

The RHAC Players are busy again with several plays being produced within the next few months. To begin we were honored by an invitation from The Center For The Book to do a children's show for their seventh annual convention. This is the third year for children and we understand there should be around a thousand or more children. This is one of our goals to promote old time radio to young people and gain their interest. Our performance will consist of an introduction to radio, an overview of a couple of old-time children's shows, a short discussion about the theater of the mind while a huge storm will be brewing with rain, wind and thunder. There will then be a production of the "Three Little Pigs" and then a hands-on-workshop for the children to ask questions, try out the sound equipment, etc. This event will be November 18, 1999 (Thursday) at

the Merchandise Mart at Interstate 25 and 58th Ave. Show time is 10:00 and 11:00 A.M. Admission is \$4.00 per person. Our cast includes those day-time retired but very busy people.

Next, and very important is the Christmas Party production, "The Iron Box", on December 11,1999. This show is an adaptation of an episode of The New Adventures of Sherlock Holmes starring Basil Rathbone and Nigel Bruce, which was broadcast on Dec 31.1945. The script was written by Anthony Boucher and Dennis Green and recently transcribed by Dennis Hogarth. We have a wonderful cast of about 16 characters, a fantastic director, John Licht, a holiday story with a real ironic twist that will really keep you on the edge of your seat, and a wonderful restaurant with lots of good food. December 11th is a must, please invite a friend and make your reservations early. See you there.

One last note to let you know that our RHAC Players are still busy promoting old-time radio even in other places. Member, Dick Williamson has been doing his old-time radio show, Radio Memories on KFKA in Greeley, Co. for over 10 years. Many of our members have never had a chance to attend an Old-Time Radio Convention. Ever wonder - "What goes on at one of these conventions?" Starting with this month's issue of *Return With Us Now...*, you'll find out.

The Radio Enthusiasts of Puget Sound (REPS) held their 1999 *Radio Showcase VII* on Friday and Saturday, June 25th and 26th, at the Seattle Center, home of the world-famous Space Needle. The *Showcase* began on Friday afternoon, at 3 PM and continued until about 9:30 PM in the evening. It then resumed on Saturday morning at 8:30 AM and ended at about 9:30 PM.

Every year REPS selects a theme with which to stage re-creations and panels. This year, the theme, *Mystery at the Mike* was fun, active, and highly diverse as it allowed REPS to offer a wide-range of radio series recreations.

#### **OTR Guest Stars**

Every year REPS invites a large contingent of Old-Time Radio personalities. Each *Showcase* allows REPS to invite several new Old-Time Radio (OTR) friends to share their talents and memories. This year's first-time attendees included:

#### **Panels**

This year, the moderated panel discussions included such topics as: "How Did These Mysteries Miss the Program," "Whatever Happened To. . ?," and "A Mystery. . . Why Were These Kids So Darned Good on Radio?"

#### Interview

This year, Ginny Tyler interviewed, first-time REPS guest Alan Young. Alan had lots of great stories. Did you know that two of the characters that were written out of Alan Young radio show, because the sponsor didn't like them, later became important characters on the Fred Allen Show under new names - Senator Claghorn and Titus Moody. Quick - What was the original name horse who played Mister Ed? Bamboo Harvester.

#### **Re-Creations**

One of the main activities at any OTR conventions is the re-creation of shows. All of the re-creations at the *REPS Showcase* featured at least one actor or sound person who appeared in the original show. Each had a unique aspect.

Three of this year's guests, Herb Ellis, Larry Dobkin, and Harry Bartell, had played Archie Goodwin in the original *The Adventures of Nero Wolfe* series. In the REPS re-creation, Larry played Nero Wolfe, Harry played Archie, and Herb Ellis directed the episode titled "The Case of the Party for Death."

The Adventures of Red Ryder recreation of "Border Line Bad Man" featured two actors, Tommy Cook and

Ann Whitfield Phillips, who had played the role of Little Beaver. Did you that Art Gilmore, who was the announcer for Red Ryder, also whistled the theme music for that series?

The Jack Armstrong, the All American Boy episode "Break In" featured Charles Flynn, the longestrunning of the Jack Armstrongs. As a special touch, the theme song and a Wheaties commercial were performed by a barbershop quartet.

The Vic and Sade re-creation also fit into the mystery theme with the episode "How Does Your Garden Grow?" A Vic and Sade episode is featured at every REPS Showcase.

In The Alan Young Show recreation, the mystery revolved around a French gourmet meal catered by, of all establishments, Duffy's Tavern.

Ten of this year's guest celebrities (Harry Bartell, Larry Dobkin, Sam Edwards, Ann Whitfield Phillips, Norma Jean Nilsson, Gil Stratton Jr., Ray Erlenborn, Dick Beals, Herb Ellis, and Tommy Cook) had appeared in the classic radio mystery series Most of them also Suspense. performed in the re-creation of the Suspense episode of "In Fear and Trembling."

Especially interesting was the "cold read" of the Broadway Is My Beat episode - "The Case of the Bag of Dirt." The actors received the scripts right in front of the audience. The players quickly marked their scripts and started into a rehearsal. Larry Dobkin directed this re-creation and preceded the re-creation with some very insightful comments on radio acting preparation technique. #### Just Sittin' Around and Visiting

This year, the very popular Just Sittin' Around and Visiting segment had a different format. Rather than just a single session, there was a session each day. Half of the OTR radio legend William Conrad,

#### Vendors

All of the guest celebrities at the Showcase were very friendly and approachable. During the breaks and the Saturday night Social Hour, there were many chances to talk with them, acquire autographs and take pictures. I got at least one opportunity to talk with each of the celebrities. I also had time to meet with many other convention attendees including a few RHAC members from around the country and members of several other Old-Time Radio clubs.

#### **Dinner With The Stars**

On Saturday night there was a dinner at which convention goers were seated one or more of the celebrity guests. You had a great chance to converse with them. This year, I was seated at the table with Alan Young. Alan had great stories and a delightful sense of humor. During this dinner awards to the performers and REPS volunteers were given.

#### **Silent Auction**

This year REPS had a silent auction which raised over \$1,000.00 to help pay Showcase expenses. Of particular interest and intense bidding were an autographed group photo of Larry Dobkin, Harry Bartell, Dick Beals, and Ray Erlenborn and individual, autographed photos of each of these OTR personalities. The photographs were taken by son of Christopher Conrad.

Yes, I was the successful bidder on the group photo that appears on the front cover of this month's Return With US Now. . . . This picture now occupies a prominent place in my home.

#### **Book Signings**

Two of this year's celebrities talked about and signed books that they had authored: Dick Beals -"Think Big!" and Alan Young - "Mr. Ed and Me." Both books are well worth reading and have many entertaining stories of about their experiences in Radio and other areas of entertainment.


