VAGUE:

Your witness, Mr. Ameche!

AMECHE:

Now look, Miss Vague, are you sure you know anything about history?

VAGUE:

Heavens to Cornwallis, yes. Why, I can tell you exactly what Marie Antoinette's last words were as she put her head in the guillatine. She said, "Je donnerai et je vous travailler me vie pourqoi."

AMECHE:

What does that mean?

VAGUE:

This is a heck of a way to get a plunging neckline!

AMECHE: Well, Jimmy asked you here to teach my boy the meaning of

VAGUE: I certainly do. Go ahead ... ask me the date of any event

DURANTE: DON'T WORRY, DEAR ... I'LL GET YOU TO THE MATERNITY WARD

IN NO TIME! (a)

VAGUE: Don't be silly, it's the Fourth of July and we have to

get ready for the town celebration...Oh, James, will you

ever forget the Fourth of July many years ago when we

were on our honeymoon? That room for two at Niagara Falls?

DURANTE: THAT'S RIGHT, BUT SOMEONE WAS ALWAYS KNOCKING AT THE DOOR.

VAGUE: Yes and don't think Mother didn't get mad when you

DURANTE:

DURANTE:

I'M BEGINNING TO GET NERVOUS ABOUT THIS SPEECH. SUPPOSING I GET STAGE FRIGHT. WHAT IF I CAN'T OPEN MY MOUTH.

VAGUE:

Then, talk through your nose...there's enough room there for the whole Gettysburg Address...But, don't worry, darling. I have a copy of the speech and I'll sit right behind you on the platform and whisper it to you.

DURANTE:

ALL RIGHT LET'S GO, THE MAYOR IS INTRODUCING ME.

MAN:

DURANTE:
