Static In The Air

The question came as quite a shock to me: "Jim, why do you waste your time, living in the past, with all of those old radio programs and reading about who and how they were made? Every minute that you spend doing that you are losing out on the present!"

Now as it happened this question came during a delightful southern dinner prepared straight from

the pages of a 1907 cookbook that had been published in Atlanta. Earlier in the day, Patricia and I had spent the afternoon at the museum admiring the detail and workmanship of some sixteenth-century British watercolors. We had so admired the imagination and skill of long dead artists who had transformed light, line and color of a visual image into an enduring window where we could almost touch a Venice that has disappeared except for what we have preserved on canvas and paper. Now such a question!

We had already agreed that our poor skills could not produce such works and that it was such a wonder that someone so long ago, with such primitive equipment could have provided so much. So, I brought up the art and skill involved in the theatric arts, discussed the creativeness of fiction and non-fiction authors. I explained the manual dexterity and sense of timing required of the studio and recording engineers. These artistic qualities taken together would leave a sound picture of our times for hundreds of years to come, just as palette and brush had left for us.

The message must have gotten through, for though she still doesn't think much of "The Lone Ranger" as a mirror of our times, Pat now concedes that Old Time Radio is as valuable a resource to preserve as her shelves of still older receipts and albums of baroque music: a valuable resource, not a obsession.


