JUST LISTEN TO WHAT HE THINKS OF THE BEAUTIFUL SNOW!

2 (PAUSE)

3 ANNCH: Mr. Moore's remarks have been colated in the public  
interest! THIS is U.S.C.!

4 WILSON: WHERE WE GOES --

FERRIS MOORE AND MOLLY

5 (APPLAUSE)

6 SOUND: SNOW SHOVELING...SNOW

7 FIB: Dad rot this stuff...SNOW!! All it causes is trouble. Wet  
feet...traffic jams...hard work...SNOW! Why do we have to  
have it? WHAT'S IT GOOD FOR?

8 MOL: How much did you pay for that snow-shovel?

9 FIB: Three bucks.

10 MOL: If we never had any snow, it would be stupid to buy a  
snow-shovel, wouldn't it?

11 FIB: Wel-l-l yes, but -

12 MOL: SO - that's what snow is good for. It proves you're not  
so stupid.

1 FIB: KKK! ...it does at that, don't it? Yeah...Ain't that a wonderful thought? Thousands of tons of snow, all over the country, just to prove that I ain't stupid. Kids makes you stop and think, don't it? I sometimes - (LAUGH)

2 MCL: What's the matter?

3 FIB: Just listening. For the phone. That guy ever call again?

4 MCL: Who?

5 FIB: I dunno.

6 MCL: Then what...er guy are you talking about?

7 FIB: The guy that phoned this morning while you were takin' out the ashes and I was in the shower, and by the time I got up from slippin' on the soap and got downstairs it stopped ringin'. You know, the guy that the next time he called I was in the basement gettin' the snow shovel out from under three tons of coal that they dumped it down the chute while I was playin' in the Sixx Pool Tournament last week and they didn't know the snow shovel was there. That guy.

8 MCL: Ohh, him! No, I haven't gotten a call all morning. Who was it?

9 FIB: That's what bothers me, kiddo! I didn't expect nobody to call, but somebody did call, and anybody that calls somebody, it must be important or they wouldn't of went to the trouble to of rang me up in the first place - much less the second place - would they of?

- 1 NOL: How do you know they were both the same call?
- 2 FIB: They weren't - they were two different calls. And when  
the same guy calls us two different times about the same  
thing, it must be urgent. Hey, you think it was the Hot  
O'Gal??
- 3 NOL: I doubt it - they've been off the air for several years.
- 4 FIB: Well, our phone's been busy a lot. HEY, THAT'S IT! I HIT  
IT'S ONE OF THEM QUIZ SHOWS!
- 5 NOL: Oh, McGee, I don't think -
- 6 FIB: LOOK - let's be logical - are you expecting a call from a  
Quiz Show?
- 7 NOL: No, I'm not. That's what I say -
- 8 FIB: Neither an If And When do them guys always call? When you  
least expect it, that's when! Boyboy - keep listening,  
Holly!
- 9 NOL: All right. You shovel while I listen.
- 10 SOUND: SHOVELLING...SQUEE
- 11 FIB: Show!!! This is hard work. How can anything that looks  
so light weigh so much?
- 12 NOL: The paper commented on that this morning.
- 13 FIB: It did?
- 14 NOL: Yes...it said this was the heaviest snow we'd had for a  
long time.
- 15 FIB: I believe it, Tootsie, because...Hi, Ole.
- 16 NOL: Well, that isn't a very good reason, but...OH...IT IS  
OLE. Hello,Ole.

- 1 OLE: (FADE IN) Hello, Missus. Hello McGee. Taking a little exercise?
- 2 FIB: Yeah, cleanin' off the sidewalk, Ole. You got the sidewalks clean in front of your house.
- 3 OLE: It don't snow on the sidewalks at my house, McGee - I got influence. I got a cousin with the Weather Bureau.
- 4 MCL: Heavenly Says - everything is political! How can a cousin with the weather bureau fix it so it doesn't snow on your sidewalk?
- 5 OLE: Very simple, Missus - when the weather says snow, he comes over and helps me cover the sidewalk with a tarpaulin. When it snows, it snows on the tarp.
- 6 FIB: (ADMIRINGLY) Nigwah, that's a pretty un-genius idea, Ole! Cover the pavement with a tarp, eh?
- 7 OLE: Sure. All the neighbors got a big laugh yesterday when they watch us cover the walks - (CHUCKLES) but guess who laughs today when we pick up the tarp and dump all the snow in the street - with a clean sidewalk.
- 8 MCL: You had the last laugh, did you?
- 9 OLE: No, the street department did. They make me shovel it off their street and down a sewer.
- 10 FIB: That tarpaulin idea is pretty good. I'll have to try it.

- 1 OLE: It's no good when it's windy, though. Spread it down  
and think you got it all fixed, then big wind comes up  
and you know what happens?
- 2 MOL: What?
- 3 OLE: You blow your tarp. It was like I told my missus when we  
got Danish postcard from my Uncle in Copenhagen.
- 4 FIB: A Danish postcard? Could you read it?
- 5 OLE: No, but I recognize the nationality of the handwriting.  
"look," I say to my missus..."something is written in  
Danmark!" She don't think it very funny but she laff  
like everything.
- 6 MOL: Why did she laugh, if she didn't think it was funny?
- 7 OLE: All the kids was there. If papa say something funny,  
and mam don't laff, it makes disrespect.
- 8 FIB: Finally all well and happy, Ole? Have a nice Christmas?
- 9 OLE: Oh sure, McDoc. Everybody gets exactly what he wants.  
Except me. I always get something useful. I got  
electric razor.
- 10 MOL: Well, say now that IS a useful gift, isn't it?
- 11 OLE: Sure is, Missus. All Christmas day, I crawl around on  
hands and knees, looking for ragged places in electric  
wires, then I trim them off with razor. I shave all the  
electric in the house.
- 12 FIB: But an electric razor is to shave your FACE with, Ole.
- 13 OLE: What? It is? Well, why don't somebody told me these  
things?
- 14 MOL: Well, anyway, your wife won't be trying to sharpen  
pencils with it!

1 GLE: (LAUGHS) No, I guess she (PAUSE) Wait a minute..knowing  
my niece like I do, niece....I won't be too sure....I  
go home and took a look! (PAUSE) So long both you fellas.

2 AD LIB SOUNDS

3 FIB: Well, back to work, kiddo!

4 MOL: By the way - why the extra shovel on the porch?

5 FIB: I charge off, when this one gets too hot, I use that one.

6 SOUND: SHVELLING. CONTINUE TILL PHONE RINGS (OFF)

7 MOL: MOORE..THE PHONE....THE TELEPHONE!!

8 FIB: THE PHONE! THAT'S IT - THAT'S THE GUY THAT- I'LL GET IT!

9 SOUND: RUNNING FEET..STUMBLE..FIB YELPS..BOY FALL..CLATTER  
OF SHOVEL

10 FIB: (MOANS) Oh, that daddratted snow shovel.

11 SOUND: PHONE RINGS OVER IT

12 MOL: (PAUSE IN) Heavenly days, let me help you up. Are you  
hurt?

13 FIB: I dunno yet.. Answer the phone, willya? I'll get up  
later. Quick, the phone.

14 SOUND: PHONE RINGS .. MOANS:

15 MOL: I can't get in the house..you're lying across the door.

16 FIB: Well, kick me outta the way quick, before the phone stops!

17 SOUND: PHONE..HALF A RING AND STOPS

18 MOL: It's stopped.

19 FIB: (GROANS INTO:)

20 ORCH: "MUSICALS' WORLD"

(APPLAUSE)

1 SOUND: SHOVELLING SNOW...WIND AND TREE CUT

2 FIB: Well this is hard work. Hey, you know something?

3 MOL: Yes. The population of Hindustan, as of the 1910 census --

4 FIB: No, no, no...I mean about snow shovelling.

5 MOL: Oh.

6 FIB: I think medical students oughtta spend several hours a year shovelling snow. It oughtta be part of the regular curriculum.

7 MOL: Part of the what?

8 FIB: Cranium. The school curriculum. You know...the course of study.

9 MOL: You mean "curriculum", lover.

10 FIB: I do? I thought curriculum was balance. Like a tight-rope walker uses a catralla to maintain his curriculum.

11 MOL: That's equilibrium.

12 FIB: Yeah? (LAUGHS) Don't kid me, kiddo! Equilibrium is a guy that rides a horse. Everybody knows that. There's an equilibrium statue of General Sherman in the --

13 MOL: Oh no, no, no...that's EQUILIBRIUM. It's from "vestrian" which means a cow pony, and "EQU", from vooen riders pretending to be scared for the benefit of a good-looking cowboy. "EQU-VESTRIAN".

14 FIB: Oh. Well, then what did I say wrong in the first place?

- 1 MOL: You said crenius instead of curriculum. Crenius is your head.
- 2 FIB: Certainly!! As I was sayin', if medical students used their heads, they'd spend a lotta time shovel-ling snow. Because when you shovel snow, you discover muscles you never knew you had and - (FADE) Was that the photo?
- 3 MOL: No. I don't think so. I didn't hear anything.
- 4 FIB: Thought I heard the photo. I sure wish I knew who was calling me. May be a lotta dough at stake. Big job in Washington...Who knows?
- 5 SOUND: SNOW SHOVELLING...SUSTAIN
- 6 FIB: Boy, this is fun! Wanna try it a while, tootsie?
- 7 MOL: No.
- 8 FIB: Very smart! Tough job!
- 9 SOUND: SNOW SHOVELLING
- 10 MOL: Hold it dearie....here comes a man...
- 11 SOUND: SHOVELLING OUT
- 12 FIB: Who's that?
- 13 MOL: Search me...I don't think I--
- 14 CLIFF: (FADE IN) I beg your pardon...sir...and waden, sorry to interrupt your work.
- 15 FIB: That's okay, buster, glad to have you.
- 16 CLIFF: Glad to have me what?
- 17 MOL: Interrupt his work.
- 18 CLIFF: Be happy to! You start shovel-ling again, sir, and I'll walk up and interrupt you. We'll just pretend that we ---

- 1 FIB: AW OUT IT OUT! You know what I mean, I'm jus' kidding.
- 2 CLIFF: Joss kidding? Well, glad to know you, Joss. I'm  
Orville Pagaley. And this, I presume, is Mrs. Joss  
kidding?
- 3 MUI: No, Mr. Pagaley...I'm Mrs. McGee. My husband is --
- 4 CLIFF: Look, baby...what you tell your husband is your own  
business. If you want to stand and bat the fat with  
Joss here, I'm not one to run and gab to your old man.  
Eh, Joss?
- 5 FIB: STOP POKING ME IN THE RIBS AND STOP CALLING ME JOSS!  
I'm--
- 6 CLIFF: Oh, I'M sorry, it WAS a bit familiar of me, wasn't it?  
Believe me, Mr. Kidding, I'm not one to take advantage  
of a --- By the way, baby, what's YOUR first name?
- 7 MUI: None of your business!
- 8 CLIFF: It is? Well, it's certainly strange what parents will do  
to children in the way of names, isn't it? Mrs. None-of-  
Your-Business McGee! I had a cousin named Dog of Biscuit  
Anderson and an Uncle named Bird Lay Square Egg. He was  
a full blooded Navajo Indian -- That is he WAS full  
blooded, until one day he cut himself while knifing a  
friend and ---
- 9 MUI: Excuse me, Mr. Pagaley. Orville.
- 10 CLIFF: Yes, None-of-your-Business? Oh, I think that's a  
delightful name. I never would have ---

- 1 FIB: DAD HAD IT, FURSLAK.... IF YOU DON'T WANT THIS SNOW  
SHOVEL WRAPPED AROUND YOUR CURBSTONE ---
- 2 MCL: Cynical.
- 3 FIB: WRAPPED AROUND YOUR CURBSTONE ---
- 4 CLIFF: Now now now...no reason for tempers to flare up, Mr.  
Kidding. I merely stopped by to inquire some directions.
- 5 MCL: Very well....where do you want to get
- 6 CLIFF: I want to go home and finish making my angel food cake.  
I didn't understand the directions so I thought I'd ask  
the first intelligent people I saw, but unfortunately, I  
met you two first. Tell me, how does one fold an egg?
- 7 FIB: That's quite simple, Grville. Beat the egg in a cup, fry  
it in a small pan, then let it cool and you'll find that  
it folds quite easily.
- 8 CLIFF: Well, THANK you, neighbor! (FADE) If these cook books  
were a little more specific....
- 9 SOUND: SNOW SKYLLING...FADE (1)
- 10 FIB: Well anyway, that lesson had given a little breather so -
- 11 SOUND: OFF...TELEPHONE
- 12 MCL: Oh, oh! There's the telephone again, McGee! I'll get it  
this time and -
- 13 FIB: NO...I'LL GET IT....MUST BE FOR ME!....
- 14 SOUND: MUFFLED SPEECH...ONE RING (MUSIC)
- 15 FIB: (MUSIC) Oh, that DELICIOUS snow shovel.
- 16 MCL: (FADE IN) Sweetheart....darling....are you hurt?

- 1 FIB: No ...I .. don't think so.. Quiet! Help me up so I  
can answer the - (FADE)
- 2 SOUND: PHONE RING RING
- 3 FIB: Ain't that the doggiest... WHO DO YOU SUPPOSE IT IS?
- 4 MOL: I haven't the faintest idea.. .
- 5 FIB: Me either. That's what's got me worried. If it  
wasn't important he wouldn't keep calling me, would  
they? Hey, DO YOU SUPPOSE ANYTHING WONDERFUL HAS  
HAPPENED TO YOUR RICH AUNT SARAH? LIKE SHE FELL OFF THE  
DOOP?
- 6 MOL: No, and get that happy look off your face.
- 7 FIB: Just a thought.
- 8 SOUND: SHUVELLING SORES(2)
- 9 WIL: (FADE IN OVER:) Well, hello there, Pal...Hello, Moll, .
- 10 MOL: Hello, Mr. Wilson.
- 11 FIB: Hiyah, Junior. Hey...you been trying to get me on the  
telephone today? Somebody's been tryin' to get me on  
the telephone and I thought if it was you tryin' to get  
me on the telephone, I -- (FADE) Was that the  
telephone?
- 12 WIL: (FADE'S) Don't hear anything, Pal. BUT SAY...IT MIGHT  
HAVE BEEN FOR ME!
- 13 MOL: It might of?
- 14 FIB: Why might it of?

1 WIL: Well, simply because I -- Hey, let me take that soon  
shovel a minute, Pal... you look tired.

2 ED: LOOK tired... I AM tired! Sure, Junior... (GLARE)  
Don't of you to help.

3 WIL: Forget it.

4 ED: But why were you expecting a call here, Mr. Wilcox?

5 WIL: Eh? Oh. Well, I told my secretary I might drop by  
and to call me here if there was anything urgent,  
because I was expecting a call from the sponsor.

- 1 FIB: About what? Pet Milk Business?

.....and boy! - come to think of it that call couldn't  
have been for me - I got that yesterday. So long now!
- 8 MIL: Well, of all the dirty tricks! Oh well.. let's get thru  
here McGee and get in the house...then if the phone  
rings again, we'll be there.
- 9 FIB: RIGHT!!
- 10 ~~WIL:~~ WIL: SHYLY SUSTAIN:
- 11 MIL: (OVER SHOVELING) I will say for you dearie, that you're  
doing a fine job!!
- 12 ~~WIL:~~ WIL: OUT
- 13 FIB: What's say, kiddo?

- 1 FIB: Now then... whaddya say, Tootsie?
- 2 MOL: I said here come... Doctor Gumble... Hello, Doctor!
- 3 FIB: OH, HI DOC!
- 4 DOC: (PAUSE IN) Hello, Molly. And good day to you, Maclebound.
- 5 FIB: Whaddya mean, "Maclebound"?.. At least I can lean over and see where I been shovelling without stepping back three paces, and that's more than you could do. With that steak-and-potatoes veranda of yours, it's a wonder you ever know if your socks match!
- 6 DOC: I'll give you a couple sometime - on the ship, and we'll see. And another thing, Athlete. Take it easy with snow shovels. You're no high school boy you know, if you ever were, and if you were I'll bet it wasn't for very long. Anyway, at your age, I'd suggest you leave the hard physical work to -
- 7 SOUND: TELEPHONE OFF:
- 8 FIB: HAY....TELEPHONE!!! IT'S RINGING!!
- 9 MOL: I'll answer it, McGee, you stay here and talk to Doct-
- 10 FIB: NO, NO, NO....IT'S FOR ME....I'M SURE....I'LL GET IT....  
(PAUSE) BACK IN A MINUTE DOC AS SOON AS I SEE WHO --
- 11 SOUND: TELEPHONE (OFF)
- 12 MOL: BE CAREFUL THIS TIME DWARIE....REMEMBER HOW YOU----

1 SOUND: RAIN FALLING

2 FIB: (MOANS) Forget about that dandruffed snow shovel.

3 NOL: (FAIR IN) Heavenly days...the poor lad...come on  
Doctor....I think we need you.

4 DOC: (FAIR IN) He doesn't need me after a fall like that. He  
needs six muscular friends and a brief eulogy by somebody  
who doesn't know him too well.....

5 FIB: (GROANS) Help me up...somebody....I gotta answer the  
phone....

6 NOL: Too late, dearie...it stopped ringing...are you hurt  
badly? Look him over will you, Doctor?

7 DOC: I've been looking him over for a month / of years and he  
gets no prettier. Think you've busted anything,  
Strawfoot?

8 FIB: I think I busted everything...looks that bone sticking  
out! What's that...my clavicle?

9 NOL: No, that's the handle of your snow shovel. Is he all  
right, Doctor?

10 DOC: Sit up graceful. That's it...(FIB GROANS) Take a deep  
breath. (FIB GASPS)

Is that your idea of a deep breath? I hope you never  
have to swim across a fingertowel, under water. TAKE A  
DEEP BUL....

(FIB: GASPS)

- 1 DOC: Feel any pain?
- 2 FIB: Yeah.
- 3 MEL: Where, sweetheart?
- 4 FIB: In my knee.
- 5 DOC: I apologize...you DID take a deep breath. You're all right, Chowdertrain. Just skinned and bruised.
- 6 FIB: I better quit shoveling snow for today, eh?
- 7 DOC: Who said that?
- 8 MEL: McGee did.
- 9 FIB: Better take it easy, eh? Relax!
- 10 DOC: Certainly not...get back and shovel...loosen up those stiff muscles...NOT TOO HARD, MIND YOU!! just shovel easy...Then take a hot bath, and lie down a couple of hours. And now, if you'll excuse me, I've got to get back to the hospital. Accident case.
- 11 FIB: What kind, Lardot?
- 12 DOC: Man slipped and fell down with his neck across his snow-shovel and broke it in two places. (PAUSE) Well, so long.
- 13 SAUND: FOOTSTEPS DOWN OFF PORCH...PAUSE OUT:
- 14 MEL: Did he mean his -?
- 15 FIB: Gee! I didn't have the nerve to ask!
- 16 OPEN A KING MEN... "HILLABALOO"
- 17 (APPLAUSE)

THIRD SPOT

- 1 SOUND: SLAW SCRAPE OF SKIING
- 2 MIL: How does your back feel now, dearie? Better?
- 3 FIB: (SLIGHT GRAN) No - but my leg hurts so bad I don't notice my back any more. You oughta see my knees! They look like I been shootin' craps on a pile of broken glass!
- 4 MIL: Look, sweetheart, why don't you go in and lie down? Then if the phone rings -
- 5 FIB: NO SIR! (GRAN) I started this job and by George I'm gonna finish it! (SCRAPE) At this point I don't care if that dafforded phone NEVER rings again! I wouldn't answer the thing now if it was - (PAUSE)
- 6 MIL: (PAUSE) No, sweetheart. No. It didn't ring.
- 7 FIB: Thought I heard it. Anyhow, like I say - Oh hey, take that extra shovel off the steps and get it outta the way, willya?
