# Radio and the New York World's Fair

A GUEST EDITORIAL

By Grover A. Whalen

PRESIDENT, NEW YORK WORLD'S FAIR, 1939

**W**ORD of the New York World's Fair of 1939 has penetrated to even the most remote outposts of civilization—thanks to radio broadcasting. Radio, indeed, has already gone to new record coverage on behalf of the exposition, particularly in the case of the Howard Hughes-New York World's Fair round-the-world flight, which since its day has frequently been called the greatest single event ever covered by radio.

Tallies from available radio logs show that the flight won for itself a total of more than 360 broadcast periods in this country alone. The figure is exclusive of regular commentator or news periods and of periods given by miscellaneous stations. The Fair's radio department puts it in these words: "Probably no broadcasting station in the world—commercial, governmental or amateur—failed to come in with word of the Hughes-Fair flight."

That is but one example of the recognition accorded New York World's Fair ventures. The limits have not yet been reached, by any means. The Fair is just opening. Which means we will afford a greater concentration of things and events to talk about than the world has known heretofore.

The most pretentious radio program ever devised made its initial bow on January 1. It was a program every radio man had dreamed about; a program mere money could not buy. Only love of a cause or universal enlistment in a mutually profitable venture could have commanded such talent, such coverage and such speakers as kings, queens and prime ministers or other heads of governments. In the United States and in Canada hundreds of stations carried the program each week.

Unheard-of coverage! We called that program over three national networks the "Salute of Nations."

With the opening of the exposition, radio will also start a program, "Salute of the States to the New York World's Fair." Obviously, 1939 is going to be a year in radio that'll be worth watching. Many of the Fair's industrial exhibitors are completing their plans for broadcasting. Television is going to make its real debut at the Fair—and what a pity it is that the machines aren't already in general use.

The coverage granted the Fair by radio is all the more phenomenal in that the Fair corporation does not have, and cannot have, an advertising budget such as would permit the buying of either paper-space or time on the air. Under the circumstances, the Fair corporation is more than grateful; it is heartened to go on with its endeavors, for the periods granted by radio form a

magnificent tribute to the exposition with its aim of promoting world trade, world understanding and world peace.

The Fair, as is indicated by all surveys, is going to attract anywhere from sixty million to seventy million visitors. It is sure to cause the greatest travel period in history. An exposition of such magnitude could not have been brought into being without radio. It could not be handled during operation without radio.

This means no slight to the efficacy of the newspaper or the periodical press, which have

been of invaluable aid to our cause. They too have set new records of coverage in presenting news, features and photographs. Radio, nevertheless, offers the only medium through which the world may hear our voice. The exposition is an international project whose ramifications extend to the ends of the earth. It needs the most rapid means of communication. It needs an instantly available voice, and that is what radio has provided.

## Stations Beware

We can look across the Rio Grande for a sample of what happens to station managers and their radio stations when a long-suffering public really starts to brood about rotten program service.

This Mexican station was XETH, a 1,000-watter at Pueblo City, and its programs were principally the playing of records. Early in April, a crowd gathered in Pueblo and marched on the station. They caught and beat up the manager. They broke all the records in the place. They tore out wires and broke up equipment. They were going to set the building on fire, when the police arrived.

After listening to some American programs, we're of the reluctant opinion that those Mexicans have got something there.

## Kate Smith Sings

Kate Smith was a Washington, D. C., girl. One of her earliest public performances, as all who read the James Street story of her life recently published in RADIO GUIDE know, was for some French soldiers during the World War. In her heart there has always been a flaming love of liberty and country.

One of the supreme emotional experiences to be offered by radio today is her singing of "God Bless America," the song which Irving Berlin wrote and Kate introduced. She has sung it many times, but she should sing it every Thursday night. Such a message should be repeated over and over. Some have suggested that an appropriate ending for any program is the "Star-Spangled Banner." We demur in favor of Kate Smith singing "God Bless America."

These are the words:

*God bless America, land that I love.*

*Stand beside her and guide her through the night with light from above.*

*From the mountains to the prairies, To the ocean, white with foam, God bless America, my home, sweet home.*

# HOW POISON NEWS GETS INTO YOUR HOME

Poison News May Cover Many  
Fields—Crime, Labor, or War.  
This First of a Series is Startling

## No. 1. WAR PROPAGANDA

"GIVE me two weeks and the proper machinery and I'll change the so-called mind of the American public on any given subject."

So said George Creel, head of the United States propaganda service during the World War. Mr. Creel knows whereof he speaks. It was his "Committee on Public Information" that sold America on making the world safe for democracy, and it is the precedents and techniques established by him that will sell America the idea of saving the world from the dictators. With this difference: Today, propagandists have a new weapon, a weapon far deadlier than anything they knew in 1914-1918. Today, they have radio. And when the next war crashes down on a stricken world—at most, a matter of months now—radio will do more than any other single agency to work up the proper degree of hatred and savagery.

For wartime propaganda, radio is a natural—a honey. It's the answer to the warmonger's prayer. And in the next war, for the first time, radio is going to get a real workout. Radio will be the second world war's contribution to the science of combat.

That's the way with wars. They progress, they go forward, just like everything else. In medieval times, only professional soldiers fought wars. They fought for money, they fought according to set rules. There is on record, for instance, a full-dress battle fought between mounted men, a battle involving thousands and lasting four

hours, in which only one combatant was killed—he fell from his horse and was trampled to death!

But all that changed, as time went on. Gunpowder came along. Soldiers didn't shoot arrows from yew bows any more. They shot ugly lead bullets. Our own Civil War started with muzzle-loading rifles, ended with breech-loaders—a great contribution enabling one man to kill at least five times as many of the enemy as he had before. The Spanish War brought the Gatling gun. The first World War brought poison gas and the land battleship, or tank. The Spanish Civil War has showed us the splendid potentialities of the airplane as a destroyer of civilians. The second world war will demonstrate the effectiveness of radio as an aid and incentive to the slaughter.

Today, as you read this, you probably don't want war. You will probably even say you hate war. Almost anyone will say that. Adolf Hitler himself, more than any other one man responsible for the cataclysmic horror the world faces today, has said over and over again that he wants peace. So you don't want war. You won't fight. Let them have it out in Europe, you say, but they'll have to get along without me. I'm not having any.

All right. Suppose that war is declared tomorrow. It's England and France against Germany and Italy. You're sitting peacefully at your radio, listening, we'll say, to Jack Benny, when—bang!—in the middle of a gag Benny goes off the air and a station announcer comes on. For once, the dramatic overtones in his voice are

justified; for once, he says "Flash!" and means it.

"Ladies and gentlemen, we interrupt this program to bring you a special bulletin! London, England: Without warning or notification of any kind, hundreds of planes, thought to be German, appeared over London tonight and began a savage bombardment. The attack started about an hour ago, has continued without cessation, and the central part of the city is apparently already in ruins . . . It is impossible to tell as yet how many have been killed, but the number is certainly in the thousands . . . The attacking planes, flying high above the clouds, are having no difficulty in finding their target, and the anti-aircraft fire is ineffective against them . . . High explosives, incendiary and gas bombs are being used . . . The National Broadcasting Company is making every effort to bring you a broadcast from London and may be able to do so in a few minutes. Keep tuned to this station!"

"IS THAT what you told Fred Allen, Jack?" Mary Livingstone hasn't heard about the war yet, but somehow it isn't very funny. You don't listen. You light a cigarette with shaking fingers. So this is it! So those blankety-blanks have started it, have they!

"Ladies and gentlemen! The National Broadcasting Company interrupts this program to bring you a broadcast

direct from London, England! Come in, London!"

The man in London seems to be crying. He's an Englishman, but his clipped Oxford accent has lost its authority, its assurance. In back of his voice you can hear the dull "wharoom!" of the bombs.

"I don't know what to say, really," the man begins. "I don't even know if you can hear me . . . This is perfectly frightful . . . There must be ten thousand dead in the city of London by this time. I myself have seen at least five hundred killed . . . not two minutes ago, looking out of a window, I saw a bomb strike squarely in the middle of a crowd . . . they were blown literally to bits. There is no one left of that crowd; there is nothing there but a great, gaping hole in the pavement; the pavement is running with blood . . . and between the crashes of the bombs one can hear nothing but awful, ghastly, continuous screaming. Those poor people down there, those poor people screaming in the puddles of their own blood . . . This is the worst catastrophe the world has ever seen. This is the most terrible thing that has ever happened to the world . . . I saw a little girl down there pick her own hand off the pavement and try to put it back on her wrist, she bled to death before my eyes . . . and . . ."

"Ladies and gentlemen: You have been listening to a broadcast from Lon-

don, England, this moment under attack by German bombing-planes. Due to circumstances beyond our control . . ."

Now what do you think? Still going to let 'em fight it out by themselves? Or is there a small, still voice down there in the back of your mind saying, "Why, those dirty dogs! I'd like to get my hands on one of those baby-killing bums." No? It isn't that way with you? Well, be patient. It will be. This is just the beginning. You'll come around. Radio will see to that.

**T**O UNDERSTAND why radio is the perfect, all-time Utopian propaganda instrument, we must understand just what propaganda itself is like. It's a word that's been much maligned. To most of us, the word "propaganda" is synonymous with the word "lies." It isn't as simple as all that. Propaganda, dictionary-defined as "an organized effort or system for the dissemination of information," is also a science. It almost deserves the ranking of an exact science, so positive, so accurate are its workings in the hands of the expert.

A first-line practising expert of today is Dr. Joseph Paul Goebbels of Germany. Says he: "If any statement, no matter how untruthful, be repeated often enough, the mass of the people will believe it. This is stark fact."

That's the basic principle of all propaganda. Keep it coming. Tell 'em often. Repeat, repeat, repeat. Another pri-

mary principle is this: The best propaganda is the simplest propaganda. Don't permit the people to think; that's fatal. Frederick the Great, a pioneer propagandist, once said, "If my soldiers ever started thinking, not one of them would stay in the ranks."

The primer of propaganda has a lot of rules like that. You must always be positive, for instance. The strident voice of the propagandist must never quaver; it might let a little doubt seep into the minds of his listeners. Propaganda must appeal, always, to the basic emotions—love of country, love of women, the passion for possession, and so on. Nor need it restrict its appeal to these homely, basically constructive ideals. Propaganda designed to build up the war fever is keyed to the most brutal and sinister passions. "The only reason I can cheat people," says the confidence man, "is that ninety-nine people out of a hundred have larceny in their souls. You can't cheat an honest man." Similarly, you can't make a soldier out of a peaceful man. He'd rather go to Leavenworth. But only a few of us are genuinely peaceful. The wish to kill is thinly veneered in most humans. It takes a lot of policemen to hold America down to 10,000 murders a year.

Appeal to the good in man, and appeal to the bad in him, says the propagandist, but stick close to what he

NEW YORK.—Edwin C. Hill is slated to pinch-hit for Walter Winchell during the month of July while the columnist takes his annual vacation . . . When Matty Malneck's orchestra replaces Eddy Duchin, the program will shift from NBC to CBS, taking over two quarter-hour periods a week following Amos 'n' Andy. Morton Downey does not go with the new set-up . . . NBC also loses "Your Family and Mine," which moves to CBS on Monday . . . Abbott and Costello, comics of the Kate Smith show, have already been set on the program for next season at a big increase in salary. They go into a Broadway show in a few weeks . . . Tommy Riggs and Betty Lou start their summer vacation after the broadcast of May 27, and are scheduled to return about the end of August . . . "Vox Pop" goes off for the hot-weather months around the end of June . . . Rudy Vallee will be back in New York in a couple of weeks to open an engagement at the Astor Roof on May 22 . . . When Kay Kyser goes to the Coast in a few weeks he probably will do some work in the movie studios. Several picture companies have made offers for Kay and his band . . . Artie Shaw's sickness caused him to lose plenty of do re mi—and I'm not singing the scale. He was off the Benchley program for a couple of weeks and had to cancel quite a few engagements he had lined up . . . CBS announcer Mel Allen leaves the Monday night "Pipe Smoking Time" program after working on the show for three years . . . Maxine Gray returned to sing with the Hal Kemp crew. Incidentally, Maxine made a settlement with the railroad company for injuries sustained in the train accident while traveling with the band.

Remember I told you last week that Jimmy Lunceford had invited fifteen boys, who had announced they didn't go for his music, to be his special guests at a broadcast of Columbia's "Dance Hour"? Well, it seems that when the broadcast was over Jimmy had a special playing-engagement at a swank night-spot, and he took the fifteen boys along with him. It was a great night for all of them, and as to what they think of Lunceford's music now—well, the boys reversed their decision . . . There was some sensational impromptu entertainment at Kate Smith's rehearsal Thursday afternoon. Tap-dancing Bill Robinson and members of the current "Hot Mikado" were there to guest on the show, and when Johnny Williams' Swing Ensemble started beating out its hot rhythm the boys couldn't contain themselves. Johnny hadn't gotten through one chorus before three of the "Hot Mikado" guests were out in the aisle shagging and truckin' to a fare-thee-well. Then Bill Robinson topped it all off by jumping up on the stage and running through as nice a dance routine as I've seen in many a year . . . Raymond Scott's number, "Peter Tambourine," is named after his clarinet player, Peter Pumiglio, who also plays the tambourine in the piece. The first time the Scott Quintet aired the tune on "Hit Parade" they discovered at rehearsal that the tambourine sounded too tinny over the mike, so Peter used Scott's plaid sports jacket to deaden the sound. When they had run through the number, a young enthusiast came bounding up from the audience and clapped Pumiglio on the back. "That was great," he exclaimed, "but what's the idea of resting the tambourine on a blanket?"

Ran into Bess Johnson, star of "Hilltop House," at Columbia's Seventh Avenue studio the first of



the week looking hale and hearty after a two-week rest. According to the script she was lost some place in Canada after an airplane crash, but she didn't get that healthy tan in Canada. She was really in Venezuela basking in the tropical sun . . . Walked in at a Whiteman rehearsal just as Paul's Socktette was running through "Heat Wave." It's not right, according to Boss Whiteman. They work on it some more,

and it's still not right. They run through it again, for about the fourth time. Paul says it sounds better and goes into the control-booth to listen. The Socktette plays it again. Shouts Paul, "I'll buy that one," which is just his quaint way of saying the number is set . . . Bob Ripley had two crippled baseball players on his "Believe It Or Not" program last week. Emery Ray Moyer, from Germantown, Ohio, is a victim of infantile paralysis and pitches from a sitting position, winning seventeen out of nineteen games last year. The other boy, Jimmy Hill, lost both of his legs in a train accident, but he still manages a semi-professional ball club in Muncie, Indiana—and he batted .330 last year. Ripley brought the two boys to New York more than a week in advance of their program appearance so they could have a good time doing the town, and so they could be here for the opening of the baseball season . . . Dropped in last week on a broadcast of Columbia's "Her Honor, Nancy James" and found a group of boys and girls from the Bronx House, a settlement house, visiting the program, which is based on settlement-house work. I learned that the author, David Victor, once lived at the Bronx House, where he got his idea and the background material for the script.

## This Is No Bulloney

The men who are in Dave Elman's animal department had quite a problem on their hands last week when they brought a 900-pound bull all the way from Memphis, Tennessee, for presentation on "Hobby Lobby," together with its owner, H. E. (He) Mann, whose hobby is lifting the bull. First off, they had to find quarters for the animal; secondly, they had to satisfy a squad of ASPCA men; and thirdly, they had to find a suitable place to stage the bull-lifting stunt. A stable was rented, the ASPCA men gave their assent, and then Elman's cohorts went to work on the third problem. # YOKEL BOY MAKES GOOD

Bob Burns' Gab is the Humor  
of the South--Slow and Easy  
Like The Old Arkansas River

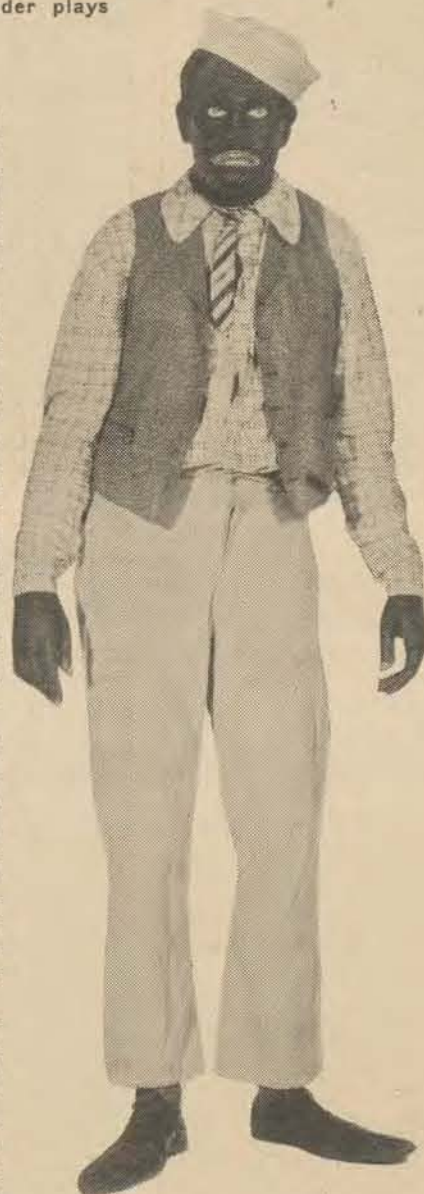


Youthful Robin Burns is about to die at the hand of a fiendish pirate in one of those younger-generation blood-and-thunder plays

**T**HERE never will be another Will Rogers, and the day that the Hollywood hierarchy and Bob Burns realized that self-evident truth—then, and only then, did the Pipe Piper of the Ozarks strike the mother lode after plugging for peanuts for more than thirty years.

Brother Burns got in the show and show-off business back when the Taft depression (we called 'em panics in those days) was blamed for America's economic stupidity, and he has been in and out of it ever since. He's really a city slicker who made good in the country. He has been everywhere and has done about everything. He has been washed up and wrung dry time and again. The movies kicked him around. The smart boys of radio said he couldn't pull his weight in the selling game called broadcasting. He has taken a terrible beating from life, seeing its seamy side and now its satin side. They tried to make him something he is not: first, a blackface dunce, then another Will Rogers, then a whiny and rather boring hillbilly. But eventually they let him be what he really is—a humorist, not a comic; a showman who gives us gab and not gags, a mixture of Opie Read and Irvin Cobb and all those sentimental and easy-going Scotch-Irish of the South who never drape finsel on their humor; men who take time to tell their stories because the folks take time to listen.

There is a vast difference in the humor of America. Burns' gab is not hillbilly wit, it's river humor, slow and deep. The South has been belly-laughing at such fun for a hundred years. The nation's humor finally is taking on a southern accent, thanks to Burns. The South could never see anything funny in that "Who was that lady I seen you with" thing. But the South will chuckle at the ancient story of the Yankee missionary and the river captain. The cap'n

was a mite hard on his Negro roustabouts and the Yankee demanded, "Don't you think a Negro has a soul?"

The cap'n said, "If a niggah ain't got a soul, it's the only thing a white man ever had that a niggah didn't get."

And Brother Burns has brought the humor of the South to the nation's understanding. Will Rogers' humor was western, sharp and tangy. Burns' humor is slow and easy like the Arkansas River, near which he was born.

**T**HERE have been many Arkansas Travelers. The original was a man who roamed the state on a horse, fiddling for the folks. The next Travelers were the Little Rock baseball club. But the headline-writers ruined them by calling them the Pebbles, or Pebs, to make them fit in type. The next Arkansas Traveler was a truck that rambled the highroads. The last and best was Burns. He is the Arkansas Traveler, a weaver of stories. There are two other roles he should take—Davy Crockett, a teller of tall tales and a fighting man, and Steam-

boat Bill, steaming up the Mississippi.

The bazooka has been shoved into the background. Grandpa Snazy is getting old, but Burns has just hit his stride. Folks no longer say, "He sort of reminds me of Will Rogers." He's already an institution, and he will be immortal in the theater. It took him a long time to get there, but there he is, perched on the ladder and looking down at the wise guys who said he couldn't do it.

He is an institution for which he owes thanks to radio. Not that radio saw his genius and helped him. Oh, no! Radio said he was no go, but he finally shoved his way in and the tycoons ate crow. Ho hum! The great discoverers of the movies and radio! Bunk! Nelson Eddy, Edgar Bergen, Don Ameche, Bob Burns, and many others—the powers turned thumbs down on them.

Radio is a conglomeration of salesmen, smoothies, loud-mouths, slickers. Brother Burns is the old drummer who comes to town on Thursday night, props his feet before the fire and spins

a yarn. He sells cheese. He's a star drummer, an A No. 1 salesman, but it took him thirty years to sell himself.

They will tell you down in change-the-name-of-Arkansas-hell-no! that Robin Burn is not a pure D razorback. He left Arkansas back when his whiskers were so soft he could put milk on his face and let the cat lick 'em off. He got his training in such hillbilly towns as New Orleans, Chicago, Paris and a few other flag-stops, including New York and Hollywood.

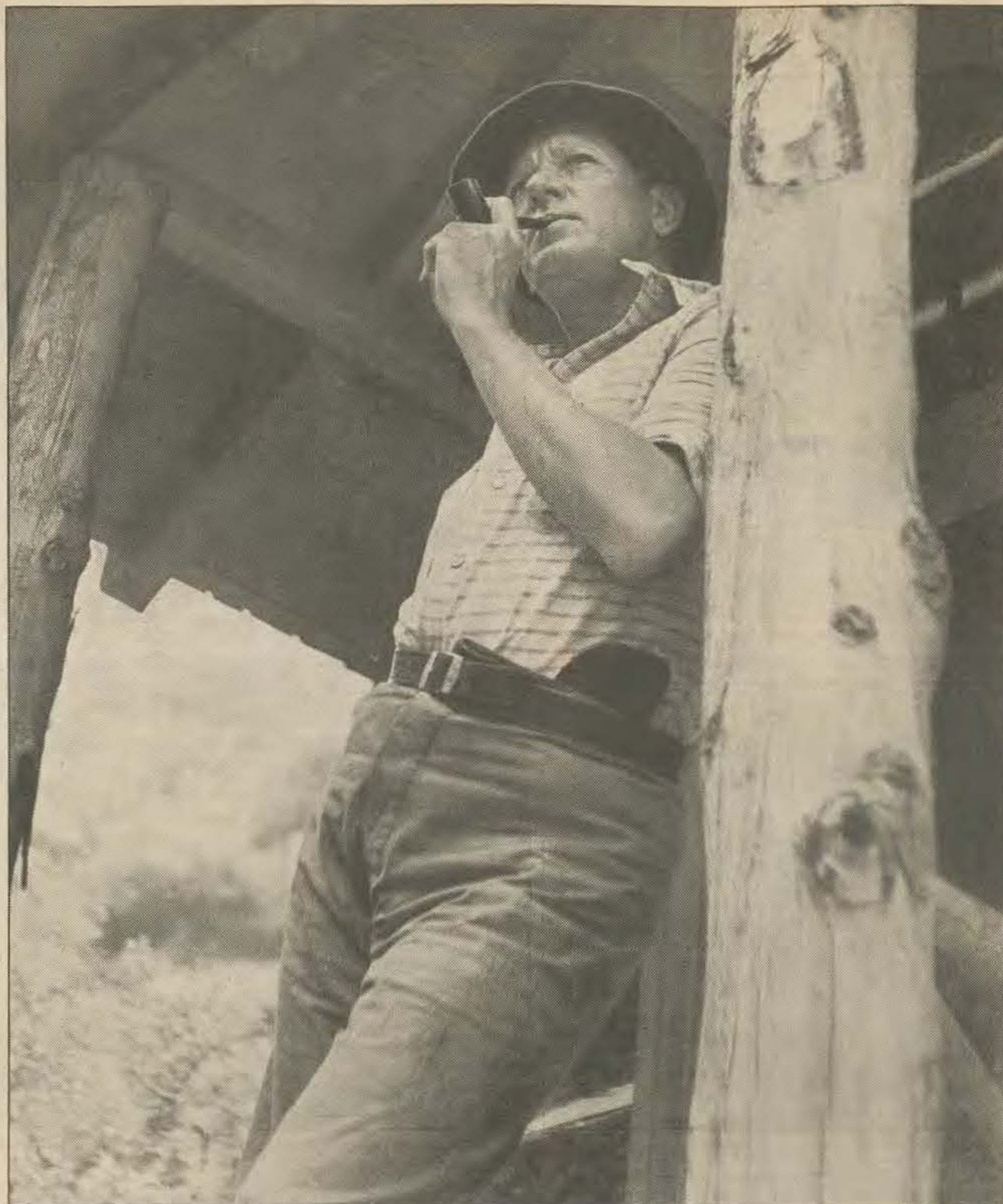
He was born Robin Burn on Broadway in Van Buren, Arkansas, August 2, 1896. Van Buren is the county seat of Crawford County and is in the foothills of the Ozarks. It was a bustling town, even then, just across the Arkansas River from Fort Smith. Down the river a piece are London, Dardanelle, Moscow, England and Gethsemane, if that will help you any.

Robin's father was resident civil engineer for the Arkansas Central Railroad. He was never a prosperous man, but the family "had enough," whatever "enough" is. Robin's mother anted to the family's jackpot by taking in sewing. The Burn family—father, mother, Brother Farrar and Robin—lived on Broadway for several years. It was the old section of town, not far from the river. However, Van Buren, with a bit of the West in it, was never a snooty town and Robin wasn't looked down on because he came from across the tracks. He was a normal boy, rather gawky and apparently not too bright.

At six, he began to take mandolin lessons and had a crude knack for music. He picked up the banjo, guitar, saxophone and other instruments of the inquisition without much effort, and finally got to be fair-to-middling with the piano and cornet.

He was a Huck Finn at school and didn't do so well, preferring to spend his days on the Arkansas River where an old ferry, held together by the grace of gravity, ran between Van Buren and Fort Smith. Some folks say Robin was a river pilot at fourteen. Now that's going a bit too far. I'm never one to dash a good yarn, but don't pull our legs, dear press-agents. You durn near ruined Bob Burns by trying to make a Will Rogers out of him. And now that Mark Twain touch! Leave him alone. Let him be Bob Burns.

Robin used to ride that old ferry a heap, and hang around the skipper. Maybe he ran her across a few times.

Burns is still a hillbilly at heart despite his rise to fame and fortune. On the back lot at his luxurious Bel-Air place is a log cabin to which he retires at every opportunity, clad in his good old jeans

But all you had to do was point her nose at Fort Smith, yell for steam and let her buck. That doesn't make a man a pilot. River pilots, for the benefit of the records, are the most skilled navigators in the world. It takes years to be an A-1 pilot.

But Robin did have a hankering after the river. Most boys do. Rivers and railroads—it was a natural urge.

He did the things most small-town boys do: delivered papers and drug-store parcels, sold peanuts, toted water at the circus, played hooky, fished, got warts and tried to get them off with stump-water, and lazed along the river bank, building air-castles on mud.

Father Burn did better as the years rolled by and the family moved to a better home. Mother Burn quit taking in sewing and Robin got a cornet. He was a sensitive boy. Most boys are. In those dear, dead days there was none of this father-and-son-pal business. Paws were strict. Father Burn was never close to his boys. And Robin got the wanderlust early in life.

He was a natural tale-teller and was a humdinger at that flamboyant exaggeration so dear to the South. His favorite story was about the fellow who lined up several million grasshoppers and rebuked them for eating the crops—just gave 'em unshirted hell, lo'rated 'em! Put 'em in the dozens!

When the Van Buren Silver Cornet Band was organized to do joust w'ith music, Robin got the post of first cornetist. The band practised in a plumber's shop, and one night after practice Robin picked up two pieces of lead pipe, jammed them together, poked a funnel in one end and oomphed a sort of a tune on it. He called it a bazooka because it made a bazooka sound. It was no great triumph of instrument-making and did not make musical history. For years, southern musicians have made melody on lead pipes, tin cans, saws, jugs, and cigar-boxes with wire strung across them. The bazooka was good for a laugh. It was funny only because Robin Burn blew it. A

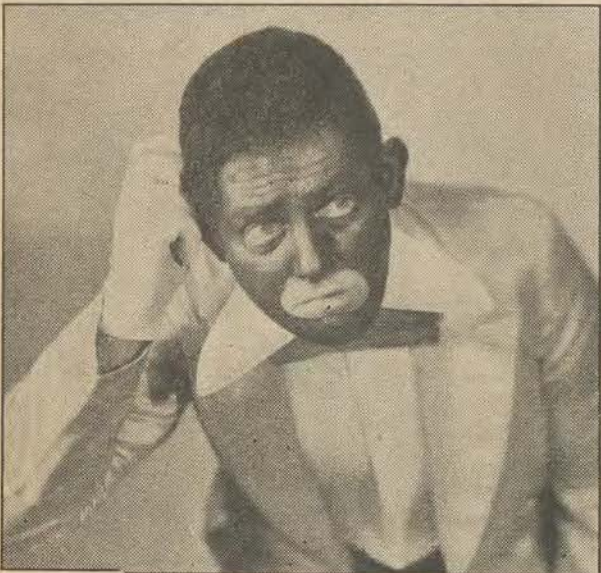

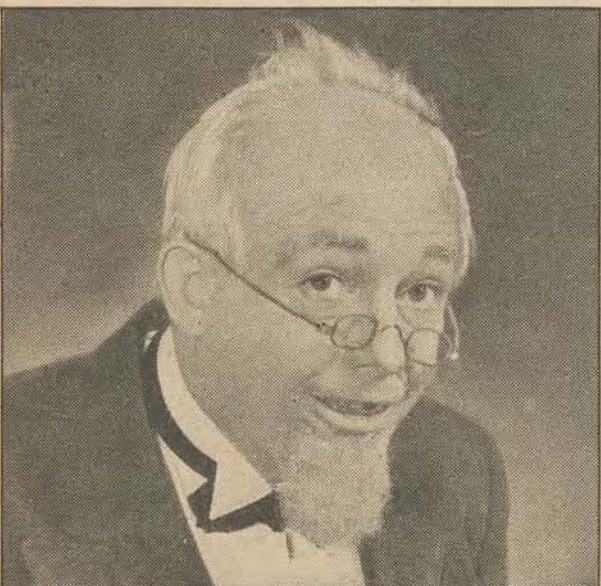

**F**IDDLERS and saxophonists who have become famous bandleaders may be a dime a dozen, but you can count on two or three fingers the drummers who have tiptoed into that charmed circle. 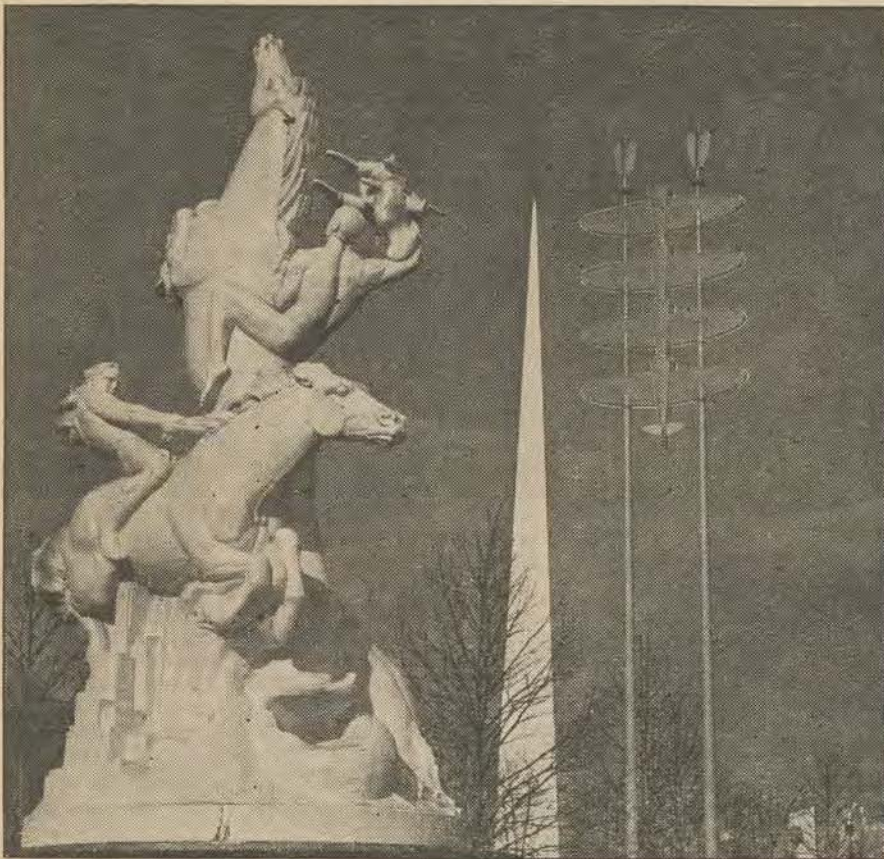

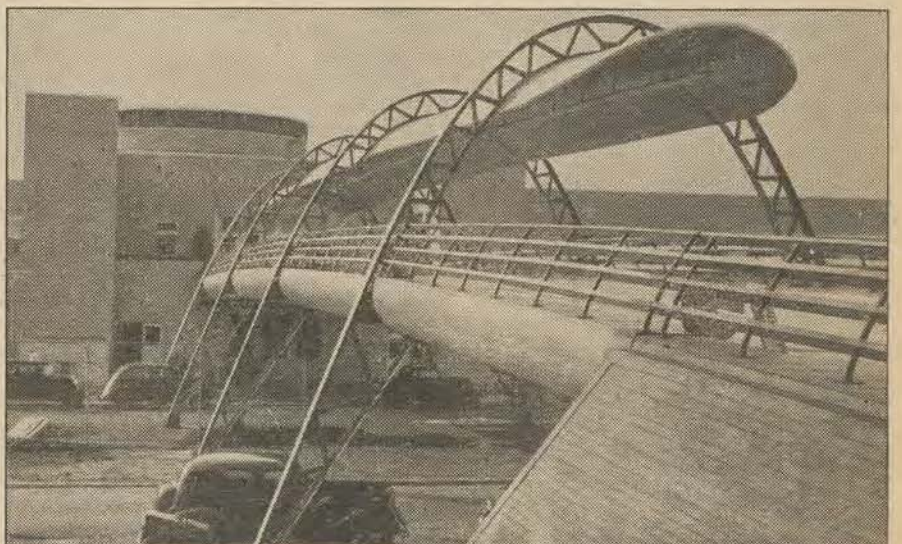

# IT'S COLOSSAL!

**O**F COURSE you're going to the New York World's Fair of 1939. Sixty millions of you are going—one out of every two men, women and children in these United States. You're going to see a great show—a great show in every possible way. But most of all you're going to have a great radio show—the biggest, breath-takingest show radio has ever poured into the air!

You'll see the greatest number of television transmitters and receivers ever assembled at any one time or place in America!

You'll see the most complete "coverage" ever attempted by American radio—coverage by all three major networks and a dozen big independent stations, broadcasting to the far corners of the world.

You'll see your favorite network programs going on the air from the Fair Grounds.

For the first time, you'll see radio's newest wonder-child, facsimile, the production of newspapers by radio.

You'll hear international programs of a size and scope never before put on the air, and you'll take your choice of twenty-five thousand half-hour programs now ready and waiting for the microphone.

These are some of the things radio is planning for you and for the World's Fair of 1939—and most of them will be yours to enjoy whether you go to the Fair or not. It will be the biggest event in the history of broadcasting. Says Grover A. Whalen, president of the Fair corporation, "The New York World's Fair will be the radio capital of the nation for 1939."

It will be more than that. The World's Fair—"The World of Tomorrow"—will definitely mark the beginning of a new era in broadcasting—the era of sight as well as sound. For on April 30, the opening day of the Fair, television comes of age. "No longer is television an experiment," says Dr. John S. Young, director of Radio and Television. "At the Fair you'll see it actually working; in sets, you'll soon be able to enjoy it in your own home."

On April 30, speaking from the Federal Building at the Fair, President Franklin D. Roosevelt will make the official speech which will open the huge extravaganza. All of America will hear him. But people living within fifty miles of New York will be able to see him as well. It's particularly fitting that President Roosevelt, so well known for his mastery of the radio technique, should be the subject of the first official television program in American history.

Just as other great expositions have been famed for the production of some spectacular and lasting contribution to mankind, the New York World's Fair will probably go down in the history books as the "Television Fair." At least three great corporations are planning to put every emphasis on television during the coming months.

The Radio Corporation of America—famed RCA—will use the Fair as a springboard to provide the first regular television program service within the New York metropolitan area. Millions of Fair visitors will see for the first time moving images projected through space and splashed on a

screen by the electronic bombardment of television. Daily ten hours of programs will be televised, programs made up of shows from the NBC studios in Radio City, plus outside pick-ups by the "telemobile" unit, and motion pictures televised by means of a special scanning device.

The RCA-NBC telemobile will furnish many of the most interesting programs as it roams around the grounds picking up spectacular Fair events, and moving into New York City proper to catch outdoor incidents with topical news value. When the Fair opens, the NBC television station, W2XBS, will go into operation on a daily schedule from Radio City, and the Columbia Broadcasting System is also rushing its television plans. Installation of the CBS transmitter in the Chrysler Building tower is going forward at great speed.

The General Electric Company will give its Fair guests opportunity not only to see television in action but to take part in its programs. A talent-director will pose people before the camera and give them a short course in acting for their own amusement and that of their friends in the audience. Similar facilities will be offered visitors to the Westinghouse exhibit, where there will be a television audience chamber seating 125 persons.

But television will be only part of the show. All of the chief radio networks, NBC, CBS, Mutual, station WLW of Cincinnati, local New York stations WNYC, WMCA, WHN, WNEW, WINS, WQXR and virtually all others are laying the most minute plans—and at the same time the most elaborate—to "cover" the exposition as no fair has ever been covered before.

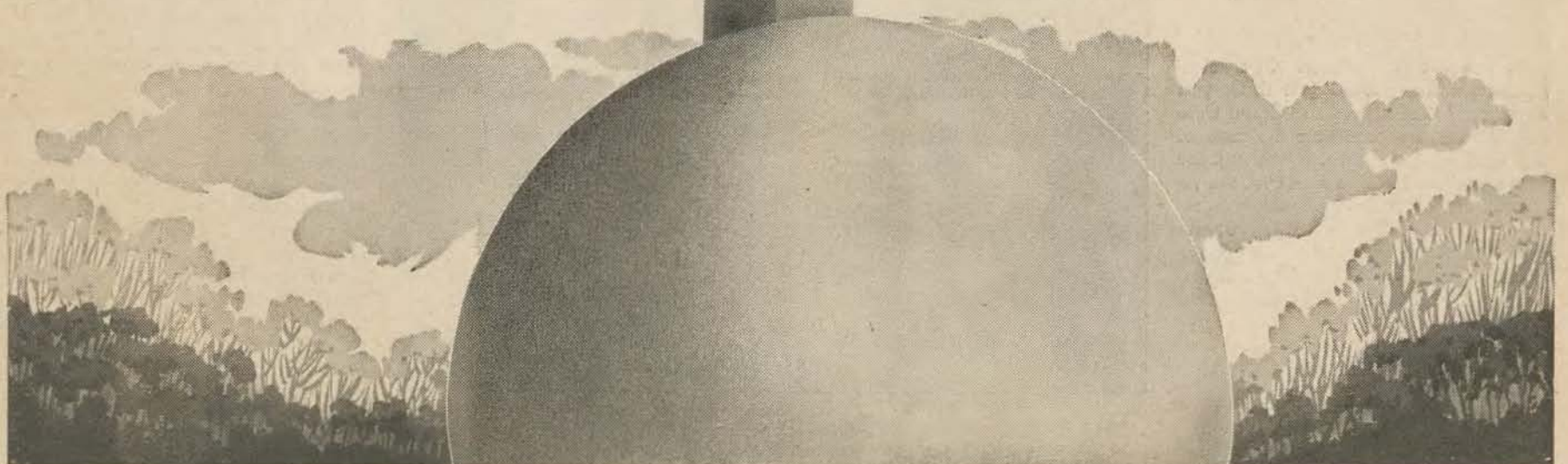
The National Broadcasting Company will throw its entire resources into the job of describing the Fair for the listeners of its two networks. There will be a crew of announcers and engineers on the grounds almost continuously to broadcast such events as President Roosevelt's address on opening day, the visit of King George and Queen Elizabeth of England, and the appearances of royalty and celebrities from this and other lands.

Equally prominent in the picture will be the microphones of the Columbia Broadcasting System. In addition to regular coverage, CBS will from time to time stage broadcasts describing unique attractions in the main exhibit and amusement areas.

The Mutual Broadcasting System will be on the air with its new Perifone "mike," styled to resemble the Perisphere and Trylon. Mutual has jumped into the lead with a Coast-to-Coast program titled "Welcome, Neighbor," presenting interviews with Fair officials and visitors, ready for the air as this is written.

Station WLW will operate from its own building in the Communications Zone at the Fair. Many programs of interest to the nation, and particularly to the Midwest, will be fed to the parent station from a studio in the building. New York's municipal station, WNYC, will be particularly active at the Fair in comparison with its size. As the voice of New York,

One of the world's biggest publicity splurges is history; and its object, the world's greatest exposition to date, this week becomes reality. After the public has listened to broadcasts by kings and queens and assorted royalty leading up to the opening of the New York World's Fair of 1939, it will be up to

our own F. D. R. to keep the big event from being an anticlimax. President Roosevelt can usually be depended upon for the glamorous spark needed. His speech will be the main attraction of the formal opening ceremonies. He will speak from a stand in front of the \$3,000,000 Federal Exhibit buildings. Participating in the verbal ceremonies with him will be Governor Herbert H. Lehman of New York, Mayor Fiorello H. LaGuardia of New York City, and Grover Whalen, official guiding genius of the World's Fair. NBC is making the event an especially auspicious occasion. President Roosevelt as he delivers his address will be the subject of the first program of the first regular high-definition television service in the country, according to Lenox R. Lohr, NBC president. The opening activities will be relayed from the fair grounds by the NBC mobile television station.

Both pictures and sound will be transmitted via the Empire State Building tower. The televised image of the President will be visible on receivers tuned to the NBC transmitter in the metropolitan area within a radius of forty or fifty miles. Thus the "predecessor President" adds another "first" to his record as he becomes the subject for the official launching of NBC's television industry.

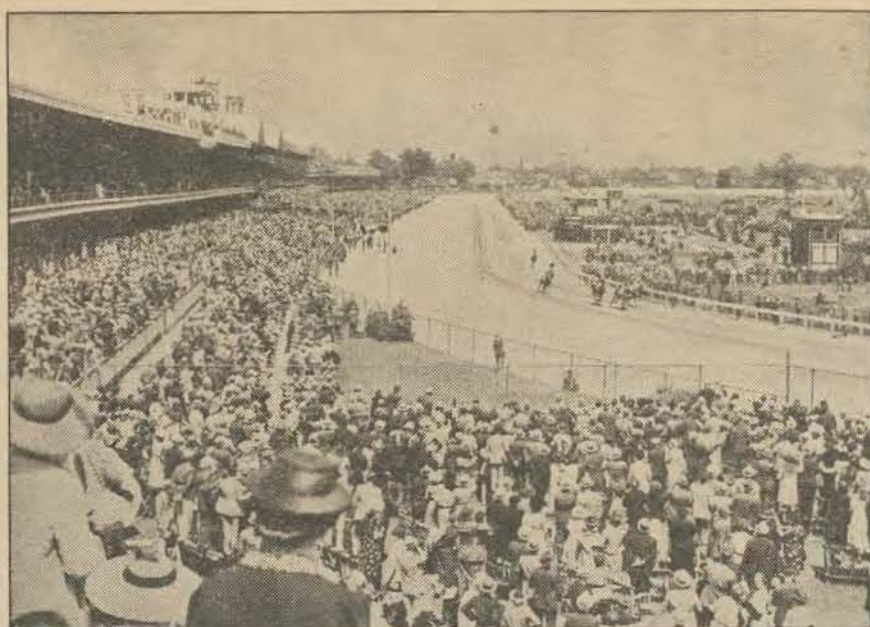

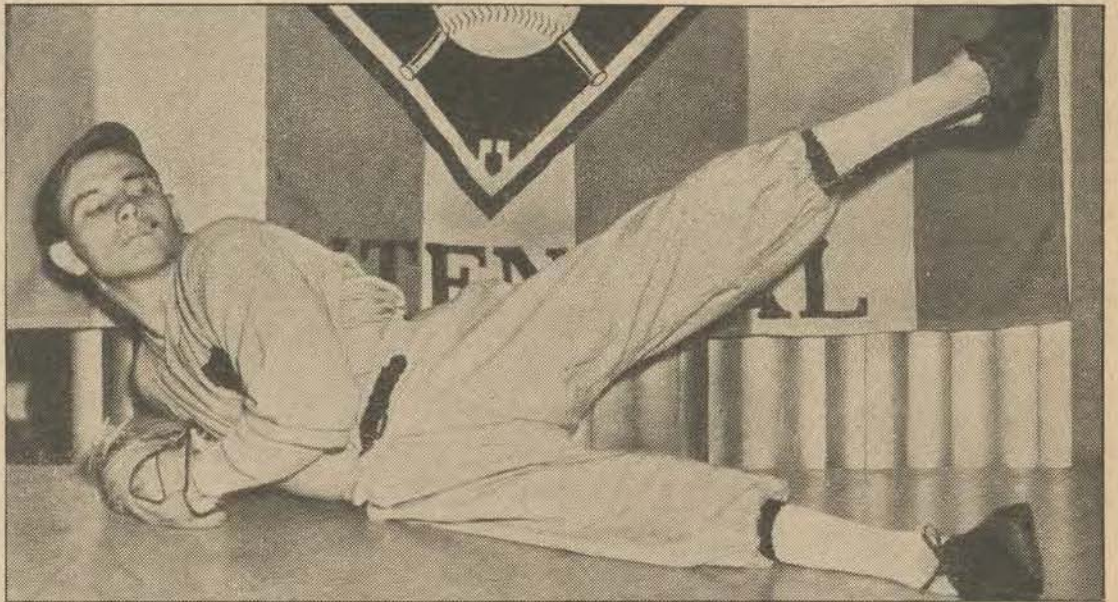

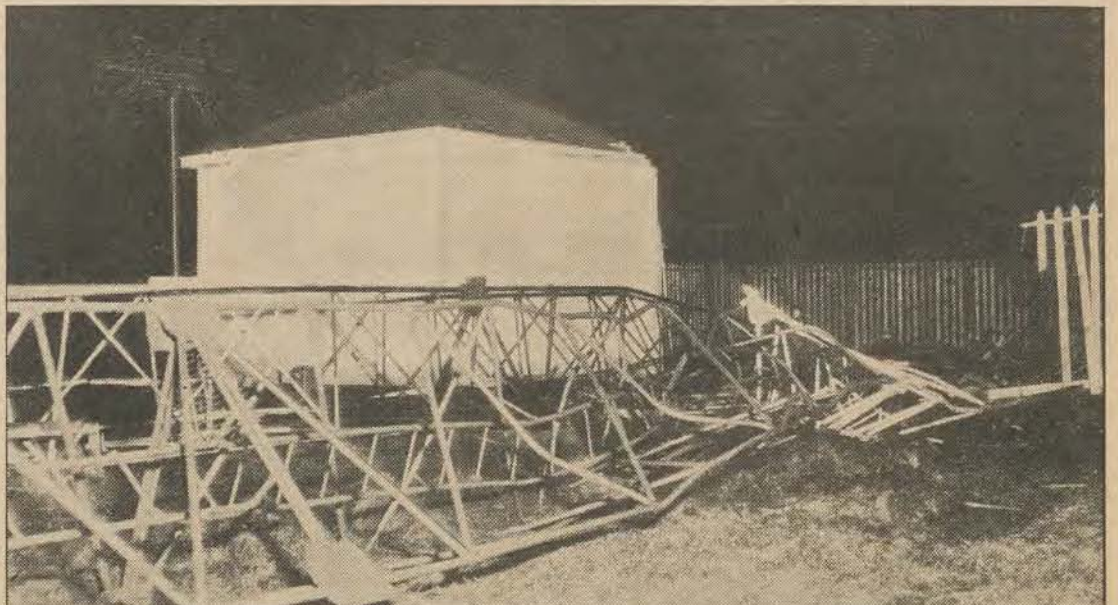

# The March of Music

## Now It Can Be Told

WITH Menotti's new radio opera safely delivered over the air, I feel relieved of a confidence reposed in me by some NBC powers prior to the premiere.

It appears that they considered the libretto too risqué and ribald, and feared criticism detrimental to radio in general. Public and private censors, the clergy, women's committees, and the Federal Communications Commission might protest and possibly bring about punitive action. With that contingency, who could blame the radio producers for their hesitancy?

Often such timidity earns them the ridicule of open-minded persons who like their air programs served more "hot in the mouth," but those objectors have no large radio business to protect and no Federal regulation to fear. It is not that the producers are unwilling to broadcast truth and realism, but their courage might cost them their investments and their licenses. So they prefer to be careful.

In the case of the Menotti story, as you now know, the main theme is the demoralization of two hitherto respectable women by a fascinating vagabond, for whom they endanger their reputations—lie, steal, and almost murder. Then instead of pointing a moral and effecting the punishment of the wicked, the finale discovers a kindly, innocent old maid heartbroken and disgraced while the glorified vagabond decamps with her goods and her pretty servant.

Of course, the whole is treated lightly and satirically in the libretto, and that is what decided NBC to let the premiere go on as advertised and trust to the listeners' sense of humor. It seemed to function, too, for so far, no army of indignant dialers has marched on Washington, no ministers have thundered, no public burnings of loudspeakers occurred, and Americans still seem to think that the doings in Europe, the opening of our baseball season, and the adjustment of the W. P. A. are of greater importance than the subject of Menotti's opera.

Meanwhile there are thinkers who ask themselves why the esthetic solicitude about radio, which "goes into every home and reaches the children," as the fearsome preach, when the salacious tabloids and other scandal-filled dailies also cross nearly every domestic threshold. And the films (which do not bar children) flash all forms of human frailty, and arouse sympathy for ladies of easy virtue and gentlemen of the automatics and sawed-off shotguns. And the theaters do the same. And the novels and some of the magazines. Why should radio alone be expected to remain stainlessly immaculate?

As for opera, most of the librettos already broadcast, and others to come, make Menotti's a Sunday-school tale

by comparison. The profligacy, for example, of Carmen, Delilah, Salome; the philanderings of Wotan; the murder-lust of Elektra; the incest of Siegmund and Sieglinde...

Pardon, please, while some of us join with NBC in cynical smiles.

## Speaking Up

By V. Vidal

Music plays a large part during the opening week of the New York World's Fair, with three opera performances and five symphony concerts. However, so far there is not much hope of hearing many of them on the air. Of the operas, NBC will take the last scene of "Die Meistersinger" on Thursday night. But up to the time of going to press, no arrangements have been made to broadcast any of the symphonic events, except the Brazilian and Roumanian concerts over short wave.

However, in case plans should change, here is a listing of the four concerts. On April 30, opening day, John Barbirolli will conduct the New York Philharmonic Orchestra (official orchestra for the Fair) in Berlioz' "Roman Carnival" overture, Griffes' "Pleasure Dome of Kubla Khan," and Beethoven's Fifth Symphony. Josef Hofmann will be the soloist in Chopin's E Minor piano concerto. May 1 will feature an all-Norwegian program, with Olav Kielland conducting. May 3 is all-Polish, under Artur Rodzinski; May 4 is all-Brazilian, under Burle Marx, and May 5 all-Roumanian under Georges Enesco.

At least a portion of these concerts should be broadcast. Not only do they present an exceptional group of conductors but the programs are largely made up of music unfamiliar to radio audiences.

As an added musical attraction, the World's Fair has announced a competition for band music, open to composers of all countries. The three winning manuscripts will be performed by famous bands late in the summer at the Fair. Published works are unacceptable, but manuscripts which have been performed are eligible. Composers may send in any amount of manuscripts in full score, which may be accompanied by piano reductions. Band parts of the winning manuscripts will be made at the Fair's expense.

One work will be selected from each of three classes—instrumental or vocal solo with wind-instrument accompaniment; music in any form for a symphonic band, except a quick-step march; music for a small band or a combination of wind instruments.

Manuscripts should be sent to the Department of Music, New York World's Fair, 1939, World's Fair, New York, before August 15.

THE spotlight is on the New York World's Fair opening this week, with a "Meistersinger" last act from the Metropolitan included in the air festivities. A program of paramount interest is the performance of Mahler's Eighth Symphony from the Cincinnati May Festival, conducted by Eugene Goossens and featuring an imposing list of soloists.

A new series which should develop into a permanent fixture on the air is the new NBC Orchestra symphonic series on Sunday nights. It has pretty tough competition, however... opposite Charlie McCarthy!

Mendelssohn's (1809-1847) First Piano Concerto is rarely heard nowadays, although it was once a popular part of the piano repertoire.

He was only twenty-one when he conceived it in Rome. He already had an impressive list of compositions to his credit, the Midsummer Night's Dream Overture having been written when he was seventeen. The Concerto was finished in 1831, and Mendelssohn, a first-class pianist as well as a composer, premiered the work himself at a concert in Munich. He played it frequently thereafter on concert tours.

The Concerto is in the fluent, romantic Mendelssohn style, with a gentle an-

dante which follows the first movement without pause. The finale is lively and spirited.

It is strange that although Mendelssohn was a pianist, most of his piano works, including the two concertos, have lost their popularity, while his violin concerto continues to be one of the most frequently performed and best-liked violin compositions.

These concerts are evidently going to follow the "pop" tradition in their program, judging from these sure-fire "Pop" selections.

The "Nutcracker" Suite is among the most charming of Tchaikowsky's works, and is lacking in the usual melancholy quality with which most of his music is imbued. It was originally composed as a ballet suite in fifteen numbers. The story is about a little girl, Marie, who receives a quantity of beautiful presents on Christmas Eve but prefers an ordinary nutcracker to them all. The nutcracker is broken and Marie goes crying to bed. At midnight, all the toys and candles come to life, and the nutcracker is transformed into a Prince Charming, who takes Marie to the magic land of the Sugar Plum Fairy.

The suite that Tchaikowsky has formed from the ballet is in three parts. (1) Miniature Overture (2) March; Dance of the Dragon Fairy; Trepak; Russian Dance; Chinese Dance; Arabian Dance; Dance of the Tops; (3) Waltz of the Flowers.

Gustav Mahler (1860-1911), Bohemian composer, was equally famous as a conductor. For many years he was director of the Vienna Opera, and in 1907 came to America and conducted at the Metropolitan. Later he conducted the New York Philharmonic, completely reorganizing and improving it.

Mahler is still a subject of bitter controversy. Some critics feel he has borrowed too profusely from Wagner, others that he is unique among modern composers. The music is a strange blend of mysticism and passion, with long, windy passages and others of striking beauty and nobility. Mahler was fond of writing for tremendous orchestras, and the

present symphony uses two choral groups and eight solo singers as well.

The symphony is in two parts, the first being based on an ancient Latin hymn, "Veni, Creator Spiritus," supposedly composed by Charlemagne. The second part is an evocation of a portion of Goethe's "Faust." The main theme sung by the choral groups opens the first part. Voices alternate with orchestra and a majestic double fugue ends it. The second section is introduced by an orchestral interlude. The idea of "Woman's Soul leadeth upward and onward" inspires the great finale in which chorus and orchestra join.

# Something About Works for Piano and Orchestra

IN SPEAKING of piano concertos last week, I omitted many of which my readers might have heard or read, but the list I gave tried to confine itself mainly to works now in the active repertoire. If one pokes about in the Music Encyclopedia, sheer endless numbers of piano concertos are encountered, most of which have not been played anywhere for years, and perhaps never in America. Some of the buried older ones by famous European composers are those of Moscheles, Thalberg, Field, Bruch, Godard, Arensky, Rimsky-Korsakoff, Sgambati, Martucci, Dussek, Dvorak, Glazounow, Reger, and hosts of others.

Outstanding later romanticists who contributed keyboard concertos were Paderewski, Scriabin, Dohnanyi, Busoni, Hutcheson, Rachmaninoff, whose second in C Minor, melodious, virile, beautifully themed and harmonized, is a warm favorite with pianists and public. Noted modernists followed with concertos generally less gracious than their predecessors, and subscribing to the newer idea of the musical leftists that frank melody is mawkish, and that the piano must be treated as a percussive instrument, something like a drum. Such concertos are those of Stravinsky, Milhaud, Hindemith, Poulenc, Tansman, Toch, Bartok (however, his first concerto is quite Lisztian) and Ravel. The last-named also provided a rarity with his concerto for the left hand alone.

Other unusual forms of the concerto are Chausson's for piano, violin and string quartet; Bliss' for piano, tenor voice, xylophone and strings; Stravinsky's for piano and wind instruments; Busoni's for piano and male chorus.

Concertinos, or small concertos, have come into vogue of recent years and the best of them are by Tansman, Honegger, John Alden Carpenter, Edward B. Hill and Jean Francaix (heard over the air a few weeks ago).

Radio performances of concertos which stand out in my memory with special distinctness are Hofmann's of the Beethoven "Emperor" and Rubinstein D Minor; Lhevinne's of the Tchaikowsky; Gieseking's of Rachmaninoff's C Minor; Iturbi's of Liszt's E Flat; Horowitz' of Brahms' B Flat.

American composers seem to have been particularly tempted by the concerto, and few of them escaped a try at the form, although none achieved any lasting popularity. The nearest was MacDowell with his D Minor, which flourished a while after his death in 1908 but now emerges infrequently. It is good stuff, even if our younger musicians find it over-sentimentalized and too flowery in decoration. His best contemporaries in that branch were Henry Holden Huss and Mrs. H. H. A. Beach, both still living. Mrs. Beach left the concert platform when she married, turning to composition, in which she was entirely self-taught.

She wrote two piano concertos, including one in C sharp minor, and on a European tour 1910-14) appeared as soloist in her own concerto.

Practically all the younger American writers have concertos to their credit, and although the list is long, let me cite the most familiar of the names: Powell, Ornstein, Copland, Sowerby, Gruenberg, Cowell, Hill, Antheil, Beryl Rubinstein, Morris, Dukelsky, Blitzstein, Jacobi, Mana-Zucca, Giannini, Fuleihan (two heard on the air within the past few weeks), Isidor Achron, Chasins and Gershwin, whose Concerto in F deserves far wider employment than it is receiving.

I have already mentioned Bach and Mozart concertos for two pianos with orchestra. Liszt and Stravinsky each wrote one such ensemble concerto, but without orchestra; Poulenc's uses the full complement, also Sowerby's. Liszt's "Mephisto Valse," originally a piano solo, has been arranged for two pianos and orchestra by Vera Brodsky and Harold Triggs, and was premiered on the Ford hour in 1936.

The repertoire is rich with a multitude of works for solo piano and orchestra, not in concerto form. The oldest is Weber's long-celebrated "Konzertstueck" (Concert Piece), a title also used by Busoni, who in addition is the composer of an "Indian Fantasie." Liszt's "Hungarian Fantasie" was broadcast this season by his pupil, Moriz Rosenthal, as was Paderewski's "Polish Fantasie," by his pupil, Schelling; the latter is himself the composer of a set of "Variations" for piano and orchestra, called "Impressions from an Artist's Life," most popular of shorter piano-orchestra works in Franck's "Symphonic Variations." Dohnanyi contrived clever and merry "Variations on a Nursery Theme." Rachmaninoff fashioned a similar opus on the theme of a Paganini "Caprice" for violin. Rosenthal too made his own piano "Variations" into a piece for that instrument and orchestra. Burmeister added orchestration to Liszt's solo "Spanish Rhapsody," and before that Liszt had done similar service for Schubert's "Wanderer Fantasie." Richard Strauss' only attempt at piano-orchestra is his brilliant "Burleske." Stravinsky is on hand with a "Capriccio," not among his cherished output. Josef Hofmann once in a while programs his "Chromaticon," interesting study in modern harmonies. De Falla's "Nights in the Gardens of Spain" offers sensuous and spicy music. Whit-horne has a "Poeme"; John Powell a propulsive "Negro Rhapsody"; William Grant Still an attractive "Kaintuck." Twice some weeks ago we dialed "American Fantasie in Three Moods," by gifted twenty-year-old Milton Schwarzwald. And, of course, there is the unequalled "Rhapsody in Blue," by our abidingly lamented George Gershwin.



# LISTENING TO LEARN

## Person-to-Person

• On April 17, for the third time since its establishment, the Radio Advisory Council of the Chicago Board of Education assembled to dine with superintendent William H. Johnson and listen to the suggestions for future plans of Chicago's No. 1 radio-minded educator, Harold W. Kent. After shrimp cocktail, sizzling, luscious steak, strawberry shortcake, et al., it is hard to startle anyone. Mr. Kent did, however, with requests for a four-year major course in radio for Chicago students and ultrahigh-frequency broadcasting facilities. Startling as these requests may have seemed to those assembled, they definitely are the next steps if Chicago wishes to keep abreast of latest developments and maintain the high position it now holds in the radio-education field. The requests illustrated perfectly the progressiveness of Radio Council Director Kent and the spirit that has helped him raise Chicago's radio-activity from practically nothing to a plan that is now getting nationwide attention.

Interesting in his report also were the figures that show how interest has been increased in educational radio programs—not only in those presented by the Radio Council itself but also the educational programs produced independently by Chicago stations and the networks. Prize remark of the evening was Dr. Johnson's "This radio work started with an epidemic (in Chicago schools) and has almost become one."

• Prize local development of the *Information, Please* idea is WTOC's *Savannah Brain Trust*. As a build-up for the annual Summer Paper Festival (April 16-19), bank presidents, former mayors, doctors, judges and other important citizens of Savannah agreed to put themselves "on the spot" to answer questions about Savannah sent in by listeners. Though this called for a lot of nerve on the part of the brain-trusters, none failed to appear, and, according to current opinion in Savannah, the series is the most popular being presented over WTOC locally.

• New series to be added in the next publication of our *Educational Program Classifier* started over NBC on April 24. Titled *Frontiers of Geology*, the programs are presented in cooperation with the Geological Society of America and deal with such intriguing subjects as "Submarine Canyons," "Shifting Ocean Levels," "Origin of Mountains." Speakers on these programs will be outstanding authorities on various aspects of the science and all will blend their donations to the general theme—the part the science of geology is playing in international politics, industry and other phases of every-day life. Time: Mondays at 7:30 p.m. EDT, 6:30 EST and CDT, 5:30 CST, 4:30 MST, 3:30 PST.

## Meet the Faculty

Dr. Franklin Dunham, educational director of the National Broadcasting Company since 1931; lecturer; advisory board member of several music organizations; an authority on music and art appreciations and specialist for several years in the humanities; in the field of public service broadcasting he has pioneered, developed and originated a great number of NBC's educational programs during the last eight years.

## Child Listening-Habits

Should parents supervise the listening-habits of their children? This question is arousing a great deal of attention today, and in the minds of expert authorities there is no doubt that the choice of programs in a child's listening-schedule is definitely the parents' responsibility. Assuming that this is a mother's and father's job, to whom can they refer for reliable advice on the problem? Needless to say, it is wisest to follow the counsel and recommendations of those who are in close daily contact with both radio and education—this puts the problem right in the laps of the radio-educator. For years while the rest of the world, including not radio-minded educators, have been ignoring the potentialities of broadcasting, the radio-educator has been studying the many phases of radio, and now is best prepared to answer these perplexing questions.

Another question that this new problem raises is: How should parents decide what programs are suitable for child consumption? RADIO GUIDE's own *Educational Program Classifier* will prove to be a great help. In this monthly index are listed the outstanding educational programs that are presented over the networks, classified according to allied interests. Using this classifier, parents can immediately

put their fingers on several network broadcasts that are ideal for the child's listening-schedule as well as their own. Further information about network programs may be found in pamphlets that are distributed free by NBC and CBS. *Sustaining Educational and Cultural Broadcasts* is the title of Columbia's leaflet that lists the CBS programs ideal for child and adult schedules; *NBC Presents* is the title of NBC's pamphlet that serves this same purpose.

In making up a child's listening-schedule, local programs should not be overlooked. In every community there is available today a great number of worth-while local programs that belong in the child's schedule and, in many cases, will serve the purpose in mind much better than network programs. Where and when to find these good local programs is a question for which the community's board of education or parent-teacher organization should have the answer. In Chicago, Cleveland, Toledo, New York, San Francisco, Los Angeles—to mention only a few examples—the local board of education makes available to the public a list of recommended radio programs that may be heard over stations in that vicinity, and this list includes the network programs as well as those broadcast as local features.

## Parent-Teachers and Child-Listening

While the Tenth Institute for Education by Radio is in session at Columbus, Ohio, on May 1, 2 and 3, the National Congress of Parents and Teachers will be meeting in near-by Cincinnati. Also an active force in radio, but chiefly in an advisory and sponsoring capacity, the National Congress of Parents and Teachers plays the natural, and very important, role of creating a common ground in the field of broadcasting (as it does in the field of education) on which the parent and the teacher may stand for joint attack on their overlapping problems.

A question that is causing no little comment today in radio-education circles, and that is a natural for parent-

teacher consideration at their annual meeting in Cincinnati, is: Should parents supervise the listening habits of their children? This question, it is hoped by many, will be thoroughly analyzed at the National Congress of Parents and Teachers meeting in Cincinnati this year.

The theme of the meeting is "Freedom through growth," based upon facts contained in a book published by the Educational Policies Commission, *Purpose for Education in American Democracy*. Although there will be one or more broadcasts over the networks from this convention, the details have not been definitely set as we go to press.

## The Columbus Meeting

Most-asked question in radio-education circles during past several weeks has been: "Are you going to the Columbus meeting?" The Columbus meeting, in case you did not know, is the annual confab on educational broadcasting sponsored by the Institute for Education by Radio, which will take place this year, its tenth, on May 1, 2 and 3 in Columbus, Ohio. Radio-minded educators and education-minded broadcasters from Coast to Coast look forward to this annual meeting and attend, if possible.

Leading the list of educators who will take active part in the sessions, we find the names of Dr. John W. Studebaker, U. S. Commissioner of Education; A. S. Barr, H. L. Ewbank and Lester Ward Parker and staff, all of the University of Wisconsin; William McPherson, acting president; J. Wayne Wrightstone, Alton O'Steen, I. Keith Tyler, R. R. Lowdermilk, of Ohio State University; H. Clay Harshbarger, State University of Iowa; Tracy F. Tyler, University of Minnesota; W. I. Griffith, Iowa State College; Belmont Farley, National Education Association.

Radio will be well represented by John Royal, Franklin Dunham, Judith Waller of NBC; Sterling Fisher, Lyman Bryson and Earle McGill of CBS; Carl Menzer of the National Association of Educational Broadcasters; Neville Miller of the National Association of Broadcasters; Joseph Ries of station WLW; Larry Roller of United Broadcasting Company.

The confab will be divided into three main divisions: (1) General sessions, (2) work-study groups and (3) sections on special problems.

The Institute's system of "work study groups" is most promising of significant results. Each group, headed by a chairman, tackles a different radio-education problem. The chairman, an authority on that particular phase of radio-education, selects his own panel of experts and they meet for two half-days, working intensely on their problem. Typical problems: "School Broadcasts," "Radio Courses in Colleges and Universities," "Educational Uses of Facsimile, Ultrahigh-Frequency Stations and Recording."

The Institute promises numerous sessions that should interest the average serious listener: Cesar Saerchinger's work-study group on broadcasts for general education; WGY's G. Emerson Markham on agricultural broadcasts; a round-table discussion by faculty members of the University of Chicago on "The Place of Radio in a Democracy"; Alton O'Steen's section on music programs; round-table discussions of dramatic programs, forum programs, controversial issues, and public relations broadcasts.

Highspot of the entire meeting for many will be the Third American Exhibit of Recordings of Educational Radio Programs. NEA's Belmont Farley will preside over this meeting, the fourth and final general session, during which announcement, demonstration, discussion of awards will take place.

There will be a special NBC broadcast from Columbus on Tuesday, May 2 (7:30 p.m. EDT; 6:30 EST and CDT; 5:30 CST, 4:30 MST, 3:30 PST). Dr. John W. Studebaker will introduce the Governor of Ohio, John W. Bricker, who will speak on "Radio and Your Government."

**P**RESIDENT ROOSEVELT, delivering the opening address at the New York World's Fair of 1939 on April 30, will be the subject of the first program of the first regular high-definition television service in the United States. Thus, after years of experimental development, the gigantic new television industry is at last to be officially launched. The NBC transmitter in the Empire State Tower, starting with the above inaugural program, will provide a minimum weekly service of two evening programs, each one hour long. Satisfactory picture service will be available within a radius of about fifty-five miles in all directions from the station. The powerful new CBS visual transmitter in the tower of the Chrysler Building, New York City, is also nearing completion, and the special aerials which will stick out like spikes from the dome of the tower are being installed. The opening of regular visual service from this station is scheduled for about June 15. Several radio manufacturers will have television receivers on sale shortly. The General Electric Company announces production of five different models combining sight and sound. The size of the received image will vary from five to twelve inches, depending upon the model. The more expensive receivers will have both all-wave radio and television features. Television stations are now under construction, or already operating experimentally, in the following cities: Albany, N. Y.; Los Angeles, Calif.; Philadelphia, Pa.; Kansas City, Mo.; Bridgeport, Conn.; Boston, Mass.; Manhattan, Kans.; Chicago, Ill.; W. Lafayette, Ind.; Camden, N. J., and Iowa City, Ia. Stations are also proposed for Cincinnati, Ohio, and Milwaukee, Wis.

*The King and Queen of England will leave Farewell Jetty, Portsmouth Dockyard, in H. M. S. Repulse, en route to Canada and the United States, at about 9:30 a.m. EDT, on Saturday, May 6. The departure scene will be described over Daventry stations GSF, GSG and GSD, starting at approximately 9 a.m. EDT.*

lanky, cow-eyed, droll boy tooting a lead pipe was funny.

About that time in life, Robin's feet got to itching. It had come spring. He got a job helping build a bridge across the river and buddied up with an old sailor—a two-fisted liar and a first-class drinking-man. He told the boy of the glory of the sea, which is something only fools and fishes follow. He promised Robin to take him to New Orleans and get him signed on some day, maybe when the bridge job was finished.

Robin hurt his finger on the job, almost cut his finger off. The boy went home, his finger dangling, and showed it to his father. Father Burn ridiculed the injury and said that when he was a boy he could have lost his whole hand and not made such a fuss over it.

That hurt Robin. It hurt his pride. And a boy's pride is a complex thing; it won't stand punishment. Robin decided to run away. He went to get his old sailor friend, but that worthy one was drunk in Fort Smith. Robin shanghaied him, and they left for New Orleans. Down there the sailor got sober, which is a strange thing to do in New Orleans. He gave Robin the slip, but the boy hid out on a tramp, was discovered and kicked off. He caught a freight train home.

The Black Cat Minstrels came to Van Buren. One has a feeling it was a medicine show. But anyway the head man boasted of a genius with his show who could play a saw. A friend of Robin's heard the boast and said, "That ain't nothing a-tall. We got a young 'un here who can toot a gas-pipe."

Robin and his contraption hooked onto the show, traveled a few miles and the show went bust. Robin's pay was \$3 a week.

They had started to call him Bob Burn by then, and Mother Burn reckoned he should go to college. He hadn't been graduated from high school, but a little thing like that wasn't important. J. R. Williams, superintendent of the Van Buren schools, gave him a letter. Bob packed his Sunday suit and went up to the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville. He handed the letter to the president. The letter said, "I hope you'll be able to interest Mr. Burn. We can't flatter ourselves that we did."

Neither could the university. They let him in but they couldn't make him work. He cut classes and was a pretty shiftless student. So he and his brother, Farrar, decided to get on down the line, and lit out for New Orleans. Bob took his bazooka. The theaters in New Orleans wrinkled their aristocratic noses at the pipe and at the boy who tooted it. He and Farrar, who was a musician of sorts, had worked up a vaudeville routine in which Bob played the thing and told lies. But New Orleans was not interested in imported lies from Arkansas. They preferred native talent.

The Burn boys had forty cents. They blew thirty cents on two meals and the last dime on nickel stogies. Now there is the yokel touch. Give a country boy a cigar and a shoeshine and he's in high cotton. With cigars in their mouths and no dough, the boys wouldn't be denied. They went to a large hotel and Bob told the manager, "Mister, we are working for you now."

really, down deep, wants to do. Keep him happy while you're doing it, keep him hot, keep it coming at him—and don't let him do any thinking!

Radio fits this formula to a T. In the first place, radio delivers the spoken word. And the spoken word has roughly five times the effectiveness of the printed word. When you're listening to a speaker, you can't go back over what he has just said, weigh it in your mind, evaluate its justice and its reason. A propagandizing speaker deals in emotions, and stays as far away from cold facts as he can. Also, you can't heckle a radio speaker, you can't talk back to him. You can listen or you can shut it off—but if you listen, you'll have to sit there and take it. And when you're listening to effective propaganda, you keep on listening—because you want to. It sounds good. It's exciting. It stirs something in you. Your thinking processes slow down, stop altogether—and there you are, hooked!

But the plain, unadorned, garden variety speech is just the kindergarten of radio. Don't forget the news broadcasts. Don't forget the dramatic shows. Don't forget the commentators. Don't even forget the musical programs, because they can be made useful, too. When Finland was facing trouble with Russia, the authorities had to forbid the playing of Sibelius' "Finlandia." Whenever five Finns heard it together they wanted to kill Russians with their bare hands. If war comes, you'll hear even children's programs with an anti-pacifist slant!

It can't happen here, you say? But it can, and it will happen here. If war comes, it must happen here. The United States is today, of all the major powers, probably the most thoroughly peace-loving. We have everything we'll want or need for the next hundred years. We have all the room we need. You could drop England into Texas and lose it there. Furthermore, we have plenty of our own problems to solve without taking on anybody else's. We just want peace, and a lot of it. (Here we are speaking of governments, not people, of course. Because all civilized peoples, without exception, want peace. But not all governments want peace.)

But peace-loving as we may be, we can't be blind, too. And there are a few facts to be faced. Three nations are today definitely and persistently planning world dominion. Because of stupidity, corruption and blundering statesmanship in the democracies, including this one, these three powers have at least a toe-hold on their totter-estrial ambitions, which ambitions include the United States just as much as they included, for instance, Czechoslovakia and China. The United States Government may decide that the only way to stop the dictator states is to fight them, and to fight them while there are still some others left to help us, rather than when we must face them alone. If America must fight, then everybody in America must fight. Americans must be hopping, fighting mad—and propaganda is the only way to bring that about.

That's how the reasoning goes, and that isn't the last you'll hear of it. Next time you hear the particular piece of propaganda outlined in those two paragraphs, it'll probably be on the air.

Nobody ever thought it would turn out like this. Consider, for instance, General J. G. Harbord, veteran of the first World War and a man who should

have known better: "... the radio industry in America has played a major role not only in the development of a national consciousness in our own people but also in the cosmopolitan consciousness of the world at large. More than all the peace conferences of history, it has served to make the concept of 'Peace on Earth, Good Will to Men' a reality, and, taking the world by the hand, has led it one big step farther down that shadowy trail that ends in Utopia."

Sorry, General, you were wrong about that. Not that radio couldn't have done it, given the chance. But the rest of the world doesn't believe in handling radio the way we've handled it here in America.

When George Creel set up the "Committee on Public Information" for the American end of the first World War, it was divided into ten departments: News, civic and educational cooperation, syndicate features, foreign-language newspapers, official bulletin, women's war work, four-minute men (15,000 of them making speeches, and not doing, all together, the work that one could do today on the air), public-speaking (for longer orations), pictures (still) and films. For the second World War, they'll tack radio on that list, somewhere between women's war work and films. And then we'll be off on the flying trapeze again. A thrill a minute, and two hates thrown in for nothing.

The propaganda of the first World War wasn't bad, but it wasn't very good, either. It will be done better next time. Of course, there are certain stand-bys that can't be overlooked. Exemplary, for instance, is this good, standard stuff of about the 1916 vintage: "Many women were violated at Nieppe; one woman there had her daughter violated by thirteen Germans and her husband shot before her eyes" ... "At Wittschaeete most of the women in the village were raped by Uhlan patrols" ... "At Zonnebehe, during fighting east of Ypre, British soldiers found a woman's corpse lying in the pigsty of a farm with eight bayonet wounds in the stomach, and in a room upstairs with corpses of two little girls—about six and eight years old—both shot through the head" ... "The two women were violated. When the children shrieked, one of them had its head cut off; two others, one arm; and the mother, one of her breasts, while everyone in the cellar was massacred."

Even in print, that's inflammatory material. Even in print, even when it concerns people far away and long ago, it's dynamite. Imagine such stories as those pounding out of the loud-speaker into your home, full of the passionate punch that only a trained announcer can get into his words—and imagine them dealing not with Belgian farm women but with American women.

Let's see how that would be brought up to date, and a little bit closer to home. Suppose the Philippines had been suddenly invaded by an oriental power. You're sitting there with your ear glued to the loudspeaker, eager for more information, and you get it.

"Bulletin: Two American girls, the daughters of an Episcopalian missionary in the interior, were yesterday raped by more than twenty men of the invading army. Refugees who made their way to Manila reported that the father of the girls was brutally forced to witness their violation, and then shot in cold blood. One of the girls, who

In Birmingham they got pinched, but just as a railroad detective was ready to chuck them in the clink, an old flagman came up and said, "I didn't know you boys were due today. Git over to my shack and I'll be right with you."

The law released the surprised boys. Later the flagman, who never had seen them before, explained that he had a son on the road and couldn't stand to see young boys locked up.

The brothers had learned to survey back home, and next got jobs with the Alabama Light and Power Company. Farrar went to Montgomery and Bob to Anniston. In a few months, however, they got back together and the hotfoot set in again. So they actually bought railroad tickets and just went riding, taking the bazooka and a guitar along for fun. They played for the conductor and he let them ride plumb to Atlanta, then on to Norfolk.

Broke again, Bob pawned his watch, did house-to-house selling-jobs and wound up as a street-car motorman, while Farrar sold peanuts. Next they got jobs as waiters on a boat that ran between Boston and Jacksonville, touching at Norfolk and a few way points. They entertained on the boat and did all right. They saw Washington, Boston and, of course, wound up in New York. Farrar got homesick and lit out again, halting in St. Louis with a decent job. Bob began haunting vaudeville houses with his bazooka, but couldn't get on. However, he did get in the movies, as extra in a thing they were shooting on Eleventh Avenue. He was a Swiss guard. Then he got homesick, and a mite hungry.

He landed on his uncle's farm near Hugo, Oklahoma, pitching hay. Farrar went to Utah and wrote for Bob. They got together again, and made out pretty good, then separated. Bob was a hotel clerk in Salt Lake City, then ran a boarding-house!

He saved his money and got together a vaudeville act that toured the countryside. The show finally folded and Bob labored in Idaho, pawned his stickpin for grub, and did an act in Nampa, Idaho, as "Harmony Hobo, the Musical Plumber." He and his bazooka made gravy money. Next it was nip and tuck. To California picking prunes, here and there doing two-bit jobs, tooting the bazooka for dimes, fighting, rambling, living. But in 1915, he showed up in Van Buren, broke and wiser, a rolling stone with no moss—but a nice polish.

Bob's name of Robin Burn had come out Robert Burns during his roamings. He hied down to Little Rock and sold advertising, then hopped over to Hot Springs and booked conventions, and 1917 found him and the bazooka in Chicago. He was selling ads for the

Chicago Herald. The bazooka was gathering dust. And millions of things that boasted they were created in God's image were splattering the little brains of their brethren in France, and America slipped into the noble experiment that would make God's footstool a nice place to live. Heil Peace! Viva Faith! Hurrah Hope! Cheerio Charity! Whoopee Love!

"When are you going to join up, Bob?" some friends asked him.

"Tomorrow."

Well, there's one thing about the bazooka: it never killed anybody.

Burns enlisted in the Marines. He got a big send-off in Chicago. He and the bazooka had lots of friends. He trained at Paris Island, South Carolina, and became a sharpshooter. He was soon promoted to sergeant, and trained recruits and developed into one of the best shots in the Army. He organized the Marine Jazz Band and went to France—not to shoot a Springfield but to toot the bazooka!

He finally put the bazooka away and went out into the mud and fought. He won rifle tournaments and honors, and General Pershing decorated him as the champion marksman of the A. E. F. He met Pershing at Tours. The Marine Jazz Band was back together and was entertaining officers. The general was intrigued by the bazooka, and Sergeant Burns agreed to let the general try his wind at blowing it. It was no soap.

After the Armistice, the band toured France, and in Paris played for royalty. King Alfonso, who was working at his job then, came to France after the war to do a little fancy playing and met the bazooka. He couldn't blow it, but the king never was much 'count at tooting anything except his own horn. He wasn't so hot, even as kings go.

The band was offered a good job at Paris' famous Zelli's, but the Marines had to come home to get mustered out. So home they came and toured New England. Burns and his bazooka were well known then. He could have hooked on almost anywhere. The band could have returned to France. But Bob was homesick. The band broke up and Brother Burns got off the "Cannonball" train at Van Buren, just another ex-soldier. The little town bored him. He went to Chicago and sold ads again. Chicago got him down. He went to New York and played in various cafes and clubs.

It was then that Robin Burn, the Van Buren boy, got a little dollar-mad. Money suddenly seemed very important to him. That's something else the war taught us. The bazooka was patented and he tried to get backing to manufacture it and make it popular. It was a crazy idea. Only Burns really can play the thing, but he had an idea he could make it the national instrument—or something. Soon he was broke again and became a pitchman, a street-hawker of a windshield-cleaning fluid. The police didn't like his sales-talk and chased him out of towns. Even Atlantic City barred him. That's pretty bad, to get asked out of Atlantic City. Why, 'most anybody could do business there.

Bob quit hawking and rented a concession on the Atlantic City Boardwalk. It was a game of chance: chances are the suckers went broke. But Bob cleaned up and decided to be a carnival man.

Down the Boardwalk was a girl, Elizabeth Fisher of Lancaster, Pennsylvania, who owned five concessions. She had black eyes and could cook.

They were married in 1921. They made \$8,000 the first year, then lost

\$15,000 in a dance-hall venture. The blue laws clamped down on carnivals. America, having saved the world for fascism, became missionary to the world.

The going got tough for the newly-weds. They tramped in a battered car, cooked in greasy tents by candle-light, followed carnivals, and never made ends meet.

Mrs. Burns went home to Lancaster. Bob was in Johnson City, Tennessee, running a concession with the DuFour Shows. He posed as a "blue-eyed Hindu" and tooted that bazooka. He sent the first money he made to his wife. The baby, Robert, Jr., was born the day the check arrived. Papa was in Tennessee with his bazooka and sixty-two cents.

It was up-and-down, round-and-about for the Burns for several years. He worked when he could get carnival jobs. In New York he bumped into Claude West, a funny little fellow he had met in New Orleans. They went to an agency and showed an act they had worked out—blackface. The agency scorned the act. Bob said "Some day you'll be glad to have me."

Today, he is one of the agency's most valuable properties. They jeered at his bazooka. Now they make toy bazookas.

Burns and West got into vaudeville and did pretty well for eight years. Then the bazooka hit a sour note. Vaudeville became a thing that fathers told their sons about; you know—"When I was a boy they had shows called vaudeville. Had a heap of funny folks running around the country. I recollect a few—a man named Jack Benny and some more, Walter Winchell, Eddie Cantor, Fred Allen, Will Rogers, Bob Burns. Reckon they'll starve now that vaudeville is dead."

Bob almost did. He was at his wife's house in Lancaster, shining his britches. That was 1929. Europe was paying us something on account. Bathtub gin was \$4.50 a bottle! Frank Roosevelt was in Albany. Herbert Hoover was a hero. Germany was a democracy, of a sort. And everybody was making money, swapping IOU's. Everybody except Robin Burns! Then he met a casting-director who wanted a blackface team for Fox. Bob whooped for Claude West. The competition was stiff. Bob made the grade but West didn't. Burns was teamed with John Swor, a crackerjack blackface comic.

He got a contract for \$300 a week and headed for Hollywood. He practised his Negro dialect until he spoke it in his sleep. After three months, he got a call to play a mounty in a Northwest Mounted picture. He was to speak one line. Camera! Action! And out shuffled Robin Burns of Van Buren, dressed as a mounty and drawled, "Hydee folks, what's this-heah yawl been sayin' 'bout me?"

The director swooned. Brother Burns was too big to kick off the set. You don't go around kicking Arkansas boys. But Robin was escorted off the set. He reckoned he was through. But off the set he met Will Rogers.

Will was from over in Oklahoma, just a little piece from Van Buren. Will's wife was from up at Rogers, Arkansas. Dog-gone! That made Bob and Will almost kinfolks.

Will said, "Keep on working, son. Whatever you do, don't give up."
