

Permanent loss of tape sound quality can occur if one allows the hears to become demagnetized. Iron, steel, and similar metals will become permanently magnetized in prolonged presense of a pluruating magnetic field. Since recording tape is a magnetic, heads can become magnetized just from continued playing. The more one "plays" with his machine (frequent starts, stops, fast speed, etc.), the quicker the heads become demagnetized.

Magnetization is also caused by the abrupt collapsing of current to the heads. Thus the very act of shutting off the machine will cause magnetization. One should note that most machines have the necessary electronic circuitry to dampen or retard current collapse when turned off. However, when turned off and on by a timer or in power outages, this circuitry is ineffective.

Generally, machines should be demagnetized after 8-10 hours of playing or after each use of an automatic timer. One should remember to demagnetize all metal parts contacted by the cape, not just the heads.

Demagnetization techniques are simple. The demagnetizer should be brought in close promisity of the heads(direct contact not required), then and only then, turn it on. With a small circular motion, withdraw the demagnetizer back about 4-5 feet, and then turn it off, but not before then. Withdrawal rate should slower the closer the head; it should take about 10 seconds to go the first 6 inches. Do each head seperately.

Whatever you do, don't try to use a bulk eraser to demagnetize. It is much too powerful. It can damage VU meter and permanently magnetize the heads.

Dubbing-

Now for a few pointers on copying and dubbing tape recordings. Significant care and attention should be used since the copy you make will not be as good quality as the original. Tape hiss is said to increase about 3db each time a copy is made. Therefore, only about 5 generations of recording is possible unless great care is taken.

The first tip would be to use the highest audio signal possible to overcome any hiss, i.e. higher signal to noise ratio. Keep the VU meter at zero with frequent excursions into the red. The slight distortion you get while in the red will not be noticeable in speech.

The proper hook-up in dubbing is to go direct from tape deck to tape deck without going through an amplifier. The fewer stages of amplification the signal goes through, the less distortion will result. The only time when you should go through your amplifier is when the signal needs modification; sore bass or treble.

Use your better quality deck to play and the lesser machine to record for less noise.

Dubbing should be done at normal speed using one track at a time. If dubbed at high speed, unless you have a super machine, all frequencies above 15khz will be lost since these will be at 30khz at double speed. Loss of the high frequencies will cause the sound to be flat and bassy.

Also at double speed, one must remember that the signal energy has increased by a factor of four. This level can well overtax the ability of the elctronics and the heads. Keep the VU meter well under control. Whatever you do, don't both double track and double speed since the increased energy is most apt to cause cross-talk. Editor's Note: Thanks very much, Jack, for this help. If we follow the tips you have given us in the last two issues of Return With Us Now we will all enjoy our collections more than ever.

HOW IT WORKS - We have had many questions on how the RHAC operates and since we have so many new members this might be a good time to explain

many of our activities.

Meetings-We have no permanent place to have our meetings so we must look around each month for the most convenient place. Evening meetings are usually the best attended. We try to keep business to a minimum and have interesting guest speakers.

Blank tape-We have a contract with Ampex tape. We get very good quality tape at a very low price. You can order tape from Dick Mullins by mail

or at any meeting. Prices available on request.

Tape Library-We have a fine tape library. At this time we have over 160 reels available for rental. Our "old" library has about 100 reels in various sound qualities. They may be ordered from Ernie Jessen. They are 50¢ each for rental. You may request a catalog to check the quality before ordering. We also have our "new" library of about 60 reels. They are available from Jack Richards for \$1 per reel. They are available at meetings or by mail. The "new" library reels are all in excellent sound quality or they will not be accepted in the library. We ask that tapes be dubbed and passed on within one week. If a member wishes to donate a tape to the library contact Jack and blank tape will be given to your use. Remember, they must be in excellent sound quality.

Newsletter-We publish a monthly newsletter and try to make it as interesting as possible for our readers. We rely for stories from our members. We look for old radio magazines all the time in order to get stories. If you are trying to sell equipment, trade tapes, have any comments on radio or the RHAC we will always help you by printing them. If you have been "taken" by a repair shop or a tape dealer we will be able to warn others through the newsletter. I will not, however, downgrade any indi-

vidual, OTR club, or another newsletter at any time.

Exhibits-We have had several exhibits in the past. It is a great way to gain new members. We have had great fun, too. We anticipate many more of these exhibits and ask for your support.

Charity Work- Over the past few years many of our members have given tapes to the blind and we always will support this work. Please send any excellent sounding donated tapes to Dick Mullins. We also have been involved in the past in spending evenings at nursing homes to provide entertainment for many senior citizens. We want to get into this more actively in the future.

The RHAC will try to provide tapes for your collections, good buys on tapes for you, a place to advertise items for sale, an interesting newsletter for your enjoyment and many other things. We ask for your cooperation. We need your ideas on how to run things better, items for

the newsletter and your time to help in RHAC activities.

as such. In 1929 and for 30 years on radio and then on television, we tuned in regularly to "Amos 'n' Andy". Their Fresh Air Taxicab Company of America, Incorpulated, was a weighty title for one rickety cab that was always falling apart. Their misadventures and fractured English, like "I's regusted!" tickled us all. The show, heard regularly by 42 million people, was so popular that movie theaters would stop a film to pipe in the program.

Amos was simple and industrious; Andy, lazy and bungling; the Kingfish, a shady schemer. We laughed when Kingfish got Andy to remove his pants by playing doctor in order to steal a valuable old nickle from the pants, then lost the nickle in a telephone coin slot as he eagerly called the coin dealer. We chuckled at Andy's explanation when Amos wondered how a store could be out of so many things: "Well, it's a mighty big store".

On Tuesday nights, we followed the antics of Fibber McGee and Molly. We were conditioned to laugh every time the closet door was opened with the crashing sounds of a lifetime of useless objects falling out, along with Fibber's "Gotta straighten out that closet one of these


days".

Jack Benny evoked laughs with his fictional characterization of a conceited, stingy man. Always the straight man, he seldom told jokes but brought roars when he was held up by a robber growling, "Your money or your life!" and responded with a long silence. When the robber per-

sisted with a menacing "Well?" Benny's reply was "I'm thinking it over".
Witty sardonic Fred Allen did not fare well in television but was devastating in radio. He would tell of the scarecrow that scared the crows so well that they brought back the corn they'd stolen two years

On the "Burns and Allen Show", George's vanity about his singing was always good for a chuckle as when Gracie told him he was a better singer than Bing Crosby and he replied, "I'm not better than Crosby-as good, maybe." Ioyal Gracie said, "I won't be happy till your voice leaves the whole world the way it leaves me-weak and limp."

Bob Hope, tireless entertainer of our armed forces, could deliver jokes with machine-gun mirth: "I've been down at Palm Springs but I had to come back-ran out of cosigners ... I mingled with the 400 while I was there. In Palm Springs they don't care how many people they put in



your room".

Red Skelton, the eternal clown, as Clem Kadiddlehopper had a hundred ways to resist his romantic-minded girl friend, Daisy June. When she told him, "Listen to them June bugs all snuggled down cozy in the grass, chirping away. Clem, why can't we do something like that?" Clem's response was, "Shucks, Daisy June, I can't rub my hind legs together to chirp like them bugs".

Groucho Marx was a master of funny word play in his movies and on his quiz show, "You Bet Your Life" He could keep you in stitches with lines like "I'd horse-whip you, if I had a horse". Once a pretty young tennis star, asked about training, said she needed to improve her form and speed. Groucho observed, "If your

form improves, you're going to need all the speed you can master".

Ed Wynn, the Texaco Fire Chief, could make us laugh with sallies like "My goodness, everyone knows what a married woman is. That's someone who has nothing to wear and six closets to keep it in". Or "I was just carrying a jar of jelly wrapped in a newspaper when it fell on the ground and broke. You should see the jam Dick Tracy is in today".

Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy brought us many a laugh, especially when their steady guest, W.C.Fields, had verbal feuds with the brash wooden dummy. There was Charlie's dubious defense of Bergen, "I want you to know that Bergen's just as honest as you, you crook, you!" And Field's reply, "You'd better come out of the sun, Charles, before you get unglued". Charlie's query topped everything: "Do you mind if I stand in the shade of your nose?"

There was Eddie Cantor with Bert Gordon as the Mad Russian explaining, "I'm a travel agent. In fact, traveling is mine hobo". Cantor corrected him, "You don't mean hobo, you mean hobby". Gordon retorted, "You travel on your salary; I'll travel on mine".

"Easy Aces" added to our laughter when Goodman Ace told his Jane he didn't think she was what it takes to become an actress. Her malaprop response: "Not much, I haven't. I've always had the smell of goose grease in my blood, I've always dreamed of seeing my name up in tights"

Garry Moore would tell of the romantic singer who had quite a following-his wife kept three detectives on his trail. Teamed with Jimmy Durante, Moore once spoke of attending kindergarten and grammar school in Baltimore. Durante claimed the same attendance. When Moore added, "And I graduated", Durante came back, "Too much education is a dangerous thing".

There were others. We loved them all, for they brought us laughter. Few gifts are as precious.

NEW INFORMATION ON SAM SPADE AND A NEW SAM SPADE! . . BY IRVING HALE

I am greatly indebted to Scott McCoy for furnishing me the data that is the source of both this article and one that will appear in next month's Return With Us Now. He furnished a log of Sam Spade programs as well as a great deal of background material. As near as I can tell, this information is new. At least, I have never seen it elsewhere in print, and no dealers whose catalogs I've encountered have dated their programs, except the ones where Sam gave the date in his report to his secretary, Effie.

Sam Stade ran from July 12, 1946 through April 20, 1951. Howard Duff was Spade until Sept. 17, 1950; then, after a brief hiatus, Steve Dunne completed the series, starting November 17, 1950. There were 230 half-hour programs in all, of which Dunne did 23 and Duff the rest.

Of this line-up, two were two-part shows. (One of these, "The Kandy Tooth Caper", has survived.) Four programs were repeated and no titles are given for eight of them, presumably being unavailable.

It is a pity that fewer than 10% of this glorious series has survived, as far as I can determine. As of a month ago, there were only 21 programs around that I could unearth. They are given below, in chronological order:

All of these programs were done by Howard Duff, except the last two which were Dunne's. Quality of programs range from VG+ to EXCELL-ENT, except for the "One Hour" and "Gold Key" capers which were taken off of a wire recorder. The dealer says that "G" on those programs stands for "Good"; I say "Ghastly".

Casual analysis of the broadcasts available reveals no deep pattern. Certainly, there are a few close together that were probably taken off at the same time, but for the most part, they constitute a

good sample of the entire run.

After I had completed the above compilation, I learned to my great joy that another program had turned up. Once again, I am obliged to Scott McCoy for this knowledge. His collection of catalogs is as formidable as his acquisition of program logs, and in his latest Radio Reruns catalog, there appears "The Fairly Bright Caper", which is dated 10/31/48. I am looking forward to obtaining and listening to this new rediscovery.

If anyone knows of other SS programs available that have not been mentioned, I would greatly appreciate hearing of them. I refer to the series, and not to related programs such as "The Maltese Falcon" on Academy Award Theater and Screen Guild Theater, or the Suspense program, "The House in Cypress Canyon", in which Howard Duff played a

detective from San Francisco, named Sam.

Next month's article will discuss the origin of the series, and the people involved in its success.
