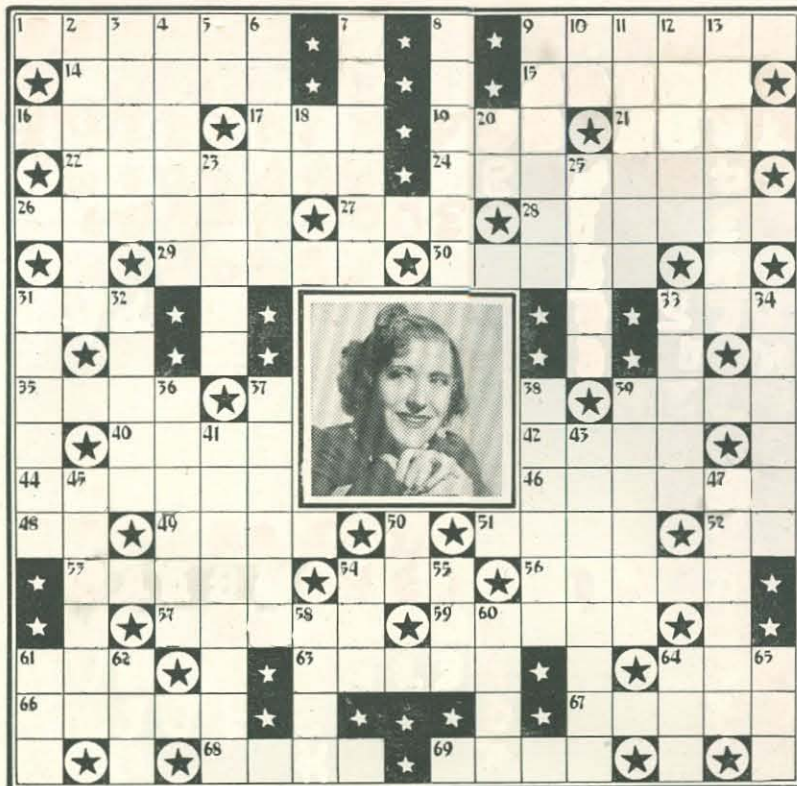

THE GIRL ON THE COVER

SECOND in RADIO GUIDE's new series of serial-star covers is Bess Johnson, whose picture adorns this week's cover. Bess Johnson is heard as the leading lady of "Hilltop House" over CBS Monday through Friday. And Bess Johnson plays Bess Johnson. That was a novelty back in 1937, when she became the star of "Hilltop House," for previously she had done as many as seventeen broadcasts—in the role of actress, announcer or commentator—a week, but in most cases little was done to feature the name Bess Johnson. Listeners remember her as Fran of "Today's Children," but they remember more clearly the voice of Lady Esther, which she presented anonymously. When she was signed to play the



role of matron at "Hilltop House," Glendale orphanage, Miss Johnson was required to give up her Lady Esther series and "Today's Children," in return received a higher salary than any other serial-drama actress in broadcasting. For more than two years now, as Matron Bess, she has been idolized by the children and loved by the community of Glendale, which is almost any small American town. Early in the script a handsome young stranger came along, with whom she fell in love and who has turned out to be the savior of the financially embarrassed orphanage. In real life Bess Johnson is blond, beautiful, the mother of an eleven-year-old daughter, Jane Orr Perry. She entered radio in Chicago in 1930.

Where Are The War Songs?

Radio is one reason you haven't heard any new "Tipperarys" during the current war

IF—AND we voice herewith our fervent prayer that this "if" may never become an actuality—America should go to war tomorrow, the lads in Tin Pan Alley stand ready to do their bit. It may seem an odd commentary on our form of civilization, but it's a proved fact that the fellow who writes martial tunes to fire the blood of marching youth is more potent than the fellow who fires the guns, and you can add to the many strange features of the current war the fact that no striking tune has yet come to light. Tommies and poilus have contented themselves with digging down into the song-bags of the World War I for "Tipperary" and "Madelon." They've even revamped the convivial "Beer Barrel Polka" into a song of death and destruction and shocked Walt Disney by changing the delightful words of the dwarfs' work song (in "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs") to read, "Heigh-ho, heigh-ho, it's off to war we go . . ." Efforts to produce a new song for the war have fallen, somehow, rather flat.

Perhaps the quality of the present war is to blame. After all it's hard to become inspired about tanks and anti-aircraft guns and blockades. A more plausible explanation lies in the fact that Tin Pan Alley, whence flow the world's big song hits, is operating under heavy wraps as far as war is concerned.

When war was declared, many song-writers hailed it as a grand occasion for lyrical outbursts and the music publishers were deluged with a brand-new crop of war songs. A few of them found the printed page—"Lizzie Doesn't Look Good in Her Gas Mask" was typical—only to subsequently find an indifferent public. A strong feeling for the maintenance of our neutrality sprang up and people wisely preferred to watch the events on Europe's battlegrounds coldly, calmly and without the emotional stimulus of music. But the death-blow to efforts of these war-song writers was dealt by radio executives who, in their musical programs as well as in their newscasts, had determined to cooperate closely with the President in maintaining a neutral spirit in the United States.

The National Broadcasting Company, in the first weeks of the war, made its position clear. "NBC, to maintain the proper program balance, will present war songs but will prevent them from getting out of hand." Statements from the other networks were similar.

But if America should go to war tomorrow, the picture would be completely altered, and from what has already happened in Tin Pan Alley it is obvious that the productiveness of 1916-18 would be duplicated. Then, almost overnight, the country was flooded with war songs, songs written for the express purpose of stirring fighting-blood and of keeping the morale of those who wait at home bolstered to a high key. Remember how everyone sang "Over There," "Somewhere in France Is a Lily," "Keep the Home Fires Burning," "I'd Like to See the Kaiser with a Lily in His Hand" and a flock of others. Tin Pan Alley went to town,

and dance-bands, vaudeville and stage stars, anxious to do their bit, sang these songs until everyone knew them by heart. Today, with radio, the popularization of such songs would be a simple matter and, because their life is short in the face of continued repetition, the song-writers would have to work night and day to keep the hopper full. But you'd probably be able to get little else in the way of music until the war had ended. And the odd thing about it all is that, when the war was over, there'd only be one or two numbers worth remembering.

George M. Cohan, author of "Over There," in speaking of this phenomenon, explained it very clearly. "If I hadn't written 'Over There' on Thursday," he said, "someone else would have written it on Friday." In other words, these were songs which were ground out for a purpose—to inspire and to bolster morale. And of all the long roster of songs written to make World War I a pretty thing, "Tipperary," "There's a Long, Long Trail" and the immortal "Hinky Dinky Parley Vous" have outlasted the war. The same is true of other wars. In the Civil War, "Dixie" and "John Brown's Body" (later revamped into the magnificent "Battle Hymn of the Republic") are remembered of the many songs sung by the men in blue and gray.

America's first war song, "Yankee Doodle," still remembered and loved by Americans, was given us by an English army surgeon before the Revolution. As colonists of Great Britain, our forefathers marched with the English redcoats to fight the French and Indians at Frontenac and Niagara. Dr. William Shackford, a surgeon with the English army, in a spirit of fun, rewrote an old English song so that the words slyly poked fun at the uncouth, ununiformed colonials and gave it to them as a popular marching-song. The redcoats laughed up their sleeves as the rude colonists marched with the self-ridiculing words of "Yankee Doodle" on their lips. But the redcoats swallowed whatever laughter they enjoyed at Concord and Valley Forge and Trenton later when these same rude colonials, fighting for their freedom, marched out to vanquish the English with "Yankee Doodle" still on their lips.

Songs like these—songs with such magnificent tradition behind them—are not soon forgotten in times of trouble and war, especially when they happen to be, today, as good martial music as you'll find anywhere.

But Tin Pan Alley stands ready to do its bit by turning out war songs at the drop of a hat, and out of the many melodies which will find their way to the printed sheet and out over the air, some one or two may be remembered when the ink is dried on the next war's armistice. If war does come, let us hope that from the army of melodies that will stream out of Tin Pan Alley there may be one as stirring and inspiring as "Yankee Doodle." But let's not lie awake nights worrying about it. After all, we still have "Yankee Doodle."

TWELVE CROWDED MONTHS

These ten marvels of 1939 broadcasting made them memorable

HISTORY was made in 1939!

Events which will leave their scars upon the face of the earth for generations to come crowded the twelve short months just ended, and every quarter of the globe witnessed stirring, dramatic action. In years past, events in the Orient, in Europe, in England—even as close as Canada and the South American coastline—seemed vague and far away as we read of them in cold print.

In 1939 it was different. History—written largely in blood—came vividly alive for us as we sat in ringside seats for the greatest drama in the world. Radio erased distance with startling ease; radio went wherever things happened, brought us history as it was being written in the words and the voices of men who were making it.

An NBC reporter, microphone in hand, watches the Graf Spee steam slowly out of the harbor at Montevideo to keep its tryst with death. There is an explosion, a split second of speechlessness, and then, almost as it happens, we have the dramatic picture of a naval suicide. German planes soar over Poland dealing sudden death to those below. At the same moment radio is bringing to us Adolf Hitler's impassioned words of explanation from the German Reichstag, his declaration that he is now Germany's "First Soldier" as well as its Chancellor.

Stirring, profound events, all of these. But perhaps the most important thing in the year just past has been radio's

part in making history real for us, radio's part in keeping us the best-informed people in the world. Radio, in 1939, proved its part in American life, proved that it was not a medium of entertainment alone but the most vital force in disseminating information and knowledge that has yet been developed.

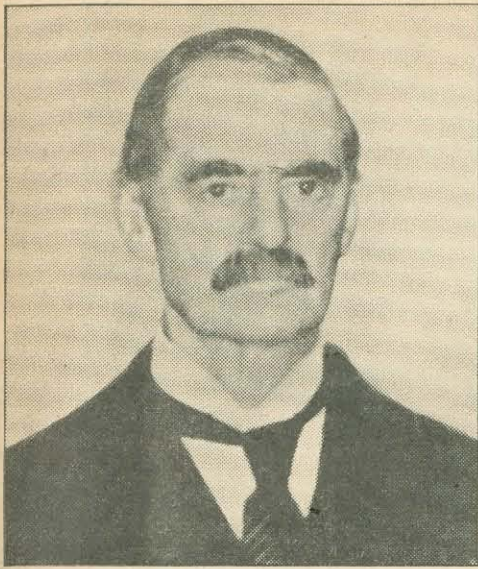
The radio networks have made their selections of the ten biggest broadcasts of the year for you. RADIO GUIDE now makes its selection, and below—and in the dramatic pictures on these pages—relive with us these great moments from the year just ended.

1. Dread of war hung over Europe during all of 1939, and the rumbling of marching men in Europe's streets, crisis after crisis kept radio listeners on edge. Late in August, however, war came when Hitler's legions launched their swift blitzkrieg upon Poland. Newsmen scattered throughout the capitals of the world kept radio listeners aware of the swift-moving flow of events as they occurred.

2. Invasion of Poland meant war. And it was a solemn occasion for Prime Minister Chamberlain—champion of appeasement—when he stood before the English Parliament and declared that there was no alternative—England was at war with Germany! With deep feeling, this idealist—stripped of his ideals and betrayed—invoked force, and American radio listeners heard his every word, his deep pauses, the emotion that underlay his every statement.

3. What would America do? This was the question which burned in every American heart. A few short hours after Chamberlain announced that England was at war, the American best able to answer this question, the President, sat down before a microphone and told Americans that this nation would do everything in its power to stay at peace, that every citizen must do his part by acting neutral, and then thanked God that there was "no blackout of peace in the United States."

4. The President had hardly ceased talking when word of the sinking of the Athenia was flashed to listeners everywhere. The torpedoing of this vessel with Americans on board was perilously similar to the Lusitania sinking which involved us in the last war. Radio kept

its listeners aware of developments, aired the charges and countercharges which governments made, aided us to keep cool and deliberate by keeping us fully informed.

5. One of the greatest forces for peace during the last troubled decade had been Pope Pius XI, now known as the Pope of Peace. News of his death early in February was flashed around the world, and people remembered that he had caused a radio station to be built at the Vatican, had used it to broadcast messages of peace to all peoples. His funeral on February 14 was graphically described for listeners everywhere, and from the balcony of St. Peter's—in the words and voice of the official spokesman—radio listeners heard announcement, later, that Cardinal Pacelli had been elected his successor.

6. On Sunday, February 26, radio listeners were thrilled by the music of Ignace Jan Paderewski, Polish pianist and statesman, who inaugurated his twentieth—and probably last—concert tour of America with a concert on RCA's "Magic Key" program. A few months later listeners who had thrilled to his music heard by radio that the famous pianist had been offered the premiership of Poland's government-in-exile, had refused because of his age.

7. In June, with the world sitting on a powder-keg, a king and a queen of England chose to pay their first visit to American shores. Not since the fugitive Charles II took refuge in Virginia, a colony of Great Britain, had a British monarch made such a trip, and interest in it was wide and enthusiastic. Radio gave a preview of the coverage it was later to muster in covering the war when it brought to listeners the most minute and letter-perfect description of this historic visit, starting from the moment the monarchs landed in Canada until they sailed again for England.

8. In May, disaster struck at home. The U. S. N. submarine *Squalus* failed to come to the surface after a dive at Portsmouth, N. H. Radio flashed the first horrible news to the world, stood by to give later news as it developed. But radio played a more important part. Radio speeded word of the tragedy along, organized the rescue work, sent rescue ships speeding to the scene.

9. In the world of radio entertainment Rudy Vallee is known not only as a dependable and sterling performer and musician but as a pioneer who has done as much as anyone to make radio the entertainment medium it is today. On September 28, 1939, Rudy Vallee announced that he was going to take a rest after years of working to entertain radio listeners. In a brief, heart-warming farewell, Rudy—who had been with a single sponsor for ten years—said good-by to his public, a public which will long remember him for the gifts he has brought them not alone in his own shows but in the many performers now on the air whom he discovered.

10. As the year drew near its end with the tragic red side of the ledger already overcrowded, the mighty Russian army invaded tiny Finland. Here was tragedy of the first order—Finland, a stronghold of western democracy, honorable in her dealings with the world, attacked, upon no provocation, by what was believed to be the world's mightiest army. But the tragedy proved to be one for the Russian army as well as for the civil population of Finland, bombed and driven from their homes at the Christmas season. The little Finnish army proved itself more than able to take care of itself. Step by step, events leading to this invasion were covered by radio, and when war came, developments were brought, as they occurred, to listeners by eye-witnesses and reporters in Finland.

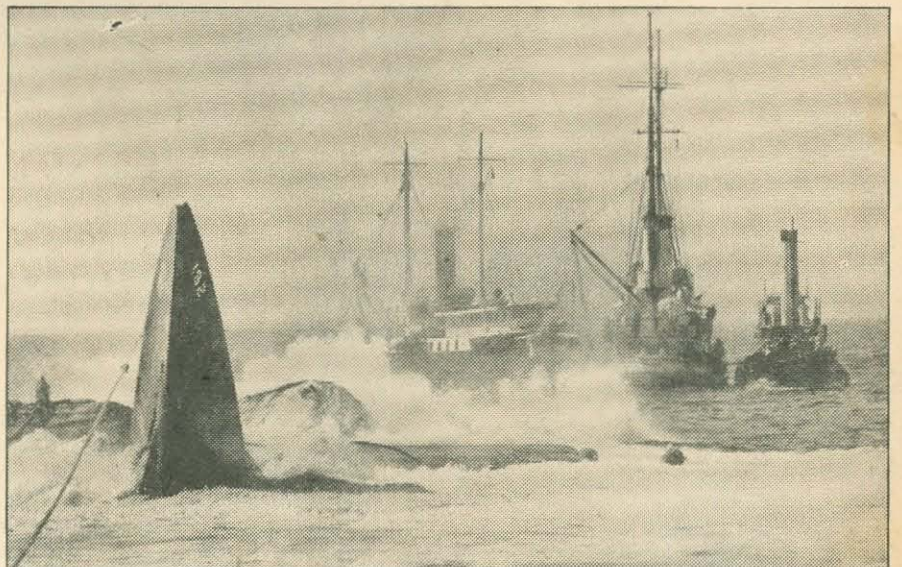
THUS the year 1939 ended—an eventful year for the world, crammed full of excitement and thrills and drama for radio listeners who watched this industry, a scant decade in age, prove its worth not only as a means of family entertainment but as a medium for making modern history come thrillingly alive, for mirroring the world as it is for people who live today.

The year 1940 promises even more important events, and now, as the new year starts, let's resolve to know more about the world in which we live, to enjoy more fully the good things which are available to us, to use our radios more and more, that the lamps which have been going out all over Europe will stay brilliantly alight here in America.

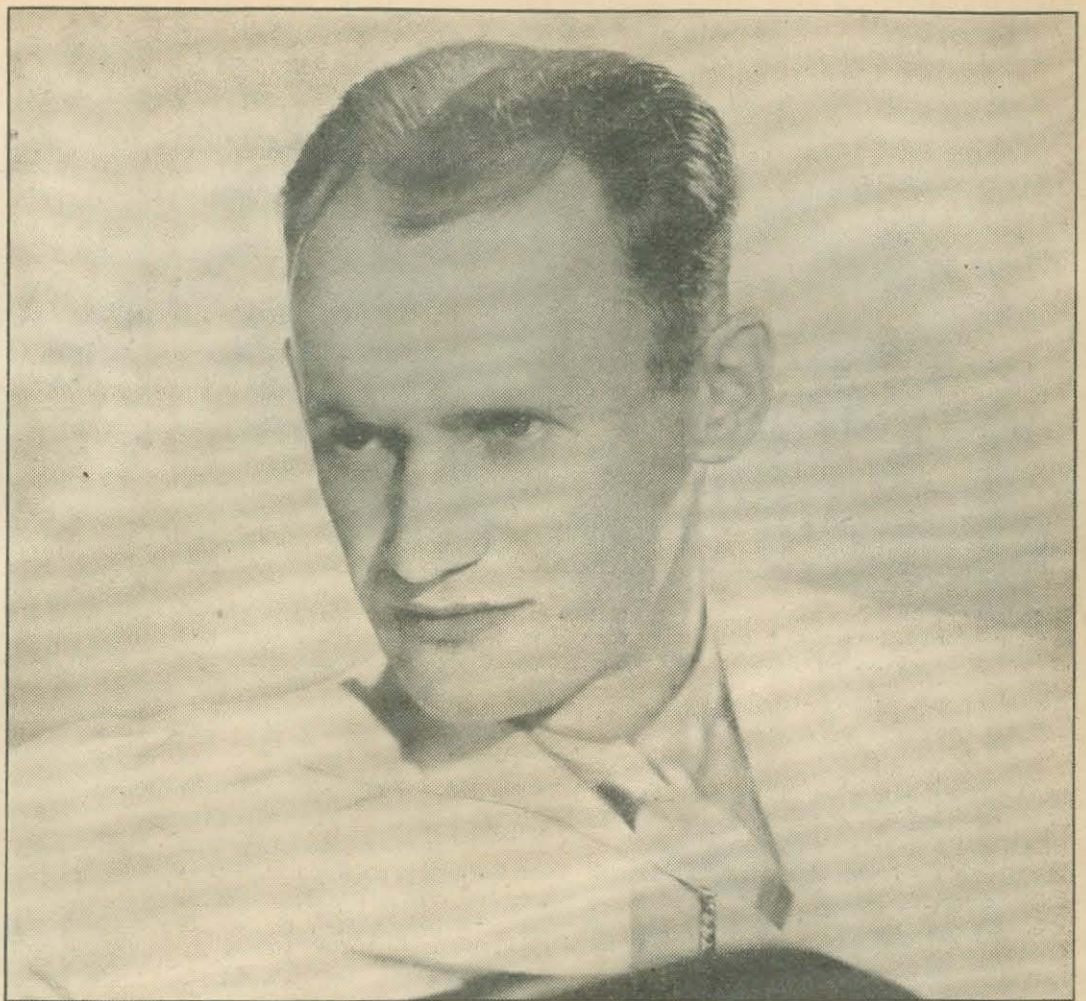

If you are familiar with your radio schedules, you'll know that this means Miller will be competing with Bob Hope, Kay Kyser and Bing Crosby, respectively, which couldn't, in this reporter's opinion, be any tougher competition . . . Walter Winchell's flashes will come from Florida for the next few weeks . . . For the past few days Kate Smith's noonday chats have been coming from Lake Placid in upstate New York, where the "Songbird of the North" has gone to take in the winter sports.

"We, the People" will be made into a feature movie within the next few months . . . Ted Husing, ace CBS sports reporter, has written the article on golf in the 1940 edition of the Encyclopedia Britannica . . . Milton Berle's book, "Laughingly Yours," has sold so well that he is working on a new book to be titled, "Comedians Don't Laugh." Upon investigation I learned that this is Jane and Goodman Ace's way of giving a few actors and actresses who need it a chance to make some money to buy Christmas presents, for which a doff of the hat to a pair of Aces who are as Straight as they come and nicer than many a Full House of four-FLUSHers in Radio Row.

Behind the Scene

There were two extra cops outside studios 3A at NBC last Friday night to clear the way for George Jessel's guests on his Celebrity program, which included some of the best-known stars of the vaudeville stage, musical comedy and cinema—when you and I were young, Maggie. Francis X. Bushman, the Robert Taylor of yesteryear and our mothers' favorite, was one of them. Eddie Leonard, the greatest minstrel man of all time, Blanche Ring, Elsie Janis, Ann Pennington and others. It was a grand idea to get these old-time favorites together on one program and it should be repeated. Jessel showed us a letter he received from a listener who wanted to get on his program, because he claims that he has hit more teachers in his school with spitballs without being caught than anybody else in the whole school. I suggested to George that he turn the letter over to the "Hobby Lobby" program.

Allen vs. Berle—the Battle of Wits

That loud noise you heard outside of studio H last Wednesday afternoon was Fred Allen arguing with Milton Berle. It seems that Fred claims Berle's "Confucius" gag the other Saturday night was originally his own—about an "announcer who try to be good joke man usually end up good humor man!" "And when I told him it took me a day to think that up," said Fred, "he an-

swered, 'It's stale enough to have taken you a century!' So when I asked him why he used it if it was so bad, he answers again, 'Just for contrast to my own good jokes!'" Fred added in parting, "Just goes to show that you can't trust a comedian," and we heard Portland reply, "Why, I trust YOU, Fred!"

Phil Spitalny's female musicians threw a party for their maestro the Saturday night before Christmas. The party was paid for by a "fine box," to which the girls have contributed during the year. The girls, among themselves, decided to impose fines every time they were late for rehearsals. Believe it or not, they raised \$270 in this manner. For the first time in four years Spitalny himself arrived late and they fined him \$25, which was the amount they were short to pay the bills for the party.

In the Studios

For the tenth year in a row, Nila Mack, director of CBS children's programs, threw a Christmas party for the "Let's Pretend" cast immediately after their broadcast of December 23. Those in attendance, whose ages ranged from seven to seventeen, were all given presents and a good time was had by all . . . The only female worker in the Sky Blazers studio, strangely enough, is the sound-effects woman, Miss Ora Nicolls. While the hefty actors stand before the mike reciting their lines, Ora, a petite miss barely over five feet, fires guns, splashes through pails of water and simulates the sound of airplane engines.

In New York, Detroit and Chicago all went along fine; but in Toledo every single one of the sponsor's "cop" drivers was pulled in by the real police for impersonating officers of the law. They were released when the sponsor promised to replace their brass buttons with black buttons so that they look a little less like Toledo's cops. Everybody's happy now about the affair—but still, we're told, a lot of Toledo citizens wonder why cops are going around driving bread-trucks. Apparently the black buttons aren't very effective.

After a recent "Information, Please," the Board of Experts adjourned to the Algonquin Hotel (famed for literary gatherings), threw a party for Oscar Levant and his bride, June Gale. It was supposed to be a great secret, but we met someone who sat at a near-by table. Know how Kieran, Adams and Levant passed the time (also Fadiman)? You've guessed it—they played "Information, Please"! . . . And you surely noticed how silent Walter Pitkin "Life Begins at Forty" was during the broadcast? Well, seems that when he agreed to guest on the NBC program he forgot to tell anyone that he was pretty hard of hearing, and everyone in the studio wondered why he sat with hand cupped over ear, head cocked in Fadiman's direction. It was just that he was trying to hear the emcee's words; he did just about once and answered that question. Next time, before inviting someone to guest for them, the Board intends to ask them about their hearing ability.

HOLLYWOOD.—Gene Autry, young America's favorite celluloid cowboy, returns to radio, the first medium of his expression, on Sunday, January 7, when "Gene Autry's Ranch" becomes a regular weekly program of the Wrigley gum company. Cowboy Gene's musical western broadcast will replace the "Gateway to Hollywood" screen-talent-quest series at the same time over CBS but with an added number of stations. It was via radio in Texas, Oklahoma and Chicago (WLS) that Autry first bid for fame as "Oklahoma's Yodeling Cowboy." And it was in Chicago that this writer first met the wholesome, popular appeal of this plain-voiced, straight-singing youngster with blue eyes and fair complexion and recognized a certain simple something in Autry's character that betided fame and fortune. That something clicked on the screen, too, via Republic Pictures, and now radio reclaims its hostage. The new series does not mean that Autry will quit the screen, however, but merely that he will broadcast weekly, too.

Off Live Mikes

Charles Boyer has returned to the Wednesday NBC Woodbury Playhouse for a cycle of plays, and meantime Gale Page and Jim Ameche will vacation . . . Although a half-dozen sponsors are bidding for Don Ameche's services as star of various proposed dramatic programs, he has accepted none yet. Don, by the way, brought son Donnie to meet Charlie McCarthy at the studios Christmas week-end. First, Donnie was introduced to Edgar Bergen, "whose work you know," added papa Ameche.

Donnie said "No." The same business was duplicated with Donnie's introduction to McCarthy, and Donnie again said, "I never heard of him." Edgar Bergen suspects that Ameche Junior was coached in a special act!

Wooden-headed McCarthy is snootier than ever now that he headed the New Year's Day Tournament of Roses parade bedecked in a special all-white evening suit and top-hat. But he didn't snare all the radio glory, for Baby Snooks (Fannie Brice) rode her own float, too . . . Andy Devine, the microphone rasper, will be missing from this scene and the Jell-O show for eight weeks while he appears in person; his first eastern date is January 12 in Indianapolis, home town of Jan Garber and your reporter. So the movies draw on radio for acting and writing talent. Latest signed is Arch Oboler, who will pen Joan Crawford's next M-G-M screen play, "The Woman's Face." Orson Welles ordered all his cast to remove their beards and mustachios before Christmas—not to avoid being mistaken for Santa but to rehearse a new film, "The Smiler with a Knife," which he'll shoot smooth-shaven while awaiting completion of sets for "Heart of Darkness." New assignment will keep Welles here until October.

Backstage on a Pass

Shirley Temple's radio bow Christmas Eve on "Screen Guild Theater" was not without misgivings for the

young lady. She was worried. It seems that Darryl Zanuck was to introduce her, but at the last minute mother Gertrude Temple was substituted. Whereupon Shirley remarked, "I'll just bet Mama steals the show!"

After ten years, it almost happened. Freeman Gosden, Andy's Amos, was atop the CBS building taking candid-camera pictures of the holiday merry-makers below. Came nearly time for his broadcast and he discovered he was locked on the roof! He was rescued finally after a passer-by had reported to CBS: "There's a man on your roof who is acting crazy and he looks as if he's going to jump."

Happiest couple in town were parents of "Silver Theater" maestro Felix Mills, who dedicated his music December 24 to them; it was their sixtieth anniversary and they were honored guests of the broadcast . . . Eddie Robinson was given a desk set and smoking equipment on his birthday by his "Big Town" cast. "Big Town" will move to New York for two weeks on January 9 or January 16.

Helen Wood, of "Those We Love," no longer counts Dr. Alfred Huenagardt among those she loves . . . WHAT'S HAPPENING TO THE CHURCH?

Radio parson Frederick Stamm
preaches to the church—ailing
because it deserted the people



Why shouldn't churches be more inviting, more comfortable—why should they not be built and designed in a way to entice attendance? Rev. Dr. Frederick Stamm wants to know

THE religious men and women of America have written 250,000 letters saying without any mincing of words exactly why they do not go to church. They have addressed their letters to a preacher—a man whose pulpit is a microphone, whose congregation is scattered unseen through the forty-eight states.

The preacher is the Rev. Dr. Frederick Stamm, of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, and he is a man with two swinging fists and a tongue like Jeremiah's, who spares neither the backsliding church-goer nor the fusty parsons who cannot hold their flocks.

Here are the reasons men and women in the towns and in the rural districts are staying away from churches, according to Dr. Stamm:

The preaching is dull. It puts the congregation to sleep. "Why," writes one listener, a farmer, "should I drive ten miles to suffer or sleep?"

The preachers spend too much time hammering away at trivialities. They attack baseball-playing on Sunday. They crusade against smoking and drinking and dancing. And when they have finished they have given their flocks nothing of Christianity, nothing of "that old-time religion."

Too many churches cultivate class prejudices. They cater only to certain so-called upper classes, turning up their ecclesiastical noses at the laborer, the foreigner.

Denominational differences, none of which are important, split communities, making each individual church, especially in small communities, so poor that the pastors are obliged to spend all their time fighting the wolf away from the door.

Finally, there is no true call to repentance, thinks Dr. Stamm. No thundering from the pulpits on the sinners, which exist today as real as they have ever existed. Men like Harry Emerson Fosdick are doing it. And here and there throughout the land, men of the cloth are lambasting the immoral and spiritless.

These are a few of the reasons Dr. Stamm has culled from his package of mail and from his own observations, drawn from hundreds of thousands of miles of travel from town to town throughout the land, reasons why the American people are abandoning the churches.

When a preacher says to him, "The people are deserting the church, what can we do?" He replies, "The church is deserting the people, what can you do?"

The falling off in church attendance these past ten years is a matter of record. Anyone with half an eye can not have failed to observe the slackening of interest. According to Dr. Stamm, there is not a Protestant denomination in America which can point to a Sunday attendance in church of more than one-third of its membership. In other words, sixty percent of the church members of America are not going to church.

In rural America the situation is worse. Rural churches are passing out of existence at the rate of one thousand a year. They are being turned into garages, into bars and night-clubs. They are being burned for kindling. The situation is serious.

Dr. Stamm implores all communities that are overchurched to join together in a united church.

"Let them have a resident minister," he says. "And a united church can afford a good one. Let them forget their petty differences in ritual and government. Let them put up a community house where young people can gather, where they can play, where they can cultivate initiative. And let no one call the young people bad because they use the community house, under proper supervision, for dancing, card-playing and theatricals."

He points out that he was raised in a village and preached in a village, and that he gets many more letters from country people than from city people. He finds that country people tend to be too narrow in their views, too sectarian. It is therefore principally to them he addresses his appeal for the united church. Which, by the way, represents a movement that is gathering momen-

tum throughout the country today.

Dr. Stamm fulminates against pettifogging preachers who drivel away about petty abuses, such as smoking. When they point in horror to the fact that women are smoking, he tells them certainly they smoke. They are also flying airplanes. They are working in offices, running farms, managing big businesses "instead of living as pampered, legalized mistresses."

The whole world is going up in smoke; it has been sitting on a volcano for twenty years, and preachers twiddle the hours away talking about cigarettes. "Abstinence from tobacco won't save civilization," he shouts. "But religion will."

"If I were to devote my radio time to excoriating cocktails, cigarettes and petting, I'd soon find the stations all over the land closed against me, and in

less time than I can tell it I would be politely requested to stop preaching. Why? Because I would lose my audience. Most people have had more experience with all three 'evils' than I have. But I have had a lot of experience with religion and the soul, and that is what I try to preach so that others will understand them."

A pastor who tells what he knows to be the truth about the great causes of human misfortune, character flaws, woe and misery will hold and keep his congregation. He will be giving them something they can get nowhere else.

Men like George Truett, a conservative minister of Dallas, Texas; John Haynes Holmes, a liberal of New York; Merton Rice, hard-hitting Methodist of Detroit, who keeps his four-thousand-seat church jammed every Sunday—all of them are doing it because they talk with confidence of the fundamental problems of life; they call their flocks to repentance. They do not waste their time on peccadillos but attack sins which are deep-seated.

To speak of sin, Dr. Stamm points out, sounds old-fashioned. But it exists in much the same form it always did. Sinners he calls by name are those who put money-getting above public service and human personality; the people who are good through fear while being monsters at heart; the neutrals who are neither good nor bad; those who give to charity but who refuse in their personal lives to be merciful, just and tender-hearted.

Finally he assails the "old and bigoted men" who run so many of our churches.

"Instead of moving out adventurously into the broad, bright fields of religious growth," he says, "they are forbidding, regulating, prohibiting and punishing. One of the noblest sacrifices they could make would be to resign and give youth a chance to take over."

Having laid about him against the preachers, Dr. Stamm comes back to you, the church-goer. He declares that while there is a great deal wrong with the church today, there is much that is still wonderful in the church, as now constituted. There are thousands of noble, intelligent men in the pulpit who need support.

And if they are not delivering what you, the church-goer, expect, it is up to you to insist on change, on improvement. He adds:

"If the millions of religious non-church-goers in America will go back to church with a militant desire to recreate it, the next decade, war or no war, will see the greatest surge of spiritual progress the nation has ever known."

"But be sure that, when you have built the church of your heart's desire, you will not repeat the performance of the past and say, 'Here is the thing I wanted, it must not be changed.' The thing that I ask you to change must be forever changing. And you, to fulfill the destiny of Christianity, must change with it."

Tschaikowsky's second symphony, known as "The Little Russian Symphony," was written in 1872, when he was thirty-two. Its construction and orchestration do not reveal the mastery the composer was to acquire later, and the music is not as gripping as that of Nos. 4, 5 and 6 ("Pathetique"), but nevertheless No. 2 has moments of real emotion and some colorful treat-

ment of the folk-tunes of Tchaikowsky's native land. Characteristic are the kettledrum beats which open and close the second movement. The finale is undeniably brilliant. It starts with a little Russian song called "The Crane," stated by the violins, and is interwoven with a second theme of original inspiration. The ending throbs with vitality and excitement.

The violin concerto is an enduring favorite with all the great fiddlers and audiences everywhere. Passion and sentiment dominate its pages. So appealing and beautiful is the music that one cannot help condemning Fritz Kreisler for revamping the work recently, omitting some parts, changing others, shortening the cadenza and making a new ending for the first movement. Such tampering smacks strongly of artistic sacrilege. If Tchaikowsky's writing is good enough for Elman, Menuhin, Morini, Heifetz, Spalding, then why not also for Kreisler?

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This aftermath-holiday program surely has enough of tune and cheer, the character being properly set with the rollicking opening number.

Tibbett's programming of "Danny Deever" recalls the American visit many years ago of Rudyard Kipling, author of the verses. Unknown to him, Damrosch had set them as a song, and with David Bispham, the baritone, went to the author's hotel in New York to perform the composition as a surprise. Of course it was necessary for the composer to change the rhythm of some of the lines and to insert pauses between others. This so incensed Kipling that he ran from the room and refused to return until Damrosch and Bispham had left. Later he cooled down, apologized to Damrosch, and finally came to like the song greatly.

Moszkowski also suffered anger through his "Malaguena," which is a number in his only opera, "Boabdil." He was a tremendously popular composer of piano music for years and when the Berlin Royal Opera premiered "Boabdil" he expected nothing short of a triumph. But the critics wrote scathing things about the work. (To my mind the score is full of lovely music.) Moszkowski grew so incensed that he left his Berlin home permanently and settled in Paris, where he died ill in mind and impoverished in purse.

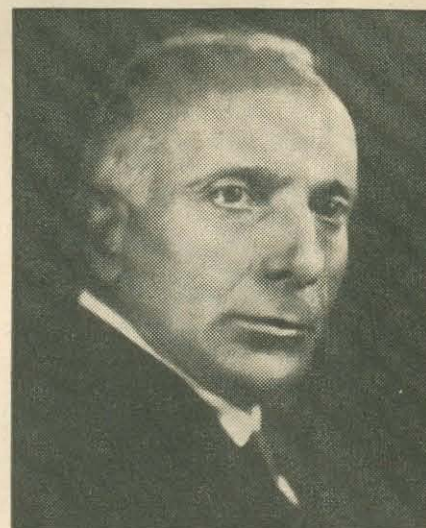

Auld Lang Syne in Music

ALWAYS when the old year passes and the new one comes in, I get nostalgic and hopeful at the same time. My thoughts wander backward and my wishes go forward.

This early January for some reason I traveled into the past mentally and got to thinking of what was happening musically a hundred years ago.

Beethoven and Schubert had died a short time before; Bizet came into the world just before 1840. Twelve months previously Verdi had written his first opera, "Oberto," and Gounod had won the student Prix de Rome at the Paris Conservatoire with his cantata, "Fernand." In 1841 Arthur Sullivan, the future "Sir," came into the world.

In 1840 itself, Donizetti produced two of his best-liked operas, "La Favorita" and "Daughter of the Regiment," and was feted immeasurably. Nicolo Paganini, the Heifetz-Menuhin-Kreisler of his period (for he played like a demigod and was rich) died at Nice at the age of fifty-eight. Brahms, seven years old, studied piano industriously and did not even dream that he was to enjoy immortality beside the greatest of the creative masters. Only eleven, Anton Rubinstein was a prodigy pianist and toured Europe with his teacher, Villoing. During the same period, Franz Liszt, already a world-famous keyboard virtuoso of twenty-nine, was winning triumphs which eclipsed even those of Paderewski at his palmist. When as a youth in his teens he had made his first appearance in London years before, the original poster advertising the concert commented on his having "consented to display his inimitable powers on the New Grande Piano Forte invented by Sebastien Erard." Which is also of historical interest because it indicates the approximate date of introduction of the modern piano. Around 1840 Liszt went to England again, traveled elsewhere giving concerts incessantly from 1839 to 1847.

Mendelssohn, a hero wherever he went in 1840, both as composer and pianist, finished his "Hymn of Praise" in that year. Chopin, just returned from his unfortunate romantic trip to Majorca with his beloved George Sand, wrote the last of his opus 28 (the twenty-

four preludes) and also the great Scherzo in C sharp minor. Robert Schumann, intimate friend and artistic brother of Mendelssohn, finally disregarded the long opposition of Clara Wieck's father to her union with the young composer and the pair were wedded. Their unclouded happy marriage (until Schumann's mental collapse and death) was one of the outstanding romances in history.

Cesar Franck, destined to eminent rank as the towering musical mystic of France, was still studying and won the first prize for counterpoint and fugue at the Paris Conservatoire. For some reason his father would not permit him to compete for the Prix de Rome, which he doubtless would have gained. Smetana settled in Prague and began his greater career, while the modest Bruckner was a humble piano-teacher in Linz, Austria. Its capital, Vienna, had the luminous Strauss family. Papa Strauss popularized the quadrille in 1840, and four years later his Johann made an unexpectedly brilliant debut as a waltz player and composer, much to the discomfiture of the elder Strauss. A shining star rose in the 1840 musical firmament in Russia with the birth of the glorious Tchaikowsky, at about the time Wagner was completing his "Rienzi" and "Faust Overture."

For Americans, 1840 has special sentimental significance, for then Stephen Foster was a fourteen-year-old student of Athens Academy at Tioga Point. Twenty-four years later he died—poor, lonely, miserable but leaving us the greatest musical heritage our country possesses.

And now—the year 1940. What will historians write about it one hundred years hence? Echo answers "What?"

A New Year Contribution

LAURITZ MELCHIOR, the Metropolitan Opera tenor, writes to this department: "I am sending you a little story which should cheer your entrance into the coming year. It happened when I was engaged to sing recently in an inland city. I was in my hotel room practising lustily the morning of my concert when there came a loud hammering on the wall from the neighboring apartment. Thinking it meant that pictures were being hung, I went on with my vocal exercises.

"When the racket had gone on vigorously for about ten minutes, it grew somewhat unendurable. I stopped singing and the noise stopped too. I began again and instantly the knocking was resumed. I tried the experiment several times and always with the same result. I then went down to the hotel desk to ask whether the picture hanging could not be postponed until some other time.

"As I got to the desk, another guest stood there complaining in a loud voice and saying, 'It's an outrage, that fellow next to me bellowing all morning. If you don't stop it, I will. I've used up the water-bottle and the tray and I'll keep on even if I make a hole through the wall.'

"I stood by silently as the clerk showed the register to the angry one and pointed to my name. The objector looked hard at the writing and exclaimed, 'Good heavens, Lauritz Melchior! And to think that I've often paid nearly eight dollars to hear that guy sing at the Metropolitan.'"

OFFENBACH, composer of operettas, wrote one grand opera, "Tales of Hoffman"; Leo Delibes (1863-1934), composer of operettas and ballets, wrote two grand operas, "Jean de Neville" and "Lakme." His chief fame rests on the latter, and on his outstanding ballets, "Sylvia" and "Coppelia."

"Lakme" has all the typical earmarks of grand opera, with an intensely dramatic plot, telling numbers for solo singers and chorus, rich-hued orchestration and picturesque pageantry. (Of course there is a ballet, but that occurs also in nearly every other French grand opera of Delibes' period.) The music of "Lakme" offers abundant imagination, fine melody, and exotic colorings appropriate to India, where the story of the libretto takes place.

The underlying thought of the plot is the hatred of Nilakantha, Brahmin priest, and his followers for the English who annexed India. With that motif is interwoven the tragic romance of the Brahmin's daughter, Lakme, and Gerald, an English officer.

The first-act scene, a sacred garden, has Nilakantha invoking his group to wait patiently for the overthrow of the invaders. From the near-by temple comes the voice of Lakme in prayer.

The second-act picture, an open square in an Indian city, shows Nilakantha and Lakme in disguise (he as a beggar, she as a street singer) mingling with the crowds at the bazaar. The vindictive priest believes that on hearing the girl's voice, the man he seeks will surely come forward and betray himself. Nilakantha orders Lakme to sing the legend of the Pariah's daughter. ("Bell Song.") The plan works. Gerald steps out and is wounded by the old man's dagger.

In the last act Lakme has had Gerald carried to a hidden hut in the forest. Nursed by her, he is more enamored than ever. She goes to fetch a magic draught which unites lovers forever. Frederic appears and tells Gerald that their regiment has been ordered away. As he and Lakme drink the romantic potion, martial music of the soldiers is heard. Gerald starts up eagerly. The girl realizes that he is lost to her, and poisons herself with the deadly Datura blossoms just as Nilakantha rushes on to finish Gerald. Lakme saves his life again by warning her father that it is sacrilege to kill one who has drunk of the sacred spring, and she dies finally, still vowing her love for the fickle Gerald.

HI-YO SILVER AND GOLD


HIS voice is as well known as the President's and his ability as a radio actor is generally recognized, but if Earle W. Graser lost his present job tomorrow, he'd probably look a long, long time before he landed another job. As a matter of fact, there are few people, in or out of the radio industry, who know Mr. Graser, but the magic name of "The Lone Ranger" is a household word not only here in America, where his "Hi-yo, Silver" has become a sort of juvenile greeting whenever one boy meets another, but in England and Europe, as well, where cowboys and Indians are even more enthusiastically acclaimed.

You see, Mr. Graser is the Lone Ranger, and because he is his voice would be of little value in any other role. Too many people know it, and even if he were cast as Romeo, and played it very well, the chances are his balcony speech would draw a "Hi-yo, Silver" rather than enraptured "oh's" and "ah's" from his listeners. That's the price he's had to pay for his success. There is probably no better-known radio character than the Lone Ranger and no more anonymous radio personality than Mr. Graser, who has breathed the breath of life into him.

Unlike most radio shows, which are put together, given a trial and, if they succeed, find their way eventually to the networks and national popularity, "The Lone Ranger" was no hit-or-miss affair, but a well-planned, time-tried piece of showmanship based upon long experience in the theater. Oddly enough, too, "The Lone Ranger" is largely the product of a man whose name is seldom heard in connection with it, and yet he owns the Ranger body and soul. Piece by piece, the Ranger and his companions—Silver and Tonto—were put together and sent out to ride the range in behalf of righteousness and lawfulness by the almost cold, analytical design of George W. Trendle, one-time president of a motion-picture-theater chain in Detroit and now part owner of radio station WXYZ, in Detroit, and of the Lone Ranger Corporation, for the Lone Ranger is incorporated.

Back in 1930, when the bite of depression caused customers to stay away from his theaters in carload lots, Mr. Trendle started casting about for some field in which to recoup his losses.

"People still wanted entertainment," he decided, "and the form of entertainment that reached the greatest number of people at the least expense to them was a cinch to click. Radio was the

only answer. The movie fan has to go to the theater to be entertained, but the radio fan has his entertainment brought right home to him. So I figured radio was my field." In April Trendle and his associate, John H. King, bought Detroit's station WXYZ.

At the time, WXYZ was losing seven hundred dollars a week—a situation which would have discouraged most prospective purchasers—but Trendle had definite ideas. When you wanted to fill your theater, you ran a serial and got the kids. What sort of a serial? Any showman could give the answer to that one—a western. As it happened, Mr. Trendle had on file some correspondence from a young free-lance writer in Buffalo who—with a wife and a youngster and another on the way—was seeking a steady connection. In this correspondence, Fran Striker—now widely known as the author of "The Lone Ranger"—had given just one thought that truly interested Trendle. He had heard from a pioneer uncle—who'd tended bar in the early mining-days of Denver—many tales of the early West. These tales, he wrote, could be woven into a splendid radio serial that would have a wide juvenile appeal. These thoughts being identical with those held by Trendle, a deal was made and the youthful Striker set to work to make the Ranger come true.

In the spring of 1932, the Lone Ranger first mounted his famous Silver and started down the rocky—and often ambushed—trail to the heart of juvenile America. But the rocky riding was only in the script. The Ranger was a success from the start. There was no reason why it shouldn't be, based as it was upon the tried formula of Robin Hood translated into the near-at-home atmosphere of the early West. It was first heard as a sustaining program on WXYZ, but in a few months the combined shoutings of hundreds of street-corner Rangers in Detroit had penetrated through to the ears of a bakery's promotion manager. He bought the program. Soon the bakery was working overtime to keep up with the orders. The same bakery bought the program for other cities in which it had branches, with the same results. In Chicago storekeepers were forced to hide that particular brand of bread in order to sell other brands which they had stocked.

Such sales records are not hidden under a bushel—at least not by George Trendle and Charles Hicks, veteran theatrical promotion-man who had come to WXYZ with Trendle. The Michigan

network was formed largely as an outlet for the Ranger, with Trendle as president. At WXYZ, they say the first interconnection of stations which later became the Mutual Network was made for the same reason.

Shirley Temple has often admitted that "The Lone Ranger" is her favorite radio show. Mrs. Roosevelt, wife of the President, wrote in her column: "The other evening I offered to read aloud to Buzz until bedtime, but there is a program on the air called 'The Lone Ranger' which seems to be entirely satisfactory . . ." Today "The Lone Ranger" is heard—in the flesh—on seventy-nine stations from Coast to Coast. On transcriptions it is heard on more than fifty additional stations, which makes it heard on the largest network of stations used for any commercial program.

THE wide appeal of the Lone Ranger for children is not—any more than was the character's creation—a matter of guesswork. Before a program is taken to the studio, Fran Striker tries it out on his two sons, eight and six years of age. The two-year-old of the family has not yet met the Ranger. From these two, he learns whether interest has been sustained, while from Mrs. Striker he gets the mother's slant—things to be avoided or emphasized in character-building. This testing is supplemented by a thick file of fan letters from both adults and children.

One letter from a mother protested the use of the phrase "You dirty rat." Her son, feeling that the Ranger would say nothing that was not in the best of form, had used the phrase in addressing his mother and others. A Hollywood screen writer objected to a program in which marijuana traffic had been dealt with. Despite the fact that the illicit traffickers had ended up behind the eight ball, the subject of dope has been permanently banned.

Striker, thirty-five, tall, with deep, grayish-brown eyes and brown hair, watches his mail carefully for ideas and criticisms. Graser, to whom most of the mail is addressed as the Lone Ranger, doesn't answer his mail but it is all turned over to Striker. As a matter of fact, so anonymous is Graser that even his next-door neighbors don't know who he is.

His most touching letters have been from—or concerned—children. The day

I was in Detroit to see him he had just opened a letter from a mother.

"Dear Lone Ranger," it had started. "It might interest you to know that one of your Lone Ranger Scouts is riding now the long, long trail. He wears that beautiful Ranger pin of blue and silver just as his own hands placed it in a new blue-and-silver tie just a few days ago. Your Lone Ranger program was the very last program he listened to over the radio just before he died . . ."

Striker can shed unashamed tears at a letter like this, and his file is filled with them. He has no exaggerated idea of his writing ability, but he does know that his influence upon children is as great as any other one person's. He has tried to make his programs character-building in that right conquers over might, and he stresses safety at every opportunity. His programs have frequently received various national safety awards for this effort. No Ranger will carelessly cross streets, use fire or swim. Carelessness will result in a Ranger losing his badge.

Oh, yes. These badges. With the Ranger's wide popularity, it was only natural that other developments should follow. And follow they have. A children's publishing-house wanted a book about the Lone Ranger and Striker wrote it. A sequel quickly followed. He plans another book for adults, built around the same character. The movies then became interested and Republic Pictures have made two full-length serials which jam neighborhood theaters wherever they're shown. A third will be released shortly. A comic strip built around the Ranger by Striker now is seen in 120 papers from Coast to Coast and in a number of foreign papers.

The deluge had started. All kinds of novelties began to appear with the Ranger as their motif. There are cowboy hats, chaps, chewing-gum, soap, dolls, fountain pens, pencils, first-aid kits, make-up kits, masks, ice-cream cones, coin banks, spoons, knives and forks, tableware, combs, tooth-brushes, tooth-paste, balloons, rocking-horses and others. In all, sixty-four different manufacturers of children's clothing and novelties and games have been licensed to use the magic name of the Lone Ranger.

Lone Ranger, Inc., was set up with Trendle as president and principal stockholder to handle the large volume of business that followed the appear-

ance of the Lone Ranger, and it is well on its way to becoming radio's first million-dollar idea. Last year, from the motion-picture serials, the corporation received approximately \$60,000. The cartoon strip, syndicated by King Features, paid \$100,000. Another \$100,000 poured in from the various licensees who manufacture Ranger novelties and goods. Together with the radio income of the program, this makes its receipts for the past year well above \$400,000.

Fran Striker, who still handles the script with the aid of two assistant writers, receives \$10,000 a year for his labor, Graser gets \$150 a week for playing the part. The Lone Ranger, Inc., also produces two other serials which are anxiously awaited by the juveniles—"The Green Hornet" and "Ned Jordan, Secret Agent." These, too, are under the supervision of Striker. "The Lone Ranger" is presented three times a night from WXYZ in order that children in various parts of the country may hear it at bedtime. Two studios and a multitudinous mass of sound-effects are used. The clop-clop-clop of Silver's hoofs are made with two plumber's plungers beating in a pile of sand. The thud of the villain falling under the Ranger's deadly aim is actually soundman Ernest Winstanley falling to the floor. He'll show you the bruises to prove it.

IN BALTIMORE a hundred thousand kids—and plenty of adults—in ten-gallon hats paraded downtown streets when the Lone Ranger made his debut on WBAL. In San Francisco an aged couple speeding through the Broadway tunnel were haled into court, where they told the judge that there was no radio reception in the tunnel and it was time for "The Lone Ranger." The case was dismissed. Felix Holt, who hails from Kentucky and once worked on Irvin Cobb's paper at Paducah, will tell you a hundred other similar instances of the Ranger's popularity. Felix is the Ranger's publicity man—a sort of Tonto and Silver and Boswell rolled into one.

The fact remains that the Lone Ranger is important both as an industry and as a legend which, as imperishably as Robin Hood, may become radio's first contribution to that Americana which includes Paul Bunyan, John Henry, Mike Fink and Casey Jones.

... SHE'S EXPLODED

Radio scoops the world with its broadcast of the Graf Spee suicide



In the red glare of the setting South American sun, hundreds lined the Uruguayan shore on Dec. 17, watching the dread but crippled German battleship, Graf Spee. But as her captain blew her to bits, millions of American listeners knew as soon as those hundreds what had happened

THE passenger plane was like a silver-winged condor speeding through the skies above the flat Nebraska countryside. Its passengers may have remembered—with a smile—that on the plains eleven thousand feet below Buffalo Bill once carried mail and news from the East to pioneers of the West by speedy pony express. For, comfortably cabined in the airbird, they listened to news of the world by radio.

"The Graf Spee seems to be definitely preparing to leave." It was NBC reporter James Bowen at Montevideo, Uruguay, broadcasting with a portable microphone from the docks where he watched the Spee. "Thirty-one wounded sailors have been brought from the ship to hospitals here. One of them carried a Christmas tree, and the parting between the wounded and their comrades who face an unknown future was touching . . ."

If only Buffalo Bill could have been there in that plane! What would he have thought, what would those news-starved pioneers have thought as news from every crook and cranny of the world flashed into them just as it happened from newsmen trained and scattered to the far corners of the earth? But now there was little of Buffalo Bill in the minds of these people. They were suddenly being taken to front-row seats at the greatest drama of their day.

Three days before, the Admiral Graf Von Spee—German pocket battleship and terror of British shipping—had been cornered off the coast of Uruguay by

three light English cruisers. Outmaneuvered, outfought, shattered by shell-fire, the Spee had managed to evade her dogged pursuers and find sanctuary in the harbor of Montevideo. But it was to prove only a temporary sanctuary. International law set limits upon her stay in this neutral port, and as soon as she could be repaired and made seaworthy she must put to sea. There two of the cruisers which had fought her awaited, augmented by other fighting-craft, and it seemed that each passing hour made the predicament of the Spee more dire. What would she do? Would she— But let's get back to Bowen in Uruguay.

CROWDS surged about him—excited, pushing, betting crowds that almost forced him off the dock and into the water at times. But all day he maintained his watch, going on the air regularly to give to the world news of each new development. When he wasn't on the air he was in contact with New York by special wire, keeping the NBC newsroom there informed.

"Hello, New York. There are a lot of rumors floating around here that the Deutschland and a convoy of submarines are heading here to help the Spee. It that's true, we're apt to see another Battle of the Falkland Islands right off the coast here."

"What Allied ships are outside, Bowen?"

"You can't get that information. I've heard that the British Renown is there and that the French Dunkerque—either of them big enough to handle the Spee

alone—is there, too. And there's a report that the Ark Royal is steaming here from Rio de Janeiro, but I can't confirm this. Here's Captain Langsdorff. He's getting ready to go out to the Spee. Better give me the air."

Then Bowen was on the air.

"The captain has just gone aboard in his brig and there seems to be a lot of activity out there. They're testing their searchlight and forward gun-turrets, and smoke is beginning to roll out of her stack. They're taking up their port and bow anchors! Looks like she's going to make a fight of it!"

Then came the news that all the world was waiting for.

"The Graf Spee is moving! The port captain's tug is clearing the way for her, and she's steaming slowly out toward the sea. The decision has been made! Soon we'll know something. I'm going to follow her down and we'll be back on the air as soon as we have something for you."

Now Bowen was back on the private line.

"It's getting dusk here . . . clouds dropping fast. Be a good night to try a getaway. The Spee might make it."

"Do you think she's going out to fight?" New York's question was everybody's question.

"I don't know. She seems to be moving southward, towards Buenos Aires."

"We're keeping everything ready for you, Bowen. As soon as something happens, you'll be on the air."

"Say, will one of you fellows call my mother at the Vassar Women's Club in Washington, D. C., and tell her to

listen? I haven't seen her for several years."

"Sure. I'll have someone do it now."

The Spee was now directly in the channel leading towards Buenos Aires. Outside the harbor searchlights were sweeping the skies, visible evidence that the Allied warships were on hand, and over the Spee planes from the fleet outside soared. She moved slowly.

"She's almost stopped," Bowen told New York. "There's a lot of excitement out there. Looks like men are being taken from the Spee to the Tacoma. (The Tacoma was a German tanker which refueled the Spee.) Something's going on but we can't tell what yet. Better wait a bit before giving me the air." He watched the channel, already growing dark. "Hello, the Spee's stopped moving. She's—GIVE ME THE AIR, QUICK! SHE'S EXPLODED!"

IN THIRTY seconds Bowen was talking to the world through the full facilities of NBC. He was telling the world of the most dramatic episode yet to come out of World War II. The Spee had committed suicide! In the plane soaring over Nebraska, passengers relaxed, perhaps thought again of Buffalo Bill and the pony express now that the Spee affair had reached its anti-climactic denouement. Perhaps hardy Bill Cody stirred in his grave, and if he did, it was with admiration for the grand job radio was doing. And afterward, Bill Cody must have rested peacefully, content in the knowledge that there were still pioneers to carry on from where he had left off. —Edward Nolan.

LET'S LISTEN TO HOLLAND

IN WELCOME contrast to the usual war-propaganda programs being ground out on production scale by the leading short-wave stations of Europe are the "Happy Programs" of Holland's famous broadcasting twins, PHI and PCJ. The regular m.c. for Holland's good-will programs is Eddie Startz, who, speaking equally well in Dutch, Malay, German, French, Spanish, Portuguese and English, often throws a combination of several languages into the same sentence with gleeful abandon. A world traveler with an inexhaustible stock of yarns, jokes and wisecracks and fortified with only a stack of phonograph records he can put on a funnier and more entertaining show than almost any of our own top-ranking and high-salaried comedians supported by their staff of stooges.

PCJ and PHI are owned and operated by the huge Philips Radio Works at Eindhoven. The studios are at Hilversum. These stations were among the very first to operate on short wave, and although still classed as experimental transmitters, they boast of some of the finest equipment in existence, including a very unique antenna system, which, suspended from two towers on wheels, can be quickly moved around on a circular track, permitting broadcast to be accurately di-

rected at will toward any point of the compass.

PCJ (20,000 watts) maintains a complicated and extensive broadcast schedule, but we are interested only in transmissions directed toward North America, which are as follows: On 15.22 megs (in the 19-meter band), Wednesday mornings from 8:50 to 10:50 a.m. EST; on 9.59 megs (in the 31-meter band just above GSC, London, in frequency), Sundays from 8:25 to 9:25 p.m. EST; Tuesdays from 8:45 to 10:15 p.m. EST; Wednesdays from 8:25 to 8:40 p.m. EST, and Fridays from 8 to 9 p.m. EST. You will hear Eddie Startz on the Tuesday, Wednesday morning, and Friday programs. PHI (17.77), once quite active, broadcasts at present on Sundays only from 6:40 to 7:40 a.m. EST, with a program for the Far East.

Prior to coming on the air, PCJ's channel may be identified by a four-tone chime signal repeated over and over. There is a peculiar hollow sound, often accompanied by an echo effect which further helps to identify the Holland stations.

Letters to PCJ, containing reception reports are often read over the air. Those reporting are also supposed to receive attractive PCJ verification cards but unfortunately these do not always arrive.

FROM THE EUROPEAN ARENA: There has been a veritable invasion of the 25-meter band by Soviet short-wave stations. Aside from RNE (12), which is being well heard from about 7 to 8 a.m. EST, there has appeared an entirely new station on 11.915. The unidentified Moscow station on 11.895 megs also carries the same program but has not been very understandable due to interference from XGOY (11.90) of China. Other Soviet stations are broadcasting irregularly on 11.81, 11.705 and 11.64 megs. RADIO GUIDE's observation post in New York reports definite jamming of LKQ (11.705). Oslo, Norway, signals by a pirate station which, waiting like a bird of prey, swoops down on the Norway channel the minute the station comes on the air at 2 a.m. EST. . . . ZAA (7.85) in Tirana, Albania, is being heard in the East for a short time before its sign-off at 3:30 p.m. EST with fine signals. The music sounds a lot like the Arabic selections that London uses in its program for North Africa.

THE NEWS IN GENERAL: The Winnipeg stations CJRO (6.15) and CJRX (11.72) are back on the air again and can be heard with excellent signal strength from 4 to 8:30 p.m. EST and occasionally to 1:30 a.m. EST. . . . Pitcairn Island has been completely isolated from the world since last spring, when its sole means of communication, amateur transmitter VR6AY, was shipped to Panama for repairs. The British ship that was to have taken it back was ordered elsewhere on ac-

count of war demands. Letters sent by the operator, Andrew Young, when the transmitter was shipped several months ago stated that a landslide had damaged the boats at Bounty Bay; that rats were eating up the island's few crops, but that everybody was well although supplies were running low. . . . Joseph Voisich of Washington, Mich., writes that CR7BE (9.64), operated by the Radio Club of Mozambique, Lourenco Marques, Mozambique, is being heard with amazing signals from 2 to 4 p.m. EST. The program commences with the beat of tom-toms. A woman announces in English. . . . WBOS, Boston, Mass., now relaying CBS programs daily from 3 p.m. to 1 a.m. EST, has been granted three new channels, namely 6.14, 15.21 and 21.54, in addition to its present frequency of 9.57 megs. It will share time with WPIT, Pittsburgh, an NBC affiliate-owned also owned by the Westinghouse Company, on the three new frequencies. . . . The new Perth (West Australia) station has been testing early mornings as VLW (6.13), VLW2 (9.56) or VLW3 (11.83) and has been heard with excellent strength on each of the channels. . . . Desmond Callan of Readville, Mass., reports reception of another new Australian station, VLQ (9.615) at Sydney, which came on the air with a special program for North America at 7 a.m. EST, but was promptly blotted out at 7:12 a.m. EST when TIPG (9.615) of San Jose, Costa Rica, arrived on the scene.

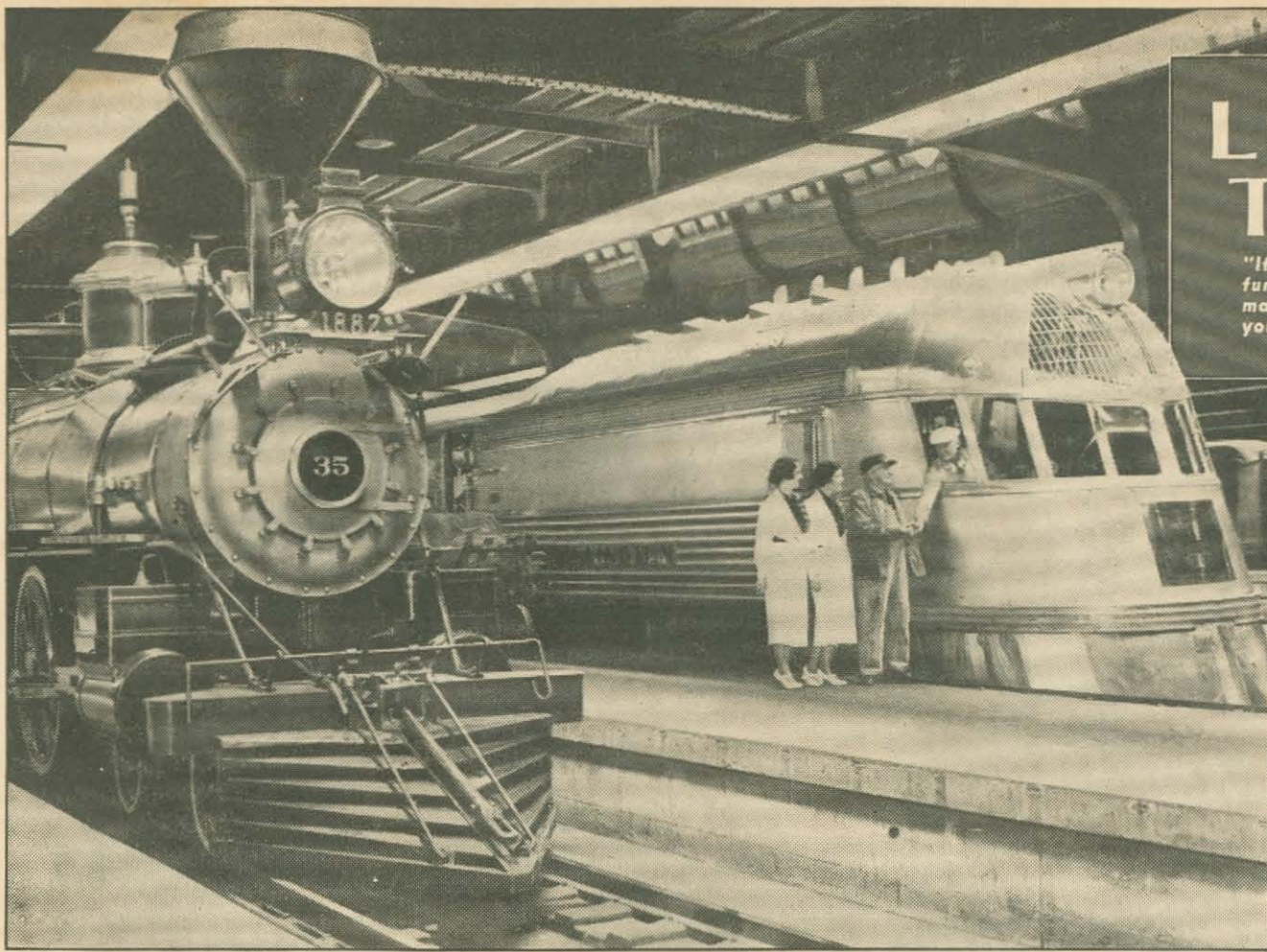

LISTENING TO LEARN

"If radio can stimulate a person to look further into things, or if it can provoke a man to think—then it's an education, and you have a college in your living-room."

Person-to-Person . . .

● After three months' experimentation, Parker Wheatley, radio director at Northwestern University, reports that listeners' comments and questions have increased in quantity and improved in quality enough to warrant permanent use of the new "armchair forum" technique on the Sunday morning "Reviewing Stand" broadcasts. The technique has recast the form which the series has followed since its beginning several years ago. Under the new set-up the entire program is built around comments and questions submitted by listeners. Response to the first invitation to listeners for their ideas was poor. The number increased week by week, however, and now the volume necessitates tabulation of the letters into general areas of opinion for presentation on the program. At first only questions were asked of the listeners. But it was soon discovered that the writers preferred to present their own opinions rather than ask questions. Reversing the process, the "Reviewing Stand" now presents one question each week to which the listeners are invited to send in their own particular viewpoints. The speakers, who study the comments in a pre-program meeting, organize their own discussion on the basis of the listeners' opinions. Because it gives them some assurance that they are discussing problems in which the public is actually interested, the "Reviewing Stand" speakers favor the new technique. This is one of the first revolutionary ideas to develop from the discussion technique since it was first introduced to radio.

● WORDS FROM THE WISE: "The trouble with many educational broadcasts is that they forget that they have to sell their product just as big commercial programs do, and that they've got to break down a great deal of sales resistance. No matter how true or factual an 'Adventure in Reading' program may be, it can be educational only if it is entertaining. Therefore I try to make each script interesting in itself and never ask people to keep tuned in just because it's about good books."—Helen Walpole, author of NBC's "Adventure in Reading" series.

● Joining Progressive's Margaret Harrison and Alice V. Keliher, Frederick L. Redefer, executive secretary of the Progressive Education Association, has been added to Columbia's Board of Consultants for the "American School of the Air." The PEA is cooperating with CBS in presenting Monday's program in this series, titled "Frontiers of Democracy."

● Two weeks ago this column promised an alphabetical list of network educational programs. It's still in the formative stage and can be expected in about two weeks. Definite announcement will be made in the next column.

The World Is Yours, NBC.

Prominent forerunner of U. S. growth and development during the last one hundred years was the railroad. No other single industry contributed as much to U. S. expansion, none played as dramatic a role during this period as the steam locomotive. The logical starting point of a brief consideration of the rise of the railroad is England in the year 1814, when an engineer named George Stephenson put his first locomotive to work upon the Killingworth mine, near Newcastle. England's Stockton and Darlington road, projected three years later, is considered the first public railway to use steam power. In America, railroading began in earnest with the trial run of the famous Tom

Thumb in 1829. With one cylinder and a boiler about the size of the average washtub, the Tom Thumb accomplished the almost unbelievable by hauling thirty passengers thirteen miles in fifty-seven minutes. Compare this with the modern steam locomotive, weighing 128 tons, capable of hauling heavy passenger trains at speeds far in excess of a mile a minute. Most significant in its effect upon the rapid development of the country was the highly dramatic junction of the Central Pacific with the Union Pacific at Promontory Point, near Great Salt Lake, on May 10, 1869. The rapid growth of the railroad since that time is best illustrated by a comparison of mileage, which steadily increased decade by decade from 53,000 miles in 1870 to approximately 244,000 miles of railway line at the present time.

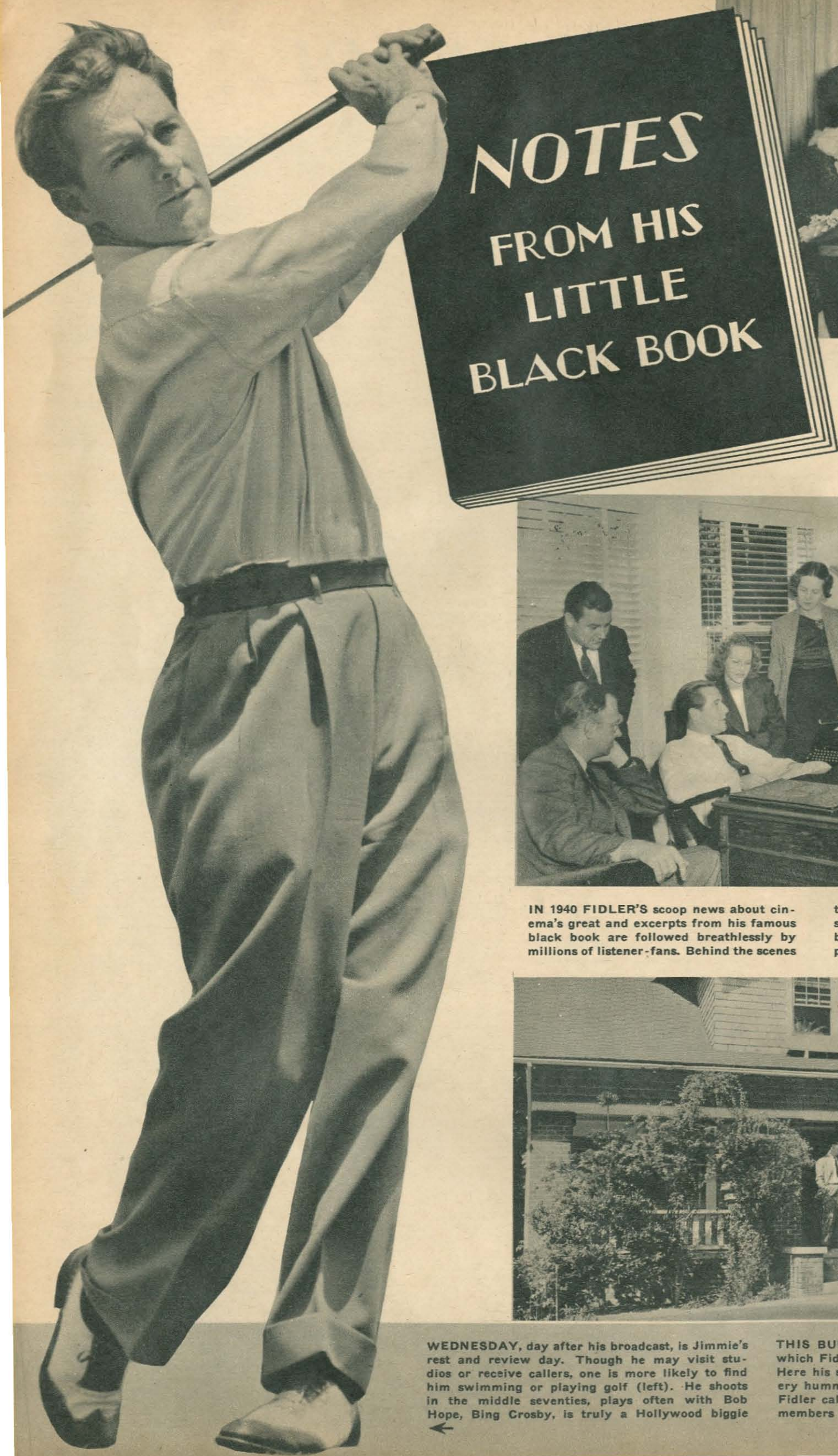

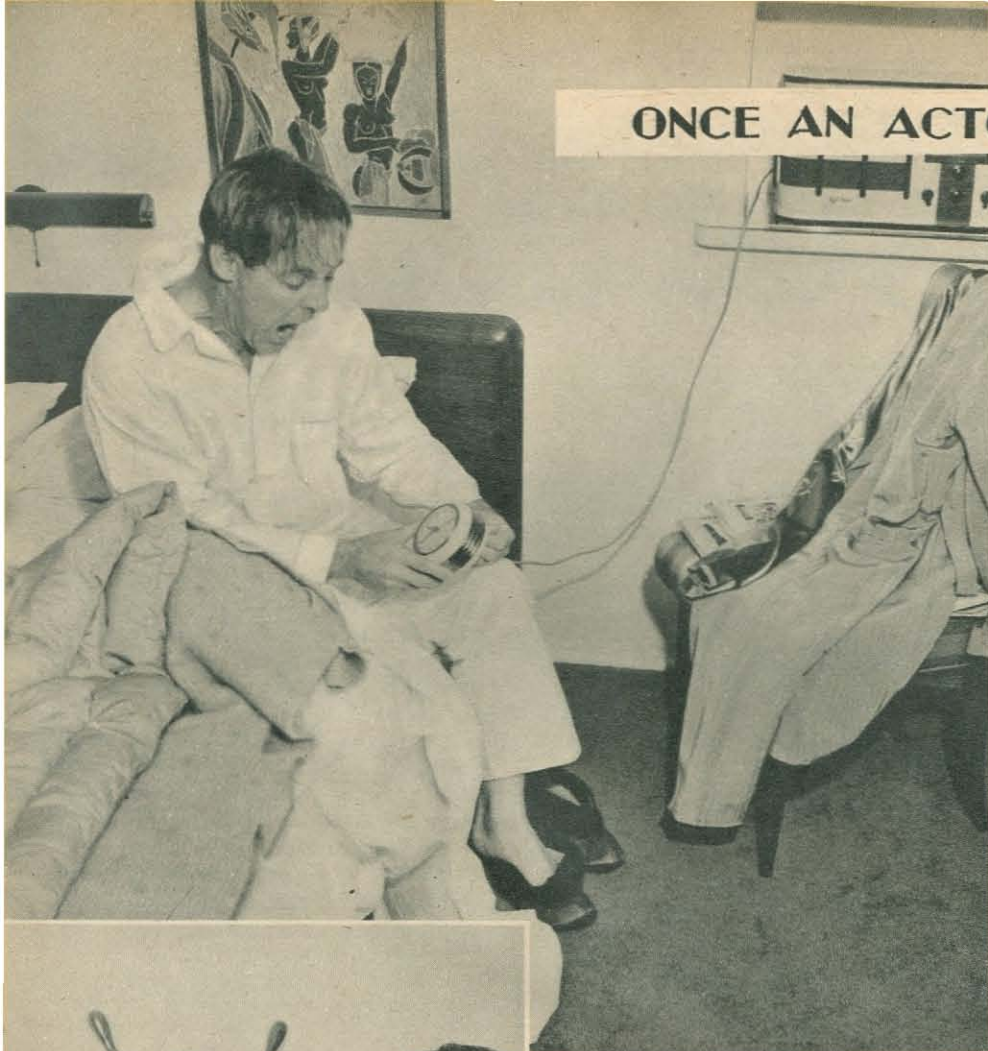

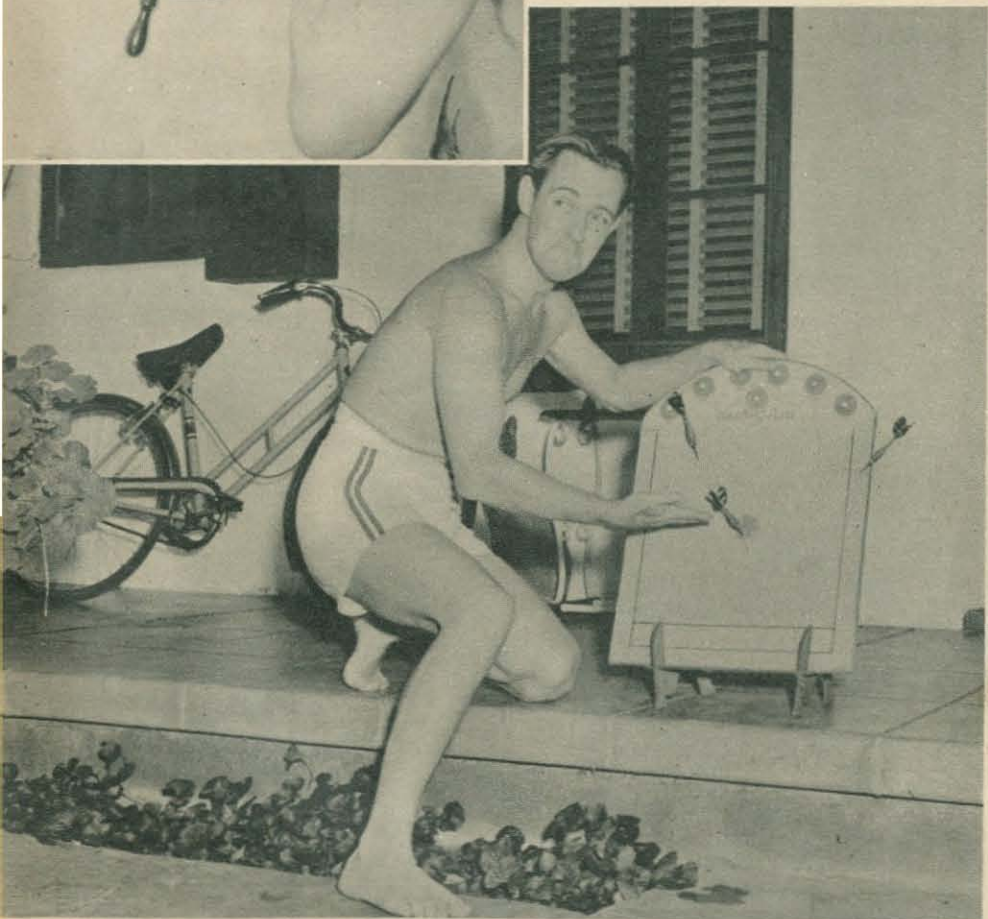

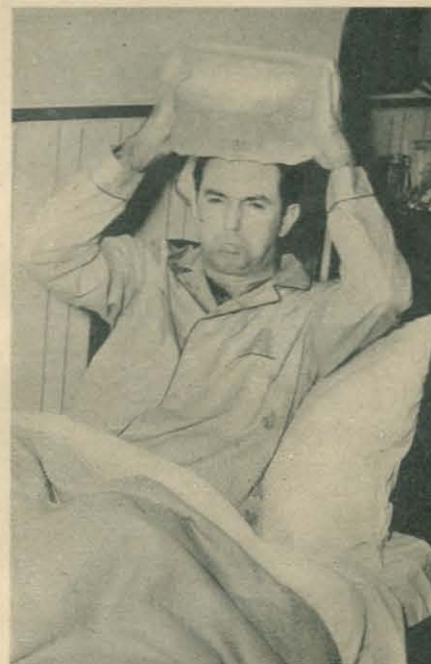
"Baby Me"
