5 SOUNDS: DOOR OPENS AND CLOSSES. OFF:

6 MOL: (SLIGHTLY OFF) Yoo-Hoo, McGee - I'm home!

7 FIB: Okay! I'd give you a hand, kiddo, but I'm settin' down.  
 You need some help with the groceries?

8 MOL: (FADING IN) Oh no, thanks dearie. I only spent 3 dollars

9 FIB: Good. That oughta feed us for --- Where's the groceries?

10 MOL: In my purse. I only bought a few -.

11 FIB: IN YOUR PURSE??? (SHOCKED) HOLY SHAKE!! YOU MEAN TO TELL  
 ME YOU CAN CARRY THREE DUCKS WORTH OF GROCERIES IN YOUR

12 MOL: It isn't hard, believe me! I shop carefully, because

- 7 FIB: Why is it every time I get ready to go out, somebody drops in? COME IN!
- 8 SOUND: DOOR OPENS:
- 9 MCL: Oh hello, Mr. Old Timer!
- 10 OLD M: HELLO THERE KIDS! HI, DAUGHTER - HEY JOHNNY, didja see the paper? The New York Yankees was in town - had a parade here.
- 11 FIB: The Yankees? A parade? I'd like to -.
- 12 OLD M: Accordin' to the paper here, they marched down 30th Street in two rows - side by side!

- 1 MCL: Where does it say that?
- 2 OLD M: Here's the headline, daughter - says "YAKS CROSS WITH-  
PARALLEL"
- 3 FIB: Aw no, that's -
- 4 OLD M: And that's the news for today, kids - what's news with  
youse?
- 5 FIB: Plenty boy! I just woke up to how high up the high cost  
of livin' has went up, lately. Why up!
- 6 MCL: Do you have much trouble making both ends meet these days  
Mr. Old Timer?
- 7 OLD M: Yes I do, daughter. I wota could bend over and touch  
my toes any time, but seems like I can't even reach my  
knees any more. Arm's are gettin' shorter, I guess.  
Ain't made both ends meet since -

- 7 OLD M: Bossie's sister had the same problem, daughter. Worried  
her to death. But she figured out a wonderful deal,  
though. Cut her grocery bills right in half and still  
eats as good as ever!
- 8 FIB: Migoah, how's she do that? We'll try it.
- 9 OLD M: You won't like the plan, Johnny. She shot her husband!  
(LAUGHS) So long, daughter.

10 SOUND: DOOR SLAM

11 OPEN: THE INSOURATED CLOCK

12 (APPLAUSE)

SECOND SPOT

- 1 SOUND: FOOTSTEPS ALONG PAVEMENT -- TRAFFIC
- 2 MOLE: Here's where I trade, McGee.
- 3 FIB: Oh, the Wistful Vista Cash and Carry.
- 4 MOLE: Yes...
- 5 FIB: We have a charge here.
- 6 MOLE: Oh, look, they must have had a holdup, McGee! Look at all the policemen at the door!
- 7 FIB: Yeah, they - oh, that's a money wagon there, they must be deliverin' the payroll. Boy, look at the guns! They take so -
- 8 COP: (SLIGHTLY OFF) ALL RIGHT, MEN - CLOSE RANKS!! I WANT A SOLID LINE FROM THIS FRONT DOOR TO THE TRUCK! (CRASH HEARD)
- 9 MOLE: Don't they look business-like, McGee? Look - the man with the machine gun - carrying the little box.
- 10 FIB: Yeah. What is it, bud - the payroll?
- 11 COP: So - four pound fib roast. WATCH IT MEN! FOUR POUND WHAT HAPPENED LAST WEEK!!
- 12 MOLE: What happened last week?

- 1 OUF: Carload of western gangsters, lady - hijacked a pork chop.  
ALL RIGHT, LET'S GO!
- 2 SOUND: CARS ROAR AWAY.
- 3 FIB: Wonder if it was insured...Oh, well. Let's get started.  
Grab a basket, while I check my list here. I'll pay as  
I go.
- 4 MOL: Yes you will. Through the nostrils, I might add.
- 5 FIB: Lemme see now, first - HEY DOC.
- 6 CLERK: Yes sir.
- 7 FIB: Loaf of bread, please. Here's my nickel. (CLERK)
- 8 CLERK: (PAUSE) You been away, mister?
- 9 MOL: Yes he has, sir. In fact, he's not quite back yet.
- 10 FIB: What's more?
- 11 CLERK: Bread, sir, is 15¢ a loaf.
- 12 FIB: FIFTEEN CENTS?? FOR A LOAF OF BREAD?? THAT'S RIDICULOUS!!  
I WON'T PAY IT! Keep your bread! We'll take biscuits!  
Gimme some biscuit flour.
- 13 CLERK: Here you are, sir. 47¢.
- 14 FIB: SKIP IT! I'll plant wheat! Come on, Molly - let's walk  
down this way...
- 15 MOL: You should come shopping with me afterward, docrie. This  
sort of thing has been going on since - Ohh, look who's  
here, McGee - Hello, Doctor Gashio!
- 16 DOC: Hello, Molly. And good day to you, Knucklebones.
- 17 FIB: HI, Bacon-Belly. How's the pill-peddlin' racket?  
Business good?

- 1 DOC: Business, I am happy to say, is terrible, my boy.  
Wistful Vieta has had an epidemic of good health lately -  
thanks to Old Doc Gable.
- 2 FIB: Sure, sure. I been readin' nice things about you lately,  
Doc, old man.
- 3 DOC: Really? Where?
- 4 FIB: The May issue of the Witch Doctor's Digest. Is it true  
you discovered a way to dye buckshot yellow and sell it  
for penicillin tablets? You oughta make a fortune just -
- 5 DOC: OH, FIVE DOWN, Clabberhead. You're not fancy! How'd  
you ever get him out of the house to help you shop,  
Molly - set fire to the divan?
- 6 MOL: No, he's down here to investigate the high cost of  
living, Doctor. He can't figure out where our grocery  
money's going.
- 7 DOC: Oh, he can't? Has it occurred to you to look inside  
the lower part of your vest, Button Buster? You've  
got enough pure lard behind your belt buckle to French  
fry a rhinoceros.

- 1 FIB: Now, now, now, let's not get personal, Tallie Bucket!  
This cost of living thing is all of us's problem, boy.  
We're all infected by it.
- 2 MP's: You mean AF-fected, dearie. IS-fected more-
- 3 FIB: I know - these food prices sure are sick!
- 4 DOC: Well, I have one suggestion, my boy. If you think the  
cost of living is too high, why don't you stop?
- 5 FIB: Stop what?
- 6 DOC: Living! So long, Molly.
- 7 SOUND: FOXGLOVES, BEHIND.
- 8 FIB: Well, come on, Molly, if we're gonna find any bargains -  
hey, wait a minute! There's a guy demonstratin'  
somethin', Molly! Come on, free samples!
- 9 MOL: You - it looks like he's pouring -
- 10 FIB: HEY DUD, WHICHEVER YOU'RE GIVIN' AWAY, WE'LL TAKE AN  
ARMSLOAD AND - Oh boy, it's Wilcox!
- 11 WIL: Well, hello, Pal - Hi, Molly! Stop right up and have a  
cup of coffee with that wonderful Pal Evaporated Milk.

5 FIB: Speakin' of "house", Junior - house about one more cup?  
6 WIL: Help yourself, Pal. You see, the first big bargain, of

showcase!

12 FIB: Boy, I'd like to take that home! What's the sign - Oh.  
"PRICES QUOTED ON REQUEST AND BY APPOINTMENT ONLY! FREE  
SMILING SALES!" Migooh, if that ain't the --

- 1 MCL: McGee, this meat counter is killing me! I haven't seen so much raw, red meat since the Sunday we spent at Coney Island!
- 2 FIB: Hey Molly - look at this baked beef!
- 3 MCL: Ooo, that looks delicious, McGee! Don't torture me, because -
- 4 FIB: Maybe we could buy a few - HEY BUD! Let's take a look at the baked ham, willya.
- 5 BUTCH: Certainly sir. Mind putting up a small deposit, just as evidence of good faith?
- 6 FIB: DEPOSIT?
- 7 BUTCH: Your bank book - wristwatch - any small thing will do for -
- 8 MCL: For goodness sake! Here! Will my wedding ring do?
- 9 BUTCH: (REVERIES) Well, it's a little irregular, but - (SLIDES CASE OPEN) Here, take a look. DON'T TOUCH IT, SIR! JUST LOOK! It's our best grade of -
- 10 FIB: BOY, THAT SMELLS WONDERFUL! (SNIFF-SNIFF) Sniff it, Molly!
- 11 MCL: (SNIFFS) Oohhh, isn't that wonderful!
- 12 FIB: Yeah. Letme have fifteen cents worth of that, bud! What the heck, make it two bits worth!
- 13 BUTCH: Two-bits worth? You've just HAD a collar worth, mister!
- 14 SOUND: SLAM CASE:
- 15 FIB: Awwwwww.....
- 16 MCL: Come on, McGee, let's go - oh, hello there, Mr. Mayor!

- 1 GALE: (PAISE IN) Hello, Holly. Hello, McGee.
- 2 FIB: Hiya, La Triv. YOU'RE JUST THE GUY I'M LOOKIN' FOR!  
YOU'RE THE MAYOR. WHAT ARE YOU DOING ABOUT POOR PRICES.
- 3 GALE: Shuddering. What are you doing?
- 4 MCL: Shopping. We took all our money out of our piggy bank, some  
downtown to shop, saw the prices, so now we're going  
home and eat the piggy.
- 5 FIB: You know what I think is the cause of high prices today,  
La Trivia? My theory of the cause of high prices, is  
that everything costs more. Whaddya think?
- 6 GALE: I think you have something there, McGee, and I hope it  
isn't contagious, because I don't want to get it.
- 7 MCL: I don't suppose there's really any use to blame the  
grocers for the high prices. Which is too bad...because  
it's so easy to hang it on them.
- 8 GALE: No...it's just general inflation, I guess. You  
understand inflation, McGee?
- 9 FIB: No.
- 10 GALE: Well let me explain it to you.
- 11 MCL: Please do, Mr. Mayor.
- 12 FIB: Yeah...you can try, anyway. I'M pretty hard to  
explain things to because when I don't pay attention,  
I pretend I heard everything, and when I DO pay  
attention, I don't understand because I'm too busy  
thinkin' of what I'm gonna say when you get through.  
But go ahead, boy. Try.

1 GALE: Very well. Inflation is a spiral. Do you know what a spiral is?

2 MCL: Yes. A spiral is something that rises and turns around at the same time, like the man in front of you at the movie when you stick your foot through the back of the seat.

3 GALE: Er....yes. But let's think of a spiral in terms of a coiled spring. Like the springs in your davenport.

4 FIB: Oh you mean inflation makes you lose sleep.

5 GALE: NO NO NO!...Look. When prices rise and wages are raised to keep up with it, then costs of manufacture and processing rise to pay the wages which means prices have to go up too. That is a spiral.....

6 MCL: CHISSSSSI, I HESI.....LIKE A COILED SPRING....

7 GALE: Exactly...and like the springs in your davenport. when it gets out of control...it will get you in the end...!!!  
Good day...

8 ORCH AND KING'S MEN: "WHEN YOU AND I WERE YOUNG, WAGGIE, BLUES"

9 APPLAUSE

THIRD SCENE

- 1 MCL: Well, I will say you're an economical shopper, dearie. You've been here three hours and you haven't spent over a dollar yet.
- 2 FIB: Nope.
- 3 MCL: Of course, you haven't bought anything but 6 cigars. Look why don't you give in, dearie?
- 4 FIB: NO SIR!
- 5 MCL: Let's take the fifteen dollars - buy ten dollars worth of ham and five dollars worth of eggs and go knock ourselves out!
- 6 FIB: NO SIR, THIS THING HAS GOT MY BACK UP! I'LL FIND A BARGAIN IF I HAPTA GET THE MANAGER BY THE THROAT AND CHECKE THE - HEY HOO, YOU THE MANAGER??
- 7 CLIFF: (STRANGLING) Yes, sir, but I - I-
- 8 MCL: MOOKE, TUSH LOOSE OF THE MAN'S THROAT!!
- 9 FIB: Oh. Sorry, bud. Got carried away.
- 10 CLIFF: That's quite all right, sir. Our new policy. Every customer gets one free chance at strangling the manager. That's a CHECKE, son! (LAUGHS HEARTILY)
- 11 MCL: Heavenly days.
- 12 FIB: Look, bud, this may be funny stuff to you, but I ain't amused! I come down here to buy some groceries and I drive a hard bargain.

- 1 MCL: I say as well warn you, sir - he's sharp!
- 2 CLIFF: Well, I'm happy to serve you, Mr. Sharp! You must be Mrs. Sharp, Mrs. Sharp??
- 3 MCL: No, no, I'm Mrs. McOve.
- 4 FIB: Yeah, now look, bud - I'm gonna lay my cards on the table see -
- 5 CLIFF: Ohh I'm sorry sir, we don't permit gambling in the store! It is not our policy to -
- 6 FIB: Aw, cut it out! I didn't say anything about gambling! I wanta buy some groceries. Look, I'll pick out enough stuff for a week and pay you a flat fifteen bucks for it! How about it - you want a deal or not?
- 7 CLIFF: Shuffle them first - I'll cut you for deal. Let's play jokers wild, with the nines and deuces -
- 8 MCL: PLEASE SIR! We didn't come here to gamble! Can you just show us some bargains in groceries and - Here, how much are these olives?
- 9 CLIFF: Ohh, that is a splendid bargain indeed, madam! These are our finest imported stuffed olives!

- 1 FIB: What are they stuffed with?
- 2 CLIFF: Olive pits, sir. They are graded according to size. Starting with the Nuzmoth size here, they work on up through Colossal, Magnificent and Tremendous - up to the size of BB's - which we call Monster!
- 3 FIB: Yeah, well no use -
- 4 CLIFF: Then the middle-size are labelled Broulston, on up through Massive, Super-Massive and Frightening, till we come to these Giant Super-Enormous Natch Grandes, which as you can see, are about the size of noteballs. Then -
- 5 NOL: Please! Never mind the olives, sir! I wish I'd stayed home and -
- 6 CLIFF: Ohh, let me tell you about an amusing thing that happened here yesterday! My brother has a sailboat at Dagon's Lake and the wind tore all the canvas off of it.
- 7 FIB: Yeah, well -
- 8 CLIFF: So he came in yesterday and asked me for the money to buy a new sail. I gave him the money and punched it out on the cash register, whereupon he said "What did you ring on the cash register, brother?" Smiling slyly, I said "NO SAIL"! (SHRUGS HIMSELF UP) Oh, around the market here -
- 9 FIB: Aw for the - DAMN-T IT, BUD, CUT IT OUT! I'M GETTIN' SICK OF THIS!
- 10 NOL: He too, dearie, I'm going home. You can stay here if you want to but I'm tired!

1 FIB: I'm stayin'! I'll find some bargains around here if it's  
the last thing I - NOW LOOK HERE, STUPID! I'M A CUSTOMER  
OF THIS STORE AND -

2 DOOR: BRIDGE

3 MOL: Ho, Ole - McGee isn't home yet, but come in anyhow. He  
ought to be here any minute.

4 OLE: Well, thanks, Mrs. I just stay a minute. (DOOR CLOSE)

5 MOL: He's down at the grocery store, Ole. How's the family?  
Well, I hope?

6 OLE: Well, I hope so too, Mrs. What you say McGee's doing?

7 MOL: He's trying to find some grocery bargains, Ole - he thinks  
we're spending too much money for food.
