**Democracy by Radio:** Just to illustrate what can happen, consider the fact that our national law states that there shall be no censorship of radio by radio's controlling agency, the Federal Communications Commission. That bureau is to be a policeman, keeping stations on the right side of the road. Nevertheless, a recent FCC ukase stated that those broadcasters who wanted to broadcast commercial programs by short wave should so build their programs that they would reflect the culture of our country. It's a good idea, but who decides which culture to reflect? Obviously, the FCC thinks the FCC should decide. Obviously, such a regulation which regulates program content is censorship. It does not now apply to our own programs, but that might come next. The thing to do is to fight what looks like another FCC grab for more power. Which is exactly what Neville Miller, president of the National Association of Broadcasters, is doing with all his strength. More power to Mr. Miller and the NAB in their fight for the rights of listeners to hear programs uncolored by Government blue-pencil.

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
**Under Your Thumb:** That's what the world will be when the new series of "Magic Key" programs starts on Monday, June 26. For some unusual space-defying broadcasts are promised by the sponsors. After many years as a Sunday afternoon program,

RCA and its allied companies are moving their program to Monday night, and advance reports of their plans promise to make that a "must" night for every listener. Their first program is what Winchell calls an "excitem." It's an hour preview of Sonja Henie and Tyrone Power's new picture, "Second Fiddle." Rudy Vallee, also starred in the film, and Irving Ber-

lin, who wrote both lyrics and music, will be a part of the program. Most interesting, Miss Henie will do her part of the program—and it will be considerable—from somewhere in Norway. Separated by more than seven thousand miles, Miss Henie and Tyrone Power will do what will be the record long-distance scene ever broadcast, and do it exactly, so far as the listener can tell, as if they were together in the same studio. Only RCA with its vast technical resources could do it. We look forward to more of the new Monday "Magic Key" programs.

**"We, the People":** This program remains one of the greatest on the air. Recently it presented Mrs. A. C. Jackson, of New York City, a woman who had been insane but who had been cured by kindness. In telling of what kindness can do for the insane, Mrs. Jackson might well have added that good music is also one of the best treatments. Indeed, many modern hospitals tune in musical programs for mental patients.

# AMERICA ON ITS KNEES



## Portrait of a man who saves souls—100,000 a year—by harnessing radio to religion

CREEPERS and ivy grew over the little log church, obscuring the rude wooden cross atop the shingles and climbing down through jagged holes which time and the elements had made in its roof. And children in the valley were like weeds, growing wild with no knowledge of the Word of God, though they played rough-and-tumble over the crumbling pews and decaying pulpit in the house which had been His house. The last circuit-rider who had preached from its pulpit was moldering ash in a deep-sunken grave, dust returning to dust, and it seemed that God had forgotten the simple folk who had settled there. Only the little church—abandoned now, and forsaken—bore a mute testimony that the Word had ever been spoken there or that miracles had been performed in His name long, long ago. Or even that His Son had been born at Bethlehem and had died in agony on a cross between two thieves at Calvary.

Miracles? But I started out to tell of a miracle, the miracle of how God's Word came back to the valley which was a three-day journey by muleback from the nearest railroad in a deep Kentucky backwoods. I started to tell how the word came, first in a silver-winged plane and from the lips of a tall, dynamic man who spoke their language, but whose word was God's Word. And then how it came each Sunday through the air to the little box—they called it a radio—that had been set upon the pulpit. Miracles? . . . Long ago . . . No, only yesterday . . .

Perhaps you are one of the thirty millions of listeners who, during the course of the week, will tune in your radio to WLW for the "Nation's Family Prayer Period," from the Cadle Tabernacle in Indianapolis. You'll remember

the hymn, "Ere You Left Your Room This Morning," and then Buford Cadle introducing his father:

"Your friend and my father—"

THAT program has become an institution to thousands of American families in cities as well as in the backwoods and mountains of Kentucky, Tennessee, West Virginia and southern Indiana. And the Cadle Tabernacle, standing in downtown Indianapolis, has become the spiritual center of Christians running into the millions. I wanted to know why. So I went down to Indianapolis to meet E. Howard Cadle, who spurns the title of reverend and who believes that only through inter-denominationalism can the salvation of the world be worked out.

I found him in the hospital, recuperating from a breakdown in health. But even so, he seemed strong and calm and healthy, with a health that emanates only from a soul that is at peace with man and God. His wide, gray eyes are kindly and calm, and his face is long and thin, like Lincoln's. He is a man of ideas, a man who might be a successful businessman you meet in the street. Until he starts to tell his

story. Then his face lightens up and he becomes enthusiastic as he talks of the "old-time" religion and how it came to him.

"Twenty-six years ago," he said, "my soul was the battleground of a great war—a war between God and the devil. And I'm telling you I would have laid odds of twenty to one that the devil was coming off best." At that time Mr. Cadle probably would have given just such odds, for, by his own admission, he was a petty gambler, a drunkard, a saloon-operator, a slot-machine king (operating in six states and buying officials as he went), a big-time gambler, a libertine, and an almost dead hombre on many occasions when the cold deck he brought to card games was discovered.

"I WAS degenerate," he said, "and getting worse all the time. I lost my saloon and, getting a job as porter in it, I was too degenerate to even clean cuspids. So I took my wife and two children and went home." His eyes grow soft now as he talks of his mother. "There was a lady who was betting on God. And there wasn't a moment of the day that she didn't pray for Him

to help me, and, miraculously—" I felt as if I were with Saul, finding his miracle in the dust of the well-trodden Damascus road—"her prayers did the trick. I saw the error of my ways and I've been on God's side ever since."

That is the story that Mr. Cadle has to tell. And he started out then—in 1906—to tell that story to a Sunday School class consisting of two boys. Today he tells that same story to an audience of between twenty and thirty million souls. And there is a definite reason for his growing popularity, not the least of which is the deep faith of the man and his utter and complete belief in the potency of prayer. He has, too, a radio style that is close to the soil, and a humor—unusual in gospel preachers of the old school, to which Cadle definitely belongs—which is not unlike the style of Bob Burns. Once, in a sermon on Jonah and the whale, in which the miracle had been questioned, he shouted from the pulpit: ". . . What I can't understand is how the whale could keep such a cowardly preacher in his belly for three days and not get sick at his stomach."

But the chief secret for the amazing success of the man in his audience-building has been radio.

Back in 1931, when the Tabernacle, seating ten thousand people, was crowded and hundreds stood outside unable to enter, he began to cast about in his mind for a way to reach these people and immediately hit upon radio. The station manager at WKBF, in Indianapolis, now WIRE, felt that if Cadle could turn 'em away from his doors, then maybe he did have something to offer radio. So the Tabernacle went on

the air. Buford Cadle, his son, became the announcer for the program—fifteen minutes daily, an hour on Sunday in the afternoon and an hour Sunday evening. Mrs. Cadle, his wife, sang the opening hymn, and Mr. Cadle delivered the sermons and made the conversations.

Soon the fan mail had become so heavy and the obvious appeal of the program so great that Mr. Cadle sought a stronger outlet and took the services to WLW, where they have been presented for the past six years.

Times at the Tabernacle have not always been good. It was built at a time when Mr. Cadle was operating the American Shoe Repair Company, a while-you-wait shoe-repair chain of shops operating throughout the Middle West, and the original funds for the Tabernacle came largely from its profits. However, in the late twenties, Mr. Cadle was forced out of the shoe business by falling prices and, eventually, out of the Tabernacle. And now boxing-matches and burlesque shows—which he fought bitterly—were staged in the Tabernacle, and where once the Cadles had stood at the pulpit and sang, "There's a Fountain Filled with Blood," now human blood of men fighting for wages flowed upon the canvas floor.

It was in 1931, when he started radio broadcasting, that Mr. Cadle regained control of the Tabernacle which—ironically enough—had borne his name through all of the boxing-shows, burlesque shows, wrestling-matches that had been held there. To give a small idea of the appeal and popularity of the man, it was about this time that he was asked to run for governor of Indiana, and politicians, sensing his power, began to climb on the bandwagon, newspapers offered him their support. But again his mother was the deciding influence in his life when she asked him to withdraw, saying: "Howard, I'd rather have you the poorest preacher in the world than the richest and most powerful politician." He withdrew from the race.


Three years ago Mr. Cadle was vacationing in the backwoods section of Kentucky, when he came upon an

abandoned church in the middle of a small community.

"Why isn't it used?" he asked. And they told him that there wasn't enough money to pay a preacher. And besides, they couldn't get a preacher to come there. He'd have to travel three days on the back of a mule to reach the community. Mr. Cadle had flown in in his plane.

AND again Mr. Cadle hit upon radio—as the answer to a vital problem—the problem of bringing God's word into communities so poverty-stricken that they were letting their churches go by the board. When he returned to Indianapolis, he sent a man down into this section to see how widespread was this defection. After five months, this representative came back and told him that he had found more than 300 such abandoned churches already and his survey had just begun.

Radio sets were purchased by the Tabernacle, carpenters employed and sent down to repair these buildings. Then a representative of the Tabernacle went down with the radios—battery sets, for there is no power in most of these communities—and he appoint-

ed a person to look after them in each community. They were set up in the churches, on the old pulpits in communities where the Word of God had been almost forgotten. And a great revival is now going on. Some forty thousand souls ride muleback and horseback and carry babes in arms to the regular Sunday services coming to them from Cadle Tabernacle in Indianapolis. Last year some twenty-five thousand of these mountain folk traveled—some for a month—to reach Beckley, W. Va., where Mr. Cadle appeared in person at a revival meeting celebrating the opening of the first mountain church radio service.

For distance means nothing to this twentieth-century circuit-rider. He has his own private plane, flown by his

#### Program Notes

For almost a year now, "The People's Platform," which is one of the most interesting and informative airshows, has been heard on Sundays over CBS. The only reason it isn't more popular is the fact that it was on the air at the same time as Jack Benny. Strange as it seems, now that the comic goes off for the summer, CBS is switching "People's Platform" to a Wednesday night spot starting July 5 . . . Starting the same night, "For Men Only" will be heard regularly on Wednesdays following "What's My Name?" as predicted weeks ago . . . Benny Goodman's cigarette show moves to Saturday nights over NBC, his present CBS spot being taken over by Bob Crosby . . . When Tommy Riggs and his Betty Lou return to the air in the fall, it will not be on Saturday nights. The sponsors are seeking a new spot.

Kay Kyser's cagy boss is starting something new when he repeats the "College of Musical Knowledge" on Thursday nights over WOR in New York, which will undoubtedly take more listeners away from the Rudy Vallee hour. It will be the same program that is broadcast from Coast to Coast on Wednesday nights which will be transcribed for the rebroadcast the following night. So if listeners don't hear it on Wednesdays they can tune in the following night.

I'll bet you didn't know that Dave Elman, who conducts the "Hobby Lobby" show, used to write the scripts for the Bob Ripley program. Neither did I until I was told about it the other day . . . Arch Oboler, whose plays presented Saturday nights are becoming more popular each week, got an unexpected thrill the other night. After the broadcast he was called to the telephone, the page-boy stating that Nazimova, the great actress, would like to speak to him. At first he thought it was a gag, but when he answered the phone he recognized her voice. She told him how much she enjoyed his programs and added that she would be pleased to participate in one of his radio plays without salary if he would write her in. Ordinarily Nazimova would get \$2,500 a performance without any trouble. After Oboler pinched himself a few times, he told the actress he would write the play, and you listeners can hear her act in it on July 8.

Betty Garde, who will be featured in a new series, "My Son and I," starting in the fall, will be heard regularly throughout the summer on "Grand Central Station" . . . If you saw Bette Davis' picture "Dark Victory" you may have recognized the blond songstress who sings with the orchestra in the night-club scene. She didn't get any billing in the picture, but she is Vera Van, former CBS songstress . . .



Walter Tetley, who has grown up in radio and left New York a couple of years ago in breeches, came back recently wearing long pants. He came to visit his family and must be back in Hollywood by July 10 to start work in "Flying Cadets," which will also star Jackie Cooper and Freddie Bartholomew. 



## A LISTENERS' GUIDE TO THE NEW YORK FAIR

Sights to see and spots to go for spying on the stars

**I**F YOU are one of the lucky sixty million people who will visit New York's World of Tomorrow, then you will no doubt be interested in taking a sightseeing trip through another world—the fascinating world of radio broadcasting.

Visitors to New York invariably either begin or end their sightseeing tour of the city with a trip through the internationally known Rockefeller Center, where, in addition to such magnificent eye-openers as beautiful theaters, roof gardens and a sunken plaza, there is an exceptionally instructive and entertaining tour behind the scenes of Radio City. You may well start there.

The Rockefeller Center tour costs fifty-five cents. Well-trained, courteous guides lead the parties through the vast NBC studios. Visitors are given sound-effects demonstrations and shown how stations from Coast to Coast are hooked together with split-second accuracy. They are shown the largest studio in the world, studio 8-H, where Fred Allen's "Town Hall Tonight" convenes.

The next logical trip is the television tour. It costs the same as the studio tour, or both may be had for ninety cents if taken together. On this tour of

four studios, the visitor is shown historical television equipment, "sight effects," comparable to sound-effects in broadcasting, and television receiving sets. The whole party participates in a television demonstration, both witnessing and being televised themselves.

While at Radio City, two interesting side tours may be taken. One is a trip to the observation roof of the RCA building, from which a really magnificent view of New York is obtainable. This trip costs forty cents. The other side-tour is a visit to Radio City Music Hall, the largest theater in the world, with a capacity of 6,200, where Erno Rapee's seventy-piece symphony orchestra and other attractions, along with the latest films, delight the visitor.

While CBS and Mutual do not have guided studio tours, you can visit their studios provided you have a ticket to a regular broadcast.

**H**ERE it should be said that persons wishing to visit actual broadcasts should, before going to New York, write the studios for tickets, specifying the particular time they will be in the city. The NBC studio tours do not include admission to regular broadcasts, though

tourists may get a passing glimpse of a rehearsal.

Requests for tickets to NBC programs should be addressed to Guest Relations Department, National Broadcasting Company, Rockefeller Center, New York, N. Y. Tickets to CBS shows can be obtained from Pass Division, Columbia Broadcasting System, 485 Madison Ave., New York, N. Y. The source for MBS tickets is Mutual Broadcasting System, 1440 Broadway, New York, N. Y.

**M**OST NBC and MBS air-shows originate in their main studios. Columbia, however, accommodates most of its audiences at four theaters scattered throughout the Times Square district. Radio Theater No. 1 is located at 242 W. Forty-fifth Street and houses such programs as "We, the People," "Model Minstrels" and others. CBS Radio Theater No. 2 is the radio home of Ben Bernie, Guy Lombardo, Kate Smith, the Philip Morris program and others. Radio Theater No. 3, at 1697 Broadway, is the scene of many headline shows including "Tune-Up Time," "Major Bowes' Amateur Hour," "Hit Parade," Hal Kemp's "Time to Shine," Paul Whiteman's show, and Burns and

Allen. At Radio Theater No. 4, 215 W. Forty-ninth Street, Phil Baker and Eddie Cantor do their shows.

For the out-of-town visitor who likes to dine or dance and at the same time would like to catch a glimpse of nationally known radio bands, New York can easily fulfill his wishes. There are dozens of radio orchestras in various hotel restaurants and night-clubs. Rudy Vallee entertains his many friends at the Astor Roof, in the heart of Times Square. At Ben Marden's Riviera, at Fort Lee, N. J., just across the George Washington Bridge, Ted Fio-Rito is playing. Tommy Dorsey is at the Hotel Pennsylvania Roof; Sammy Kaye is at the Essex House; Richard Himber is currently at the Paradise Restaurant. Enoch Light, at the Hotel Taft, holds the distinction of being the only radio band which plays at the luncheon hour. Barry Wood, CBS baritone, now has an orchestra and is playing at the Claremont Inn, a beautiful spot on Riverside Drive overlooking the Hudson river. There are many other orchestras, of course.

For a glimpse of radio personalities, one can, if patient and observant, see the great stars at candid moments when

**B**ENNY is a serious man. Tom Harrington, his radio boss, says he's the most serious man in show business, possibly excepting Fred Allen. He talks shop all the time. Mary buzzes around, but Jack is apt to get you in a corner and pound your ear with his woes and talk ideas.

"It's impossible for Jack to relax," Harrington said.

He'll talk for hours about censorship. He believes the public should be protected from obscene shows, but he thinks too much censorship is dangerous and that it can wreck comedy. Rules regarding controversial subjects are rather silly at times and Benny is penalized particularly because so much of his humor is based on today's happenings.

After the Orson Welles' Mars program, Jack was going to use some cracks about Mars, but he was blocked. A week later he was allowed to do so, but the punch was gone. Maybe Mars is controversial. Unquestionably, radio is childish about "controversies" and in straining at a gnat often swallows a camel.

Along that line, this little recent incident may tickle even Mr. Benny, who is not the only radio man with woes. Phil Stong's "Honk the Moose" was broadcast recently, and Phil was asked to take the part of the moose he made famous. His job was to honk. The moose story is for children and thousands of them have read it. But some minute-man of radio came up with the startling information that mooses honk only during mating-season, therefore Phil's honk would be out of order. There was quite a to-do about it. Maybe the FCC and some of the bigwigs would be offended if there were a

nasty old honk on the air. Phil Stong was too amused to be offended, even at such ignorance. He simply pointed out that a moose honks as a cow moos, a duck quacks, a sheep bleats and a dog barks. He went on and honked for his moose. America's morals were not soiled.

Benny is a cooperative soul and he's willing to cut his show to conform to good taste. Recently he had a schoolroom scene in his tentative show. A day or so before broadcast date, a school bus was wrecked, and Benny cut the scene rather than remind America of the tragedy.

**H**E IS not allowed to get by with gags that Allen can use. Jack is prohibited from saying anything about a bad appetite, and he can't kid about taste. His agency handles many food accounts, and they fear that if Jack kids about foods somebody might not buy some of General Foods products. We hazard the suggestion that is very funny. Brother Benny can work miracles but we do not believe he can wreck America's appetite.

Benny is never temperamental, but

he gets irked. He was in Boston one day and it had been arranged that he call on the Governor of Massachusetts. He went to the executive's reception-room and waited. The Governor was busy. Benny waited a long time, then got up to leave. A stooge of the Governor's said, "Don't go, his excellency will see you in a minute."

**J**ACK said, "I've got to go. My option comes up in thirteen weeks. The Governor is good for four years."

Benny has had trouble only once with his program, and that was when he hired Michael Bartlett as his tenor. Bartlett's voice didn't fit the tone of the program. The contract was canceled in friendly fashion and Benny hired Kenny Baker, who now ranks next to Bing Crosby in popularity. Don Wilson also rose to fame after joining Benny. However, Benny's hired hands are "typed," and in years to come that may cause trouble for them.

Burns and Allen are the Bennys' best friends and have been socially associated with them for at least twelve years, ever since Jack and Mary married.

They play Friars "Around the Corner" and rummy together. Jack and George play pocket billiards while Mary and Gracie concentrate on backgammon. The two women favor the same shops but avoid duplicating clothes because they are together so much.

Jack thinks George Burns, Eddie Anderson—the Rochester of the show—and Andy Devine are the funniest men alive.

Although Benny is moody, he'll laugh himself sick if he's really amused.

"He'd laugh at a red hat," Burns said. "His friends enjoy punching in his presence because Jack is such a good audience. He'll literally roll on the floor when highly amused."

Once he fell down and crawled on the sidewalks of New York because he got tickled at Burns. The two were walking along and Burns said something unimportant. Benny doubled up.

"What's so funny?" Burns asked. "It's not what you said," Jack replied, "but I know what you are thinking." Burns didn't.

The two clowns used to have a telephone game that was very funny to them. Burns would call Jack and say he had some important information. Then right in the middle of a sentence he would hang up. Benny would roar. Once Jack wired George to meet him on the nine-thirty train that would arrive at a certain station. George wired back, "What time will you arrive?" Benny then wired friends all over the country and they wired Burns "Benny will arrive at nine-thirty."

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# ARE YOU A PLATTERBUG?

Then get acquainted with your fellows—there's a  
Rockefeller and a Mohammedan king among them

IT WAS "Louis Armstrong" night at the Tri Delt House, and the jitterbugs were tearing themselves a piece of carpet via the turntable attachment to the radio and an almost complete collection of the hottest Armstrong "platters." Some of the records didn't carry the Armstrong name (they were old and scratched), but all of the "bugs" knew that the hot trumpeting that gave out was that of none other than the old New Orleans master. And especially the platterbugs knew. They make it a point to recognize style wherever they hear it, and it's a matter of pride to them to find—in some second-hand record-shop where the dealer isn't "hep"—recorded museum pieces, comparable to a Whistler or a Van Gogh, which they purchase for ten cents.

But let's revert back to our good old every-day English to find out what this business of platter-collecting is all about.

Back a few years ago, most of us bought records and—becoming fond of them—kept them in the little cabinet under the phonograph provided for that purpose. We never particularly thought of ourselves as collectors—in the same sense that one collects stamps or old coins—but that's what we were. Today the collecting of phonograph records draws its enthusiasts from every strata, and "old-record" shops are springing up on every street-corner, stores in which you can buy what you want at ten cents each or three for a quarter, unless the store dealer happens to be "hep." Then the masterpieces may be sorted out beforehand and offered at such fancy prices as \$2, \$3, or—in a few cases—at \$50 each.

A CHICAGO dealer, who has been in the business for a long time and who knows his way around, told me that elderly female clerks, stenographers and secretaries used to be the principal purchasers of Bing Crosby recordings.

"They'd come in at lunch-time," he said, "and ask if there were any new Crosbys out. They couldn't wait for the new ones. And now, just to give you an idea of how crazy it is, high-

school kids, college kids come in for the Crosbys. But can you get them to buy the new ones? Oh, no. They want the old ones—the ones he made back in 1931 and 1932. And they're willing to pay fancy prices for them."

"Why?" I asked. It didn't make sense to me either.

"Because a guy named Eddie Lang accompanied him on the guitar and because somebody's discovered that this Lang—who's now dead—was a

great guitar-player. He used to accompany Bing back on the old Cremo radio show, too, so you must have heard him."

By far the most popular subject of the collectors is the popular radio band. Casa Loma, Dick Jurgens, Guy Lombardo, Benny Goodman, Artie Shaw—all big radio names—and a host of others are all avidly sought after by the collector who will—upon the slightest provocation—invite you over to his "hot-house" for an evening of Louis Armstrong. "I've got 'em all," he'll tell you with a gleam in his eye that makes you wonder whether you should go or spend a quiet evening at home reading the Congressional Record. And just what "having 'em all" really means becomes apparent when he tells you that Louis Armstrong cut a groove on more than a thousand disks from the time he started out with King Oliver's Creole Jazz Band a long time ago.

CONSEQUENTLY the largest group of collectors is that group which seeks "hot music." It draws its enthusiasts from every walk of life—from the schoolyard and the college campus, the business office, from behind soda-fountains and in great factories. Maybe you're one. I am. And the most-prized possessions of this group are the original Leon "Bix" Beiderbeckes. Perhaps, back in the early days of big radio shows, you will recall the "Golden Era" show which Paul White-man, troupin' from city to city, staged for Old Gold cigarettes. And if you do, you've probably never forgotten the young trumpet-player featured in the brass section. Neither have the platterbugs forgotten him, and, tragically, he died back in '31 before he had made nearly enough recordings to satisfy the public appetite for him. A Beiderbecke record today will bring \$35 in almost any market because of this scarcity.

In this same Chicago record mart—which carries an assortment of more than 75,000 recordings of various types which it offers to the platterbugs at ten cents a throw or three-for-a-quarter—it is an interesting fact that the re-

## SHAW'S ESCAPE FROM DEATH

**Agranulocytopenia tried putting him in one groove — he preferred another**

**F**LASH! Artie Shaw, top-flight hot clarinetist, radio's wonder boy of 1939, and Lady Luck, the ficklest female of them all, are closer than a dead heat!

That's the way the news should have been blazoned out to the world at large last May 17, when Artie Shaw returned to radio; if it wasn't, it should have been; if it wasn't, let's do it here and now. For Artie Shaw is the luckiest young fellow in radio today. He's just come back from what was very nearly a one-way trip to those pearly gates. He laughs when he thinks about it now, but just before his near-fatal sickness Shaw wrote a song called "One Foot in the Groove"—as forthright a piece of "hot" as the name would indicate. He thinks now that he should have called it "One Foot in the Grave." He had that foot in there, all right, and he got it out, all right—the hard, long way.

Most of Artie Shaw's life has been on the tough side. After a false start with a band in New Haven, Connecticut, he joined an outfit that played in Lexington, Kentucky. There it broke up. The other boys went home. Artie stayed on, sleeping in the park, washing his shirt

in the park fountain, getting a restaurant job in order to eat. Nevertheless, Lexington saw the beginning of one of the things that makes Artie Shaw a standout among bandsmen. It's no secret that musicians, by and large, are an inarticulate lot. Music keeps them busy, and music is all they care about. They don't read much, they don't talk much outside their own fields, very few of them could be called well educated. But Artie Shaw is a bookworm—a bookworm, a scholar, and a writing-man to boot. He has studied at three universities—Cleveland, Columbia, and N. Y. U. His marks in calculus at the last-named school were the highest of the year.

**H**E HAS written at least one book, a life of Bix Beiderbecke. And all this began in Lexington, Kentucky, in the long warm evenings after work, when Artie began to haunt the public libraries. He started writing then, too. He'd sit in the park with a stub pencil and a scrap of paper and spend hours just trying to write, accurately and truly, exactly what he saw, or how he felt, or the color of the sky.

For a year and a half Artie drifted

around the country, looking for an empty seat in somebody's sax section. He was sixteen, and he kept plugging. And writing. In Cleveland he won an essay contest, was rewarded with a 6,000-mile tour of the West by plane. When he got to Hollywood he stayed there, playing with Irving Aaronson at the Cocoanut Grove. He traveled with the band through the Middle West to New York, then dropped music to study more. When he picked up his clarinet again, it was to join the Columbia Broadcasting System musicians' force, and at CBS he played under Kostelanetz, Van Steeden, Humber, and Whiteman. After that stint, still juggling his two loves, music and writing, he bought a farm in Pennsylvania and wrote his Beiderbecke book. But he didn't like it

when it was finished. And still doesn't. So Artie Shaw went back to his first love—and the big break. A swing concert at the Imperial Theater, New York, started him on the way. Artie came on the stage after the biggest bands in the country had done their stuff, and tore the house down with just himself and a string quartet. Up in the big-time at last, he organized his own band, played the Onyx Club, the French Casino, the Lexington Hotel, the Paramount Theater. But the band still wasn't right, so Artie Shaw took it on the road for a year and a half. When he came back his name was in the first ten, sweet fame was his. High, wide and handsome. Artie Shaw starred on the Old Gold series with Robert Bench-



PRESENTING, ladies and gentlemen, eleven more of your choices among the personalities and programs of radio, as indicated by the 750,000 votes you sent us in the Star of Stars Poll of 1939. As last week, we refer you to the new table of results on these pages, where, for every division, you'll find the winner with his standing in points and the runners-up listed below with their standings. As we explained last week, the points recorded represent standings of star or program based on 100. For your information, however, we think a fuller explanation is desirable. After the votes had all been counted, we took the twelve in each classification with the greatest number of votes, forgot about the others. The total votes received by those twelve was made to represent 100 points. The number of points awarded each of the twelve would then represent that star's or program's proportion of the total. For example, in order to receive 49.2 points, "One Man's Family" had to poll nearly one-half of all votes cast for the twelve listed, to be exact, 49.2 percent. Several features of this final group of results interested us. First, the voting on kids' programs. Sure enough, "The Lone Ranger" came in the winner, but note the three runners-up, none of which are more than four points behind. They're all the fairy-tale type, with no blood-and-thunder. Indicating, we thought at first, that most of our voters were adults who disapproved of the "Gang Buster" motif. But if that is true, why did "The Lone Ranger" win? Because the grown-ups like it too? Again, there are the results in the serial-drama division. We knew "One Man's Family" was popular, but its 5-1 win over any other serial should be a hint to daytime sponsors on what listeners like in drama. We note also that Artie Shaw is the new king of swing, nosing Benny Goodman out by 3.7 points, but that young Artie bows to Tommy Dorsey as best swing instrumentalist, lagging 9.2 points. Mention should be made of the Best Program not on a Network division, too. Naturally, voting here was highly diversified. Reason for Zeke Manners' 25.2 standing is no doubt the great population which hears New York local programs. Now we'll leave you to make the scores of other interesting observations which can be made from the results of this week and last—a veritable Blue Book of radio.



### "Men Behind the Stars"



## Radio and the Box-Office

THE other evening I heard quite a controversy waged by a group of leading musicians regarding the effect of radio broadcasts on the box-office receipts of concerts and operas. "Radio helps," said the affirmatives; "Radio hurts," declared the negatives. And so the argument went on, and as usual among musicians, no general agreement was reached. Your reporter is also a musician, and so he ran true to type by holding stubbornly to his own opinion that radio increases attendance at the best concerts and opera performances, because it has familiarized the dialers with the master compositions, the great singing voices, and the art of the leading instrumentalists. The radio public cannot of course ever see Bach, Beethoven, Brahms and Wagner, but it has a real desire to gaze some time upon Flagstad, Heifetz, Toscanini, Tibbett and Rachmaninoff. Especially Rachmaninoff, who has never sounded his pianism on the air.

He and Kreisler still fight shy of radio and call it "mechanized" music when it broadcasts tone. That is somewhat illogical on the part of those two gentlemen, for both of them have made numerous phonograph records, and if that is not "mechanized" music, then my grandmother is an omnibus.

The outstanding artists certainly have nothing to fear from radio as a box-office deterrent. Their real enemies are too frequent public appearances and waning voices and instrumental technique as the result of age. Also there is the danger that the nervously progressive American public, liking novelty and change, is always ready to acclaim new superior talent and to shelve some of the too familiar. Perhaps the chief nightmare of most veteran public singers, players and conductors is the vision of some younger rival who might suddenly pop up and monopolize the interest of music-lovers—and the take at the box-office.

The oldsters cannot hold on forever, and should realize that there must be pinch-hitters to carry on when the present popular favorites have taken themselves and their art to the distant Elysian fields. The only ones that can feel safe are the composers who have written immortal music and now look tranquilly on this world from on high and continue to hear their works played and applauded as the ages roll on.

Will the day ever come when Beethoven's Fifth Symphony shall pall, Chopin's F Minor Ballade seem merely melodramatic, and "Tristan and Isolde" sound to future generations as a futile outburst of sawdust passion? We know not, as the old-time novelists used to say. May that moment be eons away, for should it ever arrive,

mankind shall have lost its exalted masterpieces to gain—what?

## Speaking Up

T MUST be assumed that steady dialers do not take everything for granted on the air any more than does the writer of this column, and all of us probably ask ourselves many a puzzled question. Doubtless these are some of them:

Why do musical announcers, with few exceptions, explain music as though they were delivering solemn funeral orations?

Why does The Great Silence fall upon daily newspapers whenever there is an important musical debut in radio? They report all the puny little recitals of the concert stage and all the second-hand opera presentations by second-hand singing companies, but let a new symphonic work come through the microphone, or a new vocalist, instrumentalist or conductor make a first appearance, and lo! the critics are out and gone to the races, or somewhere.

Why doesn't station WQXR (Interstate) do national network broadcasting? Of course they give only recorded programs, but they are the best imaginable, and it is a burning shame that only dialers living within a restricted distance from New York are able to enjoy those outstanding performances.

Why aren't more stadium concerts on the air? And more Philharmonics and Metropolitan operas?

Why do sponsors fight shy of symphony orchestras? The Chesterfield and Banks people tried the experiment with the Philadelphia organization, and furnished notable concerts admirably led by Stokowski. General praise was the result, and must have brought about the warm gratitude of all musical radio fans. Perhaps that gratitude may not have sold many extra cartons of cigarettes, or increased bank deposits greatly, but it certainly established enormous good-will for the sponsors.

Why do we not hear more concertos for less familiar instruments, like the harp, oboe, clarinet, horn, etc.? If an absolutely popular instrument is desired, let it be whispered that so eminent a master as Debussy composed a "Rhapsodie" for saxophone and orchestra!

Why do so many singers who speak good English distort that language when they vocalize on the air? The well-known tender passion is "love" and not "lahve," our two-footed and feathered friends are "birds" and not "bairds," and the word "you" is not pronounced "yieu."

Why—but we pause for answers to the foregoing.

Guillaume Lekeu, Belgian (1870-1894), was a pupil of Franck and D'Indy and, before his untimely death from typhoid, produced chamber-music and detached vocal and instrumental pieces that remain attractive because of their originality, tunefulness and emotional intensity.

One wonders how many piano concertos, whole or in part, Miss Schumann has played under the Rapee direction. She has been his steady keyboard soloist through the years, and performed practically all the outstanding works for her medium in conjunction with orchestral accompaniment. The Grieg example is a

lasting favorite, and all constant radio listeners are well acquainted with its dramatic opening measures and the immediately following lovely lyrical theme. Maurice Baron has done well to take over the Henrietta Schumann talents from Rapee.

The conductor figures as composer of two feeling and finely made songs, in which the resonant, agreeable voice of Weede and his sensitive interpretations should come to effective registering.

Tschaikowsky's "Serenade" is for string orchestra, written in 1880, and shows that composer at the zenith of his powers as a melodist and perfect orchestrator.

Maybe Barlow has been reading our "Something About" essays, wherein we recently spoke about rare concertos for the oboe. At any rate, here he is with a notable example by Handel, who had a special preference for the instrument, as did Bach. It dates back into the dimmest days of antiquity, and has been found in Egyptian tombs of 3700 B.C. Originally the oboe was known as the shawn. Haydn, Mozart and Beethoven used two oboes in their symphonies; Wagner, always out ahead, put three oboes in his operatic orchestra.

Handel wrote six oboe concertos, in which that "soprano" of the double-reed family (the English horn is the "alto") is understandingly employed in exposition of its pastoral tone-quality, and blended beautifully with the orchestral accompaniment.



the palace of Count Thun in 1783. Ordinary mortals, when they are house-guests, usually take along a present of candy or flowers. The prolific Mozart, who could shake a symphony out of his sleeve before breakfast, just wrote a gift score as his offering. The work is in his typical sprightly and melodious vein, with a particularly sparkling last movement.

Bach's suite, with the customary overture and several dance movements, is one of the series he composed for his patron, Prince Leopold of Anhalt-Cöthen, at whose court the master was in charge of music. The Prince, a devoted lover of the art, preferred orchestral performance and maintained his private symphonic ensemble of eighteen players.

Ordinarily, of Mendelssohn's "Midsummer Night's" music, only the overture is programmed, but Leinsdorf gives us a more complete hearing by omitting that number and listing the "Nocturne and Scherzo," the "Intermezzo," "Little March," and "Wedding March."

# Something About Romantic Piano Solos

IT IS a decidedly difficult matter to say just where the line should be drawn that marks the transition from classical to romantic music. In fact, there really is no such exact line. Broadly speaking, present-day acceptance has it that classical music is the formal composing that flourished from the end of the sixteenth century to the end of the eighteenth, while the other kind dates from about 1820, when the romantic movements in the arts were in full swing.

The whole question is still confused and likely to remain so. However, it is not important except for historians. So long as some classical music sounds romantic, and some romantic sounds classical, and all great compositions in the end seem to become classics, the average listener does wisely to give himself over to mere enjoyment and let scientific definitions go hang.

Probably the best explanation of classical is that of Riemann, the famous German musical lexicographer: "Classical—a term applied to a work of art against which the destroying hand of time has proved powerless. Since only in the course of time a work can be shown to possess the power of resistance, there can be no living classics." The same general idea was once expressed more tersely by the humorist who said that "A classical composer is a dead composer."

In America, most people use "classical" as antithesis to "popular," which is about as correct as that other absurdity, "semi-classic." No one has yet discovered exactly what that means. Those who use the term no doubt believe that classical (fugues, sonatas, symphonies) has no tunes, semi-classic has a sort of tune, and only popular has real tunes. I once heard Rubinstein's "Melody in F" referred to as classical, and Braga's "Angels Serenade" as semi-classical!

The foregoing preamble is by way of saying that there is romantic stuff in Bach, Haydn, Mozart, Schubert and Beethoven; and classical in Weber, Schumann, Mendelssohn, Brahms, and even Liszt. If all this mixes you up considerably, it does me too!

Weber was born fourteen years before Beethoven, and yet in some degree was the first of the veritable romanticists. He won his chief renown with his operas, but also scored brilliantly as a pianist, and gained international triumphs with the performances of his own works for the keyboard, especially the still beloved "Konzertstück" (for piano and orchestra), eight sets of variations, twenty-four waltzes, six fugues, four sonatas (one of them has the familiar "Perpetuum Mobile"), and of course the abidingly popular "Invitation to the Dance." Berlioz and others have orchestrated it, and the late Leopold Godowsky arranged it for two pianos, and later for three.

Mendelssohn was born 1809, Schu-

mann and Chopin 1810, Liszt 1811. A strange coincidence and foreshadowing of the coming great romantic movement in piano music! Mendelssohn is the best formalist of the four, Schumann the most idyllic, Chopin the most dramatic, Liszt the most flamboyant. All four started as pianists, but a finger accident took the youthful Schumann from the keyboard and turned him to creation exclusively.

Mendelssohn began to compose when he was ten. At seventeen (1826), he had written his first piano sonata, the imperishable overture to "Midsummer Night's Dream" (for orchestra) and the ever popular "Rondo Capriccioso." In 1834 came the first of the many "Songs Without Words," the later collections (published between 1843-45) including the "Spinning Song" and the "Spring Song," perhaps his best-beloved composition, unless it be the "Wedding March."

Mendelssohn's piano list never is profoundly deep, all of it has abundant melody, charm, and facility and polish of craftsmanship.

Dreamy Schumann represents the poetic spirit of German romanticism more convincingly than the suave and buoyant Mendelssohn, and the former's more imaginative approach to music is illustrated strikingly by a sentence he wrote in a letter (1832) when he was twenty-two: "Dorn (also teacher of Wagner) wishes me to believe that music is fugue—heavens!"

At nineteen Schumann did his sprightly and characteristic "Papillons," and the next year saw the appearance of the "Toccata," that formidable study in double notes. In 1841 he commenced the immortal A Minor Concerto, premiered five years later by his wife, Clara. He became intensely interested in the literature of the period, and much of its influence is apparent in his piano music, but the leading impulses are the tender expression of human feelings and the reflection of outdoors nature—"Childhood Scenes," "Flower Piece," "Night Piece," "Album of Youth," "Woodland Scenes."

The larger canvases, and which chiefly keep Schumann in the repertoire, are the "Carneval," the G minor and F sharp minor sonatas, "Andante and Variations" (for two pianos), the "Fantasie Pieces," "Kreisleriana," the monumental "Symphonic Etudes," and the majestic Fantasia in C, the last-named still looked upon as one of the major test-works for even the best pianists. To the majority of less serious music-lovers, Schumann's enduring masterpieces are his gracious "Arabesque" and the affectionate and touching "Traumerei."

If there is any criticism of Schumann's composing technique, it is that he occasionally repeats his thematic material too persistently and develops it at too great length.

of his room, and when Jack asked why he didn't meet him, Burns said, "I didn't know what time you would arrive."

Jack rolled on the floor. Gracie and Mary put a stop to such doings.

When Benny and his writers are working on a script, he will act the whole thing. If the script calls for him to climb a ladder, he'll climb one. He gets peeved at Beloin and Morrow, the ace gag-men, at times, but never bawls them out. Instead, he scolds Baldwin, his secretary for eight years, for not "reminding the boys to do such and such."

He loses his temper with his radio cast if they don't put their whole heart in rehearsals. But after bawling them out he'll say, "I'm sorry I was a bit harsh."

Benny has been accused of being absent-minded and reserved. Morrow says his brain is preoccupied, that he's always thinking about his work, and that many persons mistake his preoccupation for snootiness. He's a generous and fair boss and gets his hands extra jobs when he can. He even pays his cast and writers when they do benefits, although Benny is not paid for such work.

His feud with Fred Allen, of course, is just a gag. They really are good friends.

Benny reads detective stories and other frothy stuff. He likes to think of himself as a gourmet, but actually his appetite is very easy to please. He does know good coffee, and makes his own. He also enjoys malted milks and likes to eat at drive-in restaurants—those places where you park and eat in your car. He eats anything, but is apt to sample your food. He eats when he gets hungry and eats what he wants.

His favorite exercise is walking, and he takes long jaunts with his trainer, Harvey Cooper. He plays golf, too. And terribly! He makes fun of the game while he plays it, and usually knocks off about the tenth hole.

He enjoys driving his own car, and owns three. On his recent trip to Europe, he left his Buick in Chicago, and all during his European jaunt he kept talking about how much fun he would have driving from Chicago to California.

Benny can sleep anywhere and in anything. If he's tired after a party, he'll sleep a few winks on the divan in his clothes before he heeds Mary's order to undress and relax. He never uses a pillow.

Mary buys a new hat every week, and each is more radical than the other. Those gags of Benny's about his wife's hats are from his heart.

Mary is a very vital person and interested in everything, particularly hats. She smokes moderately and is generous to a fault. She loves movies and attends every preview possible.

She loves fine nightgowns and negligees and is afraid of the dark. She won't be alone for five minutes if she can help it. They have some half a dozen servants, but when Jack is away, her sister or Gracie must stay with her.

Mary is essentially high-strung. Jack pays her a salary and she spends half of it on clothes. She loves tailored underthings and silken doodads. She buys a new dress for each weekly show and her wardrobe is filled with fine clothes and furs.

She sometimes bobbles a line in the show, but the audience never knows it, and the bobbles give Benny some swell ad-lib material. Recently she said, "Can't I be boat's Don" instead of "Don's boat." Jack squeezed five extra laughs out of the mistake and the audience thought the line was planted.

Jack is allergic to roses. They make him sneeze. A fan sent him a basket of roses at a recent broadcast and Benny was on a spot. He didn't want to seem ungrateful and he knew the sender was in the audience. So he smelled the flowers, and sneezed so often that his show almost was late.

As a dresser he's inconsistent. He has been voted the second-best-dressed man in America, but he's apt to be mussed at times, with cigar ashes on his front. Robert Taylor asked Benny the name and address of his tailor, and now Taylor goes to Jack's tailor. Phil Harris also is a smooth dresser and goes for hand-embroidered robes.

The Jack Benny Club of Perry, Iowa, voted him the only star who can look handsome in his shirt-sleeves. It's well enough that his fans can't see him at Saturday rehearsals. The cast meets at Benny's house and sits around a long table. Jack is at the head of the table, dressed in a pair of gabardine slacks, a tan camel's-hair sweater and a tweed coat. Morrow and Beloin wear rumpled sports clothes. Mary probably will be dressed in a navy-blue blouse and slacks, with a bandana on her head. Andy Devine will be in blue dungarees and Don Wilson will wear flannel golf slacks and a polo shirt. Phil Harris probably will be the best-dressed of the pack, with a bright sweater and glen-plaid trousers.

When Benny began his gags about his Maxwell automobile, he had no idea so many of the cars still are in operation. But owners of the orphan cars have sent him more than a hundred hub-caps from old Maxwells.

Every room in the Benny home, except the dining-room, has a fireplace.

A Benny joke seldom fails, but Jack tells of the time he flopped.

"I was at the Academy of Music," he said. "I walked onto the stage and said, 'Hello, everybody.' I got the raspberry. So I said, 'Good-by, everybody,' and walked off and kept right on walking until I got home."

Jack poses as a tightwad in his show, but he's really a soft touch. He gave away \$1,500 in two days to not-so-lucky friends during a recent visit to New York.

Several years ago he and Mary adopted a daughter, Joan Naomi, who now is about five. Jack's funniest act is seen only by her and Mary. He romps and yells with her and converts his home into a madhouse. She went to one of his rehearsals and saw him do a line several times. Finally she said, "Why didn't you do it right the first time?"

Benny is not a joiner. He belongs to the American Legion, however. He

**A** TRANSMISSION from the tiny territory of French India, of especial interest to DX listeners, will be broadcast over amateur station FNIC (14.084) on Thursday, June 29, at 10 a.m. EDT. Reception reports should be sent to D. W. H. Patterson, Gondalpara, Chandernagore, Bengal, French India. This station's unusual QSL cards picture the head of a royal bengal tiger in gold against a circle of dark blue.

Charles Havlena of Washington, D. C., writes that broadcasts for North America may still be heard from Prague (Bohemia) nightly from 7:55 to 9:30 p.m. EDT, over either OLR4A (11.84) or OLR5A (15.23). The programs come to a close with the playing of the Czechs' national anthem, "Kde Domov Mu?" (Where Is My Home).

Authentic reports reaching me from Europe claim that the finest radio engineers of Germany have just completed one of the most powerful short-wave installations in the world at Hitler's Wachenfeld retreat at Berchtesgaden. Tests from this station, it is reported, have been heard in Australia and western America. Speeches of the heads of other nations are tuned in on the chancellor's powerful receiving sets and recorded for future reference. Even telephone conversations between Hitler and other parties are recorded. Nothing passes through the ether or the cables that could remain unknown to the master of the Third Reich, according to my informant.

Since February, Lithuania's 500-watt government short-wave station LYR (9.29) has been testing daily from 1 to 2 a.m. and from 1 to 3 p.m. EDT. A powerful new short-wave station, with beams directed to North and South America, is being planned to replace this present small transmitter at Kauunas.

Dennis E. Gallo, owner of short-wave station YNDG of Leon, Nicaragua, notifies me that a special program for listeners in the United States is now being broadcast Saturday nights at 11 p.m. EDT on a frequency of 13.9 mags. This transmitter is on the air week nights from 9:30 to 10:30 p.m. EDT, on its newly assigned frequency of 7.66 mags. All correct reports sent to YNDG will be verified providing these are accompanied by a dime, since international reply coupons are not valid in Nicaragua.

Gail Beyer of Chicago, Ill., tells me that the Chinese station on approximately 11.4 mags is XRVG, Chungking, China, according to a letter of verification he has received from Mr. Tseng of the China Information Committee. XGOX (17.8) of Chungking broadcasts an English program nightly from 10:50 to 11:15 p.m. EDT.

**SHORT - WAVE SHORTS:** 2RO8 (17.82) has replaced 2RO6 (15.3) in the usual nightly 8:30 to 10 p.m. EDT "American Hour from Rome" . . . August Balbi of Los Angeles, Calif., reports that EIRE (17.84) of Athlone, Ireland, is now being heard irregularly from 12:30 to 6 p.m. EDT; that TPB11 (11.885), Paris, France, has increased its transmitter power and is being heard with greatly increased strength; that COCO, Havana, Cuba, has shifted in frequency to 8.7 mags; that HS8PJ (9.51), Bangkok, Siam, is being heard Saturdays from 9 to 11 a.m. EDT, and on Fridays at the same hour irregularly, and that XMHA (11.86), Shanghai, power 500 watts, is broadcasting week days from 12 mid. to 2 and from 6 a.m. to 12 noon, and on Sundays from 11 p.m. to 12 noon EDT, Mondays.

XMHA often relays San Francisco General Electric station W6XBE near 10 a.m. EDT . . . TGWA (9.685) of Guatemala City, Guatemala, rebroadcasts the BBC Reuter's news service, Sundays at 9:30 p.m. EDT . . . The director of short-wave station TG2 (6.19) of Guatemala City, Guatemala, notifies me that new attractive QSL cards in Spatari, the new universal short-wave language, have just been completed and are available for those sending in reception reports . . . ZP14 (11.72), Villarica, Paraguay, operates Mondays through Fridays from 6 to 9 p.m. and on Saturdays and Sundays from 12 noon to 7 p.m. EDT . . . John M. Sherman, technical director of broadcast station WTCN of Minneapolis, Minn., advises me that its ultra-high-frequency relay station W9XTC has been temporarily withdrawn from service . . . Australia's new national short-wave station which is under construction in northwest Australia will bear the call letters VLR6.

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

son, Buford, and he has made as many as three appearances a day hundreds of miles apart.

I am still a little punch-drunk as I write this. I have the confused impression of a kindly man lying ill in a white hospital bed who has been—in turn—something of a Jean Valjean, a combination of Horatio Alger's most persistent and heroic character, Henry Ford, and Billy Sunday. There is little or no trace of the rowdy and roistering Cadle of the early days left in his make-up, and he is like a Jean Valjean washed clean of his sins. As he told me—in a most matter-of-fact tone—of the fortunes he had amassed in shoe-repairs, in the selling of cars, in Florida real estate, and as I remembered the little country preacher boy, fresh from the sassafras, entering business for the

sake of God and hugely successful at it, there was a whimsical touch of Alger to the man.

"Last year," he said, "we had more than one hundred thousand conversions. We diverted more than two hundred people from the suicide they contemplated, and we halted—with sage advice—at least a thousand divorces." And that was Henry Ford, calmly recapitulating the year's production. Like Billy Sunday, Cadle preaches fire and brimstone and the wonders of salvation. He preaches a heaven of pearly gates and a hell of fire.

He is one of the great evangelists of our age. And he is extremely thankful that he lives in the day of radio because, he says, he could live to be as old as Methuselah and never touch the surface of the millions he reaches now through a microphone on his pulpit, which makes the world his parish.

corded voice of King Edward VIII, in his farewell address to a world which was concentrated around many millions of radio loudspeakers, carries a price-tag of four bits.

While many collect simply because the fever is upon them, others collect with a more utilitarian purpose at heart. Hal Kemp, for example, collects Debussy, Ravel, Sibelius, and other classical "greats"—not alone because he enjoys hearing them but because he gets smart new ideas for orchestrations and instrumentations from these masters—ideas which are incorporated into arrangements of his band and which give, in many instances, that air of being "different" to that musical organization.

And then, almost every boy or girl studying music with the Metropolitan Opera Company as a goal gathers in the imperishable recorded voices of Patti, Caruso, Sembrich, Melba and others as case records for their study. Oddly enough, Caruso recordings are among the cheapest collectors' pieces—not because of any fault in the great Italian's voice or technique but because he made so many recordings.

Others collect hillbilly songs, folk-songs, comic dialog, early blues singers. There is no top, no bottom, no latitudinal nor longitudinal boundaries to the craze—which is not a craze at all, basically, but a deep-seated love of music on the part of many people. One result of the platterbug's mania has been the start and growth of a new type of music-house—a business establishment which buys in old master records of sought-after artists and reissues their efforts. In this group

are the Commodore Shops, maestroed by Milt Gabler; the Hot Record Society, and Steve Smith and Associates. These houses go a step farther in the making of new recordings by artists whose popular appeal is not wide but who have become idols of the platterbug.

But what—at first glance—seems a howling new way to get rich quick may have an entirely different ending as the perversity of the platterbug comes to the front. Most collectors would give their right leg for an original "Bix" Beiderbecke. But they wouldn't give two cents for a reissue. So they go on about their merry way of poring through thousands of records in hundreds of record-shops for what they might easily have by filling out an order-blank and waiting for the postman's knock.

Names among the record-collectors would astonish you—names like King Fuad, of Egypt; the Duke of Windsor; Nelson Rockefeller, Charles M. Schwab. And the craze—far from being restricted to these jazz-ridden shores—flares even more flagrantly abroad. In England there are formal "Hot Music Clubs" which hold regular meetings to discuss platters, renditions and the musical backgrounds of people like Cab Calloway and Ben Bernie. And there are kids on a fifty-cent allowance who have in their collections records coveted by millionaires.

Perhaps that's where the real thrill of platter-collecting lies—in the three-for-a-quarter salesrooms where a kid who knows his stuff, a kid who is "hep," can put it all over a wealthy dilettante who doesn't know a hot trumpet when he hears one and who—for all his wealth—has trouble "getting in the groove."

they are far removed from the tenseness which is theirs in the broadcasting studio. Here are some of the most likely spots for spying upon the celebrities:

Radio City drug store: This is one of the best spots for intimate glimpses of many stars. Almost any afternoon or evening many of your favorites can be seen eating sandwiches or sipping coffee or tea, drifting in and out, relaxing and chatting.

Lebus Fountain and Restaurant: Just as the NBC stars may be seen in wholesale lots at the Radio City drug store, so this restaurant at the CBS building, 485 Madison Ave., is the meeting-and-eating-place of many CBS celebrities. Go there about lunch-time any day and you're bound to rub elbows with any number of actors and actresses.

Lindy's: This well-known spot at Broadway, corner of Fifty-first St., is much publicized by columnists. Monday night invariably finds Eddie Cantor there, when in New York, munching a chopped-steak hamburger. Song-writers and song-pluggers make this a meeting-place.

Cocktail Lounge, lobby floor, RCA Building: You'll nearly always find Fred Allen here between his two Wednesday night broadcasts.

Dave's Blue Room: This establishment on Seventh Ave., near Fifty-second St., is a favorite haunt of handleaders in their moments of relaxation.

Charlie's Tavern: Directly opposite Dave's, this is another spot where musicians congregate.

If you have plenty of spending-money, you can see a goodly number of radio celebrities at the various swank night-clubs, especially Ben Marden's Riviera, Billy Rose's Diamond Horseshoe, and the Paradise Restaurant.

At the World's Fair itself you can see a number of radio personalities and programs. Some network programs originate regularly there, and many others will do special Fair broadcasts. "Vox Pop" does its interviews with the man-at-the-fair from the RCA exhibit on Saturday nights. Ray Perkins presents his "Letters Home" from the Westinghouse exhibit on Sundays. On Wednesday evenings Mutual has its "Welcome, Neighbor" show. WNYC, New York's municipal station, has a complete broadcasting studio in the municipal building for public inspection.

Tenor Morton Downey performs in Billy Rose's Aquacade, and George Jessel cuts up at the "Little Old New York" amusement concession. Two very interesting exhibits of popular radio programs are Dave "Hobby Lobby" Elman's hobby exhibit, and the "Gang Busters" display of modern crime-fighting equipment.

When you visit the New York World's Fair, you'll be in the country's television center. The General Electric Company gives demonstrations and gives the spectator an opportunity to participate, posing before the iconoscope camera. A similar offer is made at the Westinghouse exhibit and at RCA. At the last-named exhibit, the public is invited to witness NBC's regular television programs and also demonstrations of facsimile, "the newspaper of the air."

The NBC television schedule is: Tuesday, 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.; Wednesday, 4:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.; Thursday, 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.; Friday, 4:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m., and Saturday, 4:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.

If you were interested in seeing only the marvels of radio and television, the trip to the New York World's Fair this summer would be well worth the expenditure. So visit the World of Tomorrow if you can, and by all means seize the opportunity to get better acquainted with the great world of radio—its home, its people and their work.

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
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
