

Virginia Payne, Murray Forbes, and Charles Egelston in "Ma Perkins."

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
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From the



Ma Perkins

Ma Perkins brought to listeners the world over Oxydol's "mother of the air." This program was first heard as a local feature on WLW, Cincinnati, August 14, 1933. After a three-month trial, sponsor Proctor & Gamble brought the serial to Chicago in a coast-to-coast NBC slot. It started on NBC December 4, 1933, and was also sold to CBS in 1942. *Ma Perkins* had rare double network status for six years, doing a 1:15 P. M. stint for CBS and the NBC show two hours later. At the height of its fame, the serial was also heard in Canada, Hawaii, and throughout Europe via Radio Luxembourg.

Among the great homespun philosophers of old-time radio, none is remembered with more affection and pathos than *Ma Perkins*. Flowing into kitchens each afternoon to a slight variation of "My Old Kentucky Home," *Ma Perkins* was one of radio's most important daytime serials, spanning almost the entire life of network broadcasting. This Frank and Anne Hummert creation was a softer show than others more closely identified with the Hummerts. Certainly less melodramatic than *The Romance of Helen Trent*, it followed the life of a widow who managed a lumber yard in Rushville Center, U.S.A. Ma was a tough old bird with a heart of gold, described by *Time* just before her twenty-fifth anniversary as "a shrewd combination of Dr. Christian, David Harum and Tugboat Annie." She was another of radio's great commoners, a woman's answer to *Just Plain Bill*, and even more durable than that perennial Hummert favorite. Ma's busy life was never too crowded for another problem. She lived by the Golden Rule, but wasn't above diving into a verbal slugfest when she saw a wrong to be righted. In her years on the air, Ma became Rushville Center's conscience, its best-beloved sounding board, its guide.

All this in addition to raising three children and managing a business. Ma's kids were John, Evey, and Fay. John was killed in World War II, and was buried "somewhere in Germany, in an unmarked grave." Evey, rather a gossip snip at times, married Willie Fitz, who became manager

of Ma's lumber yard, and they had a son named Junior. Fay, Ma's pet, married Paul Henderson while she was "still a girl." He died, leaving her to raise their daughter Paulette alone.

Rounding out the cast of regulars was Shuffle Shober, Ma's partner. Shuffle possessed many of Ma's personal qualities: tough honesty combined with instinctive understanding of the human spirit. Though he was not as articulate as Ma, Shuffle often saw through deceit much faster. Ma subscribed to the principle that all people deserved trust until they proved otherwise. With Shuffle it was often the other way around.

Many's the night they sat together on Ma's Rushville Center porch, philosophizing about their loved ones and the world around them. On those warm wartime evenings they would often talk until—one by one—the lights on the block

Unlike her fictional heroine, Virginia Payne was highly educated. She held two degrees from the University of Cincinnati. Her performance as *Ma Perkins* was convincing and real from the beginning, boosting sales of Oxydol and soaring to ratings marks that competed with nighttime shows. Whenever she appeared in public, Miss Payne dressed up as *Ma Perkins* and played the role.

CBS acquired sole possession of the show in 1948, and *Ma Perkins* continued there until its demise on November 25, 1960. And when her show was finally canceled, it was Virginia Payne who summed it all up, touching the highlights in an emotional farewell.

"*Ma Perkins* again. This was our broadcast 7,065. I first came to you on December 4, 1933. Thank you for all being so loyal to us these twenty-seven years.

The part of Willie has been played right from the beginning by Murray Forbes. Shuffle was played for twenty-five years by Charles Egleston,

and for the past two years by Edwin Wolfe, who was also longtime director. The Fay you have been hearing these past few years has been Margaret Draper, and the part was played for many years by Rita Ascot. For fifteen years our Evey has been Kay Campbell; Helen Lewis plays Gladys, and Tom Wells has been played by John Larkin and Casey Allen. Our director is Richard Leonard. Our writer for more than twenty years has been Orin Tovrov.

Ma Perkins has always been played by me, Virginia Payne. And if you'll write to me, *Ma Perkins*, at Orleans, Massachusetts, I'll try to answer you.

Good-bye, and may God bless you."

went out and the night sounds rose up around them. Then, with the problems still unsolved but somehow easier to bear, Shuffle would shuffle off, leaving Ma with a feeling of contentment and thankfulness for the blessings of life.

Ma Perkins had its share of dark moments. When son John was killed, the network was deluged with letters addressed to "Ma" carrying heartfelt messages of sympathy. People were killed, divorced, and disgraced on *Ma Perkins*. Ma was cheated by unscrupulous cousins, and once worked overtime to expose a baby black market. Through it all, she carried herself with dignity, winning high marks for her show in the Radio Hall of Fame.

In an incredible stint, Virginia Payne went all the way as Ma, never missing a single performance. Miss Payne, just 23 years old when the program first went on the air, was 50 when it ended. She was a daughter of a Cincinnati doctor, breaking into radio at WLW. There, she played *Honey Adams*, a singing Southern heroine in an early radio epic (Jane Froman is said to have been Honey's singing voice) and, during the summer of 1933, she was tapped for *Ma Perkins*.
