radio's hat-wearers (Ken Griffin is another one) is Merrill Fugit, who plays the part of Dean, one of the Harding twins. Bulk of the dialog was between pretty, wide-eyed Loretta Poynton, who plays twin Donna Harding, and handsome Willard Farnum, who takes the role of Jack Garland. Lovers years ago but since drifted apart, Jack would once more like to be number one in Donna's "heart parade." But it seems there's another man, and the episode closes with things looking pretty dark for

Jack. Isabel Randolph (Mrs. Harding) didn't have much to say. Sitting in a chair by the studio wall when not acting, Miss Randolph dons spectacles when reading her script. Not heard in the show I saw was Dean's chum, fun-loving stooge Lowe, who is played by youthful Hugh Rowlands.

Since "Dan Harding's Wife" started, Loretta Poynton in real life has had two baby boys. Mrs. Ken Robinson, wife of the author, gave birth to a baby girl, the Robinson's first daughter. They already had two boys . . . Merrill Fugit is a bachelor and Isabel Randolph a widow . . .


Musical Notes





Person to Person

Hearty handclaps for NBC's Judith Waller in recognition of her courage, insight and perseverance seeing through the establishment of a local "town meeting" for the city of Chicago. Station WENR will be the outlet, January 10, the first broadcast, "Transportation" the first topic, and the good city's mayor, Edward J. Kelly, may be one of the first speakers. Miss Waller sponsored this idea several months ago but had to abandon it when opposition got too strong. Taking it up again, with Northwestern's Samuel N. Stevens slated for the moderator's post, the stunt is finally set to go, but not without many quizzical eyebrows raised regarding possible outcome. Considering poor job Chi papers are doing supplying local citizenry with actual, uncolored facts about what goes on, this move should have the blessing of everyone, except-ing, perhaps, some of the politicos.

Students and civic-minded laymen alike will be pleased to note the resumption by Columbia this week of two broadcasts from Washington, D. C., "Current Questions Before the House"* and "Current Questions Before the Senate." Considering the present unsettled outlook in Washington, the extremely confusing state of the national political scene, and the fact that another presidential election is not so far off, these broadcasts assume more than usual interest, promise to enjoy wider listening audience than ever

Lucky is station WCAU with the exclusive privilege of broadcasting from the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia. One of the year's most interesting experiments took place there recently when a balloon, carrying scientific apparatus and miniature radio station, ascended 78,000 feet, radioed back information about temperature, altitude and cosmic ray inten-sity. A few days later a fisherman off Nantucket got the most unusual "catch" of the year when he salvaged the equipment from the water.

 Under consideration is the possibility of making the School Broadcast Conference, two meetings of which so far have been sponsored by the Chicago Board of Education's Radio Council, a national gathering. Idea has many favorable angles, particularly Chicago's central position, geographically, and Chicago's central position regarding radio-education activity (the most of which is taking place at present in the Middle West).

Stimulating contrast keynotes new Mark Sullivan-Jay Franklin series. Both nationally known Washington correspondents, Sullivan is classed as "conservative," Franklin is decidedly "liberal." RIES DEFINES JOB, DOES IT

principles guiding selection, preparation and presentation of programs in Mutual's "The Nation's School of the Air"s series is its director, Joseph Ries. Dynamic, interesting, "on his toes" every minute is Ries, and, fortunately, these qualities are reflected in his work.

"It is not the function of radio in a national facility to take the place of the teacher," says director Ries, "but rather augment the teacher's classroom activity in bringing the world to the pupils at their desks.

"In so far as radio has brought to the classroom material which the classroom could not otherwise secure, so far, and so far only has radio as an art made a genuine contribution to class-room education."

What radio can give the classroom that "the classroom could not otherwise secure" is convincingly demonstrated in the "Nation's School" weekly history lesson, Pioneer Pathways. Here the story of the development of the Northwest is presented by vivid dramatization, in which the students meet

Sunday, April 9. Here is a trip that will leave a good taste in our mouths. We are going to see quiet, beautiful, peaceful Sweden, home of popular King Gustav V and popular Greta Garbo. We can tell the great king wholcheartedly that we admire his perpetual virility and his democratic attitude toward his subjects. We can point out: "You have in Stockholm one of the most beautiful cities in the world. We have in New York one of the greatest cities in the world. Let us work together to make the city of tomorrow both beautiful and great."

Sunday, April 16. We are invited to the home of another near neighbor, Brazil. Here, as in all the countries of the Americas, we will find many similar interests, social, political, economic. Dr. Getulio Vargas, president of Brazil, will be our host at Rio de Janeiro, and as he speaks we will be hoping that the New York World's Fair will be another step toward the practical ideal of pan-Americanism and world cooperation.

Sunday, April 23. This will be the last of our delightful journeys to foreign lands to meet foreign figures. What nation is more appropriate for a climactic visit than Great Britain, our sister in race and culture. Sir Louis Beale, commissioner general to the fair, will introduce us in London to the highest dignitaries of the great empire. They will tell the world over the air that the two English-speaking nations will ever act as a unit in seeking a better world order. We will probably be making mental reservations about alliances for aggressive warfare. It will be a grand final thrill to sit in spacious Buckingham Palace in the company of royalty with such an il-lustrious tradition, and to walk through the unpretentious door at 10 Downing Street with the officials of the land that knows no setting sun.

Then we must close our date-book and get ready to visit the great fair ourselves. Of course, we are sorry that time prevents our visiting other great countries. Others are not in our schedule for other reasons. There will be no "Heils" from Germany. Reichsfuehrer Hitler withdrew his plans for participation in the fair because of "expense" expense, perhaps, of creating a personal world of tomorrow. Spain has no plans for participation, being occupied in a war to determine its own future.

Nevertheless, we have radio to thank for one of the biggest treats of its history. We have lived with royalty in fairy-tales and literature. We have read great names in the news. Never, however, have we been afforded the opportunity of hearing the voices of so many of them.

We are indebted to the New York World's Fair of 1939 for this privilege. It is fitting that we give the closing inscription in our book of dates into the hands of Mr. Grover Whalen, whose hand guides the transformation of a dump on Flushing Bay into a symbol of the World of Tomorrow. He

says:
"These broadcasts lead up to the opening of the New York World's Fair April 30, 1939, and offer further evidence of the extraordinarily international character of this great exposition. When kings and queens, leaders of nations, find it worthy to salute the fair, then we are again reassured that this vast undertaking is certain of fulfilling the high purpose to which it is dedicated-building the World of Tomorrow, which means building for world peace and progress."






