

Gangway for Godfrey!

ARTHUR GODFREY is not the guy we've been hearing all over the clock. That Godfrey sounds sharp, cynical slightly this side of sixty. The Arthur Godfrey that we ran into backstage at the CBS Vine Street Theater looked innocent-faced, eager to please and about twenty-five. When we told him that he bore an uncanny resemblance to Van Johnson, he blushed and looked down at his moccasins.

Actually, Arthur says he is the same Godfrey and he is really forty-five years old. His formula for retaining his youth is "work too hard and never get any sleep."

Also, he says that he really isn't as harmless as he looks. There are several things that make him mad--and he does something about it. Audiences, for instance. When they're being cold and

unreasonable, he turns his back on them and pretends they aren't there. "They love it and roar with laughter, but I don't turn back," he insists. He's a hard man. Also, sponsors. "Isell their stuff. What more do they want?" is his reasoning. When his sponsors asked him to read their contest rules, he did it on the condition

that he read them his way. It was the most sarcastic, ho-hum rendition of contest rules we've ever heard. "People don't listen to me to hear about contests," booms the redhead. He was not reprimanded on this occasion. "They wouldn't dare,' is his attitude.

In the matter of risque chatter, Godfret is sweet and reasonable. "I don't *mean* to," he says penitently. "But it's an easy

habit to fall into when you're on the air gabbing every day. Funny thing--when my show starts on a new station, I get letters for the first two months, complaining about innuendos. After that they stop. Either I get better, or the listeners get used to me and stop noticing it." At any rate, Godfrey doesn't take criticism of this sort lightly. It worries him. He goes back to the offending broadcast, if he has received letters mentioning a specific statement on a specific show, and plays the transcription over again. Sometimes he can't figure out what he's supposed to have said. Other times he sees the point, and immediately checks and watches himself from then on. Of course the show goes on, the words steadily pour into the

mike--and Godfrey may lapse. But honest. he doesn't mean to. And if you write him a critical letter, you may be sure it is read and acted upon. He pays attention to adoring fan letters. It's the ones that raise the devil with him that he studies.

"It's funny," he told us. "Practically everyone I've ever met has told me that the first time they heard

me, they said to themselves, 'How did that smug bum ever get on the radio?' And now they say they never miss the show."

Godfrey goes along doing just about what he wants to on the air because he knows his listeners like it better that way. He's experienced so many ups and

downs, on the air and off, that he's philosophical about it all.

We have never given Godfrey's fantastic background its just due in these pages. There's just too much of it. However, a brief summary makes almost surrealist reading. He started out at fifteen with a ten-dollar-a-week job as an architect's office boy. In succession followed jobs as dishwasher, worker in a World War I separation center, coal miner, lumberjack, farmhand and tire finisher at the Goodyear plant, by the time he was sixteen. He joined the Navy graduated from Naval Radio School, passed an entrance exam to Annapolis but volunteered for duty as radio operator on a destrover patrolling Medditerranean during the Greco-Turkish War, and he learned to play the banjo and ukulele.

After four years of Navy, he tried being a factory worker. short-order cook, hotel night-manager, taxi driver and cemetary-lot salesman. When he tried to sell a cemetary lot to a vaudeville actor, the vaudevillian sold Godfrey half the act and the right to appear in it. He was a vaudeville performer until 1927, when he joined the Coast Guard. taught radio classes, graduated at the top of a class in advanced math and was sent to Baltimore to design radio equipment. He took part in an show on WFBR. Baltimore, and won a regular job on the station as "Red Godfrey, the Warbling Banjoist." He became manager of the station

and subsequently an NBC announcer in Washington.

An automobile accident left him in the hospital with forty-seven fractures and months of time to listen to the radio. He evolved his philosophy of personalized broadcasting and launched an early-morning radio show in Washington. The program went well until Godfrev was fired for against revolting overwork. Obscurity closed in and he helped a friend run a flying school in Virginia. Washington radio editors kept up column commentaries of "We want Godfrey," "Where is Godfrey?" "What happened to Godfrey?" until CBS in Washington hired him as their early-morning man. Walter Winchell gave him his first nation-wide publicity plug.

By 1939, Godfrey was a Lieutenant-Commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve, ordered by the Navy Department to retain his radio work and turned down for active service because of his accident injuries. He inaugurated a program to collect blood plasma and the eventual amount reached 6,000 pints. The Navy flew him to Pacific fighting areas as war correspondent to witness the use of plasma.

Now established as a successful radio personality, Godfrey keeps up extra activities with the same enthusiasm he once displayed in changing jobs. He has an 800-acre farm in Virginia, owns and flies a four-passenger Navion, owns and races two boats (a Lightning and an S-Class Sloop)—and he's a bird-lover.

Recently Godfrey launched his "Talent Scouts" on television and vaudeville in New York. Godfrey is proving himself to be a top video personality, his little-boy good looks probably coming as a pleasant surprise to already established fans. A film had been made of "Talent Scouts" previous to its television bow. It proved two important facts-Godfrey, not the "Scouts" nor the "Talent," was the show, and Godfrey was mugging to the audience. He wouldn't beleive it until he saw the filmed record.

In the summing-up of all the Arthur Godfrey achievements, the strawberry blonde insists he has only one true claim to fame. It seems that the day he received his very first pay check on his very first job, he visited the State of Liberty, struck up an accquaintance with questionable character--and woke up later, still in the Statue of Liberty, with his money gone.

"I figure I am possibly the only man now alive who was rolled in the Statue of Liberty."
