Perhaps the time isn't yet. The Kellogg Circle interests us because of its earnest effort to entertain without using the ancient comedian-singer-orchestra formula. The program hasn't found itself as yet, but it may. If it doesn't, we think no listener will disagree that a glamour girl or a Hollywood he-man is just as dull and annoying as any other bore. If it does find itself, it will demonstrate only that a new method of presenting stars can keep the cupboard from going bare for a little while longer.

Eventually radio must find new stars for itself. We think that day is not far away. Sponsors and broadcasters, where will you look when the cupboard is bare?

Eddie Cantor

To do a charitable act for publicity purposes is such a habit with many radio and movie stars that we are often fooled into believing that a gilded

lady's heart really is of gold. To do it because of one's convictions is something else. Eddie Cantor is one star whose sincerity never has been and never will be questioned. For years he has supported a boys' camp for underprivileged tenement kids. Annually he raises huge sums of money for helpless, hungry persons. His career as a practicing benefactor came to a climax, we think, when he led the recent "March of Dimes" program on the air. With the greatest names in radio offering their services, Eddie Cantor acted as master of ceremonies for a difficult full hour in order to raise funds for the President's drive against infantile paralysis. He was never better as a showman and entertainer. He was never enlisted in a better cause.

Echo

It is a pleasant experience to find one's judgment seconded and one's proposals imitated. Particularly when the seconder is a big-shot. Remember that editorial we ran months ago called "It Can Happen Here." It warned that any president of our country is only a hair's-breadth away from dictatorial control of broadcasting, according to the present law of the land.

The law says: "Upon proclamation by the President that there exists war or a threat of war or a state of public peril or disaster or other national emergency, or in order to preserve the neutrality of the United States, the President may suspend or amend, for such time as he may see fit, the rules and regulations having application to any or all stations . . ."

Last week a big-shot newspaper, the Chicago Tribune, retold our story in slightly different words. The great midwestern newspaper also recommends that this dangerous grant of power in our radio law be changed and that right quickly. Congress is in session. Congress, as representative of the people, should take back unto itself the rights it so recklessly and carelessly entrusted to a single individual. Personal control of broadcasting is much too great a temptation and responsibility for any one man no matter whether he be Republican or Democrat!

RADIO IN PRISONS *by Lewis E. Lawes*

Famous Warden of Sing Sing Prison

THE other evening, I made one of my accustomed tours through the cell-blocks. As I strolled along I could hear laughter issuing from practically every cell, and could see, of course, that the radio was creating this atmosphere of joviality.

"Hello, Warden," the men greeted as I passed by. "They got a swell program on tonight."

I knew the program they were referring to. It was one of the prominent half-hour variety shows, and a favorite among the prisoners. But whether it was really as humorous as the mirth of the men seemed to indicate was a question; because prison, after a period of time, exerts an unfortunate, though to be expected, influence over the inmates incarcerated there.

Confined as they are, and with anything of tremendous importance rarely occurring to liven up their existence, they seize upon the slightest and most insignificant happening as material upon which to build something of moment to them. As a result, one can hear them laughing in the prison yard over the most trivial incident, or gravely arguing about the smallest matter imaginable.

Thus it is not difficult to understand why the remarks of a radio comedian, of a man who is expected to be comical, will move the men to hysterics, regardless of actual humorous quality.

As I continued my inspection, the hilarity gradually subsided and was replaced by an air of almost complete silence. I knew what was responsible for the change in attitude. The men were now listening to another type of program, a leading symphony orchestra; for it is our object, as far as possible, to provide a variety of entertainment for the confined men. And we do this for several reasons.

In the first place the types of inmates are as numerous

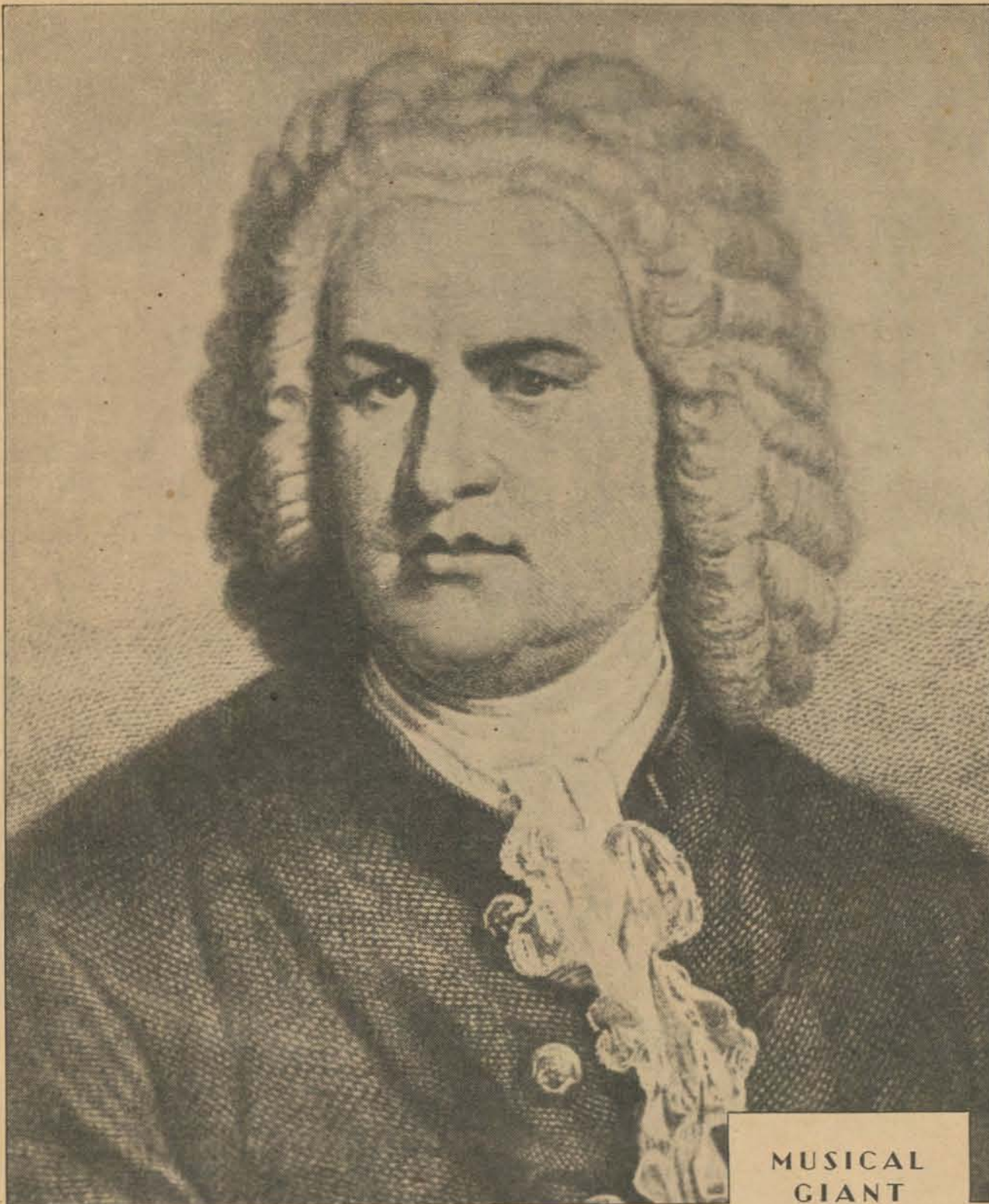
as the types of programs, and therefore the tastes of all must be taken into consideration. There are many educated men to whom good music constitutes the essence of recreational enjoyment. Then there are prisoners for whom the drama holds the most desirable form of relaxation. But with practically few exceptions, every inmate eagerly listens to the news broadcasts so that he may participate as best he can in the constant movement that takes place in the world of which he was once a part.

The prisoners receive only broadcasts selected by our civilian program-director, and these presentations are transmitted from our central receiving-station to earphones in their cells. This means, of course, that the inmates do not have the privilege of choosing individual programs, but we so vary the types of shows that the desires of all are reasonably well satisfied.

Taking into account the practises of years ago, in which inmates, when not working, were confined completely to themselves, not even being allowed normal communication with one another, it is obvious to anyone what a tremendous blessing the radio is in the lives of men otherwise restrained from any direct contact with the world outside.

And in this connection, the radio medium contains features not possessed by the most complete library. It establishes a relationship with the living, vibrating human being other than with the cold, dead print of a book or of a publication.

But while a library can never be replaced even by the most advanced radio methods or technique, nonetheless what the men need most in prison is that which everyone on the outside appreciates, perhaps the least: contact with his fellow man. And radio provides this vital and valuable link for the man behind bars.

father to visit Sans Souci Palace in Potsdam . . .

The adjutant returns with the sixty-two-year-old homespun Bach, his clothes dust-stained, his boots unpolished, his wig awry. He is made to stay for the evening concert at the palace, and next morning Frederick has Bach playing the great organ there and trying the new pianoforte just invented by Silbermann to supersede the tinkly harpsichord. The august music enthusiast then drags his guest through Potsdam, makes him test all the church organs in the city and generously presents him with a valuable ring and a purse of gold ducats.

The meeting brings other arresting moments, with conversations between the two, the king an eager questioner and listener and also showing his com-

Radio has made it possible for metropolis and out-of-the-way hamlet to share alike when great music is broadcast. IT IS May 7, 1747. A powerful king and his ministers sit around the council table after a war recently won by their nation. Financial and economic affairs must be straightened out, political policies changed, the depleted army remanned and newly equipped. It is a serious conclave with vital discussion.

An adjutant enters and salutes the monarch.

"Speak!" he commands.

"Sire, he has arrived."

"Let him enter."

"He is at the inn, after a long ride in the coach. He desires to change his clothes and—"

"It is my desire that he come here at once—as he is. Bring him without delay." The adjutant leaves.

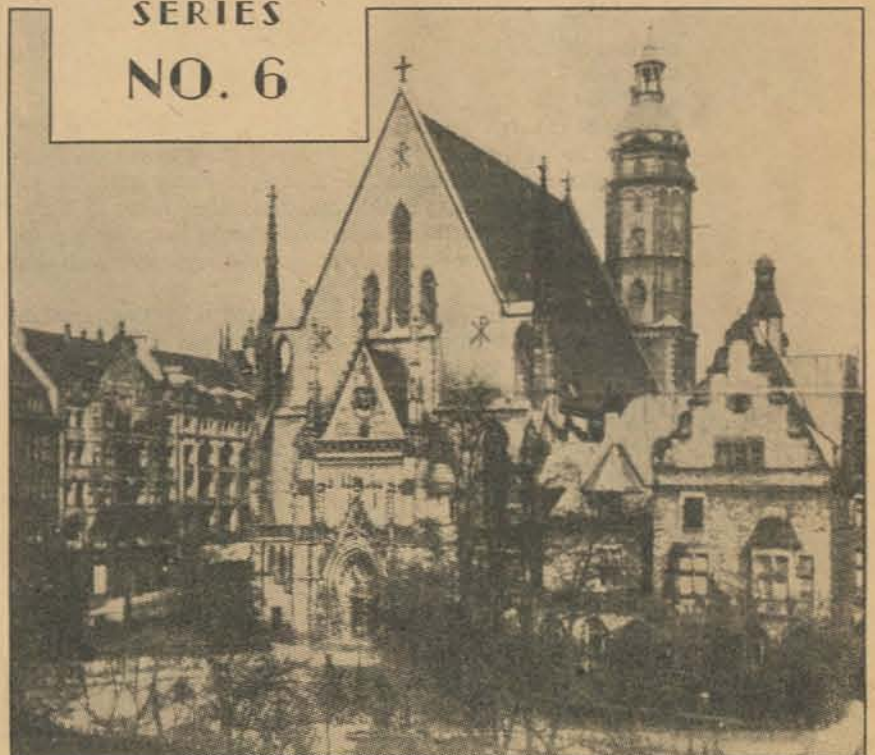
The thirty-five-year-old ruler turns to his ministers and cries out excitedly: "Gentlemen, old Bach is here. The meeting is adjourned. But don't go away. I promise you that you shall hear something." Insincere murmurs of pleasure accompany astonished glances. Are not matters of state more important to a king than the visit of a mere musician?

Not when the king is Frederick the Great of Prussia, and the musician Johann Sebastian Bach! . . .

The latter's son, Wilhelm, in charge of court music for Frederick, often has told him about the genius of his father and played Johann Sebastian's works for the regal music-lover, who himself is a skilled performer on the flute and a composer of some talent. He extends through Wilhelm the invitation to the

St. Thomas Church, Leipzig, today.

The period during which Bach was director of music for this church was productive of his finest works



positions to Bach and playing the flute for him. (What the latter thought has not been recorded by history. It is safe to assume, however, that in view of Frederick's real ability, Bach could not have agreed with a dictum spoken a century or so later when a caustic critic said, "Never criticize the compositions of a prince, for heaven only knows who might have written them.")

Frederick must have recalled to Bach that he was born portentously in the same year, 1685, which brought Handel and the elder Scarlatti into the world; and one can imagine the visitor relating how much he admired Handel, even going to the city of Halle in 1719 to pay his respects but arriving there just after his eminent colleague had left for England. (The meeting of the pair of immortals never took place, much to the lasting regret of both.)

Frederick, with a knack of knowing everything that went on in Germany, could have asked about the story of Marchand, French organist, who challenged Bach to a public musical contest when the latter appeared in Dresden. The concert was arranged. Bach went to the hall, where a crowd of the curious had collected, but after a long wait no Marchand came. Friends had given him the tip about the German's prowess as an organist and improviser, and the French challenger sneaked hurriedly out of town.

"And is it true that you once walked twenty miles to hear a great organist?"

"Yes, Sire; I was only twenty. In Lubeck lived Buxtehude, then an old man but still a marvelous performer. As I had no money for the long ride on the stagecoach, I simply went on foot."

"And did you almost ruin your eyesight by sitting up nights as a boy and copying manuscripts of famed music with only a flickering candle as light?"

"I did indeed, and my reward was that my elder brother, who was also my teacher, discovered my nocturnal activities and as punishment tore up all the work I had done so laboriously."

ONCE in reminiscent mood and encouraged by Frederick, Bach doubtless went on to make him laugh by telling how, while in charge of music at the church in Arnstadt, he had angered the consistory through his independence and firm-mindedness. "The members accused me of refusing to rehearse the choir sufficiently; accompanying the hymns with curious variations and irrelevant ornaments; indulging in too long organ preludes, and making them

too short when scolded. Also, Sire, they lectured me because I allowed a 'stranger maiden' in the organ loft when I was practising."

"Oh, oh, you rascal!"
"Well, she was my cousin, Maria Barbara, whom I married soon after. Alas, she died thirteen years later, but left me seven children. I took a second wife and thirteen more children came to bless our union." (An irreverent wag has remarked that Bach was the father of the fugue and of twenty children.)

Among Frederick's friends were the Duke of Weimar and the Prince of Anhalt, at both of whose courts Bach functioned in the capacity of organist, conductor, choirmaster and what not musically. At the Anhalt establishment, he created some of his finest works. Another connection was with the Margrave of Brandenburg, who commissioned him to write the six orchestral scores known today as "The Brandenburg Concertos."

WISH I could know what Bach played for Frederick during the several days in Potsdam. Perhaps the towering C Minor "Passacaglia"? Some of his best toccatas and fugues? Excerpts from the concertos, suites, chorales; passages from the monumental oratorios? The musical monarch must have been fascinated and entranced...

Three years later Bach died, survived for thirty-six years by the king.

The musician's life was spent entirely for his music and his home. His art he looked upon as a form of worship; his every manuscript, even the smallest, is inscribed "In nomine Jesu" (In the name of Jesus). Deeply religious, he climaxed his high faith in the pages of his oratorios; there are moments in the "St. Matthew Passion" and "St. John Passion" which make it impossible for the hearer not to offer the tribute of tears.

But Bach could be humorous, too, even in his fugues, some of them quite jolly, a real surprise for those who imagine all fugues to be scholarly and dry. His "Phoebus and Pan" is a rollicking conceit. His "Coffee Cantata" is an uproarious burlesque, mocking a young lady inordinately addicted to the fragrant drink just become popular at that period.

Bach's muse found expression in practically every form. He did not invent new ones, but developed and enriched the old, some of them so amply that his predecessors seemed

The musical appeal is by no means the only factor in bringing the "College" to a position where the filling of ticket demands is months behind. THE CAST

SPINE-TINGLING excitement and a touch of mysterious magic colors a lesson in crime suppression in "The Shadow." Desperate criminals, mad inventors, imperialists, smugglers, crackpots, spies, and madmen are some of the types of characters that fall one by one under the craft and supernormal powers of the man known only to the public as The Shadow. Only to his close companion and aide, Margot Lane, is the mysterious agent known in his true identity as Lamont Cranston. Through a superior mental power

Cranston is able to make himself invisible, and by means of this power he is able to accomplish heroic feats in his crusade for law and justice. The locales for his dangerous adventures range from America to the South Seas. Each program is a complete unit. The production aims not only to present good entertainment but also to impress upon the public consciousness that crime does not pay. "The Shadow" may be heard on Sunday over MBS at 4:30 p.m. Eastern Time and at 5:30 p.m. Eastern Time, 4:30 p.m. Central Time.

LAMONT CRANSTON (played by Bill Johnstone) is a wealthy, much-traveled young man. He has learned to practise the occultism of the East so that he can by the power of hypnotism will that no one see him. Thus, as The Shadow, he campaigns forcibly against the forces of evil. He wages unusual battles with his wits and his penetrating intellect, and sometimes, dangerously, with fists or weapons

MMARGOT LANE (played by Agnes Moorehead) is the confidante and admiring companion of The Shadow. She is the only one who knows his true identity. She is also a valuable assistant in his exploits, investigating, contacting, and so on. Margot has the normal feminine weaknesses but possesses an unusual strength of character. Her regard for Lamont prompts her many excursions into hazardous situations

COMMISSIONER WESTON (played by Dwight Weist) is the city police commissioner who is so often aided by The Shadow in solving difficult crimes and bringing the criminals to justice. The commissioner sometimes questions the correctness of The Shadow's tactics, but is invariably convinced by the worth-while results that the phantom-like character is a trustworthy ally in his own fight against crime

EVERETT SLOANE is a key man in the production. He is a specialist in the art of duplicating the voices of youngsters, as often required in the plot of "The Shadow." He is also a master at "doubling." Whenever you hear a newsboy or a weak young man who is led astray, or some similar supporting character in the story, it is in all probability the voice of this talented and youthful supporting player

AARTHUR VINTON is another reliable actor who is often heard in various roles in these thrill dramas. Now and then, as in all stories, a voice is needed that is clear and resonant, yet not too young. Vinton has such a voice, calculated to ring true in any capacity. He is called upon for widely different characterizations. He portrays any role from that of a racketeer to that of a loving and devoted father

ROSA RIO has a musical mission in the battle against evildoers. If it is true that "music hath charms to soothe the savage breast," then Miss Rio may be credited with making the villains a little less ferocious. She plays the atmospheric organ music that sets the stage for the story and rings the curtain down at the end. Her musical bridges create the proper mood and help keep the action in the true key

KENNETH ROBERTS gives full play to his expressive voice in acting as announcer and narrator for "The Shadow." Well known for his finely modulated speaking voice, Roberts fits ideally into the scheme of the show. He opens, sets the scene and closes each program. The pleasing Roberts tones serve as a soothing interlude between the exciting scenes and balance the tense action of the drama

Agony and Art in Song

PROBABLY nothing in the world of music is more frequently—and more fruitlessly—discussed than singing. When it comes to vocalism, everyone appears to be a critic, especially since radio has brought it into the home daily for the greater part of the twenty-four hours. Hardly an air program without its crooners, torchers, concert artists or opera stars. Mama may prefer tenors or opera soprano; Papa (if trained in chorusing "Sweet Adeline" or college songs) usually gives his loyalty to more robust utterances; the youngsters know what they like, from Uncle Don to Maxine Sullivan. Dialing brings it all to easy hearing; take it or leave it—or tune in on the quiz sessions or news commentators.

The American ear and aural taste have been vitiated to some extent through the "popular" type of sounds regarded by many of our compatriots as singing. Whispering, moaning and bawling satisfy many listeners more than the artistic production of tone. Consequently they enjoy "Flat-Foot Floogie" better than a Schumann lied or an operatic number. The girl who seems to bring her voice out of her stomach and has never taken a vocal lesson is nearer to their understanding than Kirsten Flagstad and her refinements in song. The recently published encyclopedia, "Oxford Companion to Music," gives the English view of torch singers: "Those ladies who have the right emotional flavor, voice and personality to put over the sensations of unrequited love."

Singing as an art has been assiduously cultivated by all nations with any considerable degree of ordered life. Ancient Greece and Rome led in the practise. In fact, there are historians who tell us that Nero did not fiddle but sang. Regular schools of song existed in Europe as early as the fourth century.

With strange premonition of things to come, twelfth-century St. Bernard warns singers "not to produce tone through the nose." He also said that "it is necessary that men sing in a virile manner and not with voices shrill and artificial like voices of women, or in a manner lascivious and nimble like actors."

The other day I saw the advertisement of a man who alluded to himself as "voice-trainer for singers in the

popular field. Learn how to be a successful performer on the radio and in night-clubs." Generally, such teachers are not voice-trainers but voice-strainers. Many a fake pedagogue has made a naturally sweet voice into cries like that of a peacock, or a cavernous rumble like the snort of a rhinoceros.

Radio announcers should not be permitted to glorify the vocal groaners, cooers and shouters. Furthermore, to keep up a high appeal, the leading vocal artists should never compromise with agents and sponsors by programming cheap types of songs.

In many cases, serious singers have no conception of how to put over a popular song. They sing it as straight music and not only bore the listeners who prefer their light music by experts, but shock those who expect a higher standard from serious artists. If they do it as a bid for popularity, they are sadly mistaken. I think I

resemble most dialers in my liking for opera from opera singers, Schumann, Schubert and Brahms from lieder-singers and "Flat-Foot Floogie" and "A Tisket a Tasket," from Jane Froman and Frances Langford.

Speaking Up

By V. V.

"You know, it's funny, as far as radio is concerned, Carnegie Hall with its wooden walls could have been built yesterday—there's hardly a modern

steel and concrete hall that can beat its acoustics." Deems Taylor talking. "All the wood used in its construction acts as a natural sounding-board, and it is just as acoustically perfect for these Philharmonic broadcasts as it has been for concert audiences during the last fifty-seven years."

Up in the control-room, perched directly above the orchestra behind the wall of the stage, engineer Robert Anderson agrees, as does James Fasset, general production manager. He and the four other men in the tiny, box-like room follow the clock above the engineer. At three sharp, announcer Frank Gallup slides into a seat and sounds his familiar "Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen..." into the microphone. As Barbirolli raises his baton, Gallup's microphone is cut off. The music is picked up by the three microphones suspended over the orchestra.

Back in the control-room you learn from the engineer that radio sets are not built as yet to receive more than a certain range of sound, so the full force of the orchestra is never heard over the air. To retain its dynamic and tonal values is the delicate job of the engineer, guided by young Rolf Kaltenborn. Son of the famous H. V., he is making a name for himself in the production end of radio, and has taught himself to read score for this particular specialized work. Arrows marked in the orchestral score point to approaching loud and soft passages in the music. Anderson turns the dials on the control panel at the direction of Kaltenborn so that crescendos and diminuendos sound natural and not too sudden.

The strongest tangible link with the millions who benefit from all these anonymous activities is Deems Taylor. His intimate conversational chats give each listener a sense of participation in the program. His eyes focus intently on his script, but even the men in the control-room have no feeling that he is reading. His talk is just as much of a relaxation for them as for you in your armchair. For thirteen minutes they smoke and listen, approving or disapproving. They enjoy the fan mail he gets every week, and take it for granted that they'll never get any. Someday he'll talk about them... the invisible, unknown manipulators of sound who bring you your Sunday afternoon music as perfectly as they know how.

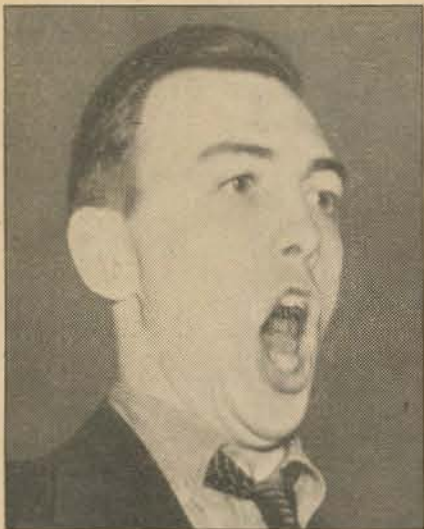

MERRIEST of evenings at the Metropolitan so far this season was "The Barber of Seville." So elemental is its humor, both in story and music, that its appeal remains unlesened through the years, even though one may not understand every word of the Italian text. At the opera house. Americans get the drift of the lines by watching the facial play and comic pantomime of the performers on the stage. Radio listeners, if they cannot procure a libretto, at least have the outline of the tale as given on this page and amplified by the instructive commentation of Milton Cross.

ACT I

Scene I

A street in old Seville. Dawn.

Young, handsome Count Almaviva and his musicians serenade Rosina, beautiful ward of Dr. Bartolo. The Count, left alone, watches for Rosina but instead encounters Figaro, the famous Barber of Seville, gossip and go-between for lovers. Figaro sings his gay "Largo al factotum," boasting that no one can get along without him. "Figaro here, Figaro there, Figaro everywhere." The Count begs Figaro to arrange a meeting with Rosina, asking that he be introduced as "Lindor,"

aria "La Calumnia" the musician relates how they will blacken the young man's character in order to disgust Rosina. However, Figaro reveals to the girl that Bartolo wishes to marry her himself. Bartolo accuses his ward of a romantic interest. The Count, simulating a drunken dragoon, staggers in, but Bartolo furiously refuses him quarters and rushes off to get exemption from that duty. The lovers exchange quick vows before the old man returns with soldiers, who try to arrest the Count, but he secretly whispers his identity and they release him.

ACT II

A room at Bartolo's house.

A strange music-master enters (the Count in another disguise) and announces that he is substituting for the suddenly indisposed Basilio. Rosina's music lesson is flavored with the flirtation of the lovers. Figaro comes and starts to shave the protesting Bartolo, but manages to steal the key of the balcony. Basilio enters in perfect health and the Count secretly bribes him with a purse. Figaro diverts Bartolo's attention by getting soap in his eyes, but the latter realizes that he is being duped and the three plotters make a merry exit.

In the final scene of this act, Bar-

so that the girl may not be influenced by his title. He and Figaro hide as the aged Dr. Bartolo emerges to give orders to the servant that no one be admitted except Basilio, the music-teacher, who is helping the guardian to marry the ward for her dowry.

Scene II

A room at Dr. Bartolo's.

Rosina reads a note from "Lindor" and sings "Una voce poco fa," expressive of her delight. Basilio tells Bartolo that Count Almaviva is also a suitor for Rosina's hand, and in the

tolo convinces Rosina that "Lindor" is really acting for Almaviva. Furious, she decides to marry Bartolo at once, ordering him to have "Lindor" and Figaro arrested. The happy old man goes to get the police. Figaro and the Count enter by means of the stolen key and Rosina reproaches them angrily. The Count, delighted that she prefers a poor lover to a titled rich one, admits his identity. Basilio arrives to act as notary and marriage broker for Bartolo, but a pistol persuades him to perform the ceremony for the young couple instead.

Brahms has written nothing more tender and heart-warming than this music of simple loveliness.

The piece was scheduled for performance last week, and it is devoutly to be hoped that Toscanini will really play it this time.

NEW YORK.—According to the latest listeners' survey, Charlie McCarthy still has the largest audience of any show on the air. Jack Benny is in second place, followed by the Lux Radio Theater. Bing Crosby is fourth, then comes Major Bowes, who still seems to be quite popular, although you rarely ever hear anyone talk about his program any more. Burns and Allen, Rudy Vallee, Fred Allen, Edward G. Robinson, Orson Welles, Al Jolson and Eddie Cantor follow in the order named. Kate Smith and the "Good News" show are running neck and neck as percentages go, with Kay Kyser and Fibber McGee next in line. Walter Winchell tops the news commentators, with Lowell Thomas the runner-up.

Kay Is Kayoed

Went over to Kay Kyser's show last Wednesday night, my first visit in about five weeks. Kay had a lot of new gags to put the audience in the proper spirit before the show went on the air, but something happened that was not expected. As soon as Kay came out on the stage a woman in the audience started to heckle him. He said everything anyone could say in a very diplomatic manner to try to shut her up, but she just wouldn't shut. Finally Ben Grauer, thinking he would try to save the situation, thrust a piece of paper in Kay's hand. Then the Prof. said: "Friends, we have a very unusual guest in our audience tonight and I've been asked to introduce her. She's the only woman tobacco-grower in the country and she hails from my home state of North Carolina, let's give her a great big hand." And who should stand up but the woman who had been annoying Kyser all evening. The audience howled.

From the Kyser program I went over to catch Fred Allen's repeat show at midnight. A half-minute before the program is ready to go on, Fred rushes down the aisle and up to the stage and sorta outa breath he tells the audience, "I just got in from Hollywood, folks, I'm out on bail." Of course this brought plenty of howls and put the audience into the proper mood for the many laughs that were to follow. Incidentally, that program had a few lines cut out of the script for obvious reasons. Peter Van Steeden was supposed to say, "Jack's (Benny) got the heart of a lion," and Fred was to answer, "Oh yeah, Benny could eat the M-G-M trade-mark and he still wouldn't have the heart of a lion. He's as yellow as a twelve-dollar diamond." You understand, of course, that they didn't want Benny's name and diamonds mentioned in the same breath.

Up in the Air for An "Airing"

There's no telling how far or how high your reporter will go to cover a broadcast. When "Howie Wing," the aviation serial, was broadcast from a United Airlines plane as it flew over New York City, I was among those present. It goes without saying that the big city is a beautiful sight to behold at night from the sky, and it was fun picking out the Empire State Building, Radio City, Times Square, and other notable spots while flying five-thousand feet above terra firma. The broadcast went off without a hitch. Bill Janney, who plays the title role, and Barbara Weeks, who portrays Donna Cavendish (she is also "Her Honor, Nancy James"), were seated side by side in a double seat. Only one microphone was used, and all during the broadcast it had to be shifted back and forth in front of their faces as they read their lines. Seven CBS technicians were used, which gives you an idea of what it means to put on a broadcast from a plane. Two

were stationed in the ship, two on the ground to pick up the broadcast by short wave and transmit it to the studios, where three engineers were sending it out to the network. A good time was had by all.

Columbia's "Tune-Up Time" had a unique show the other Thursday night . . . Dick Powell and Joan Blondell did a dramatic sketch, "Life At Home," with Powell on the stage of CBS Playhouse No. 1 and Joan working from a studio at KNX in Hollywood. The whole show ran off just as smoothly as though they were working on opposite sides of the same microphone. A. H. Petersen of Columbia's traffic department told me that this is an unusually stiff assignment for the engineers. Facilities have to be set up to take care of the normal time-lag of approximately three-fifths of a second between New York and Hollywood so that the show won't lag. It also requires three separate "mixing-points," one in Hollywood, one in New York and one in Chicago. It made me stop and think what a whale of a lot of effort goes into these shows which we listeners often take so casually.

A dress rehearsal of "Tune-Up Time" is no little affair, either, what with Walter O'Keefe and his regular cast, the thirteen Kay Thompson Rhythm Singers, the guest stars and, last but not most assuredly not least, Andre Kostelanetz' orchestra, which numbers forty-five. Mix all those in with the usual amount of officials and production men, the sound-effects men and the stage hands, and you've got, take it from me, a crowd. When it came time for Mr. and Mrs. Powell to rehearse their sketch, who should step up on the stage to read Joan's lines but her sister, Gloria—and a right nice job she did of the reading, too.

After the broadcast, the town's young stage-door johnnies with autograph books in hand congregate at the exit door and rush up as the Andrews Sisters and Elise Cooper show their faces . . . While I was at the rehearsal of the Bob Benchley show, singer Dick Todd came in with dark make-up on, and you'd imagine he'd just returned from Florida. Just in case you youngsters are wondering why Irene Wicker's Sunday morning program was changed to a later hour, here's the real lowdown. Many letters were received by the charming Miss Wicker requesting the change in time because a great many children attend or should have been at Sunday school at the hour she was on the air. The mothers stated they were having trouble because their offsprings wanted to stay home and listen to Miss Wicker's program. Always ready to oblige, the

Tops!

CHICAGO.—With the first month of 1939 behind us, Chicago continues to hold its blistering pace as the origination-point of the country's most popular serials. The latest national survey shows that of the five leading script-shows in the country today, four of them emanate from the Windy City! Chicago has already been recognized as the script-center of the country in point of quantity output. But now survey figures prove that Chicago is also the home town of the most popular shows, as well. The best-liked serial in the country today is "Ma Perkins." In second place is "The Guiding Light." New York's top-ranking five-a-week program is "Pepper Young's Family." In number four position is "The Story of Mary Marlin." And in fifth spot is "The Woman in White." Four out of five originating in Chicago!

Smart Buyer

One sponsor is apparently the smartest user of daytime radio in the country today. For the first four programs are all sponsored by one firm—a soap company (Procter & Gamble). That radio advertising pays is attested by the fact that each year the soap firm is pouring more and more of its advertising appropriation into radio. Apparently they feel they can get more results per dollar spent from radio than from any other medium. And they are the biggest network radio advertisers in the country today. In 1938 they spent over six million dollars on the three networks. In 1937 the soap firm's radio expenditure was four and a half million; in 1936, three and a third million; and in 1935, slightly more than two million. That this firm is constantly increasing its radio appropriation, that it is the number one radio time-buyer in the country, that it sponsors the four most popular serials in this country today is all mute testimony bearing out the power of radio advertising.

Next Most Popular Shows

But back to the country's leading script-shows. In addition to the "Big Five," other shows that follow, in popularity, are as follows: (6) "Big Sister," (7) "David Harum," (8) "The O'Neills," (9) "Hilltop House," and (10) "Road of Life."

Radio's Ace Writer

The survey also re-establishes the superiority of a Chicago writer, Irna Phillips, in the art of authoring script-shows. Of the five most popular serials on the air, Miss Phillips is author of two—"Guiding Light" and "The Woman in White." A third show, "Road of Life," is in tenth place.

I'll never forget the hullabaloo along radio row about a year ago when it was first announced that the most popular serial on the air at that time, "Today's Children," was to be replaced by a newcomer. People said the author, Miss Phillips, didn't know what she was doing in taking the top program off. Her best friends urged her to change her mind. But Miss Phillips remained firm in her decision to replace the program. She felt that, from a dramatic standpoint, "Today's Children" had been squeezed as dry as it could be. So, against the advice of practically everyone in radio, "Today's Children" came off and "The Woman in White" went on. That Irna knew what she was talking about is attested by the fact that "Woman in White" has been near the top consistently, and right now is reposing snugly in fifth place. Miss Phillips once more proved that she was the peer of all script-

writers. Other authors who are in the "Big Five" are Orin Tovrov ("Ma Perkins"), Elaine Sterne Carrington ("Pepper Young's Family"), and Jane Crusinberry ("Story of Mary Marlin"). It's interesting to note that the authors of the five most popular programs, with one exception, are women. Which seems to indicate that if you want to appeal to feminine listeners use a feminine script-writer.

Crippled "First Nighter"

The night your Tattler watched a performance of "First Nighter," the personification of that character, Bret Morrison, was on crutches while introducing members of the cast. Although cutting his foot in an ice-skating accident, Bret didn't let that injury cut any ice as far as his radio shows were concerned. Bret was there—injured leg and all. Since the "First Nighter" cast must be dressed formally, Bret had a pair of monogrammed "formal" black crutches instead of the ordinary white ones, while his foot was bandaged in somber black bandages instead of the usual white wrappings!

"First Nighter" Tidbits

Barbara Luddy and Les Tremayne make a very charming couple on the CBS stage. They look just as nice in real life as you imagine they do when you hear their voices on the air. Barbara unconsciously uses a cute gesture of putting her hand to her ear when broadcasting. Crowds swarm Barbara and Les for autographs following show, in typical Hollywood style... "First Nighter" and "Barn Dance" only two Chicago night-time shows now airing repeats. "First Nighter" repeat for West Coast is broadcast at 11 p.m. CST. CBS studios are jammed—with many people standing—for both the 7 and 11 o'clock shows... In real life, red-headed director Joe Ainley is married to pretty Betty Lou Gerson, star of "Arnold Grimm's Daughter"

... Tom Wallace, executive of agency handling "First Nighter," is in the control-room with director Ainley and engineer Gregg during broadcasts.

Correction

The serial "Guiding Light" did observe its second anniversary as related in last week's column. However, the show which was moved from New York to Chicago, and which features Ken Griffin and Betty Lou Gerson, was not "Guiding Light," but "The Road of Life," authored by Irna Phillips. Miss Phillips also writes "Guiding Light," thus giving rise to the confusion of the two.

Sports, Winter and Summer

Janet Logan, Sandra Sinclair of "Romance of Helen Trent," is combining business with pleasure in week-end jaunts to Kenosha, Wis. She takes along her skis to relieve the advance work she's doing for a Radio-Stage Guild show to be presented there... The cast of "Those Happy Gilmans" gave announcer Don Gordon an elegant fly rod, following his final broadcast in that serial.

RECORDS OF THE WEEK

A department reviewing the recordings of your radio favorites

Schumann and Gershwin:

MYRA HESS is one of the rare members of her sex to reach concert virtuosity on any instrument, in this case the piano. To make her bow to record-buyers, Miss Hess has chosen a sure-fire favorite among piano concerti, the warm, brilliant and charming *Concerto in A Minor* by Schumann. And she leaves little doubt in your mind that she is an artist of top caliber. The accompanying orchestra is directed by Walter Goehr. It was recorded abroad. (Victor album 473. \$6.50.)

By far the best of the Gershwin albums is now out on Decca, fittingly played by the Paul Whiteman Concert Orchestra. The inevitable *Rhapsody in Blue* starts it off, but two unrecorded and much less familiar works follow . . . the *Second Rhapsody* and the *Cuban Overture*. Both typically Gershwin, with emphasis on the piano passages, neither of these top the popular appeal of the famous *Rhapsody*, but are refreshing in their unfamiliarity and originality. The overture naturally borrows many Latin rhythms for its effect. The album concludes with the excellent *American in Paris* which Gershwin wrote mostly abroad, and describes his feelings walking about the French capital. These are all works of more importance than anything else Gershwin wrote, and thus the album is of far more value than the medleys of his show tunes which both Victor and Columbia have issued. (Decca album 31. \$5.50.)

Pop:

Undecided, new swing tune, gets polished off by both the veteran Benny Goodman's band (Victor) and the newly formed John Kirby orchestra (Decca). Kirby is one of 52nd Street's best swingmen, and his little band sounds great. On the other side is a fine Billy Kyle tune, *From A Flat to C*.

St. Louis Blues, like Alexander's Ragtime Band was treated last year, is due for a resurgence of interest due to its being the title of a movie. From the Paramount picture cast, Matty Malneck and his little trick band may be heard playing this famous Handy tune on a Decca record. But the Malneck group borrows trumpet tricks from Benny Goodman's man Ziggy Elman, and there is a touch of the corn with the accordion.

Speaking of Ziggy Elman, two swingers are out by his own picked band, and both creditable stuff. Best side: *29th and Dearborn*. (Bluebird.)

That old turkey *Trees* gets swung by Bunny Berigan's band. (No gags about swingin' on trees.) Trumpeter-leader Berigan stars. On the other side, *Black Bottom* (And no gags.) Victor.

Bob Hope and Shirley Ross, creators of both tunes on film, sing the sophisticated lyrics of *Two Sleepy People* and the new *Thanks for the Memory* (not the usual words.) Decca.

Any Artie Shaw release is news, and he keeps up his high standard of good swing on well-chosen tunes. This time it's *Karibali*, the jungle-drums song, and old-but-good *It Had To Be You*. Very worthy. Bluebird.

pygmies in their treatment of the same modes. To indite some cold, analytical summing-up, it may be said that he was an original, lofty and living voice in music, combining the ancient classical formalism with the warm spirit of emotion, enhancing the technics of all instruments, and devising harmonies both novel and daring—in some instances foreshadowing those of Wag-

ner! Upon the Bach masterpieces, his best successors build triumphantly. It has justifiably been said that without Bach there might have been no Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven and Brahms.

BACH BIBLIOGRAPHY

A whole library of books has been published about Bach and his music, a few biographical, most of them analytical, and none that make light read-

ing. Those who seek a serious approach to the composer can find it in Philipp Spitta's volume on the life of Bach; likewise J. Fuller-Maitland's. Excellent also are Charles Sanford Terry's "The Music of Bach," and "Bach, the Master," by Sir Hubert Parry. Consult, too, the biographical essays in the various music encyclopedias, notably that in Grove's.

... A Ceaseless Search, an Unquenched Thirst for Knowledge ...

Person-to-Person

• In the Alameda City School of the Air plan all programs are dramatized (*Listening to Learn*, Jan. 28). Recognition of this work now comes from the National Education Association and will be publicly expressed for the benefit of Coast-to-Coast listeners on the NEA's *Our American Schools* program February 15. On this date the Alameda air-school will take over the program to show what they are doing in California. Many interested eyes have been focused on Alameda's experiment and this broadcast presents itself as an unusual opportunity to ear-witness a first-hand demonstration.

• Georgetown University, Washington, D. C., came into the radio picture over Mutual last Wednesday night, February 1, with the premiere of a series of public-health forums.

• Scripts for the Department of the Interior's new series, *What Price America*, have been written by Bernard C. Schoenfeld, who will be remembered for the excellent job he did with the Office of Education's *Brave New World* series last season.

• *Meet the Faculty* (below) is the first of a picture and brief biography series presenting the men and women engaged in various phases of radio-education. The purpose of this series is to acquaint the fast-growing number of people interested in this educating medium with the nationally recognized experts active in the work. Behind it there is also a much more sinister purpose—and that is to prove to "diehards" and "doubting Thomases" that a change has actually taken place in the quality and potency of the educational broadcast and that it is an inspiring and vital aid to education both at home and in the classroom, for adults as well as children.

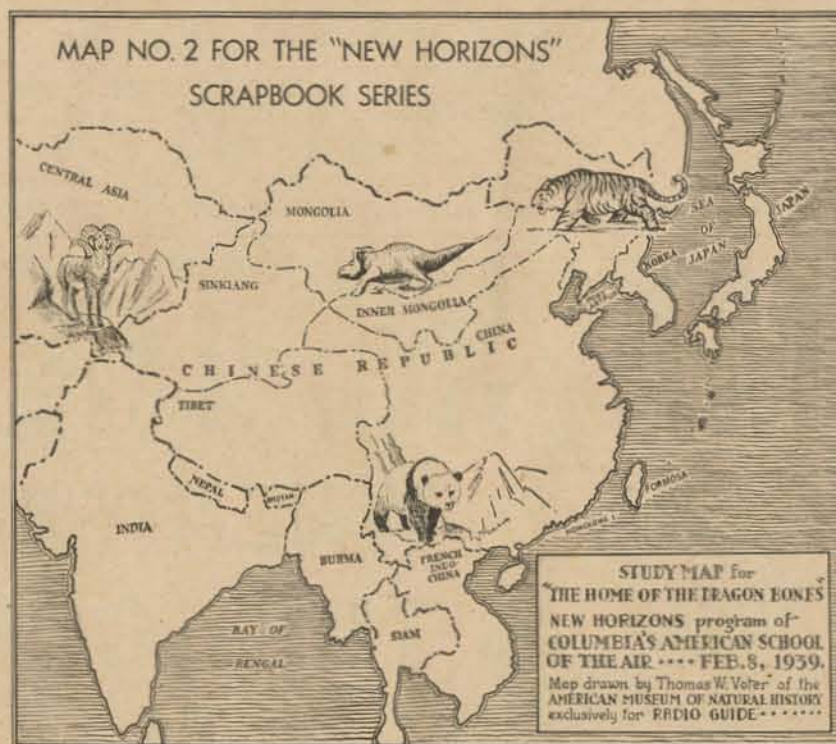
Meet the Faculty

OVIS POLI—beautiful, spiral-horned sheep; first discovered by Marco Polo in 1269; found only in the treeless, wind-swept Pamirs of Turkestan.

GIANT PANDA—rare; pictured above in the mountains of southwestern China; a living question mark to mammalogists, for it has characteristics similar to both the raccoon family and to the bear family.

SNOW TIGER—long-haired; one of the most beautiful and ferocious of the cat family; larger and more powerful than its relative of southeastern Asia; inhabits cold regions of Siberia.

PROTOSERAPTES—long-tailed monster wearing bony flange on its head; a dinosaur that lived in the Gobi Desert of Mongolia millions of years ago; the finding of several nests of dinosaur eggs containing some of the unhatched young near the bones of the Protoceratops was the first positive proof that some dinosaurs laid eggs.

Eight Years Old and Still Going Strong

Eight years is a mighty long life for a radio program idea; and when the program happens to be of the educational variety, this phenomena approaches the miraculous. But such is the distinction of the perennial favorite of the serious listener, the *University of Chicago Round Table Discussions*, which series, on Sunday, February 12, celebrates its eighth year on the air.

This series came into being at a time when the mere mention of "educational program" was enough to cause Mr. Average Listener to feverishly dial for "just anything else." But it came, brought a radically new practise in broadcasting with it, gained enough followers to merit its continuance, and exerted a significant influence in changing the popular attitude of antagonism toward educational programs.

Recognition for the success of this venture goes to persistent Allen Miller and his conviction that such an idea was not impossible. Miller, now director of the University Broadcasting Council, had a tough job selling the round-table stunt because that job meant inspiring a broadcaster with the courage to attempt something which at that time was generally considered taboo. It was after Miller took Judith Waller into his discussions of round-table possibilities that the proposal finally evolved into a local broadcast over station WMAQ*. At that time Miss Waller, now director of education for the NBC central division, was vice-president and general manager of station WMAQ. During the Round Table's two-year run as a local program many problems had to be worked out. In October, 1933, the Round Table went network, with the radical departure in radio technique that made it the first program to be presented on an NBC network without the use of a manuscript. It has been a regular weekly network feature ever since and one of the most popular educational programs on the air.

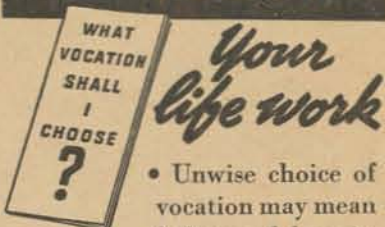

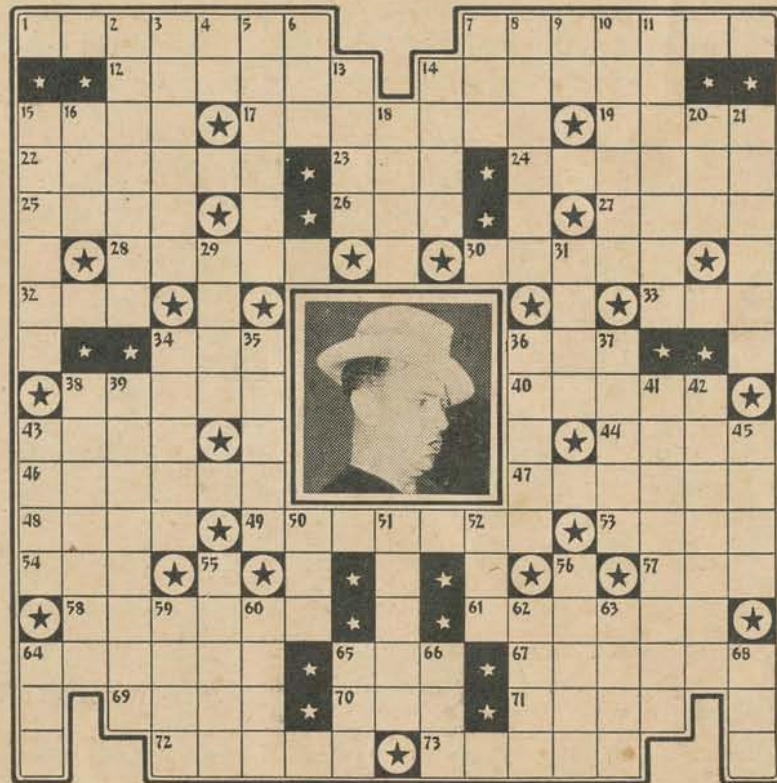

On Short Waves

ACCORDING to information just received from the E. I. A. R. in Italy, the powerful new transmitters of the Imperial Short-Wave Center at Prato Smeraldo, near Rome, are operating as follows: Daily over ZRO4 (11.81), from 4:40 to 8:45 a.m., and from 10 a.m. to 12:05 p.m.; over ZRO8 (17.82), from 5 to 7:30 a.m.; over ZRO6 (15.3), from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.; over ZRO3 (9.63), from 12:10 to 9 p.m., and over ZRO9 (9.67), from 3 to 10 p.m. EST. Certain of the above transmissions are also carried by commercial stations as follows: Over IQY (11.67), from 5 to 5:15 a.m., 12:10 to 1 p.m. and from 3 to 3:30 p.m.; over IRF (9.83), from 12:40 to 1, 1:37 to 3:30 and from 6 to 9 p.m., and over ICC (6.35), from 3 to 3:30 p.m. EST.

The new street addresses for all stations in Havana, Cuba, as furnished me by Ricardo Rubio of that city, are as follows: COCO, San Miguel 314; COCQ, Monte 103; COBZ, San Rafael 108; COBC, Monte 467; COCW, Prado 553 Altos; COCM, Calle 25 No. 1113, Vedado; COBX, San Miguel 570; COCA, Galiano 464; COCD, Calles 25 y G, Vedado; COCH, Prado 63 Altos, and COCX, Reina 314 Altos (all the above stations are located in Havana, Cuba).

In a desperate effort to counteract the effect of the insidious propaganda radiated daily over Japan's powerful short-wave transmitters at Tokyo, the Chinese government is installing short-wave transmitters at strategic points throughout China. Owing to haste in construction and necessarily temporary locations, these stations are of low power and unfortunately none too efficient. However, by careful tuning, the average short-wave listener can usually hear the following transmissions: Over XPSA (7.01) of Kweiyang, Kweichow Province, daily from 6 to 11 a.m. EST; over XGRV (11.4) of Chungking, daily from 8 to 8:30 a.m. EST; over XOJD (6.88) of Hankow, daily from 6 to 8 a.m., and over XGAP (9.56) of Peking, daily from 4 to 9 a.m. EST. This last station, in territory conquered by the Nipponese and oper-

ated by them, controls all broadcasting in North China. Reports on reception of XGAP should be sent to S. Yoshimura, director, Peking Central Station, Hsi-chan-an Chieh, Peking. In verifying reception, this station sends not only an attractive QSL card but eight exquisitely tinted Chinese scenic postal cards as well. Reports on reception of either XGRV or XOJD should be sent to H. K. Tong, China Information Committee, Box 90, Hankow.

W3XAU, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, is now operating experimentally on its new frequency of 15.27 megs Mondays through Fridays after 3:30 p.m., and Saturdays and Sundays after 3 p.m. EST.

HIGH-FREQUENCY HIGH-LIGHTS: A new Tokyo transmitter, JLG (7.285), is broadcasting for European listeners daily from 2:30 to 4 p.m. EST. . . . Despite a ban on short-wave transmitters in that country, ZC6EC (14.04 and 14.1), somewhere in Palestine, is on the air, and being heard by many listeners near 7:30 a.m. EST, and in late afternoons. . . . OAX5C of Ica, Peru, has at last picked out a clear channel of 9.39 megs. . . . YV3RX, "La Voz de Lara," Barquisimeto, Venezuela, being heard on 4.99 megs, formerly broadcast on 5.9 megs under the call YV3RA. . . . YV5RM, "Radiodifusora Venezuela," Caracas, being heard on 5.01 megs, formerly broadcast on 6.16 megs under the call YV5RD. . . . New calls for the two transmitters formerly known as HIG, Trujillo City, Dominican Republic, are: HI1G (6.29) and HI2G (9.295). . . . "Radio Nacional de Espana" is now transmitting on a frequency of 7.66 megs, while EAJ43 of Tenerife, Canary Islands, which formerly carried the Nationalist broadcasts using this identification, is now transmitting independently on approximately 7.49 megs.

The India stations operating on the 60-meter band have shifted slightly to the following new frequencies: VUD2, Delhi, to 4.96; VUM2, Madras, to 4.92; VUB2, Bombay, to 4.885, and VUC2, Calcutta, to 4.83 megs.
