RADIO GOES TO WAR


(The following article is from the Preface of Radio Goes to War, The Fourth Estate, by Charles J. Rolo. Copyright 1940, 1941, 1942. Published by G.P. Putnam's Sons, New York. I hope that you find it as interesting and informative as I did.)

At 2:26 PM on the afternoon of December 7, 1941, a New York radio station interrupted a broadcast of a football game to announce that Japanese planes and naval forces had attacked Hawaii. Within a few minutes American broadcasters were reporting, with record-breaking speed, the swiftly-moving developments of the most momentous news event in the history of U.S. radio- the news of the United States entry into World War II.

Immediately all the networks went on a 24-hour-a-day basis. In the space of four minutes the Columbia Broadcasting System switched from its scheduled World News to a war roundup with Bob Trout from London, Albert Warner from Washington, and Major George Fielding Eliot from New York. Less than 20 minutes after the first news of hostilities, the voice of Ford Wilkins came in from Manila, 9000 miles away, with a first-hand report of the outbreak of a new war. In just over 90 minutes the National Broadcasting Company put Honolulu on the air. And in the course of the afternoon and evening, CBS, NBC and the Mutual Broadcasting System brought listeners a succession of dramatic on-the-spot broadcasts from the Pacific war theater.

Meanwhile, on the home front, commentator followed commentator in a frantic attempt to keep pace with and evaluate for a tensely anxious public the flood of dispatches and unconfirmed reports. At the same time, radio took on the job of flashing to the national official government announcements and orders to the men in the services. Stations throughout the country announced the civilian defense measures taken in various cities and the instructions issued to factories to guard against sabotage; requested gasoline stations to remain open all night to facilitate the return of military personnel, and broadcast nationwide appeals for enlistments.

Upon receiving the first news of the war in the Pacific, the radio networks, press associations, and great newspapers, immediately put their short-wave listening posts on a round-the-clock schedule and manned every available transmitter to pick up the stream of bulletins and propaganda from abroad that poured in over the ether. From Tokyo came the announcement that a state of war had been declared to exist between Japan and the



United States, and ominous claims of U.S. warships damaged or sunk and grounded planes destroyed in the initial surprise attack. Later, the British Broadcasting Corporation reported a Japanese attack on Singapore. Premier Curtin of Australia was heard over short wave announcing that Australia would go to war against Japan. Radio Roma declared that in accordance with the Three Power Pact a state of war existed between the Axis powers and the United Statesand later denied its own report. Berlin broadcast Manchukuo's declaration of war on the United States and, quoting Tokyo, reported the first attack on Hong Kong and the success of Japanese landing operations in the Malayan peninsula. The radios of Costa Rica and Nicaragua broadcast declarations of war on Japan, while from stations in Cuba and Panama came pledges of solidarity with the United States. On all fronts radio was first with the news.

In the studios of U.S. international stations the switch-over to a wartime basis was accomplished without a hitch. Long-prepared for this eventuality and geared for prompt and vigorous action on the battle-ground of the ether, U.S. international broadcasters were well equipped to counter, from thirteen powerful transmitters, the intensified propaganda onslaught of the Axis powers and to put the American Case, swiftly and aggresively, before the world's radio listeners.

Thus U.S. radio went to war.

AN INTERESTING LETTER FROM A COLLECTOR by John Adams

I'm a collector of political memorabilia, and when going through the July Mountain States Collector I noted the story about your radio club. With a name like John Adams you could certainly qualify for collecting political pins, ribbons, etc.

When I was in an antique shop the other day, the owner showed me a spoon which had Gene and Glenn--Quaker Early Birds printed on the handle. She asked me if I knew what that referred to and I guessed they were early radio entertainers.

A couple of days later I saw the notice about your club, so that's the reason for this letter. Is my guess a good one? In case you don't know one way or the other, would you be kind enough to ask other members if Gene and Glenn were on radio?

Could you have answered this request? Well, I couldn't. I was able to piece together some facts about Gene and Glenn from my memory. It was a 15 minute early morning show in the 30's and the sponsor had to be Quaker Oats. Silver spoons were a big item during the 1932-33 Chicago World's Fair. Later on, radio offers were gold charms and the kid items of rings, badges, shaker mugs, etc.

I talked to John Lloyd on the phone and he read the article from Tune in Yesterday on Gene and Glenn. They were on from Chicago in the 30's. Gene sang and Glenn played the piano but they were best known for their skits of Jake and Lena. They broke up and Gene went on to play Lena the maid on the Fibber McGee and Molly show.

John Dunning says that he has not heard any of the Gene and Glenn shows but that there are some Fibber McGee and Molly shows around with Lena the maid. Hey, John, how about playing some of those shows for us.

SOME FINAL WORDS

According to my calculations, this is the 62nd issue of Return With Us Now. It is my 32nd issue as editor, and last. Let's see, at an average of 10 hours work per newsletter (although some don't look it) that's 320 hours of writing, printing, stapling, pulling staples out of fingers, stamping, cussing, rewriting and mailing. I pay my \$10 just like you do, plus I have ALWAYS tried to make things better for us all. When you reach 320 hours of work you will get my written apology. Enough of that nonsense.


I deeply appreciate every member who sent in interesting articles for Return With Us Now over the years I have editted the newsletter. It
