Radio Guide Campaign for Woman Commissioner Gains Impetus

Welcome Help: There may be a woman commissioner on the Federal Communications Commission yet. After our recent Open Letter to President Roosevelt, issue of July 14, Senator Styles Bridges of New Hampshire, who is now ranked as one of the four leading possibilities for the Republican nomination for the Presidency, in a speech on the floor of the Senate at Washington, introduced into the *Congressional Record* the full text of the RADIO GUIDE article and added his own personal endorsement.

As we go to press, we learn that Chairman McNinch of the FCC has resigned. We learn further that President Roosevelt has already sent to the Senate the nomination of James L. Fly of Tennessee to fill the vacancy.

Whatever are the qualifications of Mr. Fly, we regret that our suggestion—backed by Sen. Bridges and other authorities—that a woman be appointed to the FCC has been ignored. We are not giving up the fight here. If you agree with us that a woman's opinion is needed, write a letter to President Roosevelt today demanding a woman appointee for the next vacancy.



Bridges: "A woman should be appointed"

Appoint a Woman, says Senator Styles Bridges, United States Senator from New Hampshire: "The suggestion that a woman should be appointed to the membership of the Federal Communications Commission is in full harmony with the true American tradition of representation, and would, I am confident, bring results of which the American people and Government would be very proud. The editors of RADIO GUIDE are to be congratulated for their support of the suggestion. In my service as governor of the State of New Hampshire and as United States Senator I have witnessed practical demonstrations of the achievement of women holding positions of public trust. When governor, I appointed the first woman judge to be named in New Hampshire. In many cases today, women are appointed to positions of importance in competition with capable men. There are instances, however, where women can be of especial value. The FCC largely falls into that latter category. All during the day before the return of the bread-winner, the housewife and mother and her children enjoy programs particularly designed for them. She knows what great extensions of knowledge and entertainment can be brought to her home by the modern miracle of radio. So it is that women have become authorities on radio and its possibilities.

"In the composition of the FCC, the ladies of the nation are well entitled to a voice. There are many outstanding women who would make able members. It is my earnest hope that one of them will be appointed to the next vacancy in the membership of the Commission."

HOLLYWOOD HYSTERICS

Wanted!—Strong men for radio producers in Hollywood. Must be able and willing to take it



THE production of radio shows is a funny business. Writers, actors, musicians, announcers see to it that they are given full credit for their respective parts in bringing you radio shows, but Mr. Producer—who is shoved far back out of sight when there's glory to be passed around—is shoved right back up to the front again when a program "lays an egg" and raps are forthcoming. Which is odd, because—by all the rules of the game—the producer is the guy who ought to be shoving others around.

The producer's job is to see that a good show gets on the air. He has two bosses—the advertising agency for which he works and the client who sponsors the show—and he has to keep them both happy. But his job is bigger than that. He hires writers, actors, musicians, and he has to keep them happy, too. And when he finally whips a show out of all this assorted talent, he's right back where he started. The client may not like this—and doesn't, in most cases. The advertising agency may not like that. When the script is chopped to pieces and pasted back together again, the actors, writers, musicians, announcers usually start in all over again because of the changes which have been wrought.

That is a very calm picture of what the men who brain-trust your radio programs are up against in the East. When you start talking about the fellow who produces the big radio shows from Hollywood, you multiply all this confusion by ten, add a million to the product, and square the sum. In the industry, they have a name for it—Hollywood Hysterics.

A couple of years ago the big advertising executives in the East suddenly discovered that "Hollywood Hotel," a big-name program originating in Hollywood, was selling a lot of soup. A little digging under the surface soon revealed the fact that Mr. and Mrs. John Q. Public were more than passingly interested in the radio appearances of their favorite screen stars. Then the

exodus started, shaming the puny efforts of the lads and lassies of '49 who trekked westward in search of the same thing—gold.

These radio pioneers had hardly set up shop in their Pacific paradise when things began to happen . . . to producers. They were spending more time in sanatoriums and at health resorts than in their offices, and the Biblical plagues were as nothing compared to the stomach ulcers, frayed nerves, jit-

of proportion and went "Hollywood"? Or was it because they found the high-pressure pace of dealing with dynamic, super-gilded screen personalities too hard to handle?

A look behind the scenes gives a quick answer to these questions.

A year ago Norma Shearer, queen of the M-G-M lot, was to appear on the "Good News" program. The night before the broadcast (when rehearsals are held), a social engagement kept her from attending, and a stand-in had to read her lines. It was not until three hours before broadcast time that Miss Shearer finally appeared in the studio. Then she objected to lines in the script. They were immediately rewritten. An hour and a half before broadcast time, Miss Shearer finally found time to give the producer a few of her precious moments to run over her lines. Critics pronounced her performance far from finished, and she hasn't done much on the air since. And—oh, yes, Ed Gardner, one of the producers of the program, resigned. Bill Bacher, who had preceded him in the same berth, had had similar difficulties with stars—and consequent difficulties with his agency and client—and had resigned several months before.

THE stars themselves are no bargains. Hard-worked, diet-thinned, neurotic, they are more picky about material they will use on the air than a Broadway Angel is about the play into which he will dump fifty thousand dollars. But the star's camp-followers—the expert, price-haggling agent, trained to wring the last cent out of sponsors bidding for his star's talents; the star's movie producer, always fearful that the star will not be presented in just the best way; the star's publicity men, stooges and countless advisors, each with a new way of crawling into the producer's now rapidly thinning hairs—these make his load unbearable.

In a case like that of Miss Shearer, the producer has bought a pig in a poke. He doesn't know how she's apt to sound until the last moment . . . and she usually lives up to his worst expectations. Then, oh, then, don't his New York bosses yell! The long-distance wires burn and the Hollywood producer gets another stomach ulcer . . . or he goes berserk and talks back . . . or resigns . . .

Joan Crawford is willing enough but

suffers from a bad case of microphone jitters, as does Jean Arthur, and there's not much a producer can do about it except hope for the best. Some time ago Patsy Kelly, appearing on Phil Baker's Gulf program, passed out cold from mike fright an hour before air-time. The show couldn't be rewritten but maybe a substitute could be found. In a dither, the radio producer had a heart attack and was removed to a hospital. Then, ironically, Miss Kelly recovered and went through the show without a hitch. But the damage, as far as the producer was concerned, had been done, and it was several weeks before he was up and around.

Dorothy Lamour once had a bad case of jitters before miktetime, and Dwight Cooke, then producing the "Chase and Sanborn Hour," didn't deal too softly with her. Tears filled the lovely Lamour's eyes and Cooke took a small rap from his superiors. But that was as nothing to the rap he took less than a year later when Mae West read her "Adam and Eve" lines straight in rehearsal and saved her implications by intonation for the actual broadcast. That performance ruined Cooke.

The worst babies to handle are guest stars; not necessarily because of the star's temper or temperament—although there's plenty of both in evidence in most cases—but because each show must be built to fit the star's personality. The bigger the personality, the harder the job, and shows upon which guest stars appear have developed into the worst producer-breakers. Cecil B. DeMille is a producer who has been a notable exception to this rule. Stars are afraid to turn in a sloppy performance for a name as big as C. B.'s.

THE regular shows develop their troubles, too. In the Al Jolson-Parkyakarkus-Martha Raye set-up of last season, Parky and Al very nearly came to blows over script differences. The producer had to pacify them, equalize the laughs, and get the show on the air. Had Jolson not quit at the end of his thirteen-week option, this producer, too, might have gone the ulcer route. With Dick Powell replacing Jolson in the cast, everything moved along smoothly, for Dick is a star who likes direction.

There are plenty of other real people on the Hollywood rosters. Jack Benny, Charles Boyer, Edward G. Robinson are so helpful that they practically produce their own shows. Bergen, Don Ameche, Nelson Eddy must be added to this list.

Bing Crosby, Bob Burns, Lum and Abner, Bob Benchley, Joe E. Brown, Al Pearce, Fibber McGee, Eddie Cantor, Joe Penner are all easy to work with—"smoothies," as the radio producer calls them. Clark Gable is another who not only accepts direction but asks for it. "I want to be as good on the air as on the screen," is the way he puts it.

Not all of the trouble endured by Hollywood producers comes from without. Under close contact with gilt-edged names and the magic of the California sun, egos expand and producers must exert a real effort to keep from succumbing to the egocentrism peculiar to Hollywood. One producer worked hard and long in a New York advertising agency where he didn't even have a desk. Now, in Hollywood, he has a luxurious office with everything his heart could desire . . . and blew higher than a kite the other day because

he didn't like the drapes in his office. Just jitters, hysterics, exaggerated ego.

Work is hard in California, and the desert clime is more adapted to siestas than to the boiler-bursting pressure required of producers there in the land of make-believe. Harry Ackerman, producing the "Phantom Pilot" five days a week, found Gulf's "Screen Guild Show" added to his labor. So he worked every day and a couple of nights every week until they hauled him off to a Los Angeles sanatorium with a nervous breakdown. More recently Bob Colwell, an important agency man in New York, was sent to California to recuperate from an attack of rheumatic fever. While there he took over the "Circle" writing-

Not the least pressure on the nerve-centers of the Hollywood producer comes from the New York office via telephone, teletype and telegraph. The producer is always on the spot with his eastern bosses and the long-distance control—taken together with the matter of the stars, the unions, the overwork—doesn't decrease his sleepless nights. After every broadcast, the barrage of telephone calls starts. And are they from fans? Oh, no! They're from the agency and the client, and the producer learns in plain and blunt language how "stinko" his efforts have been.

When shows were produced in New York, the "ironing out" with clients and agency executives was done over

a table and a glass of beer, face to face. Long-range compromises haven't worked out. The Hollywood producer has learned that to deal successfully with the prima donnas he meets there he must match his self-confidence and assuredness against theirs. It is probably for this reason that producers—so sane in New York—permit their egos to run riot in Hollywood. But the producer often forgets to put aside this false face in dealing with old cronies in New York who knew him when. The result has been disastrous.

"What? Change a line? I'm the producer and to hell with him!"

There are several remarkable items to come out of this whole jumbled state of affairs, not the least of which is the quality of show which eventually results from all this confusion. The wonder of the whole thing, to the writer, is that any show gets on the air from the movie mecca. It is even more remarkable that good shows find their way to the ether waves from Hollywood and that—in RADIO GUIDE's annual poll—Hollywood shows are invariably at the top. And if an accurate, nose-by-nose count of all radio listeners were taken, it would show Pacific broadcasters command most of the listening ears.

The second item which confuses your reporter no end is that—with all these casualties, mortalities, even—executives can still find daring young men to move up as replacements in the many breaches. This is a practical demonstration that radio people are either insensitive to hurt and health or else—and I like this "or else"—they are fired with a courage and a love for radio art that recognizes no obstacles.

assignment, just to keep busy. It kept him too busy. "The Circle" was in its hectic, experimental days, and in no time at all Colwell was in Palm Springs resting from a return attack of rheumatic fever. In the end, he was called back to New York because he was too valuable a man to the agency to be allowed to kill himself writing and worrying . . . in Hollywood.

There are other afflictions which beset the Hollywood producer. He is working in a union town and there are more union rules there than in any other spot in the world. There is a union for turning on and off the lights, for sound-effects men, for engineers, musicians, actors, each with its own peculiar pattern of regulation. It is little wonder that producers forget to take it easy—as was the case with Gordon Thompson. Thompson, a young man though a veteran producer of the "Vallee Variety Hour," spent long hours clearing the impedimenta which confronted his show, more hours than a man should spend at work. The result was that he fell over at a rehearsal the day before a broadcast last spring and, a few hours later, was dead of the heart attack.

NEW YORK.—Another cartoonist will become a national radio figure when John Hix inaugurates a weekly half-hour program based on his "Strange As It Seems" cartoon. First of the series gets under way Thursday, August 17, over CBS, and will be sponsored by Palmolive Shave Cream, which for the past few seasons paid the bills for the "Gang Busters" program. It is expected the crime-detection dramas will switch to another product . . . The Quixie Doodles, introduced by Bob Hawk last season, will be taken over by Colonel Stoopnagle starting October 20 over MBS . . . This show should be a natural for Lemuel Q., who will undoubtedly tell everyone now that his middle initial is for Quixie. It's an idea anyway, Colonel, isn't it? . . . "Sherlock Holmes" returns to the airlines this fall over NBC, with Basil Rathbone as the star . . . Attention, housewives! Another five-times-weekly serial, titled "Donna Curtis," makes its debut over CBS starting September 11—or don't you care? . . . Wayne King's new program for Colgate starts on October 7 over a CBS Coast-to-Coaster.

BROKEN-HEARTED



Dorothy Lamour, whose ultra-sultry voice and sensuous beauty weaves "strange enchantment" over men, couldn't divide her heart between Hollywood and Herbie Kay. Divorce made another disillusioned bandleader

THE heart-rending story of Pagliacci, clowning to bring joy to an idolizing public while his heart—carefully concealed behind the rags and the grease-paint that mark him for the clown—shatters into a thousand pieces, finds its every-day counterpart in the lives of our American bandleaders.

Bathed in a soft light, he stands almost like an idol on a pedestal before thousands of swarming dancers throughout the land. And yet, having in his hand this success, this adulation, he is, so often, a broken-hearted man hiding his heartbreak behind crooning strings or blaring brass.

Quite often he starts on a college campus, unknown, or in some wayward tavern or cafe. Then he comes to know the one-night stands; the hard, bitter fighting for bookings, fighting to hold his band together in the face of cheap travel—buses, day coaches—in the face of cheap food irregularly taken; in the face of long hours of rehearsing and practise and experiment that goes into the building of a band that's "different."

Surviving this, he may get his chance. Sometimes it takes months; more often, years. A short contract with a large ballroom—preferably one which broadcasts—is his jumping-off place. Here he will either make good or learn that the organization he has built of sweat and blood and sacrifice is inadequate. There are many such jumping-off places, but not nearly enough to care for the countless bands which are in process of building.

The Coconut Grove, on the West Coast, is one. Here Phil Harris, maestro for Jack Benny, got his start. Guy Lombardo won his first acclaim at the Granada Cafe in Chicago, and Wayne King's sweet waltzes were first heard by a wide audience from the Aragon Ballroom in Chicago. Chicago's Blackhawk gave Kay Kyser and other famous bandleaders their first taste of fame, and from the Glen Island Casino, in Westchester, N. Y., came such famous bandsmen as Tommy Dorsey, Larry Clinton, Glen Gray and Ozzie Nelson.

To "click" in any one of these spots means success. And what does success mean to a bandleader? Success means money—plenty of it. Now the bandleader comes to know radio engagements, theatrical engagements, long contracts at famous ballrooms and restaurants, recordings, motion pictures and a new, high-salaried type of one-night stand. It means the bandleader

can indulge the dreamy desires of his youth—polo ponies for Phil Harris, speedboats for Guy Lombardo, a country estate for Tommy Dorsey, airplanes for Wayne King.

But in so many cases it does not mean happiness. When Herbie Kay, after the long fight to the top, married the lovely Dorothy Lamour, he seemed to have reached a perfect stage of dreams-come-true. But Dorothy, a star in her own right, traveled to Hollywood while Herbie's engagements kept him in the East. The long-distance romance soon blighted and faded away completely in the corridors of a divorce court, leaving another broken-hearted bandleader to laugh and play and pretend to be happy. Or take the case of George Olsen and Ethel Shutta, his wife and vocalist. Here were two people in the same organization, obviously in love with each other, and the success of their marriage seemed a certainty. For a while it was a perfect thing. Blessed with two fine, healthy children, the Olsens were pointed out as an example of the happiness bandleaders might find in marriage. But their hectic, barnstorming life again proved a stumbling-block to sane, happy marriage, and the divorce court, with its heartache and heartbreak, ended the legend.

Latest divorce in the ranks of the bandleaders is that of Horace Heidt after a long try for happiness.

With Eddy Duchin, tragedy struck in a different way. He was playing an engagement away from New York when his wife had to undergo a Caesarean operation. The child—a fine baby boy—was saved, but Mrs. Duchin died. Eddy barely managed to reach her bedside in time to say a last farewell after a desperate airplane trip.

Death, tragedy, unhappiness seem to stalk the bandleader with a grim determination that makes a shambles of his life. And yet, on the surface, he is the same smiling-faced Pagliacci, playing sweet music under soft lights, hot music under bright lights for idolizing fans and feverish jitterbugs who ecstatically exclaim, "Ain't he wonderful!" not really knowing the half of it.

And yet to those who do know of the hidden heartaches, these musical idols have an added aura of appeal. Maybe it's because he does an act that plays up the Pagliacci appeal that Ted Lewis, the "High-hatted Tragedian of Jazz," has wowed the public for years.

THE bandleader lives for the day when his band clicks, or "catches on." 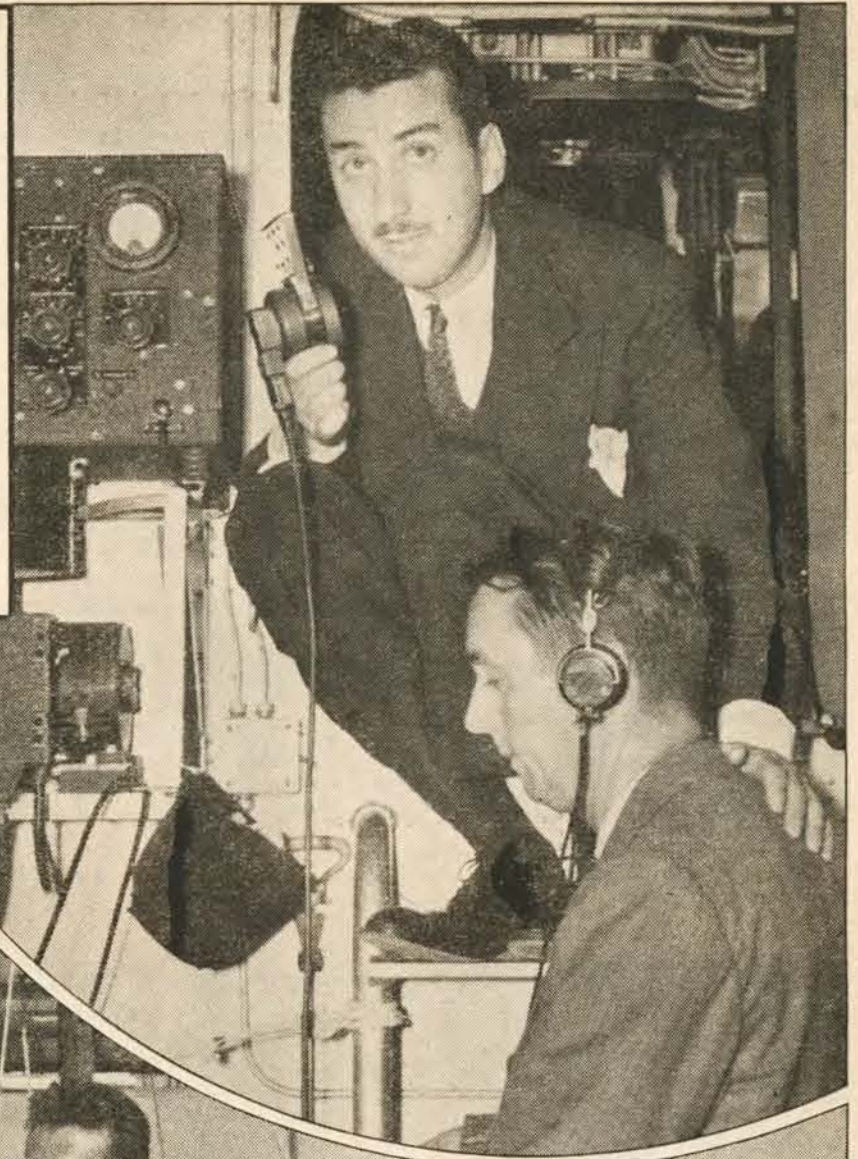

DIARY OF AN ON-THE-SPOT NEWS REPORTER

For Columbia's Mr. Trout, life is just one hectic whirl—with a portable mike

"NOW this year, everything is going to be different."

It was a promise to myself and a New Year's resolution combined. During the summer of 1938, your salt-water-minded correspondent had acquired a boat, a very small boat, but a lifelong ambition come true. When New Year's Day, 1939, arrived, that boat had not yet felt the uncertain touch of her new owner's hand upon the wheel. Thus the resolution: A little less hectic dashing over the landscape, portable microphone in hand, and a lot more peaceful cruising with a boat's wheel in hand.

It was a good resolution, and I kept it so well that by March, 1939, I was putting on the CBS network a daily news broadcast five times a week, and commuting between New York and New Orleans. And by the time 1939 was half through, I had made a month's tour of the Pacific Coast, broadcast

from cities as far apart as Reno, Nevada, and Lexington, Virginia, followed the King and Queen on the royal tour of Canada and the United States, and spent the month of June in almost continuous traveling. If anyone reading these lines has been down to Long Island Sound lately, it would be a kind gesture to send me a postcard stating whether I still have a boat.

The year 1939 started, for example, with the convening of Congress in Washington. I broadcast that as usual. Then, just as the excitement was dying down and it looked as though my schedule was going to be comparatively easy, Professor Quiz decided to take his program on a two-months tour of the country. That meant that I, as his announcer, would have to do some pretty tall traveling back and forth between New York and wherever he was touring, in order to keep my nightly news broadcasts from New York and

the Saturday night "Battle of Wits" going at once. What happened after that is summed up in this diary I scribbled as the year progressed:

February 17, 1939. New Orleans, La.

Went down to meet the Professor at Canal Street on the Mississippi this morning. There was a fog on the river thick as pea soup and I was scared stiff the Professor wouldn't arrive at the microphone in time. But the fog burned off after a while, and along came his steamboat around the bend. Her progress was pretty slow, and I knew the broadcast wouldn't go on in time at the rate the crew was tying her to the dock. So did the Professor. The boat had

barely grazed the dock, when he did a Douglas Fairbanks, climbing out through a deck window and leaping onto the wharf. The other passengers cheered as I introduced, "the one, the only, the original Professor Quiz!"

March 23, 1939. San Francisco, Calif.

Visited "Treasure Island" with the Professor today and saw the sights. I'm stopping here for a little while after flying back and forth between New York and the Quiz entourage, which has gone everywhere in the past month, including the Gulf Coast, Reno, and Hollywood. We were in Hollywood for three weeks. The Professor's still

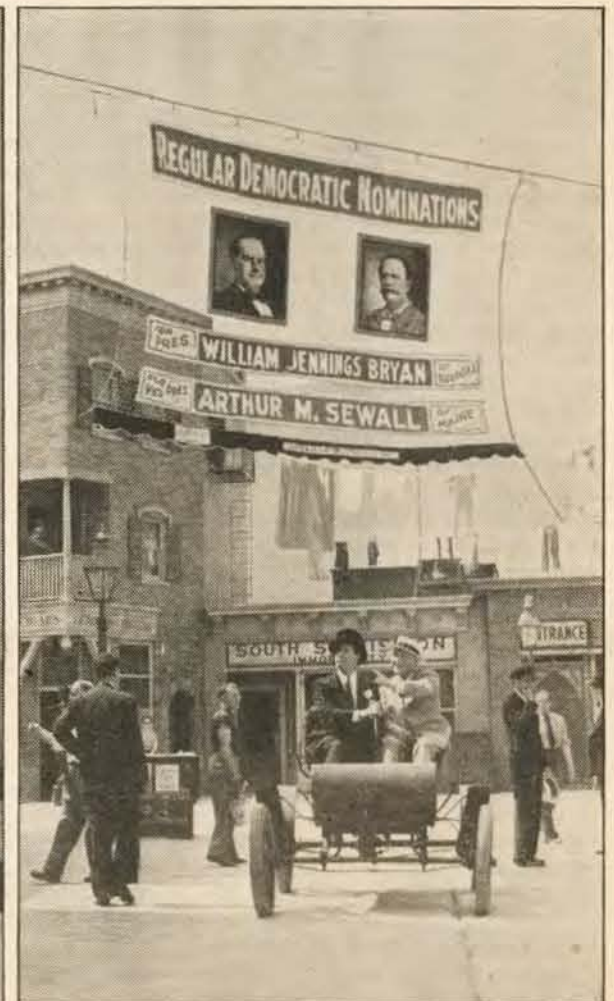

WHAT EVERY LISTENER SHOULD KNOW

By Curtis Mitchell

In this concluding article on the FCC and radio, the editor recapitulates the ideas he has presented in two previous issues, and ventures some predictions as to what broadcasters may do in the future to rid radio and radio listeners of the hindrances to good listening which the present administration of the FCC has placed upon them.—Editor.

BACK in 1927, Herbert Hoover was Secretary of Commerce; newsboys and stenographers were getting rich in the stock market; NBC had staged—the year before—its first big broadcast with such substantial figures as Will Rogers, Titta Ruffo, Mary Garden and Weber and Fields participating; and pseudo-scientists were blaming radio for the excessively wet or aridly dry weather that struck simultaneously in different parts of the land. And radio, that voluble and raucous infant, still in its swaddling-clothes, wandered about a world that was still new and strange to him while we sober adults watched his antics with curiosity and a certain amount of tolerance and—tuning in our radios—found the air filled with strange noises and felt that the infant, for all his phenomenal growth, was still a problem child.

Yet men—substantial citizens—were investing large sums in the development of broadcasting-plants, studios and in serving the public, with no real comprehension of the commercial possibilities inherent in the new art but purely from a sense of public duty and in a pioneering effort to develop this new medium into something important and worth while.

That same year Congress, in order to avoid the confusion that was becoming acute because of overlapping frequencies and the freedom with which any broadcaster might choose his wave-length, enacted the first radio-communications act with the express purpose of assigning frequencies and policing the physical transmission of radio broadcasts. This act created a Federal Radio Commission, composed of five members, to administer the act. The act also, with wise foresight, prohibited any action on the part of this commission which would even remotely resemble censorship of programs. As a further protection for listeners, who are the owners of the wave-lengths, the act provided that stations must be operated "in the public interest, convenience and necessity."

The instrument through which this police power was to be exercised was the license, without which no station could broadcast. The act provided that such licenses for commercial stations were to be issued for a period of not more than three years.

We have seen, however, how the very purposes of the act have been voided by the Federal Communications Commission—successors to the Federal Radio Commission—in its assumption of censorship powers under authority of the "public interest" clause, using its licensing power as a club to

make such censorship effective. We have seen, too, how the quality of radio programs has suffered as a result of lack of adequate financing—due to the short license periods and the consequent failure of banks to invest in a business whose future is so uncertain—and because of the diversion of funds from program-building to meet the expense of filling out long and detailed FCC questionnaires and in payment of lawyers' fees for FCC hearings.

In short, while radio has grown up to most of us and is a favorite medium of entertainment and information for millions of listeners, a source of employment for hundreds of thousands of

people, not alone in broadcasting but in the allied industries, it is still a problem child to the FCC. Or, at least, that is the attitude that that august body has assumed in its treatment of the industry.

A bill which has for its sole purpose the curbing of "bureau arrogance" on the part of quasi-judicial and quasi-legislative units which have persistently ignored the courts and Congress to impose their own will and interpretation upon Congressional acts has recently been introduced in Congress. We wonder if the sponsor of that bill had in mind that little body of seven politically appointed commissioners who make up the FCC.

Congressman McLeod, of Michigan, specifically condemned their assumption of censorship powers on the floor of the House a few weeks ago when he compared the commission to a Frankenstein.

"Here," he said, "we have a creation

of Congress suddenly turned Frankenstein, ignoring the will of Congress and determining just what American radio stations shall or shall not say during international broadcasts. To carry out their purposes, violation of this fantastic principle will warrant revocation of a radio station's license and thereby force it out of business.

"This regulation is but a small cancer now . . . but it will spread like any other malignant growth until free speech is throttled, the press will be the mouth-piece for a few, and radios will blare forth only the ideas of the FCC."

The chief defect in the present radio act is that it did not definitely set up

a three-year license period for radio stations. At the outset, when radio was an untried quantity and the stability and dependability of broadcasters was unknown, such a short term was justifiable. It is justifiable today in the case of new stations which have not yet demonstrated their ability and reliability. But in the case of the older stations whose records are unimpeachable, such stringent licensing provisions can be justified only on the ground that the Commission feels it should maintain a strict control over these stations.

The short-term license is a defect at once remediable under the existing law without further amendment or legislation. The FCC can clearly extend license periods to the full three-year term allowed by law and the situation now obtaining will be largely cleared up.

The second defect in the act, which makes for an arbitrary and czar-like

control of broadcasting by the FCC, is the clause which provides that radio stations must operate in the public interest. The only interpretation of public interest has been that placed upon it by the commissioners after an act of the station which has resulted in that station's loss of license.

This defect can be remedied only through additional legislation, and there is a growing feeling that the license under which radio stations operate should be akin to that under which railroads operate—the issuance of a certificate of public convenience and necessity without the public-interest clause, a clause which lends itself to such varying interpretations as a changing commission may care to give it.

The whole problem resolves itself into a simple question: What will be the future of American broadcasting?

There are two alternatives which face us. We can continue under the present system of broadcasting which—in the face of a government-fostered instability and a censorship of fear—has given us the finest broadcast programs and a technical excellence achieved nowhere else in the world, or we can go, on the other hand, to government control or operation.

Television, facsimile newspaper actualities, and the future of radio art and mechanics seems unlimited. But it is limited. It is limited by the economic problem of financing. The whole industry is limited by the problem of financing, for its development to its present state has been largely upon private financing. Today private financing is not able to carry the load, and radio must be placed upon a sound, business-like basis to gain banking confidence and continue to progress.

The difficulties in which the radio industry now finds itself are such basic conflicts between Americanism, as represented by our constitutional guarantees, and fascism, as represented by increasing governmental control and censorship, that the industry has found many new champions to sponsor its

cause. Newspapers, which have had no good word for the industry in the past, have blasted forth with editorials of protest against infringements upon liberties of speech. *The radio industry, alone, has been silent.*

Whether it were better to sit silently back and take its medicine like a little man, or whether it would be better to muster, through its own self-advertising facilities—the

broadcasting system—a strong public support for a three-year or a lifetime license and elimination of the "public interest" clause, is a difficult decision.

You may get a better picture of radio's spot by likening it to a little boy who has been beaten and bullied by a larger boy who now stands over him with a club saying, "I dare you to tell anyone."

One day, though, radio will find its voice. When it does, if our democratic processes prevail, you may expect to hear the fur fly.

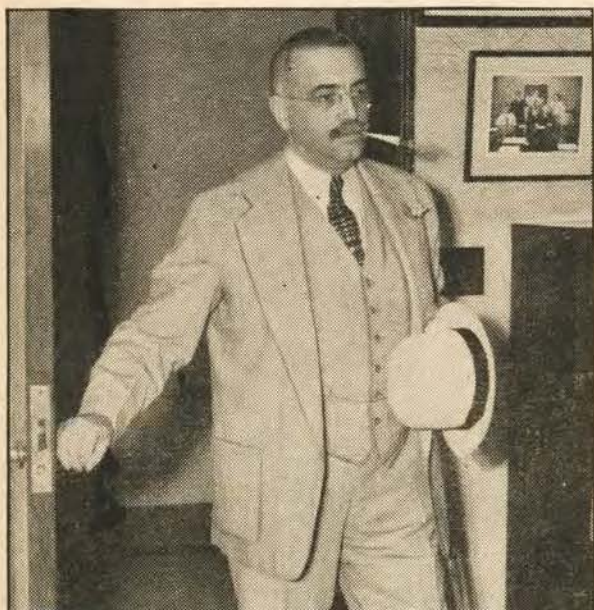
SNOW WHITE AND THE SEVEN FCC DWARFS



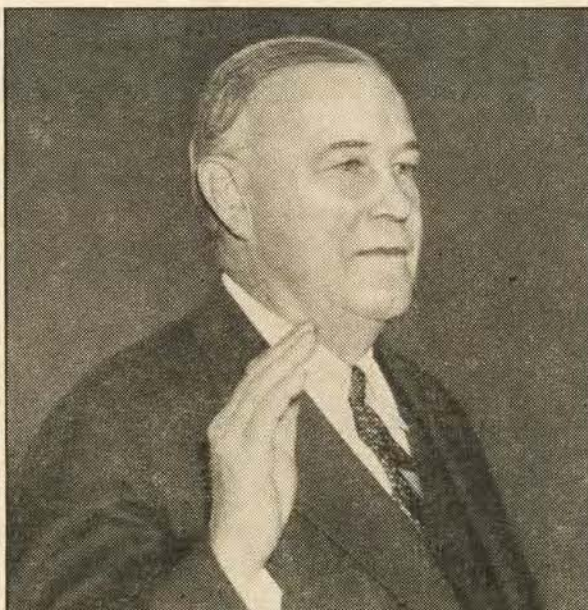

In a world where efficiency is reached only when trained experts are in charge, our Government persists in the system of making political appointments to this vitally important board. That such a policy may be unwise is indicated by the hot water the FCC has been in since its beginning. Alternative plans that would benefit all broadcasting require appointment of only qualified radio men to commission and setting up of a commission whose responsibility would be broadcasting (it now includes telephones, telegraphs). Radio experts directing radio would give us better listening, less bureaucratic interference.

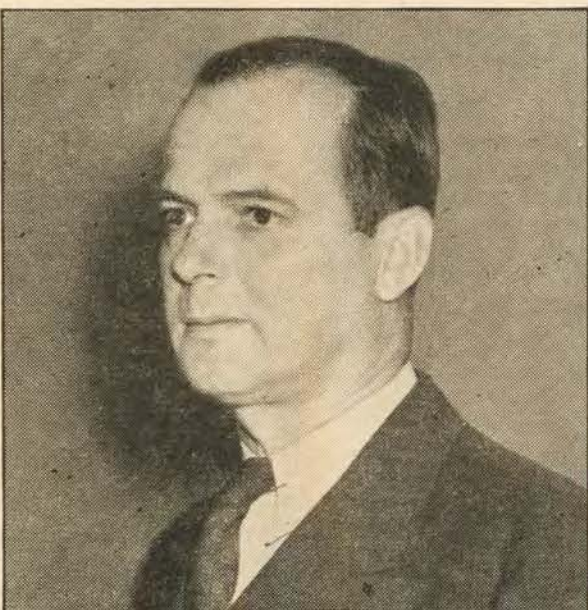

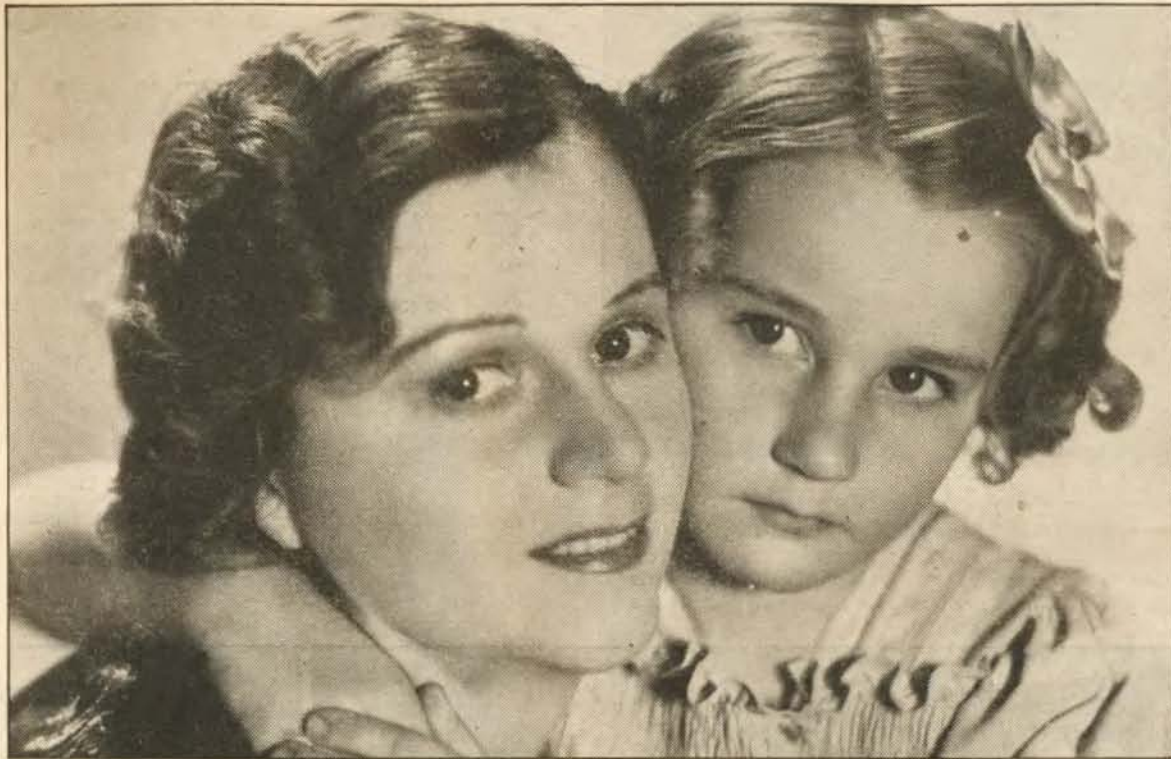

In our issues of July 7 and July 14 appeared a two-part story of clown-maestro-quizmaster Kay Kyser (see picture above), by author James Street. During the course of the story Mr. Street made a bantering excursion into the realm of food, taking personal exception to Kay Kyser's professed fondness for the southern staple, grits.

In answer to one particular letter which came to Mr. Street, criticizing him for "ridiculing" the South, the author wrote a long personal reply, a copy of which we later saw.

For several reasons we decided to print Mr. Street's letter here. First, it will serve as an earnest defense for the author's remarks to anyone else who may have seen in the Kyser story anything offensive to Mr. Street's own good old Southland. Second, it contains some fine tributes to the food tradition of the South. Third, the letter is itself a classical document on food and its history.

The same reader who wrote to Mr. Street also sent a letter to this department. Herewith we present the letter we received and the author's reply to the letter he received from the same writer. We are sure, even if you can't forgive Mr. Street for condemning grits, you will read his letter with interest—and appetite.—Editor.

Dear V. O. L.:

I wish to take exception to article by James Street in July 7 issue on Kay Kyser, ridiculing his liking for grits. I am a native Carolinian myself, and thoroughly agree with Mr. Kyser that I prefer grits to caviar. Grits is not swollen corn, but refined corn and a fine dish.

There are many fine people who enjoy this dish.

As for belittling Mr. Kyser for being a "milk drinker"—this boosts him in

many people's estimation. This world would be a much better place in which to live if there were more men like Mr. Kyser.

All Carolinians and southerners admire him for remaining a southerner, a gentleman, a fine showman.

Dear Mrs. Young:

Thank you for your letter of July 5 in defense of Kay Kyser and those incorrigible twins of gastronomy, grits and gravy. I am grateful for your suggestion that I should make a study of grits. Is that my penance, ma'am? Must I do that to win your forgiveness? Can you not pass another judgment upon me and impose some other penalty? Such as eating collards after the frost has hit them? Or hog-jowls and black-eyed peas? Or blue-channel cat fried in corn meal? Or batter-cakes wallowing in cane molasses, the kind of molasses they used to make on my grandpa's place down in Mississippi after the cotton was ginned and protracted-meeting time had passed, and before the Mississippi went on its winter spree and, loaded to the gills with damyankee water, came rearing home, tracking up the place with mud?

The South, ma'am, has many sins to explain on the day of reckoning. We must stand trial on charges of brewing pot-likker and smoking hams with hickory fires, of stuffing our hogs with goobers and chufers, then with yams until the shoulders and hams cure so beautifully that the ghosts of the gourmands haunt our smoke-houses. We must explain Brunswick stew, burgoo and butter-milk biscuits, beaten biscuits and scuppernong jam and mayhaw jelly; four-layer cakes and sweet-potato pie; ay, ma'am, and rice cooked over steam until each grain stands out, a thing apart from its comrades, like a rugged individualist.

We must plead guilty to passing along to hapless mankind such things as spoon-bread, ambrosia, good coffee, oysters Rockefeller, red-snapper throats, chicken and dumplings, barbecued spareribs and a little dish once served in the South on special events, such as the arrival of the boys home from New England. It was

made by putting a dove in a partridge, the partridge in a guinea, the guinea in a duck, the duck in a capon and the capon in a turkey.

But the South is not responsible for grits! Selah! It is an Indian concoction called tafula. There was a time in the South when slaves were protected from grits. The law forbade a master from feeding his darkies grits more than three times a week, and duck more than twice weekly. When the Scots settled in the South after Culloden they brought with them a food called burgoo, made of oatmeal. It was the regular fare of sailors, because it could be shipped easily. There came a time when the bluenoses jumped into the bootleg slave-trading business, and, needing a food that would keep slaves alive in the middle passage, they turned to burgoo and grits, or tafula. Tafula looked like sand and they called it grits.

Mrs. Young, I'm an authority on grits. But my great grandfather hated grits and ate San Jacinto corn with old Sam Houston and ate it raw, but wouldn't eat grits. My grandpa and my father hated grits. It's my heritage to hate grits. If Mr. Kyser wants to eat grits, more power to him. It will help us cut the corn surplus. But I still think caviar is better. Incidentally, most of the caviar in New York simply is catfish roe shipped from the South.

As a boy in Mississippi, my mother made me eat grits. I even sold a paper called "Grit." Some mornings our old darky cook, Aunt Malindy, would fry grits in egg-batter. But it didn't improve. It still was grits! I went to prep school in Pulaski, Tenn., near your home, and they fed us grits. I had grits in college, then I married and Mrs. Street fed me grits. I am allergic to grits!

Now, as for milk. I like milk. Milk is a handy food to have around the place. It's nice in coffee, for breakfast, but never for dinner. Milk is all right in its place. But when I'm in North Carolina, and I often am, do I drink milk? Oh, no. I take a road out from Waynesboro, to Tom Alexander's camp in the Smokies and we trout-fish. And we cook 'em along the banks and Tom always drops a jug of elderberry wine in the creek and chills it, and we drink it and wash the fish down with spring-water. Milk!

Mr. Kyser is certainly welcome to my quota.

Seriously, if you think I did Kyser or the South an injustice, I hazard the suggestion that you read an idea into the story that was not there at all. I'm sure Kyser understands. I've written many, many stories for many magazines about the South, and a book. I've never before been accused of ridiculing the South.

I am sure Mr. Curtis Mitchell of Radio Guide is aware that I never ridicule my section of the country. He's from Missouri. I'm going to find out if he likes grits. If he does, I'm going to convert him to the paths of righteousness. I will ask him to shun all appearance of evil eating and join me in a crusade against grits.

Woe is me, for our cook, born in Vermont, tells me that for supper we will have fried chicken, corn on the cob, beans cooked with side-meat—and grits. My mother-in-law is here from the South and she likes grits. I can't do anything about it.

Sundries in Staccato

THE Wagners are a wonderful family. A Wagner created music drama. A Wagner invented sleeping-cars. A Wagner was for several seasons the best ballplayer in the National League. A Wagner won the 1906 Vanderbilt and 1908 Grand Prizes in motor-racing. A Wagner was John McCormack's manager. And Siegfried Wagner, son of the operatic Richard, declared when he visited America a number of years ago, that this country has the best bathroom plumbing in the world.

An alarming dictum comes from Percy Grainger, the pianist-composer: "Technical accomplishment is not so vital in musical education as bringing out the primitive instincts."

Looking at a picture of the Ford motor works the other day, I could well understand why so many American men are not aware that Schoenberg has broken away from concord and that Richard Strauss took orchestration beyond Wagner.

The planet Neptune rotates once in sixteen hours, making life there somewhat confusing in terms of time. For instance, with sunrise at 6 a.m. EST, sunset occurs at 2 p.m., and the next sunrise at 10 o'clock of the same day, after which it is day all the rest of that night until sunset at 6 o'clock next morning. That sounds something like the plot of "Trovatore."

IF SOME musical performances deserve repeating, others seem to call for repealing.

Some of the best musicians do not know exactly when Beethoven was born or when he died; some of the worst musicians know every date in musical history.

A professor of Milan says that the human brain emits radio waves. It will be easy hereafter to discover what the tired businessman is thinking about while listening to grand opera.

I'm sure that readers of this department are not those who dial Toscanini and then read a newspaper or a book while he is on the air; converse loudly during a Metropolitan opera broadcast; tune out Wallenstein in a Bach composition to replace it with a jazz orchestra; and jeer at persons who hear all the good musical programs and miss all the prize-fight descriptions. For those types of listeners, I wish continual static and no end of tube-trouble.

Speaking Up

AN INTERESTING letter in the mail-bag this week comes from a disabled war veteran who saw over twenty years of service in the United States Army. He has been a patient in veterans' hospitals for years and only in 1933 was he allowed to

spend part of his time at home, although, of course, in bed. While in the army, he was stable sergeant of the 5th U. S. Cavalry Band and "learned quite a lot about music." "The only pleasure I can get is from my radio which the American Legion gave me," he writes. "Although I never had a music lesson or played an instrument, I cultivated the desire for better music, so all I look for on the radio is classical music."

HE GOES on to say that he has been keeping a radio log of all the music he hears and, with the help of **RADIO GUIDE**, cuts out the pictures of programs, orchestras and artists and pastes them in his log. He also lists the composers and compositions he hears, and in the last fifteen months has heard 781 composers and 4,084 compositions. That probably sets some kind of a record. He is quite methodical about it, listing them alphabetically, and his list gives one a good statistical idea of just how much each composer and his music is played over the air. The Bach family and Beethoven seem to be well in the lead (ten years ago Bach was poison on the radio), with Brahms, Haydn, Mozart and Debussy close behind. The rest of the list is truly staggering in its variety, and would be a lesson for any critic who yells that there's not enough good music on the air.

It would interest this department a lot to know if there are any others among the March of Music readers who are doing the same thing as this enterprising veteran. Or if they have different musical hobbies, I wish they'd write in and tell us about them.

What with all the quizzes on the air, it was inevitable that a music quiz should come along, and "So You Think You Know Music" (formerly The Hour of Musical Fun) is it. The program is well thought out, and the questions are for the most part original and not too difficult. The humor is a bit on the "Gee, I'm funny, Ha! Ha!" side, but a little lightening up of the script could fix that. Most of the real if unconscious humor is supplied by the contestants who sing, whistle, moan and bleat familiar tunes into the microphone. There is an unseen, unheard arbiter, Judge Macaluso, whose presence I find a bit spooky. I wish they'd turn him into a sound-effect. How about one rap for the correct answers and two for the wrong ones? It's nice for the studio audience to see the judge nod his head, but after all, this is a radio program, not a stage show.

The "Manhattan Fairy Tales" Suite of David Broekman, played by the Columbia Symphony Orchestra July 23, deserves a big hand, and Howard Barlow another for playing it. How about a repeat?

The Music Hall has an original list this week, with a well-balanced mixture of old and new composers.

John Herrick, baritone, tackles some interesting novelties. Erich Wolff (1874-1913) was an Austrian composer who spent some time in America, where he

died. He is best known for his songs, of which there are many.

"Don Juan de Manara" is an opera by Eugene Goossens, conductor of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra. Based on a Spanish story, it was first produced in London at Covent Garden, in 1937, with Lawrence Tibbett in the title role.

Robert Schumann's "Kinderscenen" (Scenes of Childhood) is known to everyone who has ever made a pretense at studying the piano. Who can forget struggling with "The Jolly Farmer," usually a parlor show-piece for suffering little boys and girls. Benjamin Godard, French composer (1849-1895), made a charming string and piano arrangement of the popular piano pieces, which the Music Hall Quartet and Henrietta play for us today.

Edward Elgar, one of the most-beloved of English composers, of whom we usually hear only his "Pomp and Circumstance" march and "Enigma" variations, wrote his "Froissart" overture in 1890. It was among the most important of his early works. Elgar was a great admirer of the days of chivalry and he prefaces his score with a quotation from Keats: "When Chivalry lifted her lance on high." Elgar derived the idea for the overture from a scene in Sir Walter Scott's "Old Mortality," in which Claverhouse talks of Froissart, the ancient historian of the days when knighthood was in flower. It is descriptive of the old, chivalrous world, with its gallant fighting and romantic love-making.

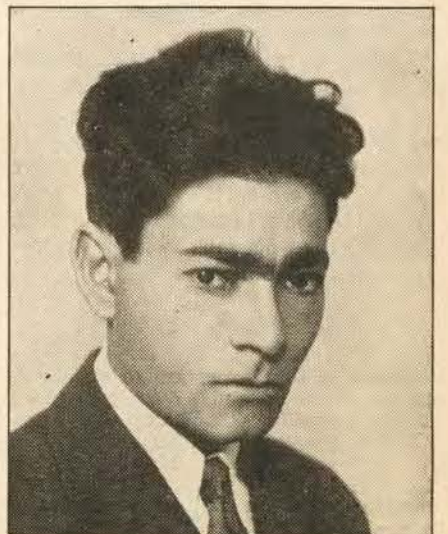
"Tapio" was originally composed by request of Walter Damrosch, for performance by the now defunct New York Symphony. It earns the adjectives that music critics usually lavish on Sibelius' music, such as "bleak" and "stark." Tapio is the legendary name in Finland for its great forests, and Tapio was the god of the forest in Finnish mythology. A few descriptive lines of verse give the atmosphere of the music—

"Wide spread they stand, the Northland's dusky forests,
Ancient, mysterious, brooding savage dreams;
Within them dwells the Forest's mighty God
And woodsprites in the gloom weave magic secrets."

Izler Solomon, American conductor, is the permanent leader of the Illinois Symphony Orchestra, which under another name is the Chicago WPA Orchestra. He has made the Illinois Symphony into one of the most popular institutions in Chicago, rivaling the older Chicago Symphony and causing its performances to be called "the spiciest highbrow entertainment in Chicago."

He has chosen some numbers unfamiliar to radio audiences. Peter Warlock (1894-1930), English composer, was a queerly dual personality, who wrote music under the name of Warlock and musical criticism and essays under his own name of Philip Heseltine. The critic in him did not quite approve of the creator in him. He died tragically by gas and it is said he was a suicide. His best-known compositions are his songs.

Basil Kalinnikoff (1866-1901) was a lesser-known Russian composer, who spent many years as a conductor. Consumption forced him to give up conducting and he devoted himself to composing. Besides his two symphonies, he left a cantata, a string quartet and various other orchestral works.

Operas Table d'Hote, Also a la Carte

OPERAS table d'hote, you ask? I mean the kind principally current in France, where the lyric menu, of standardized pattern, hardly ever offers the public much choice. You take what you get and like it. Once accepted by fifty million Frenchmen, the repertoire in Paris and everywhere else in la Belle France is dished up eternally. Even the operas by Meyerbeer, now mostly shelved by other lands, still tickle the taste of the Gallic messieurs et mesdames.

There was a time when France had no home-made operatic style of its own and avidly swallowed the fare sent over by Italy about the middle of the seventeenth century. But not without the addition of a typical French art-sauce, first supplied by a Parisian musical chef. He was the Italian-born Lully, master of entertainment at Versailles for Louis XIV. That monarch loved his ballet, and so smart Lully put ballet into all the operas imported from his native land. He also wrote the incidental music for the plays by the great Moliere, but soon took to composing operas of his own. Basing on the Italian models, nevertheless Lully made some innovations, amplifying the accompaniments and using a well-developed overture instead of a mere brief prelude. (Of course, plenty of ballet turned up, stayed permanently in French-made opera, and finally gained vogue also in Italy.) Lully is the father of French opera.

Rameau, born four years before Lully, was his chief immediate successor, but founded an operatic style more indigenous than that of his predecessor by contriving a newer and more extensive manner of harmonizing. (Both Lully and Rameau are now absent from the stage but they still have performances of their—ballet music!) Following them were such graceful writers as Mehul, Boieldieu, Auber, also practically obsolete.

Rossini, Bellini, Donizetti, Verdi won Paris for a long while with their melodies and swept aside the lighter French operas, but Meyerbeer (a Parisianized German) supplied France with another style it could call its own, sonorous, spectacular, melodramatic, by "The Huguenots," "L'Africaine," "The Prophet," etc. A more purely lyrical manner returned with Gounod ("Faust"), Bizet ("Carmen"), Thomas ("Mignon"), carried on also by Saint-Saens ("Samson and Delilah"), Massenet ("Manon"), Halevy ("The Jewess"), Delibes ("Lakme"), and lesser talents. The only creator of a style more realistic and noble was Berlioz, but perhaps on that account his several operas never found favor with his compatriots. At that time they were yet unconverted to the grandiose ways of Wagner. (His first offering to the Parisians, "Tannhaeuser," was, in fact, hissed off the boards by them.)

Story interest and facile music sometimes rising to real dramatic power are in Messenger ("Veronique" and "Monsieur Beaucaire"), Charpentier ("Louise"), and some others with pleasant gifts for melody and orchestration. Reyer ("Sigurd") diverged along the Wagnerian line, but he was not generally imitated by French composers.

No new style appeared until Debussy presented his epochal "Pelleas and Melisande" (his only opera) to a world at first puzzled over that master's musical impressionism and avoidance of orchestral bombast. But soon the sheer genius of the new work prevailed, and it is today recognized as the most original stage style since that of Wagner. Ravel was another who left unconventional paths with his subtle and exquisitely jeweled "L'Heure Espagnole." Dukas, too, got away from the old sugary French manner with his "Ariane and Barbe-Bleu." And there we can let the monsieurs rest. Their role in opera has been an engaging and important one.

Russia, too, had its early presentations from Italy, and in 1734 Empress Anne sponsored her own Italian company at St. Petersburg. She was followed similarly by the great Catherine. Italian composers of note were invited to Russia and encouraged to write there. However, native pride and talent prevailed in the end, and the Russian musicians began to draw upon the folk-tunes and rhythms, legends and history of their land and set them for the stage. The real pioneer was Glinka, with his "A Life for the Czar" (1836), still beloved in Russia, although elsewhere only its overture and a few excerpts are programmed.

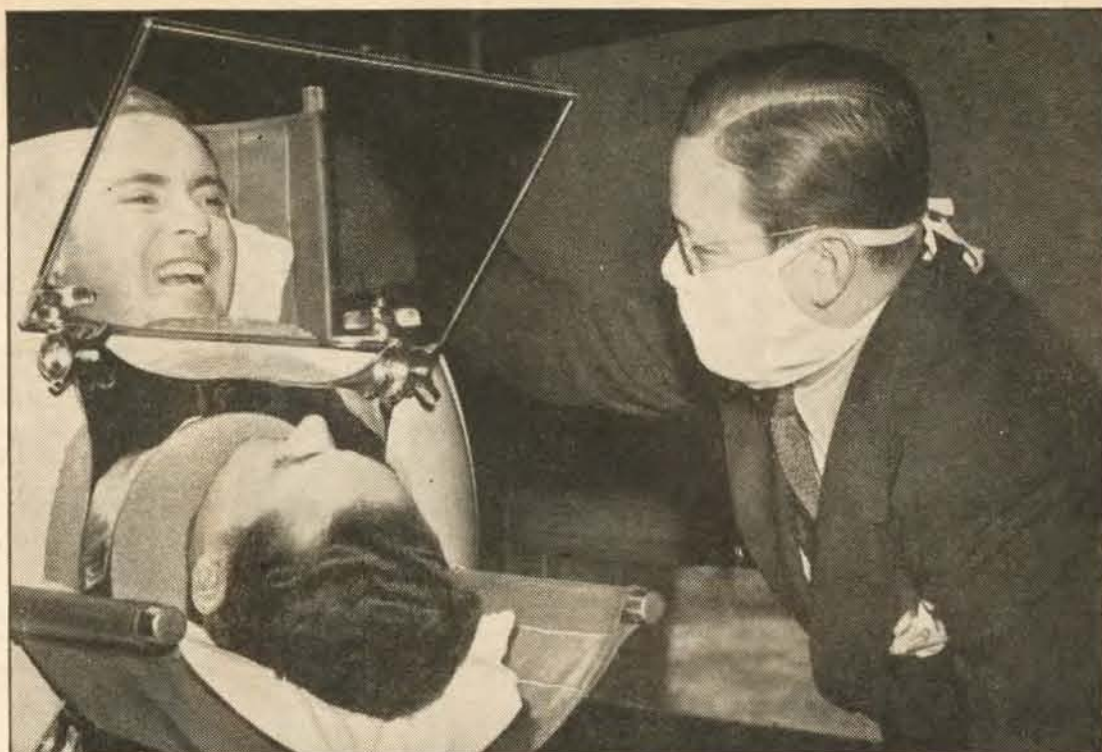
The masque was the model for primitive English operas, in which Purcell shone outstandingly, even though they really are plays with incidental music. Handel, following the Italian manner, won rousing success in London until the English composers evolved their "ballad" stage pieces, started with the vogue of "The Beggar's Opera." Although many later Britons wrote pretentious operas, none of them has achieved lasting life.

America, too, went through the usual course, with Italian opera as its ABC, until native works came about 1794, and more followed throughout the nineteenth century. All of them shared the fate of the productions in England. The Anglo-Saxon countries have never fathered a great composer of opera, bitter as the admission is. In America, the best have been and are Victor Herbert ("Natoma"), Deems Taylor ("Peter Ibbetson"), Cadman ("Shanewis"), Damrosch ("Cyrano") and "The Man Without a Country", De Koven ("Canterbury Tales"), Gruenberg ("Jack and the Beanstalk" and "Emperor Jones"), and Gershwin with his "Porgy and Bess." That may not be strictly an opera, but it is full of tune, rhythm, drama, and all of them recognizably American.

RADIO SHUT - IN NUMBER ONE

Fred Snite sees life and enjoys it through radio and a rear-vision mirror

Lying in a metal chamber not unlike an oil-barrel, Fred Snite, the "man in the iron lung," receives friends and visitors like this. They wear sanitary masks and watch Snite's face through mirrors as they converse with the courageous young victim of infantile paralysis

A WHITE-GARBED nurse tied the gauze mask carefully over my nose and mouth and then the sound of a radio-broadcast ball game stopped with a click. "This way, please." I followed her into the small, air-conditioned room where Frederick B. Snite, Jr., was lying in his "iron lung." Another nurse was just taking away a food-tray. Then we were alone.

"Listen to the radio much?" I mumbled through the mask, trying to make conversation. What do you say to a boy who has been lying in a metal container not unlike an oil-barrel for three years? What can you say to a boy who—at the prime of life and with everything to look forward to—is stricken down by infantile paralysis?

And then he smiled. You have to see Fred Snite's smile to appreciate it, to understand why he has become the symbol, the red badge of courage for all other suddenly stricken people regardless of where they might be.

"Yes," he said, "I listen a lot. I don't know what I'd do without a radio." And then, when he smiled, you didn't wonder what to say. You just talked naturally, freely, as you would to anyone else. That was the way Fred wanted it to be and that was the way you wanted it to be. So that was the way it was.

You walk into the room half expecting to see a pallid, pain-stricken face worn by the suffering its young owner has undergone. Instead, you see a round, healthy, well-bronzed face and a spontaneous, wide smile. The lung is a long, green affair—not somber, not unpleasant—and before you leave you've almost forgotten about it. All that you can see of Fred is his head sticking out through a rubber ruffle that seems to breathe back and forth as the suction-pump operates. You look at him—and he looks at you—through an arrangement of mirrors over his up-turned face. At first you want to stand over him and look down into his face, but after a while you get used to the mirrors and it's like talking face to face with him.

"No, I don't know what I'd do without a radio set now. Funny, you never think much about what a little thing like radio means till you get in a spot like this." He grinned, and I remembered how he laughingly called himself the "Boiler Kid." "And you listen to a lot of things you never even thought about before. I used to go to church regularly, but I never thought about listening to religious programs on the air. Now I never miss the 'Catholic Hour' on Sundays.

"And news broadcasts. I just never cared about them before. Now I think I catch them all. You begin to take an interest in things people do—and in people who are able to do things—when you've been like this for a while."

And then he told me about Alec Templeton. Radio people have been pretty swell to Fred, coming out to perform for him from time to time. Among these was the blind English pianist, Alec Templeton, and he played and sang for a long, long time. Fred speaks in intervals—timed to his forced breathing—and it was hard to tell whether it was a breathing-pause or a catch in his voice as he told of Templeton's recital at the Snite home in River Forest, just out of Chicago. There was a strange bond between the two—between the man who, blind, had developed such remarkable muscular control of his body, and this boy who, able to see perhaps farther and surely straighter than most, was unable to move a muscle of his body, even to breathe.

"Alec is a great guy," Fred said, "and I'm glad to see him get such a break. I listen to him regularly." He said it as simply as that. He meant a lot more.

Fred listens to the "Grouch Club." "I like their sort of grouches," he grinned. He also listens to the ball games and, when big races are broadcast, to their radio description, and to the fights. A devout Catholic, he believes the "Catholic Hour" is one of the finest programs on the air.

"I made a radio appearance of my own last January," he said. It was from Miami Beach, Florida, where he was spending the winter, and over an international network. He spoke on behalf of the Foundation for the Prevention of Infantile Paralysis and he started his plea for funds for this worthy cause with the words, "I know the need . . ."

It was early in 1936 that Fred was stricken while flying from Shanghai to Peiping on a pleasure trip. He was taken at once to Peiping's Union Medical College, where, a few hours later, he was paralyzed from the neck down. He could not move a muscle to breathe, and death from suffocation would have been a certainty had not the hospital been one of the few in the East to have an artificial respirator. From the day he entered the respirator, he had to learn a new mode of life.

THE principle of the lung is the creation, through a suction-pump, of a slight vacuum, which causes the chest to lift. Then, when air is again let into the respirator, the chest drops. Thus the lung actually breathes for the patient enclosed in it. In eating, in talking, in breathing, he had to learn to keep time with the pump. Learning not to swallow his tongue in the now involuntary act of breathing was quite a trick. In nine months he had so accustomed himself to this new mode of life that he was ready to start home.

The twelve-thousand-mile trip back to Chicago, with its dramatic moments, is well known to everyone. There was the time when, in transferring him from the train to the steamer in China, he was out of the lung for a long three minutes, and the time when the current failed and a quick-thinking nurse operated the pump by hand until it could be fixed.

Then, back home, he settled down to the task of adapting himself to this new mode of life in earnest. Through his mirrors he had learned to read and to play games. But there was a deeper and more important side to this new

life. He must learn to live spiritually, mentally with the part of him untouched by the affliction. And it was here that radio played its part.

Radio brought to his imprisoned body a mental freedom that was unknown to the invalid of fifteen years ago. It brought a wide, new range of interests, a brand of entertainment that was not dependent upon the people around him. It has freed him, largely, of his dependence upon friends and family. "You can tune in your radio and listen, and when you get tired, turn it off, and you don't feel that you've put anyone out, you don't have to talk back to it or thank it or anything," is the way he puts it.

At the touch of a finger, he finds things he wants—music, drama, religion, upon which he feeds so deeply and through which he has gained so much of the courage it has taken to keep his chin up and the smile on his lips. And you feel sorry when you think that even the strength to flick the small switch of a radio is denied to this youth.

He had just returned from Lourdes the day I went out to talk with him. He could still smile, though no miracle had brought back to him control of his paralyzed muscles there in the little grotto where the obscure peasant girl had heard the voice of the Virgin. He said the trip had been inspiring.

ROSE to leave, and I couldn't help feeling that if ever I make a pilgrimage in search of a miracle it will be to the little room in River Forest where Fred Snite lives. That he lives at all is a miracle of medical inventiveness and ingenuity. I give you the iron lung in living proof. That he lives a full and a happy life under overwhelmingly depressive circumstances is another miracle. And for this, radio is largely responsible. I think the greatest miracle of all, however, is Fred Snite himself—a miracle of courage and endurance and hopefulness after three years of motionless looking at life through a rear-vision mirror.

Person-to-Person

● Summer radio workshop enrolments this year are exceeding expectations. Dr. Franklin Dunham, educational director of NBC, reports that 212 have registered for his course at Columbia University and more than one hundred are expected to take his Harvard course. In both cases the number enrolled is more than twice the number expected. At Indiana State Teachers College, where Dr. Clarence M. Morgan is conducting two summer radio workshop courses this year, the enrolment for the first was sixty-two; and for the second, sixty-nine.

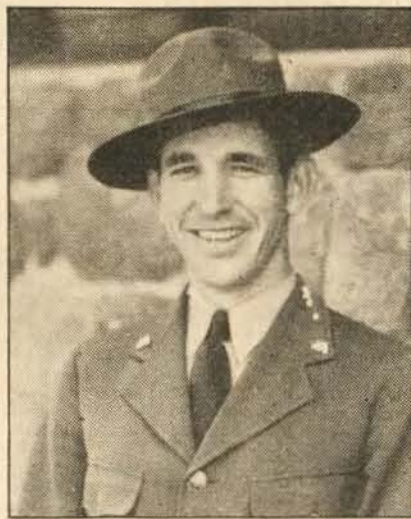
● Frank Woodruff joined the ranks of Irving Reis and the others who have been won over to Hollywood picture-making from radio work when he went to RKO as a director recently. For the past four years Mr. Woodruff has directed the popular "Lux Radio Theater."

● The recent WPA shake-up in Congress placed the future of "The World Is Yours" series in doubt for a while. Now it is announced that it will continue to be presented over NBC by the Office of Education, Federal Security Agency for the Smithsonian Institution, with the assistance of the WPA. A list of the subjects to be treated in broadcasts from August to February is available to listeners upon request.

● "Science Everywhere" returns to the air again on October 17 as one of NBC's programs designed for classroom listening. The outline of subjects to be treated in this series during the 1939-40 school year has been approved by Dr. Franklin Dunham, and, although there probably will be a few changes in the line-up, it should remain serviceable for most practical purposes. As I scan this list that includes a brief explanation of the subjects to be treated in each broadcast, I cannot help but feel that it would be a marvelous aid to any teacher planning to use the "Science Everywhere" programs. Armed with this outline, a teacher can organize her year's work to tie in directly with the broadcasts. "Science Everywhere," presented under the auspices of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, will again be directed by Dr. Carroll Lane Fenton. Dr. Fenton is currently occupied with a series of ten broadcasts based on important books in popular science.*

● First of the fall parade of radio-education meetings will be the Northwest Conference on Educational Broadcasting, November 10 and 11. This will be the third annual conference sponsored by Minneapolis station KSTP. Thomas D. Rishworth, KSTP educational director, who originated the meetings, has invited Office of Education Commissioner Dr. John W. Studebaker, NBC's Dr. James Rowland Angell and Judith Waller, and Dr. I. Keith Tyler of the Evaluation of School Broadcasts project to participate. Two previous meetings resulted in the establishment of thirteen radio workshops in Minneapolis-St. Paul schools.

Clever use of similes makes Dr. Gregg's nature programs interesting as well as informative

"Nature Sketches"

Along the Thompson River in Rocky Mountain National Park, Dr. Raymond Gregg and the Junior Nature School will discover many interesting forms of bird, insect and plant life to discuss on Saturday morning, August 5. There in the spotted shade of the quivering aspens, they will find a great variety of flowers, ferns and lower forms of plant life, and Mr. Gregg will explain how the birds, insects and animals that inhabit this grove use the aspen tree for food and shelter.

● The aspen tree is a white-barked species of poplar, common in the Rockies. "Nature's Register" is the title of Mr. Gregg's story of the aspen's ability to register scars made on its pale trunk.

● Eagle fern, ninebark, monkshood, fireweed, cow parsnip and tall stickweed are some of the flowers that may be encountered and described.

● Red-naped sapsucker, warbling vireo, western robin, yellow warbler, broad-tailed hummingbird and pigmy nuthatch are some of the birds that frequent the trailside to be followed.

● Part of the story material in this broadcast will be devoted to "bear trees" and "tree cancers."

"Men Behind the Stars"

School Use of Facsimile

The educator, generally speaking, becomes a very meek individual when divorced from his own little world of established facts. A wary lot, few are found even with the courage to look into the future of their own work and publicly predict what they feel will take place. Dr. Clarence M. Morgan, radio director of Indiana State Teachers College, raised his head above the rank and file recently when he drew the attention of Indiana educators to possible school use of a new radio "baby." Addressing a school administrators' conference in Terre Haute, Dr. Morgan predicted wide use of facsimile in the transmission of study material into schools from educational centers.

"Facsimile," said Dr. Morgan, "offers one of the greatest future possibilities for college extension service to practising teachers. Indiana State Teachers College has the second largest teachers' college library in the United States. Its faculty, by research and experimentation, has the latest in educational materials always on file. Information from these two sources becomes immediately available to teachers via facsimile. If the schools will install facsimile receivers and the colleges the transmitting equipment, the resources of the entire college become available on call. For example, a social-studies teacher wants a map showing the latest boundaries. She telephones her need to the college and this map can be sent immediately to her via facsimile. Same for unit plans, illustrative material, new drills, etc. Experiments are now under way whereby facsimile may be sent on the inaudible frequencies while any broadcast is in progress. If this develops, any teacher in the field could have answer to a request in a very few minutes. And, by use of simultaneous sound and facsimile reception, the map referred to previously could be sent and an authority in the field could explain it to the teacher and her class as the map forms on the receiver."

The outstanding experiment in the use of facsimile in educational work is taking place in Cleveland. Dr. Levenson, radio director of the Cleveland Board of Education, reported at the Tenth Institute for Education by Radio last May that it is being used in two ways—administratively and in instruction. The transmitter is operated from board of education headquarters, and schools equipped with receivers are sent a bulletin that ordinarily is distributed by mail, a school newspaper and instructional guides. If attempts to record facsimile messages on a cellophane strip are successful, it could be used for slides and thus be a valuable contribution.

Wide use of facsimile in school systems will be realized only after experimentation indicates the handicaps to be overcome. At this early stage in the development of this new radio "baby" the difficulties cannot be clearly defined. Radio and facsimile, twentieth-century devices, are vitalizing and making pertinent twentieth-century education. Maybe they will make twentieth-century students more receptive.

any nearer to the *Squalus* by plane, we changed our course, took off again, and flew to New London, Connecticut, where we landed just as the weather caught us for good.

I found that the submarine-tender *Falcon* had already headed up toward Portsmouth, with its famous rescue chamber aboard. In a few hours I also was on my way—on board a train, complete with radio equipment and engineer. I arrived in time to cover the story of that famous rescue from start to finish—and, believe me, it was one of the most thrilling adventures of the sea I have ever had the privilege to witness.

June 11, 1939. Hyde Park, New York.

Last night, after almost two weeks of ceaseless traveling, I broadcast the final chapter in the visit of the King and Queen. It happened on the east bank of the Hudson River, at the little Hyde Park railroad station. Only a tiny group of men and women were present as the President of the United States and his family waved good-by and the royal train rolled slowly off into the night.

June 18, 1939. Lisbon, Portugal.

If anybody had told me just a week ago that I'd be here in this town of narrow, winding streets and magnificent old houses, broadcasting to America, I'd have told them they were crazy. And if they'd told me I'd get here by flying across the Atlantic, I'd have told them they were crazier still. But here I am.

It all began last Monday in the West Point armory. I had just finished broadcasting the graduation exercises when our broadcast telephone rang. It was Paul White, head of Columbia's Department of Public Affairs, calling from New York.

"How would you like to go Europe Saturday?" he asked.

"Sure," I answered.

"All right. You're leaving on the *Atlantic Clipper* Saturday afternoon."

We left from the Pan American base at Port Washington, Long Island. There were eighteen passengers in all—reporters, radio engineers, Pan American officials. As we pulled away from the Port Washington base, I spied my little boat, which I still hadn't had the opportunity to use. She was riding at her mooring in the bay, and I gazed at her a long time through the *Clipper's* window as we set off for Europe. It was six minutes before four in the afternoon by my watch.

Heading east, we began a long, slow climb to eight thousand feet. That was about the average height for the whole trip. Then, for an hour and forty-five minutes after the take-off, we put on our first broadcast, an account of the flight so far, from the *Clipper's* spacious living-quarters. Before airtime, the engineer, Clyde Houldson, would get a time-check from New York, another engineer, Don Wittemore, would set his watch exactly with Houldson's and then come aft to check time with my stop-watch. Then I simply waited for airtime to come around on my watch.

At 8:30 p.m., New York time, my earphones buzzed with the hubbub in the radio theater, which always heralds the start of a Professor Quiz program. So I banged the gavel, and then, from the sky, 820 miles out over the Atlantic, introduced "the one, the only, the original Professor Quiz!" Instantly I heard a roar of applause from New York in the phones, then the voice of the Professor. "Thank you, Mr. Trout. It was a real thrill to hear your voice from away up there in the clouds, and I know all our listeners as well as myself wish you a very happy landing."

At midnight I climbed into my upper berth for a nap. Those sixty-six cylinders produced a pleasant, lulling sound, which put me to sleep the moment my head dropped onto the pillow. Absolutely steady, the *Clipper* never rocked nor swayed, much less bumped, and to insure the passengers' comfort that first night Captain Wallace D. Culbertson flew 150 miles off the direct course to dodge a storm. But although sleeping-conditions would have pleased Rip Van Winkle, there was one little item I had forgotten. We were speeding eastward, helped by a tailwind, nearly two hundred miles an hour, and so, an hour and a half after I had gone to bed, the bright sun came streaming through the window of my upper berth.

It was fifteen minutes to four that afternoon, New York time, when we slid down on the broad Tagus River, off the clean white city of Lisbon. By the time the huge forty-one-ton *Clipper* had been safely tied up at the pier, it was past four, and I had a broadcast scheduled at five. I arrived in the studio just in time. I had borrowed a typewriter on the *Clipper*, and all afternoon over the ocean between Horta and Lisbon I had written more than I ever would have time to use. I was well along in my speech when the Portuguese engineers reported that nothing was coming through. I had to stop. The really annoying feature was the fact that in my earphones I could hear the CBS program perfectly. American music was pouring into my ears there in the Lisbon studio, and at regular intervals the music would stop while a New York announcer would say, over and over again, "Come in, Bob Trout!" I was unable to make my answers heard, and finally had to be content with sending to our New York news department a cable detailing some of the main points of our flight.

It's midsummer now, and so far I've spent just three uninterrupted days on my boat. Pretty soon the big U. S. Army maneuvers will be getting under way. I'm planning to broadcast them. And then the next big event is—what was that I was saying a while ago about a New Year's resolution? Oh, well—broadcasting news-on-the-spot is fun, too.

A SPECIAL dispatch from Radio Press Service advises me that the new 25,000-watt Swiss Government short-wave station recently completed at Schwarzenburg, Switzerland, was destroyed by fire on the evening of July 6. Two years of labor in building and equipping the station have been lost. The transmitter was the most modern in all Europe and was to have been officially inaugurated on July 15. Initial tests with transmissions beamed on North America had been remarkably successful, and Swiss residents in this country were delighted with the prospects of regular programs from their homeland. Although the losses are estimated at more than a million Swiss francs, it is said plans will be drawn up immediately for a new station to replace the one destroyed. In the meantime, special transmissions from Switzerland will be continued over the League of Nations stations at Prangins.

A panorama of Hawaii, capturing all the charm and beauty of the Pacific isle in native music and song, featuring outstanding native vocalists and instrumentalists, is being presented weekly from Honolulu, Sunday nights at 10 p.m. EDT, over short-wave station KQH (14.92).

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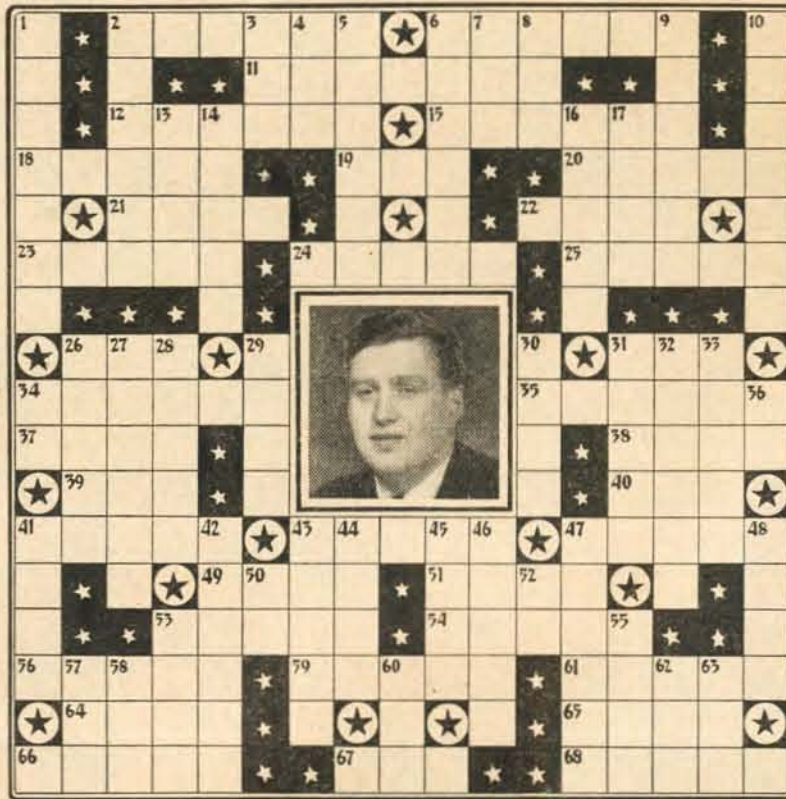

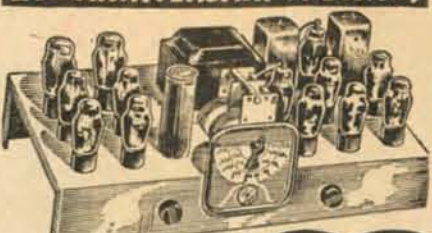

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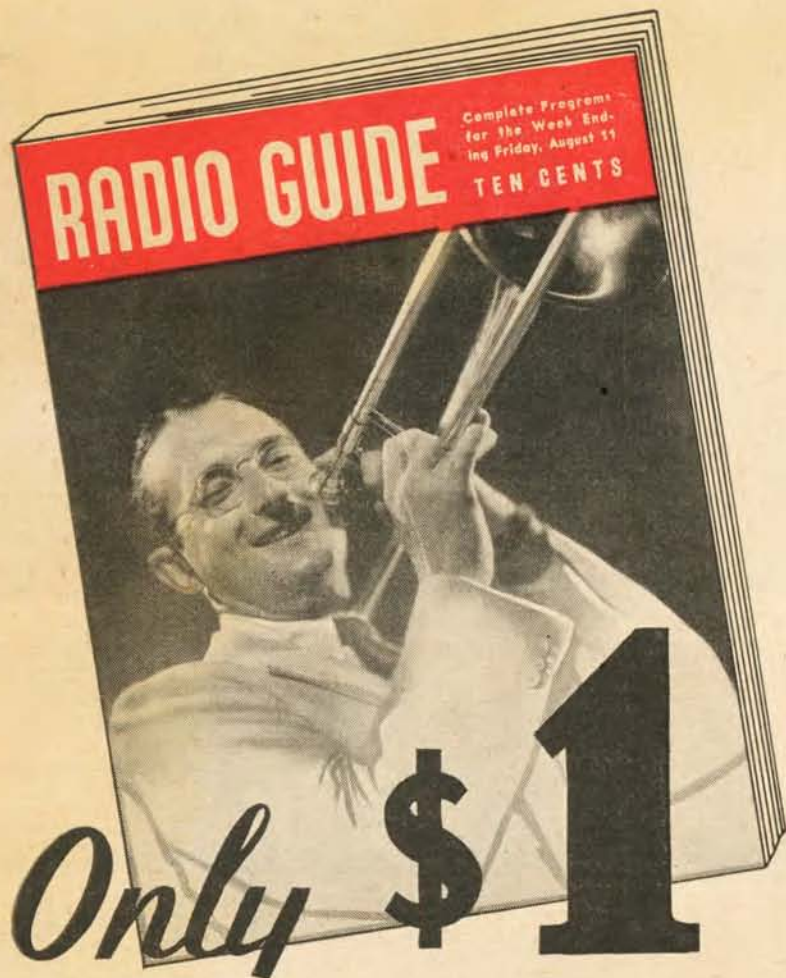
