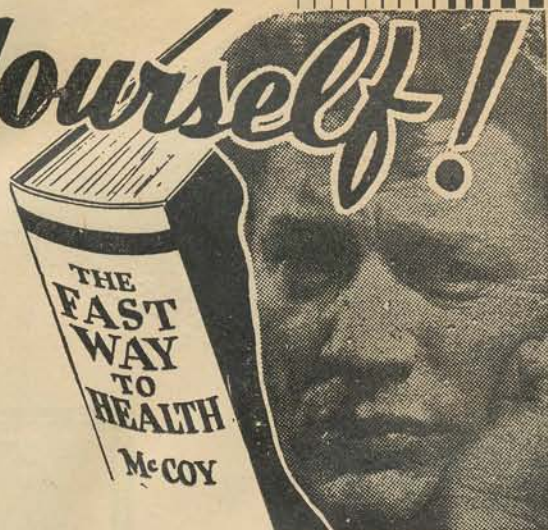

## CHATTING with the EDITOR

### VANCOUVER ON NETWORK

It's a long lane that has no turning! At last Vancouver would appear to be coming into its own. A preview of the fall and winter programs lined up for the . . . we were going to say Commission, but it will be the Canadian Radio Corporation, won't it? . . . Vancouver is slated to produce and furnish no less than six programs weekly for the coast-to-coast network and several new ones for the Western network.

Since the inception of national broadcasting "Radio News" has consistently urged a greater recognition of Vancouver talent, as well as the need of a more powerful outlet and better studio accommodation. It would now appear that the seed has taken deep root and is springing forth to harvest.

During the past year Vancouver has produced several worthwhile shows which have gained fine notice in the east. Now recognition is manifest in a greater number of programs going national.

The results attained by CRCV are all the more noteworthy when one realizes the tremendous handicap the staff has been working under. In addition to having an antiquated equipment to work with, the staff is very much undermanned and they have practically no studio facilities. Both of these deficiencies will no doubt be overcome early this winter when the new 5000 watt station goes on the air, for in addition to a new transmitter, large commodious studios are planned for the center of the city.

In view of the fact that a number of new programs are to be produced in Vancouver, starting the first Sunday in October, some additional help should be given at once. However, the wheels of government move very, very slowly.

Congratulations, then, to the staff

of CRCV, under the leadership of that human dynamo, Jack Radford, their manager, for this national program recognition—they deserve it and there is no doubt that they will give a good account of themselves in this additional responsibility.

### THE NEW RADIO BOARD

Swinging into action, deferred though it be, the Dominion Government has announced the personnel of the board of honorary regional directors for the new set-up of national radio.

A western Canadian has been selected as chairman and among others two British Columbians have been chosen.

With the announcement of the personnel of this new board, came expressions of surprise on every hand. Amazement, in fact, in some instances. This was the first intimation the radio world had received that the members of the new board were even radio minded, to say nothing as to being sufficiently enlightened to give expert advice and pass judgment on this million and a quarter national enterprise.

The Vancouver morning paper points out that three members of the new board are lawyers, a trust company manager, a broker, a chemistry school director, an executive of a moving picture corporation, a journalist and an author.

The Herald's main criticism is that a musician or two was not appointed to the board. It contends that the dispensation of music is the chief responsibility of radio.

We can heartily concur with our young friend, the Herald, in that the government should have appointed at least two outstanding musicians to the board but we cannot agree that "radio is, and never can be, anything other than a musical instrument."

## Board Members

If one is to take for granted that no special qualifications are necessary and that it was impossible to include on the board three or four persons closely connected with radio from its infancy, either in the manufacturing or actual broadcasting or allied fields, then we can, in the main, offer congratulations to the government in its choice.

Of course it may be that those who have expressed surprise, in that none of the appointees have heretofore publicly manifested interest in radio, overlooked the fact that it is quite possible that the interests, likes and dislikes may be known to those in the inner circle of a great political party machine. Who can tell? We can't!

The chairman of the board is to be Mr. L. Brockington, for many years city solicitor of Calgary and now of Winnipeg.

In the choice of Mr. Brockington a wise selection has been made. For many years he has been a devotee of the legitimate stage, professional and amateur. He also served on the board of directors of the Calgary Symphony Orchestra. Throughout his twenty years' residence in Calgary he always manifested a keen and sympathetic interest in cultural affairs and was ever ready to lend his support in the cause of art.

Further, to our own knowledge, he displayed no little interest in the infant radio some twelve years ago. We assume that he has kept close watch on the infant's growth.

The two British Columbia appointees are General Victor Odlum of Vancouver and Mrs. Nellie McClung of Victoria. Both citizens of the highest order who may be relied upon to see that the requirements of British Columbia are not overlooked.

General Odlum, who was for many years publisher of Vancouver's only morning newspaper, has a wide and varied cultural background. He has not, however, manifest, up to the present, any public interest in radio.

Mrs. McClung is an author of world note. We believe that during the past few years she has taken a keen interest in radio production, and with her cultural attainments should be a valuable member to the board.

# Eddie Cantor Is On Columbia Again



IN 1909 on the stage of Miner's Bowery Theatre—the Palace of its day—a slim, banjo-eyed youth scampered across the platform to do a song and dance for \$5—first prize for amateur night.

In 1929—twenty years later—this same actor, heavier, older, yet just as energetic, lost \$2,000,000 in the Wall Street debacle. The actor is the stage, screen and radio star, husband, father and philanthropist—Eddie Cantor.

When you hear Cantor over Columbia networks, you visualize the pop-eyed, mirth provoking star. Yet he is more than a comedian. He has purposely buried the gag type of humor to provide philosophical fun for his millions of listeners.

His "Cantor for President" brought him radio fame. Instead of adding to the troubled minds of the country the same story of depression, he debunked it. He made people—parents and children, alike—laugh at his jokes. His plans for prosperity were unusual.

## Plans for Prosperity

"In baseball nowadays we have nine men on a side," he said. "I say, let's have forty men on a side, and twelve umpires.

"In prize fighting we find only two men in the ring with a single referee. What kind of employment is that? Let's have six in the ring with three referees. There should be six in every quartet, a duo should have five members and a solo four. It's an idea."

Eddie Cantor was born in New York's lower East Side, the son of a violinist, who tried hard to support himself, his wife and young Eddie. Both parents died before Cantor reached his second birthday. He was brought up by his grandmother.

It was the same East Side that produced Al Smith, George Jessel, Gus Edwards and a dozen of New York's leading jurists today.

Like many other East Side youths, a "no good" future was prophesied

for Cantor. His mimickings, street singing and other youthful capers finally led him to Miner's for amateur night. He later confessed he beat out the girl singer, by getting his Eldridge street chums to whistle, applaud and stamp their feet for Eddie Cantor.

Gus Edwards, who knew youthful talent when he saw it, spotted Cantor the next summer, working in a Coney Island saloon as a singing waiter. The accompanist was Jimmy Durante, the famed "Schnozzola" of the stage and screen.

## Debut with Jessel

That marked Cantor's debut on the stage. In 1912, with Georgie Jessel, he took part in "Kid Kabaret." It was the first time he met Jessel, and the two became fast friends.

Then Flo Ziegfeld, hearing of Cantor's rapid rise on Broadway, gave him a one night trial on the New Amsterdam roof—the very place from which Cantor made his N.B.C. broadcasts. He caught on at his first appearance, stopping the show.

Then came the "Midnight Frolics," "Kid Boots" and more Broadway applause. "Whoopee," "Kid Boots" and "Palmy Days" were made into screen hits. "Strike Me Pink" is his latest picture. He has written magazine articles and books and his N.B.C. network audience numbers millions.

In telling of his hectic, yet successful life, Cantor says:

"Some time in the future I would like to produce on my own with maybe myself in the leading role. I have been more or less of an associate producer for the past ten years anyhow. During the course of my work for Ziegfeld I always tried to contribute my share of new ideas for staging and production.

"I am 43 years old now. I can honestly say I have been a star since 1920, and on Broadway since 1916. In all that time I have written seventy-five per cent. of all my comedy."



He has also written an autobiography, "My Life is in Your Hands."

## Has Five Daughters

Eddie is the pampered male of his family. And who wouldn't be with a wife and five daughters? His wife, Ida Tobias Cantor, was his childhood sweetheart and married the young comedian when he was still struggling to gain recognition. She is always helpful, he says, by humoring him.

He loves to help others and it is a fact, although rarely publicized, that Cantor has been the chief support of more than one Jewish orphanage in New York. Each summer, with the aid of actor friends, he sponsors mountain and seashore excursions for the unfortunate young.

As for his own children, "Their lives are in their own hands" to paraphrase the title of one of his books. "If they want to go on the stage when they grow up it's all right with me," he said.

"My oldest daughter Marjorie was just graduating from high school and was guest dramatic editor of a Hollywood paper for a week. They offered her a job for the summer at \$10 a week as a columnist. The salary of columnists must be going up."

His other daughters are Natalie, Edna, Marilyn and Janet.

## Sally Gets Break

Sally Breen, pretty little 18-year-old sister of Bobby Breen, Eddie Cantor's youthful protege, is being rewarded at last for her unselfish devotion. Five years ago, she renounced a promising stage career to manage and promote her brother. Today, word comes from Hollywood that she passed a screen test with flying colors—and will be featured in a picture, "Rainbow on the River."

## Kaltenborn On the Spanish Front

At the age of 19, Kaltenborn himself ran away from his Milwaukee home to enlist secretly with the Fourth Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry for service in the Spanish-American war. Taken on as a private, he worked his way up to the highest

non-commissioned office in his company.

In a brilliant career as journalist and, for the past nine years, as radio commentator for Columbia, Kaltenborn has made it his business to study and explain the political factors which make for war or peace. In Europe last month to bring radio listeners in closer touch with leading statesmen on that question, Kaltenborn found himself within a day's airplane flight from the Spanish border as the revolution broke out. Speeding to the war-torn country, he interviewed rebel and Loyalist leaders and emerged periodically at Hendaye on the Franco-Spanish border to bring American audiences first-hand news of the situation.

# Vancouver Steps Into Prominence In Canadian Radio Circles

CRCV, the Canadian Radio Commission outlet at Vancouver, is in receipt of advance information from Regional Director H. S. Stovin on fall and winter programs showing that this city has been awarded six periods weekly on the coast-to-coast network. Five of these periods will be filled with orchestral and vocal productions. Other presentations to the Western network bring the total of musical features to be produced and broadcast from CRCV to nine programs weekly exclusive of such features as "I Cover the Waterfront," Pat Terry's popular tales of the sea, and "Spent Spinner's" chummy chat with anglers.

New voices have been aired locally and on some network programs, with the result that this winter will bring to Canadian listeners and the large audience of the United States, many voices that are unknown to them today.

### Second To None

Radio Commission programs from Vancouver have been given the highest praise by critics in Vancouver and other provinces of the Dominion. With the greatly increased number of broadcasts from this city to the networks, British Columbia will hold a place second to none in Canadian radio circles.

Percy Harvey, of "Blue Pacific Moonlight" fame, will launch a new vehicle called "Jewels of the Madonna" and will also prove his versatility to coast-to-coast dialers with his augmented "Pierrot" orchestra. Harry Pryce hits the novelty spots with "Ye Olde Medicine Show" and a new production trading under the title "Hacienda." Mart Kenney returns to the airways with an augmented group dispensing the sweet type of music. "Sophistication" is the name of a new Saturday evening studio broadcast featuring the works of modern composers interpreted by an entirely newly organized string group and the

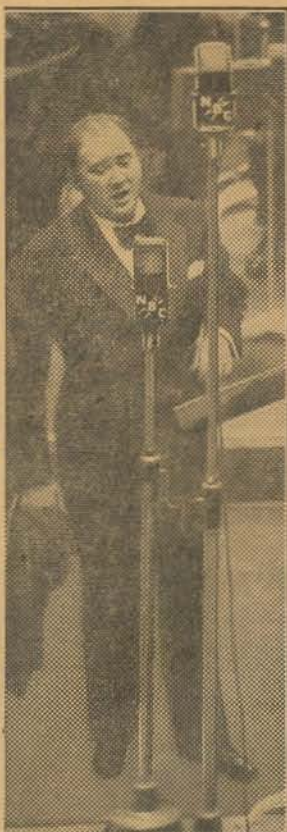

The first five concerts will be under the baton of Fritz Reiner, who recently completed a brilliant season at Covent Garden, London. Sharing honors with him on the first program will be John Charles Thomas, Metropolitan Opera baritone.

The other noted conductors who will

appear as guests will be Alexander Smallens, Eugene Ormandy, Jose Iturbi and Victor Kolar, who directed during the 1934, 1935 and 1936 seasons. Kolar will conduct the orchestra in eight concerts.

Among the celebrated concert stars to appear as guest soloists during the season will be Mischa Elman, violinist; Josephine Antoine, coloratura soprano; Kirsten Flagstad, soprano; Gladys Swarthout, mezzo-soprano; Jose Iturbi, pianist; Richard Crooks, tenor; Jascha Heifetz, violinist; Lily Pong, coloratura soprano; Vladimir Horowitz, pianist, and Nelson Eddy, baritone.

## Good Will Court Replaces Major

The Good Will Court, the unique radio program designed for the litigation of legal cases involving persons unable to pay court costs and presided over by real judges sitting unofficially, will be inaugurated over National Broadcasting Company, KPO Red networks at 4:00 p.m., Sunday, September 20.

The Good Will Court had its inception over a New York station a year ago. Announcer A. L. Alexander invited unfortunates in all walks of life to bring their legal problems to the microphone. Prominent metropolitan judges agreed to sit on the "bench" to give the radio plaintiffs free legal advice on their civil and criminal difficulties. Immediately scores of listeners began to bring their personal tangles to the radio station for help.

When the new program goes out over N.B.C.-KOMO it will have the endorsement of twenty leading New York welfare organizations and the Frauds Bureau of the New York County district attorney's office. The welfare societies will follow up each case after the radio "litigants" have been given free legal counsel by the judges, making sure that justice is accorded each person who appears on the program.

Announcer Alexander does not reveal the names of the men and women appearing on the program. Each person is labelled as a case number, and is addressed by that designation, as Alexander interview them and clarifies their cases for the judges.

The judges will be paid for their services by the sponsors of the program, and will in turn donate money to one of the charities interested in aiding the cases.

## 21 Nations Link in Good Will Broadcast

All the major broadcasting systems throughout the globe will be linked for a single program of American folk music on Sunday, September 20, according to arrangements completed by the National Broadcasting Company, the Columbia Broadcasting System and the International Broadcasting Union. The time is 12 noon, Sunday, N.B.C.-KOMO and C.B.S.-KOL and KVI.

The program, to originate in both N.B.C. and C.B.S. studios, is the first of a series which was proposed by National Broadcasting Company delegates at the recent Intercontinental Broadcasting Conference, held in Paris under the auspices of the I.B.U. Other programs to follow depicting cultural backgrounds of other countries will include a broadcast of the annual Tango Carnival at Buenos Aires, Argentina, some time in February, 1937, and native music from the Belgian Congo and the Dutch East Indies, the last probably to come from the famed annual Harvest Festival at the palace of the Sultan of Djokja.

The inaugural program of September 20 will present American folk music in four broad categories—Indian music, cowboy music, Negro spirituals and Anglo-American ballads.

The Indian music will open the program, following an actual radio pick-up of the roaring of Niagara

Falls. Chief Jesse Cornplanter of the Seneca Indians and Nicodemus Bailey, his blood brother, will conduct other Indian singers in tribal chants and war cries, accompanied by native flutes, shell rattles and tom-toms. Howard Barlow will lead a symphony orchestra in Skilton's "War Dance."

The cowboy music will follow, with Carson Robison and his Buckaroos singing and playing "The Streets of Laredo" and "Roll Out, Cowboys." The traditional music of the plains will be contrasted with a modern composition when Hal Kemp and his orchestra play "I'm an Old Cow Hand" from Bing Crosby's newest picture, "Rhythm on the Range."

The Fisk Jubilee Singers, famous Negro chorus, will sing "I Want to Go to Heaven When I Die" and Stephen Foster's "Old Folks at Home." This portion of the broadcast will originate at Fisk University, Nashville, Tenn.

An Anglo-American ballad, "Sourwood Mountain," will be sung from Washington by I. G. Greer of Thomasville, N.C. Mrs. Greer will play the accompaniment on the dulcimer. The half-hour program will be closed by Dr. Frank Black, music director of the National Broadcasting Company, who will lead a symphony orchestra in the selection "Cripple Creek," from Stringfellow's symphony, "Southern Mountain."

## Paley Award To Be Given to Amateurs

On September 6, at the National Amateur Radio Show held in conjunction with the American Radio Relay League's Central Division Convention, announcement was made that William S. Paley, President of the Columbia Broadcasting System, has offered a permanent award to be presented annually to that individual who through amateur radio, in the opinion of an impartial Board of Awards, has contributed most usefully to the American people, either in research, technical development or operating achievement.

Shortly after the flood disasters in the early part of 1936, in which amateur radio operators rendered such useful service to their stricken communities, Mr. Paley felt that some permanent recognition should be made to the amateur radio enthusiasts of America and Canada . . . thus limiting the area, for the purposes of making the award, in a field in which no national boundaries are considered, to a practical area from which it is possible to make a thorough and fair survey of accomplishment.

Mr. Paley designated the American Radio Relay League, the official organization of the amateur radio operators of the country, whose headquarters are in Hartford, and whose members number nearly 20,000 active operators, as the permanent custodians of the award. Upon it will be engraved each year the name of the winner of the award. A smaller replica will be presented to the individual selected as the winner, by an impartial board of experienced authorities on amateur radio activities.

## New Agreement of WLW and Mutual

The Mutual Broadcasting System announced that it had completed a new arrangement of association with radio station WLW, which becomes effective September 27 next.

The availability of WLW's facilities to advertisers in conjunction with the Mutual network remain unchanged insofar as the transmission of programs to and from WLW to Mutual is concerned and all of the fine sustaining programs interchanged between the Mutual stations and the Crosley Cincinnati station will continue as in the past.

The new association arrangement by which WLW becomes an affiliate of Mutual rather than a member is the same as is in effect with all other stations releasing Mutual programs, with the exception of the stock holding outlets—WOR and WGN—and the other stations—CKLW, WAAB, and the Don Lee network, (joining not later than December 29), who participate as members in the total expenses of Mutual.

Affiliates participate in Mutual by receiving published advertising rates for commercial programs and reimbursing Mutual for the expense incurred in servicing and contracting the business.

The new arrangement will be ratified by the Mutual Broadcasting System board of directors at their next regular meeting.

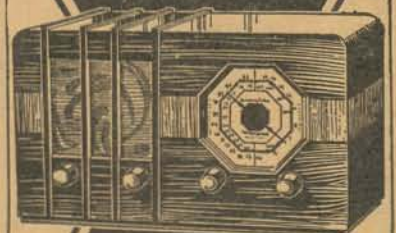

## "March of Time" Takes Holiday

After 60 successive weeks of broadcasting, five times every week, the "March of Time" will be discontinued for a short period after the program of September 25 to give its producers, writers and actors a much-needed rest before returning to the Columbia network for its fall series.

The vacation will affect the 63 writers, musicians, editorial workers and production and service men who are associated with each broadcast and whose jobs five days a week start with the writing of the scripts at 9:00 each morning and end with the broadcast at 10:45 at night (EDST). In order to prepare and produce one program the services of the 19 musicians, 21 actors, 8 production and service men and 11 editorial and research workers are required. This number is often increased according to demands of the scripts.
