He's the voice of Denver. You can't mistake it. Kind of smooth, but not lounge lizardy. Kind of big city, but peaceful. He says, "My friends" a lot.

Like after a Fats Domino record. "Now there my friends, is a gentleman."

It's Ray Durkee. The Duke of Durk. Mr. Oldies.

Fifteen years of Sundays he's been hosting Sunday at

the Memories on radio station KHOW.

Bringing vou the winners of spinners, waxes to watch, wild childs, mounds of sound designed with you in mind. A gentle voice of nostalgia and class

He's the original oldies deejay in Denver. He started doing the oldies back when the other stations were mired in disco.

I started listening to him in 1973 when I was a downtown kamikaze driving armored trucks for Wells Fargo. Durkee was spinning oldies, and I was fighting traffic on 17th and Cherry.

He'd play Satisfaction and I couldn't

I way a young dude with the rage. I could splash an entire block of Christmas shoppers waiting for the bus on 16th Street to the tune of Wild Thing.

They'd freeze in place, fists and fingers aloft.

But you can only listen to Greenback Dollar, so many times. Then you have to play it. So after I got fired from Wells Fargo I bought a guitar and hit the road.

I'd miss the Durk.


Luckily, Sundays are traveling days for musicians. Driving down from Canada, blasting through Montana, singing at the windshield, busting my knuckles on the radio knobs trying to find some decent music, the Beach Boys came on. And the voice. My man the Durk.

The home voice. The syndicated

The home voice. The syndicated home voice that is. He was everywhere. Syndicated on 80 stations. Wherever I was on the road, the Durk and I would spend Sundays together. Him on the radio and me driving. Pounding Wipeout on the steering wheel. Stomping out Locomotion on the floor of Big Red the traveling GMC pickup.

In the Virgin Islands I'd listen to the

In the Virgin Islands I'd listen to the Durk count down the top 500 songs of all time. In alphabetical order.



Durk.
Oldies were my life. Still are. Every show was a time capsule back to my high

After all these years of listening to him, I swore if I ever got a writing job, I'd write a story about him.

I've always wanted to "do" dinner with a show-biz type, so the Durk and I did dinner at a joint on 120th Avenue.

I told the gruent the area.

I told the guy at the cash register I was meeting Durkee for dinner and the guy lit up.

"You mean the Ray Durkee?" He asked. "Geez, I used to listen to him every Sunday back in my hometown. What's he doing in Denver?"

Syndication can disorient you.

Meeting a radio jock for the first
time can be traumatic. They never look
like they sound.

Their voice conjures up a cross between Paul Newman and Clint Eastwood. They usually look like a cross between Bob Newhart and Elmer Fudd.

Well, Durkee is a tall Tom Waits. He's about 6 foot 3, sort of slender, and he carries his 51 years well. He had on a red shirt and snappy pink pants. I saw by his outfit, he was kindred.

It's not always advisable to meet your heroes, because they may be less than you hoped. But the Durk is cool. He's a nice guy. As nice as they get. The gentleness you hear from the little speakers in your Walkman headphones. comes from a very big heart.

We talked of music.

We talked of life.
We talked of his beginnings. He
wasn't always a music jock. For three
years he was a traffic snooper and
flew air cover for the freeway troops in
their tin personnel carriers.

He started his Sunday at the Memories show in 1973 and syndication followed soon after.

The stations are all over the world. He is easily the most famous voice Denver radio ever produced.

You can hear him spin out the Ronnettes in Guam, do the *Hanky Panky* in Saipan and hear *Great Balls of Fire* in Saudi Arabia.

The spread of American culture is due to shows like Sunday at the Memories. Ray Durkee was one of the first.

Now everyone does them. But no one does them as good.

ABOUT BILL HERST, SPEAKER AT SEPT. MTG. Bill Herst first found radio about 1930, when as a kid he haunted the network radio stations in New York. There were no studio audiences and anyone interested enough could roam freely through NBC (then the red and blue networks) and CBS.

Stars-to-be like Kate Smith, Bing Crosby, Raymond Knight, and others were all flattered by kids' attention and made themselves easily accessible.

Herst's first professional association with the medium was in 1944 when as part of the advertising group at Lipton Tea, he was client producer for the company's media involvement. He worked with Hi Brown and the cast of Inner Sanctum, and the next commitment which was Vox Pox with Parks Johnson and Wally Butterworth.

Through exposure to the radio community he got to know Irving Mansfield, a CBS producer. Mansfield lured Herst into a studio and insisted that he watch a new show called <u>Talent Scouts</u>. Herst got Lipton to sponsor it.

Let's kick this around a little more, the money for the transmitter couldn't be much. \$500.00 for a used


one? The office/store could serve as the studio. The tape segments and scripts could be prepared at the office/store and a studio audience would surely be welcome--wouldn't they?

We will be back again at the October meeting when we shall be performing with our guest speaker, Larry Cox.




