Answers

ARTIE SHAW

A brother bandleader rips into Artie Shaw's rip into the popular-music business

ARTIE SHAW SAID:

"The musician in America hasn't only a financial and artistic problem with which to contend but he must fight politics, corruption and a system of patronage."

"Anyone can lead a dance band. At least, anyone could lead many of today's name-bands. None of them need leaders—and very few have them. The average bandleader is only a front, a window-dressing."

"Mountebanks have cheapened popular music to such an extent that a wisecrack or a catch phrase becomes more important to their success than the music they play."

"Give me fifty thousand dollars, fourteen good musicians and a press-agent and I'll make Joe Doakes, who doesn't know a C-scale from a snare drum, one of the most popular bandleaders in America."

". . . it's almost axiomatic in the business that if a band isn't booked through one of the Big Four offices it hasn't a chance of ever playing a decent spot."

"Radio, more than anything else, is responsible for this frantic fight to tie up wire hotel spots. The Great God Microphone is deity to the bandsman and he worships at its shrine."

ARTIE SHAW'S blast against the band business, which appeared in the *Saturday Evening Post* recently, is certainly open for argument. Artie dashed off his article after he had recovered from an almost fatal illness, which might have jaundiced his viewpoint.

Possibly Artie was battling tremendously magnified evils. Like the lovable, if misguided, Don Quixote, he was tilting at a windmill.

I have a positive outlook on the band business. Like many another new industry, it is robust, vigorous, fast-paced and strenuous. In that respect it is typically American. Competition is strong and rivalry intense. To survive, a bandleader must possess strength of purpose, strength of mind, and just strength.

He must love the band business, love it enough to put up with back-breaking, brutal hops from town to town on one-night tours, love it enough to want to kiss every youngster who thinks enough of him to clamor for his autograph.

At the bottom of page fourteen of that particular *Saturday Evening Post* article, Artie declares that the musician in America, in addition to other problems, must fight politics and corruption in the band business.

LET'S get the situation straight. No top-ranking bandleader deals directly with the executives who book bands, and these headaches are not his. As any other artist, he hires a reputable manager or manager organization to handle these affairs for him.

In any case, Artie contends the bandleader (or his representative) must fight politics and corruption. I think the answer to this is that Shaw confuses corruption with intense competition. There is no gainsaying that there is bitter competition in the band business, with managers and booking-agencies fighting hard to land the juiciest engagements for their client-bands. That is not only practical but good business sense. Especially when you realize that the four rival booking-agencies between them have a roster of almost four hundred bands, which include the top-rankers and the lesser known, while there are thousands of other independent bands throughout the country always looking for jobs.

To my knowledge, there no longer exist any iron-bound contracts between hotels and booking-agencies by which the hotel must take the bands given it by the agency. The field is wide open. But it is to the hotel's advantage to favor an agency which can supply it with big name-bands, the bands that draw crowds. It is, again, a matter of business sense. But Artie calls it playing politics.

No, a bandleader doesn't fight politics and corruption. He fights competition from rivals who want the hotel spots

he thinks he ought to have. And if he is angry at being beaten out, it is no more than a human gesture for him to cry, "I wuz robbed."

On page fifteen Artie says, "Anyone can lead a dance band . . . None of them need leaders—and very few have them. The average bandleader is only a front, a window-dressing. If he has capable musicians behind him and imaginative arrangers behind the musicians, it doesn't matter whether he's on or off the platform—the music will sound the same."

In part, I agree with Artie. Yes, anyone can lead a dance band, if by leading a band you mean getting up in front of it, giving the downbeat and waving a stick in correct tempo. Matter of fact, there is a movement afoot, in symphonic circles, to dispense entirely with the maestro as an unnecessary appendage during public concerts. The answer is, all the work of the orchestra-leader, popular or symphony, takes place before the orchestra goes on the stand.

The music doesn't go 'round and come out smooth and sweet just with a snap of the finger or a wave of the baton. There are hours of rehearsals behind each number played, hours of good hard work. That's where the bandleader figures. Nor am I at all ruffled at the accusation that some leaders are not terrific musicians or instrumentalists. A drama critic need never have written a play and yet be an expert on things dramatic. But of this you can be assured: that these leaders know what they want in the way of music and they aren't satisfied until they get it from their boys.

They may not be able to read music (most of the musicians in the golden era of jazz, of which Artie speaks, likewise couldn't read music), but they had the business acumen and sense to organize a band of capable musicians and hire these imaginative arrangers and weld the various parts into a good band. Without him there would be no band.

Several paragraphs later, Artie cries that a wisecrack or a catch phrase becomes more important to the success of the leader than his music. There isn't a wisecrack or catch phrase invented that will make bad music good. Bad music remains bad music and attaching a phrase to it will never, this side of heaven, magically change it. In the final analysis, people don't dance to wisecracks or catch phrases. They dance to music.

I will say this, however—that a catch phrase may help in gaining publicity for the leader. That, when his name is attached to a snappy phrase, it will more likely be remembered by hurried readers. Take my own case, for example. "Swing and Sway with Sammy Kaye" is so euphonious that it stuck in listeners' minds, and people, hearing it for the first time, remember the name of Sammy Kaye. This was proved by

the sudden jump in fan mail immediately after we introduced the phrase. But our music was the same, since we had swing-and-sway rhythms before we attached the title to it.

In the next paragraph Artie declares that, given fifty thousand dollars, fourteen good musicians, and a press-agent he'd make Joe Doakes into one of the most popular bandleaders in America. Here's where Artie just didn't face the facts. He knows, as well as I do, many cases where money was poured into bands liberally—with no results. Financial backing is available, just as it is for a good legitimate production, but no amount of money will make a silk purse out of a sow's ear.

And then Shaw declares, "It's amazing what a powerful booking-office or music-publisher can do to assist a new band up the ladder." And I say amen to that! It's not only amazing but it's wonderful. How many of our really good bands, now on top, would still be wasting away in roadside cabarets if it weren't for the help given them by some such organization? Plenty. The situation is a simple one: booking-agencies are constantly looking for talented newcomers. It means business to them. Newcomers are investments which, in time and if handled right, pay nice dividends.

I'll use a real case as an example. A representative of one of the agencies spotted this band working in a roadside spot for virtually nothing. He recognized the talent in this outfit and passed the word along to his home office. An executive flew out and caught the band at work. He signed up the leader. The band needed to be spruced up for public appearances. That required monetary investment, which the agency supplied. It bought uniforms, new and better instruments, guaranteed the salary of the arrangers and vocalist whom the leader hired. Then it went to work for the bandleader and in a short time got him his first hotel engagement at a salary of \$200 a week. The second engagement brought \$400. And so it went, until the band was ready for New York. The results: The agency was making money on its investment, the leader and his musicians were making money, and the public was enjoying a good dance band.

IS THAT an evil of the band business?

I hardly think so.

Skipping to page sixty-seven, we find Artie saying that if a band isn't booked through one of the Big Four offices, it hasn't a chance of ever playing a decent spot. The answer to this is simple. If a band isn't booked through one of these agencies, chances are it isn't worth being booked. As I've pointed out before, these agencies are in business to make money. It would hardly be good business acumen to pass up a good band.

On the same page Artie indicts "The

Great God Mike" as another obstacle to the new bandleader. Yet every bandleader will tell you that the greatest thing that happened to the band business was radio! It has brought the music of bands into the homes of millions of far-flung listeners throughout the country and it has worked toward acquainting these listeners with the leaders and their individual styles of music. Thus, when the band is booked into the ballrooms and hotels of these far-flung cities, their music has preceded them and a hearty welcome is assured.

I assume that Artie's indictment against radio is that it is used artificially to hypo a band's popularity; that, through politics, a wire is given a band, bad or good, to make it successful. Again, the answer is that a bad band will remain bad and, just as no catch phrase will better it, so no wire will make it good. Look through the late-hour program listings of bands on the air and you will find dozens who have had network wires for years and yet remain third- and fourth-raters.

THERE is no arguing with the importance of radio to the bandleader. It has helped me as it has helped others. If what Artie says is true, then there would be no Glenn Millers, no Kay Kysers, no Dorseys, no Hal Kemps, no Bob Crosbys, and no Sammy Kayes. We'd still be plugging along, slowly making our way up the ladder.

Unlike Artie, I have no misgivings about the future of dance music in America. Never before have dance-band leaders been thought of so highly, respected, and even loved by men and women, boys and girls, in all walks of life throughout the country. It is good for the bandleader to be considered in this light and it is good for the people to have this feeling. Never before has there been so much music played in America, and good music, too, for people who want to, and deserve to, kick up a bit and dance or settle back comfortably alongside their radio sets for a bit of lighter musical entertainment; and never before have so many musicians been working, and the outlook is even brighter.

In the future, as at present, the bandleader will continue to be a hard-working fellow with a terrific urge to make his band the best in the business. New bands will be formed and leaders will take them on those brutal one-night tours—and love it. And if they are good, they will become great attractions and make a lot of money. And it will be worth it.

But don't get me wrong. I still think Artie is a sterling musician and a fine clarinet virtuoso.

RADIO GOES TO THE SOUTH POLE

SPANNING the icy wastes of Antarctica, radio again will bring to members of the U. S. Antarctic expedition, headed by Admiral Richard E. Byrd, messages from their relatives and friends to lighten their long, ice-locked months at the bottom of the earth and within reaching distance of the South Pole. Radio again will provide the only connecting link between the intrepid explorers and the civilization they have left behind to explore and claim for their country lands which, some day, may be of the greatest value. Both ships—the "North Star" and the "Bear"—are equipped with receivers capable of receiving not only short-wave broadcasts but regular broadcasts as well, and the two land bases to be established will be similarly equipped. Every other Friday night, beginning February 2, the National Broadcasting Company, in cooperation with the General Electric Company, will broadcast a program of interest to these isolated men and a "Mailbag," in which friends and relatives will send personal messages to members of the party. These programs, sponsored by prominent newspapers, will be heard over an NBC network at 11:30 p.m. EST; 10:30 CST; 9:30 MST; 8:30 PST.

IN THE pages of history, in the convictions of those who remember, in the reverence of those who have been told, William Jennings Bryan was as great a speaker as ever lived. Though this gentleman of the biting tongue was never President of the United States, his fame is more enduring than the men who defeated him.

The days when a poor speaker can vanquish the man of a million golden words have vanished. Those days have been supplanted, via radio, by an era of great speakers who, though they use a different technique from the revered Bryan, nevertheless endeavor to achieve the same effect. Despite his intuitive handling of a mass audience, despite the limpid flow of choice phrases, William Jennings Bryan could never reach the people as our presidential aspirants may today—they had to read Bryan's speeches in the morning newspaper, minus the dramatic Bryan pauses, the brilliant Bryan satire.

Tomorrow's newspaper is for the record these days. When the 1940 political battle starts, America will be treated to the groggiest, dizziest, most vocal three-ring circus ever conducted within our boundaries.

Few men have recognized the power of radio as has Franklin Delano Roosevelt. On that memorable March night in 1933, when the thirty-second President first took to the air from the Oval Room of the White House, a new gauge for American domestic diplomacy was created. Chatting from a fireside that was not there, to perhaps the largest audience of all time, the President asked for faith. He promised to thwart the thirties. And those millions of unseen listeners hung on every word—believed what they heard.

That America heard and believed Franklin Roosevelt was no mere accident, no quirk of hard times. This man is a technician of mass psychology, a talker who reads well, a speaker who extemporizes with a facility that astounds even those familiar with his methods. From a speech crammed to the last letter with meat, Mr. Roosevelt extracts every drop of juice, flavors the dish with an exact portion of the salt and pepper of this superb sarcasm, garnishes the verbal platter with an assortment of vocal eye-raises and heart-warming grins. No mean opponent

in radio debate, Franklin D. Roosevelt speaking alone is formidable.

When the whine of the bullets of satire, the boom of the bombs of bromide are let loose over America's ether within the next few weeks, it will take a neat knowledge of who's who and what's why for the average intelligent listener to make a decision between one assertion and another.

None of us knows, as this is written, whether or not the President of the United States will indulge in 1940's vat of words in his own behalf. Let there be no mistake, however. If Mr. Roosevelt does not choose to run in 1940 and he nonetheless decides to speak, his words will ring from one corner of the land to the other. He will speak with a confidence born of conviction and, perhaps, just a little opportunism. In other words, those aspirants to either the Democratic or Republican nominations had best look to their radio laurels if they would brave the windmill. And unlike Don Quixote, sheer bravado will not carry them very far.

OF FIVE presently leading Democratic possibilities, Roosevelt, Garner, Hull, McNutt and Farley, but two have declared their candidacies—and one of them reserved qualifications. The Vice President, John Nance Garner, seems to be intent on running his campaign either from the front porch of his home in Uvalde, Texas, or from the cloakrooms of the United States capitol. To Mr. Garner, this may appear to be keen psychology, based on the belief that America gets its fill of politics. And Mr. Garner may be right. Come what may, and disregarding his current Chief's radioratorical abilities, the Vice President is smart if he shuns the mike. He is no speaker. In nine years John Nance Garner has made one public address, and that during the 1932 campaign. He seems to be the only presidential aspirant who can get away with not appearing on the radio. He might do it.

Paul V. McNutt, ex-Governor of Indiana, current administrator of the Federal Security Administration, claims the benignity of the White House. With a toothy smile that flashes on and off like a traffic light, with a shock of white hair that gleams like sterling, Mr. McNutt is undoubtedly the Robert

Taylor of 1940 politics. But unfortunately for Mr. McNutt, television is not among us yet. And Mr. McNutt's addresses are rather stodgy. Recently he spoke before Washington's National Press Club. Perhaps he didn't see them, but several people walked out on him. Chiefly, I think, because Americans these days are not interested in banalities supported by beauty and grin. It is quite possible, though, that Paul McNutt will improve his delivery and his content when he faces the mike over the next six months.

Of the others in the Democratic fold, no more can be said than that each is waiting for the other to jump. From a speaker's angle, Postmaster General Farley would appear to have it all over Secretary of State Hull. Mr. Farley has had sufficient said about his marvelous memory for name and face, of his passion for detail. That passion for detail must have carried him through in his speaking ability. For the Farley of today, on a microphone, is not the Farley of 1932. Once a jerky reader, one who frequently lost his place, Farley today reads with éclat—to the point where, at times, he sounds amazingly like the President. Such improved delivery must be due to the little-known fact that the Postmaster General's speeches are typed in enormous "box-car" letters, separated by much white space between the lines.

We have observed that Mr. Farley seems to have the jump on Mr. Hull, but one must not overlook the respect with which Mr. Hull is held in most American minds. Despite his current reciprocal trade difficulties, everybody on the Hill likes Cordell Hull—and darned near everybody respects his opinions. Though he speaks in a high, monotonous voice, totally lacking in astute phrasing or pausing, Mr. Hull usually says something—and people know it. One or two of our aspirants aren't even remotely guilty of that offense.

Now, unlike the Democrats, the Republicans can't count their possibilities on one hand. The sickly elephant can look to five political doctors who have indicated that they're willing to accept a call at any time of day, one very good doctor who might be routed out of bed at the eleventh hour, one general practitioner who had lost his clientele but

who has made a definite comeback recently.

Dr. George Gallup says that today young Thomas E. Dewey, the Republicans' closest approach to a glamour boy, has the best chance for the Republican nomination. Dr. Gallup is probably aware that Mr. Dewey's lead can be attributed to his air personality. All the while that Tom Dewey, in his capacity as New York's district attorney, was busy attending to "Lucky" Luciano, Jimmy Hines and Lepke, he was also very busy taking lessons in how to talk. Previous to that time Tom Dewey had developed a neat baritone singing voice. So much so that he ran a close enough race for the governorship of New York State to frighten Governor Herbert Lehman not a little. Dewey's voice has been well trained. He employs a dramatic technique; he is youth, vigor and bravery incarnate. Tom Dewey is the American conception of the dashing racket-buster. From a radio angle, he is the one big threat to the Democratic stronghold.

IN STRONG antithesis is Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg. There was a time when Mr. Vandenberg made the most comprehensive and the most utterly fatiguing speeches on the floor of the United States Senate. He had a case to state, he stated it thoroughly, he sat down. He has said frequently that he is uninterested in occupying the White House. Paradoxically enough, Mr. Vandenberg's delivery has improved considerably in recent months. Instead of his characteristic drone, he now employs a variety of tone and a change of pace. Somebody has tipped the Senator off. A bit more shading, a little more friendliness in his voice, and Arthur Vandenberg must be reckoned with.

What Senator Vandenberg has done, Senator Robert A. Taft has failed to do. Looking like a thorough, intelligent, somewhat stodgy businessman, Mr. Taft still sounds like one. Perhaps it is because he lacks the public experience of his colleagues. Perhaps it is by intention, but that is doubtful. His convictions have merit, his "curealls" have their points, but Mr. Taft will have to learn that we are an emotional people and none of us is interested in a recitation of the business index, or even the Constitution of the United States. American voters

want their leaders to be human. To date Mr. Taft is very much on the mechanical side.

Now, Senator Styles Bridges is of a different metal than the preceding two statesmen. He lacks no color. Put him before a microphone or an audience with no typed speech and he can almost extemporize Franklin Roosevelt. Unfortunately for Senator Bridges, it's almost impossible to ad-lib a political address these days. And Senator Bridges reads poorly.

Comes next Governor John Bricker of Ohio. Hard-headed but experienced, Mr. Bricker sounds much like he actually is—a personable, well-informed executive. Apparently his radio personality will not enter too vitally into the campaign for the nomination. But should he be nominated, he will need to cultivate a flair for the dramatic, a more comprehensive understanding of American mass psychology.

As to the doctor whom the Republicans may call in a pinch—minority leader of the U. S. House of Representatives Joseph William Martin, Jr.: theoretically, he is not a candidate. In such capacity he has therefore and will therefore make few speeches. Joe Martin is no great speaker. Though a newspaper owner and publisher, he is no great writer. But he is a neighborly, likable gentleman, and his voice and delivery are characteristic.

But one probable candidate remains—the Republican general practitioner, former President Herbert Clark Hoover. The Hoover of 1940 is not the Hoover of a decade ago. He is a rested, younger man today. He speaks now not in the stilted, weary delivery of his term in office but in the glowing, living manner of a man reborn. Herbert Hoover has made a comeback. Whether he wants to—whether it will return him to the White House, is a matter of conjecture.

A political campaign is not a horse-race. You can't always judge your candidates by past performances. It is in the new tricks they learn, the new stride they develop, that the finish is decided. Like the great Man of War, only one man stands out as a pretty sure winner now, if he's in the race. That man is the present President of the United States. But, with proper training and a knowledge of the track, there's always a Seabiscuit.

SIMON BARER, Russian pianist, who had sensational reviews in his New York recital last year, plays the popular B flat minor piano concerto of Tschaikowsky with the New York Philharmonic Sunday.

Rarely heard on the air is Elizabeth Schumann, outstanding concert singer, featured Sunday with the New Friends of Music in five Mozart songs.

On Sunday, Ossy Renardy, brilliant Viennese violinist, will be guest soloist on "Radio City Music Hall of the Air."

Island") was originally meant by Debussy to be included in his "Suite Bergamasque" for piano (the one that contains the beloved "Clair de Lune"). However, it was published in 1904 as a separate piece.

As his subject, the composer took Watteau's painting "Embarquement pour Cythere" (Embarkment for Cythera). Cythera is a Greek island whose name is sometimes substituted for that of Aphrodite-Venus, as she is supposed to have risen from the sea near that place.

Debussy makes his music sensuously suggestive, tinted with poetic imagery and opulent hues, but also rhythmical

Excellent Russian pianist Simon Barer is playing the great Russian concerto of Tschaikowsky; therefore something racial and racy should result.

Such an outpouring of vim, brilliance and passion went into those pages that Tschaikowsky was reproached by purist critics with having written too hastily and been moved more by feeling than by a sense of form.

He showed the composition to the pianist Nicolai Rubinstein, who condemned it unmercifully, but Hans von Bulow accepted the dedication and gave the premiere in 1875—in Boston! Regardless of other opinions, the Bostonians immediately loved the concerto and encored the finale after the several local performances.

The luscious chief melody of the first movement is derived from a tune which Tschaikowsky heard sung by a blind beggar at a village fair. The waltz-like refrain played by the violas and cellos in the second movement is a chansonette called "Dance and Sing, to Be Amused."

The final movement starts with a furious Cossack dance and climaxes with a broad, full-throated, irresistibly triumphant paean of revelry. The entire concerto, universally popular, is unique in style and appeal.

Arthur Rubinstein and the London Symphony Orchestra under John Barbirolli have made a magnificent recording of the concerto for Victor. VM-180 (Alb)—\$10.00.

Of these Mozart songs, "Das Veilschen" (The Violet) is the only one well known. Masterful as he was in other forms of composition, he did not especially shine in solo songs with piano accompaniment. However, that should not be set down to Mozart's detriment. (He was, it should be remembered, not an originator of new forms, but an imaginative developer of old ones.)

Mozart's contemporaries and immediate predecessors, Haydn and Beethoven, were no more successful than he in that field, and it remained for young Schubert to invent the lied and show how descriptive and eloquent it could be made.

Of course, nothing that came from Mozart's pen is without merit musically, and so one finds expressive melody and a fluent vocal line in his songs.

The Brahms quintet ranks high in his list of creations, with its deep sentiment, dramatic moments and episodes of verve and vivacity. For a long while Schumann's famous E flat quintet was the most popular work in that form, but now Brahms' is giving it a close race for supremacy.

The Busch quartet with Rudolph Serkin recorded the Brahms piano quintet only a few months ago. VM-607—\$10.00.

Musician of the Week

(Elisabeth Rethberg)

SO MUCH romantic nonsense has been written about opera singers' dressing-rooms that it comes as a shock to find one that actually conforms to the romantic pattern. Elisabeth Rethberg's dressing-room at the Metropolitan (also used by Lotte Lehmann) has all the trimmings described by the books. Green and silver brocade covers the couch, the curtains of the closet, the dressing-table with its gigantic mirror, and the easy chair. In one corner stands a small piano, in another a door leads to a bathroom. Typical prima-donna touch, a bunch of red roses stands on a shelf. The next act's costume hangs under a protective sheet.

HALF an hour before the first act of "Lohengrin," Rethberg sits at her mirror fussing with a new wig. She wears a long, flowing white-and-gold robe. The wig is platinum blond, the hair reaching to the waist. It is the first time she has worn such a light-colored wig and she is a bit doubtful about it. Mrs. Marchand, her dresser, a small, plump, unflurried woman who has been with Rethberg for twenty-five years, reassures her. The wig is probably Mrs. Marchand's choice. She spends half her time peering into antique shops picking up things to go with Rethberg's costumes. The golden circlet which fits over the long white veil covering the hair, Mrs. Marchand found in Germany. The gold-and-turquoise diadem matching the turquoise-velvet mantle of the second act costume was another Marchand discovery in an old shop in Paris.

Mrs. Marchand pins on the veil while Rethberg braids the platinum hair. The new wig is too flat, so off come crown and veil again, Mrs. Marchand pins a few puffs of hair on top of the wig, and the veil goes back, satisfactorily high this time.

RETHBERG is heavily but not too brightly made up. In the first act Elsa must appear pale and suffering. Karin Branzell, as the villainess Ortrud, comes in for a moment in her dark, flamboyant costume and highly colored make-up. She moans that she sang in Worcester the day before and, "It was so coldt, liebchen. I do not feel so goot," to which Rethberg listens sympathetically. Leopold Sachse, stage director, brings Rethberg a new penny, which he does before all her performances, and reminds her to make her entrance from the proper side of the stage. Erich Leinsdorf, the conductor, trots in, and a flood of German fills the room as he kisses her hand (exactly like the novels). Edward Johnson knocks timidly at the door, also kisses Rethberg's hand, and they both sigh reminiscently over the time when Johnson sang Lohengrin to Rethberg's Elsa—Johnson still looking young and slim enough to fill in for Melchior.

The final knock and "Three minutes, Mme. Rethberg." She dabs on an extra fluff of powder, stands up, kicks her train in place and is ready to go on.

many (tenth century), and his followers are assembled on the river bank near Antwerp. The Duchy of Brabant is without a ruler, for its young heir, Gottfried, has vanished mysteriously. Telramund and his wife, Ortrud, plot to obtain the Duchy, and he accuses Elsa (Princess of Brabant) of having murdered her brother Gottfried. Henry orders Elsa to be tried by ordeal of combat, but no champion appears to defend her against Telramund until a boat approaches drawn by a swan and bearing a knight garbed in resplendent armor.

HERE we have the eternally romantic story of the valiant knight in shining armor come to save ye ladye faire in distress. Of course, before he succeeds, he has to circumvent the machinations of her tormentor (there are two of them in this case) and overthrow him in mortal combat.

The tale covers more than that, however, and the mythological legends (German, Dutch, Belgian) on which it is based go into many side-lines. With his usual sure theatrical instinct, Wagner eliminates most of them and changes others to meet the needs for active drama and musical illustration. In the main, he has combined two different legends, one about the Swan-knight, and the other about the Holy Grail and its guardians.

In 1850, when Wagner was a political refugee in Switzerland, Liszt, his greatest admirer (and subsequent father-in-law), premiered "Lohengrin" at Weimar. The opera was phenomenally successful and traveled to all the important stages, which made the still-exiled composer say that he was the only German who had not heard "Lohengrin"! In 1861 he was permitted to return to his native land and then he had his initial hearing of the work.

The libretto story, briefly, runs as follows: Henry the Fowler, King of Ger-

He asks for Elsa's hand in marriage, provided she shall never ask him who he is or whence he came. She has dreamed of just such a protector and she consents happily. Thereupon Lohengrin strikes down Telramund in their duel but spares his life.

In the second act the ungrateful Telramund and Ortrud plot further against Elsa and try to persuade her to ask Lohengrin the forbidden questions. The knight again frustrates the plotters and he and Elsa are married.

The third act finds the newlyweds in their bridal chamber. Elsa (finally influenced by the insinuations of Ortrud) breaks her promise and insists upon knowing her husband's name and origin. Telramund bursts in to assassinate Lohengrin but is himself killed by the former's magic sword.

In the final scene, again on the river bank, Lohengrin sadly reveals his identity and takes farewell. He is the son of Parsifal and knight of the Holy Grail! The swan reappears to bear the hero away, when Ortrud proclaims herself a sorceress and confesses that the bird, enchanted by her, really is the missing Gottfried. Lohengrin breaks the spell, sails away forever (the boat now is drawn by a white dove) and Elsa dies in the arms of her restored brother.

Who Wins the "POT O' GOLD"?

How Horace Heidt's "selector" saved a home, helped a church, while it thrilled America

THE secret ambition of the average American radio listener these days is to have his telephone ring just before 9 o'clock, eastern time, some Tuesday night. Of course lots of telephones do ring just before 9 o'clock, eastern time, on Tuesday nights. But only one of them will have a voice on the other end that says, "This is the 'Pot o' Gold' program. We are sending you \$1,000 by telegraph!"

It's a modern Klondike, this new and startling program which in the space of four months has seen its Crossley rating of popularity zoom up to a bulging figure of twenty-one. That means almost one out of every four families listening to the radio between 8:30 and 9 p.m. has its dials tuned to Horace Heidt and his "Pot o' Gold." Which, in the annals of radio entertainment, is almost unprecedented.

The lure of free gold, unexpected and without toil, has been dubbed the root of all evil. Avarice, greed, unhappiness are invariably reputed to follow in its wake.

But the "Pot o' Gold" and its free \$1,000 given away each week seem to upset this time-honored axiom. The records show that the money has done a startling amount of good in every case, performing such heart-warming tasks as the rehabilitation of families beset by hard luck, helping a small-town clerk pay for his home, and even giving a preacher funds with which to start a new church! In fact, you'll find not a single blemish on its unbroken record for doing good.

If you've never bent an ear to this program, here's the way it runs. There's a complex and highly unpredictable mechanism called the "selector," which whizzes through a master library of telephone books from all parts of the nation. The "selector" not only narrows out a certain book but even designates the page and a single name on that page. A phone call is then put through to the chosen party. Should the call be answered, the individual whose name was chosen gets \$1,000. If the ring goes unanswered, then the party is presented only \$100, with the remaining \$900 being added to the following week's pot.

Of the first fourteen calls made—dating to the start of 1940—only five went unanswered. The "selector" plays no favorites, for the golden shower has fallen in many diverse corners of the country. Always benevolently, however, for not one of the recipients has been a person to whom the money did not mean much.

Take, for example, the Connecticut

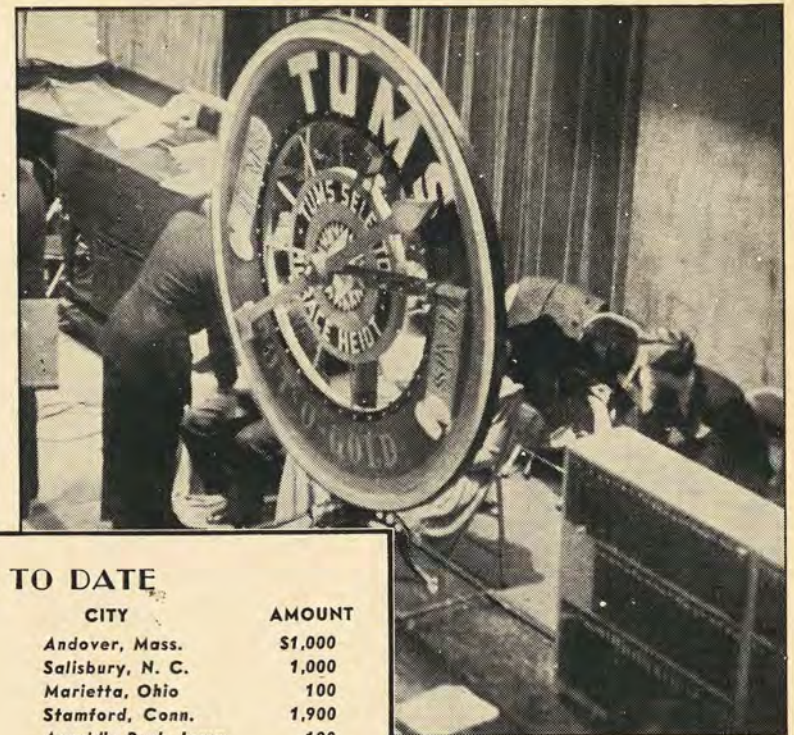

housemover with four children who had been forced to give up his home because his life had financially been too much up-hill. To him came a two-week accumulation of \$1,900—a golden windfall that enabled this typical American to buy back his house, reestablish his family life, and face 1940 with hope, all because the wily "Pot o' Gold" selector picked his name from a welter of the nation's telephone subscribers.

Out in Norwalk, Ohio, there is a busy, happier housewife this winter. Although her husband was injured four years ago and can no longer work, she now knows that her family has a far better outlook than before a certain Tuesday when the phone rang and a voice from Radio City announced them to be \$1,000 richer. They were previously so poor that even a few dollars to repair a broken radio set could not be mustered. A new receiver was one of her first purchases.

AND there have been other commonplace, hard-working Americans on the list of the lucky—a Florida exterminator, an Ohio paperhanger, a Massachusetts woodworker and a Michigan grocery clerk. The latter individual has used his gift—a three-week total of \$2,800—to finish paying for his small and modest home. The public likes to see this money go to deserving people and often the studio applause is thunderous when a phone call reveals that the recipient is employed at a simple, down-to-earth occupation.

Probably one of the most interesting

will go a long way in helping my struggling congregation carry out our plans. When our church is finished it will stand as a lasting monument to the Horace Heidt program."

One of the biggest chunks of "Pot o' Gold" cash—a mere \$2,800—went to Henry Wilpolt, a railway engineer from Kaukauna, Wisconsin, who has a regular day's run on the Chicago & North Western. Mr. Wilpolt had just come home on that memorable night, after rolling his locomotive into the roundhouse, and was eating supper, when a member of the family snapped on the radio. The music of Horace Heidt filled the room.

As they ate, the family listened to the program. The "selector" went through its unpredictable gyrations which pick the telephone number to be called. "Just think," said Mr. Wilpolt's son-in-law, "that call could go anywhere in the whole United States."

And at that moment the phone began to ring!

"New York is calling Mr. Henry Wilpolt," droned the toll operator. It was one of those breathless events which can never be forgotten in an entire lifetime.

SEVERAL hundred brother engineers, many of whom he had never met, wrote and congratulated this Wisconsin man. From Hollywood actor Hugh O'Connell wired his greetings—for O'Connell remembered Wilpolt from years before when the screen star had been a "call boy" for the Chicago & North Western. It was in the days when most engineers had no telephones and if the railroad needed a throttle-man for an early morning special run, the "call boy" was sent to throw pebbles at his bedroom window.

A flood of mail usually follows on the heels of all "Pot o' Gold" windfalls. Many of them are from well-wishers, but an equal number originate with people selling oil stock, shares in busi-

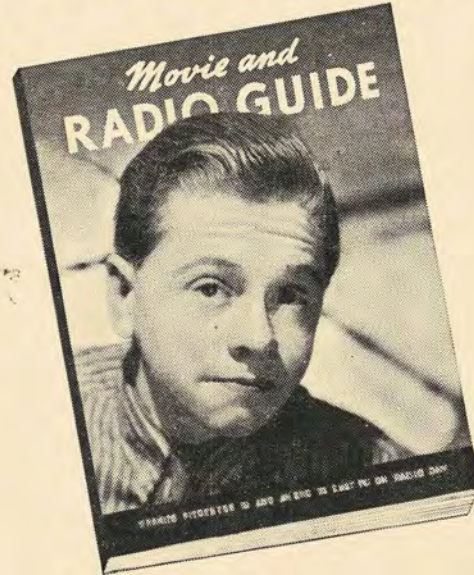

LET'S LISTEN TO "LITTLE AMERICA"

AFTER an unbroken polar silence of some years, "Little America" will soon be on the air again. The Byrd Expedition, now nearing Antarctica, will use short wave extensively, both for local and for international communication purposes.

The first broadcasts from Antarctica, subsequently to be made every two weeks, will originate from the expedition's west base, a new site for "Little America," 100 miles east of the 150th meridian. This camp will be equipped with two 500-watt short-wave transmitters, one of which will establish commercial contacts with American networks, using the call KRTK; the other, an amateur station to be known as KC4USA.

After the west base has been established, the ships will backtrack to Valparaiso, Chile, to refuel, and then set up the east base on Alexander Land, south of the southernmost tip of South America. Here the commercial transmitter will operate under the call KRTC; the amateur transmitter, under the call KC4USB.

The great, lumbering snow-cruiser, also completely radio-equipped, houses commercial short-wave trans-

mitter KRTA and amateur transmitter KC4USC.

In addition, there will be twenty-five low-power outpost stations, including nine radio-equipped dog sleds and powerful transmitters in each of the expedition's five planes.

Amateur transmitters KC4USA, KC4USB and KC4USC will operate optionally on 7.075 megs in the 40-meter band, 14.15 megs in the 20-meter band, or 28.300 megs in the 10-meter band.

Commercial transmitters KRTK, KRTC and KRTA will be heard on experimental frequencies 6.425, 9.135, 11.06, 12.862 or 23.100 megs, as well as special commercial and mobile frequencies.

En route to Antarctica, when the expedition stopped at Pitcairn Island, they found supplies of food, clothing and medicine very low (as predicted by RADIO GUIDE some weeks ago). Radio operators repaired the island's single radio receiver, but their only means of contact with the outside world, transmitter VR6AY, after having been repaired in Panama, is still stranded there, awaiting some means of transportation back to its south-seas home.

FROM THE EUROPEAN ARENA: Members of the International DX'ers Alliance report Lahti, Finland, short-wave stations OFE (11.78) and OFD (9.50) are still being heard when conditions are favorable. . . . A new series of timely talks entitled "What Is This Freedom," in which freedom as understood in a democracy and its place in the ordinary life of the British man and woman is discussed and analyzed by Sir William Beveridge, may be heard from London weekly, Tuesdays at 10 p.m. EST over GSC (9.58) and GSL (6.11).

THE NEWS IN BRIEF: Chicago is soon to have its first of the new-type, frequency-modulated short-wave broadcast stations. To be installed and operated by the Zenith Radio Corporation, it will broadcast with a power of 1,000 watts on a frequency of 42.8 megs. . . . NBC's new steerable antenna is constructed so that the narrow beam of signals which it radiates may be swung across South America through an angle of twenty degrees merely by touching a push-button. Thus its effective signal strength of more than 600,000 watts power can be concentrated on main centers of population which lie along the coast and can be shifted so that the greatest possible listening audience may be reached, first on the East Coast, and then, as the evening progresses, on the West Coast. This arrangement

gives our short-wave stations a distinct advantage over those of Europe, which have to spread their beams fanwise across the continent at all hours and therefore cannot concentrate on particular centers of population to any great extent or separate their Spanish and Portuguese programs. . . . VLV3 (11.83), Perth, West Australia, actually operates from 3 to 10:30 a.m. EST (Sundays to 9:30 a.m.), but the best hours of reception are from 8 a.m. EST on. . . . I want to once more call your attention to CR7BE (9.65), Lourenco Marques, Mozambique, Portuguese East Africa, which is transmitting experimentally from 2 to 4 p.m. EST. The signals from this station at times reach tremendous volume. If you have never heard Africa direct here's your chance. . . . The India stations on the 60-meter band, namely, VUD2 (4.96), Delhi; VUC2 (4.84), Calcutta; VUB2 (4.88), Bombay, and VUM2 (4.92), Madras, are being heard throughout the United States with fine signals from about 7:30 a.m. EST on. The news in English is given at 7:30 a.m. EST. . . . The recent earthquakes in Turkey apparently did not harm short-wave station TAP (9.465) at Ankara; as it was heard one afternoon last week with excellent signals up to its regular sign-off time at 4:30 p.m. EST.

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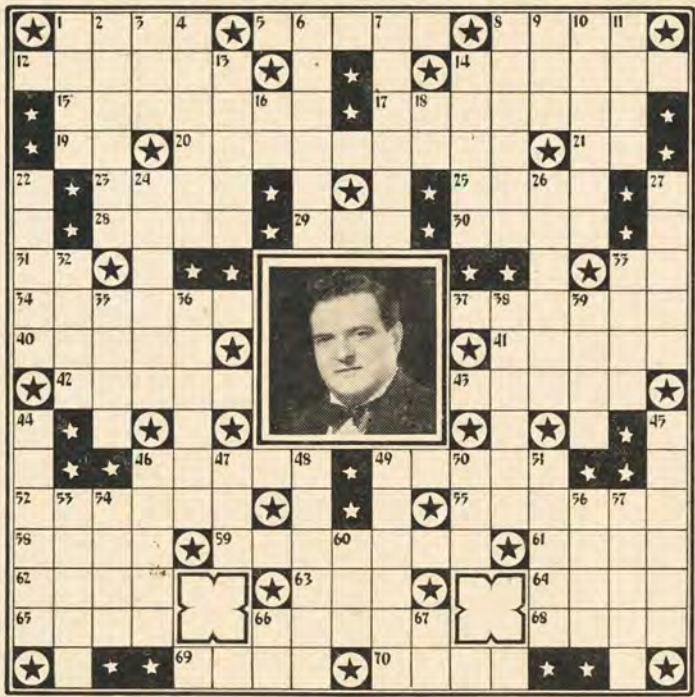

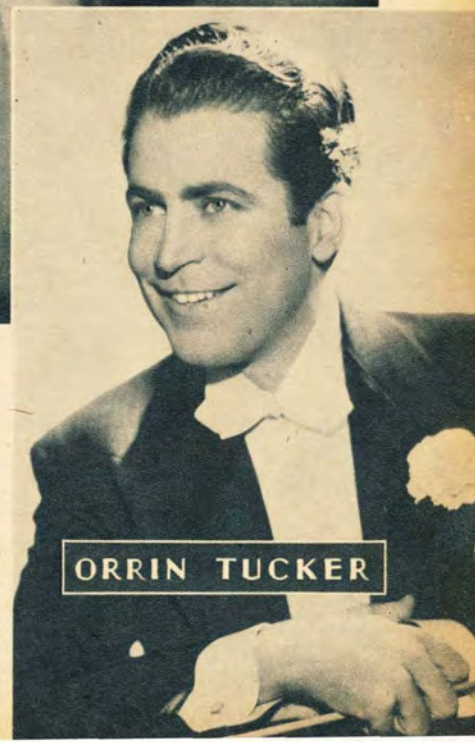
The "OH JOHNNY, OH JOHNNY" Girl

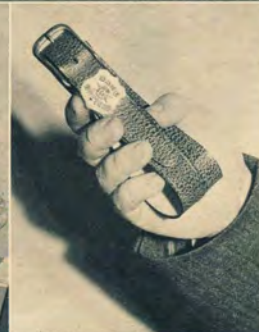

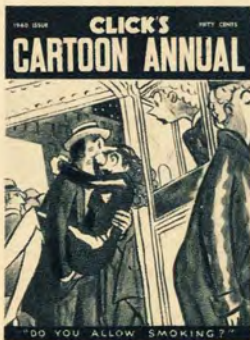
