On October 28, 1979 the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin, the radio priest of the depression who commanded a weekly audience of 40 million before being silenced by his superiors in the Roman Catholic Church, died at his home in suburban Detroit. He was 88 years old and had been ill for several years.

He was born, Charles Edward Coughlin in Oct. 25, 1891, the son of an Indiana-born Great Lakes seaman, Thomas Coughlin, who married Amelia Mahoney, a Canadian, and settled in Hamilton, Ontario. He was noted for his attacks on the administration of Franklin D. Roosevelt.
