PARKS: The Saturday Night Camel Caravan rolls in on the music
of Benny Goodman...America Swings!
(THEME UP)

PARKS: Out of the heart of America, from the shores of the
Mississippi came a new music, a music whose rhythm and
freedom captured the hearts of a hundred and thirty million
people to become the new music of America...EWINS! Tonight
the makers of Camel cigarettes are happy to present the
young musician whose daring conception of style and brilliant
clarinet technique blazed the way to this new era in American
music...and here he is leading the greatest collection of
swing artists ever gathered in a single band...Benny Goodman!
(APPLAUSE)

BENNY: Good evening everyone and welcome to the sixth of our new
series of programs for the makers of Camels.

PARKS:

Say Benny, the man with the stop watch says we'll have to hurry to get everything into our thirty minutes tonight.

BERRY:

All right Bert Parks...just one thing before we start... Tonight we're presenting a special number written for us by Harold Rome, the composer and lyricist who wrote the Broadway revue "Pins and Needles," and the recent song hit, "Franklin D. Roosevelt Jones"....The number he wrote for us is coming later, though.

PARKS:

And the overture Benny...?

BERRY:

"Down South Camp Meeting"...Bert.

(BAND! "DOWN SOUTH CAMP MEETING")

(APPLAUSE)

PARKS:

Say Benny...this number you've got listed next is a tune you've already played on two Camel broadcasts, in this new series...What's the idea of playing it a third time?

BERRY:

Do you know what a command performance is, Bert?

PARKS:

Why certainly...A command performance is a...well it's kind of a...I mean...when a fellow...say maybe I was thinking of something else.

BERRY:

When an artist is invited to perform before the King and Queen of a country, it's called a 'command performance'....actually he doesn't have to appear before the Royal Family if he doesn't want to...but generally he does...
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PARKS: Wait a second...What's that got to do with your repeating a tune three times?...We've got no king and queen to tell you what to do. No...but we've got radio listeners...and when they tell you they want to hear "Sunrise Serenade" again...well...that's a command performance.

(BAND: "SUNRISE SERENADE")

(APPLAUSE)

BENNY: And now Bert Parks has some advice for every smoker who wants to save money...Bert Parks.

PARKS: Save money is right, for penny for penny, America's shrewdest cigarette buy is the cigarette that gives --

LIONEL: That old angel came down to see me again last night. She's worried.

BENNY: Is that the same angel you dreamed about, that came down and told you I should give you a raise?

LIONEL: That's right, Pops...the same angel.

BENNY: What's the angel worried about, Lionel?

LIONEL: She's worried that you forgot about the trio.

BENNY: You mean you'd like to play the drums a little?

LIONEL: The angel didn't say nothing about that...

BENNY: Okay, Lionel...Get behind the drums...and follow Fletcher into "Henderson Stomp."

(TRIO: "HENDERSON STOMP")

(APPLAUSE)

BENNY: Several times a year the American Society of Composers and Publishers award a prize to the author of the song it considers to be the best tune written during the quarter. This week Ziggy Elman, one of the band's trumpet players, received this award for his tune, "And The Angels Sing."

(APPLAUSE)

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PARKS:

Ziggy shared the twelve hundred and fifty dollar prize with Johnny Mercer who wrote the lyric. Johnny's in New York now with Bob Crosby and his Dixieland Band on the Tuesday night Carol show..

BENNY:

But Ziggy is here so we'll let him tell us about it...Here he is...

Ziggy Elman.

ZIGGY:

Thanks Benny,

BENNY:

Well Ziggy...how did it feel to get all that money at one time?

ZIGGY:

The honor's the important thing.

BENNY:

But the cash money didn't hurt anyway -- We're all proud of you Ziggy...and we'd like to show it...Maybe there's something nice we could do for you.

ZIGGY:

Sure there's three, or four things, you could do.

BENNY:

Wait a minute...I said something...one thing.

ZIGGY:

You can't quibble with us composers...Benny...

BENNY:

Okay Ziggy...What can we do for you besides letting you play

"And The Angels Sing."

ZIGGY:

Let me play it twice.

BENNY:

All right Ziggy...once now with Louise Tobin singing the vocal and then late some night next week...Along.

(HANDS "AND THE ANGELS SING" LOUISE TOBIN VOCAL)

(APPLAUSE)

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(PIANO UP WITH "OUR LOVE")

- PARKS: Our Love is like a melody,
I can hear it....etc.,.
BENNY: Just a minute, Bert...
TODD: What's the matter...Sounds good to me...
BENNY: Wait a second...Mondello...I'm not picking on Bert's singing.
It's that song...What's the name of it?
PARKS: "Our Love"...What's wrong with it?
BENNY: Isn't that the tune the composer borrowed from Tschaiikovsky's
Romeo and Juliet overture?
PARKS: That's right.
BENNY: We've had enough of this tune stealing from those Europeans,
We've got plenty of American classics to steal from and it's
about time Tin Pan Alley began stealing right here at home.
I don't get you Benny?
BENNY: We talk American...Don't we...we buy American...then why can't
our song writers steal American?
PARKS: That's a great idea, Benny. And that's what Harold Ross had
in mind when he wrote this special number for us.
(MUSIC UP)
STEAL AMERICAN FIRST
PARKS: Let's steal our tunes
Not from Brahms, but from the Bronx
Not from Debussy, but from Kentucky
Not from the Beethoven nines, but from Hollywood and Vine
Steal American First!
(PANIC)

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HENRY:

Now Bert Parks let's get to work
And the first thing on our roster
Is a ditty called "Our Love"
Taken straight from Stephen Foster.

(SHANEE RIVER)

PARKS:

Our love is like the banjos ringing
Oh how I pine!
Our love is like the birdies singing
Below the Dixon line!
The melody my heart is strumming
Comes from Caroline.
Our love is like the old folks hummin'
The old moonshine!

(TISKET) (UNDER)

HENRY:

Is it Schalkowski?

BAND:

Not Not Not Not

HENRY:

Is it Dobuszy?

BAND:

Not Not Not Not

HENRY:

Is it Stravinsky?

BAND:

Not Not Not Not

HENRY:

Let's steal American first...Yeah

(INTERLUDE)

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FENNY:

Next on our list what a song

It's a honey...oh yes man

Here's a new tune called Our Love

Stolen from How Dry I Am

(FULL INTERLUDE)

PARKS:

Our love is like

A red red rose

It shines out like

Pinocchio's nose.

Our love's a rose

That blooms and swells

It haunts and taunts

And grows and swells,

(TISSU)

FENNY:

Is it Haydon?

BANDI

No! No! No! No!

FENNY:

Is it Chopin?

BANDI

No! No! No! No!

FENNY:

Is it Mozart?

BANDI

No! No! No! No!

ALL:

Let's steal American Fire!!

(BAND)

FENNY:

Now we're going to go to town

With the next song from our noodle

It's a ballad called "Our Love"

Stolen straight from Yankee Doodle.

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(YANKEE DOODLE)

PARKS: Our love's like a melody,
Singing everywhere
You take all the harmony
And then give no the air!

BAND: Our Love!

PARKS: Is it just a moon love?

BAND: Our Love!

PARKS: Is it just a June love?

BAND: Our Love!

PARKS: Is it knife and spoon love?

BAND: I want some trout fish Mother

(INTO CHORUS OF YANKEE DOODLE)

BERRY: Is it Fossin'it?

BAND: Not! Not! Not! Not!

BENNY: Paganini'it?

BALD: Not! Not! Not! Not!

BENNY: Boccherini'it?

BAND: Not! Not! Not! Not!

ALL: Let's sing American first -- Hey!

(BAND: SIDE OUT: YANKEE DOODLE) (APPLAUSE)

Lionel Hampton's beating that rhythm on the drums can mean only one thing...Kenny Goodman's famous "Sing Sing Sing" is coming up with choruses by Toots Mondello and Benny.

(BAND: "SING SING SING")

(APPLAUSE)

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HENNY:

And that's it...another session of America Swings..Thanks to all you people for listening in and thanks to all you Camel smokers who make these broadcasts possible..Goodnight.

(BANDI THEM)

PARKS:
