

The money received by the veterans of foreign wars is used for one of America's most worthwhile causes, The Potter County Memorial Blood Bank, which has not only typed the blood of one out of every three people in Amarillo, but has been responsible for saving many lives throughout the country. For example:

I'd like to introduce Mr. Jasper Elliott from Austin, Texas. Now tell us, Mr. Elliott, you're a member of the veterans of foreign wars, are you not?

ELLIOTT: Yes, I am Horace.

HEIDT: And you had to have a very serious operation, is that correct?

ELLIOTT: That's right, the 10th of December.

HEIDT: And on the 9th what was the situation?

ELLIOTT: On the 9th, we found out they only had a half pint of my type of blood, which is rare, in the blood bank in Austin so after frantically searching, we finally found a couple of pints in Amarillo in the Potter County Memorial Blood Bank and they flew it down to methe next morning, so the operation went off ail right, it was a success.

JEIDT: It was a success and therefore this blood bank up

there in Amarillo saved your life, is that correct?

ELLIOTT: That's right. And I'm certainly thankful for it

to them and for their Veterans of Foreign Wars

and what they did in helping me find it.

HEIDT: How are you feeling now, Mr. Elliott.

ELLIOTT: Fine.

HEIDT: You're feeling very fine. Well very very swell.

HEIDT:

And now ladies and gentlemen, I'd like to have you meet Mr. Mel Kruse, who was awarded a plaque for being the outstanding post commander of the veterans of foreign wars during the year 1950-51, and who conceived the idea of typing the blood of every eligible person in Potter County.

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KRUSE:

Horace, the Amarillo Veterans of foreign wars are very appreciative to Jasper Elliott for coming to San Antonio and telling first hand of how the Potter County Memorial blood bank saved his life. It makes me very happy to tell your many friends, Horace, that the Potter County Memorial Blood Bank has saved three to five lives a month, and that this work has been greatly aided by your organization, which has come to Amarillo for two years and raised money for this worth while cause. We also wish to thank your sponsor, Lucky Strike. What you're both doing is truly THE AMERICAN WAY.




