

NEW MEETING PLACE





TAPE PRICE HIKE

We have been informed by the Ampex Tape Company that they have increased the price of their reel to reel tape to \$1.75 per 1200' reel. A case of 40 reels will be \$70.00 (\$80.00 for out of town members). We previously have been able to give you all some advance notice of these tape price increases but they did not give us any notice this time so the prices are now in effect. While these prices sound a little high at first sight it is still the best buy around. You can't touch those prices in a retail store.

OUT WEST

SINCE ANCIENT TIMES, travelers have been the prime source of information on distant lands and other cultures. But until the twentieth century, the world had never seen a traveler like Lowell Thomas.

The son of teachers Harry and Harriet Thomas was born April 6, 1892, in Woodington, Ohio, Harry soon earned a medical degree and set up practice Out West near the Cripple Creek diggings in Victor, Colorado. When he wasn't mending ming injuries and the like, Harry was building a 3,000-book library, which he encouraged his son to use.

Young Lowell sold newspapers in the rough saloons and had a boyhood crush on his Sunday school teacher, future speakeasy queen Texas Guinan. His father insisted that he learn the art of elocution, reasoning that a man who could speak clearly would always have a place in the world.

The boom days ending, Lowell's family moved back to Ohio in 1907. After attending Northern Indiana University, he returned to Cripple Creek to report for and then edit a local newspaper. At nineteen he moved to Denver for some free-lance writing and more degrees from the University of Denver. Chicago was next, where he entered law school and wrote for the Chicago Journal.

After uncovering a blackmail scheme against the city's top meat-packers, Thomas was off on an expense-paid railroad trip to the San Francisco World's Fair. (The railroad furnished the passage in return for glowing reports.) He stopped in Denver long enough to have a marriage proposal turned down by DU friend Fran Ryan.

In San Francisco, he bought a movie camera to take on a trip into the Yukon. Here he filmed his first travelogue, which he showed to social groups after moving to Princeton to study constitutional law. Former university president Woodrow Wilson named him to head a "See America First" campaign, but World War I intervened. Thomas

finally married Ryan, and they honeymooned in war-torn Europe.

In Venice, Thomas met Gen. Sir Edmund Allenby and arranged to follow him to the Near East as a journalist. While haggling over the price of dates in Jerusalem, Thomas stumbled on the biggest story of his life. Standing in a group of sheiks was a dashing blond, blue-eved Englishman in robes of the desert. Thomas joined Col. T.E. Lawrence, who was helping fight the Turks, on his famous campaign and told the world of its latest hero in his best-selling With Lawrence in Arabia.

Back home, his lectures with movies were in great demand. Thomas soon tired of touring and bought an estate in Pawling, New York, where he could write. Before settling down, he toured Afghanistan, Malava, and Burma, so he had a wealth of material to draw from. His second book, Beyond Khyber Pass, cemented him as

the country's favorite travel author. A millionaire at thirty-five, he would write over fifty books filled with adventure and intrigue.

Thomas had seen his first crystal radio set in 1923, the year son Lowell Jr. was born. Seven years later, Thomas entered broadcasting history. Someone had suggested to CBS head William S. Palev that Thomas might be a perfect successor to newsman Floyd Gibbons. The show's sponsor liked Thomas but wanted to hear him in action.

September 29, 1930, was a confusing day for the assembled writers and experts. Frustrated. Thomas walked out at 4 P M., bought a newspaper, returned at 6, strolled up to the microphone and said. "Good evening, everybody." When he had finished "telling" the news, he signed off with "So long until tomorrow," establishing a forty-five-year pattern.

Thomas modestly credited much of his popularity to his time slot before "Amos and Andy" "I had the whole world to myself," he once mused. "Cronkite was nine. Brinkley was five, and Harry Reasoner was a two-year-old. The rest of them weren't even born." In 1933 he became the voice of Movietone News newsreels, and in 1940 he delivered the first televised newscast for NBC.

War reporting filled the early forties, during the final thrust in the Pacific, he was heard from underground tombs on the Philippine island of Luzon. Toward the end of the war, audiences heard their impartial announcer nearly come apart while describing Nazi death camps.

In 1949. Thomas and his son traveled to Lhasa, the capital of Tibet, obtaining the first pictures and interviews with the teen-age Daiai Lama Returning, a horse threw him on a mountain pass, shattering his leg and hip in eight places. Carried on a platform over 200 miles of impossible road at 14,000 feet. I owell recorded sixteen daily newscasts, sending them ahead by runner.

His first television series. "High Adventure," began in the fifties. On one show he mer with a group of New Guinea cannibals just after they'd had a rival tribe for dinner.

Fran died in 1975 after a fifty-eight-year marriage, and CBS took him off the air on May 14, 1976. A thirty-nine week PBS series, "Lowell Thomas Remembers," came next. In 1977 he published the first of his two-volume memoirs and married Marianna Munn in Hawaii. In 1980 he delivered the seconding speech for Ronald Reagan at the Republican National Convention. On August 29, 1981, he died in his sleep at his Pawling home of a heart attack at age eighty-nine.

Lowell Thomas crammed centuries of living into one lifetime. He knew the world firsthand yet retained his down-home attitude, becoming the most famous globetrotter since Marco Polo.
