FROM THE KING'S ROOST

Next was an outstanding workshop on sound effects with Barney Beck and Bob Mott. While that was going on, they were doing <u>A Visit to Duffy's Tavern</u> with Gary Yoggy in another room. The Dave Warren Players presented <u>Duffy's Tavern</u> and <u>Casablanca</u>. The next event was a reading by Raymond Edward Johnson about <u>The War of The Worlds</u>.

After dinner there was a re-creation of a <u>Lux Radio Theater</u> drama titled "You Can't Take It With You (Only If Your Carry Your Own Luggage)" the cast included Ezra Stone, Margot Stevenson, Abby Lewis, Rosemary Rice and Florence Williams, Lou Clark plus many others. It was a joy to listen and watch them work.

Saturdays events started with a workshop on <u>Gunsmoke</u> with SuzAnne and Gobor Barabas. They are the authors of the new book on <u>Gunsmoke</u>, titled <u>Gunsmoke</u>. A <u>Complete History</u>. And it sure is. There are 836 pages of detailed information about all of the <u>Gunsmoke</u> programs on radio and TV. This was followed by Mercury Theater panel with Elliot Reed, Richard Wilson, Arthur Anderson and Bill Herz.



There were two other things going on in the little room, a look at <u>Suspense</u> and then a look at <u>Ethel and Albert</u> with Peg Lynch.

We had dinner and "A Tribute to CBS" featuring announcers and commercials, followed by a re-creation,"A Plot To Overthrow Christmas", directed by the author Norman Corwin, starring Burgess Meredith, Ezra Stone, Dwight Weist, Bob Dryden, Lon Clark and a cast of many others.

All of the re-creations were absolutely excellent. The sound men did a perfect job and it was a joy to watch and listen to the technicians at work. If you don't believe me, ask Fred Hinz. He was there also.

The return trip was uneventful and everything was fine.

The big bands

THE BIG BANDS of America kept the country entertained from the mid-1930s to the mid-'40s. In crowded ballrooms or in your home, the strains of that musical era poured forth for more than a decade. The big bands were king.

In addition to style, tempo and personnel, each big band had its own theme to further aid in its distinction and identity. Recall these with us:

Bob Crosby (Summertime), Xavier Cugat (My Shawl), Jimmy Dorsey (Contrasts), Eddy Duchin (My Twilight Dream), Lionel Hampton, (Flyin' Home), Bunny Berigan (I Can't Get Started), Woody Herman (Blue Flame and Woodchoppers' Ball), Harry James (Ciribiribin), Ben Bernie (It's a Lonesome Old Town and Au Revoir, Pleasant Dreams) and Gene Krupa (Apurksody and Star Burst).

Let's reverse the situation and see if you can identify the big bands for which the

following songs were their themes: Thinking of You (Kay Kyser), When My Baby Smiles at Me (Ted Lewis), Bye Lo Bye Lullaby (Freddy Martin, who also used Tchaikovsky's Tonight We Love), The Very Thought of You (Ray Noble), Blue Rey and Nighty Night (Alvino Rey), Nightmare (Artie Shaw), Sleep (Fred Waring), Out of the Night (Ted Weems), Bubbles in the Wine (predictably, Lawrence Welk) and Rhapsody in Blue (Paul Whiteman).

We owe a great debt of gratitude to the big bands. From the end of the Depression through the war years, like familiar friends, they were there when we needed them. The continued interest in the big bands and the musicians who comprised them is a fitting and lasting tribute to their success and popularity.

THE ADVENTURES OF SAM SPADE Tapes 5165 through 5169

The Adventures of Sam Spade first aired as a 1946 ABC Summer series, then went into the Sunday night CBS schedule September 29, 1946. Spade was based on a character created by Dashiell Hammett.

The hard-hitting, hard-boiled San Francisco private eye and his secretary, Effie Perrine, were portrayed to perfection by Howard Duff (1917-1990) and Lurene Tuttle (1907-1986). Each case came out as a report dictated to Effie, was referred to as a caper, included Sam's license number (137596), and often featured a client that died.

William Spier, a veteran of Suspense and other shows, produced and directed. Chief writers were Bob Tallman and Gil Doud. Lud Gluskin, later Robert Armbruster, directed the music and Dick Joy announced. Wildroot Cream Oil sponsored.

The program remained on CBS into 1950, then switched to NBC, still on Sundays. Duff left September 17, 1950 for other career pursuits. Sam Spade returned on Fridays for NBC with Steven Dunne as Spade on November 17. This sustained version ended April 27, 1951.

The Contributor's Library contains 60 shows in broadcast order, assembled mainly by RHAC members John Adams and Ray Stanich. Some shows are of marginal quality, some are without commercials. The Adventures of Sam Spade programs may be found in the Regular

Library on Tape 903 (through Tape 937).

Timings to the nearest minute are on the index sent with each tape.


