Thank you, Bob. Don't look now, but Bill Goodwin is over in that corner cooing in double-talk to a pigeon.

BOB:

To a pigeon? Hey, what goes, Goodwin?

BILL:

Well, I tell you, Mr. Rob. This bird just came in on the fly out of the cold spell. Between sneezes, he says he's got a message for you to be sure and explain that solid item, "I'm Prayin' Humble".

BOB:

Me, I liked Wally Reid. And there was Tom Mix. And
the Villain had Pearl White trapped in a burning car
speeding towards an open drawbridge-to-be-continued-nextweek.

BILL:

Yes, it was all there. The jerky motions, the bad lighting, the smeary make-up, and the memories.

BOB:

But there was one thing missing, Bill. That tinny pianola. Grinding out "Madelon," "Oh Frenchy," or "K-K-K-Katy." Here in the Music Shop we've got a sort of streamlined version of one of the favorites of those days. It's the hit of 1918, "Ja Da." (APPLAUSE)

With Eddie Miller on saxophone, Hank D'Amico clarinet, Floyd O'Brien trombone and Jess Stacy piano - it's "Diga Diga Doo." (BAND: "DIGA DIGA DOO")

(APPLAUSE)

(BAND: THEME)

BOB:

(ON CUE) Yes, it's our theme song "Summertime", and that means goodnight time. Till we meet again next Thursday evening, may the listening be extra easy. Bob Crosby saying Take it easy.

BILL:

And this is Bill Goodwin saying - goodnight till Thursday night!

(THEME & APPLAUSE UP AND OUT)

ANNOUNCER:
