MUSIC: SMOKE RINGS

O'KEEFE: (OVE: MUSIC) Gangway neighbor...here comes the Gamel Caravan again through the courtesy of R.J. Reynolds Tebacce Company, makers of Camel Cigarettes. HUNT: Here we are, Mr. Brady...that will be twenty-five cents...

O'KEEFE: What!...Twenty-five cents from Philadelphia to New York?

It's highway robbery. I told you to come by way of the Holland Tunnel.

JACK: Sorry, Mr. Brady...but it hasn't been built yet.

O'KEEFE: That's right. Well, I haven't got any change. Here's a diamond...I'm going inside.

BIZ: DOOR OPENS...MUSIC COMES UP PLAYING \*GOOD OLD SUMMER TIME\*

VERY PIANISSIMO

HUSING: (IN GALLIC MANNER) Ah, Monsieur Le Brady...Bon four...Bon Soir. Comment on va...Raymembair me.. the headwalter... Francois..

O'KEEFE: Oh yes...Francois. You look a lot like Ted Rusing to me.
Tell me...who's dining here tonight?

HUSING: Well...ovair thair in the cornair...

O'KEEFE: Never mind the accent Francois...who!s here?

HUSING: (NATURAL VOICE) Well over there, Walter ... I mean Diamond Jim.,
is Porros Borros Stanislaus Tuskaneenie Boleslawski. That's
a big name in the theatre business...

O'KEEFE: That's a big name in any business.. Tuskaneenie Boleslawski.

What was the name of that play I saw him in?

HUSING: Life is just a Boleslawski with a Hey Tuskaneenie and a Hot Cha Cha. Oh Mr. Brady...I want you to meet our guest of honor. Hey Steve...Mr. Brady...this is Steve Brody.

O'KEEFE: Well I've seen Brooklyn and I don't blame you for jumping.

JACK: Oh, I had lots of fun today...I jumped off a bridge and landed on a tugboat.

HUSING: But it was all right, Mr. Brady. .. he landed on his head.

He always lands on his head.

JACK: Yeah...it don't ever affect me... (LAUGHS)

O'KEEFE: No...anybody can see that. Well, glad I met you Steve.

BIZ: ROLL ON DRUMS...PATTER OF APPLAUSE

VON ZELL: (VERY SPIELERISH) And now gents, if you'll kindly remove
your hats and put your coats on I will bring out that great
singer...the toast of New York...Miss Lillian Bustle..
Miss Bustle will sing "Don't Turn My Picture to the Wall."

VOICE OFF
MIKE - TONY: She's rotten.

VON ZELL: Nevertheless, she will sing "Don't Turn My Picture to the Wall."

BIZ: CHORD IN G

FROST: (SINGS)

O'KEEFE: (AT BREAKS) Ah...what a voice... I must meet this nightingale...
Ah...what a voice...wonderful..

BIZ: BIG GONG RINGS

HUSING: Pardon me, Madam...

O'KEEFE: Ah, Francois...

HUSING: Yes, Mr. Brady ...

O'KEEFE: Did you ever HEAR singing like that before?

HUSING: Yes...once...but the joint was raided.

O'KEEFE: Francois you're a fool...you're deaf to music and you're blind to beauty...look at that lovely creature...beautiful... distinguished...refined...a lady...I must call Miss Bustle over to my table...(WHISTLES) Hey Babe...come here.

HUSING: Miss Bustle...this is Diamond Jim Brady...

O'KEEFE: Ah Miss Bustle...you do me a great honor. Never have I seen a flower so blessed with telent, refinement and culture...

FROST: Tanks.. Youse is soitinly a high class gent.

O'KEEFE: Ah Miss Bustle...your singing voice is only equalled by your speaking voice..(LAUGH) Here...permit me to give you a few diamonds...

FROST: Okay...put them in my handbag.

BIZ: SOUND EFFECT .. TO RESEMBLE COAL ROLLING DOWN A CHUTE

O'KEEFE: Miss Bustle...It's my duty to give your voice to the world.

It would be greedy of me to keep it to myself.

BIZ: CROWD CHEERS

O'KEEFE: Who's that they're cheering?

FROST: The new heavyweight champion of the world. I'll call him over. Hey John...John L..Uh? Mr. Brady, I want you to meet the champ...

SORIN: Dot's me...John L. Solomon...the Irish Strongboy. I'll fight anybody in the house, of course, of course.

BIZ: ORCHESTRA PLAYS "DARLING I AM GROWING OLDER"

VON ZELL: And so ends the first act of Walter O'Keefe's portrayal of Diamond Jim Brady and the curtain is lowered to denote the passage of fifty years. Diamond Jim is now seventy-five years old...(my how time flies)...and Jim is still going to his old hangouts. We pick him up as he is entering Delmonico's Restaurant.

BIZ: MURMUR OF VOICES AFTER MUSIC PADES

NOTE: THE FOLLOWING DIALOGUE IS ALL IN OLD VOICES

HUSING: (QUAKING OLD VOICE) Ah...Monsieur Le Brady...Bong Jour...Bong Soir...Comment on va...You raymembair me...Francois...

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O'KEEFE: Ah yes...Francois...You still look like Ted Husing to me...
Who's dining here tonight?

HUSING: Well oveir their in the cormair.

O'KEEFE: If you can't learn French in fifty years you'd better drop it.

HUSING: Well, over there is Porros Borros Stanislaus Tuskaneeny
Boleslawski Junior. And there's Steve Brody.

O'KEEFE: Hiya Steve ... Still jumping off bridges ...

JACK: (YOUNG VOICE) Yeah...Lookit this medal...Husing, old man...I got this little one for jumping off the Brooklyn Bridge.

O'KEEFE: What, s the big medal for?

JACK: For jumping back up.

O'KEEFE: Well Steve, you're still eccentric, eh?

JACK: Don't kid me...I'm nuts.

BIZ: ROLL ON THE DRUMS

VON ZELL: And now, ladies and gentlemen, we offer the toast of New York...

Miss Lillian Bustle...Miss Bustle will sing "Looky Looky

Looky Here Comes Cookie."

TONY: (OFF MIKE) She's STILL rotten.

VON ZELL: Nevertheless, she will still sing "Looky Looky Looky Here Comes Cookie."

BIZ: CHORD IN G

FROST: (SINGS)

BIZ: GONG RINGS

FROST: Aw shucks, Major...missed again.

HUSING: Say Mr. Brady...how about buying me a drink?

O'KEEFE: Eh?

HUSING: I said how about buying me a drink?

O'KEEFE: I cain't hear you...

HUSING: (NATURAL) I said how about buying me a drink?

O'KEEFE: (NATURAL VOICE) I still can't hear you.

FROST: Evenin' Diamond Jim...

O'KEEFE: Evenin' Lillian...Listen, Lillian, stick with me and I'll make you a star yet...

FROST: Better hurry...I'll be playin' a harp pretty soon...

O'KEEFE: I'm buying some perfume for you Lil. . . Do you want it scented?

FROST: Hanh?

O'KEEFE: Do you want your perfume scented?

FROST: No...I'll come over and get it myself.

BIZ: CHEERING

FROST: Say Jam...it's the champion...

SORIN: Hullo hullo hullo Mr. Brady ...

O'KEEFE: Well John L...who you been fightin' lately?

SORIN: Pincus Fitzsimmons...Moe Dempsey...and Julius Tunney...

O'KEEFE: Don t tell me you're still fighting at nine ty-seven...

SORIN: Yes...I'm fighting next week...I can't lose...I'll beat him...

O'KEEFE: You'll beat who?

SORIN: Baer...I'm feeling top tip...I'll tear him to pieces...
