

# Murder at Midnight

At the May meeting the RHAC Players will entertain us with a re-creation of the radio show production "The House That Time Forgot". This is a "Murder at Midnight" radio show that the RHAC Players did in the past, but was so well remembered that they want to do it again as their first production after being reunited. This production will have sound effects — both recorded and actual from equipment that is in the development stage.

From Tune In Yesterday Murder at Midnight was a series produced by KFI, Los Angeles, and syndicated in 1946. It featured tales of the supernatural and macabre by radio's top writers and performers. Elspeth Eric, Mercedes McCambridge, Berry Kroeger, Betty Caine, Carl Frank, Barry Hopkins, and Lawson Zerbe were Murder at Midnight regulars. The stories were wild tales of death and the uncanny - of severed hands coming to life, of death appearing as a man in a black beard. It told of "the witching hour... when the night is darkest, our fears the strongest our strength at its lowest ebb. Midnight — when the grave gapes open and death strikes! Thus comes Murder at Midnight!" This show tried to do what Inner Sanctum did so memorably on the networks; the stories were often the equal of Inner Sanctum yarns, but the format wasn't in the same ballpark. Writers included Robert Newman, an old Inner Sanctum alumnus, Joseph Ruscoll of Mollé Mystery Theatre, Max Ehrlich of Suspense, and William Morwood of Bulldog Charles Paul Drummond. contributed the creepy organ music; the director was Anton M. Leader. And that sinistervoiced narrator whose voice dripped "MURRR-DERRR -A-A-ATTT MID-NIGHT!" was none other than Raymond Morgan, a former Long Island minister who had given up the cloth for the excitement of radio.

Ed. Note: There were 50 episodes of *Murder at Midnight*; 2 were recorded, but never broadcast. Of these 50 episodes, at least 33 are in circulation. The RHAC libraries have 25 episodes; see the Tape Library Index.

# Recollection of Sherlock Holmes

"Elementary, my dear Watson!"
How those words still ring in
my ears. Spoken in the crisp,
clipped tones of Basil Rathbone
as Sherlock Holes, they brought
me to full attention in front of
my radio during my youth in the
1930's & 40's. Nigel Bruce, as

Holmes friend Dr. Watson, with his bumbling and mumbling, seemed to me the perfect foil and counterpart to Holmes "no-nonsense" character.

Watson never failed to get my sympathy when Holmes directed one of his frequent impatient or sarcastic remarks toward him. However, Holmes made up for his sarcasm with the occasional "That's it, Watson!" when his devoted friend uttered something seemingly trivial that set Holmes' mind racing, and resulting in a critical clue he needed to solve a crime.

On rare occasions the proud Holmes was humbled in some small way. One such instance occurred in "April Fool's Adventure," broadcast April 1, 1946." After knowing Holmes for only a short time, Watson was talked into helping two of his former school chums play an April Fool's joke on the young detective, whom they felt took himself too seriously. They were enthusiastically assisted by Lady Anne, owner of a priceless emerald. hired Holmes on the pretext of having him retrieve the jewel that she claimed had been stolen from her wall safe. Watson and his fellow conspirators planted phony clues in her home that caused Holmes to unknowingly describe his own features and characteristics when identifying the thief. However, after overcoming his wounded vanity, he solves the actual theft of the emerald and retrieves it. He also identifies the real thief, one of the joke players, James Murphy — later to become better known as Professor Moriarty, Holmes' lifelong antagonist, until Moriarty's death during "The Final Problem" at Reichenbach Falls.

Holmes' could also occasionally find himself at the mercy of others. One occasion, on the May 21, 1945 program, "The Paradol Chamber," Professor Moriarty had trapped Holmes and Watson in an airtight Teleportation Chamber. The hero in their rescue unexpectedly turns out to be Dr. Watson's wife, Mary, who did some fancy deductive sleuthing of her own, freeing Holmes and her husband and saving them from certain death.

The series, with Rathbone playing Holmes, aired from October 2, 1939 through May 27, 1946 – initially as The Adventures of Sherlock Holmes, and later as The New Adventures of Sherlock Holmes. The last broadcast in which Rathbone appeared was "The Singular Affair of the Baconian Cipher." Tom Conway replaced him in the fall of 1946 and the 1947 season,

with Bruce staying on as Dr. Watson, & receiving top billing.

The classic portrayals of Rathbone and Bruce as Holmes and Watson were backed by the contributions of a first-class supporting team, including Harry Bartell (announcer), Dennis Green and Anthony Boucher (writers), and Dean Fosler (music).

I am sometimes saddened knowing that the Holmes and Watson of my youth are gone forever. But are they? Whenever I slip a Rathbone/Bruce Sherlock Holmes tape into my cassette player, I am again magically transported back to the charm of Victorian London, or the damp and foggy moors of Scotland, or to so many other picturesque places that still live on in my mind. And once again, I can hear Holmes' voice above the decades, exclaiming, "Come Watson, the game's afoot!"

Ed. Note: There are several episodes of *Sherlock Holmes* from various vintages in the Libraries, see the Tape Library Index. Many *Sherlock Holmes* episodes of the Rathbone/Bruce era are available commercially.

# Old-Time Radio and the World-Wide Web

How can you quickly and easily find:

program logs for hundreds of radio shows; program scripts; recent articles on specific Old-Time Radio (OTR) shows and topics; book reviews and bibliographies; commercial tape and equipment vendors; radio-related clubs and organizations; radio programs that you can listen to any time you want; information on conventions, tape and radio collecting; answers to OTR questions; and meet people who share your interests in Old-Time Radio?

You can find all of this information and much more by accessing the World-Wide Web.

This column will not be for

answering technical questions relating to computer software and hardware, but rather to provide information and answer questions our members have relating to Old-Time Radio on the World-Wide Web (or Web). This month's column will cover some basics on the Web. Future columns will deal with specific topics relating to OTR and the Web.

What is the Web?

A graphical interface to access the Internet system of computer networks. The *Web* is like a large electronic library.

What do I need to access the WWW?

A computer with modem and sound card, a telephone line, communications and browsing software, and an online or Internet service provider. All of the preceding except the service provider come with most computers. A modem is a device that allows the computer to transmit and receive information over telephone lines. Your existing home phone line will probably be satisfactory for Web use. A service provider gives you Many access to the Web. libraries, colleges, and universities have on their premises computers with WWW access set up for the public to use.

Where can I learn about the WWW and getting on-line?

Lots of places. Many senior and community centers, continuing education programs, libraries, and colleges and universities offer low-cost or no-cost classes on how to use the WWW. The American Assoc. of Retired Persons is sponsoring more than 500 seminars in 30 cities during the next few months to introduce their members to the Internet and computer technology.

#### What is a URL?

A Uniform Resource Locator, an address to a specific Web site or document. This address or link allows you to access a specific Web location or site. Browser software allows you to maintain an list of URL's.
