# RELIGION AND RADIO

A GUEST EDITORIAL

**S**INCE I was eight years old I have been interested in radio. I had my first commercial wireless-operator's license the first year they were issued by the Government, in 1912. The progress that has been made in radio has been very close to miraculous. Little did any of us think when we were tossing about on the broad expanse of the Atlantic Ocean listening to the faint buzzes from Cape Cod that some day a little child would flip a switch and turn on music from London, speeches from Prague, and instantaneous reports from all parts of the world.

Before we speak more of radio, let us define religion. Christ defined religion as a Way, a Truth, and a Life, or material, intellectual and spiritual, and the purpose of this religion was to bring about the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man. This is the Kingdom of Heaven as far as this world is concerned. There can be no higher ideal than that complete love of God and love of neighbor, and this ideal is the common ground on which Jew and Gentile agree and unite. If religion is to bring about an international unity of humanity—materially, intellectually and spiritually—then radio is a divine agent.

Radio is light traveling at the rate of 300,000,000 meters a second (186,000 miles). That means radio has placed Tokyo, Moscow, Berlin, London, Rome, Washington and Paris split seconds apart. In short, radio has shrunk the world to the point when Washington is closer to London today than New York was to Philadelphia a hundred and fifty years ago.

Millions of people all over the world listened to the speeches of Benes, Hitler, Mussolini and Chamberlain in the recent war scare. Millions of people, speaking many different languages, had a deep interest in the welfare of the people in a small, distant republic in southeastern Europe.

As we understand our neighbors, our sympathy and interest in them grows. We see in the Chinese and Ethiopian a brother with the same virtues and faults as the members of our own household.

With the advent of television, we shall look in upon the people of the world as well as hear their words. We shall be, visually and auditorily, a fraction of a second from every man, woman and child in the world. It will be very difficult then to preach doctrines of race hatred and nationalistic prowess. It will be difficult to get men to destroy the lives and property they have been so very close to.

Radio is light and religion is the force of enlightenment. The light of the world. The light of love, faith and hope shining in the darkness of fear, suspicion and despair.

Any force which draws mankind more closely together is a re-



ligious force. That is why I feel that radio is a powerful agent of religion, and if, through radio, the fatherhood of God and brotherhood of man is brought about, then the two words will become synonymous and radio will have fulfilled its greatest destiny.

The atonement for the sins of greed and selfishness become the at-one-ment of all races and nations knit together for the primary purpose of making this word a heavenly habitation for every human creature.

It's just a hunch, of course, but we believe that many of our readers must be as tired as we are of seeing stars. For all the years of RADIO GUIDE's life, we have published nothing but famous faces on our covers. ## The Circle

It is time, finally, for us to report further on The Circle, that \$30,000 package of talent which we anticipated with a rousing two-page story inviting our readers to get an earful of the nation's most expensive entertainment.

You know the result. The Circle has been the biggest disappointment of the year, according to the radio trade-press. The man who produced it has had a nervous breakdown, the big stars have pulled out, the public hasn't accepted it.

We pause now to wonder why, and we do not think we are going out of our way to be nasty to Hollywood when we say it was because too much dependence was placed in untrained people. Ronald Colman, Carole Lombard, Cary Grant, the Marx Brothers—none of these were radio names. None of these had enough mike experience. For example, Colman had been on the air on two previous occasions, Lombard had done a half-dozen guest appearances, Cary Grant had done no more, the Marx Brothers had done a short radio series several years ago and a few guest appearances since. Altogether, they had less radio experience than any one of a hundred little-known character-actresses in a script-show.

We think this is a shining example of how not to build a radio show. We think the public has realized, at long last, that movie glamour does not come out of a loudspeaker. Radio talent which is that quality which makes for good radio entertainment cannot be counterfeited, and substitute talents will not suffice.

"The Circle" has administered a sound spanking-lesson to broadcasters for the transgression of not fully understanding their field.

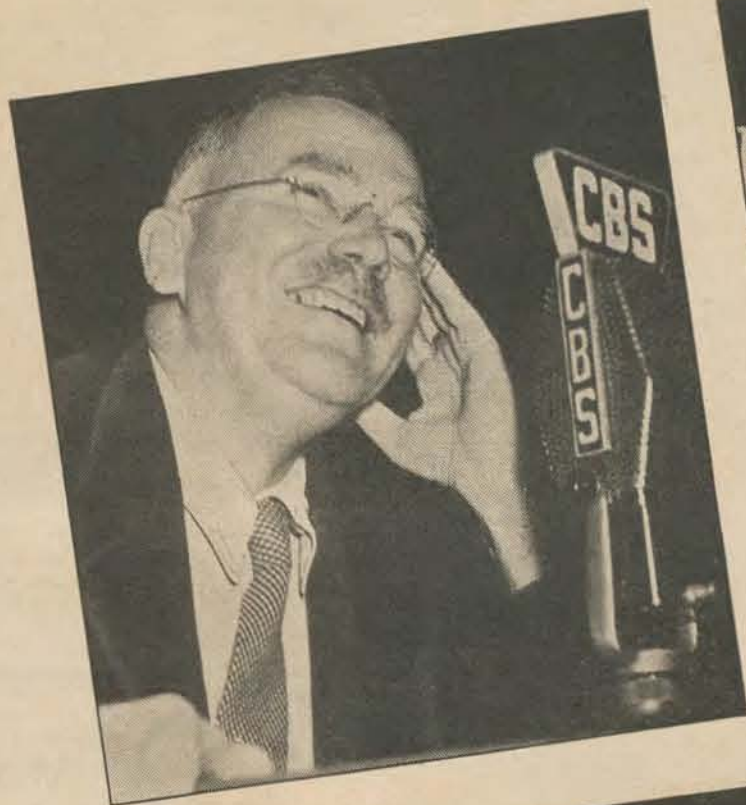

## H. V. KALTENBORN LIKES TO HEAR KALTENBORN TALK; SO DO MILLIONS OF OTHER INDIVIDUAL AMERICANS

**H.** V. KALTENBORN, dean of the air's news commentators and the man of the minute when sober judgment is needed in radio reporting, says that if he lived in Germany, where his folks came from, he would be Baron Hans von Kaltenborn.

That is one of the few errors of reporting that can be charged to Mr. Kaltenborn's account. If he lived in Germany, he would be Baron Hans von Kaltenborn only in an epitaph. For his head would have been lopped off long before now. The crime would have been talking too much and telling the truth.

Mr. Kaltenborn, nee Baron, loves to eat goose grease on white bread, to drink beer and to talk. Neither hell, high water nor a crisis can shut him up. And that's what's made him famous after sixteen years of plugging along as a reporter with pencil and pronunciation. Mr. Kaltenborn enjoys the sound of his own voice. So do

millions of other persons, and we can forgive him if he's proud and proud of it. But there's an inspiring characteristic about the man—he doesn't give a whoop whether we forgive him or not. He leads his own life, and you, and you and the world can take it or lump it.

He is sixty years old and too old to

change his ways, even if he wanted to, which he doesn't. And he's just about the most individualistic man ever to hold aloft the banner of reason while so many men are waving the bloody shirt. His people came from a land where individualism is supposed to have died. But it hasn't.

Thank God there'll always be Burkes

in Ireland, Pitts in England, Burnses in Scotland, Lafayettes in France and Kaltenborns in Germany.

His father, Baron Rudolph von Kaltenborn, was a two-fisted individualist, an officer of the Hessian Guards. Many years ago when Prussia reached out and snatched Hesse (it's an old European and American custom), Baron Rudolph von Kaltenborn couldn't stomach the steal, so he chucked his title out of the window and came to America, where, even in that era of robber barons and land larceny, a man could enjoy a measure of liberty.

He settled in Milwaukee. There were many Germans in Milwaukee and they called Kaltenborn by his titled name. It was one of the oldest names in Germany. A Kaltenborn had been minister of war and, as a boy, Rudolph Kaltenborn was a page at court. The family still is listed as Von Kaltenborn-Stachan in the Almanach de Gotha, which ranks with Burke's Peerage as



the Who's Who of nobility. It also is an excellent reference for the study of has-beens.

But gradually in Milwaukee, the folks began calling the baron just plain Rudolph Kaltenborn. He was a dealer in building supplies and was a writer and poet of sorts, and a top-hand public speaker. His wife formerly was Betty Wessels, and their son, Hans, was born on July 9, 1878. His mother was a New York school-teacher and had been to Germany to study when she met his father on shipboard. They were married in New York, and lit out for the West, where the bridegroom had a job and not much else.

Back in Germany, Rudolph Kaltenborn would have been at least a middle-size shot, but in the new land he was just another German immigrant trying to get along, and it was tough going. Hans got in the habit of working hard as a boy, and he never has gotten out of it.

He attended Milwaukee public schools until 1891, when his family moved to the little town of Merrill, Wis., where his father entered the building-supplies business. There the boy attended high school and learned to juggle balls and balance a straw on his nose.

That's not very much to learn at high school, but the tricks probably saved his life in the 1927 Chinese revolution.

He was a good student, even in high school. English was his favorite subject, and he disliked physics.

"The fondest memories of my early days are the times I caught trout in the Prairie River," he recalled, "the winters I spent in the woods, the swimming in the Wisconsin River and the time I smoked corn-tassels. I've never smoked since. The saddest memory of my early days is the time my first girl went back on me."

SOME men are born for adventure, and Kaltenborn is one of them. He looks and acts as though he were a college professor, a cousin about four times removed to Casper Milquetoast. His Harvard accents, his pince-nez, his enthusiasm for living—they don't make for the Richard Harding Davis type of vagabond journalist, but few, if any, writers or lecturers of the last decade have had the adventures of the proper and proud Mr. Kaltenborn. He has talked with the mighty. He didn't realize recognition until he was a middle-aged man. He saw flamboyant and

childhood hero was Robinson Crusoe and in real life, Dana of the New York Sun.

"My own experiences were the chief influences of my childhood. The necessity of fighting my way against poverty and small-town limitations also influenced me, as did Shakespeare and books of newspaper adventure."

In the Milwaukee schools he was selected several times for declamation contests and was a natural public speaker. He liked the theater, but at Merrill he had little or no opportunity to enjoy good shows. However, at Milwaukee he saw a performance he never has forgotten. It was his first show.

Kaltenborn said, "It was 'The Private Secretary'—a marvelous performance seen from the peanut gallery of the Bijou Theater at a Sunday matinee. My parents didn't know I attended the performance."

In Merrill, the boys called Kaltenborn "Spiderlegs." He could never adapt himself to the small town. He worked in his father's supply house a bit, then ran away to a lumber camp and worked as waterboy. Back home

spite of his father's warning that it was a precarious way to earn bread and butter.

America truly was the land of opportunity and platitudes in those mauve days. Preachers and editors insisted, and perhaps correctly so, that all men are created equal, including peons; that everything comes to him who works and waits, including sharecroppers; and Kaltenborn believed it. He apparently still does. He believed any man could get what he wanted if he worked for it. He has every reason to believe so.

Adventure began calling him in 1899, and he hung up his scissors and left the city desk of the *Advocate* to the cockroaches and rats and hied away to a lumber camp. He sent stories back to the paper and kept in good with the boss. Then one day, reading his favorite paper, the if-you-see-it-in-the-Sun-it's-so *New York Sun*, he got a yen to see the Paris Exposition, which was all set, so he left his ax and headed east. Some say he rode a freight train. Others say, being a reporter, he got a pass. Railroads used to give reporters passes. Of course, in those days reporters never called rail-

until he knows at least two languages, and then our horizons will not be the end of the block where we live.

Hans got a job peddling stereoscopes. He bought a bike and really saw Europe, knocking on doors, ringing bells and mingling with the folks. And he learned French. And he learned the hearts and minds of the people.

Two years later, in 1902, he returned to New York, walked across the Brooklyn bridge and wrote a poem about it. The editor of the *Brooklyn Eagle* was so impressed with the poem that he bought it and gave the lanky poet a job handling the stock-tables at \$8 a week. There is no poetry in high, low and bid, but Hans stuck. He even had the great privilege of covering night assignments for his paper. He got no money, but he got his stuff printed—and think of the interesting people he met. Those were the days when reporters worked for nothing, and little of that.

It took the ambitious reporter only a few years to realize he was not educated. He prepared himself for Harvard and in 1905 entered. During his

spectacular commentators shoot up the ladder while he plodded along.

But last year, when the world staggered to the brink of war, tottered drunkenly on the ramparts and staggered away again, radio looked around for the best man to tell the world about it, and Kaltenborn was the man. He was ready. He was ready because everything he has done since childhood helped equip him to know the world and the ways of men who run and ruin it. Yet, at twenty-one he'd never seen a great painting or heard a great symphony. He was a city editor of a small newspaper, and every day he sat at his desk, the rim of the world, and watched news flow under his eyes, but he never helped make it and reported only the doings of the sewing-circles and rows of the town meetings.

"When I was a boy I wanted to be a newspaperman," he said. "My father urged me to prefer business as affording a more certain livelihood. My

he returned to his father's employ and worked for him until the Spanish-American War was declared.

Hans was nineteen when that comic-opera war broke out, and, like his own country, was suffering with growing pains and wanted to fight something—not particular what it was, just something.

He reckoned his parents would forbid his enlistment because he was under age. So he lied about his age, stuffed himself on bananas and water to make the weight-limit, and joined the Fourth Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry. He fought the war in an Alabama training-camp as a top sergeant, and his memories of conflict are concerned mostly with boredom and spoiled food.

Mustered out, he rode a Mississippi River sidewheeler back north and got a job as city editor of the *Merrill Advocate*. Previously, he had reported a bit for the *Merrill Daily News* and was determined to be a newspaperman in

roads the steel ribs of the robber barons and other bad names.

In New York, young Hans slept in ten-cent flophouses and saved his pennies. His only extravagance was a daily investment in the *Sun* (Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus). He read all about the Paris fair and hung around the docks waiting to hitch a ride to Europe. Finally he got a berth on a cattle-boat and headed for Liverpool. He's never been headed since. He got paid for crossing the Atlantic. He's crossed it scores of times since, and always gets paid.

He saw Paris and, liking France, decided to tour the country. It was one of the wisest decisions a man ever made. He was a level-headed fellow even then. He knew German perfectly, having learned it from his people. And he elected to learn French. A man who can speak several languages never will starve. Some day schools will convince students that a man is ignorant

freshman summer vacation, he says he "swallowed four years of Latin while acting as a tutor."

He was an excellent student, a Phi Beta Kappa and winner of two prizes in oratory and debating. It was in Harvard that he learned he was an extemporaneous speaker. He was slated to speak a piece from "Gentlemen: The King!" And he forgot his lines, but made up new sentences and ad-libbed his way to fame in Harvard. The judges awarded him a prize, and he hasn't stopped talking yet.

He earned extra money in college by writing for New York papers. His favorite sport was cross-country running, but he had to give it up for lack of time. Despite the fact he had to earn his way, Hans won the Coolidge prize as Harvard's best debater, the Boylston Prize as the best public speaker, and was one of the organizers and business manager of the Harvard

# TSCHAIKOWSKY: CRYING GENIUS

Musical Giant Series No. 9

ON A blowy afternoon in April, 1891, a small and nervous group stood on a New York pier waiting for a boat from Europe.

"What do you think he'll be like?"

"Well, I've heard he's very excitable, but then most Russians are. He'll probably be eccentric, too."

"It's thrilling . . . imagine, Tschaikowsky is the first great composer ever to come to America."

"I wonder if he'll like us as much as we like his music."

Sighs of relief as the five welcomers watched the gangplank lowered. All of them recognized the slim, gray-bearded man with the deep, sensitive dark eyes, the full soft mouth with its hint of weakness. However, he looked distraught, completely miserable and ready to burst into tears. He was homesick and wished himself thousands of miles away in Moscow. "I regretted ever having undertaken this insane voyage," he wrote later to his brother Modeste. "I was met by four very amiable gentlemen and a lady, who took me to the Hotel Normandie. After all these people had gone, I walked up and down my room and shed many tears . . . I dressed and went for a stroll on Broadway. An extraordinary street. Houses of one and two stories alternate with some nine-storied buildings (!). Most original. When I got back I began crying again."

Later in the week, Tschaikowsky stopped crying long enough to receive a tremendous ovation at the inauguration of Carnegie Hall, when he conducted some of his music at its opening concert. He shared the program with a young, highly talented conductor named Walter Damrosch. In another letter to Modeste, Tschaikowsky marveled, "I am ten times more famous in America than I am in Europe . . . I am a much more important person here than in Russia. Is not that curious?"

However, the whole American trip was an agony to him, despite ovations, rare sightseeing and the lavish hospitality of the Americans, whose genuine kindness impressed him profoundly. But a throbbing ache of homesickness never left him, and the happiest day of the American adventure was when he boarded the boat to go home. All these people who were so kind and meant so well—how could they know or understand his morbid dread of meeting strangers, his pathological dislike of any social contacts? Only one person had ever really understood that. And the thought of her brought as many tears to his eyes as his nostalgia. For it was more than

eight months since word had come from her . . . after fourteen years of the strangest relationship in musical history. Fourteen years during which Nadejda von Meck, wealthy Russian widow, and Peter Tschaikowsky exchanged the most companionable and intimate kind of letters. And yet they never met!

Left a widow in her early forties, with eleven children, Nadejda von Meck had retired from the social world. Ruling over her little kingdom of children and grandchildren, she believed her life's purpose fulfilled. (In those days a woman of forty was considered well on in years.) She rarely went out and saw almost no one, admitting only a few outsiders to her home circle, among them Nicholas Rubinstein, director of the Moscow Conservatory of Music. Recognizing in Nadejda a sympathetic audience, he liked to gossip about his students and faculty. Among the latter, he said, was one who had quite extraordinary talent for compos-

ing, although he had not started his musical studies until the age of twenty-one.

"He's a gentleman, you understand," Nicholas assured Nadejda, "but he hasn't much money except what he earns at the conservatory. It's hard going for him, but he gave up a good job as clerk in the Ministry of Justice to study music."

Nadejda listened sympathetically. She liked music with a truly Russian fervor, and admired men who conquered handicaps and achieved things.

"Shall I play you something of Tschaikowsky?" Nadejda nodded assent.

Nicholas went to the piano and performed the music from "The Tempest," symphonic fantasy composed several years before. Its effect on the widow was instantaneous and complete. It lost Rubinstein's conservatory an excellent professor of musical theory. It started a new life for Nadejda. And it paved Tschaikowsky's way for the creation

of some of the world's greatest art. For Nadejda von Meck had fallen literally head over heels in love . . . with Tschaikowsky's music!

Immediately she commissioned a work from him and wrote him, "For several days after hearing your 'Tempest' I was in a delirium from which I could not emerge." She begged for his photograph. But never did she propose a meeting. She understood his morbid aversion to meeting people and sensed his need for one person in whom he could have complete confidence. Early in their relationship she wrote: "There was a time when I was very anxious to make your personal acquaintance; but now the more you fascinate me, the more I fear your presence; I prefer to think of you from afar; to hear you speak in your music and through it to share your feelings."

Tschaikowsky answered in kind: "That we both suffer from one and the same malady would alone bring us

**SLICE OF BROADWAY** Sunday, CBS

An unusual departure from his regular streamlined poetry dramatization will be featured by Norman Corwin on his "Words Without Music" this week. Called "Broadway Document," the special sketch will present Edward Mayehoff, one of Corwin's radio discoveries, in a program that is, if not poetically streamlined, at least distinctly a modern experiment. Corwin overheard Mayehoff doing one of his impersonations in a recording-studio on Broadway, where Mayehoff was making records just for amusement. The uncanny authenticity of his characters seemed striking enough to be of documentary value. Corwin found that Mayehoff, bandleader at New York's Governor Clinton Hotel, started the practice as a hobby several years ago. The reason for this type of program appearing in a series devoted to experimental literature for radio is that Corwin regards it as a serious study of language and idiom of the Great White Way of the country's greatest city. The young bandleader will impersonate a series of Broadway types—a hawker, a barker, a businessman, a harassed husband, etc.

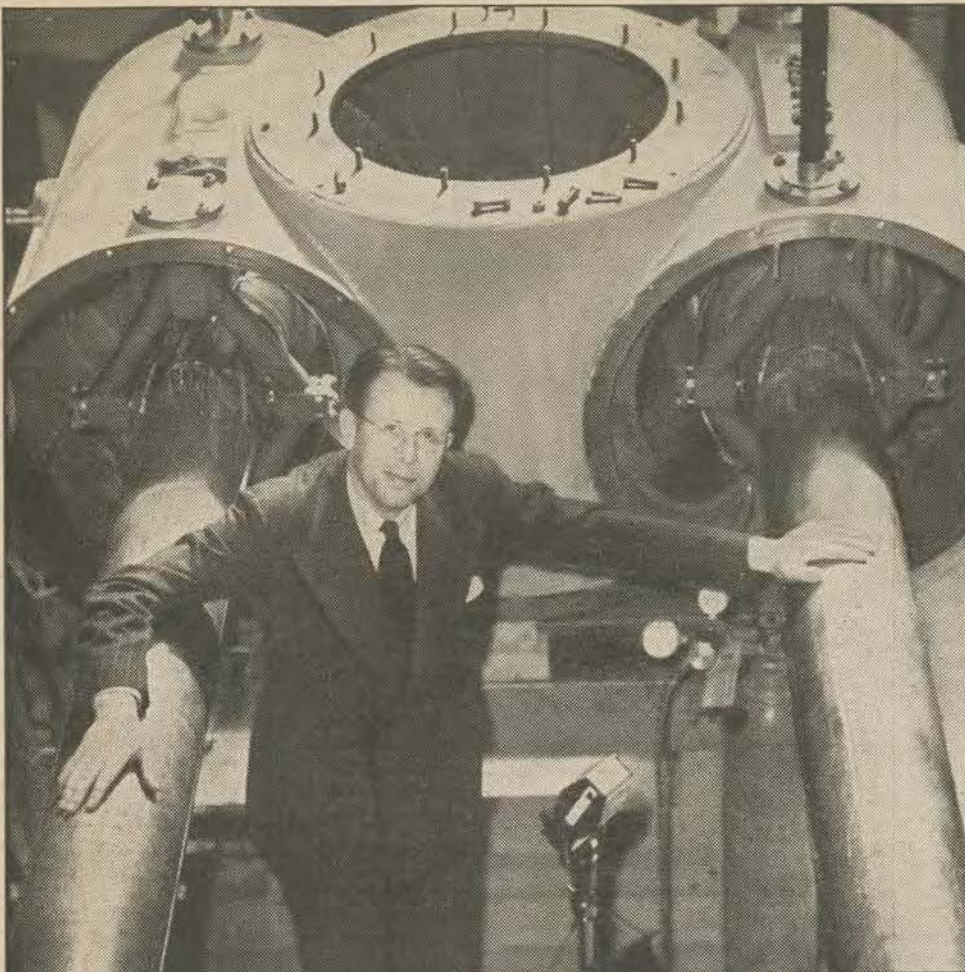

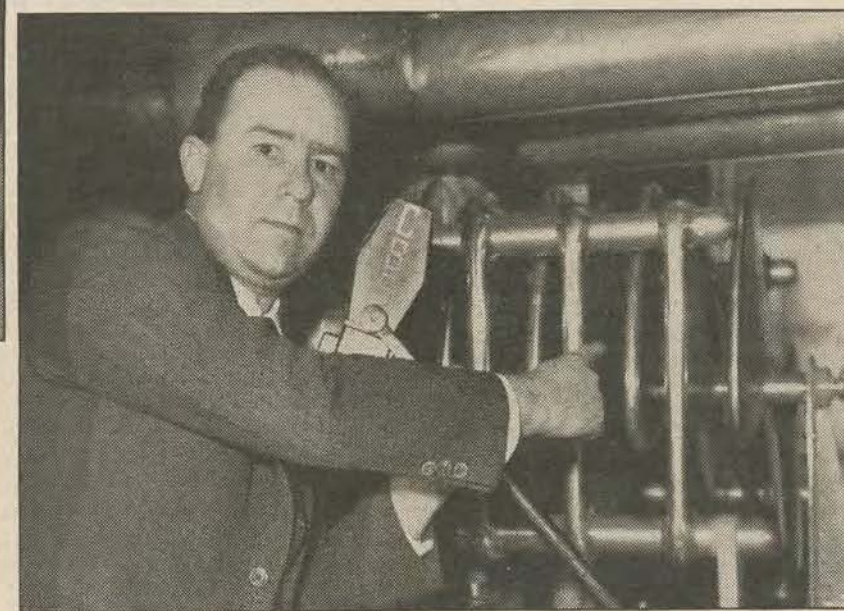

## "UP 'N' ATOM, BOYS!"

That's the battle-cry today of the army of intrepid scientists who fight all comers for the progress of mankind. They don't always pick on opponents their own size. At the risk of seeming to be bullies, often they attack very small enemies—germs, for instance. One of their latest and fiercest battles is being waged against the smallest material thing that man knows about or thinks he knows about—the atom.

The scientists select or invent their own weapons. An unusual radio broadcast this week—over CBS, Saturday, at 6:15 p.m. EST, 5:15 p.m. CST, 4:15 p.m. MST, 3:15 p.m. PST—will introduce to you one of the newest and most diabolically efficient of those weapons.

You'll meet the cyclotron. It's an atom-smasher, and it will be making its radio debut. Unusual? Words like "sensational" and "momentous" would not be extravagant. You'll be a first-nighter at the only show of its kind ever yet performed. It could be a flop, but it has all the earmarks of a "smash hit," for when one hundred thousand billion atomic bullets, each one loaded with super-energy, are fired each second, then whatever happens shouldn't be a surprise. There are intriguing possibilities.

Does an atom make a noise when it explodes? Does it hiss, crackle, or go "bang"?

When the atomic bullets hit the target, what will happen? Will they blow the sunny shores of California into the briny deep? Will they ring a bell? Or

will there simply be an instant of silent import?

Will this air premiere present a preview of staggering potentialities for the future? Such as the driving of motors, the creation of new substances, new forms of energy, the destruction of matter long considered impossible, the prolonging of human lives—or the sudden shortening?

The future course of the world and humanity may be locked up in one of those mighty mites that will go whizzing around in the cyclotron.

EST you cringe in fearful consternation at the prospect of taking a ring-side seat at this battle royal between the flyweight atom and the heavyweight cyclotron, let us pave the way for the encounter with a few intimate facts about the opponents.

We speak of the atom as an enemy—not because of any specific harm it has done but because of its stubborn refusal to be caught and broken and harnessed to man's uses, as other more spectacular-appearing elements have been harnessed. It is ironical that, according to the atomic theory, the atom

is the smallest and most fundamental particle in all substances. It's smaller and more indispensable than Charlie McCarthy, tougher than Edward G. Robinson and more aloof than Greta Garbo. It's the infinitesimal unit that has through the centuries defied all man's attempts to blow it to bits.

You're full of atoms yourself, billions of them. Everything that exists is composed of them. It would take all the people in the world thousands of years to count the atoms in a single drop of water!

But why is the atom on the spot? Why are the scientists bent on smashing it?

Not because it's a goblin to get us, a spook to haunt us, or a man from Mars to destroy us. Maybe you've been reading H. G. Wells or Edgar Rice Burroughs or Buck Rogers. Or Hearstian newspaper stories. Maybe you think you and the world are doomed by the insidious potency of the atom. Perhaps you have wild nightmares of explosive cataclysms that would rend the universe asunder. Don't worry. You're safe for a long while yet.

They want to tame and train the

atom. That's why they're after it. It does have tremendous potentialities of energy. Enough atomic energy is contained in a few spoonfuls of water to drive a ship across the Atlantic. When an atom is broken into fragments, incalculable forces can be released. Some day those forces may be put to work at useful tasks in commerce and industry. It is quite possible that the perpetual dream of alchemists of changing base metals to gold may be realized through atomic bombardment.

More important to the present is the possible significance to the treatment of cancer. Through the atomic reaction to splintering force, radioactive substances can be created. They explode spontaneously, and the atomic fragments they emit may curb cancer by zipping into tissues and killing diseased cells.

Numerous atom-smashing machines have been invented involving differing principles. Dr. Merle A. Tuve of the Carnegie Institute perfected a machine for generating a 6,000,000-volt lightning-bolt that cracks like a cannon. It simply fires electrically charged protons at each other to see how much force is required to make them collide and stick. You can understand the principle better if you perform the old trick of running a comb through your hair and then holding the comb near your fingers to make the artificial electricity crackle.

Cornell University developed an atomic gun in the shape of a glass tube, with a radio short-wave generator as the impelling force to accelerate the speed of the atoms enough to tear them apart.

Most gigantic and most generally used of the "atomizers" is the cyclotron, perfected by Prof. Ernest O. Lawrence, thirty-seven-year-old University of California scientist. There are more than thirty cyclotrons in use or under construction. The largest of all will be the one now being completed at the University of California, weighing 440,000 pounds and measuring twenty by thirty by forty feet. If an instrument that big can't smash the modest atom to smithereens, it is hard to imagine one that can. It is this colossus with which the forthcoming radio broadcast will be concerned.

A cyclotron is a modern version of the Biblical story involving David, Goliath, and a sling-shot. In this case tiny atomic nuclei represent the stone missiles, and the sling of the weapon consists of a powerful magnetic field which keeps the particles whirling around while picking up the colossal speeds that mean super-energy. The power source of the cyclotron is high-frequency, alternating-current voltage in place of David's good right arm. Now, if a sample of a chemical element is

# The March of Music

## The Music of Spring

**W**HETHER you call it *fruehling*, *printemps* or spring, it's all the same and it's here now, with blue skies, growing grasses, the piping of birds intermingled with the rhymed rhapsodies of the poets.

Traditionally credited with being the chosen interpreters of the vernal season, the poets really share that high estate with the composers. From song to symphony, springtime has been glorified as rapturously in tone as in verse. Almost as old as music is its voicing of the sounds and panoplies of spring—and summer, of course. Mozart made the violet into an immortal song; Beethoven expressed his pastoral adoration in an inspired symphony. Mascagni and Rimsky-Korsakoff penned hymns to the sun. Even the cynical Stravinsky intoned the fertility of young earth and man's riotous welcoming to reawakened nature, in his *Sacre de Printemps*.

Schumann rushed the warm seasons a bit with his "March Violets," but Thomas Moore stayed through with his "Last Rose of Summer." As early as the year 1240 or so, an anonymous genius set down his salutatory ode, "Summer Is Acumen In." The poet and the composer meet over and over again to unite their arts in praise of spring. A set of verses by Boettger moved Schumann to create his "Spring Symphony." No less appealing than that work are the same master's tender songs " 'Twas in the Lovely Month of May" and his ecstatic outpouring in "Spring Night." Schubert's heart was always filled with vernal warmth, but especially in "Spring Dream," "Spring Longing," "Spring Faith," Grieg's "Springtime," Wolf's "Song to Spring," and—but one could go on almost indefinitely with such a list.

Solo instrumental music has the same urge; to cite only Singing's "Rustle of Spring" and Mendelssohn's imperishable "Spring Song." The greening season far outdoes autumn and winter as a source of musical inspiration.

The Philadelphia symphonists make a welcome reappearance on the air. Many experts still regard this orchestra the best in America. (No bricks, please, from patriotic local fans in Boston and New York!) Eugene Ormandy deserves large credit for sustaining the standards set up by Stokowski.

With the exception of the Rimsky selection, the numbers played today are thrice familiar. "Russian Easter," a concert overture based on motives from the Russian church service, draws its "story" from the Sixty-seventh Psalm and the Resurrection scene in St. Mark's Gospel, closing with the exultant Resurrexit theme. "Resurrexit" sing the angels to the sound of archangels' trumpets and the fluttering of the wings of the seraphim; "Resurrexit" sing the temple priests through clouds of incense by the light of innumerable candles and chimes of the massed triumphant bells. A true Easter celebration in tone, leaving one with a sense of joyful uplift and glory.

Rossini (1792-1868), worldly, cynical operatic hero of Paris, was intensely interested in church music due to his early studies with priestly teachers. He composed three major ritual works: "Solemn Mass" written in his youth; "Stabat Mater," production of middle age; "Petite Messe" (Little Mass) finished four years before his death. There is, by the way, nothing little about the score, which takes nearly two hours to perform.

Originally (at a private hearing in Paris) the work had only two pianos and harmonium as accompaniment for the voices; later Rossini added orchestration, but did not survive to hear the opus in that form, its public premiere with Patti as soprano soloist following his death by one year.

Appended to the score is a touching note by the composer which bears quoting here: "Good God, behold completed this poor little mass. Is it musique sacree (sacred music) or only sacree musique (wretched music) I have written? I was born for Opera Buffa (comic opera), Thou knowest it well! A little science and a little heart are all there. Be then blessed and grant me Paradise."

The "Petite Messe" is strongly influenced by Bach, whom Rossini revered immeasurably and called "a miracle of God." Also he declared in his bedridden old age that he would get up even at midnight to hear Bach's grandiose Mass in B Minor.

It should be most arresting for dialers to listen to this Rossini music totally unfamiliar to present generations of Americans.

Sensitive, fanciful, warmly colored, is this score by the English composer, Frederick Delius (1863-1934) who died blind and paralyzed. No better descrip-tion of his style can be given than is found in the tribute of A. Eaglefield Hull, noted English musical theorist: "The art of Delius looks backward, not forward. It belongs to the evening of a great period. It is resplendent with iri-descent chromatic rays and aureoles which sometimes appear immediately after sunset. He is the last great repre-sentative of Impressionism."

Beethoven's fourth symphony shows how a composer's inner emotion often remains unaffected by outward events surrounding him. He wrote the work while Napoleon's army occupied Vienna, but the music is gracious, happy, radi-ant. The reason? He was betrothed to Therese, his "Immortal Beloved." As biographer Nohl observes: "The lion was in love and drew in his claws." The slow movement is as sublimely tender and beautiful as any Beethoven ever created.

# Something About Shorter Orchestral Works

HAVING disposed of the symphony and the symphonic poem in this series, we can turn our attention to the shorter examples of orchestral compositions. The word "shorter" is a relative term, however, for some of the fantasias, variations, overtures, rhapsodies, ensemble concertos and the like are not exactly of striking brevity and terseness.

The concertos came before the symphonies, and gave the latter their earliest inspiration in form, content and treatment. Vivaldi, Corelli, Bach and Handel were the best of the or-chestral concerto composers, and at least outwardly their scores all have the same character, consisting of dis-play episodes for solo and grouped in-struments, with a general background ensemble of orchestra. Bach's Bran-denbourg Concertos are the most widely played and familiar of that type of composition.

The form has interested later writ-ers also, and even in our time orches-tral concertos have come to creation, in purpose and construction based on the Bach and Handel models, but of course enriched with modern harmony and instrumentation. (As to counter-point, the earlier masterpieces still re-tain easy supremacy.) The general scheme of the form remains un-changed. "Concerto" still has its orig-inal meaning, derived from the Latin *concertus*, the sounding together of separate parts. Ludovico Viadana is the first one who used the term, in 1602-03, for motets which he wrote for voices and organ and called "Concerto ecclesiastici" (*concerti* is the Italian plural). Then came church concertos, chamber concertos, and *concertos grosso*. The Brandenburg set of six belongs to the last-named category. Present-day composers who have ex-perimented successfully in the con-certo grosso form and style are Ernest Bloch, Arnold Schoenberg and Albert Stoessel.

The title fantasia almost describes it-self, for it means an instrumental com-position in free form, with the fancy allowed untrammelled play, sometimes resembling extemporization. That is why Berlioz captioned his famous work "Symphony Fantastique," for it roamed through emotions and incidents with-out any thought of following classic principles in symphonic construction.

Symphonic poems are often sub-titled "Fantasia," like Glinka's "Kam-arinskaya," Moussorgsky's "Night on Bald Mountain," Tchaikowsky's "Francesca da Rimini" and "The Tem-pest," and Schelling's "A Victory Ball." Fantasias sometimes take on the aspect of variations, written on one or more themes.

Variations, at first confined to solo instruments, soon found their way into orchestra works, tempting composers through the wide opportunities for the exercise of imagination and ingenuity. In Beethoven's time, the finest set of

orchestral variations were the last movement of his "Eroica." His most effective successors in the form have been Brahms, with "Variations on a Theme" by Haydn; d'Indy, variations depicting the story of Istar and her veils; and Elgar with his lovely opus, "Enigma." Tchaikowsky also has an appealing series of variations in one of his suites.

Overtures and preludes are self-evident. Usually they are introductory to an opera, but often represent de-tached compositions telling their own story. By the way, Tchaikowsky pec-uliarly calls his "Romeo and Juliet" an overture-fantasia, but of course it is not based on an opera. Of operatic overtures, the towering ones are those by Weber, Mozart, Gluck and Wagner. My own favorites continue to be Bee-thoven's "Leonore" No. 3, "Coriolanus" (no opera), Weber's "Freischuetz," Mozart's "Don Giovanni" and "Mar-riage of Figaro," and Wagner's "Tann-haeuser," "Meistersinger," "Lohen-grin," "Tristan and Isolde" and "Par-sifal." The "Tannhaeuser" excerpt is an overture; the other Wagner excerpts he calls preludes. I also love the over-tures to Smetana's "Bartered Bride," Nicolai's "Merry Wives of Windsor," Glinka's "Life for the Czar," Gold-mark's "Sakuntala," Hadley's "In Bo-hemia," Mendelssohn's "Midsummer Night's Dream" and "Fingal's Cave," Rossini's "William Tell," Wolf-Fer-rari's "Secret of Suzanne" and—don't smile—the perennial and delightful "Poet and Peasant."

Much orchestral music has been written as incidental to stage plays and to be performed during the dia-log or between the acts. Examples are so well known they need no listing.

Rhapsodies are among the most pop-ular pieces in the orchestral reper-toire. I believe that the title was first used by Liszt for his fifteen piano solos based on national Hungarian airs. (Some of them were later orchestrated by him.) The word rhapsody is of Greek origin; a rhapsody was a ballad, several of which combined together constituted an epic, such as Homer's "Iliad." The musical rhapsody allows large scope of imagination, is not al-ways purely passionate or ecstatic, and frequently embodies also other moods, for instance, Delius' "Brigg Fair" and Victor Herbert's "Irish Rhapsody."

Legends for orchestra are many. Also poems, sketches, dances, valeses, serenades, marches. Especially marches. Come to mind immediately Elgar's "Pomp and Circumstance," Tchaikow-sky's "Slave," Berlioz' "Rakoczy," Gounod's "Marionette's Funeral," Men-delssohn's "Wedding." I am icono-clastic enough to think, too, that Sousa's "Stars and Stripes Forever" is a classic march in its way, and espe-cially in these days might profitably be put on every symphonic program in America together with "The Star-Spangled Banner."

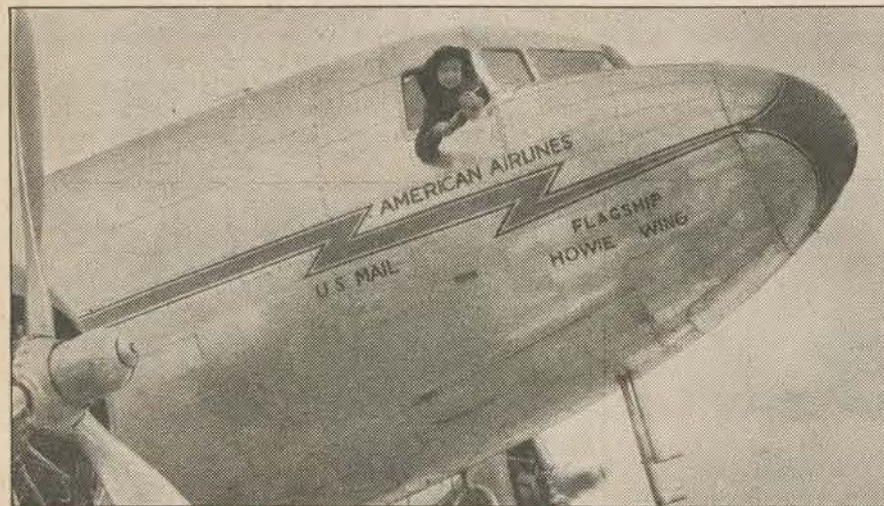

James Melton and Frank Black's orchestra auditioned for a potential sponsor last week . . . Hope it isn't true what they say about the RCA Magic Key leaving the air in a couple of weeks. It's one of the bright spots on the early Sunday dialing . . . Another story making the rounds is that Paul Whiteman will take over the Burns and Allen spot in addition to his Wednesday night airing at the completion of the team's current series . . . Lum and Abner will not shift to the spot vacated by Amos 'n' Andy on NBC. They stay right where they are, and before they left New York, they tucked away a one-year renewal contract which allows them an eight-week vacation during the summer season . . . Gabriel Heatter isn't so lucky: he will have just three weeks vacation from "We, the People" this summer. The program goes off the air the latter part of August and returns in September . . . I hear tell "The Circle" will get a permanent vacation after the thirteen weeks are up, which is just as well . . . The Lyn Murray Singers on the Fred Allen show have become the Town Hall Quartet, which means that the Mullin Sisters trio has been dropped. The new AFRA wage-scale is responsible for the cutting down.

You won't be hearing "Tizzie Lish" on the Al Pearce programs any more, but Al won't be able to forget Bill Comstock, who portrayed "Tizzie," for quite a while. Bill's personal manager has filed suit against Pearce for alleged breach of contract . . . When Lum and Abner stopped off in Chicago for one broadcast en route to the Coast, they paid off announcer Carlton Brickert by handing him a bag full of pennies. When Jack Benny was their guest a few weeks ago, he received his salary in the same manner. Oh yes, I musn't forget to mention that the aforementioned Mr. Brickert forgot all about L and A having to do a repeat broadcast for the West Coast listeners, so he forgot to show up at the studio—and he is the same fellow who announced their show for several years when the boys broadcast from the Windy City . . . Houston, Texas, is proud of the fact that for the second time a local quiz program was promoted to the networks. Parks Johnson's Vox Pop was the first to get national recognition, and now Dr. I. Q., a question-and-answer show which originates in a theater, gets the honors . . . Which reminds me that there are a few firms in the business of selling questions and answers to radio stations for their quiz shows. The pay-off is that Parks Johnson was offered a set of questions by one of the outfits, which he used on the Vox Pop show months before.

Abe Schechter, who is in charge of all special broadcasts at NBC, received the following cable from Max Jordan, the network's European representative: "Don't urgent me tonight am dead tired." This came after a week-end of many transatlantic broadcasts which brought listeners in America the reports of Hitler's advances into Czechoslovakia. A later cable informed Schechter that Jordan hadn't been to bed for thirty-nine hours, which gives you an idea of what work is entailed in order to get these special broadcasts to you.

#### Experts Need More Information, Please

Several broadcasts ago the expert Franklin P. Adams stated into the "Information, Please" microphone that Lake Minnetonka was between St.

Paul and Minneapolis. For the next few days the mailman brought sacks of mail from listeners in the Twin Cities area mentioning the fact that the above statement was an error. The sponsor was greatly pleased at all the mail, because he didn't realize the program had so many listeners in that sector. Just for the records, the reason for the huge mail response was due to a suggestion in Cedric Adam's popular column in the Minneapolis *Star* for all his readers to write FPA and inform him that Lake Minnetonka is not between St. Paul and Minneapolis.

#### To Bee or Not to Bee

Studio 3B(ee) at NBC had to be quarantined for almost two days after a handful of bees went off on a rampage at the end of Dave Elman's "Hobby Lobby" program on March 22. Elman had presented a hobbyist who trains bees to do tricks (escaping is not one of them) and this fellow had gone into a net-enclosed cage to do his act. The excitement started when he stepped out of the cage and, despite precautionary measures, permitted a squadron of bees to step out with him. It was a great sight to watch from the enclosed control-room, but to the studio audience it was as frightening as an air raid.

Fortunately, all this took place after Hobby Lobby was off the air, and the people that were left in the studio got out in a big hurry. The hobbyist-owner was the only one to stay behind and he set about capturing his bees with a net. Bright and early the following morning, the Radio Rogues, ready to broadcast from 3B, scampered like mad out of the studio shouting, "Bees!" It seems that not all of the insects had been captured. Thereafter the doors were locked and a quarantine was established. More than twenty-four hours later, the quarantine was lifted, the doors were opened, janitors gave the valiant bees a dustpan funeral, and the incident was declared closed.

Last Wednesday night I went over to the CBS Playhouse to watch Jim McWilliams put on his Ask-It-Basket program. I don't remember when I laughed so much, so long or so loud. The big howl did not take place while the program was on the air; it happened during the after-broadcast entertainment which McWilliams puts on each week. If you're in the audience and have talent, you can feel free to step upon the stage to do your stuff. Several of the ushers got up and sang and did quite well. Two of Columbia's early morning entertainers, Charles Stark and the network's pianist-whistler, Bob Byron, put on a hilarious act that got a great hand, but the big laugh was yet to come. While McWilliams was on the stage announcing the next act, a middle-aged gent in tuxedo came staggering down the aisle—but I mean staggering. Jim saw him and immediately gave the ushers the signal by yelling "Gendarme—one stew." The man fell into a seat and it was quite apparent that he didn't know where he was. Jim went on to tell a story while the inebriated gentleman gazed about his unfamiliar surroundings. The story related how he got into the wrong theater many years ago because two theaters were right next to one another and he imagined that is what happened to the unexpected visitor. Sure enough, he guessed right; the man had a ticket for "Leave It to Me," which was playing next door. So McWilliams, feeling that the gent might have missed some of the numbers from the show, went into a fast routine of all the hit songs, including an impersonation of Mary Martin singing "My Heart Belongs to Daddy" and Sophie

**HOLLYWOOD.**—For one straight year, Rudy Vallee has been urging his sponsor to let him act in those dramatic sketches heard on his Variety Hour, but until last week, it looked as if for once Rudy wasn't going to get what he went after. However, on March 30, the sponsor relented; Rudy became a supporting actor to the extremely capable Claude Rains. How good he was, your observer can't say at this writing—as the writing is being done before the broadcast . . . But back of that victory hides a most typical story of the Vallee determination. His radio contract permits Rudy a certain number of paid guest appearances on other programs each year. You haven't heard him, though, because Vallee instructed his agents *not* to accept any guest spots unless the script permitted him to act! He turned down all bids for his service simply as a crooner, comedian or master of ceremonies. With Rudy, the obsession became *acting* or *bust*. Trouble was, most radio producers probably had the fear that if Rudy were cast as an actor, he *might be* a bust. We shall hear what we shall hear. We went to his last motion picture.

## It's All Strong!

Last year when the University of Southern California established its new radio department, the college's officials thumbed down the proposal that they confer an honorary degree upon Amos 'n' Andy as a gesture to call attention to the school's addition to its curriculum. The U. S. C. faculty thought the A&A degree stunt "beneath their dignity," regardless of the fact that Amos 'n' Andy have done as much to develop the radio dramatic technique as anyone . . . So last year, Northwestern University awarded Charlie McCarthy, a blockhead, the degree of "Master of Inuendo and Snappy Comebacks," and a couple of weeks ago, New York University gave the degree "Mistress of Amusement," to Dorothy Lamour, whose attainments have definitely been more physical than spiritual or mental.

## Off Live Mikes

When Eddie Cantor's post-broadcast anti-Hitler jokes were objected to by a couple of German-Americans March 27 and the latter left the studio theater and were set upon by Cantor sympathizers, the *peculiar* part of the set-up was that a police squad car arrived by call *before* the brawl began—indicating that the couple might have been Nazi "plants" and the whole stunt framed by pro-Nazis who were out to belittle Cantor . . . Dick Powell isn't worried at all these days about motion-picture contracts. Says he, "I've saved my money and if the Tuesday Night Party broadcast goes the way I hope it does, I don't give a hoot if I never make another picture!" . . . William Paley, the CBS head man, in town, and said, "The movie producers issue so many conflicting statements about radio; I'm afraid much of it is milksop for their exhibitors." Paley also promised CBS would build two more big audience studios in Hollywood, would not commit himself whether he preferred sound-drama broadcasts better than television dramas, and assured that the CBS look-see transmitter in New York would be on the air by June 15 . . . The other night, veteran restaurateur George Rector, fully grease-painted, was about to make his television bow before W6XAO, the Don Lee station here, when power failed. "Might just as well," he quipped, "have gone on in blackface!"

## Story About a Story

A bunch of the boys and girls cast on a famous

program were killing time by swapping stories which might not be published but at least were funny when the men began to suspect that the lovely canary of the troupe wasn't catching on at all but was feigning her laughter. So they secretly framed on her by electing one of their numbers to tell a boresome, wandering and meaningless tale at which they would all laugh at the proper cue signal. After ten minutes of conversation, the narrator finally reached the supposed pay-off line which was, "So the doctor told him he had sclerosis of the liver!" Everyone laughed—and the canary all but rolled on the floor. Then, regaining her composure, she said, "I shouldn't listen to stories like that, but I just can't help laughing." Then the group *really* howled. This will let the songbird know how she was taken.

## Hollywood's Favorite Daddy

Last week your cinemaland spy spent a most enjoyable day in San Francisco, where he flew to catch the premiere of Irene Rich's starring play, "A Broom for the Bride," by Jacques Deval, and a very worthy comedy-drama it was, too. But, returning to Hollywood by United Mainliner, he struck up a conversation with the plane's stewardess, a Miss McNeill, and asked her where she had taken her nurse training. She replied, "At Cedars of Lebanon," which happens to be largely patronized by movie and radio stars. "Who," he asked, "is the most popular expectant father at Cedars of Lebanon?" The answer she gave: "Bing Crosby, but of course he's had lots of practise. Bing is always so thoughtful and cheery with the nurses. We all loved him!" . . . So, we might add, does Dixie Lee, his wife.

CHICAGO.—Up until 1932 every show that played at the Eighth Street Theater at Eighth and Wabash here in Chicago had the curtain at half-mast before it started. It was a jinx theater. Practically every show that braved its curse was a flop, lasting only a few days or several weeks. The record run was, significantly, *thirteen* weeks. Then in that dark year of 1932 the "National Barn Dance," with the cockiness born of eight years of success as a radio show, moved into the jinx theater with all its yodels and cowbells. At the same time a shabby, half-wild cat strayed into the playhouse. Nobody knew the why, the whence, nor the how of its coming. It just appeared. And the jinx disappeared. The cat and the "Barn Dance" chased the hoodoo right out the rear exit, and the show has been a perpetual success ever since. The cat is a female, and some maintain she's the mother of the kittens who were martyred to make strings for Arkie's fiddle. She's a very unfriendly cat, except to the stage-manager of the theater, who is somewhat of a guardian. She comes around the cast only when they gather for the Saturday night post-broadcast feed, but she never deserts the theater. She used to be known only as the "Phantom of the Eighth Street Theater," but now she has a real name, "Kitty Kilocycles," thanks to a contest conducted by the WLS "Smile-a-While" program and participated in by listeners from forty-one states. To heighten the mystery of it all, K. K. just spits out a vindictive "piffft" when interviewed.

#### Personality Parade

Anne Seymour, who plays the title role in "The Story of Mary Marlin," celebrated her second anniversary in that part March 29. In those two years a lot of ether has blown over the bridge, and Mary's life has been crammed with eventfulness. Her husband (played by Bob Griffin), a United States Senator, has disappeared and Mary has taken his place in the Senate. Her son Davey (Dolores Gillen), who was an infant when the story began, is now walking and talking. Miss Seymour, who has been in radio since 1932, made her stage debut at the age of twelve, when she took part in a banquet scene in Helen Hayes' "To the Ladies." She joined NBC in 1933 to play the lead in "Grand Hotel." She is now one of the best-known and most popular actresses in radio.

Inside story about the recent signing of the Chicago City Opera Co. with AGMA, the union for opera artists, is that a radio actor was the guiding hand in the negotiations. Leo Curley, who plays Uncle Ed in "Backstage Wife" and Mr. Boswell in "Those Happy Gilmans," and has been a regular performer on many of radio's biggest dramatic shows, has also long been an official of Actors Equity and active in entertainment-union work. The Chicago Opera was the last important opera company in the country to sign with AGMA.

The now oldest team in radio celebrated their seventeenth anniversary on the air recently. Since Ernie Hare died, Eddie and Fannie Cavanaugh rate the "oldest team" title. They started in 1922 on KYW, then in Chicago. The gossip-and-information-with-music pair have conducted about 5,000 broadcasts and interviewed some 3,000 entertainment celebs. Congrats, E. and F., for a real record of consistency.

#### Turning on the Sidelight

"Contented Hour" maestro Marek Weber believes in first-hand information, so he donned a sandhog's helmet and descended forty-five feet below the surface of Chicago's streets to get some atmosphere from the new subway construction for a "Subway

Suite" he's composing . . . What a change of pace! Catherine McCune has taken up chess to furnish a balance for her fast-talking role of Clara Potts in "Scattergood Baines." That reminds me that back in the days of Rex Maupin's Aces of the Air on KYW here in Chicago there was a saxophonist in the orchestra who took my measure consistently in correspondence chess. Wonder if Eddie Swan can play the game as good as ever? . . . Smiling, singing WLS announcer Hal Culver is thinking of moving into a big house this summer to allow more opportunity to follow his hobby, raising Kerry Blue terriers . . . If your eyes get bloodshot when you listen to Cincinnati's "Avalon Time," it's because this show on the NBC-Red network features not only "Red" Foley and "Red" Skelton but also a vocalist, Janette, who has flaming-red hair . . . Skip Farrell and Emily Vass, who sing duets on the "Barn Dance," make a fine-looking young couple at the microphone, and maybe they're beginning to think they'd look all right together in other surroundings . . . It's almost the "Inside Story" of Omaha. Three important men connected with the NBC "Inside Story" show, engineer Bob Jensen, announcer Paul Luther and character actor Ray Suber got their start at Omaha, Nebr.

#### News Notes

It was shocking news to their associates and friends, as well as listeners, that young CBS announcer Don Hancock and his wife, with their two children, were involved in an automobile accident while returning from a trip into Indiana. At the present writing, Don's eldest son, eight years old, appears to be the only one seriously injured, although all were battered. Dick Post did the pinch-hitting on the air for Don.

The curtain has rung down on the series of dramas enacted by Bert Lytell over NBC-Blue on Friday nights; it is succeeded by a third "Vocal Varieties" show, sponsored by the same company and featuring Jerry Cooper, popular baritone.

It's a big tribute to a local program and to Tommy Dorsey's new magazine, "Bandstand," that WCFL received almost 25,000 replies in five days to an offer on Eddie Chase's "Make-Believe Danceland" of a subscription to Dorsey's new publication. Mail was received from 1,250 towns in nineteen states and Canada.

Does Don McNeill's "Breakfast Club" have such a loyal and tremendous audience—unless one big reason is that it's clean as well as jolly? Have I neglected until recently giving you more news and pictures of the lesser-publicized sustaining artists, if it isn't because you're just now beginning to make your wishes known? Isn't MBS' "Curtain Time" given more recognition as an excellent dramatic program? Do so many people listen regularly to Mutual's "Your Sunday Date" and "Pageant of Melody" unless it's because they're outstanding musical programs?

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#### Crossroads Court of Honor

Nominating this week for recognition for outstanding radio achievement NBC's versatile man-of-all-roles Art Kohl. You don't hear his real name often, but he turns out fine performances in many regular and special parts. His work includes "Girl Alone," "Mary Marlin," "Lights Out," "Story of the Month," "Inside Story," and many others. Art is slightly over forty, got his dramatic start in the A. E. F., and he's a mighty nice guy. A toast to Art and his art.

Daylight-saving time goes into effect on April 30. This will mean a change in the time that network programs reach communities where daylight-saving time is not observed.

Time now indicated on these pages as "Eastern" is Eastern Standard Time. After April 30, this will be Eastern Daylight Time and you will have to subtract one hour to get Eastern Standard Time (also Central Daylight Saving Time), two hours to get Central Standard Time, three hours to get Mountain Standard Time, four hours to get Pacific Standard Time. Therefore, if you live in a community that does not observe daylight saving time, make the necessary deductions after April 30, according to the above formula, and you won't miss a thing.

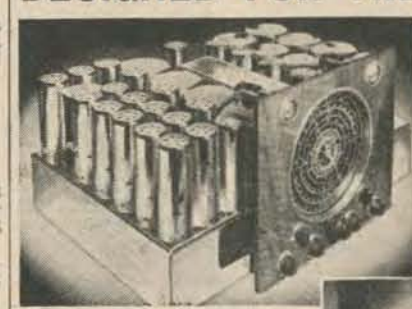

IN PREPARATION for the Olympic Games which are to be held in Finland in 1940, the government of that country has placed an order with the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company for the supply and erection of a 50,000-watt short-wave broadcasting station to be installed at Pori near the Gulf of Bothnia. This transmitter, which will rank in power with those at Daventry, England; Zeesen, Germany, and Rome, Italy, will be used to keep the world informed on the various events connected with the Olympic Games. It had been announced earlier that the Olympic Games broadcasts would be made over the German short-wave stations.

The South African Broadcasting Corporation notifies me that the new call letters for their short-wave stations are as follows: ZTD (4.876) and ZRO (9.752), Durban; ZRG (9.523) and ZRH (6.007), Pretoria; ZRL (9.606) and ZRK (6.0975), Capetown, and ZRJ (6.0975) of Johannesburg.

Herbert Campbell of Athens, Pa., the first listener to report a verification from ZAA, the new station at Tirana, Albania, states that this transmitter operates on a frequency of 7.85 megs, daily from 6:30 to 7:30 a.m. and on a frequency of 6.085 megs, daily from noon to 1 p.m. EST. Reports should be sent to Stacioni Radiotelegrafik, Tirana, Albania.

The North American transmissions from Tokyo, Japan, heard in this country daily from 7 to 7:30 a.m. and from 8 to 8:30 p.m. EST, are now being broadcast over JZK (15.16) and JZL (17.785), respectively. News in English from Prague (Bohemia) is now being broadcast daily at 1:40, 4:20 and 9:30 p.m. EST, over OLR4A (11.84).

Fred Norris of New York, N. Y., has received a letter from the chief engineer of "Radio Eireann," near Athlone, Ireland, which gives the present operating schedule of the new station as follows: Daily, on 17.84 megs, from 8:30 to 10 a.m. and on 17.84 or 9.595 megs (alternate days), from 12:30 to 4:30 p.m. EST. Irregular tests are also being conducted on 11.74 megs. Station officials are very anxious to receive reception reports from all parts of North America.

W2XE of New York City, N. Y., is now operating on its new frequency of 9.65 megs, daily except Saturdays and Sundays, from 10:30 p.m. to 1 a.m. EST. The Latin station on 9.71 megs, reported as a new Colombian HKF, is according to John Larsen of Geneva, N. Y., a harmonic of HJ3CAF (4.855) of Bogota. In line with the new French policy of installing powerful short-wave stations at strategic points throughout its colonies, two new 10,000-watt transmitters are now under construction at Dakar, Senegal. IABA (9.65) at Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, may frequently be heard in the eastern part of the United States, for a half-hour or so before it signs off at 3 p.m. EST. The Milwaukee Journal of Milwaukee, Wis., has been granted permission to construct a new 500-watt high-frequency station to operate on 31.6, 35.6 and 41 megs. The mystery station, believed to be in Corsica, is heard on 9.685 megs, from 11 a.m. to noon EST.

Hal Clein of Los Angeles, Calif., writes the commercial short-wave stations in the Belgian Congo are on the air as follows: OPM (10.33) and OPL (20) of Leopoldville, at 1 a.m. and 7 p.m. and OOF (13.25) of Stanleyville, at midnight and 11 a.m. EST.

Earl Roberts of Indianapolis, Ind., reports hearing a new short-wave station, identified as ZNS (6.09), at Nassau, Bahamas, off the coast of Florida, just before signing off at 9:43 p.m. EST, with the British anthem, "God Save the King." Dramatic Club and editor-in-chief of the *Harvard Illustrated Magazine*. He participated in French, German, Greek and English plays, was president of the Cosmopolitan Club and vice-president of Deutscher Verein. In those days they called him Hans von Kaltenborn. There was no animosity between America and Germany, and the aristocratic "von" meant something, even in America, for we hadn't gone haywire and never dreamed that we some day would try to make Germany do as we do.

Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., and Robert E. Bogers were Kaltenborn's classmates.

He was graduated in 1905, and took a job tutoring Vincent Astor, first in Europe and then aboard the Astor yacht in the West Indies.

His first love of ink called him back to New York and he hooked on again with the *Eagle* and went up these steps—reporter, military news editor, Navy Yard reporter, city-hall reporter, general news reporter, Washington correspondent, war editor, foreign correspondent, dramatic editor, editorial writer, assistant magazine editor, associate editor.

Hey! You missed the sports desk and the obit page!

Kaltenborn made it a hard-and-fast rule to go abroad at least once a year to study the foreign scenes. In that way he kept abreast of the times, and when a foreign news story broke he could analyze it for the *Eagle*. Foreign news always has been of tremendous importance to New York papers, and years ago the *Eagle*, once one of the truly great papers of America, was known for its conservative, accurate presentation of foreign news. Kaltenborn unquestionably was responsible for that enviable reputation the old *Eagle* enjoyed.

In 1910, while returning from Europe, he met Baroness Olga von Nordenflycht on shipboard and they were married. Remember, his father had met his wife on shipboard and later Kaltenborn's only daughter, Anais, met her husband on shipboard.

Kaltenborn and his wife moved to a quiet, respectable street in Brooklyn and have lived in that borough ever since. Anais Kaltenborn was born twenty-seven years ago. She now is the wife of Attmore Robinson of Stony Brook, Long Island. They have one child, Erika.

The Kaltenborns' other child, Rolf, was born on June 12, 1915. He is a graduate of Harvard and is a member of the production staff of CBS. He handles the "We, the People" show, "The New York Philharmonic," "Music for Fun," "Exploring Music" and his father's 15-minute Sunday night commentary for General Mills.

More than twenty years ago the Kaltenborns moved into a dignified but commonplace three-story brown house in Brooklyn and have lived there without a break. Although the man is a globe-trotter, he has never moved his home since his children really were children. He is a sentimentalist about his home, which is at 9 Garden Place, Brooklyn.

When the war with Germany came, Kaltenborn dropped the "von" in his name and substituted the V as an initial. His knowledge of Europe made him a valuable asset to the *Eagle's* staff, but it was not until 1922 that he really began to be known outside of a few circles.

He always was interested in foreign doings, and in 1922 the factory studio

of WJZ in Newark, N. J., asked him to conduct a sort of a quiz on foreign affairs. About the same time, he began broadcasting over the Government station on Governor's Island.

As radio history goes, 1922 was the stone age and Kaltenborn was the pathfinder.

"My radio debut," he said, "was an extremely painful experience. The absence of an audience was appalling. The moment of silence between my extemporized sentences was terrifying. For two months I was greatly tempted to abandon my lifelong habit of extempore speaking, but I stuck it out despite a constantly recurring fear complex when facing the microphone. It required four months of regular radio work to put me at my ease."

Kaltenborn was well known on the lecture platform long before he was known as a radio commentator. He also was a writer with a large following and contributed rather consistently to the class magazines—*Scribner's*, the *New Outlook*, *World's Work*, etc. His articles dealt with politics and current events, domestic and foreign. His first book, "We Look at the World," was a fair-to-middling success.

His wanderlust and news nose took him to the four corners of the world. He had a regular spot on WEAJ as a commentator when he was in America, but he was not well known in the tank towns. To be blunt about it, such commentators as Hill, Thomas and Carter seemingly passed him by. Kaltenborn had a select audience, but he was not known to the man on the street.

During the 1920's he was often in Russia, and is the only American ever permitted to speak extemporaneously over the Comintern station at Moscow. He was, and is, a quiet, reserved man, the kind of whom one would say, "Nothing ever happens to him."

It was in China in 1927 when the proper Mr. Kaltenborn fell from his dignity. He had his choice of unbending or losing his head. The folks way back in China didn't like Mr. Kaltenborn's looks, what with the pince-nez and all. They reckoned he was a Communist, inasmuch as Reds wear morning trousers and monocles. So they grabbed Mr. Kaltenborn and asked some questions. They were not satisfied with his replies and pointed guns and swords and other unhealthy things at his head. He explained that he was a member of the glorious free press of America. It didn't mean a thing to those fellows.

It was looking rather black for Mr. Kaltenborn. Foreigners were not welcome in China's interior in 1927. But Mr. Kaltenborn, the man of the minute, salved everything. He picked up a handful of oranges and juggled them. The Chinese were pleased. Hereafter, juggling should be on the course of study of every school of journalism.

Then Mr. Kaltenborn snatched a straw from a stack and balanced it, just one straw, on his rather dignified nose. The Chinese howled with delight and dropped their guns. He was never in danger thereafter on that trip. Every time some Chinese yokels poked guns at him and asked questions, he balanced a straw on his nose.

Years later, when talking about himself, which is no ordeal for him, Mr. Kaltenborn said, "I have never been a professional entertainer, although many people find me entertaining."

Maybe he was thinking about the Chinese.

nearer to each other. The malady is misanthropy, for it does not spring from either hatred or contempt of mankind. Those who suffer from it do not fear the evils which their fellow creatures may bring upon them, but they fear the disillusionment which generally follows upon intimacy."

Fourteen years they shared each other's hopes, fears, worries, joys and sorrows . . . in letters. Peter expatiated upon his family, told Nadejda of his mother, dead of cholera; his sister; his four brothers, two of whom, the twins, Modeste and Anatol, he adored and looked after like a father. He laughed about his early struggles in the Ministry of Justice, when he was so absent-minded he developed a habit of chewing bits of paper and almost chewed an official document in half. He told her of his hesitant decision to become a musician, of his feeling that sooner or later he would exchange the civil service for music. It had come sooner than he had hoped. The genius so long dormant burst into flame, and by 1865 he was already professor of musical theory at the Moscow Conservatory, with only four years of study behind him.

Now (1876), after eleven years, he had already created three symphonies, several operas, the "Romeo and Juliet" and "Francesca da Rimini" fantasies, the glittering B flat minor piano concerto, "The Tempest," and a quantity of smaller pieces. Altogether they represented a safe outlet for his emotions but resulted in scant financial profits.

Nadejda gave Peter a glimpse of a brighter future. But it was not until the tragic crash of his disastrous marriage the following year that she opened the door wide. Pursued by a lovesick young woman, Antonina Miliukoff, Tschaikowsky, in a moment of weakness, asked her to marry him so that he might gratify his family's wish to see him "settled down."

A fortnight after the marriage he knew he had made the mistake of his life and that he could not live with Antonina. He fled to his sister. Only once thereafter did he rejoin his wife, but ran away after a few days, first trying to die by drenching himself in the icy river with the hope of catching pneumonia. Followed a dire physical and mental collapse. From Switzerland, where he went to recuperate, Peter wrote the whole tragic story to Nadejda. And she came to the rescue in the best way she knew how, with the offer of a yearly pension of \$3,000, setting him free for the work he loved best. Nothing could have been of more benefit to the desperately sick man, and she saved his life and his reason.

His subsequent resignation from the conservatory and his freedom from financial worries stimulated the creative urge in him even more than ever before, and in the next fourteen years he was to write his fourth and fifth symphonies, the operas "Eugene Onegin" and "Jeanne d'Arc," the "1812" overture (that exciting evocation of Napoleon's Pyrrhic victory), the "Violin Concerto," and a whole list of lesser works.

As his fame grew, his long trips through western Europe combined business with pleasure. He became more and more in demand to conduct his own works. These tours were an urgent necessity for him, driven as he was by a periodical need to get away from cold and gloomy Russia. But once over the border, he pined again with homesickness, feverishly awaiting the moment when he would be home

again. His impressions of the foreign visits he set down faithfully in letters to Nadejda, and particularly interesting are his opinions of contemporary composers. Brahms was "cold and full of pretense"; Wagner "could have been a great symphonist"; "The Ring of the Nibelung" seemed "incredible nonsense" though with "delightful moments"; but "Tristan and Isolde" "bored me to death." Mozart and Glinka were Tschaikowsky's great passions in music — Mozart because of his pure style and Glinka for his nationalistic use of Russian folk-music.

In 1891 came the invitation from New York. But on this trip Nadejda no longer shared his thoughts. The year before, in a curt letter, she had informed him that her finances were impaired and she could no longer continue his pension. Tschaikowsky answered at once, reassuring her of his devotion in spite of her inability to supply him with funds. Almost immediately, however, he learned that she had not told the truth: her financial situation was the same as always. Shocked and hurt, deeply humiliated and utterly bewildered, Tschaikowsky saw himself suddenly as the cast-off plaything of a rich woman. He never fully recovered from the disillusionment, although financially it did him no harm, as he had been given a state subsidy by the czar. Tschaikowsky learned later that Mme. von Meck was suffering from a mental illness which eventually caused her death (three months after his). But he never forgave her.

UNDER the influence of grief at his sister's passing (just before his American trip) and Nadejda's conduct, he wrote the "Pathétique" symphony, his last and possibly supreme composition. There are some who read into the music a fatal premonition, but they could say the same of others of his works that also mirror the overpowering fear of death which was always with him.

Actually, death claimed him during one of the rare periods when he had shaken off his dread. On November 2, 1893 (when Moscow had an epidemic of cholera), he said, laughing: "Time enough before we need meet that ugly, snubnosed one. We can all wait awhile . . . and as for me, I know I have a long time to live."

Next day he drank the fatal glass of unboiled water . . . certain carrier of cholera germs. Four days later he died.

Strange, aloof, sensitive, timid creature of bottomless despairs and heavenly exaltations, the world came to adore his music without ever learning much about the man except from his sheafs of published letters. His compositions sounded in every home and concert hall. Even the critics were impressed, although (running true to form) they deprecated the restless abundance of the material he put out, the rapidity with which he wrote, his lack of severe self-criticism and sometimes of taste.

But the public has its own standards. Tschaikowsky's luscious melodies, irresistible passion and glow, and brilliance of orchestration swept him into their hearts, and there he remains, secure among the immortals.

Tucker warbling "Some of These Days." The audience was hysterical at McWilliams' very funny and fast-thinking antics and watching the man for whose benefit he put on the act. The poor fellow was sitting there bleary-eyed and looking all around not knowing what it was all about. It couldn't have been funnier if it had been pre-arranged. More about the broadcast next week.

Next stop was in the CBS Playhouse across the street to watch and listen to the Raymond Paige broadcast. Although I've raved about Paige's music before, this particular program was a great disappointment, especially his rendition of "Rhythm of the Rumba." A few seconds before the broadcast hit the air, announcer Dan Seymour introduced Paige, who walked out on the stage, tripping over one of the microphone wires as he bowed. The huge stage was jammed with musicians who just about had enough elbow room to move around, but when one of the music-makers dropped his instrument during the broadcast, he got a dirty look from the ork pilot. Hildegard looked delightful in a veddy low-cut evening gown, and when she was up in front of the mike, all eyes were upon her. After the broadcast, a CBS executive invited us to watch her work at the Savoy Plaza, where she is appearing nightly, because I stated in a previous column that I wasn't impressed with her voice. He wanted to bet I'd change my mind after I saw her perform away from a radio studio. Frankly, you wouldn't think it was the same person, and although I still feel Hildegard doesn't have a great voice, I'm convinced she has one of the greatest personalities I've ever seen. You forget about voice when you watch her, which should make her a big star when television turns that corner.

The next night I was back in the same playhouse to witness the Andre Kostelanetz-Walter O'Keefe program with Grace Moore as guestar. The only fault I have to find with this program is that it does not feature enough of the expert Kostelanetz sweet music. According to the mail I receive, many listeners seem to agree. Not that Walter O'Keefe isn't funny—it's just that the unusual Kostelanetz arrangements are more enjoyable. Getting back to the broadcast, Walter O'Keefe put the audience in a good mood with a few amusing stories before the show went on the air, and then made one of Kosty's trombone players stand up and take a bow because he held a winning sweepstakes ticket. Although he's taken an awful lot of razzing from the other musicians in the orchestra, I'd just as soon be in his position and take the dough. Backstage, after the broadcast, Lily Pons, who is Kosty's severest critic, called her husband to tell him how much she enjoyed the program. I asked the conductor if she called after every program and he replied that she hadn't failed yet. "Even when she was out in Hollywood making a picture," he added, "she'd hold up production to take time out to listen to my program and then put in a call as soon as it was over."

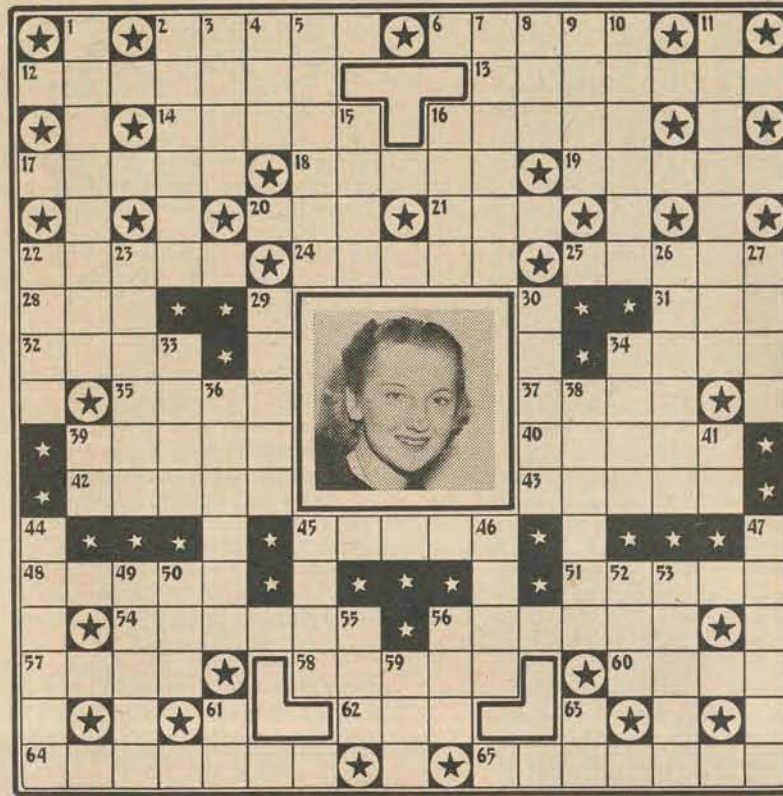

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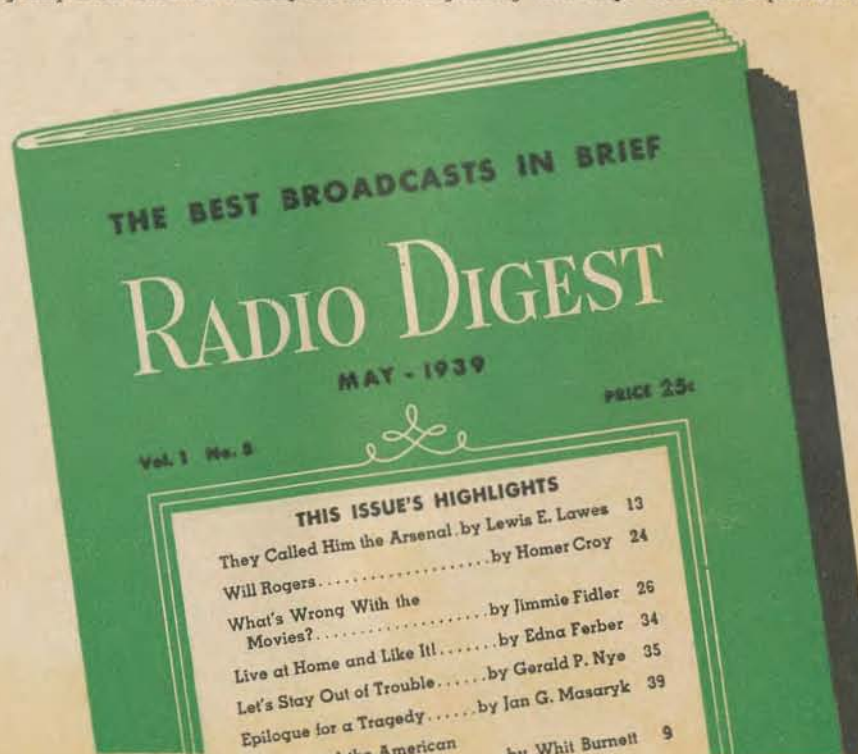

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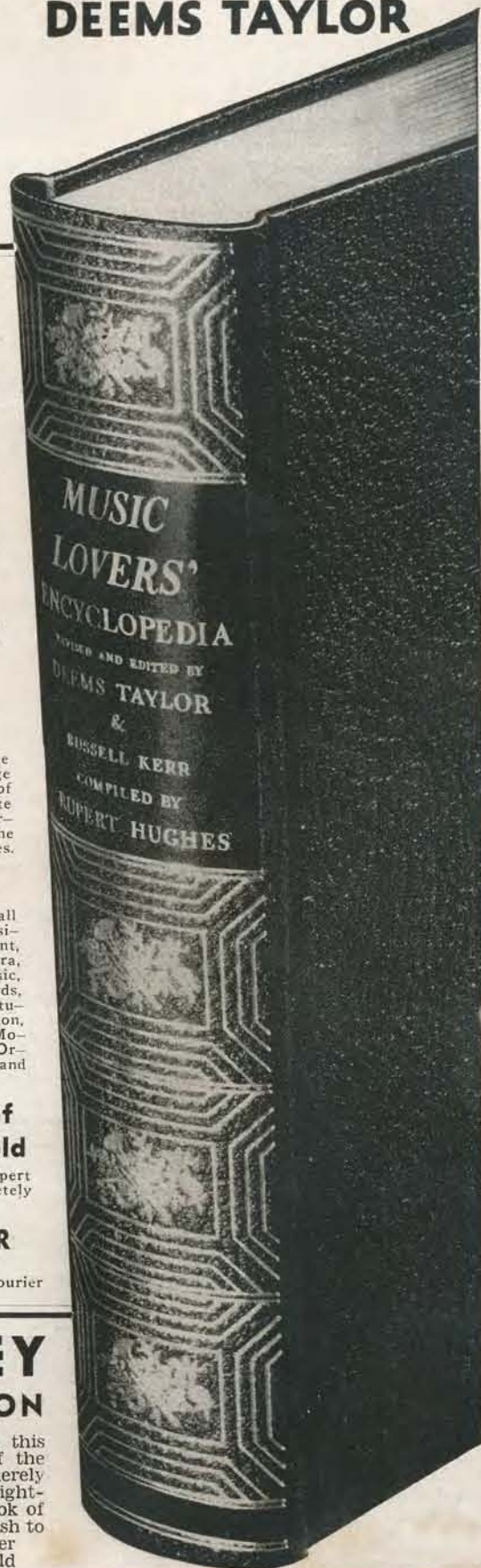
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
