I write the woman's column for this 26 ANNE: newspaper. Cal Foster and I were engaged to be married 27 Is there anything else you'd like to know? 28

- 2 ANNE: Is that so? And just who are you?
- 3 WESTON: I'm Police Commissioner Weston.
- 4 ANNE: (SHOCKED) Police...Then it's true! Cal is dead!
- 5 MEREDITH: He was murdered, Anne.
- 6 ANNE: No! (SOBBING) Cal -- oh, Cal! We were going to
- 7 be married as soon as he finished this story. We were
- 8 going to spend our honeymoon away from the city -- and
- 9 everything. We had such plans. And now -- Cal --
- 10 Cal....
- 11 MARGOT: (VOICE BREAK) Lamont, I can't stand it.
