OUT OF MY MIND Dan Decker Editor

We who live in Denver and in Colorado are fortunate indeed to have the author of one of the best books ever written about old-time radio in our midst. I am referring to John Dunning, of course, and to his book, <u>Tune in Yesterday</u>, now unfortunately out of print. By the way, I hope that you are catching his

radio program each Sunday afternoon from 1-4:00 p.m. on KBXG.

Speaking of books on old-time radio, no serious practitioner of our hobby should be without Bob Burnham's wonderful book, Listening Guide to Classic Radio Programs: Technical Guide, Volume 2 (BRC Productions, P.O. Box 39522, Redford MI 48239). This second edition, copyright 1986, is much larger than the first edition and no doubt a third edition is awaiting us down the line. This is a comprehensive book and a practical one too, giving for example hints on how to dub tapes, buy tapes and equipment. For collectors who wish to buy from dealers, there is a section explaining how such dealers operate as well as a large number of advertisements. And since our hobby often appeals to people who are essentially private (I almost said "loners"), I am glad to see in this volume a directory of collectors, including yours truly, that lists address, occupation, and names of shows that interests them. This feature of the book, it seems to me, is especially salutary in that it encourages us to communicate and trade with one another and to get out of our shells. Of course, may I add that belonging to an OTR club such as RHAC accomplishes the same thing. I should say too that the way to get the most benefit out of our hobby is to participate actively in the club and to read some of the many fine books such as this one.

Another book that I heartily recommend is The Other Side of the Microphone, second edition, by Owens L Pomeroy. The subtitle reads, A Radio Buff Remembers... Golden Years". Mr. Pomeroy is one of the best friends and promoters of old-time radio that there is. He is a founder of our sister club, Golden Radio Buffs of Maryland (3613 Chestnut Avenue, Baltimore MD 21211) and editor of its fine publication On the Air which is published monthly. This book is so highly thought of that the first edition was completely sold out within six weeks of publication. R. G. Martin of Carlton Press had this to say of the book: "With a pen dipped in golden nostalgia, the author recalls the frenzied years of radio broadcasting. He is a veritable encyclopedia of the infancy of radio. It is jam-packed with information, glamorously entertaining and extremely original. Highly recommended for its interesting subject, wealth of information in a relatively little-known field, and scientific probity." I would also point out that part of the proceeds of the sale of this book will help support the Olt-time Radio Museum Exhibit and Hall of Fame in Baltimore. The book sells for \$6.95 plus \$2.00 for postage and handling, for a total of \$8.95. In my opinion, this is a good buy indeed!

Several guests, most of whom were formally associated with radio, were at the October meeting. They were nodding in agreement as Larry Cox described many of the problems of todays radio programming.

The use of the libraries of the Radio Historical Association of Colorado is a privilege of membership, but only when the rules of the club are followed. Materials are rented for a period of four weeks. The Board of Directors established a fine of \$1.00 per reel per week and if you are currently overdue, you are expected to submit that amount. Should you not pay, materials may be denied from all libraries.



SPERDVAC CONVENTION

The sixth annual SPERDVAC Old Time Radio Convention will be held Friday, November 10 (Veteran's Day holiday) and Saturday, November 11 at the Viscount Hotel, located near Los Angeles Airport. The theme for this year's convention is "SPERDVAC's 15th Anniversary."

Again this year we will feature radio show recreations at our Friday and Saturday night banquets. Friday we will return to 221-B Baker Street and search for clues with Sherlock Holmes. Saturday our convention will conclude with a salute to Lux Radio Theatre. Both days we will present workshops and panel discussions featuring many of the era's top performers.

Admission to the complete two day convention is \$70 until Nov. 1, 1989. After that date admission to the complete convention will be available at the door for \$75. Registration and the Dealers' Room open at 2 pm Friday with a no-host bar beginning at 6:30 pm and the dinner/program at 7:30 pm. Friday's workshops begin at 2:30 pm. On Saturday, registration begins at 8:30 am. The Dealers' Room reopens at 9 am and the day's first workshop also begins then. The convention will conclude at about 10:30 pm Saturday.

These individual event rates have been established for those unable to attend the entire convention: Friday afternoon workshops and evening sit-down dinner and program: \$30; Saturday daytime workshops: \$10 (There will be no formal lunch served. Meals are available at the Viscount and at nearby restaurants.); Saturday evening banquet and program recreation: \$35.

Dealers' tables will be available for those who wish to sell radio-related items. (Unauthorized sales of radio broadcasts are prohibited.) Dealer tables are available for \$30 each. Dealers wishing to attend events outside the Dealers' Room must register for those events. To reserve a dealer table, contact Catherine Passarelli at 10615 Butterfield Rd., Los Angeles, CA 90064.

The Viscount has accomodations available for those who wish to stay overnight. The Special SPERDVAC Convention rate is \$66.08, including 12% bed tax, per room each night. The hotel also offers a special \$2 per day parking rate for tickets validated by SPERDVAC. Shuttle service from Los Angeles International Airport is available free by phoning the Viscount from the airport. To take advantage of these reduced rates, contact the Viscount Hotel directly and specify you are attending the SPERDVAC convention. Their address is 9750 Airport Blvd., Los Angeles, CA 90045. THE SHADOW Reels 5135 through 5150

With the opening "Who knows what evil lurks in the hearts of men? The Shadow knows!", listeners settled in on Sunday afternoons for another thrilling adventure of Lamont Cranston and his friend and companion, the lovely Margo Lane. Cranston, described as a wealthy man-about-town, had traveled to the Orient and learned of hypnotic powers to cloud men's minds so they could not see him. Margo was the only person to know his true identity. The Shadow's eerie laugh and filtered voice ended each program with "The weed of crime bears bitter fruit. Crime does not pay. The Shadow knows!"

The Shadow character first appeared on Detective Story Hour in 1930 for Street & Smith, then as a portion of Blue Coal Radio Revue and on Love Story Hour (both 1931-1932), all over CBS. Short runs in 1932 (CBS), 1932-1933 (NBC) and 1934-1935 (CBS) were broadcast as The Shadow, mostly for Blue Coal, and starred Frank Readick Jr.
