The Coughlin Tempest

Some listeners consider Father Coughlin a windjammer. Others call him worse. Regardless of individual likes, he does have an audience. Figures presented recently by those door-bell-ringing gentlemen who know about such things indicate that 3,500,000 regular listeners follow his talks, and that 15,000,000 have heard him at one time or another during recent months.

Any man whose voice reaches that many people can do a lot of good or a lot of mischief, according to your lights. So thought the managers of several radio stations recently when they considered his remarks to be an incitement to race hatred and refused to broadcast his orations unless he supplied copies a few hours ahead of broadcast time. The resulting hue and cry made the front pages. Followers bellowed, "Censorship." Critics yelled, "He's a menace." The battle rages.

One clear voice which has spoken of the problem is that of Neville Miller, president of the National Association of Broadcasters, who holds to the conviction, which we share, that the American system of broadcasting is the best system now available to any people in the world. He cuts to the kernel of the problem with:

In a country of many races and many religions amicably dwelling together, broadcasts inciting racial and religious hatred are an evil not to be tolerated. In these troubled times, there is need for national unity.

The responsibility for the content of programs rests upon the broadcaster; to determine what is in the public interest requires the exercise of an informed and mature judgment. He is well within his rights to demand an advance copy of any proposed radio talk. He is well within his rights to close his facilities to any speaker who refuses to submit it. He is well within his rights to refuse to broadcast a speech plainly calculated or likely to stir up religious prejudice and strife.

The situation parallels the example once given by the late Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes of the United States Supreme Court, where he declared that free speech did not give a man the right to yell "fire" in a crowded theater.

Smuggling

We pause at the headline that rides high on every newspaper:

Jack Benny indicted for smuggling. Already George Burns has confessed his guilt. There may be others. We ask ourselves, "Why did they do it?" They didn't need the money. Burns and Allen are getting \$15,000 per hour of broadcasting. Jack Benny is figured at \$16,000 for a half-hour.

Could it have been that smuggling is not a crime against anyone? Smuggling is more like a game. Children play it with their parents when they smuggle dime novels into bed after hours, or cigarettes up in the barn loft, or tune in forbidden radio programs when mother is away. When those children grow up, they play the game with Uncle Sam. What visitor to Mexico or Canada has not brought back something in a hidden pocket? What

stay-at-home has blamed a returned traveler for not paying duty on that French perfume or that box of Havana cigars?

It was Jack Benny's and George

Burns' bad luck to play the game with a fellow who played for keeps, so that their names have been linked with that of a notorious and convicted smuggler. We hope Uncle Sam will be lenient.

To protect the listener from an overdose of any one tune the National Broadcasting Company has set up a definite check system to allow duplication within only a reasonable period. All musical programs are submitted to the New York offices, where each number is checked against all programs already submitted, using the same network. Should any number already be listed within a period from three hours before to three hours after the time of the program being cleared, the number is deleted "because of duplication." That phrase has come to be a headache to program-builders but an unknown boon to the listener.

Great Americans

THINK ABOUT RADIO

I HAVE been asked to write a few words about what radio means to women. It seems to me that it is pretty obvious that radio means to women much the same as it does to men—entertainment, education, hitherto inaccessible music and drama. The whole world outside the door is now available to us all at the turn of a dial.

But it is also true that the radio means *more* to women than to men. There is an old saying — "Man works from sun to sun, but woman's work is never done." And the saying is true. Whether their work is harder than that of men doesn't come into the question, but the fact is that the average woman is more continuously busy for more hours of the day than the average man. The wife and mother of a family without a servant, and that is the overwhelming majority of all the wives and mothers in the United States, is occupied with some form of work from morning until night. Men have always been greater readers than women—not because women's minds are any less active and interested but because the men have had more *time*.

When the average husband bids his wife good-by in the morning, he has a half-hour, perhaps, to look forward to during which, riding to his work on a subway or streetcar or bus, he can read the paper. And again, when he comes home from work in the evening, he is allowed to relax with the news of the day (if that is possible in these days!) while supper is being prepared. But the wife? Does she sit down and read the paper when her husband has left the house? Not at all. There are dishes to be washed, children to be hurried off to school, the day's menu to be planned. And, at the end of the day, it's two to one that sheer fatigue will cause her to choose the relaxation of a nap to any serious discussion of the week's events.

So it was that before the coming of the radio, women were pretty well inclined to leave knowledge of world news and affairs to the man of the family. A few hardy souls found the extra time to devote to politics; but on the whole, the women of this country followed the European custom of deferring in such matters to the head of the house. And it wasn't, let me print out again, because they weren't interested; but because they simply didn't have the time to find out.

Now I believe that the women of the world, and especially the women of America, have a contribution to make to the progress and betterment of the world. But they can only make their contribution if they know what is going on, if they are aware of the day-to-day facts which, added together, spell the trend of our times.

Here in America we have a free radio—a radio to which a woman can listen as she sweeps her house, as she minds the baby, as she mends the family socks in the evening. This free radio of ours is all the time making it more and more possible for our women to be aware, to know their facts, to take their logical place in the decisions of the world. For this I, as a woman, am grateful, and I believe we all should be.

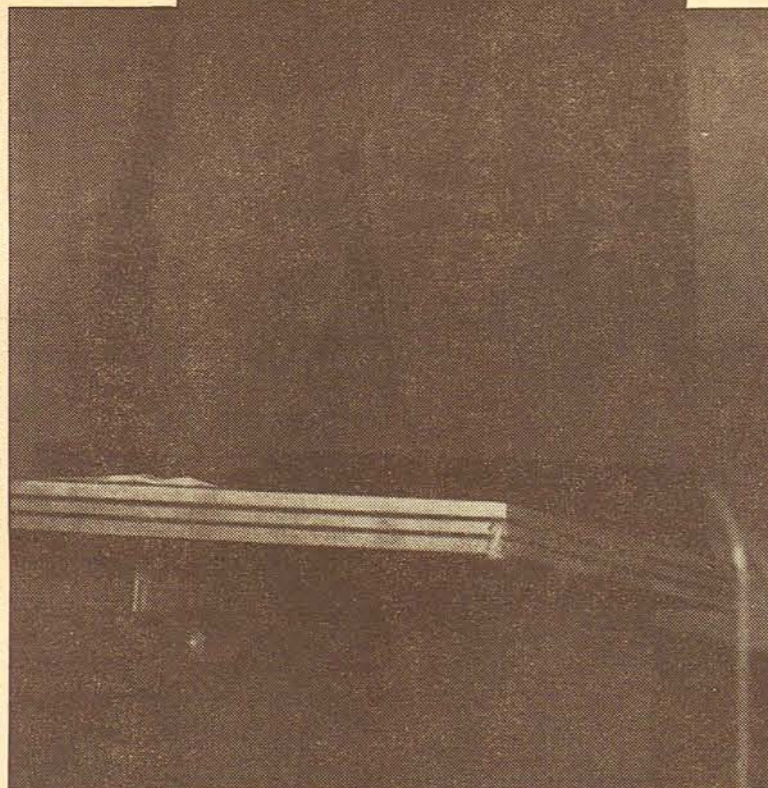
STARS IN MY EYES

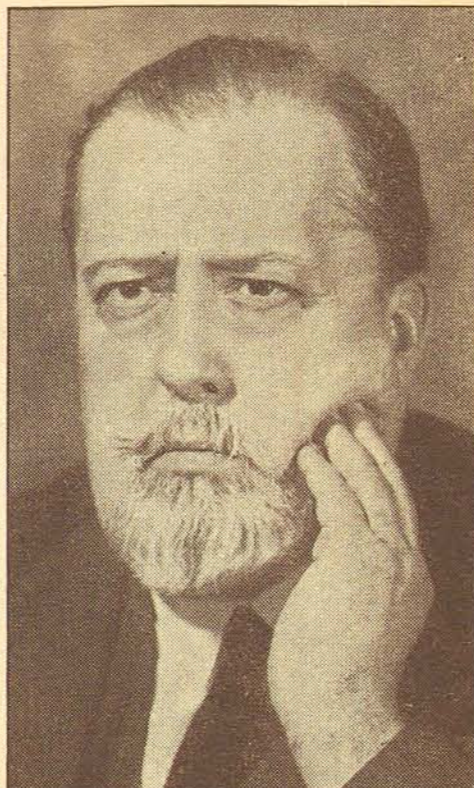

AN INTIMATE, UNUSUAL STORY OF THE PEOPLE BEHIND THE GLAMOUR MASKS OF GRAND OPERA, PAST AND PRESENT

THERE seems to be one year in everyone's life that changes everything for him. My year for complete alterations was 1917, and I will have to live a long time before I forget it! At one moment I was trudging the sidewalks hungry and penniless. The next I was a dictator—a rather timid, frightened dictator, I must admit—laying down the law to the famous stars on the roster of the Metropolitan Opera Company.

It happened this way: The Province of Quebec, in which I was born, had given me a scholarship and sent me to Paris to study. Finished with my studies there, I found a position as accompanist with the orchestra of the Conservatoire de Paris, which was just setting out on an American tour. I came on to New York in advance—and, the day I arrived, received a cablegram saying the tour had been postponed for a year. It was my first time in the United States. I had fifty dollars; not enough to take me back to France, not enough to take me home to Quebec. In two weeks the fifty dollars was gone and I had no money at all, no friends and no job. Who wanted a young musician just out of

school? My only recommendation was that I had played the bass drum with a regimental band in Quebec when I was seven years old.

Then things happened quickly. I met a Metropolitan Opera soprano. She asked me to accompany her in concert. Pierre Monteux, the conductor of the orchestra at the Metropolitan, heard me. He asked me to accompany a private pupil of his named Ganna Walska.

The next thing I knew I was hired as assistant conductor at the Met. Shaking hands with great Jove himself, the shambling, bearded Gatti-Casazza, who ran the opera company with iron hand in a steel glove, he

said: "You'll begin a month earlier than the others. I want you to prepare a singer."

"Who is it?" I asked.

"Martinelli."

He could not have given me a worse shock if he had said Caruso! Martinelli was at that time just reaching the height of his powers. He was one of the great tenors of the world. And I—I, the bass drummer—was to bully him, drive him into learning *Faust* in French. I was his new boss. His straw-boss at any rate.

"HE'LL come to your house every morning," said Gatti, adding ominously, "Let me know if he's late."

My "house" was a three-room apartment far uptown in New York, with the elevated train thundering past the windows. Except for the piano, which I rented, the furniture was mine by courtesy of the landlady, who did not believe in wasting carpet with nap or chairs with waning legs on poor musicians. The bed, I am sure, was stuffed with old roller-skates. I lay awake on it most of the night wondering what Martinelli would think of me and my little palace. I saw him stalking in, a tall man with a severe face, wearing a twenty-dollar hat and fifty-dollar shoes and followed by secretaries and valets. "What is this horrible place and who is this horrible creature?" he would say, holding a bottle of smelling-salts to his nose. "Take me away."

In the morning when the bell rang I was so nervous it was all I could do to get up courage enough to answer it. Outside stood an unassuming, modestly dressed chap who might have been the piano-tuner. As I greeted him, he said something that showed he was a great diplomat, a great psychologist, a great craftsman and a great gentleman. "This is very good of you, Maestro Pelletier," he said.

That was all, but it was a great deal. I might be young, I might be inexperienced. I might be a fool who didn't know a tenth as much about *Faust* as he did. Nevertheless I had been assigned to coach him. His duty to his work demanded that he take my word as law. Martinelli acknowledged all of that in the single word *maestro*—teacher. Then I saw an example of his energy; the energy that had lifted him to the top rank. "Let's start," he said, peeling off coat, collar and tie. He sang for two hours without resting. He worked like a harvest hand.

Few singers last ten years—especially few tenors, since they sing with the greatest strain. Martinelli is still singing today after a quarter of a century. In addition he stepped down over the footlights long ago to devote his free time to public service. As this is written he is out making speeches with New York's Mayor LaGuardia pleading for an art center for New York, like the art centers in other cities. I do not need to tell anybody about him. But

bewilderment. I could only shrug. "So this is what the public likes!" I said to myself. "This is the great tenor! Well, there's no accounting for tastes." We came to the mill scene. In the mill scene Samson begs for strength to endure his blindness if it is God's will that he suffer for his people. Suddenly the bleating stopped. There floated up to the rafters the most liquid human voice I had ever heard.

AFTERWARDS we learned the reason. At rehearsals Caruso squeaked along any old way, singing through his nose in order to save wear on his throat. The others knew it and expected it. But Samson's prayer was so beautiful, and he loved it so dearly, that he could never resist it. When he came to it, before he knew what he was doing he was singing in his full voice. And it was an angel singing then.

I saw Enrico nearly every morning after that for quite a number of years. I was in the prompter's box for the performance of *La Juive*—that was the

me he'll only borrow it from me. This way I lose only the money. That way I lose the money, maybe the friend, and surely someone to play poker with."

My introduction to Lucrezia Bori was as amusing as my introduction to Caruso. We were putting on an opera written by an American composer. The job of training an understudy for one of the leading women's roles was left to me.

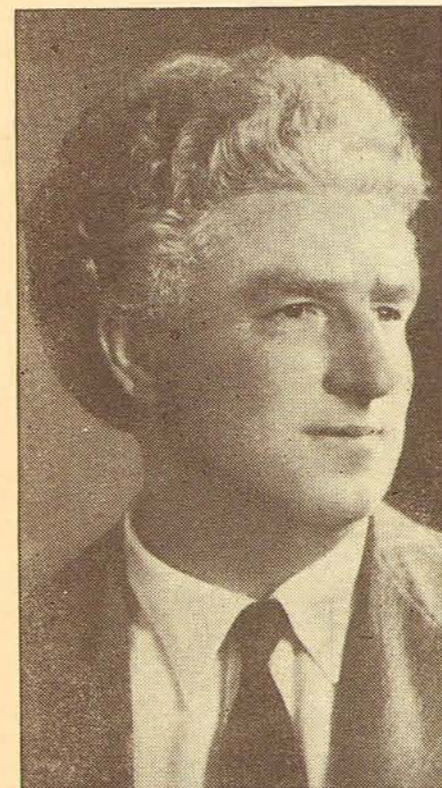
The day of the performance, the star caught a cold and my girl reported at the opera house for duty. As she stepped on the stage she heard a woman somewhere behind her say, "What a face!" She walked straight across the stage and out the door at the other side and went home in a taxicab, furious.

A performance scheduled and no singer! That meant a tornado. Gatti-Casazza was not noted for a mild temper. As I looked around me people began to fade from sight like smoke. The music secretary, when I discov-

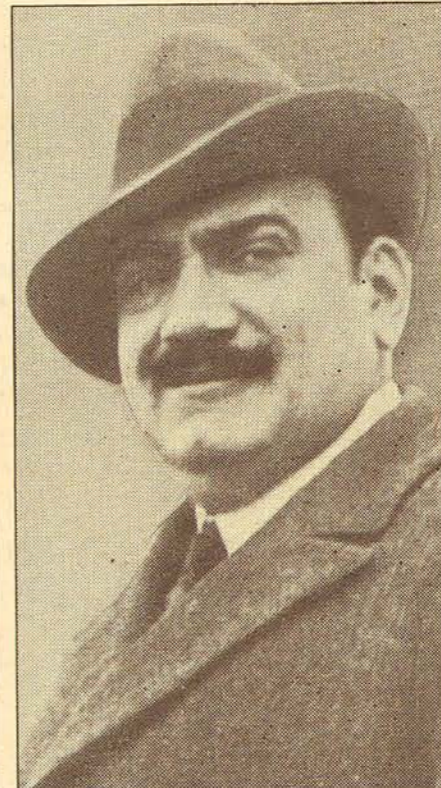
giggling, "may I present Maestro Pelletier?"

Bori has perhaps the greatest mind of anyone in the music world today. In opera, one thing is true. There is never any mistaking why the great ones are great. They are great because they have something plus. The woods are full of good voices. There are even plenty of people who have good voices, energy, intelligence, personal presence and dramatic fire. But only the truly great, the little handful of singers you could crowd into a good-sized coat-closet, have in addition that mysterious last ounce. With Lucrezia Bori, the last ounce is scholarship to a certain extent. Her musicianship is so superb that at rehearsals the men in the orchestra stand and applaud her. But she has that rarest of things, true nobility of character, as well. In twenty years I have never known her to repeat a word of gossip or say an unkind thing about anyone.

Incidentally, this may be a good place for me to explain a bit of gossip



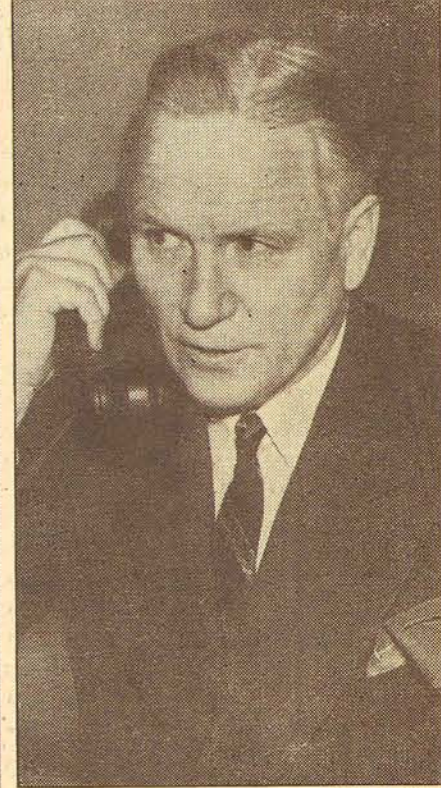
Giovanni Martinelli, "great diplomat, great craftsman and great gentleman"

one story about Giovanni Martinelli I should like very much to tell. When Caruso died, half the tenors on the globe began to advertise themselves as his successor. Martinelli did not. Once when we were together I asked him why.

"I would never presume to step into the shoes of a man as great as Enrico," he said. "And I wouldn't use a name that has grown sacred in opera to advertise my own wares."

But, if Caruso has a successor, it is Martinelli.

My introduction to Caruso was rather startling. I had heard of him. So had Pierre Monteux, my superior in the orchestra pit; but neither of us had heard him sing. We were told to make ready for a piano rehearsal of *Samson and Delilah* with Caruso, Matzenauer, Whitehill and Rothier. In his street clothes Caruso slouched out onto the stage at the rehearsal and opened his mouth to sing. But instead of song I can only describe the sound that came from his throat as a bleating. Act I, Act II, Act III came and went and the caterwauling went on. He was singing through his nose. Monteux was throwing me glances of great agony and

last opera he ever sang. At home he worked in dressing-gown and slippers, carrying a cigaret in a long holder. The room was bare except for a piano, a table, a pitcher of water and a pile of silver quarters. The quarters were for tips; his greatest joy. He was always inventing errands for the bell-boys so he could give them tips, just as he was always finding an excuse to give presents to the chorus people at the opera house. When life was generous with you, he believed, you should hang on to nothing that it brought you. You must share what you had with others. That was his creed. I remember something that happened once when he was playing poker that showed the lengths to which he was ready to carry it. Enrico was wild about poker. He would play with anyone, anywhere, any time. This time, one of the men at the table was winning a bit too consistently.

A FRIEND took Caruso aside. "Enrico," he asked, "don't you know that fellow is cheating?"

"Caro amico," answered Caruso, "of course I know he's cheating, a little. But if I don't let him win money from

ered him, was hiding behind a door. The fateful summons came. Mr. Gatti wished to see Mr. Pelletier in his office at once. I knew what for. For a coffee without cream—opera slang for a tongue-lashing. When I arrived, Gatti was green—literally. He had one of his bilious attacks. Things did not look well.

HIS opening blast was stunning. He could swear in five languages, and I took a deep breath of relief. "Thank heavens," I said to myself, "the worst is over." I didn't think he could top his opening burst of oratory. But I was wrong. The gale rose steadily while I examined the rugs, the pictures on the wall and a handsome woman who sat in the corner with a lace handkerchief pressed to her lips—sobbing or giggling, I couldn't tell which. There was no use trying to say anything. With Gatti, cursing was an art. He didn't like to be interrupted. I stood. He cursed. Five minutes passed. Ten. Fifteen. At last he ran out of names to call me and mopped his forehead, panting.

"Miss Bori," he said with a formal bow toward the lady who had been

for which I was once responsible. Although ten years have passed since then, I still meet people occasionally who wonder what ever became of the romance between Bori and Edward Johnson, who today is in charge of the Met. It was rumored that they were engaged. The rumor was my fault. Miss Bori and Mr. Johnson were rehearsing *Pelleas and Melisande* with me. Since they were both hard workers, the three of us were constantly together, and one day the newspaper reporters cornered me.

"Aren't those two seeing a lot of each other?" they asked me.

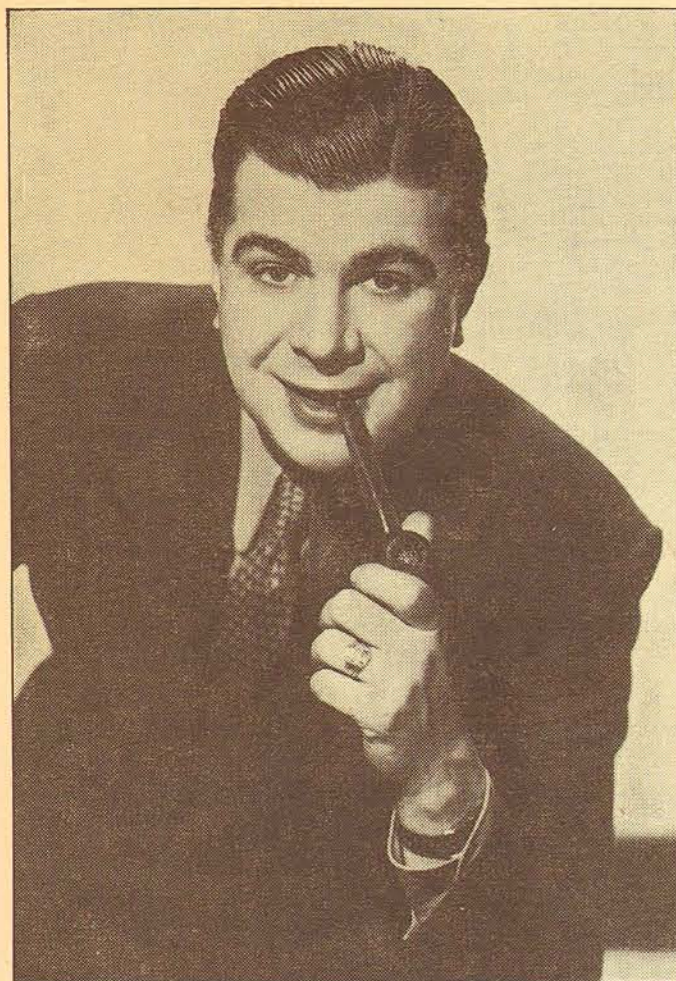
I was tired and cross. "It must be *Pelleas and Melisande*," I said. "It has a romantic effect on people."

Edward and Lucrezia pledged their troth in the evening editions.

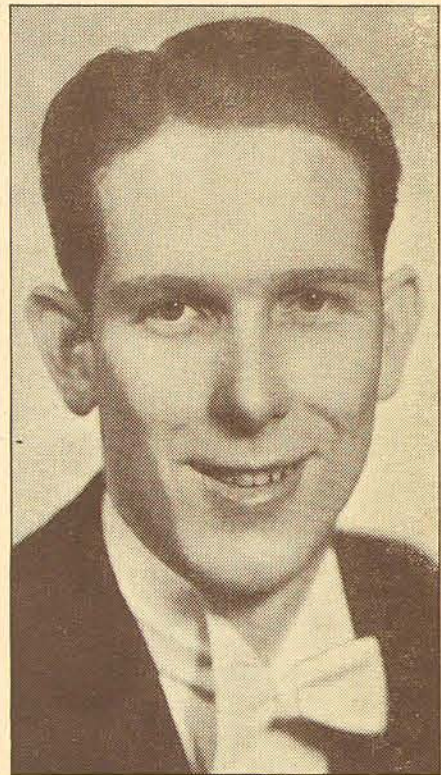

Hatred in Music

DURING the World War, after the United States got into the conflict, I was sitting in my office when a burly individual came in and with a strong Irish accent said, "I'm from the Secret Service. Is your name Liebling?" "Yes," I answered, "What's yours?" He tossed a card on the desk, which told me that he was Mr. Mulcahey.

"Do you believe that might is right?" he barked.

"No; do you?" I snapped back.

"Certainly not."

"Then why do you think that I am damfool enough to believe it?"

"Where were you born?"

"In New York. Where were you born?"

"Never mind about that."

"What's the matter? Ashamed of your birthplace?"

"I was born in Dublin."

I must have looked my amazement when I replied: "Well of all the nerve! You, a native Irishman, whose mother country is not in sympathy with England, asking a native American such questions."

Mr. Mulcahey produced a package of printed matter and asked, "Did you write these articles in your paper?" (*The Musical Courier*). I glanced at them. They were editorials ridiculing our symphony conductors for excluding German music from their programs, and the Metropolitan Opera for banning Wagner from their repertoire.

"Yes, I wrote them; so what?"

"So what, you're aiding and abetting the enemy."

Space prevents me from reporting the rest of our conversation, but I succeeded gradually and gently in convincing my inquisitor that America was not making war upon art, and long-dead composers in particular. The interview ended by my quenching Mr. Mulcahey's thirst from an editorial bottle in my desk and taking him out for lunch. We became and stayed good friends, and I often furnished him with useful information for the Secret Service.

I am recalling that story now because I see and hear dread signs that some misguided persons are again active against German music in our land, and I fear that their propaganda might eventually result as it did before. New York subscribers to the Philharmonic and Metropolitan are threaten-

ing to withdraw their support if those organizations continue to perform German compositions, and doubtless the same kind of misguided zeal is being manifested in other parts of the country.

Intelligent, broad-minded readers of *RADIO GUIDE* will of course agree that such a viewpoint is dangerously subversive to the best interests of art and should be sternly opposed wherever it makes itself manifest. To exile music on account of political or racial promptings would be to place ourselves on the level of Nazi fanatics who burned books and refuse to perform certain music for the same reasons.

It is to be hoped that should any further anti-art propaganda be spread about, the sensible public may regard it as the arrant nonsense which it is.

Speaking Up

Little did NBC know what they were inaugurating when they brought Toscanini back from Europe to head their brand-new orchestra and provided a weekly studio audience for him. His concerts, during their short existence, have become the most prized experiences of the New York season.

Tickets, by invitation only, are at a premium. The large beige-and-red NBC studio seats fourteen hundred people, but demands for tickets run into the thousands. These demands are sifted carefully and the places are al-

ready allotted long before the series begins. A second sifting disposes of the reserved seats in the small loge section upstairs, which is kept for critics, big-name musicians, visiting celebrities and friends of company officials.

Intimate, friendly charm, unobtrusive elegance and intent concentration are the keynotes of the concerts. The doors close promptly at ten o'clock. No announcer is visible or audible. The clock on the side wall is covered, so as not to get the audience nervous if the broadcast runs over the specified time. The programs are heavy sheets of thick blotting-paper, to prevent rustling. The orchestra tunes up, and suddenly is quiet. The lights dim gently and all eyes focus on the small side door of the stage. The Maestro emerges and walks briskly to the podium. Courteously he cuts short the applause, raps sharply with his baton and begins the business of the evening.

In the intermission, the loge occupants are allowed into the hall for a smoke. Here you see a cross-section of *Vogue*, *Stage*, *Harper's Bazaar* and the Sunday rotogravure. Dorothy Thompson, handsome in black velvet, smokes contentedly, with the air of one who has found familiar and precious respite from a chaotic world. Mrs. Jascha Heifetz smiles enchantingly at Walter Damrosch with the same smile that millions saw on the screen when her name was Florence Vidor. Lily Pons, her tiny figure almost obscured by a floor-length cape of blue fox, twinkles up at her other self, her husband, Andre Kostelanetz. David Sarnoff, host to this extraordinary gathering, moves beaming from group to group. Jimmie Walker and Gene Tunney, ex-politician and ex-prize-fighter, find the music a common denominator.

Gala on a diamond-horseshoe scale, these concerts are social events in the highest sense of the word. They attract the aristocracy of every art, every profession. But there is an entirely different note in this most modern of concert halls, from where music reaches out to the whole world. This audience comes to listen. There is no fanfare of publicity, no "grand opening," no reams of print in the society columns. Music's most eloquent interpreter dominates the evening. And to pay him tribute, these most unique among audiences bring what they know pleases him best, a sincere and appreciative understanding of what he is trying to say to them.

GUSTAVE CHARPENTIER, seventy-nine-year-old French composer of "Louise," has lived most of his life in Paris, which he calls "the very breath of my existence." After his musical studies ended, Charpentier gave himself over to a typical Bohemian existence in the Montmartre section, and became a leading spirit among the students, working-girls and grisettes, joining in their poverty, romances, sorrows and carousals. "The lights, the houses, the people, the streets of Paris intoxicate me," he wrote on one occasion, "and the heroine of my opera is not so much the title character as the city she typifies."

ACT I

A Paris garret, 1900.

From his window across the narrow street, Julien, a young artist, sings a love-song to the listening Louise, sentimental, romantic sewing-girl. Julien wishes to marry her, but Louise's unimaginative parents object to the shiftless artist. The youthful lovers mock and abuse the mother, who eavesdrops

and drags the happy Louise away. The father arrives, a tired laborer. The daughter sets the table; the mother works in the kitchen. The family sup and discuss Julien's letter asking for Louise in marriage. The mother berates him, the father ridicules good-naturedly. He is content with his family, his pipe, and before all things, his good Louise. She, touched, promises to try to forget Julien.

ACT II

Scene 1

A street in Montmartre.

Early morning. Characteristic street cries of vendors; rag-pickers, scavengers, marketers, late revelers come and go. Louise's mother escorts her to

work and leaves. The hiding Julien emerges, pleads with his sweetheart to elope and is refused.

Scene 2

The workroom filled with sewing-girls.

Louise sits silent and thoughtful. Julien is heard singing in the street. A band plays, and as the excited girls crowd to the window, Louise rushes out and joins her lover.

ACT III

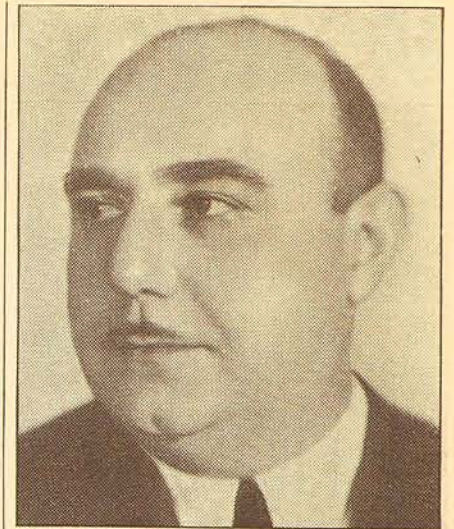
A tiny house and garden on Montmartre hill. Early night.

Louise and Julien are living together. Happily she sings her famous aria, "Ever Since the Day," but falls into remorse about her father. A joyous crowd arrives and celebrates the crowning of the Muse of Montmartre, none other than Louise. Her mother interrupts the festivities to tell the girl that the father is dying of grief and only Louise's visit can save him. She tears herself away from Julien after the mother finally agrees to let her return to him.

ACT IV

Same room as Act I.

The broken father sits sadly by the table. Louise sews gloomily. Through the open window, the lights of Paris glow beckoningly. Louise pleads to go to Julien, but the mother refuses. The father takes his "little girl" on his knee and sings a touching song. But her love-longing prevails and she defies her father, who, enraged, threatens to strike her and screams "Begone!" She whirls about like one possessed, calling for "Paris, Paris, Paris!" and "Julien!" The frightened mother intervenes, but too late. Louise has gone, forever. The father rushes to the window, shakes his fist impotently at the city and despairingly cries out, "Paris, oh Paris!"

IT IS time to call attention again to the excellent series of the Rochester Philharmonic, this afternoon led by the able Iturbi. The orchestra, of high quality, has developed into a major symphonic instrument.

Some of the "Don Giovanni" melodies are masterfully exemplified in Mozart's immortal overture.

Cynical critics and oversophisticated music-lovers belittle what they call the "hackneyed" symphony by Franck and point to its "Wagnerisms." Nevertheless, to many of the rest of us it continues to be a mighty proclamation, noble in themes and fashioning, irresistibly glowing in harmony and orchestration, combining mystic fervor with deep human feeling.

Recently I reread the biography of Franck, and was moved afresh by his touching sincerity, simplicity, and the tragedy of his indifferent and antagonistic treatment by the critics, the public, and his colleagues of the period. Then came his sad death, preceded only by the success of his string quartet.

And surely there are more significant overtures than those from Italian operas, even though composed by Rossini. However, though you are sometimes an errant and wilful program-maker, there's no quarreling with you in the light of the grandiose feats you always achieve with the baton. Anyway, thank you for flavoring the program with the spicy suite by De Falla.

HOME WAS NEVER LIKE THIS!



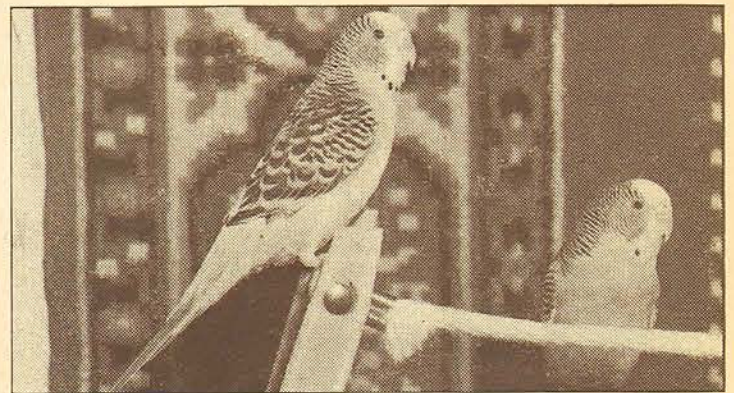

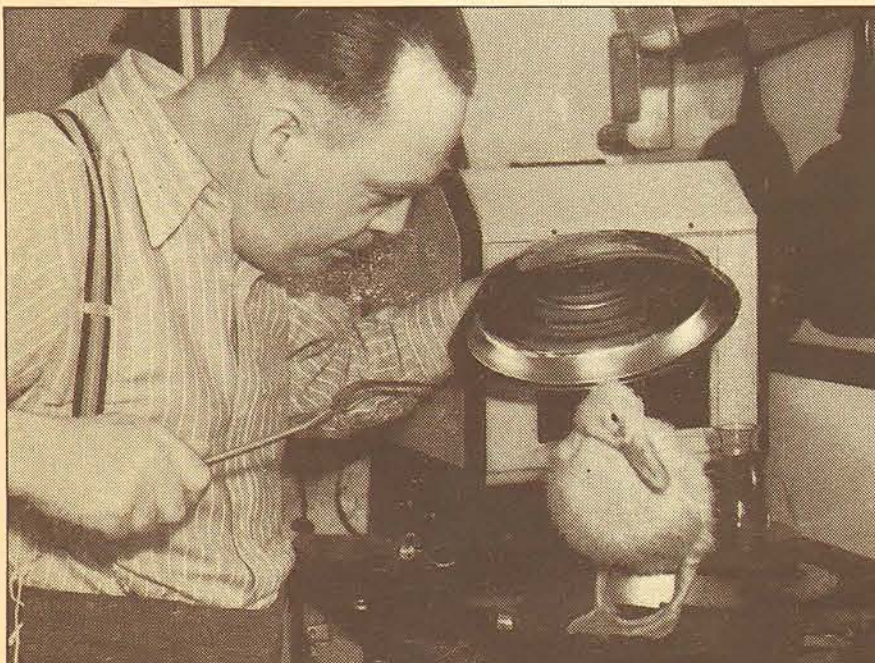

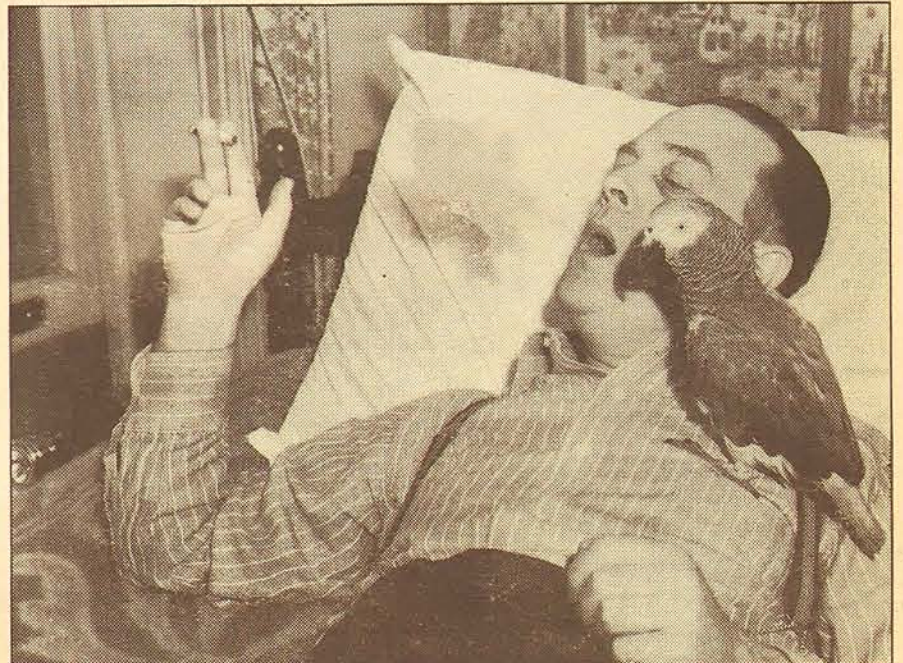

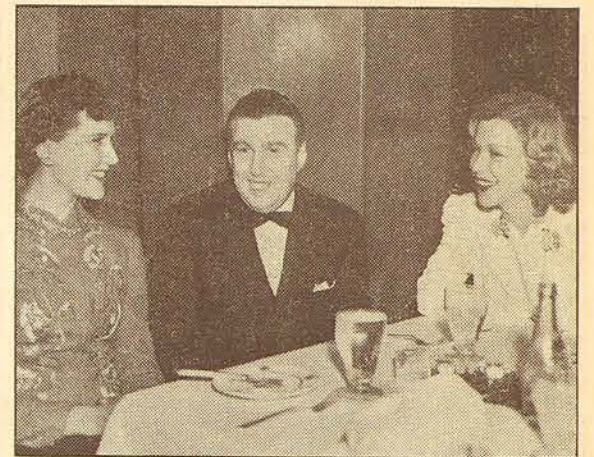

If current plans go through, the activities of the radio division of the Federal Theatre will be seriously curtailed, which will be a shame after the splendid records made by that division. Over fifty-eight different radio series have been produced by them in the last 2½ years and \$5,000,000 worth of radio time given free by the stations. Among the outstanding shows were "Tish," over CBS, which was voted most popular sustainer on the network last spring; "Epic of America," and the current "Men Against Death," on CBS, a fine dramatic series based on Paul De Kruif's books. Graduates of the project include Minnie Dupree, who stole the picture "Young in Heart," Howard Da Silva, now in "Abe Lincoln in Illinois," Ira Ashley, CBS director, and many other radio actors and writers who received their chance on the radio division.

Jean Hersholt "Vacations" in New York

Jean Hersholt is in New York on his annual vacation and is broadcasting his dramatic series, "Dr. Christian," from CBS Playhouse No. 2 each Tuesday night. Hersholt is the guiding genius of the actors and actresses assembled for the program. Tall, well set up, looking many years younger than his admitted age, he is easy in manner before the microphone, reads his lines easily, and his gestures and facial expressions are uncannily like those you would expect from your favorite family physician. Rehearsals are held on the day of the broadcast from 10 a.m. until early afternoon. Dress rehearsal begins promptly at 9 p.m., with everyone reporting in full evening clothes. Mrs. Hersholt, tall, dark and distinguished-looking, attends every rehearsal here and in Hollywood. She says she does so because her husband requests it. "Jean says he feels more comfortable if I am around," she explains. Their visit to New York, which will terminate about the first of February, hasn't been much of a vacation after all. Hersholt, known as one of the most progressive and charitable personalities in the movie world, is vitally interested in the Motion Picture Relief Fund, of which he is president; is chairman of the executive committee of the Screen Actors Guild, and a member of the board of directors of AFRA and the Theatre Authority. Much of his time has been spent attending meetings of these organizations. He has also made two guest appearances on other radio programs, and up to this writing managed to see six shows on Broadway.

Cantor Can Clown

Despite the fact that I listened to Eddie Cantor's

last broadcast from New York while I was eating dinner at home, I went over to the studio later to watch the repeat broadcast, which goes on at 10:30 p.m. in the East for listeners in the Midwest and West. When Cantor came out on stage to welcome the audience, he noticed a little boy sitting in the front row. "Aren't you out late tonight; how old are you?" he asked. The youngster replied, "Nine years old." Then addressing the woman sitting next to him, who turned out to be the boy's mother, he said: "I'd like to see you later. I have a daughter about his age, and maybe we can get together." This started the chuckles. When Cantor mentioned it was the last broadcast from New York, there were a great many "oh's" from the audience and the musicians in the band. Cantor responded, "Maybe you'll really miss us, but those musicians only said 'oh' because they'll miss the money." He then walked over to the girls who sing in the chorus and kissed each one of them and said, "It's all right, Ida isn't here tonight."

Cantor Can Be Serious

That, ladies and gentlemen, is Cantor the comedian. But he can also be serious—very serious. During his stay in New York most of his spare time was spent attending luncheons and playing benefits to raise money for the unfortunate refugees. He stopped off in Chicago en route to California to attend a luncheon to raise money for the same cause, and his eyes took on an added sparkle when he told me he was out to help raise two million dollars. More power to you, Eddie Cantor, and I hope you will be with us a long time to carry on your great work.

Bert Parks His "Varieties" Script

I happened to drop in on a Ray Bloch rehearsal over at CBS and caught the farewell program of announcer Bert Parks. Bert was saying his good-

by in preparation for his Hollywood trip with the Cantor troupe, and everybody reversed the usual procedure and seemed quite happy about the whole affair. Ray's "Varieties" is over a year old and one of Columbia's funniest and best musical afternoon shows. Ray says it's the show where anything can happen, and after watching the boys cut up for a while, I began to agree with him. Ray rehearses the band in windmill style, using both arms and no baton. Being a lefty, he emphasizes the left arm with novel results, especially when you're used to watching normal bandleaders. Bert Parks disdains studying his script and plans dire things for Bloch, with whom he has been feuding on the air for a year. When the broadcast goes on, the ad-libbing begins, and Bloch, Parks, Barry Wood and Audrey Marsh take turns at ribbing one another. It's a thoroughly pleasant broadcast and one which the cast enjoys just as much as the radio audience.

Behind the "Seen"

At a "For Men Only" rehearsal, Peter Van Steeden, the maestro, leads the band with one garter trailing on the floor. He is completely unaware of this flaw in his sartorial perfection, and as he glances behind him seems puzzled at the smiles of amusement he finds mirrored on the faces around the studio . . . Ezra Stone, the red-haired rascal of the "Aldrich Family" sketches on the Kate Smith Hour, who usually wears a sweater and slacks for his broadcasts, dressed immaculately in white tie and tails as he attended the repeat broadcast of Ben Bernie on a Sunday night . . . At a CBS Playhouse Phil Baker rehearsing "Deep in a Dream" on his accordion. A chap sits on a stool near by and beams

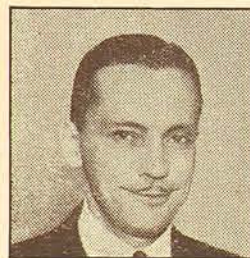

HOLLYWOOD SHOWDOWN



BY EVANS PLUMMER

First Reading

CHICAGO.—I "covered" Edgar A. Guest's show from first rehearsal to actual performance, and I saw just how much effort was spent in preparing the program. At 6 o'clock on Tuesday evening director Henry Klein has his first rehearsal in one of the smaller CBS studios. First reading, it's called, and in the top picture you can see the performers in a huddle with Mr. Klein and assistant director Jim Cominos. Since a different success story is dramatized weekly, different characters are used in every show. Jim has to know all the actors in town, just what they can do, and what parts they play best. Then Mr. Klein and he discuss the cast and choose the players. When the artists appear for first rehearsal, their parts have already been assigned. First rehearsal lasts a couple of hours and it is held to familiarize the actors with their parts. No timing is taken, but after getting pointers, tips and hints from the genial director, the actors really get the feel of their parts.

Early Breakfast

Wednesday morning at 7:30 your Tattler dashed over to the Drake. Edgar A. Guest, star of the show, arrives from Detroit at 7, and it is an unwritten law that the Messrs. Klein and Cominos join the famed poet in his hotel room for breakfast. For four years now the breakfasts have been "on Eddie." It is at this time that the show is discussed with Mr. Guest and poems are selected for the broadcast.

The Guest Arrives

About 11 o'clock, the guest of the show makes his appearance in the studio after a comfortable night's sleep and a hearty breakfast at the Drake. Floyd Roberts, winner of the 1938 Indianapolis auto races, was the guest the week I covered the show. He is introduced to Mr. Guest and members of the cast, and the kindly poet and the actors make him feel "right at home." It is at this time, too, that the honored guest reads his lines before a mike. And here is where director Klein, in a calm and fatherly manner, leads the radio novice through the hazardous perils of a first reading.

Lunch "on Eddie"

At 12:30 everybody adjourns for lunch in the Wrigley Building restaurant with Mr. Guest as the host. "Bugs" (rough spots) are discussed and straightened out, and the show sounds swell when another rehearsal is held after lunch. At 3 o'clock the actors make way for the musicians. Bob Trendler directs the orchestra and chorus, with Mr. Klein supervising the entire rehearsal.

At 6 o'clock, for the first time, the complete show, music and all, is gone over in its entirety. This is the initial "dress rehearsal," and everybody is now dressed formally. The show runs a couple of minutes overtime, so at dinner, when Mr. Guest again presides, Mr. Klein figures out "cuts"—portions of the show which can be eliminated without destroying the continuity of the program. The last "dress" (rehearsal) is held after dinner, and a few minutes before 9 o'clock, while the audience streams in, the performers go out for a final smoke.

The Show Is On!

Your Tattler watched the show from the control-room. Director Klein has no watch, but was constantly looking up to see if the show was "on the nose" (running on schedule) or losing or gaining time. At one point the show was a minute short, but director Klein deftly "stretched out" the remaining portion so that it finished "on the nose." Included among the signals that engineer Harlan

Gregg and assistant director Cominos give Mr. Klein during the show at various times were: Placing a finger or hand on nose (on the nose); putting hand across throat as if cutting it (meaning "cut"); and stretching an imaginary string (meaning "stretch it out").

Plenty of Work

And everything I've written so far still doesn't include all the work that goes into the show. How are the guests engaged? Well, the name of the show is "It Can Be Done." Through magazines, newspapers and books, Jim Cominos searches for successful people whose stories might fit into the show. Names are submitted to Mr. Klein, who gives the final okay to the choices. Care must be taken that those selected are really worthy of the honor. Then correspondence begins. In practically all instances the guests are only too glad to appear on a nationwide Columbia hook-up. When a guest has been chosen, he sends in his complete biography. Then script-writers Lucille and Morris Fisher get to work transforming the material into script form. The honored guest arrives on the day preceding the show. On Tuesday afternoon he goes to the Palmolive Building, where the offices of Batten, Barton,

Durstine & Osborne, the advertising agency handling the program, are located. There the script is read to the visitor. Usually the guest is thoroughly pleased with the script, but sometimes he wants a few changes made and these are complied with. Well, I hope I've given you a little idea on how much effort goes into a weekly half-hour show. That bald spot you see on Mr. Klein's pate was certainly not caused because of the ease with which half-hour Coast-to-Coast shows are strung together.

Bits About the Show

Edgar A. Guest never looks at the script when reading his poems. He knows most of his writings by heart and so finds it unnecessary to "follow copy" . . . Floyd Roberts, honored guest, said that he didn't have much to do with airplanes because he thought they were too dangerous. He thinks nothing, though, of driving an auto 117 miles per hour on a race-track . . . Forrest Lewis played the part of Robert in the dramatization. Others in the cast included Ed Prentiss, Willard Waterman, Michael Romano, Bill Amsdell, Olan Soule and youthful Frankie Adams. The last-named actor played the part of "Skippy" when it was on the air . . . Show always has an announcer and a narrator, and these are, respectively, Vincent Pelletier and Bret Morrison . . . Sound-effects men certainly had a workout. Auto races, crashes and crowd noises kept both sound-chief Urban Johnson and his assistant, Lee Randon, plenty busy . . . Noticed Bob Trendler is one of those rarities—a left-handed orchestra-leader . . . That was the Doring Sisters, good-looking trio formerly heard on the "Laugh Liner" show, who comprise the feminine element in the "Household Finance" chorus.

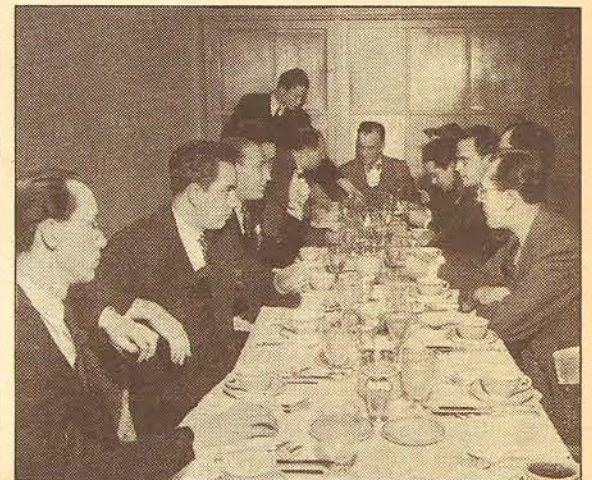

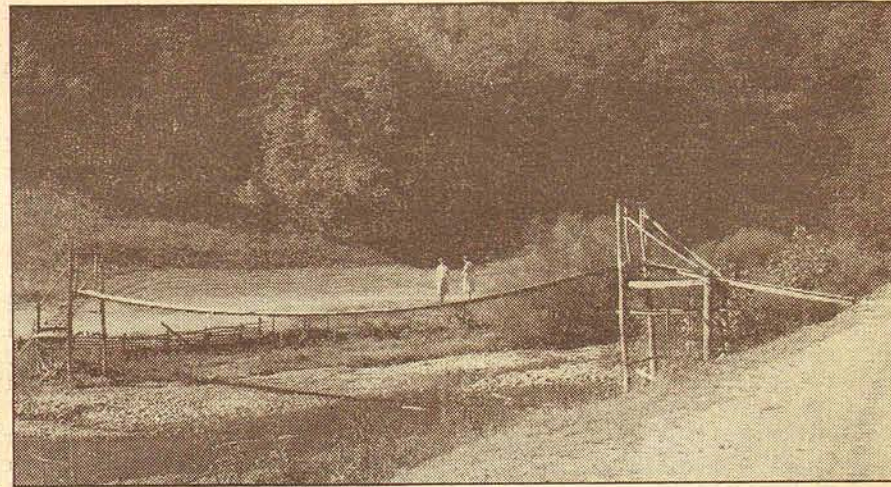
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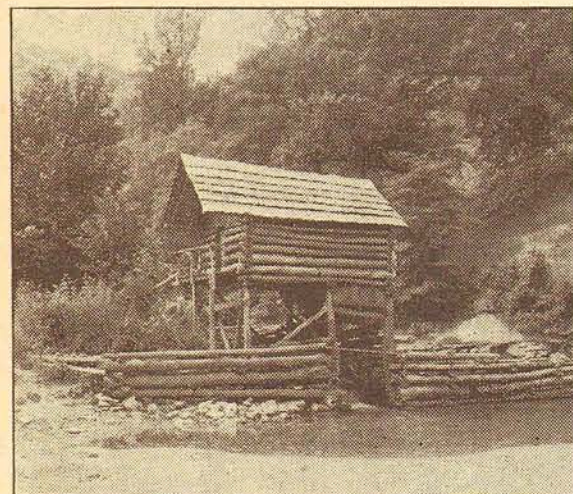

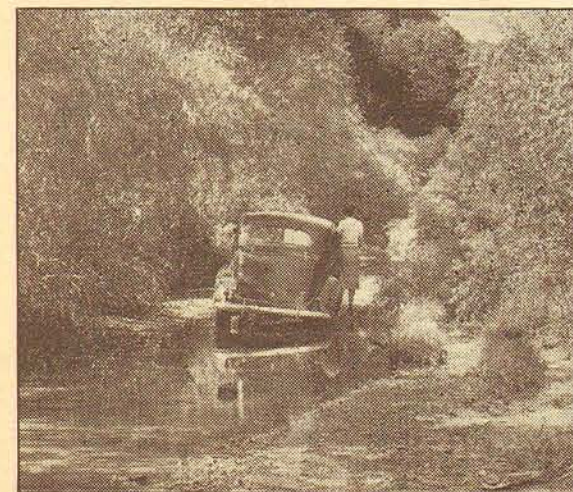

RADIO COMES TO YELLOW MOUNTAIN

THE University of Kentucky is probably the only educational institution in the country that controls both the sending and receiving ends of their broadcasting activities. For ten years that university has conducted regular broadcasts over WHAS, Louisville, Kentucky. Their "Listening Center" idea has been in operation since 1933, and its growth to the present 30 centers has been steady. The listening-center directors maintain their battery sets in operating condition and must make the university broadcasts available to all the people of the community. They may tune in any beneficial type of program at their discretion. Isolation from transportation and communication is the chief factor in the establishment of a listening-center. Through the cooperation of the National Youth Administration, Corsia Whitaker, a mountain girl, makes the rounds of the hazardous hill trails organizing and supervising the activities. These mountain people are natively shrewd, not the ignorant hillbillies often pictured by writers and artists.

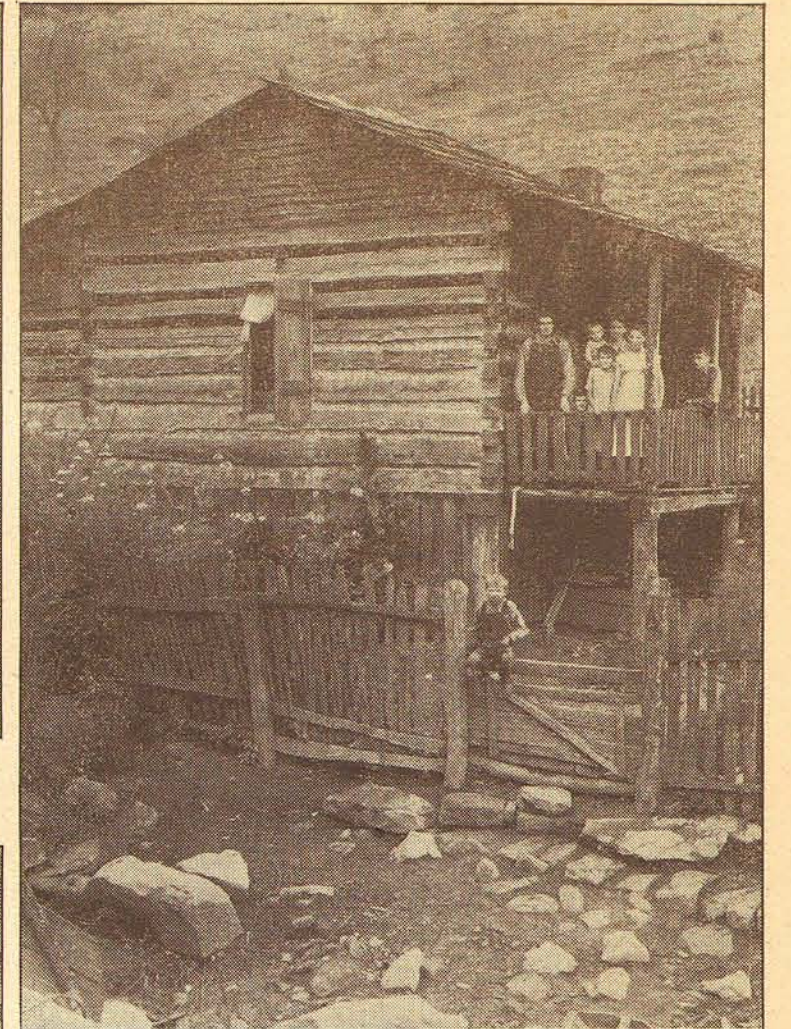

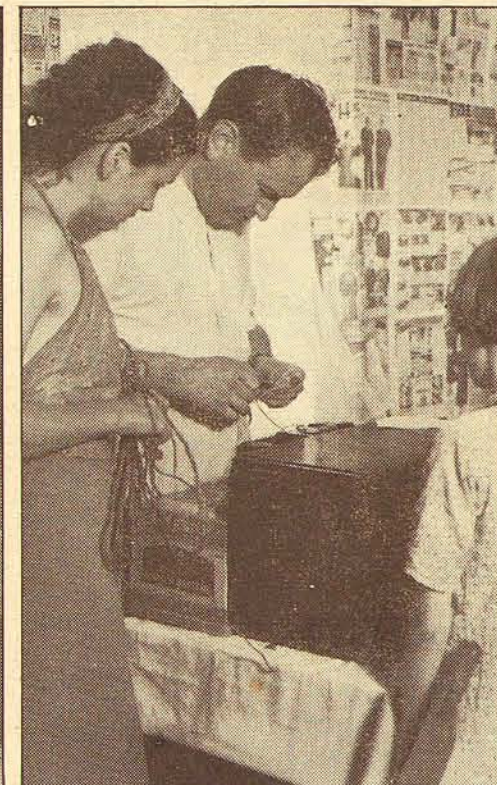

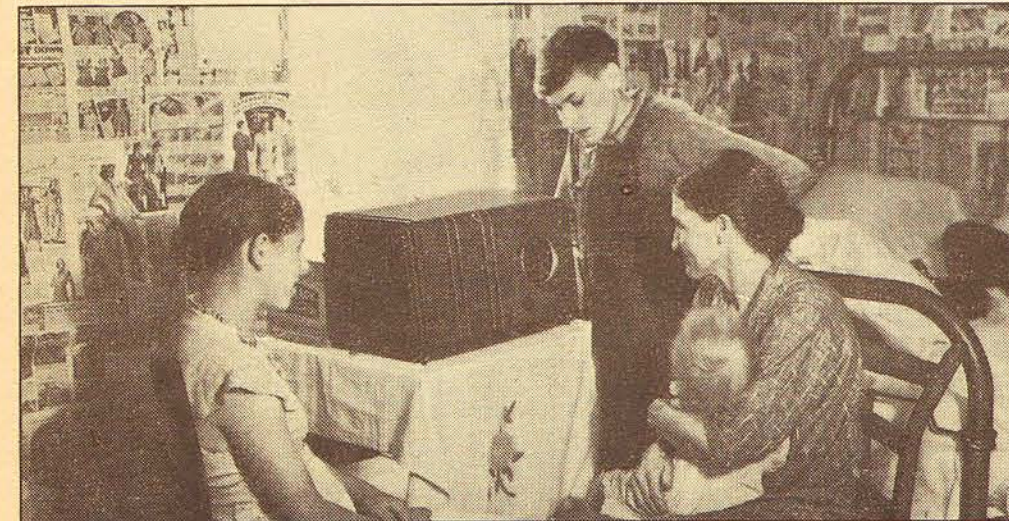

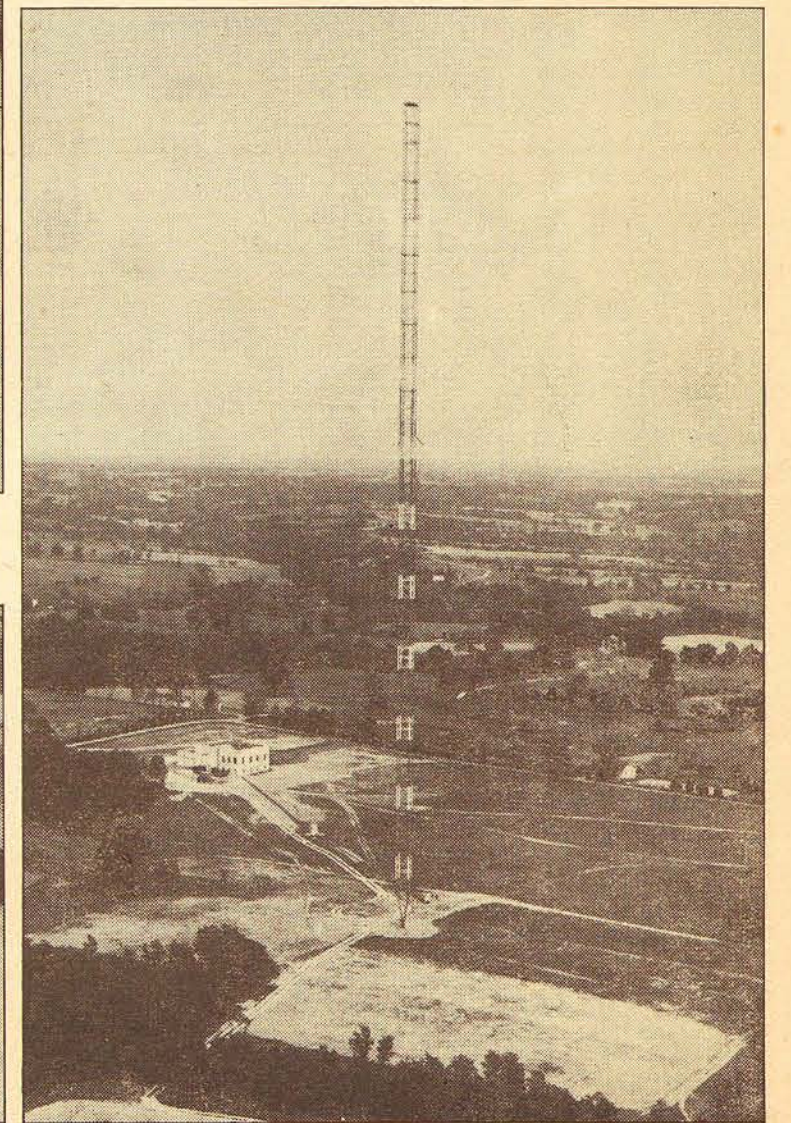

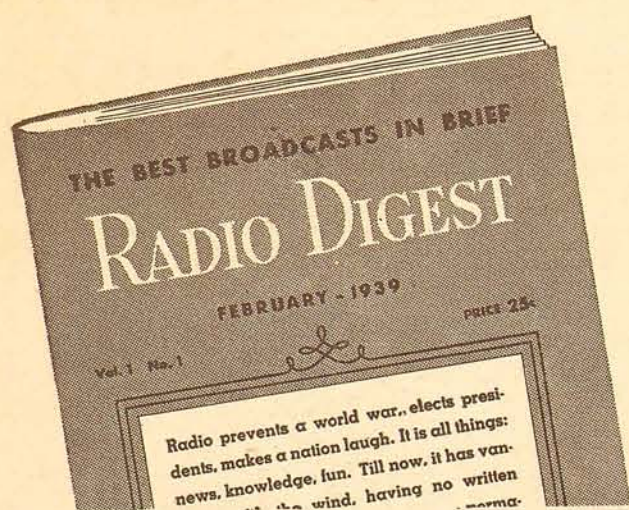

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Records of the Week

A department reviewing the recordings of your radio favorites

SWING had a very healthy year in 1938, judging from record sales and commercial radio bookings, and the first releases of 1939 augur well for another batch of strong swing-aros; so this week we dedicate our entire column to the jitterbugs. The recent "Swing Session with Benny Goodman" and Bix Beiderbecke compositions, recorded by Bunny Berigan and his men, have already been mentioned in these columns, and this week another remarkable album is out, the Bob Crosby Showcase, a fine collection of varied and intelligent swing, with bass-player Bob Haggart the personal star of the group—not only because of his playing but his composing and arranging. There are 12 sides, as follows:

Summertime, the Crosby theme, well played, of course.

I'm Free, Haggart-composed, featuring throughout the superlative trumpet work of Billy Butterfield, and it is one of the prettiest tunes you ever heard.

Speak to Me of Love and The Big Bass Viol, which spotlights singer Marion Mann; ably backed by the Bob Cats, picked swingmen from the band.

I Hear You Talking and Call Me a Taxi, by four of the Bob Cats, all four who rated first places in Paul Whiteman's choice of the All-American swing band—Zurke on piano, Beauduc on drums, Miller on tenor-sax and Haggart on bass. Zurke stars.

Honky Tonk Train, written by boogie-woogie pianist Mead Lux Lewis, which gives Bob Zurke another chance to prove Mr. Whiteman's choice an excellent one.

The Big Noise From Winnetka disproves any theory that drums and bass can't carry a whole record alone. Beauduc-Haggart.

Loopin' the Loop is more good swing by the Bob Cats.

My Inspiration is another Haggart tune, starring clarinetist Fazola, and good.

Swingin' at the Sugar Bowl—the one weak spot in the batch.

I'm Prayin' Humble—magnificent style borrowed from the Carolina spiritual singers, rollicking and inspired. Haggart again.

Next in line for a little hat-throwing is Benny Goodman's newest—a five-clarinet festival written by the blind pianist, Alec Templeton, **Bach Goes to Town.** Swing fugues are not entirely new, but nobody ever half approached the perfection of this one (Victor). Benny must be inspired lately by the close race he is getting from another clarinet man around town, Mr. Artie Shaw. Artie's latest is a full-bodied reading of a good commercial tune, **Say It With a Kiss (Bluebird).**

Comes now the screwball tune, **Hold Tight.** This one tops all the flat-foot foogies, tutti-frutti's and tisket-a-taskets. It's subtitled "Want Some Seafood Mama," and is sung by the Andrews Sisters; Jimmy Dorsey in solid background (Decca).

Don Redman, one-time top swing band, makes a worthy reappearance on wax with **Down Home Rag.** The rest of his new issues are over-vocal'd (Bluebird).

Highlight of the second semester's schedule is a new series of "on the spot" broadcasts from various Kentucky industries, such as lumbering, coal mining, cigarette manufacturing, etc. This series marks the first time in several years that the U. K. microphones have been taken any considerable distance from the studios to pick up programs of this nature.

• Product of a unique combination of Department of the Interior experts and Columbia network technicians, directors and actors is a series to be premiered on January 28. Titled "What Price America," the programs will show the United States' bitter fight to regain its priceless resources. Secretary of the Interior Ickes and Sterling Fisher, Columbia's director of education and talks, are expected to speak on the opener.

• Recent visitor at Indiana State Teachers' College was Dr. Earl A. Moore of Western Kentucky State Teachers' College. W. K. S. T. C. plans to build a radio studio on the campus and Moore was sent to get ideas on studio arrangement. Unique in many respects is Dr. Morgan's I. S. T. C. set-up with commercial station WBOV, gladly donating time and school radio equipment that *didn't cost a fortune*.

• Get ready for eleven trips to as many interesting and strange parts of the world if you are a follower of the "New Horizons" series in Columbia's *American School of the Air* schedule. Again under the supervision of Hans Christian Adamson of the American Museum of Natural History, this series for the second semester, starting February 1, follows the paths of adventure and discovery of great scientists. To give listeners a visual aspect of these explorations, maps prepared by Thomas Voter, of the American Museum, will appear weekly in **RADIO GUIDE**. First-hand acquaintance with many of the world's great scientists and explorers living today will be another outstanding feature of the second semester's outline.

It's about time that a discussion of "radio" be considered at the general sessions.

• Alameda, California, educators find the fifteen-minute radio program best for pupils and that it is desirable to have classroom programs come over the same station at the same time every day.

Eavesdropping On a Bull Session As College Youth Speaks Its Mind

"BULL SESSION" probably dates back to the first two or three men who had an idea and the desire to discuss it. But the regular practise of "bull sessions" gained its greatest impetus among students so that today the term is most closely associated with the informal gatherings of college men who come together to smoke at ease and talk about the things that interest them most.

That there is much in the average "bull session" to interest the participants needs no defense here or elsewhere; and that there is much in an average "bull session" to interest the general public has been proved by the University Broadcasting Council through the facilities of station WBBM, Chicago.

Masters at the art of building informal discussion-type programs are members of the University Broadcasting Council. In tackling the job of capturing the atmosphere of the average college "bull session" for radio listeners, Parker Wheatley, UBC man supervising this program, faced a really difficult assignment. To begin with, the usual practise of using scripts and rehearsals had to be abandoned for fear of killing the true spirit of the "bull session," *strict informality*. To overcome this difficulty Wheatley assembles the men in a clockless studio at least one-half hour before broadcast time, has them seated in comfortable chairs arranged in a circle. They are then served refreshments and left alone. By the time the program goes on the air they are usually warmed up to whatever subject they strike on and the "bull session" is caught right at its most interesting peak. Significant also is the fact that the men do not know when they are on the air and when they are talking to a dead mike; and they usually are not informed that the program is off the air for fifteen or twenty minutes after they have been signed off. The free association method

employed in these programs allows any student to break in and speak his thoughts as a question is tossed back and forth and developed.

Indication of interest among participants has been shown by the fact that 150 students competed in tryouts from the University of Chicago. Fifty of them got as far as the microphone auditions, and from this group seven or eight were selected to take part in the actual broadcast. Selection is based entirely on student's ability to think before a microphone, which eliminates the possibility of formal debaters or orators dominating the program. By this procedure any student with ideas gets a chance to prove his worth.

Both college men and coeds have been used in these programs, but experience has shown that each group works better alone; that mixed groups show a tendency to allow a question to lag or to allow the other to take the lead in the discussions. According to Parker Wheatley, men talk more readily and literally "out-talk" the women's groups on all questions brought up of interest to the world today.

Ever since November 5, 1938, the "Bull Session" has been a weekly local program feature of station WBBM in Chicago. During this two-month period students from Northwestern University, De Paul, Illinois, and the University of Chicago have been heard. Requests have been received from many other colleges and universities, and if the program gets a regular network berth, there is every indication that the plan will be expanded to include other groups.

Test spots were given this program on the Columbia network January 14 and 21. If national response measures comparatively with the interest and comment it aroused in the Midwest as a local feature of station WBBM, it's a cinch to become a regular Columbia network feature.

For Alameda Schools It's All Drama

Drama's the thing in Alameda, California. Not an early pioneer but one that is making definite contributions to vitalized radio-education, the Alameda City School of the Air began presenting programs for classroom listening in 1933 under the jurisdiction of the Alameda Board of Education. It was soon decided that the dramatized lesson performed the most beneficial job in the classroom, and today it's all drama for Alameda schools and the nearly 800 others within the listening range of station KLX. Deserving of close study are Alameda's arguments in favor of the dramatized lesson:

1. More realistic and interesting
2. Holds attention of pupils more closely and impresses them more deeply
3. Improves retention of facts
4. Makes easier the formation of desirable emotional sets
5. Best motivator of classroom activity
6. Gives the teacher greater opportunity to improve the pupils' taste
7. Most influential in bringing school closer to home and community
8. Develops greater appreciation of literature.

Examination of the staff, which under Erle A. Kenney's direction writes and presents Alameda's weekly schedule of dramatizations, suggests the reason why the Alameda City School of the Air has had such promising results with dramatized lessons. No amateur jobs are turned out here, because the scriptwriters all have had some background of training and experience in writing, and the actors a background of training and experience in dramatics. Kenney supervises the writing and dramatic staffs to guarantee the educational validity of the programs. To keep him in touch with teachers' needs and educators' opinions, an advisory council that works *without authority*, as advisory councils should, assists him in his work.

So noteworthy is the work being done by the Alameda City School of the Air that it has been voted first in the field of school broadcasting in a two-year survey by Princeton University and George Peabody College for Teachers. Recognition has also come from the U. S. Office of Education and, through funds made available by the department of the Interior, another phase of education by radio is being carried on under the Alameda College of the Air. Programs in the college series deal with safety education, fire-prevention, parent education and juvenile delinquency, and here again *all programs are dramatized*.

Radio-education's battles are being fought out today by several such seldom-heard-of units as the Alameda City School and College of the Air. In one city the theory of dramatized education is being studied; in another, student and faculty participation is being experimented with; in still another, the possibilities of the ultra-high-frequency band *just for education* are being explored. What these pioneers, these experimenters, these explorers are doing is helping to make the future of education by radio, and whenever possible this department will bring their stories to you.

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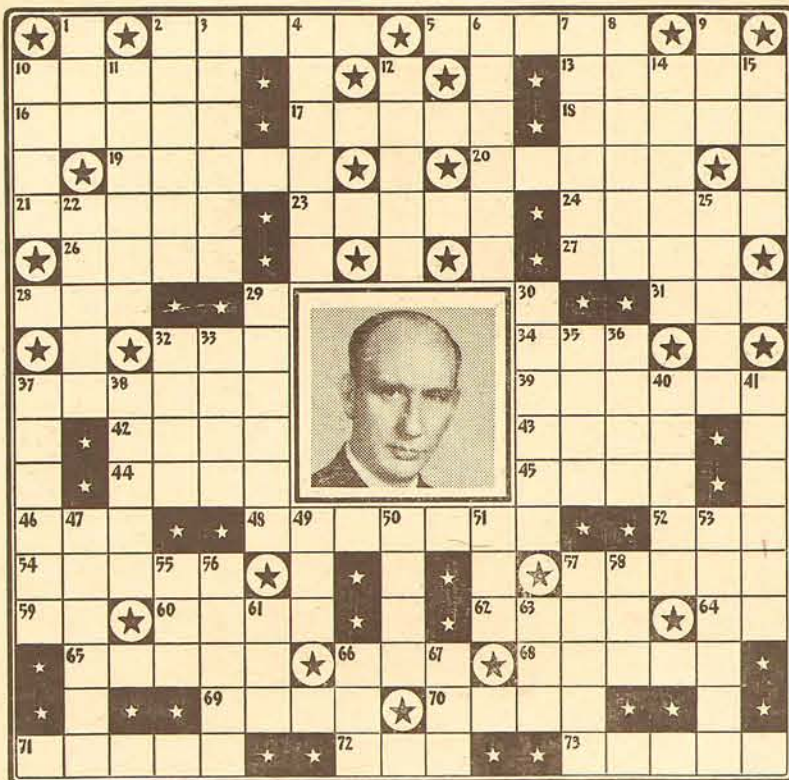

On Short Waves

AS MANY gates as there are months in the year; as many windows as there are days; as many pillars as there are hours are some of the remarkable features of Salisbury Cathedral, which is to be described over Daventry stations GSC, GSD and GSL, Sunday, January 22, at 6:50 p.m. EST. This 700-year-old building, reckoned to be the finest example of early English architecture in existence, dominates the beautiful Wiltshire landscape near Salisbury, England. . . . As Governor General Designate of Australia, H. R. H., the Duke of Kent, will broadcast a message of greetings to the Commonwealth on Australia Day, January 26, at 4 a.m. EST, over GSE, GSD and GSF. The talk will be heard again in recorded form at 8 a.m. EST, over GSF, GSG and GSJ, Daventry, England.

Short-wave station W9XA (26.45) of Kansas City, Mo., broadcasts news commentaries daily at 12:30 and 6 p.m. EST, and DX tips Tuesdays and Thursdays at 12:45 p.m. EST.

According to Frank Sekach of Detroit, Mich., the mysterious Italian station which is being heard with tremendous volume afternoons from 3 to 6:40 p.m. EST on 9.67 megs, is 2R09, one of the new 100,000-watt Italian Imperial short-wave transmitters operating experimentally. Reception from 2R09 is excellent until W3XAL appears on the same channel at 5 p.m. EST, after which time it is a toss-up as to which station will be heard, first one and then the other on top, with neither worth listening to. To further complicate this situation, the North American transmissions from Prague, Czechoslovakia, which are heard week-days except Saturdays from 7:55 to 10:50 p.m. EST are now being broadcast over OLR3B, also on 9.67 megs. The Czechoslovakian station is seldom heard through W3XAL, save as an annoying heterodyne whistle. Here we have an absurd three-cornered international dogfight for possession of this channel, with both broadcasters and listeners the losers.

HAT4 (9.125), Budapest, Hungary, is now broadcasting the latest news in Hungarian, Slovak, Carpathian, Russian and English, nightly except Saturdays from 7 to 8 p.m. and on Saturdays from 6 to 7 p.m. EST. The power of this station will soon be greatly increased.

HIGH - FREQUENCY HIGH-LIGHTS: John DeMyer of Lansing, Mich., writes the best time to log VUC2 (4.88) of Calcutta, India, is on Sunday mornings from 7:30 to 8:30 a.m. EST, during which time church services in English are broadcast. . . . "Stazione Di Addis Ababa," of Addis Ababa, Italian Ethiopia, is definitely on the air and broadcasting daily from 1 to approximately 3 p.m. EST, on a frequency of 9.65 megs. . . . Another interesting station to try for is YI5KG (7.2), 1,000 watts, operated by I. Hassan, supervisor wireless station, Civil Airport, Baghdad, Iraq, and on the air daily from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. EST. . . . Julius Pedersen of Bridgeport, Conn., writes the Danish short-wave station is now broadcasting Sundays from 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. EST, over OZH2, on a new frequency of 15.32 megs. . . . Gerry Sayre, operator of OX2QY and W10XAB, on the recent MacGregor Arctic Expedition, now at home at 250 College St., Milton, Wis., writes that all reception reports on transmissions from Greenland have now been verified. Gerry is open for a job in either a police, broadcasting, or airways radio station, and any offers will be given careful consideration.

It is doubtful if W6XBE, the General Electric transmitter being installed on Treasure Island at San Francisco, Calif., will be opened for some months to come, since a modification of construction permit has been requested from the F. C. C., which will again delay completion of the new station for six months more.

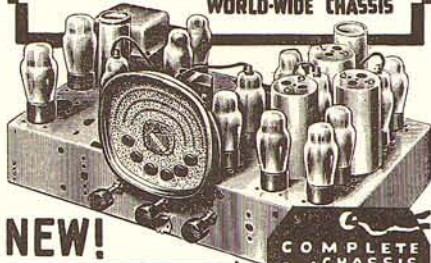
