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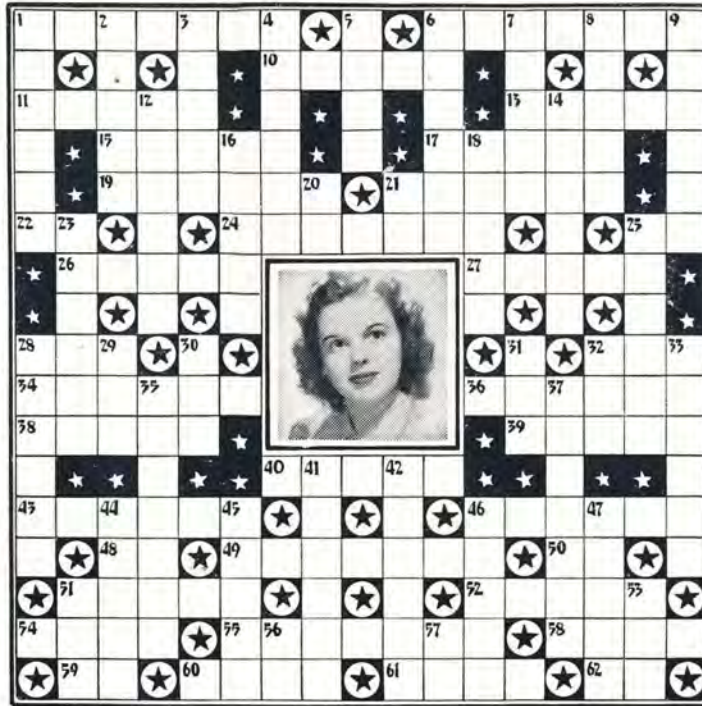

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LISTENING-POST

A random report of interesting facts and unusual events in broadcasting

Speaking of "listening-posts," O. H. Caldwell, editor of *Radio Today*, tells us in a recent statement that during the year 1939 alone well over four million of them were added to the millions already in use in the U. S. Meaning that nine million new radio sets were sold in 1939 and, since never more than half of any year's total radio sales is for replacements, there are at least four million new "listening-posts" this year.

All kinds of Americans in all walks of life have entered the essay contest sponsored by "America's Town Meeting of the Air" and Town Hall, Inc. Probably every conceivable answer to the query "What Does American Democracy Mean to Me?" has found its way to the sponsors. Particularly interesting should be the answers of fifty-one prisoners at the Atlanta, Ga., Penitentiary, who made a sizable run on Town Hall with their essay entries. The contest closed December 4.

Strange and tortuous are the ways of modern radio when used as an implement of war. Recently news came from Brazil that officials had applied Brazilian neutrality laws by sealing the radio room of the German passenger liner *Windhuk* which had recently arrived in disguise, equipped for sea raiding. A double purpose was behind it. First, neutral powers cannot permit messages to be radioed from their territory by a belligerent power. Second, Brazilians have no hankering for possible espionage or secret contact between German war vessels and German residents of Brazil.

Sad news for radio listeners was the death of Ernest Schelling, internationally famous concert pianist, conductor and composer, on December 8 in New York City. Mr. Schelling, a well-known radio conductor, was especially loved by children for his Young People's Concerts of the New York Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra broadcast over CBS. Thousands of children called him Uncle Ernest and his death denied them a new series of radio concerts under his direction which were to have begun on December 10.

Alton Cook, New York radio columnist, recently compiled a self-styled Radio Primer which unearths, among others, the following interesting facts: Each of the four big radio networks averages over 20,000 programs a year. Besides those 80,000, there are more than four hundred local stations producing their own programs daily . . . A Coast-to-Coast fall network broadcast costs \$15,000 an hour. Talent is extra . . . Major Bowes, with a salary of about \$20,000 weekly, is still the highest-paid personality in radio, but not the most popular . . . Hollywood broadcasts have a more noticeable bass tone than those originating in New York. The reason: They are brought by telephone wires and transmission tends to build up lower tones . . . Radio stars have more publicity agents than any other type of entertainers.

INTRODUCTIONS in the case of Shirley Temple, who smiles out at you from this week's cover of *RADIO GUIDE*, are probably unnecessary, for there is no better known smile in the world than that given our readers in this photograph of the famous child motion-picture star, who makes her radio debut this week. Shirley was born in Santa Monica, Calif., April 23, 1929, to Mr. and Mrs. George F. Temple, who, in addition to being her parents, serve as wary agents for their star daughter.

Shirley's screen career started when she was only three years old with a spot in a short subject which led to a minor part in a full-length feature, "Stand Up and Cheer." Twentieth Century-Fox, producers of the film, did just



that when they learned that the youngster who played the bit had lifted a mediocre picture into a box-office wow. She became a star immediately.

Unlike others, Shirley had had no long period of preparation for stardom. But as one picture followed another, directors learned that Shirley was developing into an actress. Not content with her being sweet, pretty, adorning, Shirley's parents had hired the best dramatic coaches, the best music teachers. Bill Robinson, master of tap, had personally taught her to dance . . . because he liked her. Soon Shirley was a polished actress, capable of handling the most difficult parts.

Today Shirley stands among the top dramatic stars of Hollywood.

WHY DID "GIRL ALONE" MARRY?

Serial listeners take their drama seriously. Many of them were surprised when in "Girl Alone" Scoop Curtis (played by Pat Murphy) married Stormy Wilson (June Travis). They were more startled when just recently Patricia Rogers (Betty Winkler) married John Knight (Lester Damon). Author Fayette Krum was buried under an avalanche of mail, from which she emerged to write this logical defense and hint of the future of "Girl Alone." Why did she let Patricia marry John? Are there more surprises in store? Read what the author herself says about it.—Editor.

THE week after Patricia Rogers and John Knight suddenly eloped, everywhere I turned I was asked, "What in the world ever made you decide to let Patricia get married?" Well, here's the answer. I didn't decide to let Patricia get married. Patricia made the decision herself. The most I could do was influence her.

Back in 1935, when I gave birth to "Girl Alone" and its large batch of brain-children, I didn't dream I'd have so much trouble with them. Actually, most of the time, I haven't had much to say about what my characters do.

They're my brain-children, but, like children in real life, I can't entirely control their actions. Being what they are, there are certain things they will do or will not do. And all a mother or an author can do is to try to influence them. It takes some conniving sometimes.

For instance, when John Knight broke his first engagement to Patricia back in 1936 and refused to marry her because she was the Rogers heiress, it was only natural that she should turn to the easy, gay companionship of Scoop Curtis in a way that would inhibit the warm-

blooded, passionate emotion she felt for John Knight. The affection she subsequently developed for Scoop Curtis was of an entirely different kind. There was something about the easy, carefree, Bohemian type of life, so in contrast to the prim standard of social conduct by which she'd been brought up, which had a strong appeal to her, and it was inevitable that after two years of an exciting, adventurous association with Scoop that he should become the dominating factor in her life. As a suitor, Scoop left something wanting. He was

AT LAST SHIRLEY SURRENDERS TO RADIO

"Screen Guild Theater" airs Hollywood's biggest little star on Christmas Eve

WHAT to do until Santa Claus comes? Along about the time when the youngsters are in their pajamas and ready to be snuggled off to what little measure of sleep they can be expected to work in the night before Christmas, the problem of what to do to while away the time often becomes rather pressing. But for radio listeners this year there just won't be any problem. They'll simply gather the youngsters around the radio in the living-room and twist the dials to "Screen Guild Theater." Then, as grand a surprise as anyone could ask on Christmas Eve will be waiting.

Shirley Temple makes her first radio appearance!

This grand little actress of the screen couldn't have chosen a more fitting time for her debut. Neither could she have chosen a more apt role than as Mityl in "The Blue Bird," a glorious story of the things that happen to a little girl and those about her in the interval between Christmas Eve and Christmas morn. This unbeatable combination of Shirley's grand dramatic talent plus a play that's made to order for the festive occasion promises a show long to be remembered by radio fans of all ages everywhere.

While this will be Shirley's first radio appearance, it is not by any means her first radio offer. Since that day when her appearance in "Little Miss Marker" proved to the world that a new star had been born, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Temple, have been literally flooded with offers for her radio appearance. The manufacturer of a famous food product rushed from the theater to cable the Temples—then vacationing in Honolulu—an offer of \$300,000 for eighteen weeks. Returning from Honolulu, they found other offers awaiting them. They came from oil companies, food manufacturers, candy-makers, cosmetic houses, the networks themselves. And they totaled far more than a million dollars, but the Temples and the studio, feeling that Shirley had enough to do in pictures, refused them all unequivocally.

But now Shirley is to make her radio debut, a debut that might well change this entire picture. And behind this first appearance of Hollywood's best-loved child star lies an amazing story.

Several months ago an automobile manufacturer offered Shirley \$25,000 to sing one song with a symphony orchestra on a Christmas Eve program. Another radio advertiser raised that figure by ten thousand dollars. Both of these offers were refused by the Temples. Now Shirley will appear in the Screen Guild's production of "The Blue Bird" for

charity. Neither Shirley nor her studio will receive a cent for her work, but the money that would have been paid her will go instead into the Motion Picture Relief Fund for needy actors and actresses.

Her decision to do this charity show after refusing the large offers which had been received was made by Shirley on the spur of the moment. Jean Hersholt, president of the Relief Fund, and James Roosevelt, one of its directors, visited Mrs. Temple on the 20th Century-Fox set where Shirley was making a screen version of "The Blue Bird." Because the Temples' refusal to permit Shirley to do radio work was well known, no one supposed that their visit had any other purpose than to watch "One-Take Temple" at work. But suddenly Hersholt turned to Mrs. Temple and told her what he had come for.

"We know that your policy—and that of the studio—has been that Shirley's motion-picture work keeps her busy. But this is for charity. It's to help those of her own profession who need it."

For a moment Mrs. Temple didn't answer. Then she called Shirley over.

"How would you like to do a radio show Christmas Eve for the Motion Picture Relief Fund, Shirley?" she asked her daughter.

SHIRLEY'S face beamed. She's an ardent radio fan.

"I'd love it." She was enthusiastic. But then her face fell. "Would I be able to bring Miss Klant and Mary Lou, too?" Miss Klant is her teacher, Mary Lou her stand-in, and they've worked with her on all of her pictures.

"We'd love to have them," Hersholt assured her. He turned back to Mrs. Temple.

"All right, then, we'll do it if we can get the studio's permission."

Elated at having accomplished in a few simple words what millions of dollars in contract offers had been unable to do, Hersholt and Roosevelt hurried to the office of Darryl Zanuck, production chief at 20th Century-Fox. They promptly received both his approval and that of Joseph Schenck and hurried away to make plans for what they feel will be the biggest broadcast of 1939.

The Screen Guild show, as you probably know, is sponsored by an oil company and, in addition to

being one of radio's better shows with plenty of big names in every cast, is also Hollywood's favorite charity. Glamourtown's biggest stars, directors, producers lend their talents to making it a first-rate attraction, and the sponsor, instead of paying them for their services, turns the salaries they would receive over to the Motion Picture Relief Fund, which aids needy members of the profession. So the staff which will aid in making this Christmas Eve broadcast a memorable one was chosen from the wide list of talent available to the committee. Bill Bacher, ace Hollywood radio producer, and Tom Lewis, head of the radio department of a large advertising agency, are in charge of the show. "The Blue Bird," which Shirley was making for the movies, was adapted as the play, and musical portions of the program have been left in the hands of composer Alfred Newman, who did the musical score for the picture version of "The Blue Bird," and Oscar Bradley, director of the Screen Guild show.

FOR Shirley, her advent into radio is a grand adventure, for she is an enthusiastic radio fan with a long list of "must hear" programs she drops everything to listen to. The stalwart "Lone Ranger" is at the very top of this list. There are six radio sets in the Temple home, two in her dressing-room, to say nothing of the one in the car. As the time draws closer for the program, Shirley's enthusiasm mounts, although there are some in Hollywood who wonder if she will succumb to mike fright, as many veterans before her have. They remember that Patsy Kelly fainted dead away of mike fright just before airtime and the weird performances other mike-frightened screen stars have put on. But the betting is that Shirley—with twenty-one pictures behind her and a trouper at heart—will come through with flying colors.

If she does, radio may play a far-reaching part in her future life, for it is no longer a secret that she is becoming the problem-child of her studio. This is through no fault of her own. She is a grand actress, amenable to direction and without temperament. The problem grows out of the fact that Shirley is growing up and out of the cute little roles that endeared her to millions. Under a heavy contract to 20th Century-Fox for several years to come, executives have begun to wonder what they could do with her during this period of transition.

That there will be a screen place for an older Shirley is undoubted, for Shirley is not only a lovely, curly-haired youngster with a captivating smile

but she knows all of the tricks of the acting-trade. At an age with Deanna Durbin, Judy Garland and the other adolescents who have come to the front in recent years, she will again be an asset to the studio. But for the present, during those growing years when she is neither a baby nor a young woman, pictures which might present her in an adequate way would be few and far between. At best, she could expect only supporting roles and not the stellar parts to which she has become accustomed.

Radio might well be the answer. In radio, unseen by her listeners, Shirley's fine dramatic talent and experience could be put to a good use. Radio listeners would welcome the seasoned talent she could bring to the microphone, while for Messrs. Schenck, Zanuck et al. it might prove an entirely satisfactory answer to what has been, thus far, a perplexing problem.

It's their fourth child. After the program, Van Steeden told me that the child arrived a month earlier than expected but that it was fine and weighed six pounds. Cagney will play the part of Joe Bonham, deaf, dumb, blind and limbless ex-soldier of "Johnny Got His Gun," Dalton Trumbo's best-selling novel. Oboler will fly to New York to produce the play from Radio City.

NEW IDEAS WANTED- OR ARE THEY?

Radio men must con 15,000
or 20,000 of them—sane
and screwball—every year

USUALLY when a sponsor comes to a big network with a program idea in his head and a bag of gold in one hand, doors fly open, carpets are unrolled, and the welcoming committee is paved with vice-presidents.

There have been horrible exceptions. One of them was an important maker of mattresses who approached broadcasters with the announcement that he wanted to buy a half-hour of air time.

The network allowed as it had some mighty choice half-hours for sale and what kind of a program did Mr. Mattress Maker propose to put on the kilocycles? Maybe a swing trio or a couple of high-priced comedians?

No, admitted the gentleman with a dreamy look in his eyes. He wanted to buy half an hour Coast-to-Coast and send it to the radio listeners of the land as "a program of complete silence, restful as the So'n'so brand mattress!"

The idea never quite reached the loudspeakers, novel as it might have been, because of a little ruling which says stations must keep spouting music or conversation without a break while they are on the air. Something about "public convenience and necessity." But the notion sent radio folks into a dither.

The man who made mattresses—a feat which, incidentally, he still performs—is only representative of those thousands who accost the ramparts of radio each year with a galaxy of screwball ideas. Of course he had the added virtue of crisp cash to back up his suggestion, had it been half-way acceptable. Ideas come from everyone—from taxi-drivers to bank presidents—who imagine that the shiny institution of broadcasting can do just about anything. Which, as a matter of fact, is rather right.

Most of these program notions are proffered with the conviction that great wealth is assured if one can only reach the microphone. Radio, like the movies, is America's modern El Dorado. In one respect that's correct. It's just about as hard to find as the glittering city of the conquistadors.

Anywhere from fifteen to twenty thousand program suggestions are submitted each twelve months to the major networks. It's a dull day that doesn't see fifty or more letters from ambitious people dumped on a program-director's desk.

The law of probability runs at a woful ratio. Perhaps a dozen or so, in the

course of an entire year, prove practical or even of potential value. Writers appear to have an utter disregard for what radio can and cannot do. Hypnotists want to practise their art for the benefit of radio's millions.

Typical of many ideas received is a recent letter from a man in upstate New York who wrote from a deer-hunters' camp. It came to the desk of a program-director, advising him that the snores of hunters staying at the camp were of infinite variety. "A program would be," said he, "of great use to the medical profession. The snores have a variation beyond imagination and can be appreciated only when heard."

Another candidate for air honors offered to go over Niagara Falls in a barrel, broadcasting as he went. One man, in desperation at his inability to get a job, came to the special-features division of a network last year and declared he would leap off a skyscraper

time juggling both that and his hat. Finally he puts them both on the floor, then announces that he has "a swell idea."

It goes like this, you find. Two people are supposed to have been knocked unconscious in an automobile accident and will describe their experiences while under ether. "Over the ether," he adds, with a smug smile.

You lean back in your chair and nod for the young man to go on. It appears that this is all he has on his mind. A script? No, he hasn't written anything but an outline about it. Hasn't the network got its own writers? He's just an "idea man." One of his ideas was to have the ushers walk up and down the aisles, wafting a mild odor of ether over the studio audience with spray-guns.

Outside it was a pleasant, sunny day. The young man shows no inclination to leave. You remember Blatherskit and what a good friend of yours he used

with a pack transmitter, broadcasting his dying reactions as he fell, if the network would agree to give his widow and children \$1,000.

It's all a constant parade of amazing suggestions which, if an index to the range of the human mind, often depresses program men to the point of indigestion.

Pretend, if you will, that you're a program-director. It is a pleasant, sunny day. Your secretary says there is a young man outside to see you with a letter of introduction from Mr. Blatherskit. Blatherskit is a pretty good friend of yours. "Send him in," you tell the girl cheerfully.

The young man comes in. He has a well-scrubbed face that is quite sincere yet, alas, not very intelligent. He carries a leather portfolio and, when he sits down, seems to be having quite a

time. Pretty soon your secretary announces there are some more people with ideas waiting to see you.

But before you guffaw at such inanity, consider that there's another angle to the matter. Like those remarkable things which women wear on their heads, radio programs also have great fluctuations in fashion. Suggestions which were laughed to scorn five years ago by reputedly far-sighted men today are among the most popular features of the airwaves.

The blame is probably not all with the far-sighted men. Some of it rests in the fact that broadcasting has proved to be unpredictable beyond our nightmares. It can do almost anything except defrost the refrigerator.

Back in 1931, while America was still brushing off its clothes after a mem-

orable tumble in Wall Street, a program mogul at one of the big networks had this to remark—and in print:

"We had a proposal the other day from a man in the dress-goods business that we put on a program, with his assistance, built entirely on the trade jargon of his industry. He said there were thousands who would like to hear such a sketch. Of course they would, but how about the hundreds of thousands to whom such 'entertainment' would be meaningless?"

The crystal ball must have been clouded that day. Otherwise he might have foreseen that his very network, some seven or eight years later, would produce a program called "Americans at Work," devoted to the every-day work of trained American experts in many fields of endeavor. The program ranks high today as an educational and popular feature, winner of many awards—in short, a sizable radio success.

The same gentleman of 1931 had quite a few ideas on programming. "Then there are the imitators!" he moaned. "Here again is displayed an amazing lack of understanding of radio's requirements.

"And of course," he added breezily, "it is obvious there is no field for the woman who imitates a little girl or a great actress—why shouldn't it be the little girl at the microphone, or the great actress herself?"

No imitators? What would Major Bowes do? No field for a woman who imitates a little girl? Explain away, then, the success of Fannie Brice and her Baby Snooks. Or—what was even remoter from the gentleman's thoughts in 1931—a man who imitates a little girl, such as Tommy Riggs and his Betty Lou.

If broadcasters had adhered to his early formula, Charlie McCarthy would not be a national hero. And, it is quite logical to add, the network which followed it would not be a national hook-up.

It all goes to show that you just can't tell. And with television gathering a certain amount of sluggish impetus, the vistas opened up for program ideas are frankly terrifying. Probably the soul of radio's success lies in the fact that it's even more unpredictable than the ingenuity of the men who created it.

Maybe the mattress-manufacturer, the snore-fancier and the ether-sprayer all had pretty good ideas after all. Time will tell.

FORECAST

CHRISTMAS on the radio means the airwaves filled with choruses, ringing of bells and special symphonic Christmas programs. This year is no exception, and every day during the holidays brings a special musical treat.

NBC continues its annual tradition of performing "Silent Night" at midnight on Christmas Eve, with Marjorie Lawrence as the soloist. Beloved Geraldine Farrar reads her own poem to a musical accompaniment by Frank Black. The Vatican broadcasts on

Always preferable to a commentator's analysis of a composer's music is the creator's own explanation of what he intended to express and convey. Therefore readers may welcome what Jaromir Weinberger has to say about his "Christmas." (In Prague, Weinberger's home, it became the tradition to perform the work every Christmas Eve over the radio shortly before the President of the Republic made his annual Yuletide address. This custom ended, of course, with the German occupation.)

Weinberger says: "The title page of my score bears these notes: 'From the snow-covered mountains is heard the sound of shepherds' pipes in the night. The tidings have come that in an orchard still under snow an apple tree has suddenly put forth blossoms.'

"An angel appears to the shepherds and announces the birth of the Saviour. They hasten to Him. The village band follows on foot with clarinet, trumpet and bass viol to honor the Holy Child with music."

"(It was at this time that Bohemian music received its gift of honest joy and sincere feeling, a gift that it has never lost.)"

"At the manger appear the three Holy Kings. They kneel before the Sacred Child. Angels descend from heaven to rock the Infant Saviour to sleep. Children run in to bring the little Child Jesus a cuckoo, and He sits up and calls lovingly to them."

"There is great joy at the birth of the Saviour and there sounds forth jubilantly "Glory to God in the Highest, and on earth peace and good-will to men.""

EDWARD JOHNSON and I sat opposite each other at a little table in one section of a second-tier box at the Metropolitan Opera House last Saturday afternoon. The other section, screened from our view, held NBC broadcasting apparatus and controls, the operators, and Milton Cross, the ace announcer.

In front of the managing director of the Metropolitan and myself were NBC microphones and some sheets of type-written paper. We could hear the music from the stage, part of the performance of "Boris Godunoff." Pinza was singing the title role.

"Sounds great," I said.

"Pinza is a most remarkable artist," commented Johnson; "he gets better and better with every appearance, even though no improvement seems possible over his previous work."

"All great singers study incessantly," I continued. "I remember that the late Caruso once told me—"

What he told me remained unrevealed at that moment, for a young man stationed near us waved his hand at me, as a signal, and I began to read:

"Thank you, Mr. Cross . . . Mr. Johnson, there is no fitter time or place than this for me to carry out the commission that brings me here this afternoon, through the courtesy of the National Broadcasting Company and of the Metropolitan Opera Association.

noted demi-mondaine, living a luxurious, reckless, and none too particular life in the French capital, gives a supper party to the "café set" of those days. Romantic Alfred Germont is a guest, and becomes enamored of the beautiful young hostess. Naively he questions her about herself, she is touched by his deep interest and pity, and her heart goes out to him. She agrees to give up her light career and devote herself to him alone.

They move to the country and are ideally happy until Alfred (Alfredo is his name in the opera) learns that Vio-

"LA TRAVIATA" is the Italian for "The Castaway," but the libretto has nothing to do with the sea. The story Verdi set to music was that of Dumas' (the younger) drama, "La Dame aux Camellias" (The Lady of the Camellias), best known and best wept over in America under the name of "Camille."

Francesco M. Piave adapted the romantic-tragic play for opera use, and Verdi furnished a brilliant score, including some of his loveliest and most popular airs. Venice saw the successful premiere in 1853.

For some reason Piave redated the story, for while Dumas' tale covers a period of Parisian life in the first half of the nineteenth century, the original Italian libretto took it back to the days of Louis XIV. However, at the Metropolitan the Dumas era is featured and the costumes are of the Second Empire. By the way, Dumas' play had its first production in 1852, at Paris (the year Napoleon III became Emperor). It will be seen, therefore, that Verdi possessed keen theatrical instinct and was a sharp opportunist, for twelve months after "La Dame aux Camellias" first triumphed in the theater it made its appearance as a Verdi opera.

Violetta (Camille), the heroine, a

letta has secretly been selling her belongings in order to maintain their little home. He rushes off to Paris to secure funds of his own.

Alfredo's father arrives and upbraids Violetta for leading his son into "sinful and extravagant ways." Also he declares that the notoriety of Alfredo is interfering with the contemplated marriage of his sister. The susceptible and noble-minded Violetta renounces Alfredo, writes him a note of farewell, and goes back to her old life in Paris.

Alfredo finds her at a brilliant party and implores her to return to him. She refuses without giving any explanation. Alfredo plays wildly at the gaming-table, wins, and throws the money at Violetta, as "payment in full." His father turns up again, reproaches the son and takes him away.

Violetta, always tuberculous, is fatally ill in the last act. Alfredo, now informed by his father of her sacrifice, visits her repentantly. They pledge eternal love. Her last vows end in death.

The role of Violetta requires ability to sing coloratura and lyric music, as in the "Ah, fors e lui" aria (The One of Whom I Dreamed) at the end of the first act. Nearly every noted soprano has essayed the part.

There is a hymn people used to sing in church. It went "Count your many blessings, name them one by one . . ."

That is what we asked a lot of famous people to do recently. We said, "Brother, count your many blessings and then tell us what American democracy means to you." The answers are too vital and too significant to keep. They come straight from the hearts of people who have visited your parlors and porches for years. There was no editorial doctoring of these reports. Here are America's radio stars and American citizens searching their secret souls.

Hear them speak!

Dave Elman, "Hobby Lobby": "Several years ago I heard about a man who was asked, 'If you were not an American, what would you rather be?' He answered, 'Dead.' My answer would be the same. Anyone who has known the joys of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness in our country and compares his good fortune with people living in other countries must know that our democracy is the only form of government under which Mr. and Mrs. Common Man can be truly happy."

Joe Penner: "When but a boy of eight, I sailed for America with a tag pinned on my coat marked: 'Destination—Detroit, Michigan.' There I joined my parents, who had preceded me. Newsboy, choir-singer, Ford factory

hand, amateur actor, circus clown, burlesquer, vaudevillian, radio actor, picture-player—much water has passed under the bridge since the day my ship came through. As an adopted son of the United States, democracy means to me opportunity. The small share of success that has come to me is due to that opportunity—to the freedom assured every American no matter how humble his origin. Only in a democracy such as ours is such opportunity offered all men. I thank God I am an American."

Fred Allen: "American democracy means to me that as an individual I am permitted to voice my sentiments and enjoy sharing in the direction of governmental activities that have a direct influence on my daily life and welfare. In all other forms of government the individual is relegated to the role of innocent bystander."

Lowell Thomas: "For an American to appreciate what democracy means to him, just let him travel around the world. Let him see the restraints on individualism and personal freedom among the caste-ridden masses of India; the tabu-hoarded, clan-dominated tribes of the South Seas; the militarized goose-steppers of European fascism and communism, and the war-hoarded terrorists of Europe. Then he will say as I say—'American democracy means to me something precious and unique on this earth.'"

Lucille Manners: "To me, American democracy gives an equal chance for everybody, no matter how humble his (or her) beginnings, to realize his ambitions, to see his fondest hopes come true. It means a system that gave me opportunity to make my own dreams come true, and Cinderella stories like mine become actualities every day."

Edward G. Robinson: "In a world burdened with 'isms,' there is only one for me. That 'ism' is Americanism, conceived and founded in the spirit of true democracy. That democracy guarantees

to all, irrespective of race, creed or color, the inalienable rights of free assembly, free speech and free worship. It thus assures us the sacred privilege of living, thinking and acting as free men. Democracy exemplifies the right of man to live as a human being, not as a vassal slave. It is our blessing."

Clifton Fadiman: "I am very old-fashioned. I still think democracy means what it has always meant: equality, as far as possible, of economic opportunity; the assurance of comfortable survival for all; protection against domination by any group or any 'ism.' And as an ideal for humanity—well, you'll find it all better stated in the New Testament. Why not try it sometime?"

Bill Stern: "To me democracy means having a home today and knowing it will still be there tomorrow! It means living in a country where a 'smash hit' crowds theaters instead of air-raid shelters. It means, too, that it's much pleasanter to sit in a stadium describing a football game than to listen to the roar of a cannon, and, lastly, it means that under a democracy we can watch our boys pitch pigskins instead of hand-grenades."

Kate Smith: "For the past few months I've devoted a great deal of time on the air to the subject of Americanism. I've voiced my creed as an American. I've emphasized the privileges and values of democratic government. I've talked about our flag and what it stands for in our lives. Over and over again I've sung Mr. Irving Berlin's stirring patriotic hymn, 'God Bless America.' Now, all these allusions to our country were not an accident. It seemed to me a sacred duty—and still does—to use whatever influence I may have to protect and pay tribute, to that which should be nearest and dearest to all our hearts—our American democracy. Literally hundreds of thousands of letters have come to me from people who feel as I do, yet it amazes me every now and then to hear the singing of

patriotic songs and the upholding of American ideals referred to as 'flag-waving.'

"To those who label patriotism and Americanism as flag-waving, I'd like to say this: I'm not an orator. I'm not a politician, but I'm proud and happy to be known as a flag-waver. I love my country, I honor my flag. I am filled with reverence and gratitude for being so fortunate as to live in a democracy which gives its people freedom. Well, they can call it flag-waving, sentimentality or anything else they care to. As for me, I'm going right ahead saying that America is the most wonderful land on earth. I'm going to continue to do everything in my power to uphold and protect its democratic principles. I'm going to keep on being a flag-waver—a Star Spangled Banner flag-waver, now and always!"

Walter Damrosch: "The Bill of Rights expresses more lucidly than I ever could what democracy means to me. Especially Article I, which, in establishing a free speech, press and religion inferentially prohibits any single-minded tyrant from telling Americans what type of music can or cannot be heard and whether a composer's work is 'playable' or 'verboten.'"

Carlton E. Morse: "I was a guest of Mother and Father Barbour in their Sea Cliff home the other evening. I found family continuity; I found home life in full bloom. Paul was home to dinner and not flying a plane in enemy territory on the Western Front. Hazel and the children were over for dinner and they weren't required to bring their gas-masks with them. In fact, except for pictures, the Barbours hardly knew what a gas-mask looked like. And they've never been in a bombproof shelter nor heard the distant thunder of enemy guns, nor the angry snarl of an enemy plane. The Barbours worship as they see fit and speak their mind without fear or reservation. And when they bow their heads in thanks it is with the comforting thought of the

years of peace and plenty ahead. The same comforting thought that is in the minds of the millions and millions of other American families. These are just a few of the reasons why I am thankful I am a citizen of a great and good democracy in this year of our Lord 1939."

H. R. Baukhage: "Back from war in regimented, censorship-gagged Europe, the American brand of democracy looks pretty good. Freedom to move about as one pleases, freedom to say and to print the truth—all of these are unknown in Europe today. To me, real democracy means mixing enough responsibility with our freedom so there will be plenty of liberty to go around. P. S. There isn't any democracy in war."

Benny Goodman: "Democracy has a very important meaning as far as I am concerned. It gives me the right to find the finest talent for my orchestra regardless of creed or color; it means that I can have Lionel Hampton, Fletcher Henderson and Charlie Christians, three outstanding Negro musicians, working beside men like Toots Mondello, Artie Bernstein, Ziggy Elman, Nick Fatool, Red Ballard and all the other boys in my band. Democracy means equal rights for artists and musicians without concern for nationality, religion or any other of the forms of discrimination which act only to lower the standards of art and music wherever they appear."

Gabriel Heatter: "What does American democracy mean to me? It means a way of life that makes life worth while. It means I'm free to dream and, if I'm willing to work hard enough for it, to make my dreams come true. It means I am free to climb as high as my heart will carry me and there is no one to ask: Who was your father? What was his faith? Where was he born?"

"It means that I can go to my boy or girl and say: You live under a government of laws and those laws will protect you from any who preach hate or persecution. It means tolerance and hope and courage in a world in which millions pray for tolerance, in which

millions grope for hope and courage. Above all, it means that I am free to reach out to God and possess that most priceless of all jewels—the jewel of faith.

"The lamps grow dim nearly everywhere. Men surrender or men are forced to surrender their liberties, their faith. American democracy means that we who are lucky enough to live under it will never be called upon to surrender it. And having it, we shall be free. To be free is to live. To be free no longer is to know only the living death."

George Jessel: "'All men were created free and equal.' This implies a freedom for the individual that is possible only in a democracy such as ours. I was born here and so were my parents and grandparents. We have been able to smile at all times, and because of that, democracy means to me that a sphere of happiness is completely possible to us, a sphere whose only boundaries are our own personal, intellectual and physical abilities."

Ted Malone: "This is a land where the visions and dreams of a people are not regimented by a few; where the miracle of the mind finds life a great adventure bounded only by its own capacity; where the glad song of work is echoed in a poetry of peace."

Burgess Meredith: "In general, a democracy doesn't talk about itself much, and the people in a democracy don't praise it excessively. For a long time it has been taken for granted—perhaps for too long, since men have died for it. Possibly the reason that there is so little flag-waving is that democracy leaves us so free as individuals that we forget we are confined by a government. Our government serves us and we become used to it and are apt to pay it as little attention as a good servant. But in times like these, the advantages of living in a democracy are brought strongly to our minds and we can pause for a little bit of gratitude and even flag-waving and chest-beating for the form of government under which we are still able to live."

GLOOMY GLENN LEARNS *to* GRIN

Shy, retiring Mr. Miller hits the jitterbug crowd and hits it hard

RIDING high on the hepcat horizon these days is a new contender for the Throne of Swing.

That contender is Glenn Miller. People who are familiar with only the more widely ballyhooed of dance-band statistics know that Glenn Miller runs the hottest thing in swing bands today. They have watched him edge quietly up to Benny Goodman himself in the popularity polls. They have seen him outstrip high-flying Artie Shaw in New York, where Miller's take for a week at the Paramount Theater was \$56,000 to Shaw's \$30,000 for the same days at the Strand. Perhaps they are also aware that he will step into Paul Whiteman's shoes on this Wednesday's (December 27) Chesterfield dance broadcast.

The fan magazines will tell these people how Glenn Miller—brilliant, young, unknown—sky-rocketed to jitterbug favor by some art of black magic. At least with a rabbit's-foot in his vest-pocket. Actually, the story is quite different.

For twelve years, almost a lifetime in his business, Glenn Miller has knocked about in the big-time band world. Fresh out of the University of Colorado, whither his not-too-affluent parents had sent him, this gangling youth's main asset was an extra special way with a trombone. At first his father, a carpenter, had reluctantly watched the boy wrap himself up in a horn, but when he earned his way at college by tooting it for campus dances, Mr. Miller saw the light. When Glenn left school he was good enough to rate a berth in Ben Pollack's orchestra. Those were the days when Ben had Gene Krupa, Benny Goodman and the brothers Dorsey.

Though he has played in many bands and organized at least one besides his own, Glenn has never since left the ranks of virtuoso popular music-makers.

Even during the years before swing meant anything more to American youth than a rope hanging from the backyard apple tree, Glenn was privately swinging out on his trombone. Bix Beiderbecke, then pioneering swing arrangements for recordings, hired him on hearing. The Dorseys, Red Nichols, and almost all the name bands used him for recording dates. Thus he reached and stayed at the pinnacle of free-lance success.

Long-legged, bespectacled, he sat under Ben Pollack, Tommy Dorsey, Andre Kostelanetz. Few dancers knew that it was the quiet trombonist who had devised this tricky combination of instruments or that little freak twist of arranging which add up to make a bandleader's style. Hard work behind the scenes then are the sure foundations of his success at arranging today.

Influential as he was as rank-and-file

bandsman, however, Miller's real chance at originality popped up when Ray Noble, droll Britisher of the Burns and Allen show, came to America several years ago, leaving his orchestra behind because of United States labor laws. Noble needed a man to organize and manage his new band. He hired Miller to do the job, and his immediate success as a network orchestra was built on Miller ideas of style and band construction.

So when Glenn decided, after a lot more deliberation than most bright young men, to start his own band, its success was a foregone conclusion. That is, to wiseacres who knew him for a real musician's musician. In addition to brilliant success as arranger and organizer of bands, he was already a song-writer. His "Moonlight Serenade," for which Mitchell Parish, famous for "Deep Purple" and "Stardust," later wrote lyrics, and which sold 30,000 copies before it was even released for use by other bands, was once a trombone exercise thought up for practise hours. Here was a triple-strength front—writer, arranger, virtuoso rolled into one—with which to hit American dance fans. A foregone conclusion, yes, but with one question mark. Was his personality right for band-leading? That was soon to be proved.

While Dame Fortune had thus been treating Miller quite decently in his profession, she had also played ball with him in other ways. Seven years ago he married Helen Burger, a college sweetheart. Mutual distaste for a history course at Colorado may have been responsible for their meeting. More likely, it was the prosaic but charming story of boy meeting girl. Helen doesn't take to the road with her husband, is content to stay in their Hotel Pennsylvania suite in New York. That is, since Glenn has turned maestro.

AND Glenn has been a maestro for a few weeks more than a year. That explains the "rapid rise" and "fame and fortune" patter which has been applied to him in some quarters. Here is what really happened.

Like other top arrangers, Miller saw his ideas misinterpreted and emasculated by other bands and bandleaders. "I was just tired of being pounded at," he explained. "I was tired of arguing about arrangements, of hearing things come out entirely different from the way I wrote them. I wanted to actually hear my ideas and I figured the only way I could was with my own band."

Turning down a \$350-a-week job with Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, he began to recruit men—he knew the kind he wanted—all through the country. Because he couldn't afford top virtuosos

from the big bands, and didn't want them anyway—virtuosos spend most of the time promoting themselves—he toured one-night stands, listening for talent. Almost every man he contracted was from some hinterland spot.

After a quiet opening at Boston's State Ballroom in September, 1938, a few college dates and months of shaping up, he hit New York at Broadway's Paradise Restaurant. Network wires from the Paradise got him a wider hearing. A four-week engagement at Meadowbrook lengthened into twelve weeks. And then a summer date at famous Glen Island Casino. By now he had jarred New York dancing crowds to their molars. Summer attendance records at Glen Island were shattered. NBC broadcasts several times weekly spread the Miller rage everywhere.

Obviously the next step was bagging a big commercial air show. That step will be taken as Glenn Miller succeeds Jazz King Paul Whiteman for Chesterfield. Go back twelve months and this story sounds like a Sindbad tale. Go back twelve years and it is the inevitable which has happened. Unusual talent plus far-sighted, cautious planning plus a love for one's craft could add up to no other result. A foregone conclusion, did we say? Except for the personality question.

A year ago Glenn Miller was a serious lad whom friend and occasional foe alike loved to call "Gloomy Glenn," "The Great White Father," or more pungently, "Glum Glenn." His appearance wasn't a big help, either. Simple utilitarian glasses and an earnest expression gave him a professorial mien

which contrasted strangely with a ballroom atmosphere. A few months under the public's exacting eye, however, were enough to break down whatever excess reserve he may have had. Dance fans who meet him now find him a smiling, casually genial person who likes people and likes to give people what they like. He likes jitterbugs.

"Why should anybody have anything against them?" he asks. "They may not be music critics but they've obviously got a feel for rhythm. So what if they are demonstrative?"

Miller's close friends are all in the music business, directly or indirectly. Tommy Dorsey, George Simon of *Metronome*, Chummy MacGregor, his own pianist, and Claude Thornhill, pianist, are among them. Dorsey is a friendly enemy—but mostly friendly—of old. When he organized his band several years ago, Miller helped him pick his men. Later, Dorsey returned the favor. Each thinks the other tops.

Today Glenn Miller has two all-consuming interests. They are the same interests which he had years ago when he tooted his horn on the Boulder (Colorado) campus—his wife, Helen, and his job, music. His music is shaking America. And though he has neither children nor permanent home, he has Helen and "Pops Haggerty"—Boston Bull supreme. What more can a trombone-tooter ask?

HOW TO LISTEN TO NEWFOUNDLAND

SHORT-WAVE broadcasts can now be heard daily except Sunday from the Island of Newfoundland, one of Great Britain's oldest colonies, a famed fishing and vacation spot lying east of Canada and forming the furthestmost tip of the North American continent.

The Broadcasting Corporation of Newfoundland, which first commenced its services in March of this year, operates two transmitters at Mount Pearl, while the programs actually originate from studios on the top floor of the Newfoundland Hotel in near-by St. John's. VONF, a 10,000-watt transmitter, operates on a broadcast frequency of 640 kilocycles. Its programs are relayed by short-wave station VONG, which, notwithstanding its low power of 300 watts, is heard consistently throughout eastern North America and, when conditions are good, throughout the United States and Canada. VONF broadcasts daily except Sun-

day on 9.48 megs, at the low-frequency side of the 31-meter band, about half-way between COCH (9.44), Havana, Cuba, and GSB (9.51), London, from 7:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. CST and on either 9.48 or 5.97 megs, on the low-frequency side of the 49-meter band, from 3:30 to 8:30 p.m. CST.

Chimes similar to those employed by NBC may be heard on VONG's programs each half-hour. In addition, the station can be easily identified during its regular relays of the English news broadcasts from London, at 12 noon and 6:30 p.m. CST.

The station's officials welcome reception reports and these should be addressed to A. N. House, Broadcasting Corporation of Newfoundland, P. O. Box E5372, St. John's, Newfoundland. Correct reports will be verified with a neat white QSL card bearing an outline map of Newfoundland and the station call-letters in blue.

FINLAND: Finland is not an easy country to receive even during peace times when its two short-wave transmitters are operating on regular schedules. Reception conditions have been so poor for the past few days that it is impossible to state definitely whether or not the Finnish short-wave station is still on the air; however, the Lahti transmitters operate normally as follows: over OFE (11.78), from 12:05 to 11:05 a.m. CST; over OFD (9.50), from 11:15 a.m. to 4 p.m. CST; over OIE (15.19), from 12:05 to 3 a.m. and from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. CST; and over OIH (17.80), from 3 to 8 a.m. CST, and over OII (21.55),

irregularly. By watching these various channels you may be fortunate enough to hear news direct from Helsinki, the capital of the besieged state. I don't know whether the 100,000-watt short-wave transmitter, ordered by the Finnish government for use in connection with the 1940 Olympic Games, has been completed at the British Marconi Works or not, but Finland needs this station so badly at present that it seems logical to assume if such is humanly possible it will be rushed to completion so the true story of Finland's courageous struggle against almost overwhelming odds may be told to the entire world.

Report on "Guest Star" Poll

The tabulation of ballots on the "Guest Star" question submitted in this department for listeners to vote on reveals the following results:

"There are too many big-name guest stars on regular programs"—67%.

"The guest-star situation is all right as it is"—33%.

"Guest stars cause me to buy more of the sponsor's product"—No, 74%; yes, 15%; non-committal, 11%.

Most frequently voiced remarks were: Guests are all right in moderation if they actually have something outstanding to contribute, but are a bane if they appear only for name-value without doing anything of outstanding entertainment value; money spent on guest stars should be diverted to the pocketbooks of talented radio aspirants needing only a break to succeed; the part on a show of the guests too often consists merely of shallow chatter about their life or their work in the movies; there is too much mutual back-slapping between master of ceremonies and guest; great musicians are highly desirable as guest performers; guest celebrities are desirable in programs which are built entirely upon that principle—programs such as "George Jessel's Celebrity Program" and "Pursuit of Happiness"—also on strictly dramatic shows.

And many of them will also agree that "Pleasure Time," his present air show (heard over NBC, Mondays through Fridays, twice nightly over different hook-ups) is the "shortest fifteen minutes in radio." Yet if you were at New York's Vanderbilt Theater—a

member of his studio audience—the popular bandleader would greet you with the perfectly nasty scowl he assumes above. And you'd laugh. It's a streamlined ice-breaking stunt which Fred uses a moment before he goes on the air with: "Hello, everybody . . . Thanks for coming . . . This is Fred Waring and over half a hundred Pennsylvanians . . ." And after that—well, let Radio Guide introduce you to the whole gang of Waring's Pennsylvanians.

THERE'S the very deuce to pay on "Club Matinee" these days with its joint emcees—Ransom Sherman and Garry Morfit—engaged in a bitter verbal battle over who is the rightful manager of baritone Johnnie Johnston. Confidentially, Johnnie has signed contracts with both of the boys, and while they battle back and forth over who will take the first managerial cut out of his weekly pay-check, the only loser in the battle thus far has been Johnnie. Both Morfit and Sherman seem equally capable when it comes to exchanging verbal punches and so far the fight's a draw. Of course it's all in fun, and if you have any doubts as to just how much fun it really is, be sure to listen to "Club Matinee" (NBC, Monday through Friday, 4 p.m. EST; 3 CST; 2 MST; 1 PST) this Thursday when this whole side-splitting, word-splitting battle of phrases and epithets comes to a head. Six months ago the pair decided to split the shows, Morfit taking them on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Sherman now handles the assignment on Thursdays and Fridays. But Sherman, during one of Morfit's days to handle the program, walked in and engaged Garry in a verbal tilt. Morfit reciprocated when it came Sherman's turn to handle the show by walking in and challenging Sherman to a barrel-jumping duel before the whole NBC-Blue network's audience. Now both Morfit and Sherman have sued, the papers to be served this Thursday. Johnnie Johnston, as a climax, threatens to sue them both!

MEET MR. WEEKS



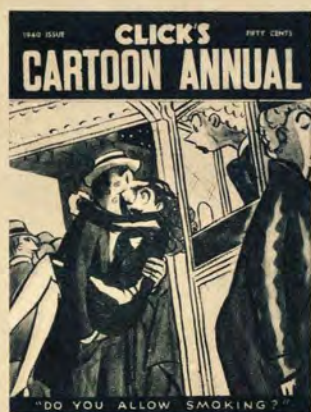

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When you hear his rousing stories of writers, books and literary forgeries, you'll say he's a man to listen to

"MEET Mr. Weeks—"
You hold out your hand reservedly and say "How do you do" in a stiff sort of way, because this is Edward Weeks, editor of *Atlantic Monthly*, one of our uppercrust magazines. You remember that here is the man who occupies the chair once held by James Russell Lowell, William Dean Howells, Thomas Bailey Aldrich, and you naturally expect him to be—well, intellectual and far above the rank and file. (All of this is figurative, of course, because Mr. Weeks is in Boston and you may be in Kansas or California and the meeting is taking place by radio.)

Then he starts talking and his accents aren't nearly as Harvardish as you had expected, and the things he talks about are things you always wanted to know anyway about people who write books—their little quirks of character, how they came to write this or that book. And then, in the next minute, he may be talking about some literary forgery or theft, and he makes it as thrilling as an Ellery Queen mystery story. Again, he strikes at the heart of today's news when he tells what censorship and dictatorship have done to such writers as Thomas Mann, fleeing the wrath of Hitler. He's been talking only a few minutes, but suddenly books and stories and people who have been cold and far away have come magnificently alive and you find you aren't listening to a cold book-review at all. You're going on a real journey of adventure and exploration with a guide who knows his way around. You're finding the human side of literature.

Mr. Weeks was born in Elizabeth, N. J., in 1898. His parents wanted him to be an engineer and sent him to Cornell with that end in view, but somehow building bridges didn't appeal to the youth who became more interested in stringing words together than watching steel girders climb skyward and, at the risk of precipitating a family war, was planning to transfer to the English department when the World War broke out. He left Cornell to drive an ambulance in the French Army, and on eighteen different sectors during the next four years he saw plenty of action, won the Croix de Guerre for distinguished services.

It was his war experiences which were to lead him directly into his present field. His letters home were so warmly descriptive and human that they won high praise from the editor of the *Atlantic Monthly*, who suggested, when Weeks was finally discharged

after the War, that he enter Harvard. Later, this editor aided Weeks in securing a scholarship at Trinity College in Cambridge, England.

After Cambridge, he became a salesman, later an editorial apprentice with the publishing firm of Boni and Live-right, leaving them in 1925 to become assistant editor of the *Atlantic Monthly* Press, the book-publishing division.

It was here that he really came into his own. His was the idea that an editor's job went beyond reading and accepting or rejecting manuscript. He felt that an editor should travel about the country, meet new authors, encourage them to write the sort of books he feels the public will be interested in reading. This he did, and for the next ten years played an important part in American letters. From a pile of rejected manuscripts about to be mailed back to their authors he personally rescued Mazo de la Roche's "Jalna"—later to win a \$10,000 prize and become an international best-seller. Other famous authors he either discovered or aided materially in their climb to fame are Nordhoff and Hall (of "Bounty" fame); James Hilton ("Goodbye, Mr. Chips"), Nora Waln, Harvey Cushing, and Ann Bridge.

He spends much of his time traveling about the country lecturing, but he confesses, "I learn much more from the people who come to hear me than they do from me." He has discovered many new writers on these speaking-trips and they permit him to keep his finger on the public pulse.

On the air, he is informal and chatty and has the knack of making people and characters in literature who have

long been dead live again. He is as timely as your daily newspaper and he makes reading a new and glorious adventure. Typical of the programs he does on this NBC public service series are: "How to Live with an Author," which is the inside story of the wives and family lives of famous writers, living and dead; "Men Against Women," in which, with keen judgment and a sharp humor, he compares the sexes in literature; "The One Book in Every Man," in which he expounds his idea that there is one good book in every person, suggests ways of liberating that book.

In his early forties, Mr. Weeks is a tall, slender fellow with a long, aquiline nose, laughing brown eyes and the common touch. He comes by the common touch naturally, having worked—in earlier years—as a circus pitchman, as a harvest hand in the Kansas wheat-fields, as a dishwasher in a greasy-spoon cafe. He's ridden freight trains and twice worked his way across the Atlantic (ocean) as a seaman on a freighter. That is why, perhaps, he considers Steinbeck's "Grapes of Wrath" an important landmark in American letters. That is why, too, I suggest that if you've been frightened away from this broadcast as something that might be stiff and coldly formal, forget your fears and this Tuesday night meet Mr. Weeks!

never romantic in his love-making.

For instance, do you recall that scene last spring when Patricia, following a session of ardent love-making by John Knight, tried to provoke something of the same fervor in Scoop with the following results:

PATS: Did you notice what a gorgeous spring night it is out tonight?

SCOOP: Yep.

PATS (dreamily): A night like tonight —oooooh, I was standing in the window down in the library tonight,

SCOOP: Um-hum. It makes me sorry I wore my heavy underwear.

PATS: Awwwww, Scoop!

SCOOP: Hunnh?

PATS: I stood there in the window tonight . . . wishing you were with me . . . Wishing I was in your arms . . .

SCOOP: Who was that guy I seen you with? That wasn't me, was it?

PATS: No, this was all before John came. I don't want to talk about him.

Scoop . . .

SCOOP: Hunnh?

PATS: You love me?

SCOOP: Yup. You're the kid.

PATS: Why don't you ever make violent love to me?

SCOOP: Welllll, I'll tell you, my love —sometime I will. I'll build you a rose arbor . . . and hang out a moon and stir up a balay breeze for you.

And then I'll say some right pretty things to yuh. But I'll tell you something, Pats. I'm no good without a rose arbor.

PATS (little laugh): You're such a goop.

SCOOP: But zowie! You should get a load of my ardor once I'm in a arbor!

But Patricia, having had certain of her more vital emotions inhibited or encased in a protective shell because of their association with the painful, unhappy memories she had of John Knight, found Scoop entirely satisfactory. Never one to face reality, Patricia would doubtless have gone on cherishing her dream of Scoop, hoping unconsciously, no doubt, that one day he would be free to marry her. Marriage to anyone else would have been impossible. So here an outsider was brought in (mother's influence again) to make her realize what a chance she was taking on leading a completely futile life if she persisted in holding to her dream of Scoop. And with his mature understanding of Patricia, I believe she has a chance to blossom out into a normal, emotionally adult person, able to face reality, not resorting to the drastic escapes she always has in the past. What's more, John Knight has many things in his make-up which are bound to make their marriage an exciting, adventurous one.

There's much excitement and many surprises in store for Scoop, too. And who can tell? Perhaps eventually Patricia and Scoop will get together again.

It's surprising how much the characters in "Girl Alone" resemble the actors or actresses who portray them. For instance, in real life Pat Murphy has the same engaging buoyancy, the same tongue-in-the-cheek boastfulness, the same ready sense of humor which Scoop Curtis has. In real life Betty Winkler is the same warm, sweet, sympathetic person that Patricia is. She has the very same intense desire for understanding. During the last four years I've watched Betty develop in many of the same ways which Patricia has. Perhaps then it was no mere coincidence that the Betty in real life finally settled down and got married at just about the same time Pat did.

Another member of the cast who's been with us since the very beginning is Joan Winters, who is one of those strikingly beautiful girls whom all men rave about. But she is the same down-to-earth, level-headed, practical person that Alice Warner is. She's completely wrapped up in her home and her husband and her two children.

John Knight is hoping to find beneath the prim, meticulous heiress a real, warm, vital girl capable of giving way wholeheartedly to a passionate love. John must necessarily have Patricia wholeheartedly. Whether he succeeds in finding her makes the problem of their marriage. As Mr. and Mrs. John Knight will Patricia and John achieve the complete happiness of marital life that is the dream of every newly wed couple?
