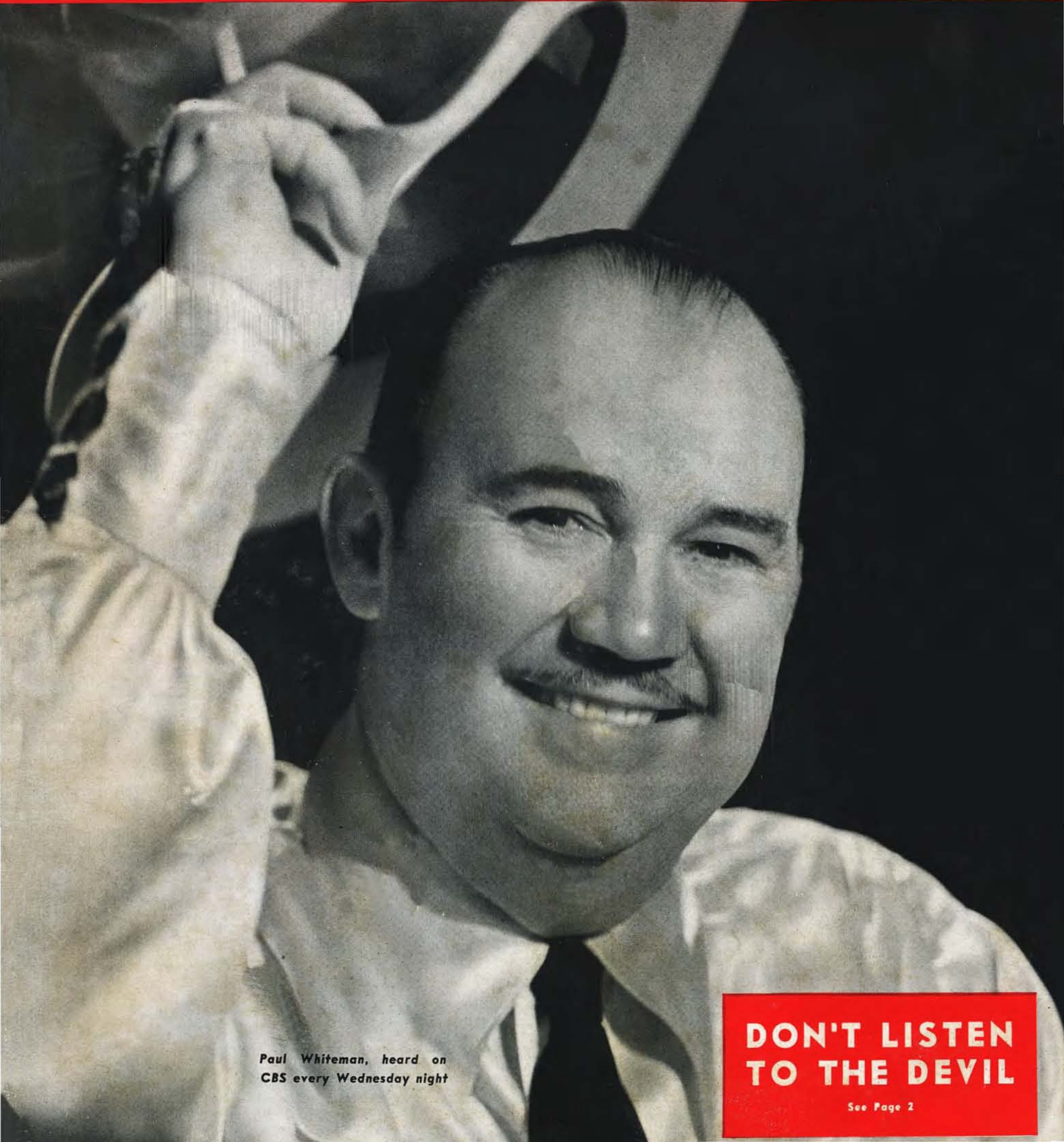

Tribute to a Great Broadcasting Idea

Radioman for Peace: On the afternoon of New Year's Day, 1939, radio grew to a new stature because of a series of programs inaugurated by the New York World's Fair. The first of those programs presented Kyosti Kallio, president of Finland, talking to all America; and Jan Sibelius, greatest living composer, conducting a symphony orchestra for the first time in twenty-five years, in honor of American listeners. Each week thereafter other international broadcasts were presented. Among them, King Carol II, President Mosaiciki of Poland, Mikhail Kalinin of Russia, King Haakon of Norway, Premier Hiranuma of Japan, Viscount Halifax of England. Here, indeed, was a realization of the old dream that nations should speak peace one unto the other. That they did speak was a result of the planning of radioman John S. Young, director of radio and television for the New York World's Fair. Many years ago John Young first found fame as announcer for the Clicquot Club Eskimos. In 1932, President Hoover gave him a gold medal as the "all-American" announcer. He was the first exchange announcer between England and the United States. But all those honors pale beside his accomplishment of bringing to American ears the voices of a world's rulers, speaking friendship and good-will. The international broadcasts he arranged have already received high praise. To John S. Young, who brought them about, RADIO GUIDE pays this tribute in acknowledgement of his contribution to international harmony and understanding.

Oomph Girls: Every so often all of us are invited to believe that some certain Miss Cinderella in Hollywood possesses a mystical quality known as "It" or "SA" or "Oomph." Mostly, those qualities are press-agents' dreams. Miss Ann Sheridan is the latest whose presence in a room is said to make men swoon at her feet and women gnaw off their fingernails. We're pretty happy that radio hasn't yet sunk to such sensationalism in order to sell its actresses. Miss Sheridan, who comes from Texas, entered the movies by winning a beauty contest, succeeded, and became the one miraculous success in a million similar "discoveries" who didn't click and who are still, for the most part, hanging around Hollywood, ashamed to go home. Only during the early days of "Major Bowes' Amateur Hour," when every high-school Gable thought he could become a star, has radio approached such shameful conditions. Typical of the way star-hunts can be conducted to the satisfaction of all, with proper respect for the future happiness of would-be celebrities, is the recently concluded "Gateway to Hollywood" program, which was sponsored by Wrigley and conducted by Jesse Lasky. Here is no trail of broken hearts or shattered dreams. Here is a record of jobs obtained. For example, besides Ralph Bowman and Rowena Cook, who got fine contracts as John Archer and Alice Eden, Charles Ruppert, Connecticut, has a long-term RKO contract. Linda Hayes, former hat-check girl, is featured in "The Spell Binder" with Lee Tracy. John Laird, Illinois, is in the same picture. Millie Coles, California, is appearing in "The Hardy Family." Camille Patti, California, works in Paramount shorts. Linda Darnell, Texas, plays the feminine lead for 20th Century's "Hotel for Women." Kathryn Hohn, St. Paul coed, plays second lead to Ginger Rogers in "My Fifth Avenue Girl." Several "Gateway" semi-finalists returned to their homes. None stayed in Hollywood unless he had a job. That's a record broadcasting can crow about—and Hollywood producers can try to equal.

Newest punch broadcast to come from California is called "Nobody's Children." Many Mutual stations are already carrying it to various parts of America. It comes direct from the Los Angeles Children's Home Finding Society. "Nobody's Children" are the unfortunate kids left alone in a friendless world. The program tells their heart-rending stories, tells listeners they may make the world a better place if they will sympathize with the underprivileged child.

Americanism:

The Americanism ballots are counted, and RADIO GUIDE readers have voted Eddie Cantor's program as that which has done the most to make Americans realize their precious heritage of liberty and democracy. In second place was Kate Smith; in third place, Father Coughlin; in fourth place, Walter Win-

DON'T LISTEN TO THE DEVIL

General Overseer Voliva once enforced Zion's ultra-blue laws with an iron hand, freely condemning recalcitrants to eternal hell-fire, admitting radio only when he couldn't destroy it

These were the builders of Zion, men and women grateful to the Lord for the cures he had effected, and they reared a great tabernacle which they called Shiloh in His name. Dowie had dreamed of "one city, one faith, one people, one industry." Zion was the city, faith-healing was the faith, cured cripples were the people. And there was not one industry but many which the Church sponsored and nurtured and controlled—a bakery, a candy factory, a printing-plant, a lace-factory, a department store—all known as the Zion Industries, Inc. And because faith in Him is the greatest healer, no doctors or druggists were allowed to practise in the city limits.

As General Overseer in Zion, Dowie's powers were complete and dictatorial. But he kept his iron fist well concealed by a smooth glove of geniality and friendship that held his followers. His successor, Wilbur Glenn Voliva, was less fortunate in his personality.

THAT he followed in his master's footsteps in his efforts to maintain one city, one faith, etc., is true and undisputed. But his methods of achieving these ends were not so carefully padded. To those who disagreed with him, he thundered the threat of a burning hell-fire from the pulpit. The verbal strongarm was all right. But when dissenters still insisted upon dissenting, he resorted to the physical strongarm. His personally managed police force was composed largely of bruisers who administered—by night, mostly, and sometimes by the light of day when there was a legal leg to stand upon—brutal beatings to those who dared to disagree with the General Overseer.

Voliva let it be known, from the start, just where he stood in the matter of dissenters. There is probably no more

eloquent—or brief—statement of city policy anywhere than is contained on a signboard he caused to be erected near the depot:

ZION IS UNDER THE CONTROL OF WILBUR GLENN VOLIVA. OUTSIDE FACTORIES NOT ALLOWED HERE AND OTHER FAMILIES NOT WANTED.

The first significant sign of revolt came in 1909, when Daniel Bryant, an elder of Zion, split with the Overseer and took a small flock to what he called the Grace Missionary Church. Voliva immediately condemned his action, scoring him and his followers from the pulpit of Shiloh Tabernacle. He consigned them to hell and spoke disparagingly of their church as a "Goat-house." Following Bryant's lead, other established churches came to Zion and built along Twenty-Seventh Avenue, where Grace Church stood. Voliva now referred to this street as "Rat Row" in his bitter tirades, and it was a new low in his life when, with Shiloh Temple burned, he was forced to take his own congregation into a building on "Rat Row."

But by that time the complexion of life in Zion had changed. The word of Voliva—tantamount to law—had kept girls from bobbing their hair, using rouge, wearing short sleeves in dresses. And with his control of the jobs in the industries—outside industries were bitterly condemned—Voliva had managed to keep most of his eight-thousand-member flock while these other churches lived a starved sort of existence. But new influences were at work to change all this.

Outside newspapers were finding their way into Zion. Transportation too had progressed, and it was easy for residents to go to near-by cities, bring back seditious and ungodly ideas. But most important, there was the radio.

Here was a word that came to every home, and there was little the General Overseer could do about it. Or was there? Why not fight fire with fire? Why not build a radio station for the Church of Zion? So in 1924—at an ultimate cost of more than \$140,000—WCBD was built. Programs aired over this station were strictly of a religious nature—sermons, Bible studies, sacred music. And in those days of pioneering in radio, WCBD was one of the strongest stations in the Midwest. Perhaps you heard it in those early days, wondered about it. But its great strength was in Zion. For the Overseer—in countless tirades from the pulpit—had warned of the devastating effects of listening to programs other than those of the Zion station. He warned parents to keep a watchful eye upon the type of program their children tuned in, and hot music, comedy, drama were taboo on Zion loudspeakers. "Don't listen to the Devil," he warned.

It is difficult to turn from ways that have been followed religiously for many years. But it is easy, too, to flick a dial and listen to the affairs of the world . . . and drama from Hollywood or music from New York or Chicago. It was fascinating, too, to listen to these things, and the fascination was not dimmed by the fact that such listening had been banned by the elders. So it was inevitable that other radio programs should find listeners in Zion, and if youth lent ear to the baseball broadcasts with more than the usual avidity of youth, it was probably because baseball had been banned in Zion. And a natural curiosity about the game had been aroused.

The first physical sign of a more widespread revolt was a direct result of radio broadcasting of baseball games.

It came in the fight of the youth of Zion—backed by a public sympathy aroused by radio—for the privilege of playing baseball, and a test case, carried to the State Supreme Court, resulted in a declaration that the city statute banning baseball was unconstitutional. This was the beginning of the end. Early on the morning of April 2, 1937, Zion was awakened by the shrill screeching of the fire siren. Shiloh Tabernacle—which also housed the radio station—was ablaze. A long, rambling wooden structure, flames were already bursting through its roof in

many places when the fire was discovered. Three hours later the building was razed. Later a young man confessed to the crime of sprinkling kerosene and starting the fire. His was a grievance, he said, against Voliva for ill treatment accorded his family. Later he recanted his confession, was tried and acquitted.

Now, the Zion station was no longer on the air. People listened where they would, although Voliva still blasted from the pulpit about the evils of unselective radio listening. And listening to other stations, they learned what was happening in the world. Events came rapidly then, one upon the heels of the other. A youth, arrested for smoking, fought the case and secured, from the Supreme Court, an injunction against the ordinance. Ladies bobbed their hair, donned silk stockings. Ball games were played openly, all with a grand disregard for Voliva, who sulked in his twenty-three-room apartment in the Zion home and watched his flock slip away from him in hundred lots. Three physicians even ventured to move into the stronghold of the faith-healers and they were closely followed by a drug store. Radio had brought to Zion a picture of the progressive world outside, and Zion was awakening.

And then—as a climactic finale to the whole amazing revolt—three boys who in other years had been pointed out by Voliva as shining examples of scarlet sin gained control of the city government in the last election. Mayor Richard Hire explained that the extent of his evil activity was withdrawal from the Church of Zion. In the other cases, there were more specific charges. Chief of Police Alven Ruesch had often been beaten and thrown into jail for smoking in the days of Voliva's dictatorship, as had his brother, Martin, now supervisor of police.

There is a new order in Zion today, and these three bad boys, with the enlightening aid of radio, have brought it about. Zionists still speak of trips to Chicago or Milwaukee as "going outside," while churches other than that of Zion—as well as industries other than those of the Zion Industries, Inc.—

are spoken of as "independents," but without the opprobrium this magnificent word once bore there. And if the Church of Zion can boast two thousand members now where once ten thousand followed faithfully, the new tabernacle reaching completion will be unable to accommodate them. It seats only 1,300.

The revolution has touched in strange places. The Church itself has not been unaffected. Today the only place in Zion where one can see popular motion pictures is in the Church of Zion. And in Shiloh Park church teams play a regular schedule of softball, and you may witness the strange spectacle of girl players wearing abbreviated shorts manufactured in the lace-factory which the sainted Dowie built at Zion.

VOLIVA—who still maintains that the earth is flat and once sailed around the earth to prove its flatness—has periodically predicted the end of the world and seems to feel no discomfiture when his predictions fail to materialize. Perhaps it is these radical changes, this influx of worldly ideas for which radio is largely responsible, which mark, for him, the end of the spiritual world he knew and loved.

But more likely Voliva of the fighting heart—in the face of a revolt brought about by radio—has learned that here is a force which will not be silenced by either verbal damnations or physical force. And realizing this, he has set out to streamline his doctrine in accordance with a wider and fuller knowledge on the part of his flock, and to overtake—at this late date—the march of time. How else can we explain the sanctioning of bare-legged lassies in holy Shiloh Park or motion pictures in the auditorium of the Church where Dowie thundered against the evils of, among other things, the theater?

IN THE impregnable fortress of the Lord which is Zion (and which lies in northern Illinois, half-way between the Sodom which is Chicago and the Gomorrah which is Milwaukee) there is discord. Even revolution. You can read it in the eyes of old-timers as they walk dazedly along the streets, warily eyeing youths with cigarettes in their hands or the new drug store where love-story magazines, chewing-gum and other corrupting influences are openly displayed. But mostly you can see it in the laughing eyes of the younger generation—girls with bobbed hair and silk-stockinged legs showing brazenly beneath short skirts; boys who openly drink Coca-Colas at public fountains and smoke where and when they will. There is no longer a fear of damnation and sudden death. And no longer do signs on the streets of the Lord's stronghold warn: TRAITORS, BUTTINSKIES, UNBELIEVERS: THE FIRES OF HELL BURN EVERLASTINGLY!

learned to raise their imploring hands; revolt, borne on the ether waves by radio, an instrument which Zion's founder would probably have banished along with the theater and the drug store and the physician if such banishment were possible. Specifically, there had been no preaching of revolt over the radio. The radio had brought, simply, an accurate picture of twentieth-century life outside to a people who, for more than thirty years, had lived an isolated and monastic sort of existence. Revolution and progress are born of knowledge, and to Zion—despite every safeguard—the radio had brought knowledge. It is a fascinating story.

Back in 1900, John Alexander Dowie—sainted founder of the Church of Zion or, as it is officially called, the Christian Catholic Church—led his faithful followers to a 6,500-acre tract of clean prairie land fifty miles north of Chicago. A stranger band of pioneers I defy you to find anywhere. They were cripples and invalids of every description who, under the prayers and faith of Dowie, had thrown away their crutches and laughed at the feeble ministrations of medical men.

NEW YORK.—The annual meeting of the National Association of Broadcasters, held in Atlantic City, N. J., and attended by the heads of radio stations from all over the country, ended with the adoption of a code that should add to your radio enjoyment. The new code, which will probably become effective in the fall, prohibits the sale of time for discussion of "controversial issues." Time for such discussions should be given free, with both sides of the issue allowed equal time. Don't worry about election blues, though, because this generosity does not apply to political speeches. There's a network law stating that candidates must purchase radio time.

Member stations of the NAB may not present programs containing attacks on "another's race or religion." Advertising must be limited to about ten percent of the regular program period—good news for all but the advertisers! Stations should regulate children's programs, restricting elements that tend to overstimulate the young listeners . . . And that about sums up the more important points presented in the NAB code. It looks like radio is definitely growing up and gradually growing better able to take care of itself. After all, it's now in its sixteenth year and nearing the end of adolescence!

Program Bits

One children's program that always received highest praise from anxious mothers was Irene Wicker's "Singing Lady" series. Irene has been presenting a similar program daily over the Yankee Network during the past few months, and starting September 4 she will be heard Coast to Coast over a network not yet determined . . . You will be sure of hearing all major fights scheduled for next fall and winter, thanks to Adams Hats and promoter Mike Jacobs, who have arranged for the coverage of the entire Madison Square Garden schedule and championship bouts over NBC. First on the list will be the Henry Armstrong-Lou Ambers match August 22.

Ezra Stone will not be heard on the Kate Smith Hour when the program returns in the fall. The Group Theater company will replace the Aldrich Family . . . The breezy "Breezin' Along" program, featuring Beverly and Johnny Green's orchestra, will be heard Mondays at 8 p.m. EDT, over MBS, starting August 7, instead of Fridays as heretofore . . . Phil Spitalny and his Hour of Charm-ers have been renewed by their sponsor and will be heard Sunday nights at 10 p.m. when the program returns to the NBC-Red network in the fall . . . Arlene Francis, the "What's My Name?" lass, has been assigned the leading feminine role in "Mr. District Attorney."

I'm extremely proud and happy to announce that Richard Brooks, news commentator for WNEW, a local New York station, has been added to the Larry Clinton broadcast, heard on Monday evenings over the NBC-Red network. Not long ago I mentioned here that Brooks was network stuff, and I'm told that those few words were directly responsible for his new commercial program . . . You may be the first listener to learn that the mysterious Ellery Queen, who conducts the CBS Sunday night detective drama, is really Hugh Marlowe, Broadway actor, last seen in "Kiss the Boys Goodbye." The actual author, "Ellery Queen," is two men.

announcer Ralph Edwards' engagement, and now comes word that the date for them to be hitched is set—August 19 . . . Ralph Kaltenborn, son of H. AT SEVENTEEN, attractive Cobina Wright, Jr., isn't the least bit worried by microphones. In fact, says she, "I love 'em."

And she speaks from a wealth of experience, for the blond and beautiful daughter of an equally well-known mother has appeared before some of the nation's best mikes. These ventures into radiodom include guest appearances on "We, the People," with Eddie Cantor's "Camel Caravan," Consolidated Edison's "City of Light," and the "True Story" hour, not to overlook a recent fling into the mystic realms of television.

Cobina, Jr., is pretty enthusiastic about broadcasting. "I like it because you can do so very much more in front of a microphone," she declared, opening her blue eyes wide with sincerity. "Radio reaches so awfully many people. I think broadcasting is one of the most fascinating things I've ever tried . . ."

The young lady, as you probably know, is the talented protegee of her astute mother who, after seeing the Wright fortunes collapse in the general melee of 1929, set out anew to restore the social and financial status of both Cobinas by a vigorous application of

wits, talent and good business sense. She did it.

High-pressured to the ranks of the glamour girls, Cobina, Jr., is tallish and slim, with trimly formed features and a wealth of blond hair. Despite her seventeen years, she possesses the poise and mannerisms of a maturer woman, tinged occasionally by some girlish inflection or gesture. Product of her patrician mother's tutelage, she aspires to a continued career before the microphone and on the stage. Like Brenda Diana Duff Frazier, with whom she went to school, Cobina Wright, Jr.'s, name has today become nationally synonymous with the term "glamour girl."

ONE of the features of guest broadcasting which she finds particularly appealing is the colorful tempo of the studios. "Things are at such tension all the time," she exclaimed. "That's what I like best. You sit there, waiting for airtime, and the little second-hand on the clock just creeps around and around until—suddenly—you're on the air. Also, you can never tell when somebody is going to tiptoe up behind you and cut out or change part of your script to make it longer or shorter—right on the air, too!" Her eyes opened

wide again at this almost unbelievable phenomenon.

Cobina, Jr., recalls vividly the ordeal she once went through just before her guest appearance on Columbia's "We, the People." There had been a mix-up over arrangements for her scheduled song, and the one she planned to use was somehow mislaid. Minutes were precious, so slim Cobina sang her way through "All Yours" minus orchestral accompaniment while Mark Warnow and his band listened with an attentive ear. Then, instrument by instrument, the orchestra picked up the tune to

match Cobina's arrangement. That night no one beyond the shiny walls of the studio noticed the slightest imperfection in either music or Cobina's own flawless voice.

She thinks her love of radio dates back to her own impromptu air debut at the age of fourteen. (If anybody doesn't believe Cobina is only seventeen, challenges Cobina Wright, Sr., they can look it up in the records of the New York Hospital.) This debut was at the Hotel Ambassador and—oddly enough—also with Mark Warnow. Mrs. Wright, once an opera-singer of note, was vocalist, and so introduced Cobina, Jr., without fanfare. She merely marched up in front of the orchestra to that intriguing microphone and sang "Love on a Dime."

Everyone applauded enthusiastically. They didn't know, however, that it was the first time this young girl had ever sung with an orchestra or before so many people. Listeners heard her over the air, wrote glowing letters. Mrs. Wright, who has taught her daughter all that she knows about music, glimpsed the beginnings of a possible career for Cobina, Jr. Engagements followed at Palm Beach, Boston, back again in New York. The young lady, however, will not sing in any night-clubs. That was settled long ago. Right now mother and daughter are working on a joint radio program which they hope to offer over a nation-wide network next fall.

Eddie Cantor has done much for Cobina, Jr., inviting her frequently to share his microphone. Only sometimes, in spontaneous Cantor style, he shifts

lines on her so that the show doesn't exactly follow the rehearsed script. "It keeps me on my toes," she explained, "but I guess that's good for me if I'm ever going to make an attempt at a stage career."

Cobina, Jr., never tells her friends to listen when she's slated for a guest appearance. "I don't know why that is," she confessed, "unless maybe I'm superstitious. I'm afraid that if everybody tunes in perhaps I'll make a mistake or something. Anyhow, I never tell them to listen. I just hope that they will."

THE one lingering ambition of Will Cuppy's life is to scare a microphone. "They've scared me lots of times," admits Mr. Cuppy. "As a matter of fact," he elaborates, "they scare me every time."

The gentleman has given the problem some acute thought, which we shall go into shortly. Right now should be pointed out a fact that you undoubtedly know, unless perhaps you've been resident on a coral reef off the coast of Sumatra this past decade and hence rather out of touch with things. Will Cuppy pens some pretty humorous lines in many of America's brighter publications, reviews mystery fiction for New York's hard-working *Herald Tribune*, and even knocks off an occasional book. Books knocked off include: "How to be a Hermit" and "How to Tell Your Friends from the Apes"—a couple of useful as well as hilarious bits of literature.

In his day Will Cuppy has bearded plenty of microphones in the role of a guest star, and given them a close shave to boot. "However," wails he, "I still get scared stiff. Funny things happen to me. I mean every time I stand in front of a mike, either at rehearsal or the actual broadcast, I have a blinding moment of spiritual illumination in which I see clearly that everything I have done, up to that instant, has been a mistake.

"I wonder why I have gone through life neglecting everything which might have helped me write a decent script. Above all, I wonder why I could have been such a jackass as to write the script in my hand, which I am about to

read, when it is obvious to the meanest intellect that it is completely unsuited to the occasion—or to any occasion."

Things usually get worse as Mr. Cuppy proceeds, but the aftermath is rather smug. "The feeling," he goes on, "doesn't persist. It leaves me the instant I am off the air. I perk up at once, and by midnight become my own carefree self, thinking that maybe I'm pretty smart after all. So then I do another guest appearance the minute somebody asks me, only to get the same reaction all over again. It's far worse than just plain mike fright. It's terrible. No little

dingus which makes people feel like that should be tolerated."

Mr. Cuppy's latest guest venture was with literati Carl Van Doren and John Mosher on Mutual's potpourri, "Busman's Holiday." He traced the love-lives of great detectives. "I dunno why," mumbles Mr. Cuppy.

It isn't lack of practise, either, which makes him allergic to microphones. He had a program of his own called "Just Relax" on NBC for twenty-six weeks once, undertakes spasmodic guest sallies, and even broadcast a description of NBC's talking-parrot contest last year

—when the parrots let him get a word in.

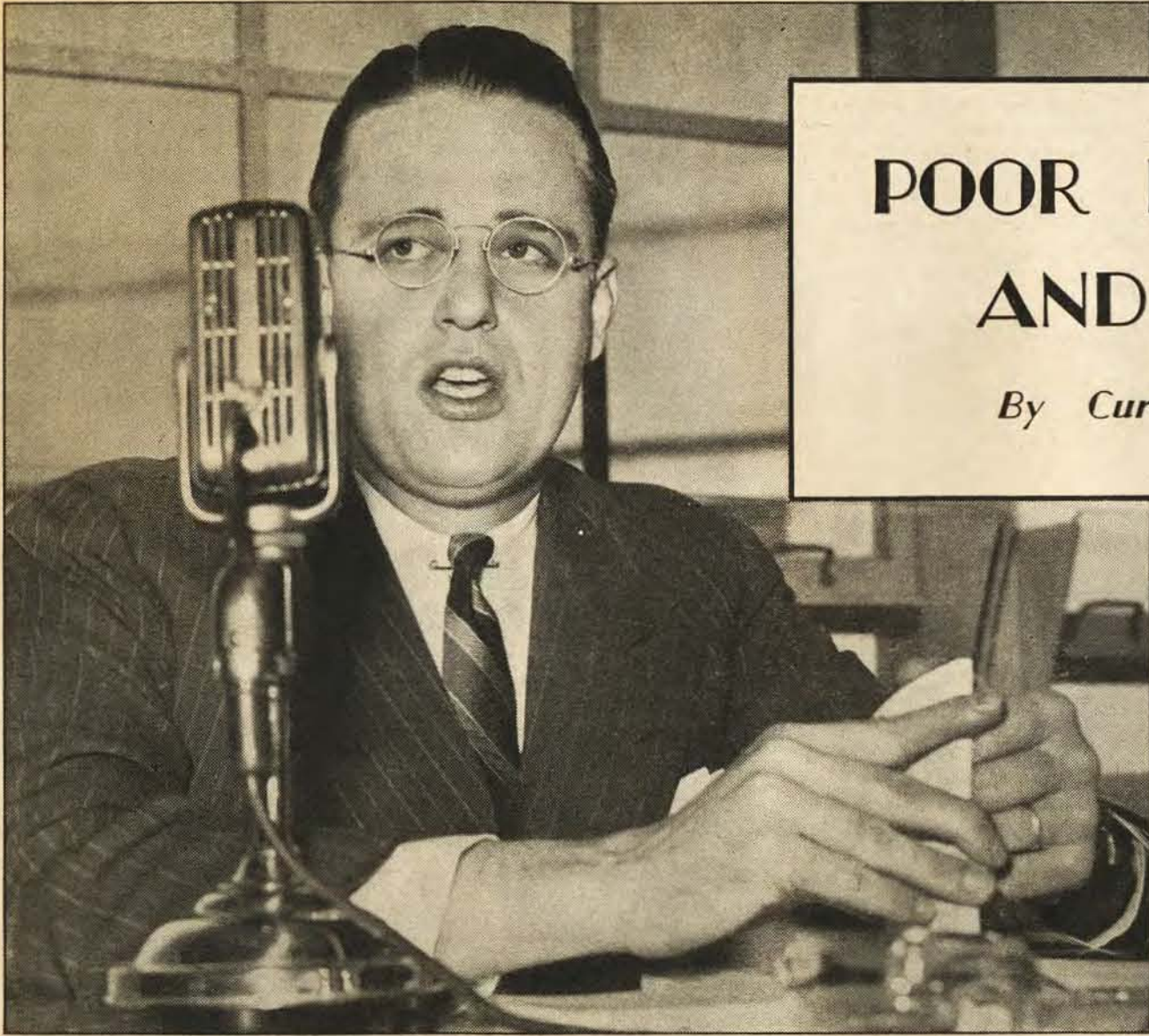
"It's a matter of nerves," rationalizes Will Cuppy, who looks at the dilemma rather coolly. "What," asks he, "are nerves for if not to be nervous with? After all of my broadcasts there has been a general agreement that I may have seemed a trifle nervous. I think people notice that sort of thing, especially when one's voice quavers and does everything but stop altogether. Confidentially, I have made a slight study of a group of persons who are never nervous. With a few exceptions, their heads are slightly under the normal size and come to a peak at the top."

Mr. Cuppy finds that he has particular trouble with frogs in his throat. "They tell me to forget it, but how can you forget a thing like that? They say I should go right on talking and it will go away. Ha!"

The last time he faced a microphone Mr. Cuppy gulped half a carton of expensive throat lozenges. "These," he confides, "upset my stomach, spoiled my dinner—but we artists will do anything to attain perfection. Only it's funny that when I opened my mouth to go on the air that night . . . I had a frog in my throat."

Will Cuppy has some very definite ideas about radio executives, too. "A strange race in our midst," he muses, "particularly at auditions. Auditions are much worse than actual broadcasts. The radio executives sit in a glass cage and make faces at you. After a while they creep out of the studio in Indian file, looking neither to the right nor left, never speaking to you. Probably they smiled or shook hands with someone once and got sued. Their heads seem to go straight back, sort of, with a long, sloping forehead like a ski-jump. I don't suppose that means anything, though . . ."

EVEN as a close observer of radio since its infancy, Mr. Cuppy admits that maybe he has been prejudiced to a certain extent by circumstances. "For a long while I never had a radio set of my very own, so I never heard what I wanted to hear. Whenever I tried to listen to anything at somebody's home, the hostess always tuned to something else and it was horrible. When I finally got a receiver of my own it was different, until recently. Now I seem to be getting programs I've heard before, so maybe something is wrong with my machine . . ." —Dick Dorrance



POOR PICKINGS AND WHY

By *Curtis Mitchell*

Broadcaster Elliott Roosevelt is one of the few radio men who have dared to speak out against FCC czars on the licensing issue

How does FCC rule of radio cheat you out of new stars and new programs? How does it prevent broadcasters from taking normal risks to give you better listening? This second editorial in our series dealing with the FCC and radio provides answers to these and similar questions. It gives you the real low-down on radio's worst headaches as they affect you, the listener—Editor.

THE banker was sorry, but that was how things stood.

"It isn't that radio isn't a great business," he said, "and it isn't that we have any question about you personally. I've known you since you were a baby, and I've always found you dependable. It's just that we can't invest depositors' money in a business we don't know will still be in existence after a year."

This little tableau occurred in the office of a banker in the Southwest a short time ago. The young man seeking the loan had invested \$35,000 in a radio station which he had been operating for four years. To this financial investment he had added hours of untiring effort and study, and now, with a reputation as a broadcaster achieved, he had an opportunity to close important contracts with an additional \$10,000 investment for modernization of his equipment.

"But the physical value of the property—better than \$35,000—should be enough security for a \$10,000 loan," he argued.

"What value would all the radio transmitters and studios in the world have if you couldn't get a license to

use them?" the banker countered. And the young man could find no answer.

"You know, son,"—the banker leaned forward in his chair—"there ought to be something that you and the hundreds like you could do to remedy a bad situation. Radio has long passed the experimental stage. It's a great industry. But as far as banks are concerned, you have every attribute of a fly-by-night promoter. You're here today, but whether you'll be here tomorrow or next year depends not on you but on a little group of political appointees in Washington, D. C.—the

the programs which come to us over those facilities. And if, from its little heaven in Washington, the FCC lays down policies which detract from those programs, our interests have been violated and we—as well as the station manager—are having our toes trod upon.

We saw last week how the Federal Communications Commission employed the short-term-licensing period and the clause, "Stations must be operated in the public interest, convenience and necessity," to impose radio censorship. Now let us see how these men use

How does FCC rule of radio hit broadcasters below the belt and, through them, you, the listener?

Federal Communications Commission.

"Such an existence doesn't make for confidence or stability. If you could get a license for three years, even, you'd be a much better risk. But with a short-term license, whose renewal is dependent upon whether you have operated your station in a way that these men approve, you're a poor financial risk."

We listeners may not have an obvious stake in radio properties, but we have—and definitely—an interest in

these same weapons to economically depress broadcasting and prevent us from having the best possible service and programs from the stations which serve us.

How do programs suffer because of short-term licenses? In the first place, the long-term planning which is a basic element in the success of such a like industry as motion pictures—where long-term contracts permit the development of actors and directors—must

be entirely lacking in radio, where a station manager would be brash indeed to contract services beyond the guaranteed twelve-months life of his station. As a result, the station must pay higher prices for the commodities it sells—talent, news service, transcriptions, etc. The additional cost is reflected in the quality of programs you hear, for stations must budget their program costs, and a higher charge for its news franchise, for example, is reflected in a lower-cost program elsewhere on the station's schedule.

Your programs are affected, secondly, by the financing of the radio station you listen to. Radio has been the fastest-growing industry in the world, and—to date—its costs have been underwritten by the individuals who pioneered the industry. Today, however, radio has passed the stage where private financing can keep abreast of vast improvements in both equipment and programming, and unless banks can be persuaded that the field of radio is sound for investment, future development will be stalemated by Federal policy.

There are few souls in the industry brave enough to speak out against the very body that has an arbitrary "yes" or "no" power over the very existence of their stations. One who has dared to speak, however, has been Elliott Roosevelt, president of the Texas Network and son of the President. Mr. Roosevelt recently told the Commission:

"The radio industry has not yet felt the stifling effect of lack of adequate financing largely because of the stability and dependability of the personalities who have associated themselves with our industry. The people who have gone in and founded stations have not done so because they felt they were making an investment in a sound business. They did it because of their public-spirited attitude.

"It is my feeling that if we had assurance of continued life so long as we operate in accordance with the law, we should be placed on a sound basis like every other business. If we can

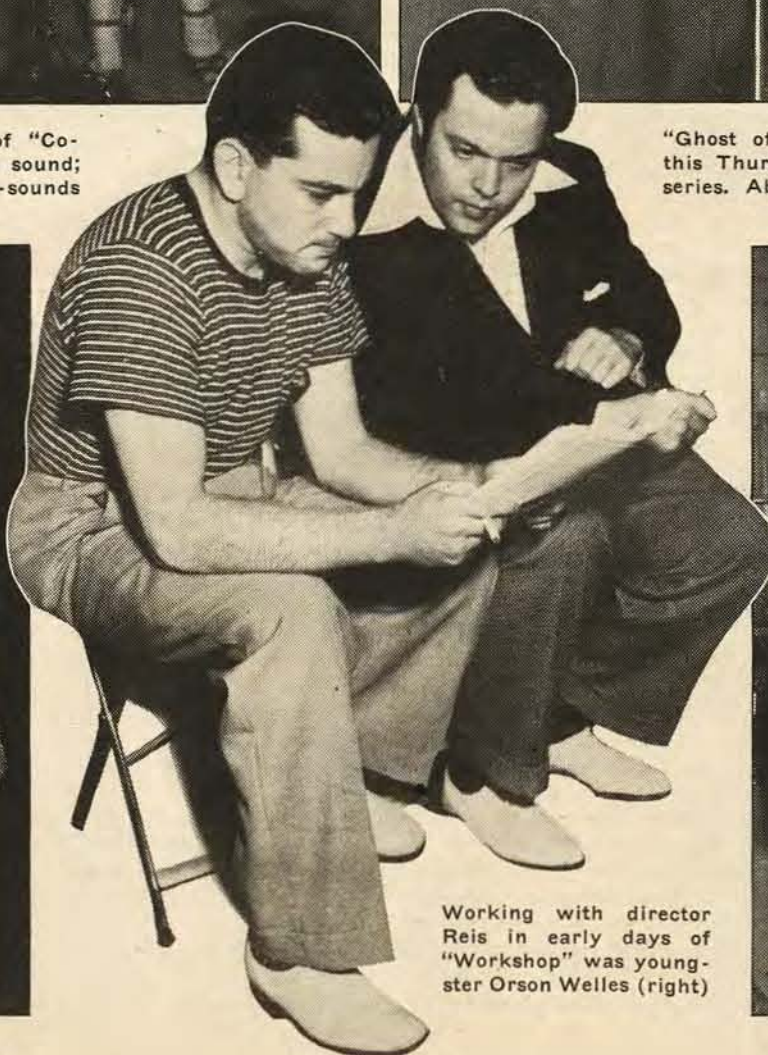

**A WINDMILL
CARRIES
THE MAIL**

Preview of the Post Office of Tomorrow—with a roof-top radio station and air mail by autogiro

AT THREE o'clock on the afternoon of July 6, 1939, Capt. John M. Miller of Eastern Air Lines lifted an autogiro plane off the roof of the Philadelphia Post Office and headed for the Camden Airport, six miles distant, the landing-field which regularly serves the Philadelphia area.

He was beginning regular service on the first—and only—autogiro air-mail route in the world.

But he was also doing something else; in sober reality, he was crossing one of aviation's last frontiers; he was striking the first blow in the coming battle to bring air transportation to complete availability. At last the airplane had come to the heart and center of a great metropolis, free from the necessity of operating from a distant, suburban landing-field. We may now confidently anticipate that the next few years will see duplication of the Philadelphia autogiro service in all the great cities of America—in Chicago, Los Angeles, Detroit, St. Louis. And it will be more than duplication: the future will see not only mail but express and passengers as well sent into the air from roof-top landing-fields. In view of all this, it is certainly no exaggeration to say that one of aviation's last boundaries has been crossed. And in the crossing of that boundary radio broadcasting played the important role that we in aviation have come to expect from it. From my own experience, I know that present-day radio communication is absolutely vital, indispensable to successful airline operation. We consider it so important that we have built there on the roof of the post office a complete, full-powered broadcasting station for the sole use of the pilot flying the six-mile air-mail route between Philadelphia and the Camden Airport. It is the only radio station of its kind in the world, and I can say that with conviction, because it is servicing the only airline route of its kind in the world, and, incidentally, the shortest.

When I am asked just how important

I consider radio's role in this epochal new service, I can only say that if for any reason it had been impossible for us to build that transmitter on the Philadelphia Post Office roof, I would positively not have sanctioned the beginning of the service. And that despite the fact that I consider this autogiro service to be one of the most important advances in the history of air transportation. Radio's part in that advance is just as important as it has been in the establishment of regular New York-to-Miami and transcontinental service, in the trans-Atlantic flights, and in the development of so-called blind, or instrument, flying.

When we were planning the Philadelphia service, I was asked why a pilot couldn't get along without radio on a flight only six miles long. The an-

swer, of course, is that he could very well get along without it—if he wanted to sacrifice safety. But aviation today puts safety first, not last.

Let's look a little closer into the matter. The Philadelphia Post Office, a comparatively new structure, was designed with an eye toward its possible use as an autogiro landing-field. Five times a day, Capt. Miller will take off from that roof-top to carry a load of mail to the Camden Airport, and five times he'll return and land on the roof. Each of these flights will save thirty-five minutes over the time required to make the trip by truck. Thus the total time saved every day will amount to about three hours, or long enough to fly from Philadelphia to Raleigh, N. C.

Now, the business of taking off and landing an autogiro on a roof-top re-

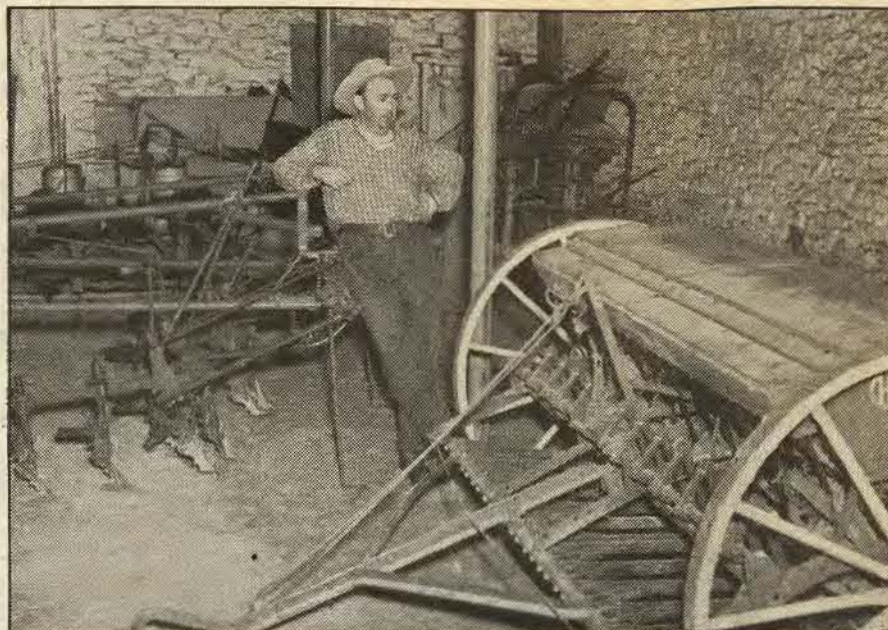
quires, naturally, a high degree of skill. I can say from personal experience that from one thousand feet in the air that landing-field looks more like a postage stamp than like a post office. And although the autogiro which Miller is using on this route descends very slowly, at an angle only a little off the vertical, and stops with no forward roll at all, he must of course carefully take into account the wind currents around the building. These wind currents are at times very turbulent, and the information which the pilot could obtain from the radio transmitter at Camden would certainly not be accurate as far as conditions at Philadelphia were concerned. Again, he could use this information, coupled with his own observations and judgment, and achieve a fair success. But he would not be operating with a perfect safety factor. To have the nearest thing possible to complete safety, he must have his own radio, his own weather station. From the instant he leaves Camden for the five-minute run to Philadelphia to the time he starts to drop down on the post office roof he will have precise, up-to-the-second information.

That's the story of how radio has helped Eastern Air Lines to make aviation history. We have built there in Philadelphia, with the help of the United States Government, a miniature airport which is, I am thoroughly convinced, the first of dozens which will eventually spot the entire country. The roof, with its non-skid surface, heated from beneath in winter to prevent ice and snow formations and slightly tilted at the ends to aid in short take-offs, is a perfect landing-spot. With its weather station and radio transmitter, it is a complete airport, down to the smallest detail. It is the first truly metropolitan airport—the first of many. And in the years to come, when we have these "flying taxicabs" operating from the heart of all our great cities to their near-by airports, radio will of course be flying with them, just as it is in Philadelphia today.

NO MORE NIGHTMARES

Listeners get no more Mars frights or Mae West thrills—and here's why

RADIO has washed its face—and just in time! It is a cleaner, brighter, more liberal radio we'll be having now, thanks to the new code adopted by the National Association of Broadcasters.

There's a story behind that new code. Not much of the story ever got out to the public, and the average listener little realizes how close he came to having the heavy hand of government censorship laid across his receiving set. That would have been a pretty howdy-do. You tune in for Charlie McCarthy, Amos 'n' Andy, or some other favorite program, and maybe you get it and maybe you don't. Under censorship, you get not what you want to hear but what some government official thinks you *ought* to want to hear.

Here's the story. You wouldn't have heard much about it unless you were on the inside, but the truth is that just about a year and a half ago the radio industry was in a bad way. The broadcasters couldn't agree among themselves. The big networks, the little networks, the big independents, the little independents, the clear-channel group, the newspaper-owned stations—all these and other elements were purring along together just about as peacefully as a den of short-tempered rattlesnakes.

Meanwhile, radio was under heavy pressure from outside the industry. A few stray "hells" and "damns" loosed into the airwaves in a dramatization of Eugene O'Neill's "Beyond the Horizon"; protest meetings and angry quarrels over Father Coughlin's programs; denunciation of children's programs by women's clubs and parent-teacher

groups; Mae West going pretty broad in her Garden of Eden skit on the air; the nightmarish "Man from Mars" broadcast—items like these were getting public, press and pulpit stirred up. There was a widespread demand that the Federal Communications Commission "do something." There were calls from many quarters that radio should be "cleaned up." The heavy shadow of official censorship was coming very close indeed.

The broadcasters were leaderless and divided. Many thought the attempt to keep up a national organization was hopeless and should be abandoned. A faithful few, however, carried on. They served as an interim committee to set up a stable organization. They wisely decided to ignore the quarreling groups within the industry and go outside for a paid, permanent president.

The man chosen was Neville Miller, a tall, broad-shouldered Kentucky lawyer who had been mayor of Louisville and later executive assistant to President Dodds of Princeton University. The nation knew him for his efficient humanitarian work during the 1937 floods, and his neighbors knew him as a liberal, honest and able executive. He took office in July, 1938, and under his leadership the National Association of Broadcasters has re-formed its ranks. It is larger than ever, united and, as shown by the code, progressive-minded.

The new code of broadcasting standards represents the radio industry's effort to show that it is fully capable of putting its own house in order. It doesn't want outside interference or government censorship. The code was

adopted by the NAB at its convention in Atlantic City in July and the board of directors was authorized to set up machinery to put it into effect—and enforce it. No date has been set for it to go into effect, but probably it will be in September, when the change-over is made from daylight-saving back to standard time. The National Association of Broadcasters includes 422 stations out of all the stations in the country, and it remains to be seen whether the NAB will be strong enough to swing the entire industry into line.

As for the code itself, let's take a look at some of its main provisions. First off, there's a rule against selling time on the air for presenting controversial public issues. Time for this purpose is given free. This rule is made to even things up and make sure that during any public controversy control of the air won't pass into the hands of whichever side happens to have the most money.

NEXT, there's a rule about religious broadcasts. Time may be sold for religious programs; but whether sponsored or sustaining, such broadcasts must be designed to "promote the spiritual harmony and understanding of mankind" and they "may not be used to convey attacks upon another's race or religion."

The purpose of this rule is to make religious programs stick to the subject. Certain individuals and organizations invoke the name of religion to carry on all kinds of crusades. They go so far, even in our freedom-of-worship America, as to attack their fellow citizens on racial or religious grounds. The rule was not aimed at any individual, but

under the new code such a person as Father Coughlin, for instance, would have to decide which way he wants to go. If he is broadcasting religion he may buy time on the air, but he must stick to religion and not attack other races and creeds. If he says he is broadcasting public controversy, he may NOT buy time but must come out into the open forums of radio where time will be given free and where there is a chance for an opposing point of view to be heard.

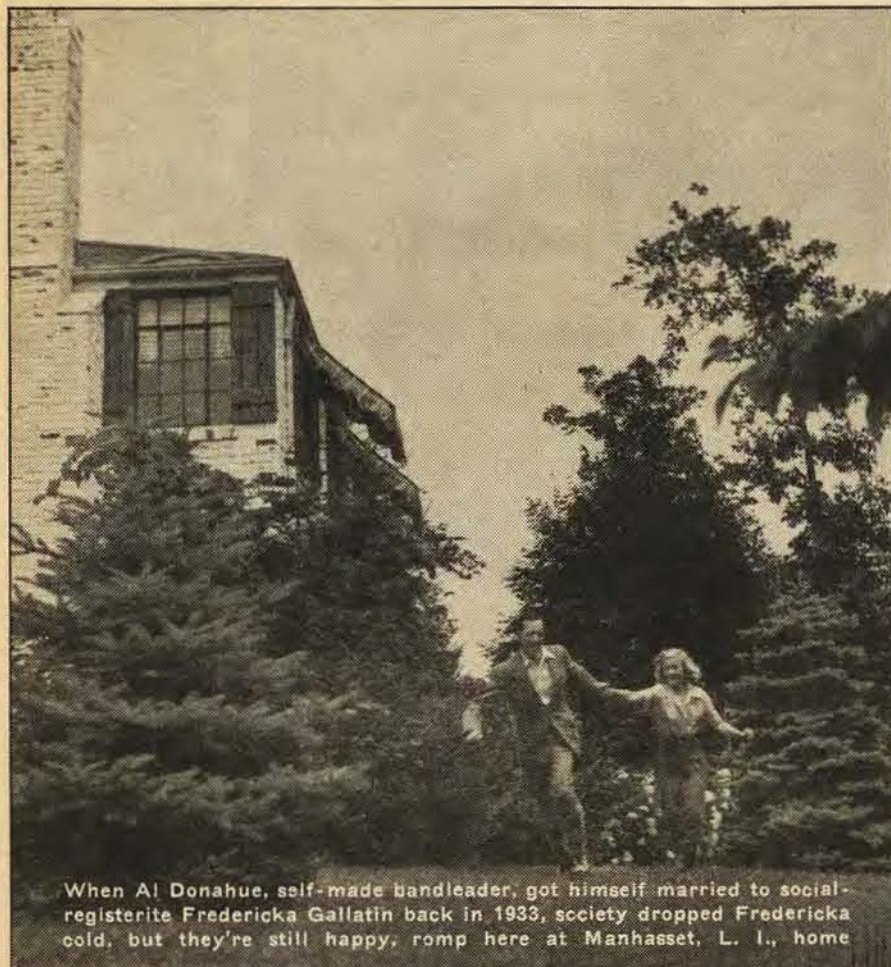
Your children will be protected under the new code. The use of such things as horror, torture, or the supernatural is forbidden, along with anything else that is "likely to overstimulate the child listener or be prejudicial to sound character development." It will probably take some time to bring all children's programs around to this more wholesome point of view, but certainly the code is aiming in that direction.

In presenting radio news, broadcasters are supposed to make sure that "news shall be presented with fairness and accuracy" and "shall not be editorial." If carried out, this rule probably will mean a toning down of some of the news commentators, for the commentators are restricted to "analyzing and elucidating news . . . free of bias."

The code urges more educational broadcasts and sets a limit on commercial announcements, amounting to not more than nine minutes of "commercials" in a full hour's program in daytime, and six minutes in an hour's show at night.

Radio is putting its house in order, and the broom is due to start swinging this fall. Then watch the dust fly!

Inside Your Radio

IN 1940 it will be just about twenty years since radio broadcasting has been made practicable, and it seems like only yesterday.

Surely the subject is worth a serious, thorough editorial explaining the origins and development of the mysterious medium, setting forth what it has achieved.

Well, to begin at the beginning.

There is probably no other single concept in the field of physics that has led to so much dispute and controversy among scientists as the ether concept. This theory postulates a medium that pervades all space and by means of which light and heat are transmitted through regions devoid of ordinary matter. It has, by many scientists, been considered the carrier of all types of radiant energy, such as radio, heat, light, ultra-violet X-rays, gamma rays and cosmic rays.

Then there is a more recent theory that also has bearing on the subject of ether. This new thought concerns "wave mechanics" and has grown out of the works on modification of the Bohr atom as propounded by such investigators as Dirac, Heisenberg, De Broglie and Schroedinger. At the time of writing his D major flute concerto, Mozart, then twenty-one, was living in Mannheim, Germany, hoping to get some kind of appointment under the Elector. He took life very easily, played an occasional concert, flirted and amused himself. He picked up a few jobs to do, one of them being an order from a rich Dutchman to write three concertos and two flute quartets. About that time, however, he fell in love with a young singer, Aloysia Weber, and was so busy paying her court that he wrote only two concertos and three quartets and was paid half the money. His father wrote him an angry letter (one of many), saying: "Why did you not follow my advice when I told you to deliver to this man as quickly as possible? Why? So as to make sure of the two hundred florins, because I know mankind better than you!"

Although Mozart was not particularly enamored of the flute, he captured the spirit of the instrument in the few compositions he wrote for it. This particular example is gay, light and exquisitely delicate throughout, the only note of gravity coming during the first part of the slow movement.

The Griffes "Poem" is for flute and orchestra, and was first played in public by Georges Barrere. Starting somberly and with clouded and obscure harmonies, it gradually develops into an eerie dance, with undertones and suggestions of Oriental coloring. Griffes, one of the most talented of American composers, died at the early age of thirty-six in 1920.

Robert Russell Bennett was out in Hollywood, scoring several motion pictures, when he got the commission from the League of Composers to write an orchestral work to be played by Dr. Frank Black. No restrictions were laid on him and the choice of subject was his own. One night, strolling in front of his house, listening to the faint night sounds of Hollywood, he conceived the idea of presenting a musical picture of Hollywood as he saw it. The piece resolved itself into an introduction and scherzo for orchestra. While working on it, he kept in front of him as a reminder a piece of paper on which were written three sentences: "Hollywood as the world sees it . . . girls, glitter and goofi-

ness." "Hollywood as it sees itself . . . divans, divorce and devilry." "Hollywood as I see it . . . motors, mountains and morality." The music is in the modern vein, as is most of Bennett's work.

"Tall Cities" as analyzed by the composer is a symphonic suite of five tone-pictures describing scenes one can find in any large city in the U. S. A. Number 1 is called "General View" (the view from a skyscraper on a bright sunny day, with the faint roar of the traffic coming up from below). Number 2 is "The Avenue" (descriptive of the most fashionable avenue in any city). A minor melody tells of someone whose heart is still in the old country and who is all but crushed under the glitter and glamour of the avenue. Number 3, "A Shanty Between Two Skyscrapers" (in almost every city one finds a small wooden house crammed between two tall buildings, which look down in disdain on their shabby neighbor; the shanty looks wistfully up at the skyscrapers and hopes some day to attain such glory). Number 4, "Moon Over the City," describes the view of the city in the quiet moonlight, and the finale is a reprise of the main themes.

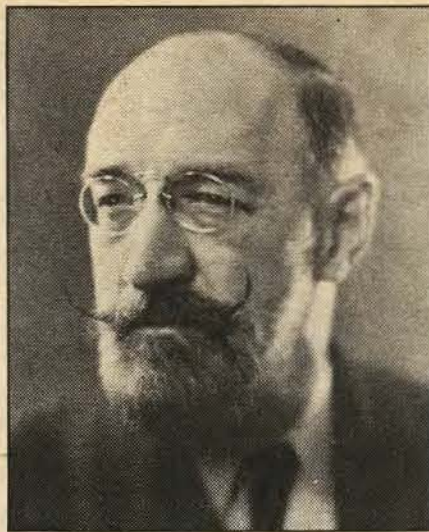

Grand Opera in the Making

USUALLY the first settings of stage plays to music are ascribed to the very beginning of the seventeenth century (1600 or so), and it is true that they were the basic suggestions of what later became known as grand opera. However, long before those early efforts Europe was acquainted with masques, mysteries, miracle plays, moralities and sacred representations. Strangely enough, while opera has been usurped by the fashionable world as a special form of social observance, its forerunners were mostly semi-religious rites, even though scenery was often used and costumed performers acted as well as spoke and sang.

"Drama by means of music" is what their composers and producers called the first real operas, Peri's "Daphne," premiered in Florence in 1597, and his "Eurydice" created there three years later. And please note that the financial "guarantors" of the performances were Florentine nobles, who also granted the use of their state parlors as "stages."

It is too lengthy and profound a subject to go deeply into the question just now of what Peri and his contemporaries and immediate successors had in mind to achieve artistically and musically. Broadly stated, it was the ideal combining of words and music, the perfect union of tone with the inflections and modulations of speech in singing form. The whole idea came from the ancient Greek theory of presenting drama, and those aristocratic Florentines were as eager to ape everything Grecian in art as our American "aristocracy" is to make a fad of everything European in opera.

Caccini and Monteverdi (the "verdi" part of the name seems prophetic), two other composers of the period, developed the new style masterfully (excerpts from their works are sung even today at recitals), Monteverdi elaborating the aria. Ah, Monteverdi, little did you know what you were starting, for soon vain singers demanded that arias be made into mere display pieces for their individual brilliancies. It was not long before a flock of highly paid and thoroughly spoiled vocal gymnasts became public favorites and considered themselves more important than the composers whose music they sang. (Sounds familiar to us, doesn't it?) For a while, operas resembled something that might be called costume concerts, with the box-holders interested only in the popular arias, and between times served with supper, conversing loudly and even playing cards! The stories of the operas were not taken very seriously, for during the first half of the eighteenth century the librettos continued to be founded upon classical and mythological subjects. However, an almost incredible practise of those days was to intersperse between the acts of the serious works merry little pieces called "buffa,"

operas indeed filled with buffoonery.

Handel and the elder Scarlatti improved somewhat upon the methods of the composers just discussed, but it remained for Gluck (1714-1787), the Great Reformer of opera, to lift that medium into a truly dignified art. But as he served as a model for German rather than Italian writers, he shall engage our attention in a later article on German opera. So now let us proceed to Italians of the nineteenth century.

Donizetti, Bellini and Rossini were the earlier lions of that time, cultivating chiefly graceful tunes and vocal pyrotechnics. Nevertheless, they had many inspirational moments, and even today we admire numerous of their passages for voice and are often astonished at their mastery of orchestral coloring and descriptiveness. Maybe the time will never come when hearers fail to find "Lucia" (Donizetti), "Norma" (Bellini), and "The Barber of Seville" and "William Tell" (Rossini) sources of keen delight. Chopin and Wagner considered Bellini a ranking master. Rossini won the sincere homage of his composing contemporaries and still holds a towering position in the operatic world. The three Italians steered away from the old classical-mythological texts and transferred veritable human emotions into action and music. With them flourished the younger Verdi, but before his long life ended (1813-1901) he turned away from crass musical melodrama, and with "Aida," "Otello" and "Falstaff" (written at the age of eighty!) sought dramatic truth and appropriate tonal dress for noble subjects.

A coincidence is that Verdi was born in the same year as Wagner, and doubtless finally fell under his influence, but without imitating his harmonies and manner of orchestration. (He did, however, copy Wagner in abandoning the display arias and choruses.)

With Mascagni and Leoncavallo came the school of "verism" or naturalism, using strong, rapidly moving plays as subjects, with characters intensely alive. Both men achieved only one great success each, respectively with "Cavalleria Rusticana" and "Pagliacci," these days mostly paired in a double bill and therefore sometimes playfully referred to as the "ham and eggs" of opera! Puccini took the Mascagni-Leoncavallo style further—if not melodiously, at least with more refined and subtle orchestration. His "Madam Butterfly," "Tosca" and "La Boheme" swept the musical world triumphantly and remain in the affections of opera-goers everywhere. Since his death in 1924 ("Turandot" was his last opera, left unfinished and completed by his friend Alfano), no Italian opera has been forthcoming to equal the worth or success of his masterpieces, unless one excepts the fine "Love of Three Kings" by Montemezzi.

Person-to-Person

● Persistent headache of three major networks arises from the fact that the United States is divided into four time zones: Eastern, Central, Mountain, Pacific.* Typical example: A program aired at 8 p.m. Eastern time (7 p.m. Central time), when a maximum number of people are free to listen to the radio, is received in the West at 6 p.m. Mountain time (5 p.m. Pacific time), when most women are busy preparing the evening meal and most men are homeward bound from work. This problem was solved for sponsors by creating a system whereby a program is broadcast once for listeners in the East, later for audiences in the West. Although this technique has been extensively exploited in commercial radio, it will be utilized for the first time to make a sustaining series conveniently available to all listeners when Columbia launches the "American School of the Air" next fall on a rebroadcast schedule. According to present advance plans, the "American School of the Air" will be broadcast in the East from 9:15 to 9:45 a.m., in the Midwest and West at 2:30-3 p.m. CST, 1:30-2 p.m. MST. Columbia affiliate stations in the Pacific time zone are making arrangements to rebroadcast the series (by transcription) at times locally convenient.

This change in policy is a significant step toward closer network-classroom relationship. NBC would do well to adopt a similar policy with their 2 p.m. (EST) programs designed for classroom use.

● In spite of the fact that WLW's "Nation's School of the Air" earned the distinction of three first awards and two honorable mentions in the exhibition of recordings at the Tenth Institute for Education by Radio last May, it will be discontinued this fall in favor of adult-education programs. The series was aired Coast to Coast last year over MBS facilities and has been a WLW educational feature for ten years.

● "Columbia Workshop Festival"† is Columbia's contribution to summer listening. In this series eight of the best "Columbia Workshop" productions will be revived, five new programs will be presented. In the list are many that the serious listener should not fail to hear: August 3, Pauline Gibson's humorous "The Ghost of Benjamin Sweet"; August 17, Wilbur Daniel Steele's "A Drink of Water"; August 24, "Meridian 7-1212," written and directed by Irving Reis; September 7, Norman Corwin's prize-winning bombing drama "without music," "They Fly Through the Air with the Greatest of Ease"‡; September 28, the awe-inspiring spectacle of the populace of a city awaiting death, Archibald MacLeish's "The Fall of the City." Here is the chance many, like I who missed the original presentations, have awaited. Let's not miss them this time.

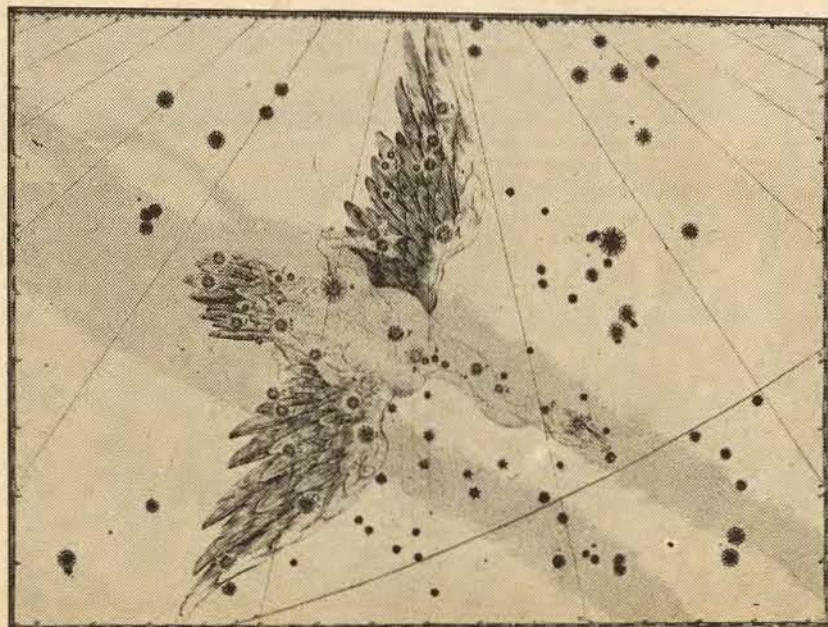
"Men Behind the Stars"

The August 4 broadcast in this series will be devoted to the constellation Cygnus, or *The Swan*—popularly identified as the Northern Cross by virtue of the fact that the stars in this group do make a large and symmetrical cross. In August we can see this large, bright figure nearly overhead in the Milky Way, with the conspicuous star *Deneb* at the top of the cross pointing toward the north. The drawing below shows this constellation as a bird with outspread wings flying south in the sky. In Lowell's *New Year's Eve* we read:

*Orion knelling in his starry niche
The Lyre whose strings give music audible
To holy ears, and countless splendors move,
Crowned by the blazing Cross high hung o'er all.*

O. S. U. Day at WBNS

Reversing the usual procedure in Columbus, Ohio, recently, school went to radio. The radio speech and production classes of Professor Donald Riley at Ohio State University were invited by WBNS to take over the station's operation for a day. When that day arrived, the students swarmed into the station crying, "Where do we begin?"

Twenty-five young men and women were assigned to various offices in the station—announcing, production, continuity, and even sales and promotion. They worked side by side with the regular staff members and participated in a series of one-hour forums conducted by the station's executives.

The idea for Ohio State Radio Day was conceived by Mr. Jerome R. Reeves, WBNS promotion-publicity, and was carried out in collaboration with Professor Irwin Johnson, director of developmental programs at WBNS and a member of the O. S. U. staff. Messrs. Reeves and Johnson arranged the day's schedules to allow a maximum amount of practical experience and, at the same time, permit opportunity for special conferences with station representatives. They also prepared a list of twenty-five questions dealing with all phases of local and network commercial broadcasting, submitting them to the students as they arrived. The questions served to "point up" the day's experiences and to stimulate thinking on many problems which otherwise might have been missed.

The climax came toward the end of the day when the students gathered for an informal discussion of their adventure in education. Enthusiastic response was elicited by such questions as "Should radio stations give listeners what they want or what we think they ought to have?" "Upon what important American concept is present-day radio based?" "What is the policy of American broadcasting stations in regard to so-called controversial issues?" "Although we hear constantly of radio's responsibility to the public, can you think of any responsibility which the public owes radio?" . . . etc. The answers were intelligent and stimulating, giving rise to much spontaneous debate before the microphone.

This stunt was an encouraging manifestation of the growing willingness of educators and broadcasters to get together on problems which long have been annoying both. The University faculty and the station's executives felt that the results of the day's experiment were such as to warrant the continuation of the project as an annual institution. As an exercise in functional education, the program was considered successful and should lead to other instances of practical cooperation.

AMERICAN short-wave broadcasters are moving forward on all fronts. Only a few years ago this country lagged miserably behind other leading powers in the field of international broadcasting. Today the United States is rapidly approaching the head of the ranks.

By the time this is printed the new 100,000-watt transmitter for short-wave station W2XAF of Schenectady, New York, should be on the air. Two of the largest radio tubes ever built will be used in the new equipment. These have been especially designed by the General Electric Company after several months of research and when used with the new Alexanderson panel antenna, are expected to produce an effective directional power output of more than 600,000 watts. With this power in use it is believed the good-will Latin-American broadcasts from Schenectady will cut through the fog of interference created by certain European stations like a knife and will give listeners in South America absolutely reliable and enjoyable reception. That American Latin-language programs are becoming increasingly popular may be attested by the fact that in several cities in Brazil powerful amplifying systems have been set up in the parks for the express purpose of bringing United States transmissions for Brazil within ear-range of every possible listener.

The National Broadcasting Company's international division has increased its schedule of short-wave programs to Latin America by three and one-half hours daily. W3XAL, one of its high-frequency stations, began beaming its broadcasts in that direction on an additional frequency channel of 21.63 megs from 1 to 4:30 p.m. EDT. Other transmissions to Latin countries are effected daily over W3XL (17.78), from 5 to 11 p.m. and over W3XAL (9.67), from 5 p.m. to 1 a.m. EDT.

W1XAL, the University Club station at Boston, Mass., is temporarily off the air to enable engineers to install powerful beam antennae which should result in improved reception in many parts of the world. The station will resume broadcasting about August 25. Listeners are invited to send in any suggestion for program topics to be included in W1XAL's fall schedule of broadcasts.

The first DX broadcast ever to originate in Turkey will be transmitted especially for the benefit of United States short-wave listeners over short-wave station TAP (9.465) of Ankara, on Saturday, July 29, from 5:10 to 5:55 p.m. EDT. The program will consist of dance music, with announcements in English throughout.

According to a letter received by Harve Amers of Pomona, Calif., from XMHA (11.86), "The Call of the Orient," located at 445 Race Course Road, Shanghai, the station has had to shift frequency three times since coming on the air last January 12 because of the deliberate interference injected into their channel. This station is the only American-owned short-wave broadcasting transmitter allowed outside of the Chinese Government station, and was the only one whose equipment was on the air following the opening of hostilities in the Shanghai area. Over 15,000 messages were relayed through this station from residents of the area to relatives in the Far East. . . . Radio Saigon, "The Voice of France in the Far East," Saigon, French Indo-China, broadcasts daily on 6.116 megs, from 12:45 to 1:15, from 8:30 to 9:30 a.m., and from 7:45 to 8:15 p.m.; and on a frequency of 11.78 megs, from 1:15 to 1:45 and from 10:15 to 10:45 a.m. EDT.

A new short-wave station, under construction on the highway between Havana and Guanabacoa, will operate when completed with a power of 5,000 watts on a frequency of 9.437 megs, and under the call letters COCN. . . . OAX6B, a new station under construction by Maximo J. Landa, at Arequipa, Peru, will operate on a frequency of 11.71 megs, and with a power of 150 watts, when completed.

Ashley Walcott of San Francisco, Calif., writes that VK9MI is operating on 6.052 megs, irregularly from 7:45 to 8:30 a.m. EDT. . . . XOJD, Hankow, China, is being heard on a frequency of 6.87 megs, from 9 to 9:35 a.m. EDT, with only Chinese programs. . . . KZEG, the Sunshine station at Manila, Philippine Islands, is now being relayed on 6.14 megs, daily from 6 to 10 a.m. EDT, or later. KZRH is a new Manila station which has just come on the air on an announced frequency of 6.1 megs. It is slightly stronger than KZEG, and has been testing irregularly from 6 to 9 a.m., or later, requesting reception reports. . . . HS8PJ (9.51) of Bangkok, Siam, is on the air now almost daily from 9 to 11 a.m. EDT.

John Larsen of Geneva, New York, has been hearing an unidentified Italian transmitter operating throughout the afternoon on a frequency of 15.23 megs, simultaneously with 2R012 (15.1) and 2R06 (15.3) of Rome. The unknown station leaves the air at 8:30 p.m., being blanketed by OLR5A of Prague, from 7:55 p.m. EDT on. . . . Walter Rankins of Manchester, England, reports reception of the new Portuguese station CSW8, "Radio Nacional," of Lisbon, at 5:20 p.m. EDT, on a frequency of 7.26 megs. An English and French program is transmitted by this station each Tuesday and Friday from 5 to 6 p.m. EDT.

place a valuation on an enduring license, and if the banks can be made to see the investment possibilities that are in radio, radio will be a very much better industry for the people of the United States as a whole . . ."

The third factor which operates as a depressive force on the programs you hear is the tremendous amount of detail work required each twelve months by the Commission in considering applications for renewals of licenses. The station must give, in these reports, full information of the activities and programs, operation and financial status of the station during the preceding year. This nerve-racking breakdown usually compels the station manager to hire outside help as well as employ all the inside help he may have available. The cost of this bureaucratic detail is subtracted from the funds which should go into program-building and replacement of obsolete equipment. In the case of smaller stations, many who should be giving their full time to program-planning are forced to devote hours to this work because of the small personnel of the station and the lack of funds necessary to hire outside help.

The Commission's argument for short-term licenses seems to be that, by keeping the periods short, it can force the stations to remain on their toes. The Commission says, in effect: "If we gave them a license for three years, as allowed by law, they'd just sit back and say, 'What the hell? I've got my license for three years now, so I can relax.'"

To such an attitude there is no better rebuttal than the past performances of broadcasters who have—in a surprisingly short time and under the most difficult regulatory policies—built radio into an important first industry of the country. Stability and dependability is in the industry, and the only jitters suffered by it are jitters which emanate from Washington and over which they have no control.

The attitude of station managers is, I believe, more honestly reflected in a letter from a station manager which I have before me.

He writes: "Frankly, I think the Commission will grant our licenses soon for a three-year period, and I think it would be a mighty fine thing, because the day they do I am going to

enlarge our studios and devote all the time and energy I have been spending on trains and in Washington, dealing with lawyers and the FCC, towards serving the public with better radio programs and building a better radio station . . ." His comments are echoed and re-echoed in letters and talks with radio managers throughout the United States.

While a short-term probationary license for new stations is perfectly in line, the application of that policy to the older stations which have proved their worth is uncalled for. It is, in a way, a questioning, a challenge of the American system of broadcasting by a Federal Government agency which says by its actions—while denying with words—that "you broadcasters have been in business for many years and we've never had any question about your operation and always renewed your licenses. But maybe, at the end of twelve months, we'll have found some other system is better fitted to our needs. Maybe we'll go in for Government-controlled stations or even Government-operated stations."

That seems rather far-fetched at first glance, but from the recent actions of the men who compose the Commission in the field of radio censorship, such a possibility is not as bizarre as it may seem. At any rate, liberty is a precious possession which is held so long as the people are watchful and wary and jealous of that priceless gift, and any infringement upon our liberties should be carefully investigated and watched.

Surely the treatment of an industry which—in the past year alone—earned more than \$120,000,000 and provided America's cheapest entertainment, education and enlightenment as a fly-by-night business which must be kept constantly under the Government's thumb is unwarranted in the face of the sterling and public-spirited character of the broadcasters as evidenced in past performances; in the face of the basic stability of the industry; and in the face of the wide public acceptance of and dependence upon radio as a medium of public information.

Rather than act as a deterrent to the building of fine programs which will go out over the best possible facilities, the Government should do all in its power to make radio sound, economically, and at least as free as the press.

For New York visitors, mail-order and record-collector fiends, we survey this week the many special shops and recording companies with headquarters in the Big Town:

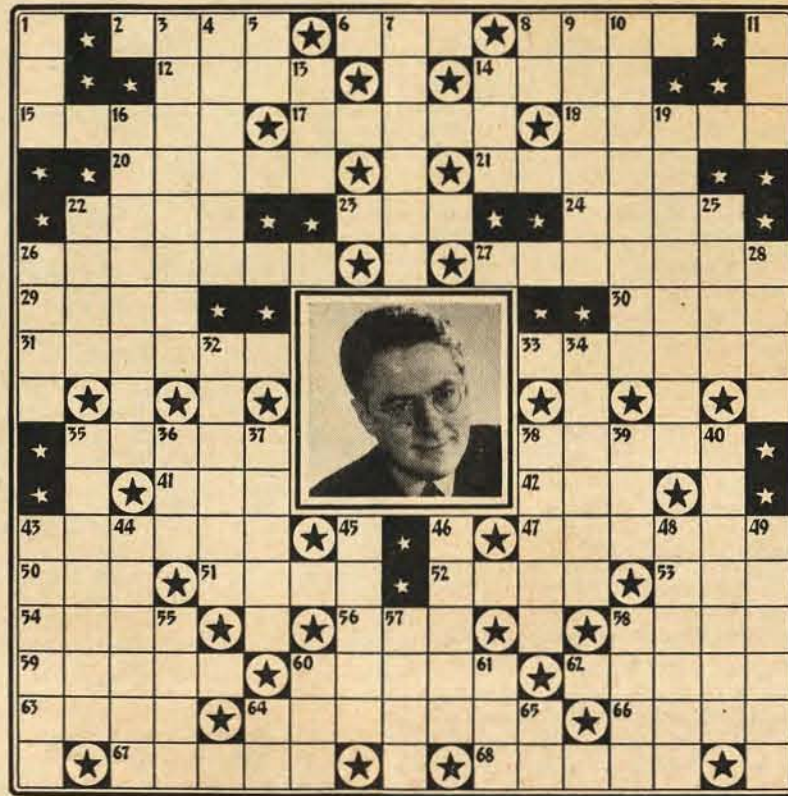
THE COMMODORE MUSIC SHOP, once a crowded little sporting-goods and music store on Forty-second St., was the first to catch on to the upsurge in swing and now flourishes a fancy branch on Swing Alley, that night-club block of Fifty-second between Fifth and Sixth. The shop not only stocks a fat proportion of swing records but has issued numerous special swing records under its own label. "Strange Fruit," a most powerful lynching song, is one of the newest and most notable of Commodore releases, is sung by Billie Holiday; a fine reading of the blues on the reverse. Another Holiday wax includes Kern's "Yesterdays" and the great "I Got a Right to Sing the Blues," with top-notch swing men backing her. There are some good Jess Stacy piano solos on Commodore, and other good buys include the two 12-inch "Jam Session at Commodore" records by the all-star-all-star jazz band you ever heard collected, and four sides by some of Count Basie's best men, the Kansas City Six. All great. The Commodore also specializes in reissues of famous old masters which the regular companies have dropped, these sponsored by the United Hot Club of America. Typical of these are the new releases in Chicago style . . . "Jazz Me Blues," by Teschmaker's Chicagoans, "Barrel House Stomp," by the Cellar Boys, and "Madame Dynamite," by the Chicago Rhythm Kings. The 10-inch records are \$1, the 12-inch are \$1.50, and can be ordered from the shop, 46 W. Fifty-second St., New York City.

Notes on Radio-Writing . . .

After Carlton Morse completes a "One Man's Family" episode, he goes over the lines of each character and decides the best and fastest way to eliminate that character from the episode in case of accident or illness. The voices of "One Man's Family" are too well known to the audience to permit substitutes, and the program has never had

to employ one because of Morse's ability to rebuild the story.

KFI Pulls Nifty

Nice wrinkle added by KFI, the 50,000-watter here, is the plan of transcribing local special news events during the day and then broadcasting the running-story recording late that night for the benefit of folk who'd have missed out otherwise because of working-hours. Announcer Jimmy Vandiveer first tried the idea at the unsuccessful auction of John Barrymore's old \$400,000 home, an auction which brought but one bid of \$65,000, which was refused. Then Vandiveer "canned" a big fire, the burning of Los Angeles' new Chinatown, for night broadcasting. He interviewed firemen and shopkeepers whose places went up in flames, all to an obligato of fire sirens and bells.

Helen Humes, vocalist with Count Basie's orchestra, is an alumna of Major Bowes' Amateur Hour . . . If current negotiations go through, Gray Gordon's Tic Toc Rhythm will be heard on a sponsored fall program for a watch manufacturer. A perfect tie-up, I call it.

Hooray for Ray

I stopped in to visit Ray Perkins, perennial radio favorite, the other night. He is holding forth with the aid of Clarence the Piano every Monday evening at 6:30 p.m. EDT over the NBC-Blue network. 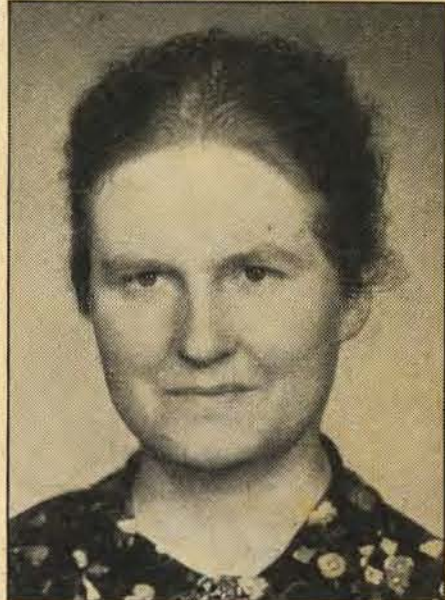
