## Blessed Event

Do you remember those March of Dimes announcements that filled the air a few weeks ago. Perhaps you wondered if anyone else really would respond, even as you sent in your own contribution. We know the results now, and they are such as to attest forever to the power of radio and the generous spirit of the radio audience, for the total amount of money raised by the radio campaign in behalf of sufferers of infantile paralysis was slightly more than \$270,000. Let's triple it next year.

## Tender Ears?

Once children were supposed to have ears too young to hear the facts of life, of war, of murder, of dog-eat-dog competition. But radio is taking care of that with a result that presents a challenge.

In New York, the Abraham Lincoln High School recently questioned its 988 students. They found that the children spend two hours and five minutes listening each average day against one hour and twenty minutes reading. They found that a student who listens to programs of low cultural content as a freshman still listens to those same moronic programs when she or he is a senior.

Therein is radio's challenge.

Children are listeners. For two hours or more each day, the average student of that average high school in New York heard radio programs. But who supervised his listening? Who told him what was good and what was bad?



Who informed him that certain broadcasts would help his schoolwork and who directed him to those broadcasts?

Nobody!

Therein is education's challenge.

## Cardinal Sins

The floundering Federal Communications Commission is said to have listed fourteen types of broadcasts it considers dangerous. Stations permitting such broadcasts will be denied licenses to broadcast, according to present plans. The cardinal sins of broadcasting are:

- (1) Fortune-telling in any form.
- (2) Astrology or other fake sciences.
- (3) Solicitation of funds.
- (4) False, fraudulent or misleading advertising.
- (5) Defamatory statements.
- (6) Failure to allow equal opportunity to discuss all sides of controversial issues.
- (7) Programs bordering upon the obscene.
- (8) Programs offending religious or racial groups.
- (9) Taking sides (as broadcasters) on political, religious or racial matters.
- (10) Cliff-hanger kid shows (horror programs).
- (11) Booze glorification.
- (12) Interrupting concerts or music to insert advertising announcements.
- (13) Too much advertising in general.
- (14) Too many phonograph records.

A more undesirable list of programs couldn't be compiled, could it? But what man or what group of men can tell us what is "misleading" advertising, or how much is "too much advertising in general," or how many is "too many phonograph records" or what is a kid's cliff-hanger program, and what is a classic such as "Black Beauty" or "Through the Looking-Glass"?

What fount of wisdom on the government payroll, whether politically appointed or a civil-service servant, knows all those answers?

Think it over, Mr. and Mrs. Listener.

## Ring Of Stations

Someone has proposed once again that the government build a ring of stations in the middle of the United States and that those stations be of such power that they can reach every corner of the country.

More interesting is the projected program set-up. One station would broadcast nothing but classical music, another would carry nothing but news, another would provide dance music, another would produce drama all day and all night, another would be a dawn-to-midnight lecture-hall broadcasting debates and discussions and orations.

In short, when a listener wanted any sort of program, he would tune to the appointed station and get what he wanted.

It's an interesting idea, isn't it?

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# GREAT AMERICANS THINK ABOUT RADIO

## STRUGGLE WITH TICKING SECONDS



**W**AS seated in the dining-car of the "Miamian," en route to Florida for a brief convalescence after my recent attack of "flu," when I overheard a group of fellow passengers at the next table discussing radio. Their conversation stamped them as solid, middle-class American citizens—the type who spend evenings at home next to the radio. They were pointing out weaknesses in radio programs. Their criticisms touched on variety shows, musical programs, "listener-participation" programs, and the type of material that is offered to child listeners. Their comments, I reflected, are a cross-section of American thought. Unquestionably thousands of people in homes throughout the country have discussed the same questions, offered the same criticisms, and made the same or similar suggestions about radio, 1939 style.

Several times I was tempted to interrupt with an answer to some of the more pointed but less generous criticisms. But I discreetly held my peace and listened as attentively as I could, because the "average listener's" point of view toward an art with which I have been identified since my arrival in this country is a fascinating subject to me.

As I listened I began to wonder whether one of the real weaknesses in radio is not the fact that Mr. and Mrs. Fan have never been brought into close contact with radio behind the scenes. Large audiences attend broadcasts, but few have seen anything but the finished product. The hours that are spent on a comedy script—the endless conferences, writing and rewriting of a program before it is sent out over the airwaves, the long, weary hours of rehearsal for a musical program that takes a half-hour or an hour to present, are not generally known to listeners. Not many of our listeners are familiar with that grim struggle with ticking seconds, the cuts and

changes that have to be made in musical scores and manuscripts to accommodate the rigid time-limits of network presentations.

On the surface, one program a week looks like an easy assignment. A rehearsal, a broadcast, and—voila!—it is over until next week. Now let us go behind the scenes. Recently I assisted my husband, Andre Kostelanetz, inaugurate his new series of "Tune-Up Time" broadcasts. I was guest artist on the initial broadcast, scheduled for a Thursday evening. On Monday evening I sang at the Metropolitan. Kosty, who usually attends my performances, dropped in for a moment to wish me good luck, then dashed home to work on some arrangements for the broadcast. For two weeks he had been busy rehearsing the orchestra, attending program conferences, working on arrangements, experimenting with musical effects. All this, mind you, for the first broadcast. On Tuesday I attended a preliminary rehearsal, where all the members of the cast were assembled for a brief run-through. We spent three hours that afternoon on a simple run-through. I was having trouble with my speaking-lines. Patiently the program director went over them with me again and again.

On Wednesday I attended another rehearsal. This one went a little easier, but it ran ten minutes too long. I was to sing two songs—and participate in the dialog. We rehearsed the musical portion of the program for most of that afternoon, while in other parts of the studio the cast ran through their lines, the continuity-writers wrote and rewrote the script,

and Kosty divided his time between directing the orchestra and making notations on the score for changes to be made before the dress rehearsal the following day. We assembled again on the day of the broadcast. From mid-afternoon until seven-thirty in the evening our dress rehearsal continued. Speaking-lines, music, speaking-lines again, until my head was whirling.

Home for a brief rest, a change of clothes, no dinner because I was to sing, then back to the studio at 9:15 p.m. Cuts had been made in the script to save fifty seconds, and the program director once again went through my script with me, instructing me on the changes in my lines. At 10:00 o'clock, we were in the wings, Kosty was on the podium, his arm uplifted, and a second later "Tune-Up Time" was on the air. Forty-five minutes later it was all over. Pages of script scattered on the floor of the Columbia Playhouse were the only record of the hours of rehearsal and effort that went into the making of forty-five minutes of entertainment.

Perhaps radio should adapt the technique of the motion pictures and let the public in behind the scenes. I am sure some of the criticisms I heard on the train that day were made because this group of average American listeners was unfamiliar with the preparation stages of a program.

Why not take definite steps to correct the faulty general impression that radio broadcasting is a great, glittering toy in the hands of lucky, carefree performers who draw immense salaries for standing at a microphone just a few minutes or only a few hours a week and vacationing the remainder of the time?

Certainly motion-picture audiences, knowing as much as they do about technical problems, have become more tolerant. Why not radio audiences?

Jitterbug dancers may seem delirious or insane to many observers, but their antics do require healthy bodies and even mental concentration

We publish this anonymous physician's examination of a subject because we believe it presents a healthful and surprising point of view. Read it and see if you agree with the doctor's conclusions.

I AM tired of hearing people cry that the young folk of today are brainless, forward brats because they have succumbed to the craze of the moment and become jitterbugs.

If I had daughters, I would want them to be jitterbugs, cats, alligators, or whatever else they call themselves these days. Not all doctors will agree with me, of course, for we are divided in our thinking about jazz and dancing just as much or as little as we are divided about when to administer spinal anesthesia.

One doctor talks about the dance thus:

"Is there not a medical argument against these dances which has not been fully appreciated. Dance neuroses are making their appearance. Sexual neurasthenias, pelvic congestions, prostaticorrhea, priapism, congested prostates, and spermatorrhea represent some of the evidence of the physical and psychological influences of the dances which have a hold upon the dancing public."

Another: "I know of three young girls who have admitted to their mothers that they have acquired the habit of self-abuse through the sexual excitement of dancing."

On the other hand: "The fact of the

matter is that the young dancers of today are drinking less liquor than ever before within my memory. It is true that the bars in many ballrooms where they encourage the jitterbug are doing their chief business by selling colas and pop."

Again: "Looking through my case histories builds a strong plea for more swing and more jitterbugs. The violent nature of the dance gives the boys and girls a fine chance to get rid of all their surplus energy. When they get through, they are too tired to be much interested in necking or worse. Frankly, I consider swing an antidote for premarital sexual intercourse."

AT THIS point, I hope that those who are reading this article have an open mind and are willing to accept facts as they are presented. For I want you to examine with me some of the interesting things regarding music which lie in our histories.

It is not generally understood that physicians have long been aware of music's power to do surprising things. Consider this, for example: More than

four thousand years ago the priest doctors of Egypt had a song which they sang and played which was supposed to insure the fertility of women.

Madness has been treated successfully in modern asylums by means of music, but one of the first instances was recorded in the Bible. It is written that "When the evil spirit from God was upon Saul, then David took up a harp and played with his hands so that Saul was refreshed and well, and the evil spirit departed from him."

A celebrated Greek invented the use of music as a cure for a hangover. Others learned that music quieted the violently insane. A fellow named Antigenides, the tibicentist, played something that must have been ancient swing for Alexander the Great, which so excited the monarch that he leaped from his couch, seized his sword, and began to attack everyone within reach. In the minds of some critics, I suppose, Alexander might qualify as the first jitterbug.

Philip V of Spain was subject to such fits of melancholia that he came close to insanity until Farinelli, the

celebrated castrato soprano, was summoned to sing for him. After weeks of listening to the music, the king was restored to mental health.

I have said that music has peculiar influences on different persons. We know of an Italian who so enjoyed the opera "La Vestale" that he decided life had nothing more to offer and so killed himself. An Englishman was allergic to the music of "Artaxerxes." Whenever he heard it, he fainted.

THERE can be no doubt that music has strange power over some people, and some power, however slight, over all people. I am frank to admit that we do not know enough about this power, but experiments are going forward today which will increase our knowledge and our use of rhythm and harmony, and which, I trust, will enable us physicians to understand better the needs of the boys and girls who give themselves up to the peremptory urging of a Benny Goodman or Bob Crosby jam session.

One doctor has seen music fighting the insufferable pain of childbirth. He says, "I have heard a patient singing loudly while a forceps extraction was being done."

Napoleon noticed something akin to that during his disastrous invasion of Russia. He reported that the Russian music drove the Russian soldiers to excesses of fortitude and bravery that his own troops could not match.

Music is amazing. It is unendingly amazing and I submit these facts in support. Music accelerates breathing.

Music increases metabolism. Music can either increase or decrease muscular energy.

Music, when sufficiently shrill and properly projected, can, without raising the temperature, fry an egg. Believe it or not, two doctors named Flosdrof and Chambers did it. I believe we are telling Mr. Ripley something there.

**MUSIC** can give us a clearer mind, better health, more energy. We are at the beginning of understanding these things. The same two doctors who used music to fry their egg also learned that the music could coagulate proteins, crack vegetable oil and generate an acetylene-like gas, even slightly change starch into sugar.

What goes on in Miss America's body when she hears "Deep Purple" is as yet both unmeasured and unmeasurable. Or what takes place when she hears "Boogie-woogie"? As yet, we watch the outside and guess about what goes on beneath the skin. In another ten years, we may know.

Even now things are happening with which too few people are familiar. In Chicago, a dentist treats pain with music. The head-pad is equipped with the sort of bone-conduction sound conveyors that are used by the deaf. The patient leans his head against the pad and, despite drilling and pulling, is braced and calmed.

In a Chicago hospital, doctors had given up hope of bringing to her senses an Italian mother who refused to have anything to do with her baby. A pian-

ist played number after number. The mother paid no heed until she heard the first bars of "Il Trovatore." Magically, it brought back her reason.

An Italian girl who had lost the power of speech began to talk again when she heard "O Sole Mio." A victim of amnesia who could remember nothing of her past regained her grasp of things and her memory when she heard "Silver Threads Among the Gold."

Many hospitals have musical sedatives to offer as well as drugs. Most often prescribed for jangled nerves are Mendelssohn's "On Wings of Song," "Berceuse," from Jocelyn, or Schubert's "Ave Maria." Tonic tunes are Beethoven's Egmont Overture, "Pilgrims' Chorus" from "Tannhauser," Liszt's "Hungarian Rhapsody No. 2." For extreme cases of blues, I have known physicians to administer Dvorak's "Carnival Overture," Beethoven's "Eroica Symphony" and the "Ride of the Valkyries."

**THOSE** are tunes to clear the mind.

What now about this business of increasing one's energy. It has been proved and measured, and in a most interesting fashion. You are all familiar with the nerve test called knee-jerks. A nurse or doctor sets you on a table which permits your legs to swing or asks you to cross one leg over the other and then taps you smartly with a small hammer at the base of your knee cap. The resultant kick, if your reactions are in good order, is the thing the musical doctors measured.

First, they determined that the in-

dividual's average reaction to the tap at the base of the knee moved the foot up and up so many inches. They measured it. Then they played music "at" the patient, tapped his knee, and measured the kick to music. The result—and I suggest we may also have something for Mr. Ripley here—was that soft music practically doubled the distance

of the kick, whereas loud and martial music almost tripled it.

A curious professor who heard of this miracle sought to apply it to a voluntary physical task. In silence, he measured the strength with which a man could grasp an object between his thumb and forefinger.

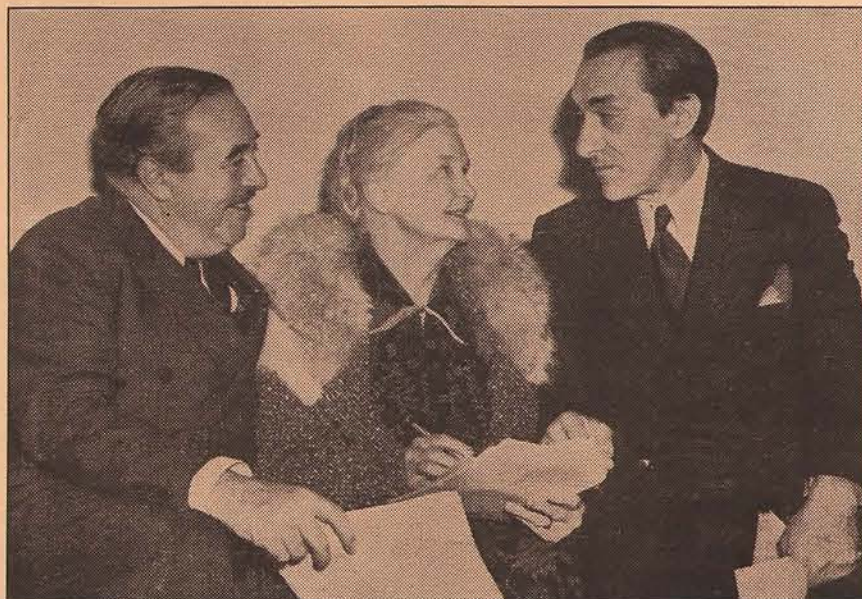

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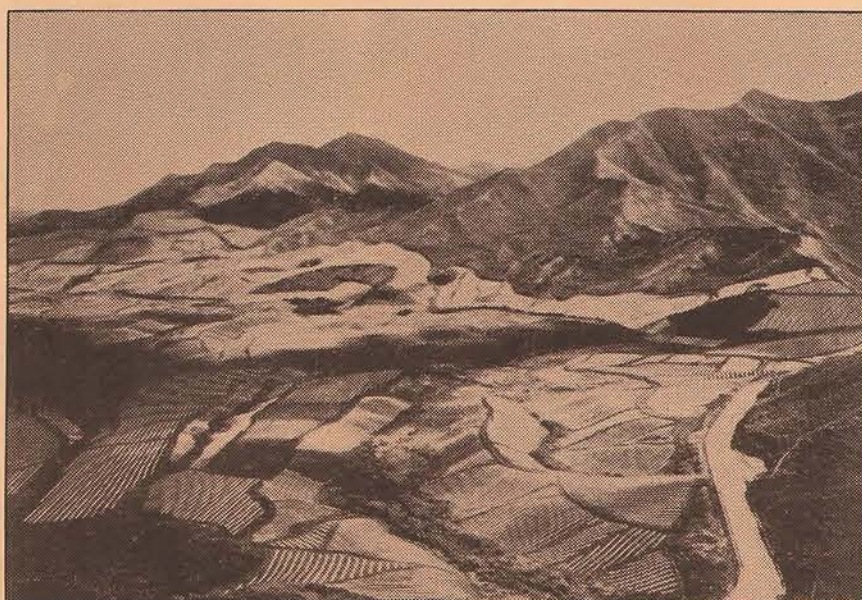

Brown and his show move from their former Saturday time to the time on Thursday which has been held by Joe Penner's program. Coincidence, too, is the fact that both Joes are somewhat the same type of comedian—naive, sentimental and scatter-brained. Brown has developed a radio technique paralleling his screen roles. The real truth about Kate Smith and the way she lives has eluded many a writer who hoped to answer a world's unasked questions. James Street's analysis of this singing lady's personality and his description of the woman she has become since she cried her girlish eyes out in Ted Collins' office years ago makes an unforgettable story.—Ed.

**K**ATE SMITH, the girl of complexes and beautiful complexion, made her debut over the Columbia network in April, 1931, and leaped from the bottom of the heap to the top so quickly that even Ted Collins, her miracle man, almost lost his breath.

She just sang. She didn't try to vocalize or croon, but just flung melody at the mike and let nature take her course. She didn't know anything about radio, and that was well. Her manager didn't know much more, and that, too, was a break. They learned together. They decided that most programs were too wordy. They figured the average American radio audience was father, mother, the youngsters in their teens, and maybe grandma and grandpa. All must be remembered. They probably lived in a village and didn't give a whoop about Broadway. They wanted music, and Kate and Ted were right again.

They got a piece of paper and sat down together.

"We've got to have an introduction," Ted said.

Kate said, "I reckon we have."

"How's this," said Ted. "You just stand before the mike and say 'Hello, everybody! This is Kate Smith.' It's simple."

"Okay," said Kate. "But we got to have a theme song."

They thought some more, and Kate remembered a thing on which she had collaborated years before. She dusted it off and sang it for Ted. It was "When the Moon Comes Over the Mountain." "It's swell," said Ted.

Kate suggested, "When I get through, I want to say 'Thanks for listenin'.' Think that'll be okay?"

"It never did any harm to say thanks," Ted said. "Go to it."

The rest is radio history. Kate went from the Capitol to the studio and went on. Jack Miller was her pianist. He still is.

"I was scared the first time I faced the mike," she said. "Then the comforting thought came to me that Mother was listening, and millions of other mothers. I sang 'I Surrender, Dear,' and my fright was over.

Ted told me I did swell. The folks in the studio congratulated me. I was a green-horn and didn't realize what I had stepped into. But I was on the toughest spot in radio, opposite Amos and Andy.

"Those two comics, on the NBC hook-ups, were the most-talked-about radio stars of the day. Playing against them was a nice way to commit professional suicide."

Kate always speaks of her Columbia debut as her real debut. She speaks of the "first time I faced the mike." But she had tried it before with NBC, and since she hadn't clicked, she had forgotten about it.

The day after her Columbia debut, the letters started pouring in. Her engagement at the Capitol, originally set for one week, was extended to nine weeks. Amos and Andy had competition. The Columbia people were beside themselves with joy. They gave Kate the coveted 7 p.m. spot. During the summer, only about three months after she clicked, she won a New York radio contest as "queen of the air." In

September of that year, she began to sing under the sponsorship of La Palina, and she has never wanted for a sponsor since. The same year, she broke all records at the Palace Theater, and in December won a national poll as the most popular woman singer on the air.

She never missed an opportunity to appear at a benefit. She visited hospitals, and in her broadcast she pulled at every heartstring she could find. She answered all her mail. That's excellent showmanship, but Kate did it because she liked it.

She organized a national society to send flowers to shut-ins. Critics said she had a hospital complex. The case of Billy was typical. Billy was a Brooklyn boy, and bedridden. Kate used to go over and visit with him. One evening she dedicated the song, "Whistle and Blow Your Blues Away," to him and got a note that he was doing just that. He died shortly afterwards.

"I've never been able to sing that song again," Kate said. "Billy died blissfully happy. I had asked my radio

listeners to drop him a card. In the week that followed, he received 18,000 letters and cards. He got flowers and money, too. The sophisticates say that's maudlin sentiment and publicity. They've said I had a hospital complex.

"Maybe I have. I don't know what such a complex is. I'm a simple person. What I do know (and what they, poor souls, will never know) is the joy of seeing pinched faces light up with pleasure at a break in the monotony of their weary days.

"When I make an appeal for the Red Cross and get back tens of thousands of nickels and pennies, what do I care for the criticisms of the few who attribute my efforts to publicity."

Kate and Ted smashed radio precedent by making a success of the "Matinee Hour," a huge afternoon show. It was a cock-eyed show. Kate was the mistress of ceremonies and she interviewed just about everybody from Dizzy Dean to the town crier of Provincetown, Massachusetts. It even became a "lost and found" bureau when

the Humane Society telephoned Kate one afternoon that their mascot was lost. His name was Paddy and he was just another dog, but Kate knew him and broadcast his description. He was located.

Ted and Kate began making money hand over fist. They organized Kated, Inc., equipped an elaborate office and went into business. There are more than one hundred persons on their staff, including a cameraman who records the mixed activities of the organization.

The corporation is an important factor in the theatrical- and radio-booking business. The company's backbone, of course, is Kate. But it controls the professional actions of Jack Miller and his orchestra; Tony Gale, the pianist and arranger; Connie Gates, and a variety of other performers. And it owns the Celtics, the rambling basketball team.

Kate bought the club because it was good publicity, and she likes the game. Kate Smith's Celtics are known to every sports fan. However, they are about as Celtic as the Fighting Irish of Notre Dame, with such good Irish names as Dutch Dehnert and Joe Lapchick.

"The Celtics are breaking even now," Kate said. "They earn their way."

## Those Program Changes

IT USED to be a saying (modern opinion has rejected it) that the champion mind-changers are women, with their whimsical last-minute shifts of views and plans. Looked upon (again not by the world of today) as the "weaker sex," they were patronizingly excused by the males of the universe.

All that is different now. The medal for such instability is awarded by RADIO GUIDE to certain orchestral conductors who give out advance publication of their broadcast programs and then calmly change them at the eleventh hour, too late for this paper to let its readers know of the alterations. Recent glaring examples of such instances were the two NBC Saturday night orchestral concerts. When Bruno Walter popped up with music different from the original announcement, Music Hall (Sunday noon); and the Ford Hour, with amazed dialists finding themselves hearing Gieseking's piano-playing instead of the singing of Bidu Sayao. Only the last-named happening is pardonable, as the Brazilian soprano fell ill shortly before she was scheduled to go to the microphone.

So please, RADIO GUIDE readers, do not blame this department for erring; and please, conductors, do not make us err. Emerson once advanced the peculiar philosophy that inconsistency is a gem; the writers of this page look upon it as just paste.

## Orchestral Opportunity

What the Metropolitan is doing with its "Opera Auditions of the Air" might well be imitated by our major symphony orchestras with the purpose of discovering new concert talent in the ranks of the younger soloists. Something of the sort was tried laudably by the Rising Musical Star broadcasts last season, but the reward for the winners were two money prizes and some appearances with the none too good orchestra of the program, which did not mean the kind of prestige that young artists could gain if they were to perform with the regular major symphonic organizations of this country.

Audiences might be getting a bit tired of hearing the same "glamor" soloists doing the same compositions year after year. In time they will be succeeded by the young artists. Why not feature them now?

THE New York Philharmonic already has its composers' contest—highly successful, too—but the Philadelphia and Boston Orchestras, at present regrettably not on the air, might well be in radio again with the novel idea of seeking new soloists for their concerts. The best of the budding talents play with more feeling and pep than

the ancients, and a number of youthful singers have fresher and lovelier voices than the worn ones of the celebrated oldsters.

Cimarosa (1749-1801), composer of innumerable operas, mostly comic, was in his day considered the equal of Mozart. And now? Well, time flies and with it also musical reputations. Only Cimarosa's "The Secret Marriage" makes very occasional appearances these days on operatic stages. Its overture is tuneful and bubbly.

Favorite Tibbett is an opera singer who believes that concert is not the best medium for the display of arias and dramatic recitatives. Also, unlike most of his operatic colleagues, he has been sufficient of a student to acquire a large repertoire of art songs and ballads, some of which he interprets on this program, and confines himself to only one selection from opera. That number, however, he knows how to make eloquent, even to an unseen audience, and without costume and gesturings. The full title of the "Rigoletto" aria is "Corigiani, vil razza dannata" (Vile Race of Courtiers). The heartbroken jester makes his plea to the nobles for the restoration of his abducted daughter, but is mocked by them until they retire before the intensity of his denunciations.

Twice today there are appropriate Good Friday performances of the great "German Requiem" by Brahms. Its title derives from the fact that its text is not the usual Latin, but German; and also, the composer wished to make it clear that his work is not so much a religious service as a lament to console mourners, with assurance of joys hereafter, warnings against the pomps and vanities of the world, and emphasis of the victory of the saints over death and the grave. The words are selected from various scattered pages of Luther's translation of the Bible. The music has added human interest and personal touch because Brahms wrote it in memory of his mother, who passed away in 1865. (The "Requiem" had its premiere two years later in Vienna.)

There are seven numbers—two baritone solos and chorus, soprano solo and

chorus, and four separate choruses. After the opening massed voices, follows a funeral march. The fifth section ("Ye now are sorrowful, grieve not") is my favorite for melody, and the sixth impresses me next, with its portrayal of the Resurrection, climaxing in fugal passages of tremendous power. The "Requiem" properly ends in deeply serious but lovingly tender mood.

# Something About Suites

By Leonard Liebbling

PERHAPS this essay should have come before the ones on the symphony and the symphonic poem, for the suite (which the Germans call "Partita") antedated those forms of compositions by a considerable time. However, strict historical order is not being observed in the present series, which follows the method of disposing first of the longer kinds of works and then making the writing and reading gradually easier by working down to the briefer and briefest examples for orchestra. The same plan will be fol- lowed in our discussions of chamber music and solo instrumental pieces.

Purcell, Corelli, Handel and Bach were among the earliest practitioners in the fashioning of suites. Generally speaking, their suites comprise several movements loosely strung together and unrelated except as to contrasts in rhythm and mood. That was simple enough to do, as the movements were dances, slow and fast, dignified and gay, and of course in varying time meters.

Some of the dances—now all obso- lete—found in the pre-classical and classical suites of Germany, France, Italy and Spain, were the allemande, courante, sarabande, gavotte, forlane, minuet, bouree, rondo, polonaise, badi- nerie, loure, gigue, passepied, cha- conne passacaglia, rigaudon, musette, pavane, etc. Those names in them- selves bring pensive and fragrant sug- gestions of a long-faded past. Each of the romantically named dances has a history of its own. To dwell on only one, by the middle of the sixteenth century the Spanish pavane, or "Pea- cock," dance had become established as a sort of proud series of steps, the performer strutting about, suggesting with mantle and dagger the spread of the peacock's tail.

The suites of the aforementioned composers nearly always had a first movement not in dance form and called introduction or overture. When the giants Haydn and Mozart appeared during the full flush of the classical period, they developed the suite into the symphony, and Beethoven carried the evolution still further. The former two dropped all the dance movements except the minuet, and the towering Beethoven discarded even that, sub- stituting the scherzo instead.

Along came the era of "program" music, and composers qualified the word "suite" with descriptive titles, sometimes merely a generic adjective denoting the character of the opus as a whole, or else applying a separate name for each movement, the com- plete score telling a connected story or setting forth its main episodes. "Romantic Suite" and "Scheherazade" are illustrative examples.

Opera composers early learned to introduce their stage music to concert audiences by making suites of the best melodies and numbers; and sometimes,

when those creators neglected to do so, their contemporaries or successors compiled such potpourri arrangements. Twentieth-century composers have furnished many suites factured from the operas and other works of the masters of long ago, like Purcell, Rameau, Couperin, Monteverdi and others. Strauss, Stravinsky, Respighi have given us delightful specimens of that kind.

Ballets, too, frequently find them- selves transcribed into suites, although as a rule such music is more effective when accompanied by the action and pantomime for which it was originally written. Striking exceptions are the modern "Firebird" and "Petrouchka" (Stravinsky), "The Three-Cornered Hat" and "El Amor Brujo" (De Falla), "Daphnis and Chloe" and "Mother Goose" (Ravel), "The Nutcracker" (Tchaikowsky). The last-named com- poser also wrote three straight suites, unstoried, with movements called sim- ply introduction, scherzo, andante, fugue, divertimento, intermezzo, march, valse, theme and variations, etc.; and did a suite of selected Mozart music which he called "Mozartiana."

Of operatic suites, the most fre- quently heard consist of "best sellers" from "Carmen" and "Faust" (its ballet music has been "suited" too), and the most popular ballet music for many years was Delibes' "Sylvia," whose chief successors today are perhaps those piquant collections, the "Polo- vetsian Dances" from Borodin's opera, "Prince Igor," and the "Nutcracker" by Tchaikowsky. Wide vogue fell also to the ballet music of Saint-Saens' "Samson and Delilah" and "Henry VIII," and Rubinstein's "Feramors." Of more ancient flavor but no less ap- peal are the excerpts from Rameau's "Castor and Pollux" and Gluck's "Al- ceste." The best-known modern French suites are Charpentier's "Impressions of Italy"; Debussy's "Iberia," "Noc- turnes," "Petite Suite," "Children's Corner"; Bizet's "L'Arlesienne," and Massenet's "Scenes Pittoresques."

Incidental music to plays figures ex- tensively as suites for concert per- formance. Best loved of all are the two "Peer Gynt" settings and Mendels- sohn's "Midsummer Night's Dream." Grieg, too, paid tribute to "auld lang syne" with his "From Holberg's Time," a suite utilizing the old classical dance forms. In that category, the specially crowned masterpieces are the suites by Bach. Quite alone stands the won- derful score by Ravel, which he con- trived by orchestrating the set of piano pieces by Moussorgsky known as "Pictures At An Exhibition."

Leading suites by American com- posers are the "Perambulator," by John Alden Carpenter, and "Through the Looking Glass," by Deems Taylor.

Our next contemplation will be or- chestral rhapsodies, overtures, fanta- sias, marches and other short forms.

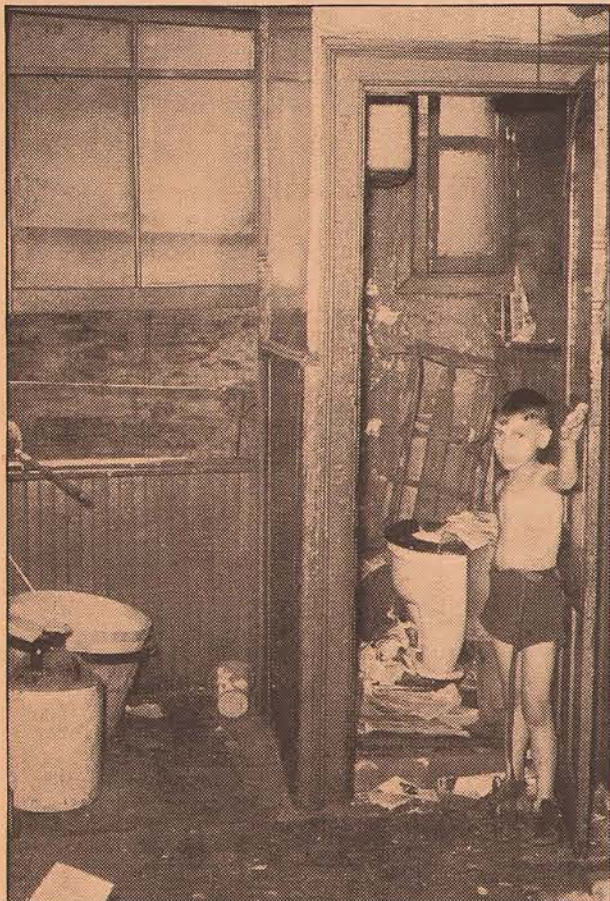

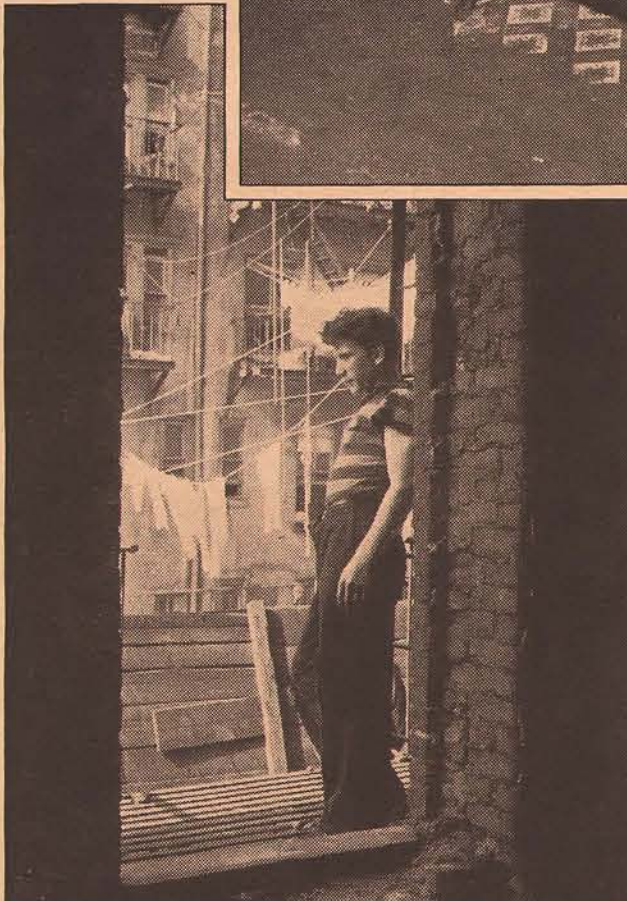

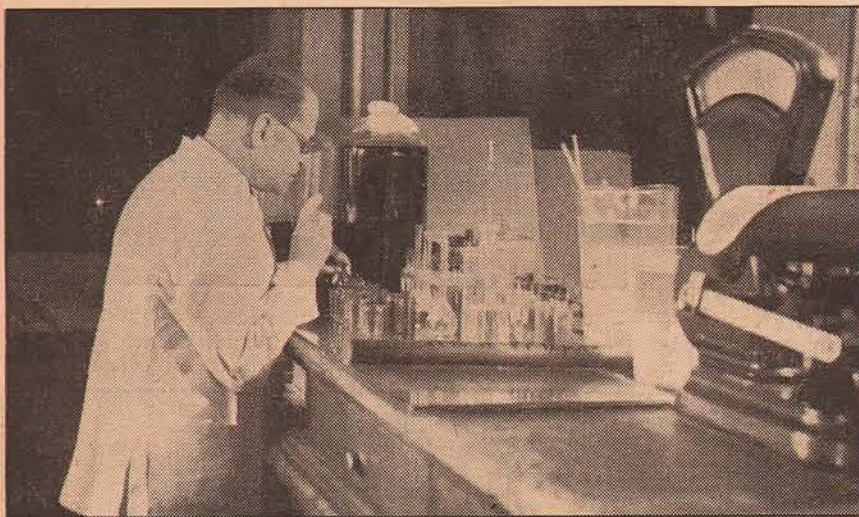

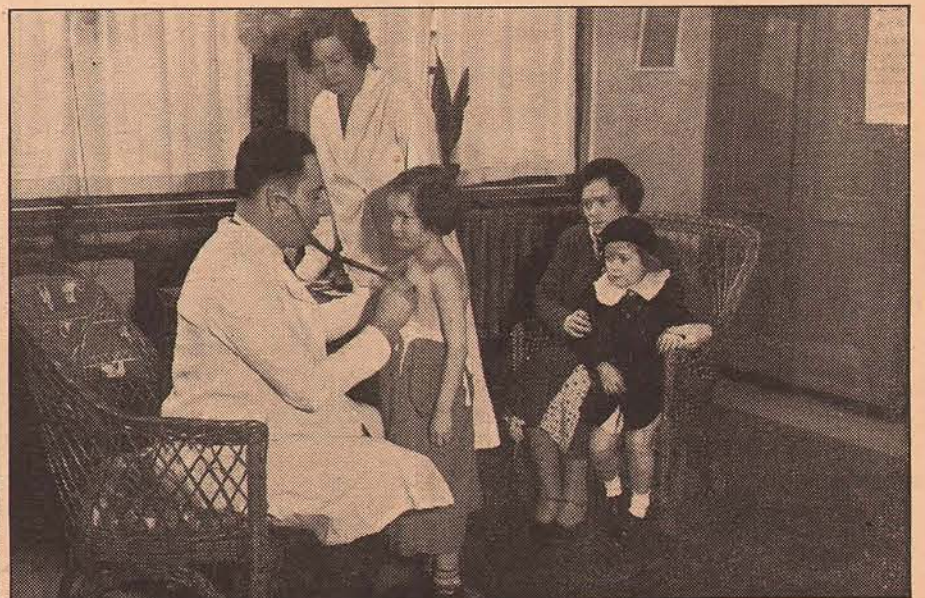

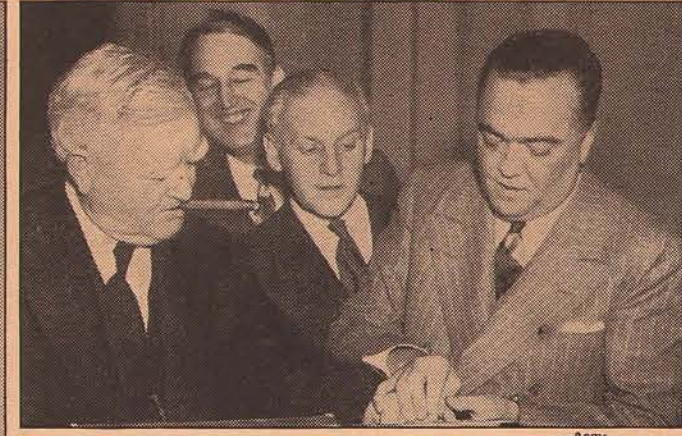
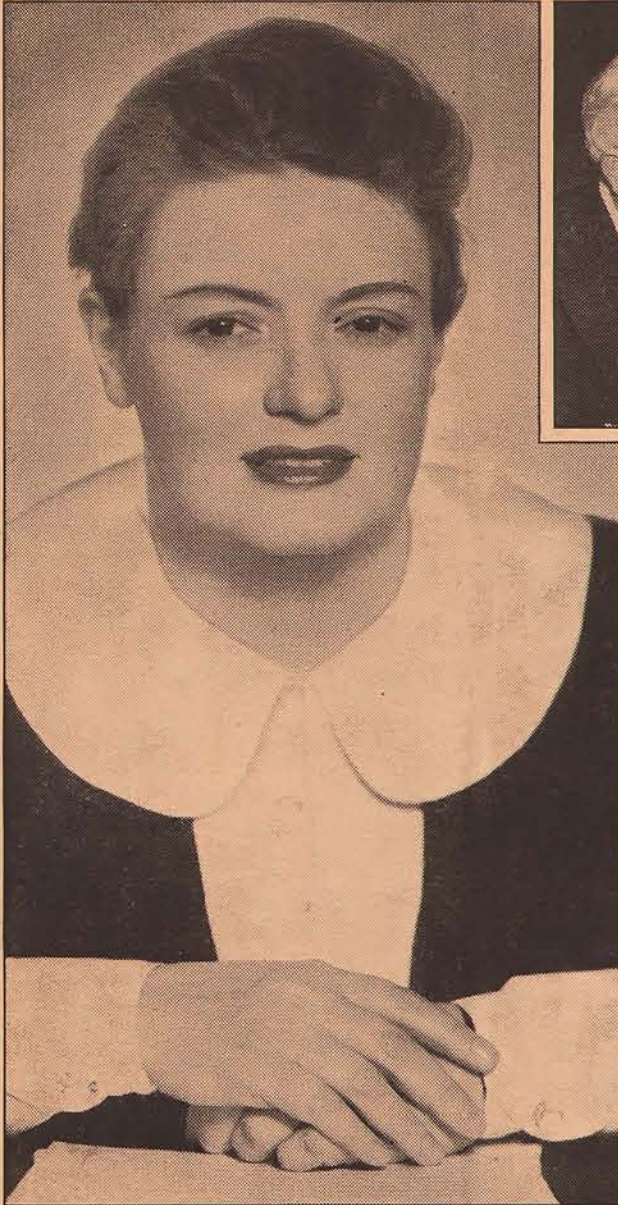

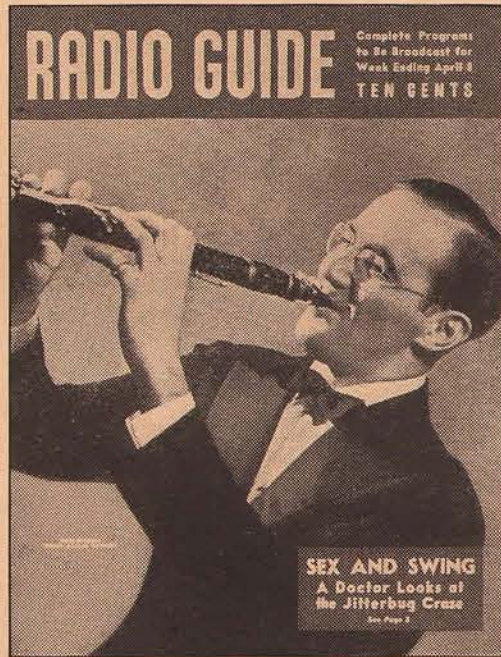

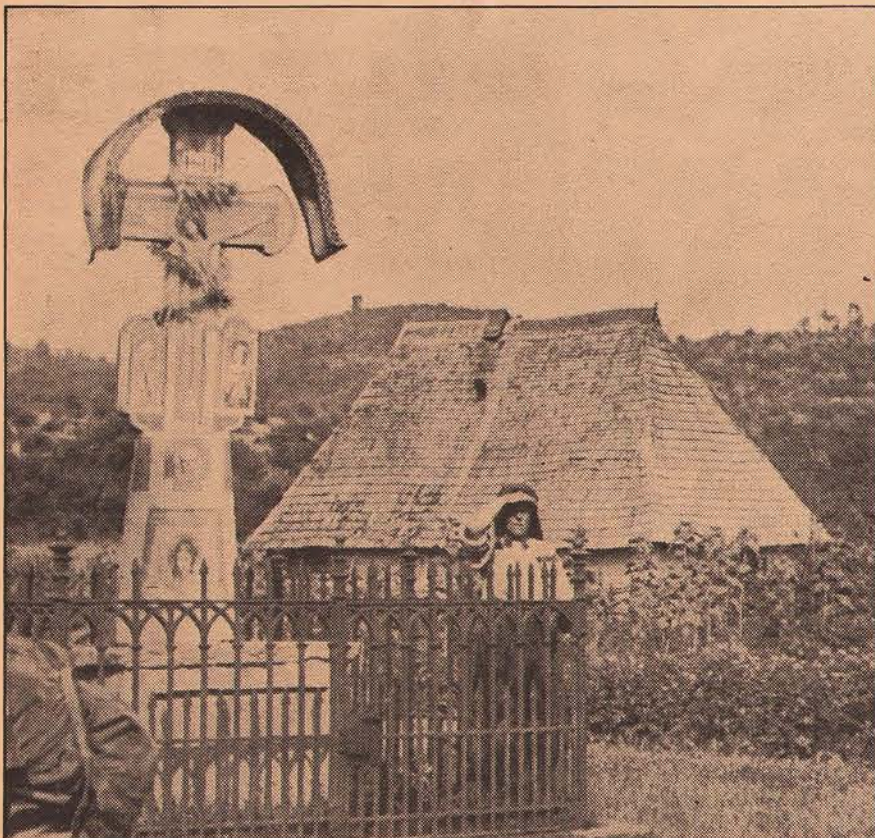

Popped in on the Ben Bernie rehearsal Sunday morning at CBS Radio Theater No. 2 just in time to have a container of coffee with the lads. Rehearsal hadn't started yet, and the first thing they always do is collect dimes and send the page-boy out for the morning java. But the trumpet-player startled everyone this Sunday by asking for milk. Finally Bernie said, "Let's get going," and the lads put down their coffee-containers and went to work.

# HOLLYWOOD SHOWDOWN

CHICAGO.—Have you ever thumbed through your mail, casually opened an unassuming-looking envelope, unfolded the enclosed letter—and found yourself face to face with one of life's highspots in emotional experience?

I did that a few weeks ago, and I'm going to depart from usual procedure to devote a big space in my column to passing that experience on to you. I could write a sermon ten times as long as that letter—and not accomplish one-tenth the effect. It is a rare document as a lesson in life and a fine sidelight on radio. The letter was *not* written as a publicity stunt. It is a personal message from a friend, and, contrary to the popular conception of a columnist's sacrifice-anything-for-a-scoop methods, I am publishing it in part only after obtaining the writer's reluctant permission. The letter speaks for itself and you know the writer as one of the real pioneers of radio entertainment.

"Dear Don:

"I admit I have been in hiding the past eight months, but I like it, for I have three more violins to my credit, and, if they are as good as professional musicians say they are, they will outlive me and my radio work by many, many years. It is difficult for most people to understand how a person could leave New York and bury himself here in a small town—in a barn, for that is my workshop. But when I tell you that since I was a kid of ten I have not enjoyed life more, you will understand why I am not tearing my hair over sponsors, continuity, announcers and all those things that continually harass a radio performer. For nearly fourteen years I have been dashing in and out of studios, up elevators and down, through revolving doors, into subways—always in a hurry to get somewhere, and, of course, always worrying that I would not be on time.

"Today I make violins as I please. No customer is shouting. No announcer is checking me with a stop-watch. I go along as I please, and I am pleasing myself. I read, build model houses, and, best of all, I am taking an active interest in a Little Theater group which we started here. Last night we did 'Ah, Wilderness,' and I was Daddy Nat Miller. We have been urged to take the show on the road by many people, but I know what would happen to the kick I get out of it if we did that.

"I suppose you are wondering how long this is going on and whether I can stand being away from the temptation of the lights. I can, and will do so until next fall, at least.

"You see, my 'fran,' I have worked myself into believing my own philosophy and trying to live it. I know many, many radio philosophers, poets, preachers and advice-peddlers, but not many of them live up to their preaching by a long-shot. I wondered if the listeners were really right when they used to write to me and say that I had the correct ideas—and the only way I could find out was to try it. I couldn't see how I could live in a hotel on a busy street, with all the comforts of a prince, and go on the air telling people there was nothing to all this popularity stuff, that money wasn't the root of happiness, that ease and luxury were nothing. If I believed that, I would have to live according to my talk, or I'd just be another shouter of nonsense. So I dropped everything and am trying it all out. I find I can live in a barn. I can live on fifty cents a day. I can find so much real happiness working at the things I love to do that I would no more choose for myself the stupid hurrying life of New York than I would deliberately catch a disease.

"I am still publishing my beloved Scrap Book. (For those of you who have inquired of this column where they might obtain copies, they are published by Reilly & Lee Co., 325 W. Huron St., Chicago, Ill.—D. M.) Of course, I may again go on the air. But if I do, I'll do so because I feel I have some kind of philosophy that will help out some poor devil trying to find a bit of happiness in this world.

"I think I am just beginning to understand such a philosophy.

Thanks to the "man in the house by the side of the road" for the finest lesson in living he ever put out, this time without a script and a mike. Keep fiddling in the same key, Tony. You've got your fingers on the strings of true harmony.

# THE RADIO PLAYBILL: THIS WEEK—"THE ALDRICH FAMILY"

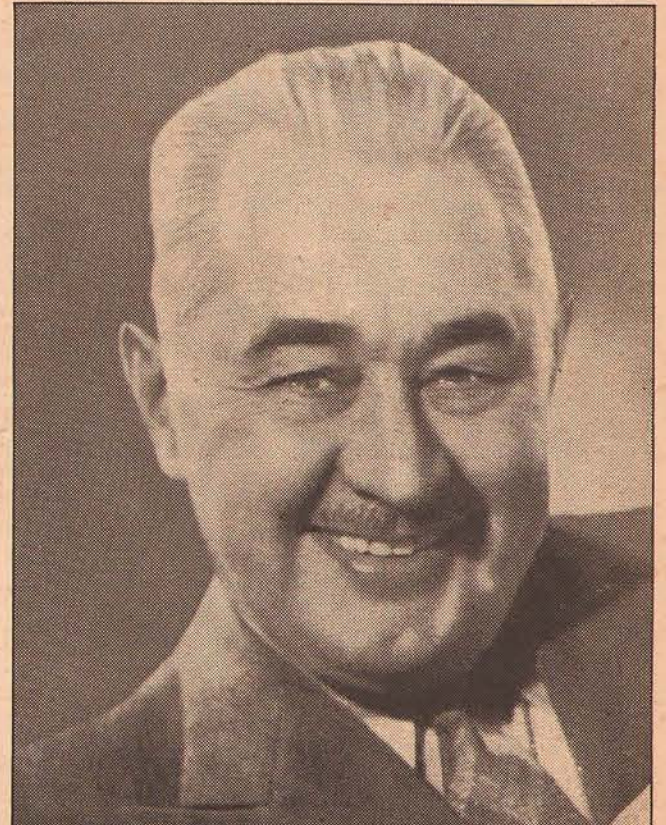


**HENRY ALDRICH** is an irrepressible youngster of seventeen, in love or in trouble or both most of the time. His flexible imagination and his tendency to stretch it into mild falsifications lead to most of his difficulties. Of course, there is very often a girl involved in the situation, and the money problem is always prominent. He's a source of mental anguish to his father and of suppressed amusement to his mother. The role of Henry Aldrich is played by 20-year-old Broadway star and dramatic art director Ezra Stone

**MARY ALDRICH** is Henry's teen-age sister. She too has her romances. In her dealings with her brother she assumes a superior attitude extremely provoking to Henry. Not far removed from doll days, Mary still retains a bit of a tattle-tale tendency. She revels in Henry's discomfort, especially if she has been instrumental in bringing it on. It's an armed truce between the two except in rare cases. The role is played by Betty Field, who, though in her early twenties, has several Broadway shows to her credit



**LIFE** as you've found it, wept with it and, especially, laughed at it—that's the theme of "The Aldrich Family." Sam Aldrich has a wife, Alice, who understands and adores him; a daughter, Mary, who wraps him around her finger with sub-deb dexterity, and a son, Henry, who, like most high-school boys, looks upon Dad as a source from which blessings flow if it can be tapped. This is an outstanding sketch, because it mirrors for you the foibles and whimsies of family life without a grain of real, disturbing sorrow. It's in something of the same class as "Vic and Sade." The chief character is Henry, and he is a character. The plot usually revolves around his normal but often unique youthful tendencies, especially his propensity for getting into trouble and into his parents' hair. ## Person-to-Person

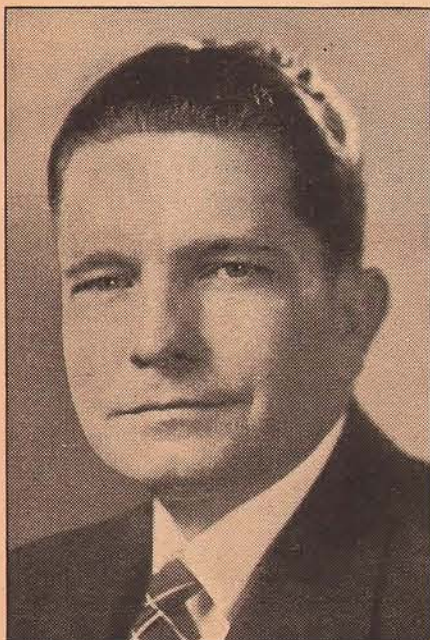
● Cited as the outstanding conference on utilization of radio in the classroom was the meeting sponsored in Chicago last November by the Radio Council of Chicago's Board of Education. The proceedings of this three-day confab have been edited and are ready for distribution. As a comprehensive review of the latest developments in and the best practical uses of radio in the classroom as illustrated at this conference, a copy of this report should be read by every educator in the country and may be had by sending a quarter to the Radio Council, Chicago Board of Education, Chicago, Illinois.

● Within the last two years four new radio courses have been added to the curriculum at the State College of Washington to meet the growing demand for specialized training in this field. Now comes the first summer radio workshop ever to be held at this school. The course will run from July 19 to August 11, and, slanted at the needs of instructors in colleges and high schools who have or are likely to be faced with the problem of planning and directing broadcasts, will present an opportunity for full-time study of script-writing, production, management techniques and the engineering side of radio. In addition, the plans include the preparation and presentation by members of the class of several broadcasts over the college's own station, KWSC, which will be operated for more hours this coming summer than ever before in its history.

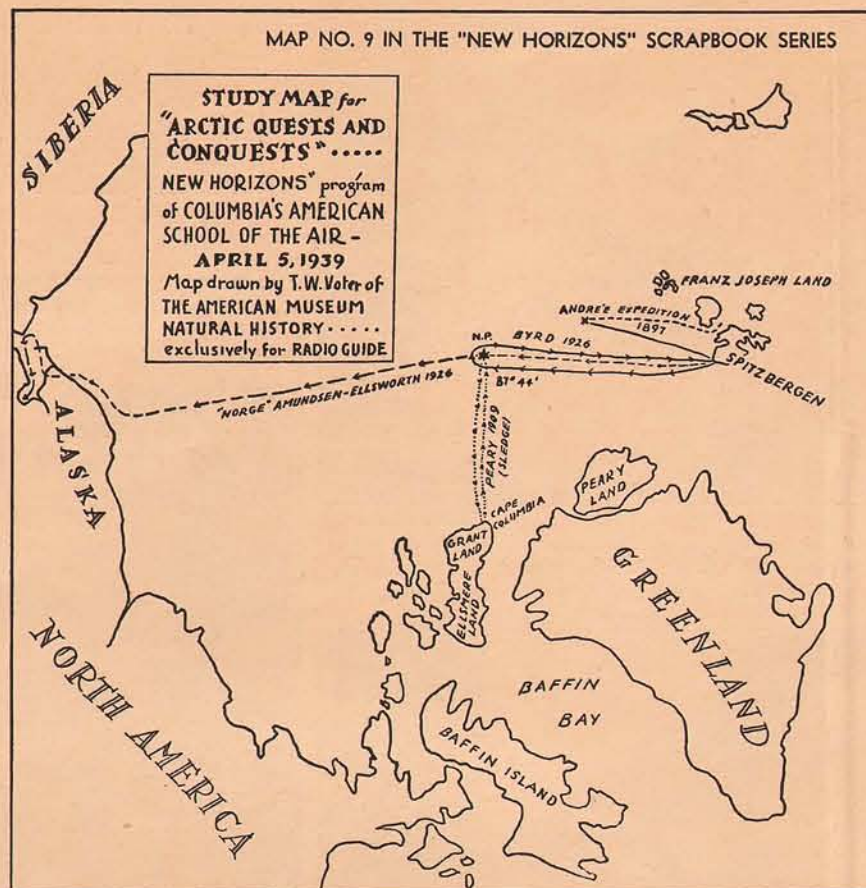
● First big radio-education meeting of 1939 will be the Tenth Institute for Education by Radio in Columbus, Ohio, home of Ohio State University and the school-broadcast evaluation experts—Tyler, Wrightstone and O'Steen. This session undoubtedly will attract more radio-education mentors than any other similar event of the year.—J. H.

## "Arctic Quest and Conquest"

**F**OR nearly four centuries the quest of the North Pole fired the imagination of adventurous, ambitious and hardy explorers of many nations. By boat, by sled, by balloon, by plane, by dirigibles, even by submarine, men flung themselves against the hazards and hardships of the frozen north. It was not until Admiral Peary discovered the Pole in 1909 that the race was won. During the thirty years that have passed since that achievement other explorers have made important contributions toward increasing the great mass of polar data.

For a long time it was thought that there was land at the North Pole and that regular continental trade routes might be flung across the arctic seas. Such routes, it has been proved, are not feasible by ships, but with airplanes and dirigibles this dream may be realized.

In discussing "Arctic Quest and Conquest," Dr. Vilhjalmur Stefansson, foremost living authority on arctic exploration, will give interesting and pertinent facts about the vast opportunities to be found within the Arctic Circle.

Captain Bob Bartlett, whose superb seamanship and dauntless courage brought Admiral Peary's ship safely through the polar ice, will recount his thrilling adventures with Peary and other explorations in the arctic seas.

Mr. William Van Dusen, a pioneer in the development of trans-oceanic airlines, will describe the progress of Alaskan airways and commercial trans-polar aviation.

"Arctic Quest and Conquest" is the title of the April 5 broadcast of the "New Horizons" series, under the auspices of Columbia's American School of the Air and the American Museum of Natural History, with Dr. Roy Chapman Andrews as host and commentator. Time: 2:30-3 p.m. EST; 1:30-2 CST; 12:30-1 MST; 11:30 a.m.-12 noon PST.

## "In Cooperation With—"

In presenting educational programs, do broadcasters assume the responsibility of deciding what is educational subject-matter and what is not? Thank heaven, skeptics don't have them out on a limb with that question: broadcasters are neither that brave nor that foolish. Let's look at a few of the outstanding network programs that may be classed as educational: *The World Is Yours*, presented in cooperation with the U. S. Office of Education and the Smithsonian Institution; *New Horizons*, presented in cooperation with the American Museum of Natural History; *Our American Schools*, presented in cooperation with the National Education Association; *Your Health*, presented in cooperation with the Ameri-

can Medical Association.

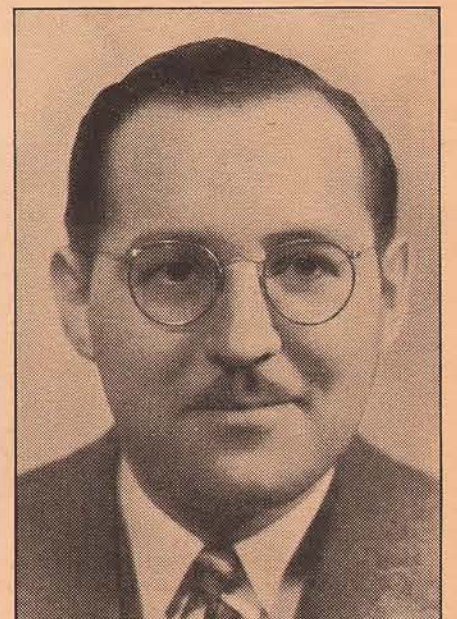
These are only a few examples of how educational institutions are working hand in hand with broadcasters to serve public interest, convenience and necessity. Although this union was a strained one in the early days of radio, when neither knew the power or the peculiarities of this new communications medium, both educators and broadcasters soon realized that only through cooperation could the problem of education by radio be solved and the responsibility to the public be met. Educational programs are presented today—both local and network programs—through the cooperation of outstanding educational institutions and civic service organizations.

## Cleveland's Experiment

Before the possibilities of radio as an aid to educators are fully realized, many questions, unanswered today, must be decided. One of the most pertinent at the present time is, Should radio participate in the direction of teaching in the classroom? Current popular opinion among educators is "No." There are those, however, who maintain that it is a possibility deserving attention, and as such should be given the full benefit of comprehensive experiment. Outstanding proponent of this viewpoint is the Cleveland Board of Education, which—armed with a money grant from the General Education Board—is exploring the field, using the facilities of a school-owned, school-operated radio station. Cleveland's radio-educators are giving this question fair trial to prove itself practical or otherwise, which, after all, is the wisest procedure for settling differences of opinion and testing opposing theories.

The Cleveland Board of Education was the first school system to use the special ultra-high-frequency band which the Federal Communications Commission made available to recognized educational agencies. Although the Cleveland station, WBOE, has been in operation for only six months, some of the advantages of the school station-to-classroom teaching are already evident: (1) provides silent periods to give time for pupil activity or work, and for pupil-teacher reaction, (2) provides sufficient time to permit the presentation of a variety of radio lessons, (3) permits the radio schedule to be adjusted to the school schedules, (4) permits the length of the lesson to be adjusted to the needs and capacities of the learner.

The directors of the Cleveland plan—Superintendent Lake, Assistant Superintendent Buckley, Director of Radio Activities William B. Levenson—are giving their theory every chance to prove its merit. Every detail is administered with clock-like precision, every phase of the work is perfected to an unbelievable degree. If the plan does not prove feasible, it shouldn't be said that they didn't give it a chance. Radio will assume its rightful place in education when thorough experimentation points out the way.

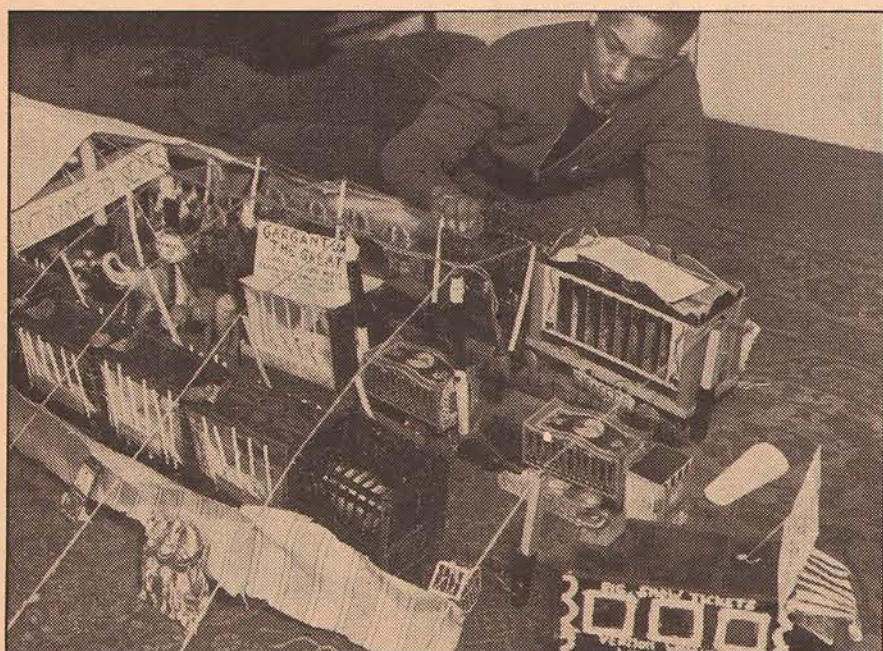

heaped on her. She sang with Leopold Stokowski conducting. She has been honored by the Red Cross and many organizations of charity. Out in Texas, where men are men and women used to be governors, former Governor "Ma" Ferguson made her a Texas Ranger and the Sioux Indians accepted her in their tribe with the name of Hum'b-o-goo-win-ga, which means "glory of the morn."

In 1936, she won RADIO GUIDE'S Medal of Merit.

She has averaged a broadcast a day and has missed but one assignment because of illness. She has forty-eight plaques and loving-cups in her office and is a top-flight sportswoman. Her golf is excellent and she swims well. Usually, she vacations at Lake Placid and goes for motor-boating in summer and bob-sledding in winter.

She is a doodler and draws funny figures while she talks.

**S**HE has written lyrics to Rachmaninoff's "Prelude in C Sharp Minor."

She is such a home body that she has moved once since 1931, and then across the street. She lives, when in New York, in middle Manhattan. It's on Park Avenue but is not a hoity-toity place. Her apartment is tiny and she lives alone, with double safety locks on the doors. She employs a maid, but the maid doesn't stay in.

Her home consists of a living-room, a small reception-room, a bedroom, a tiny kitchen and a bath. The living-room follows no particular style of decorating. Kate did it herself, and it's in excellent taste but has no pattern. That's the way she likes it, and that's how it is. All who don't like it can lump it!

There is a fireplace. The drapes are dark blue, faced with beige. The walls are blue. The book shelves are recessed in the walls. There is a large phonograph, given her by Collins, and a grand piano. The lamps are Chinese rose jade with beige silk shades. The couches are blue and beige. There is a custom-built secretary, done in antique green with flowers and birds painted on it. There are many chairs and lots of pillows and dolls stuck here and there.

Her bedroom is green and rose, with a rose taupe broadloom carpet. There is one large bed and a large dressing-table, which contains more than four hundred bottles of perfume, many unopened. Her favorite perfume is Christmas Night.

There is a large divan in the bedroom and there are china dogs and cats stuck around in odd places. Venetian blinds are at the window. Pictures in the bedroom look as though they had been cut from one of the house, garden or arty magazines and framed. Most of the pictures are of flowers.

Her kitchen is small and done in red and gray. And there are lots of electrical gadgets around.

She has been associated with food, and, naturally, lots of the stuff you read about her cooking is publicity ballyhoo. She works for food companies and naturally she often is photographed in her kitchen, with the products she plugs to the fore.

But she really can cook. That's no publicity gag. And she likes it. She can beat a mean cake, boys, and she enjoys eating it. Dolly, her maid, keeps the apartment spotless. Kate also has a home at Placid.

Many are amazed to discover Miss Smith, rich and all, lives in such a plain

place. She doesn't need a large place. She never entertains lavishly. She seldom goes out and is usually in bed by 1 a.m., except on Thursdays, when her repeat broadcasts keep her up later. On Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, when she broadcasts at noon, she gets up early. But she sleeps late on Fridays.

Her clothes are made to order but she specifies the designs. Her evening gowns are numerous and expensive, most of them of solid color. She keeps most of them at her studio, Columbia Playhouse No. 2 on West Forty-fifth Street. She is one of the few, if not the only radio artist who has her own studio dressing-room.

At home, she wears washable dresses, but her evening gowns are made by one of the most exclusive dressmakers in New York. She has a set of expensive silver-fox furs, a sable coat and lots of hand-bags and chiffon handkerchiefs.

In her dressing-room is all the equipment she needs, including a stove on which her meals are cooked when she spends the day at the theater. Her personal maid attends her there. She bathes after each rehearsal because she perspires easily.

She takes great pride in her manner of dress and toilet.

She advises large women not to worry about their weight and never to feel inferior. She is opposed to Spartan methods of dieting.

"But be well groomed," she said. "Keep immaculate. It took me quite a while to realize how important looks can be. When I came to New York, I had no illusions about my appearance. I was healthy and big. I was near-sighted and I wore glasses for reading." (She still does.)

One day in a department store she saw a woman who was stunning, although stout.

"That taught me something. I bought new dresses and had them fitted carefully. I got facials and had my hair dressed often. I read fashion magazines and talked with authorities about styles. One expert told me to wear white. I protested that I was too large to wear white, but the modiste told me that was a complex stout persons had; that white really would become them.

"Next to good grooming is good posture. Even a large person can carry herself well."

Every Thursday morning she has her hair and nails done. She does her own make-up. A few have criticized her dress, contending she goes overboard on big flowers, real and artificial. Some folks say big flowers make a woman look bigger.

**H**ER social life centers around a handful of persons: Mr. and Mrs. Ted Collins and their little girl; her mother; her maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Franklin Hanby of Maryland; Jane Tompkins of Kated, Inc.; Jack Miller, and a few other members of her organization. The only radio actress who is at all close to her is Betty Garde.

She was seen recently with Miss Tompkins at "The American Way," a smasher and flag-waving show. But she visibly was annoyed. People kept staring at her and whispering.

After the show, she went to a fountain and had a double chocolate soda.

"I have never advocated a rigid diet," she said. "I like good food and plenty of it. For breakfast I have fruit or tomato juice, as much coffee as I want with cream and sugar, and maybe a roll. My lunch usually is two apples.

But at dinner I enjoy a good, thick steak, plenty of fresh vegetables, a salad and often chocolate cake.

"My idea of exercising is more fun than dieting. I swim almost every day during the summer. I'm wild about football and basketball. I dance, play tennis, skate, do anything I want."

She goes to Washington as often as she can to see her family and friends. Recently she and Collins were due in Washington. She is privileged to use the President's entrance to the home-town station, and when she boarded the train in New York she discovered Ted had missed it.

"I wired Washington from the train that we would be an hour late," she said. "I knew a crowd would be at the station and I didn't want to arrive without Ted. I knew Ted would be on the next train. But when I got to Washington the trouble started. You just try to hide a girl as big as I am in the Washington station. Mr. Marks, the station-master, finally took me across the tracks and hid me in a caboose. I stayed there for an hour, until Ted arrived."

She and Collins have a lot of fun broadcasting. "Ted was doing a commercial recently," she recalled. "He was to tell about raspberry cake. He pronounced it 'wasberry' but tried to cover up. Then he made the mistake of looking at me. I had to grin and Ted burst right out laughing in the mike. He managed to say, 'Let Kate tell you about it.' I had to do all the commercials that night. We called him 'Wasberry' for weeks.

"I think my greatest thrills were the day I sang for those Blue Devils in Washington when I was a kid, and the night I sang to 22,000 people in Madison Square Garden."

**S**HE is very considerate of her fellow workers, but she is a hard taskmaster. Most persons don't know, but she doesn't read a note of music and depends entirely on ear and phonetics. Hence, she cannot explain to another musician exactly what she wants. She has to wait until he plays it just like she knows she wants it, but she can't tell him how that is.

Consequently, she gets peevish at times and gives the musicians a going-over. Then she'll make up for it by doing something nice for the fellows.

Her money is invested wisely. Collins handles all her business. She is not shrewd about money matters.

She amazed Hollywood, and claims Hollywood amazed her. Her road company, "Swanee Revue," had clicked all over the nation and she was a natural for the box-office, and was asked to Hollywood to make "Hello, Everybody." They made a big to-do over her. She spent much of her time getting autographs from actors and actresses who would have given much to be in her shoes.

Her picture was not a whiz. Neither did it flop. It was one of those strange things that flopped in the big houses and cleaned up in the neighborhood houses. The studio apparently made the mistake of building the show around Miss Smith. Most critics agree it would have been better to have let Kate have a few choice spots in the show, sing a bit and not be the central character.

It generally is conceded she would like another crack at Hollywood.

She has four automobiles, all at Lake Placid. She enjoys driving herself. She has a cocker spaniel named Freckles, given her by Betty Garde. She has a cat named Mittsy and some live turtles.

**A**FTER a brief vacation from the ether lanes, following the fall of Czechoslovakia as an independent country, OLR4A (11.84) was again on the air Sunday night, March 19, broadcasting its usual program to North America. The station identification was given as simply "OLR, Prague," even the announcer seeming in doubt as to the country. Tentatively the following schedule is in effect: Over OLR5A (15.23), directed to the Far East, 4:55 to 8:15 a.m.; over OLR4B (11.76), weekdays, directed to the Near East, 8:25 to 10:05 a.m.; over OLR4A (11.84), daily, directed to Africa, 12:45 to 4:50 p.m., directed to South America, 4:55 to 6:30 p.m., directed to North America, 7:55 to 10:20 p.m. and directed to Central America, 10:20 to 11:20 p.m. EST.

The new Irish short-wave station at Athlone has been testing on a frequency of 9.595 megas, almost daily from 4 until 5 or 6 p.m. EST. Experimental broadcasts on a frequency of 17.84 megas are still being heard mornings.

XGOY (9.5), the Central Broadcasting Station at Chungking, China, broadcasts daily from 6:15 to 8 a.m. EST, but good reception is available only from 7 a.m. when VK3ME (9.5), Melbourne, Australia, signs off, until XEWW (9.5), Mexico City, comes on the air at 7:45 a.m. EST. The programs consist of typical oriental music with announcements in Chinese and broken English . . . XMHA, the new short-wave station at Shanghai, may now be heard on a frequency of 11.94 megas, daily from approximately 5 to 11 a.m. EST . . . According to a letter from the Ministry of Communications, Chungking, China, received by Roger Legge of Binghamton, N. Y., the station on 11.38 megas, is XTS not XGRV.

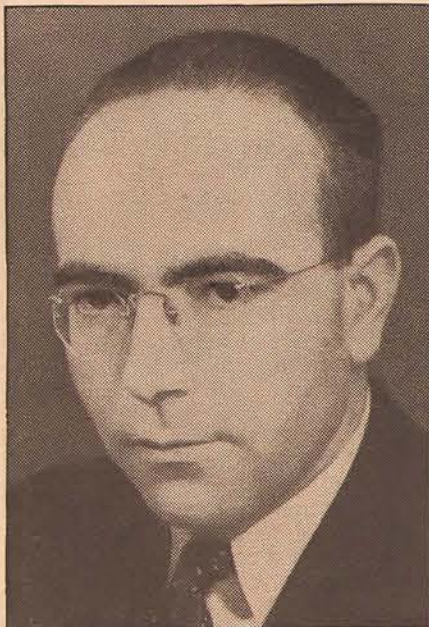

According to the Quixote Radio Club, CR6RC (11.74), Luanda, Angola, is said to be on the air Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 2 to 3:30 p.m. EST . . . California listeners report "Radio Tananarive" (9.69), Tananarive, Madagascar, is being heard daily from 10 to 11 a.m. EST . . . PSE (14.93), Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, is now broadcasting simultaneously with PSH of the same city, nightly from 6 to 7 p.m. EST . . . Charles Plotner of San Francisco, Calif., writes a new transmitter for "Radio Saigon" (6.116), Saigon, French Indo-China, was inaugurated on March 14. The station operates daily from 6:30 to 7 a.m. and from 11 to 11:30 p.m. EST . . . Attractive QSL cards are now available for all who report to All-India Radio Stations . . . ZAA, Tira, Albania, operates on 6.085 megas, almost daily from 1:30 to 7 p.m. EST. Occasional tests are still being conducted on a frequency of 7.85 megas . . . After a long absence, HCK (5.885), of Quito, Ecuador, is back on the air.

John Larsen of Geneva, N. Y., reports two new Latin broadcasters. YV4RQ (5.02) of Puerto Cabello, Venezuela, is broadcasting nightly to approximately 9:20 p.m. EST; HC2AB (9.188), "Radio Telegrapho," somewhere in Ecuador, signs off nightly at 10 p.m. EST. The latter station strikes twelve chimes, in series of threes, on the hour, as an interval signal.

The distribution of the Royal Maundy in Westminster Abbey, one of the most picturesque survivals of ancient British ceremonies, will be described on Maundy Thursday, April 6, at 6:45 a.m. EST, over Daventry stations GSF, GSG and GSJ. The Last Supper, when Christ gave His final injunctions to his disciples and set an example of humility by washing their feet, was the inspiration of the custom. Until after 1685 it was the custom for reigning British sovereigns to actually wash and kiss the feet of some fifty poor people in observance of the Maundy custom. Today the observance has become essentially one of alms-giving.

John Scott Trotter does some deft accompanying. Bing is also in the new Decca Victor Herbert album with two solos, two duets with Frances Langford. Florence George, who is soon to marry Bing's brother Everett, and Rudy Vallee also warble the Herbert songs. Also, keep eyes peeled for Bing's new picture tunes, reported the best score he has had in some time. (All Decca.)

**BOB CROSBY** does a full-bodied two-part job on "Diga Diga Do" for one of his newest, and an under-par job with the "Skaters' Waltz" and a thing called "Eyeopener." (Decca.)

**TOMMY DORSEY** is heard in "Hold Tight—Hold Tight," the whacky seafood mamma song that the Andrews Sisters introduced some weeks back. The Sisters still top all comers with this chanson. Turn the TD wax over and you get "Symphony in Riffs," a Benny Carter swinger. (Victor.)

**JIMMY DORSEY'S** latest six sides include such commercial tunes as "The Masquerade Is Over" and "Romance Runs in the Family," plus a very low-down reading of "Deep Purple." Score more good vocals by Bob Eberly. (Decca.)

**ARTIE SHAW** busts forth with a forgotten classic from the shelves of Broadway's show world, "Alone Together," from "Flying Colors." On the other side is "Rose Room," and played right well, at that. (Bluebird.)

**GLEN GRAY** swings the old-oaken-bucket song under the witty title "Hoboken Bucket." Get it? (Decca.)

**HARRY JAMES'** new band makes its bow on Brunswick this week, with much trumpet virtuosity from HJ on "Ciribiribin" . . . nothing much new on "Sweet Georgia Brown" and two commercial tunes with weak vocals. But it's always tough on new bands. Time will tell.

**COUNT BASIE** keeps his top rating for real swing with "The Blues I Like to Hear." (Decca.)

**THE ANDREWS SISTERS** return to the moderato division with "Begin the Beguine" and "Long Time No See." (Decca.)

**KIRSTEN FLAGSTAD**, ever magnificent, adds to her repertoire on wax two Richard Strauss songs, "Cacilie" and "E'er Since Thine Eye." Both as refreshing as a mountain stream. (Victor 1967. \$1.50.)

**MARIAN ANDERSON** alternates between German lieder and Negro spirituals on her record releases, and this month it is two spirituals. Both excellent choices, and sung with her usual perfection, of course. "I Can't Stay Away" and "Were You There?" Fine stuff. (Victor 1966. \$1.50.)

**LEOPOLD STOKOWSKI** takes the two placid and beautiful Gymnopedies by Erik Satie for a nugget among ten-inch symphonic records on the new Victor list. (1965. \$1.50.)

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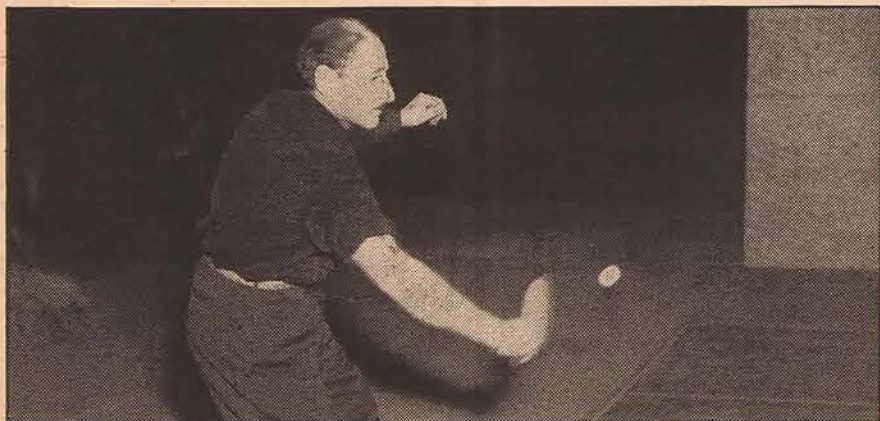

Then, while the Giant's music from "Das Rheingold" sounded loudly, he measured again. With music, he found, a man was twenty percent stronger.

During a six-day bicycle race at Madison Square Garden, another scientist made an experiment with and without music. He timed the bicyclists without music and found that they averaged eighteen and one-half miles per hour. Then he set the band to playing. The racers' speed picked up an additional mile per hour.

Now all of this has a direct bearing on sex and swing, as we shall see when we line up a few of the factors involved. Let's propound a few questions and seek their answers in the light of what we know music does to the body.

How does swing (jittermania) influence (1) posture, (2) consumption of alcoholic beverage, (3) self-consciousness, (4) physical well-being, (5) morals?

MY OWN answer would point out in summary that today's jitterbug dance demands that the dancer be athletic, and an athlete knows how (1) to stand and walk.

2. Alcohol is used as a stimulant ordinarily to work ourselves into an appropriate mood of pleasure and enjoyment; but since swing seems to do that job for jitterbugs, alcohol is not needed, and in fact becomes a liability since no one whose head is not clear can possibly do the jitter dances.

3. Jam sessions permit the most self-conscious girl or boy to lose himself in mob feeling. As one scholarly observer noted, "I have seen food riots and strikes, but I've never seen the mob mind working so beautifully. Note how they are all writhing in unison. Their screams are like the noise of excited goats."

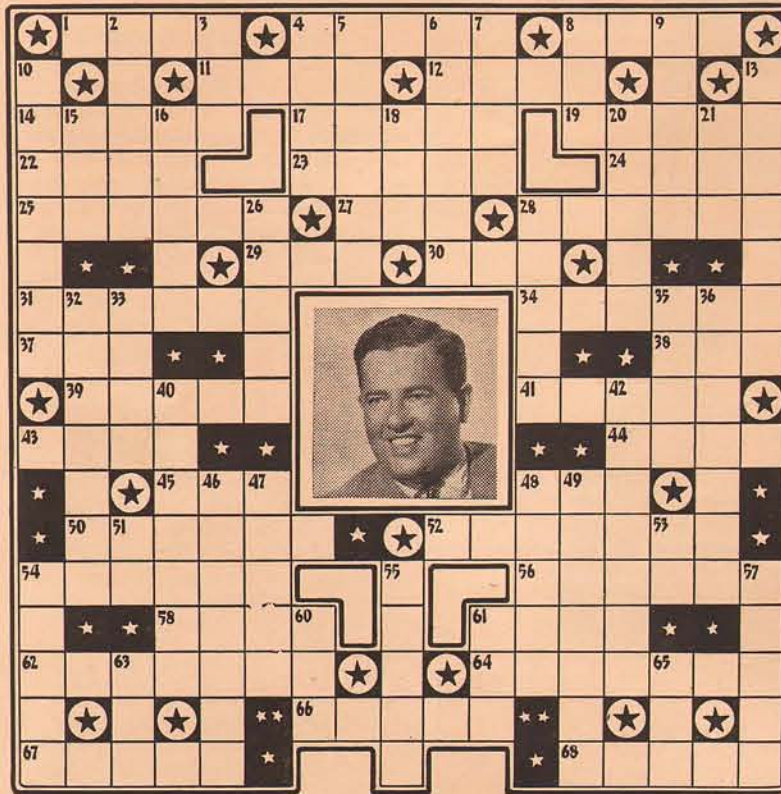
4. Their physical well-being is improved by the exercise unless the body is abused by too much exertion, and we know that music does give to them greater strength and energy, with less than usual fatigue, to enable them to stand what seems to us bystanders to be a prodigal and senseless expenditure of energy.

5. Morals. I ask you to go back to read the opening paragraphs of this article. I cited two statements from physicians against the dance, and two statements for it. But this one thing I did not tell you. I did not tell you that the two statements made against the dance were not made against today's athletic and strenuous jitterbug steps. They were made against a dance which the public has come to accept as beautiful and decorous and decent. Those statements were made twenty years ago about a sweet little dance called the Tango.

NO, I don't see much wrong with allowing boys and girls to get together in the energy-using romp that is called dancing today. What if they do sound like excited goats, what if they do clap and stomp and show their legs in cartwheel gyrations that are unorthodox to us older folk? They are healthy, and swing is helping them to stay that way.

One further thought: It occurs to me that I've never seen a modern girl dancing who was not properly and healthily clothed for whatever attitude into which her partner might swing her. In short, standard jitterbug equipment seems to be a pair of panties. Unfortunately, that's more than I can say for some of the ladies of my own generation.

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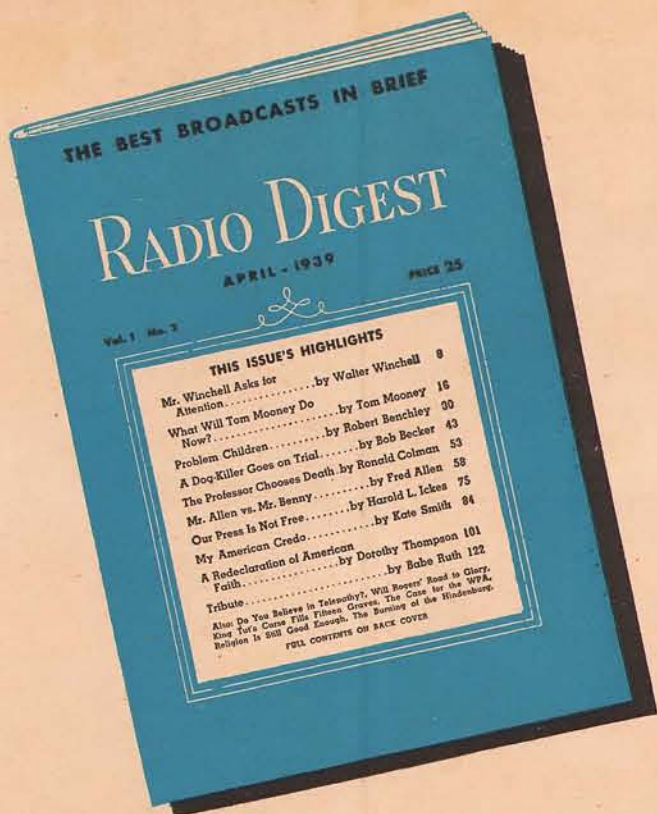

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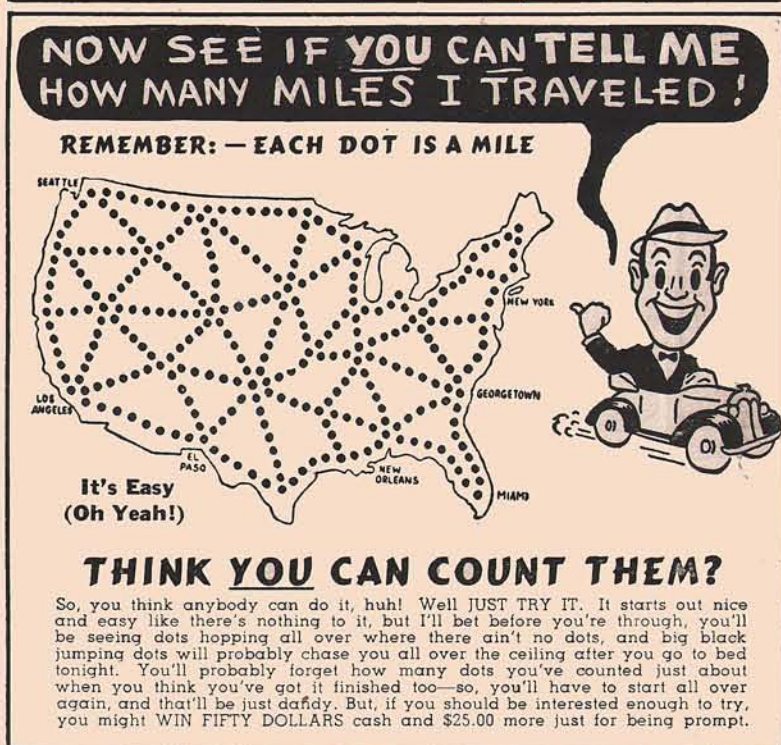
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
